

R EPS member Mike Sprague had frequent visits with Merrill over the years with the last one being in the hospital the day before he died.

Mike described that last time this way: "Merrill was struggling mightily and didn't seem to be participating in the conversation in the room. When I needed to go, I put my hand on his arm and told him that I'd be seeing him soon, one way or the other."

Continuing, Mike said, "at that point, in a lot of pain, this nice man raised up a little and struggled to get out the words 'thanks for coming'."

#### What will you miss?

- Some will miss his infectious humor, which was always there no matter how he was feeling.
- Others will miss his brilliant and sidesplitting portrayal of Uncle Fletcher in our 'Vic and Sade' recreations.
- Still, others will miss the many crisp and believable characterizations Merrill did on so many parts in so many re-creations over the years.
- And, some of us have even missed his energy-laden voice on those mattress commercials that loaded the Seattle airwaves for so many years.

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

# September 2<sup>nd</sup> "Over the Top, Boys"

his play was written by John Jensen and was the featured attraction of our September 2<sup>nd</sup> REPS meeting. The story revolves around a community theater looking for a way to raise money since their funding may be cut off. George Thompson (David Selvig), the theater director, hears about the opportunity to have Nathan Downing (Les Westrum) come to participate in the play 'Over the Top, Boys'. This is the play that made Nathan famous on Broadway decades earlier. Margaret Summers (Anna Denton), Nathan's wife, introduced in public by Nathan as his assistant, spends a great deal of her time soothing Nathan's battered ego since he hasn't done anything of importance for some time. Nathan manages to squeeze into the uniform he wore when he had the lead in 'Over the Top, Boys'. Nathan wants everything to be professional and delights in telling everyone how things should be done, including the lights and rising of the curtain. This really rubs the "star" of the community theatre, Tom Ryan (Brian Haigood), in the wrong way. Mary Wainright (Marge Lutton) is a veteran community theatre actress who is delighted to have Nathan participate in their play. Eventually, Tom and Nathan come to an understanding - thanks to input from Margaret. This cast also included Joy Jackson, Pat McNally, Cheri Swenson and John Jensen. Pat McNally and Cheri Swenson provided the sound effects and Donald Zongker was the audio engineer.

Joy Jackson, David Selvig and Anna Denton treated us to an episode of 'Vic and Sade' in which Rush Gook is playing with caramels. He does all kinds of interesting things to these caramels, including throwing them against a wall in flatten out the sides. It's funny that no one wanted to eat any of them after he was finished.

This episode of 'Vic and Sade' was chosen as a back up for the Showcase in case Merrill Mael would not have been able to attend.

#### George Pirrone Visits Seattle

At the October meeting we had a delightful special guest in George Pirrone. This was George's first time ever in Seattle and he enjoyed an extensive tour courtesy of Dick Bonesteel. George grew up in Chicago, where he had his first taste of radio acting. "Acting has to be in you... you have to have the desire," he told us.

We listened to tapes from several shows including a hilarious episode of 'The Life of Riley'. George was Egbert Gillis, the son of Riley's pal. He was on 'One Man's Family' from 1952 till the show ended in 1959 as Pinky who was always thinking about getting married. In a taped episode from March 1957 Pinky was writing a letter to his Uncle Clifford in Scotland. George never had a contract for 'One Man's Family' and sometimes 10 shows were taped at a time over two or three days.

George remembers the director of 'Dr. Christian', Neil Reagan, complaining about the liberal president, (his brother, Ronald) of the Screen Actors Guild during rehearsals. He portrayed the ticket taker on the first Dean Martin/Jerry Lewis Show where his line came out as: "Get your tickets here for the Dean Lewis and Jerry Martin show". On live TV he had the opportunity to play the back of Frank Sinatra's head in a sketch since there was not enough time for Sinatra to get from the raft to his next scene. Red Skelton hit him in the head with a non-breakaway cello during a skit.

A passion of George Pirrone for many years was the 'Mother/Daughter Pageant'. It still is. He was one of the guiding hands on this long running show, and seems close to getting it back on the air. "The heart and soul" of the pageant is built around the fact that there is an already established strong relationship. The mother and daughter were given the opportunity to share their thoughts about each other; these were then shared for the first time during the modeling of evening gowns.

Last, but not least, George shared a song with us. He and Brad Brown started writing songs when they were on 'Red Ryder' together.

George wrote: "I want to thank you for your arrangement of so great an event, and the warm welcome I got from that fun crowd. Thanks to everyone!"


#### So much history

Maybe you've heard the classic story about his network introduction of the US Vice-President on a Seattle visit, when there was a "run-away" organist involved. Only those of solid stone could avoid doubling over in laughter.

And his involvement with Jack Kirkwood and so many others along the way in his career also evolved into stories that were guaranteed to keep us laughing.

#### The Biography

Here's the biography that was used at the last Showcase. Maybe it will remind old friends of the many facets of Merrill Mael, and inform those who didn't know him so well.

#### Merrill Mael

This is Merrill and Sandy Mael's 8<sup>th</sup> Showcase. A Showcase wouldn't nearly be as much fun without Merrill. He probably has had more different radio experience than just about anybody. Merrill's acted, announced, owned stations and done voice work, commercials and news casting. His radio work has taken him all over the world including Japan, Britain, the Netherlands, Switzerland, Germany and France. Merrill started in radio in Seattle; one of those non-paying jobs that were common in the early days of radio. He went to San Francisco as the announcer on 'The Standard Symphony Hour'. On KSFO, Merrill did 'The Friendly Grocer'. He and his co-stars did 6 characters each – with no rehearsals. While in San Francisco, he worked with Jack Webb and George Fenniman on the 'U.S Steel Hour' at KGO. They were hired to do crowd noises. Their mumbled crowd lines were "L.S.M.F.T." over and over. During WWII, Merrill did fabricated news broadcasts for enemy consumption. You may know that Merrill played Uncle Fletcher on 'Vic and Sade' for a time, but you probably don't know that Merrill was all of 18 years old when he played that role. Merrill's radio credits include such diverse shows as 'Breakfast at Sardi's', 'The Camel Caravan', 'Doctor Kate', 'Fibber McGee and Molly', 'Imagination Theater', 'Junior Miss', 'KIRO Mystery Playhouse', 'Maxwell House Coffee Time' and 'Pacific Story'. At a REPS meeting Merrill said, "Radio was magic, it came at a time, during the Depression, when people needed entertainment. If you could afford a radio, the rest was free. It could take you anywhere." Merrill, you too, are magic. Thanks for being such a good friend to REPS.

#### Remembrances

Some have asked about remembrances. Merrill had a very clear request on this as he saw the end drawing near. He asked that if anyone wanted to do anything (stressing that they didn't need to), it should go to either of his two favorite places.

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## A BIG DAY IN REPS HISTORY

**November 3, 1990:** It was on this date that 11 folks gathered at the Merchants' Café, the oldest restaurant in Seattle. This group talked about their interest in Old Time Radio.

Who was there? Some were relatives just along for the ride. Some were fanatics. Some were just curious. But from this elite eleven came the Radio Enthusiasts of Puget Sound. The group decided to meet again, and again and again. The attendees at the first meeting were: Darrell Anderson, Michael Jacobs, Carol Pearce and daughter, Tara, Bob Herman with wife Judy and friend Dale Gray, Mark Skullerud, Frank Denton, Mike Sprague and his wife, Linda. Most of these folks will be at the January meeting when we spend a few minutes reflecting together.

What then? In January 1991, the first "official" meeting took place at the Queen Anne Library where the club has met ever since. It was then that the club adopted the name and become REPS. Under the leadership of Misty Dawn Lane; a cassette library was started almost immediately. A newsletter, called Air Check, was launched right away and other things began to happen as well. The club tradition of having door prizes at every meeting began at the November 1990 gathering and has continued without a miss for 10 years.

Enjoy this humorous look-back at that Merchant's Café meeting with this story written by Darrell (Andy) Anderson, a founding member.

She replied, "I'm terribly sorry about that, sir, but our new cook used to be a tailor".

As I ate my soup, I must have slurped a little too loud because I noticed a lady in the group watching me. She asked me to join this table of wireless wackos.

She said, "I'm Dale Gray. Do you know about Old Time Radio?"

"Oh, yes", I replied. "Seth Parker is one of my favorites".

"Who?" she asked astonished.

"Seth Parker", I repeated. "Years later he would go by his real name of Phillips H. Lord and produce some of radio's best programs such as 'Gangbusters' and 'Mr. District Attorney'".

"I didn't know that", said Dale.

I sat there looking smug, thinking maybe I would fit in with this motley menagerie of microphone maniacs.

Michael Jacobs ordered a round of sauerkraut juice for the eleven of us seated around the table. He said that he'd gotten hooked on radio when he was with the CCC boys in the 1930's. He said that FDR had created the Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC) and had I ever listened to President Roosevelt's Fireside Chats? By this time, Skully had finished off his breakfast and ordered another stack of toast. He certainly is a trencherman of great renown, I thought.

"What would we do at these meeting?" said Michael Jacobs.

"Listen to old programs", someone said.

"You mean sit around and stare at the radio?" asked Bob Herman.

"Why not? It could be fun", added Carol.

"I'll bring my Rocky Jordon tape", said Frank.

"I've got two tapes of Tom Corbett I could bring", said Skully, looking over the bill of fare to see if he had missed anything.

"I'll bring my Seth Parker almanac", I said.

Bob Herman said he had an Orphan Anne shake-up mug and Captain Midnight decoder he would bring.

Frank Denton said he had a photo of Ma Perkins in front of her lumberyard. He'd gotten it years ago by sending the top of an Oxydol Soap box and ten cents.

At this point, I bid goodbye to this heterogeneous group and said I had to get to a wedding.

Mike said he had attended a wedding just yesterday. "It was a very sad affair," he said, "even the wedding cake was in tiers".

As I left and headed to my automobile, which was parked "halfway up the next block"; I kept thinking to myself ... a club for Puget Sound Radio Enthusiasts??? You know, it just might work.

**Door prizes.** Share your tapes as door prizes at the meetings. Each meeting several lucky people are the "winners" of tapes.








## PUGET SOUND RADIO LISTINGS
