

John Archer, voice of 'The Shadow' dies at 84

As REPS Member #1, he was there for us from the very early days.

The members of the Radio Enthusiasts of Puget Sound were deeply saddened to learn of the death of honorary member, John Archer in December. Mike Sprague of REPS said, "John was so much more than an honorary member. He was a friend to one and all, and personally I feel a very major loss."

Sprague continued "I remember the first contact I ever had with John. It was in late 1990 when REPS was just beginning. We had learned that he lived in the area and so I was ready to call him." continues on page 2

"I don't mind telling you that I was a little nervous. This whole thing was new to us all and here I was calling this actor person. He was one of the Shadows! And he performed in movies, on television and on the

stage. I kind of expected to get brushed off."

"Then," Sprague reminisced, "all of a sudden, I was talking to him and immediately experienced that which so many others have graciousness and kindness. From that moment on, I felt that John was my friend. Everyone felt that with him."

A Caring Man

In closing our brief look at John Archer, maybe this insight will help all members catch a glimpse of the heart of this man. Larry Albert, professional actor and the first of the Executive Members, shared the following story at the January meeting.

"On the day that John had his stroke, a number of us were with him rehearsing a re-creation of a *Shadow* program at the very nice place where he lived. All was going well, when suddenly John was stricken."

"As he laid on the floor, awaiting treatment and transport to the hospital, and in the midst of a real personal crisis, I noticed something. Though he was having some trouble communicating, he was trying to reach into his pocket and to make certain that his wife Ann took care of something."

"He had arranged to take care of lunch for all of those rehearsing and he had the tickets for that in his pocket. He was thinking about everyone else at a very difficult time for him. I'll never forget that."

And, REPS will never forget John Archer, the man, the friend, the actor, someone you're really glad you knew.

Movie actor, 'Shadow' voice John Archer dies

It's John Archer's voice that's often remembered.

"His voice was something," recalled Larry Albert, "It was very deep, very resonant; it had a slight burr to it."

Albert, a Seattle actor with an encyclopedic knowledge of movies and radio shows, remembers that voice from his childhood, when he saw Mr. Archer

onscreen as a movie star, and later from meeting him in the 1990s and even from two years ago, when the veteran actor had a stroke during a local rehearsal.

Mr. Archer, 84, died of lung cancer Sunday (Dec. 5) at a Redmond retirement center.

His career began in the tiny town of Osceola, Neb., where he was born as Ralph Bowman. It extended through nearly 60 films and countless radio appearances and stage productions.

His film appearances included roles in "Guadalcanal Diary" in 1943, "White Heat" in 1949 and "Blue Hawaii" in 1961.

He had the leading role in a 1950 science-fiction film, "Destination Moon," and later recalled how the picture won an Academy Award for special effects.

"The moonscape was fabulous," he said, "and we moved on wires to simulate weightlessness."

He's also remembered as being one voice of "The Shadow," in the famous radio show of that name.

He starred in the role of Lamont Cranston in the weekly crime drama in 1944 and 1945, uttering the famous line, "Who

knows what evil lurks in the hearts of men? The Shadow knows!"

He was the father of actress Anne Archer, whose film credits include "Fatal Attraction" and "A Clear and Present Danger."

He studied cinematography in Southern California in the 1930s and worked in odd jobs until he was invited to an on-air audition for a show known as "Gateway to Hollywood."

If they won, aspiring actors and actresses got a stage name and a movie contract. Mr. Archer did win, and got both his new name and a contract with RKO Pictures.

That led to his movie, radio and stage career.

He later withdrew from acting and became a sales representative with his brother's trucking company. He eventually moved to the Seattle area, where he became active in re-creating many old radio shows.

One of the organizations benefiting from his involvement was the Radio Enthusiasts of Puget Sound, which was started in 1990.

The group attracted just 11 listeners to its first meeting, but when it booked Mr. Archer for a February 1991 meeting, 120 people showed up and provided the core of the club's membership.

Early in his career he married actress Marjorie Lord, who is best remembered as the wife of Danny Thomas' character in the TV series "Make Room for Daddy."

They had two children, Gregg Archer and Anne.

They later divorced, and he remarried. He is survived by Ann, his wife of 43 years.


They had two children, Lisa Oswald of Connecticut and Jon Archer of Issaquah.


June 3... Every Member Is An Actor!

1-dossies, A Re-creation!



conversation and reflection as we talked about the many aspects and accomplishments of Art's wonderful career.


One of the very top announcers and a frequent actor as well, Art's credits are astonishing: Amos n' Andy, Dr. Christian (for 17 years), Jonathan Trimble - Esquire, Meet Me At Parky's, Murder and Mr. Malone, The Sears Radio Theater, Stars Over Hollywood, Golden Days of Radio, Point Sublime, The Casebook of Gregory Hood, The Jack Kirkwood Show and Songs by Sinatra.

Not only did Art announce The Adventures of Red Ryder, but he also whistled the theme song. In addition to his radio announcing credits, Art acted on several series including Lux Radio Theatre and Pacific Story. Art narrated the TV show Highway Patrol and frequently appeared on the TV version of Dragnet as a Captain and as Lt. Moore on Adam 12. The Highway Patrol work did him some good; when he was pulled over one day, the officer recognized Art and sent him on his way.

Art also worked on TV on well-known shows like The Red Skelton Show and The George Gobel Show. He was the Founding President of the Pacific Pioneer Broadcasters. In addition, he co-authored a popular textbook "Radio Announcing" which we learned about.

A Christmas Present

Art Gilmore is a past recipient of the REPS Radio Achievement Award - and he is truly a very nice man. Everyone appreciated his kindness in coming and sharing. Absent members who later heard what they missed are still moaning. Thanks Art!

Old Time Radio


There was some time spent reflecting back on Old Time Radio...including the listening memories of audience members. What was it like for the audience who listened to radio as kids? Then we were to compare that to young Nick's experiences.

Dave even brought along the actual radio to which he had listened as a child. He had checked with his father, still alive at age 91, and found that he had purchased the Coronado radio for \$29.95 in 1935.

This was a fun time and even Nick had heard some of the shows referred to by his grandpa, Paul and the rest of the crowd. But, now it was time to talk about a mammoth kid show that is on the radio today.

Also, to set the stage, we learned a bit about Paul. He went to Stuyvesant High School in New York where a teacher decided to do a radio English class, using textbooks with material written by Arch Obler and Norman Corwin.

Did acting and producing in his senior year. This led to 25+ years of doing TV documentaries. He met his wife Ilona, a native of Croatia, while doing graduate work at the University of Michigan.

She has done acting and is a music professor in real life.

Among other work, Paul was floor manager at channel 11 in Tacoma. He has done many educational and training videos, along with quite a bit of voice

work too. Mixed into his busy life are about a dozen or so shows for Jim French (as an actor).

New Radio: Adventures in Odyssey

Nick is an avid fan of AIO, with a large collection of audio tapes from the show. He brought along a bit of his collection and put

it on display. He found *Odyssey* "funny, and it always teaches a (moral) lesson."

Paul talked about *AIO*. It's a 1/2 hour comedydrama. Always has a moral, but doesn't try to push religion "down your throat." It's for children 8-12, but many families listen together.

It started in 1986. "Odyssey" is a small town, maybe 35,000 people. It's co-creator, Phil Lawter, lived in southern Oregon, and first thought of Klamath Falls for the town. The show is carried on at least 2500 stations in North America, many overseas and now on the internet. It's almost impossible to say how many listeners there really are.

Paul is Whit, the lead character. How did he get the job?

Paul plays John Avery Whitaker (Whit). He's a grandfather type and Nick says Whit is a "Jack of all trades." 'Whit's End' is the local soda fountain, around which much of the dialog takes place.

How did Paul get the role? He was on vacation in Vail, Colo. A friend contacted him, and asked him to record a few commercials at a studio there in Vail. They thought he sounded like the late Hal Smith, who had originated the role of Whit. He met with the Focus on


the Family staff and was immediately selected to re-introduce Whit back into the stories.

Other REPS friends on Odyssey

Many friends of REPS have taken part in the show:

Parley Baer, Dick Beals, Alan Young, Janet Waldo, and more. Dave and Nick played some samples of these, including one where romantic sparks fly between Janet and Alan.

How is the show produced? Voices are recorded in Burbank, Calif. Music track, etc. and post-production are done in Colorado Springs. In addition to the radio program and the audio tapes which come from it, an animated video of the AIO story is produced about every six months.



This was a fast moving and informative meeting. Dave and Nick had prepared well and Paul was such a gracious and friendly guest. We positively anticipate seeing him at future REPS activities. After all, he was made an honorary member and states he plans to come to the Showcase in June.





When Terry Mahony needed to step out of his role as REPS President a year early, several members immediately thought of Bill Parker to fill the gap.


He was willing to help the club in this manner, having already been Secretary for several years, a reporter for Air Check, an active Showcase volunteer and more.


