Truly one of the remarkable stories of REPS has been the resurrection and re-establishment of our Old Time Radio Tape Library. From a near disastrous fire of two years ago, at the home of Darrell and Vi Anderson, to the establishment of a new high in tape holdings is an incredible story. Unquestionably the total loss of their home and many personal possessions would have

been reason enough for the Andersons to abandon their role as Tape Library custodians but when the ashes were settled Vi and Andy's response was, "Give us a chance to rebuild our home and we will find a place and the time to continue the Library". At the time of the loss REPS had just passed the 2,000 program level and Chairman Joy Jackson was getting concerned about finding new material that the club could afford. On top of this problem the fire destroyed about half of our collection. The one saving grace was Joy's farsightedness in maintaining a master file of each tape at her home. David Speelman stepped into the breach and offered to main-

Library until the Anderson's home was restored; Michael Comstock and Cliff Glaspey assisted Joy in restoration; and, new member Glenn Sisson led an aggressive campaign to add new material to the Library. Two years later the Anderson's are not only "back in business" but are supporting an increase in holdings of 50%. REPS Library is not known just for its quantity but also its quality. If you haven't checked it out lately maybe now is the time. A hearty "well done" to Joy, Vi, Darrell and all of their volunteers!


Revisit Showcase V, with Sitting Around and Visiting. Check out a meeting: Collectors and Jo Anna March.

My favorite among this bunch are 2 tapes entitled "Fighting Air Force". These are actual transmissions from onboard B29s flying over Japan, or interviews at Air Force bases. One of the interviews was with the crew of the Enola Gay. The transmissions were generally done by broadcasters, with the exception of one who had to be a pilot. His voice was fairly flat in its delivery. But you could tell when he got excited.

The slight rise in tone as he comments "Another one at 11 o'clock. One at 3 o'clock." His concern about the incoming Japanese fighters seeps out of his rock-steady voice. It made me feel like I was there. The broadcasts fade in and out at times, and I could hear navigation warnings from the flight deck. I am grateful for the opportunity to hear such a piece of actual history, rather than just reading about it.

Cliff Glaspey replaced all of the Damon Runyon Theatre tapes that had been missing/destroyed. Yeah, Cliff! We keep plugging away on those missing

masters.

BOB BLACKBURN RECREATES FOR REPS

Bob Blackburn, the popular "voice of the Sonics", entertaineд a packed house at our June Meeting


at the Queen Anne Library Auдitorium.

Bob's announcing days began in the early 1940's as a teenager in Southern California and evolved over the years as he moved from Los Angeles to Portland and finally Seattle. Bob highlighted his early days in radio and how he went from announcing to becoming a disc jockey and, finally, broadcasting sporting events and event recreations.

REPS members were fascinated with the realism that Bob could produce with a few letters on a

"ticker tape" for a "script", some personal sound effects and, most importantly, a good imagination. Working in innumerable foul balls, arguments, and incredible game delays, while telegraph communications were lost was just one of the tests that Bob faced in recreating sports. So realistic was his work that Bob submitted tapes of recreations for job applications and the station managers reviewing the programs thought that they were listening to live broadcasts. Besides baseball Bob did LA Rams football, ice hockey and the 1952 Republican Convention.

A fun sidelight was developed when REPS favorite Ginny Tyler and Bob related some

practical jokes that they help set up when they were doing back-to-back shows at KEX in Portland. Over the years Bob developed many friendships in the sports and entertainment world.

In developing our program the recurring theme was, as expressed by a former baseball umpire and acquaintance, Gil Stratton, "Bob is a really good guy." We would all agree with that, and particularly our friends at the Evergreen Radio Reading Service for the blind who received a generous donation from Bob after the meeting. Members are awaiting a return performance and "Bob, we won't wait too long."

have been collecting old-time radio shows for about 30 years. In that time there was one program that I especially wanted, *The Eternal Light*. Fifty years ago as a child I remember listening to this program and being moved by its powerful dramas. Unlike real life, in the show Right always triumphed in the end, although sometimes at a terrible price.

The Eternal Light reached the peak of its popularity in the late 1940's and early 1950's. The format of the show was fairly standard. It opened with a Hebrew chant, followed by "The Lord spake unto Moses saying command the children of Israel, that they bring unto thee pure oil olive, beaten for the lights to cause the lamps to burn continually in the tabernacle of the congregation, and it will be a statute forever in your generation ... THE ETER-NAL LIGHT!" Thereafter followed the drama. The show ended with a guest speaker who would briefly discuss the theme of the story. The show had no sponsor and free time was made available by the National Broadcasting Company. Some of the biggest and best known performers appeared in the dramas, including Sam Edwards, Edward G. Robinson, Jeff Chandler, and numerous others.

ome have classified The

Eternal Light as a religious program,
similar to Unshackled and Family Theater. The show was
produced by the Jewish Theological Seminary and its dramas stressed Jewish life and moral values. References to
Biblical stories were frequent; however, no effort was made
to indoctrinate its listeners with religious doctrines as in
Unshackled, or to get them to pray as in Family Theater.
The moral values stressed were diversity and toleration,
not conformity. Bigotry, narrowness and hate sold under

the guise of religion were frequently exposed. In the program titled "Ghosts Who Sit in Parliament," (broadcast January 11, 1953) Ezekial Hart, a Jew, was elected to the Canadian Parliament in 1808 and traveled to Quebec, then Canada's capital. In order for him to be seated it was necessary for him to take an oath. The clerk insisted that he take the oath on the New Testament and "as the

true faith of a Christian." Hart refused. He would take the oath only on the Books of Moses, and not on a

Bible representing someone else's religion. The oath was not administered. A hostile Parliament,

believing there could be only one true religion—that accepted by the majority of

people living in Quebec—refused to seat him. It later passed a motion refusing to seat any Jew at any time regardless of the

fact that the person had been lawfully elected from his district. In 1831 a more liberal Parliament reversed the motion and granted full civil rights to all. Hart's stubborn fight against religious bigotry was vindicated.

n 30 years I have never heard The Eternal Light played on any old-time radio show. I have never seen it in any collectors' list. I repeatedly placed ads in old-time radio publications asking about the show and never received a response.

Even searches on the Internet were net productive. The Eternal Light seemed to be one of the rarest, extant shows ever. Well, no more! I have obtained a small number of these shows in excellent sound quality. Some are complete and some are chopped toward the end. I hope to obtain additional shows in the future. The Eternal Light will again be on the air waves, and first on my show (Grieve, Bob Herman). Copies will then be dubbed for the REPS library so all can hear this fine example of old-time radio.
