

We also welcomed Janet Waldo and JoAnna March, who had been our guests at special REPS monthly meetings. And to top it off we had Barbara Fuller and Sharon Doulglas with us for the first time.

Throughout this Showcase, we saw and heard these artists blend their talents into our theme of "Radio Families". Friday was kicked off with a discussion, led by Members of the Vic and Sade Club, of "radio's homefolks, Vic and Sade", followed on Saturday by a recreation of an actual Vic and Sade show. Stories about families were at the heart of old time radio, both comedy and drama. Our "Life of Riley" story had Chester getting into plenty of trouble on a boat to Catalina, and the recreation featured no less than seven actors who had appeared on the show. Sharon Douglas had played Chester's daughter Babs for several years.

We were taken back again to "The Aldrich Family", as our special guests were augmented by our friends from SPERDVAC, Stuart Lubin, Bob Lynnes and Barbara Watkins, in lead roles in this popular comedy. No matter what the problem Henry and Homer always found a way to be part of it. And if that wasn't enough trouble we were able to join "Meet Corliss Archer" as Janet Waldo and Sam Edwards once more flawlessly recreated their famous roles as Corliss and Dexter.

Tyler and Esther did a beautiful job of recreating "Ethel and Albert", which we remember so well when it was introduced last year by Peg Lynch and Parley Baer. And on Saturday some of us sat around at lunch to talk

with Norma Jean and Rhoda about "Father Knows Best", whose star and their friend Robert Young died on 21 July. Paul Secord led a panel of opinions on 'the best Radio Family Shows ("Father Knows Best" and "The Life of Riley" were right up there among the best of course). Bob Herman then took us with his panel on a review of some of the worst family radio shows, including the famous Cary Grant being unhappy about his radio version of "Mr Blandings Builds His Dream House". Bob, with the help of Sharon Douglas and Dick Beals, managed to pour cold coffee on a couple of other shows, none of which REPS will ever recreate!

But then of course there were the dramas about family life on radio. The leading prime time drama was always Carlton Morse's "One Man's Family". Using themes from the original shows, Ed Titus and Mike Sprague created a script of the Barbour family in 1998, looking back on their lives together and where they were today. It was a superb show. Barbara Fuller had been Claudia from 1945 on and Page Gilman was Jack throughout the shows

27 year run. The recreation was followed by discussion with cast members. Anne Whitfield (Penny) said "Penny was sort of a snob". "She was a headache" echoed Barbara Fuller. Several actors described how their characters were killed off on the show — a technique Morse used to move the plot ahead and introduce new characters. Sam Edwards (Tracy) was killed in the war. Morse rewarded Sam with roles in some of his other dramatic shows. Janet Waldo (Irene) came home one night to find her father distraught and informed her "You've been killed!" Sharon Douglas was married to two different characters on the show (Hank and Pinky). Barbara Fuller told us that we should all read "Killer at the Wheel" — "a fascinating book by Carlton Morse. Millie Morse, Carleton's widow, was with us again for the showcase.

Then there were the daytime soaps that some of us remember fondly when we were sick and home from school. The last show of "The Second Mrs Burton" was recreated for us, with Sharon Douglas, who originated the title role in 1946, and JoAnna March who was in the cast during its last five years starring in the show.

For the "cold read" this year, Mike and Joy selected an Ellery Queen story, "The Adventure of the Blind Bullet". Larry Dobkin, who had starred as Ellery Queen on radio, directed, and once again we had a chance to see what professionals can do after only a few minutes to look over a script and mark their lines. That dramatization was a stretch of the Radio Family theme, as was the Saturday evening recreation of an "Escape", a spooky story of people trapped in a department store after hours. Harry Bartell did the title role which he had played in the original 1949 broadcast. Gil Stratton directed.

Then, of course, there was the ever popular "Just sittin' around and visiting" hosted by Mike Sprague. Mike chose the opportunity to ask people about their memories of working with

Gale Gordon. Sharon Douglas had her first radio role opposite Gale on "The Second Mrs Burton" and enjoyed working with him. Harry Bartell pointed out that Gale was a fine dramatic actor as well as a comedian. Dick Beals remembered being in the hospital with Dick Crenna after an appendectomy and laughing so hard at Gale saying "tether the elephants" on the "Our Miss Brooks" show that they both popped their stitches. The panel also shared many memories with us of working with Virginia Gregg.

Harry Bartell did an intriguing interview with Barbara Fuller and Art Gilmore. Among Harry's favorite shows were the 50 episodes of "Escape" that he did - "the parts and writing were superb". Art Gilmore pointed out that while it was years before most actors names were mentioned in the credits, the announcers usually had a chance to give their names. "I always said 'this is Art Gilmore speaking'. Among Barbara Fuller's favorite people to work with were Charlie Chaplin, Ethyl Barrymore and Ingrid Bergman. Her favorite stage experience was in the play 'Winterset'.

Ray Erlenborn and Stewart Conway entertained us with stories and demonstrations from their years of creating sound effects. Ray said that many sounds needed to "be seen" by the audience to help the comedians get a good laugh so they were also actors as well as sound effects men. He talked about many visits to garage sales and flea markets in search of the unusual noise maker. Peach baskets were used for crunching noises, cellophane for crackling fires, and audio wires for Roy Rogers creaking saddle.

Friday was the Convention highlight as we gathered to pay acclaim to Parley Baer. John and Larry Gassman led the tribute to our dear friend Parley, which was videotaped and sent to Parley.

There are so many to thank for making Showcase VI a success, and we especially appreciate the work of Chris and Janet Conrad in organizing the excellent dealer room, and providing us with the helpful guide to nearby restaurants and waterin' holes. I hope that you enjoyed it as much as I did and we look forward to seeing you next year.







But, they didn't occur.


Why is that? You know where I'm headed with this, don't you? Many of you have been a part of the volunteer team from the beginning all the way through. What a difference you make!
