Herman and Siskind Join Radio Entertainment Network

Bob Herman's *REPS Radio Hour* and Larry Siskind's *Radio Adventure Time* can once again be heard on cable TV, this time as part of the Radio Entertainment Network (REN). While Siskind emphasizes old time radio shows of the rarer type, Herman mixes them up and one never knows what to expect. For several years their programs were heard on the Separate Audio Program (SAP) of Channel 9. This ended in 2001 when Channel 9 abruptly dropped the Evergreen Radio Service programs.

Individuals living in King County with cable TV service can now hear the shows Thursday mornings from 6:00 am to 7:00 am on Channel 77 in King County. Channel 77 is the community channel, which airs non-commercial, offbeat, amateur programs, including those of a religious and political nature. When REN is being heard, information concerning Channel 77 is visually shown. As before, the Herman and Siskind shows, which are just short of an hour in length, will alternate each week. Those persons with cable TV and a VHS can record the programs using a VHS timer for later listening or for copying to an audiotape. *REPS Radio Hour* and *Radio Adventure Time* have been serving visually impaired listeners for seven years through the Evergreen Radio Service of Seattle. They are also heard through a special radio receiver issued free to persons visually handicapped. The signal is heard throughout the state of Washington. Previously *Radio Adventure Time* had been heard on stations KSER (Everett) and KBCS (Bellevue).

Jim Dolan and Kevin Clark founded REN which plays old time radio shows seven days a week on Channel 77 from 6:00 am to 8:00 am. Collectors can reap a rich harvest of vintage radio programs by regularly taping REN's shows. REN reaches many states and several foreign countries. Those with computers and Internet access can hear REN radio shows 24 hours a day by logging on to acbradio.org and selecting Treasure Trove. Further information can be obtained from the REN website at www.renonline.org or by calling their 24 hour line at 206-689-1708.

REPS Launches OTR Outreach Program

An OTR outreach program, produced by John Jensen and coordinated by Dave Selvig, was launched in early November. The program, presented at no cost to interested groups and organizations, is aimed at entertaining and, at the same time, informing the audience about REPS. Initially it was presented to a group of twenty senior citizens at the Kent Senior Center by Neal Shulman and Bob Cardenas. Segments of familiar OTR, combined with audience interaction and prizes, were exceptionally well received based on comments and feedback following the one-hour program.

The program was produced in a manner that allows it to be tailored to fit the time allotted by a hosting organization.

Other presentations are currently being booked with retirement homes, senior centers, civic organizations, and other clubs whose members may be interested in returning to "... those thrilling days of yesteryear ..." through the medium of OTR. REPS President, Dave Selvig, has turned over the reins for coordinating the program to Neal Shulman who is currently sending out flyers to various organizations throughout the Puget Sound area soliciting interest in future presentations.

With the holiday season behind us it is anticipated that many organizations may be actively looking for programs to fill their meeting agendas. As a result, Shulman is calling on REPS members to be active participants in this outreach program: first, by canvassing groups or individuals that may be interested in hosting the program and putting them in touch with him to schedule a date and time and, second, by contacting him yourself if you are interested in being a presenter. Both are vitally important to the long-range success of the program.

This is truly an opportunity to spread the word about our club, attract new members, and further the cause of Old Time Radio. No More "Baer" Hugs

How does one begin to describe the vast career of Parley Baer who died on November 22, 2002 at age 88 in Woodland Hills, California of complications from an earlier stroke? He was born and raised Salt Lake City where he developed an interest in acting while working as an usher in a local theater. He acquired a fascination with the circus as a result of interviewing many people for his radio job. Did you know that he even owned a circus for a while? After a stint in the Air Corps during World War II he married aerialist and bareback rider Ernestine Clarke in 1946 and later landed a job as ringmaster in the Barnum & Bailey

His movie career spanned 45 years with his first role as Boozer in 1950 in Comanche Territory. Parley's last movie role was Mr. Hollis in The Last of the Dogmen (1995). On television, Baer portrayed Darby on The Adventures of Ozzie and Harriet, Mayor Stoner on The Andy Griffith Show and Mr. Hamble on The Double Life of Henry Physe. Many will recognize his voice from commercials where he was the voice of the Keebler elf.

Memories ...

I never really got to know Parley as I've found some of the others on this (OTR) digest did. But I did get to work with him on one of his last appearances as a radio actor. It was in an episode of the Jim French series The Adventures of Harry Nile that was recorded in conjunction with the REPS convention. I was asked to step in for Peter Leeds who was unable to attend the session due to illness. The show was recorded in front of a live audience, and Parley played them like a fine violinist. By the time we started the actual recording I was willing to bet everyone in that audience was in love with him. For anyone keeping score, Parley recorded five shows (for) Jim in the Nineties ... I was lucky enough to receive one of the "Baer" hugs from this gracious man. Larry Albert

My personal memories of Parley are filled with loving laughter, especially when he did such things as re-creating Ethel and Albert with Peg Lynch. He always had a smile and his congeniality was contagious. He will be thought of often by everyone who shared his joyful presence. Frank (Buxton)

When Parley was introduced as an honorary member of SPERDVAC, the Convention attendees applauded loudly. I could tell this pleased Parley. The applause continued and everyone rose to give him a standing ovation. This outpouring of affection visibly moved Parley; I saw a tear run down his cheek ... I'm not going to write a tribute to Parley. I'm just going to relate a couple of personal incidents that occurred when I was with Parley and his wife Ernestine ("Call me Ernie").


I first met Parley and Ernie the day before REPS Radio Showcase I. I was helping Jim French organize his taping of the KIRO Mystery Playhouse. After chatting with Parley for a few minutes, I realized that I was with someone pretty special. Herb (Ellis), Parley and I were in the Green Room prior to the show. The door opened and in walks ... Harry Bartell. As these three icons visited, I realized that Parley always had good things to say about his colleagues and his comments were invariably very funny We were going to re-create the first Gunsmoke show and I had been given one word to say in the show ... "Yeah." I was nervous. At dinner before the show, I was seated with the Baers and others. Ernie kept teasing me about "Blowing my lines." Remember, I didn't know them well at this point. Parley asked, "What is your line?" and I replied "Yeah." In true Baer style, he looked very stern and waved his dinner fork at me saying "Good Lord, man, you NEVER memorize your lines in a radio show. You READ THEM!" Now mortified and increasingly nervous, I asked, "How can I not memorize "Yeah?" After a long pause, Parley slowly began to grin, and then he winked at me. Score...Parley 1, Me 0!

We had frequent contact after this episode and on one occasion when I was with them, I needed to call my Dad on his birthday. Parley had met him one time, only briefly. During my call Parley asked for the phone and talked to Dad for ten minutes like they were old buddies. While he was that way with everyone, it was so genuine with Parley and people knew that.

I loved Parley and I'll always, always treasure the special times I got to spend with him. I have never heard any negative word spoken about him. He could tease without hurting and was always funny as he did, with an elf-like twinkle in his eye. I'm so honored to have had a friendship with him. All of our lives are richer for any contact with Parley Baer.

Do yourself a favor and check out tapes of his work on radio. Try to get a tape from the REPS library of Parley and Peg Lynch doing Ethel and Albert at a Showcase. It is an absolute classic. Bill Brooks

A Marvelous Talent

Larry Dobkin, television director and character actor whose acting credits spanned stage, radio, TV and films over seven decades, died of heart failure October 28, 2002 at his home in Los Angeles. Larry was 83.

Dobkin's acting career began on Broadway in his mid-teens. After receiving an M.A. from Yale University's School of Drama, Larry plunged into radio in the late '40s and early 50s. J. David Goldin's RadioGOLDINdex lists 776 shows! A partial list would include: Have Gun Will Travel; Yours Truly, Johnny Dollar; Suspense; Frontier Gentleman; Fort Laramie; The CBS Radio Workshop; NBC Radio Theatre; You Were There; The Whistler; Family Theatre; Lux Radio Theatre; Barrie Craig, Confidential Investigator; Escape; Wild Bill Hickok; Rogers of the Gazette; Space Patrol; Broadway is My Beat; Nightbeat; Stars Over Hollywood; Let George Do It; The Adventures of Philip Marlowe; Rocky Jordan; The Adventures of the Saint; The New

Adventures of Nero Wolfe; Richard Diamond, Private Detective; Dr. Christian; Screen Director's Playhouse; The Green Lama; Chandu, the Magician and The Alan Young Show. From 1947-1948, Dobkin played the title role of the suave, deductive genius in The Adventures of Ellery Queen. Many of these shows featured OTR stars who are familiar to REPS members ...

William Conrad, Parley Baer, Anne Whitfield Phillips, Sam Edwards, Harry Bartell, Norman Corwin, Hans Conried, Art Gilmore and Alan Young.

According to REPS member Stewart Wright, three particularly good episodes are *Gunsmoke*, "Cavalcade" (1/31/53 & 11/8/59); *Escape*, "The Man from Tomorrow" (8/23/53); and *Escape*, "Wild Jack Rhett" (2/15/53). Larry was at three REPS Showcases (V, VI and VII). At Showcase VI, he was magnificent in the re-creation of "Wild Jack Rhett". He also portrayed Digger O'Dell in *The Life of Riley*. Larry almost always played heavies and bad guys, so Digger was completely different. He had so much fun with the role; he could barely get the words "I'll go ... shoveling off" out.

His television credits include appearances on Playhouse 90; The Colgate Comedy Hour; The Rifleman; Burns and Allen; 77 Sunset Strip; NYPD Blue; The Untouchables; Star Trek, the Next Generation; Mod Squad; Melrose Place; Judging Amy and I Love Lucy. Dobkin received an Emmy nomination for his supporting role in the 1967 CBS Playhouse production of "Do Not Go Gentle into That Good Night". Directing credits span 25 years and more than 200 hours of prime time including The Donna Reed Show; Dr. Kildare; The Waltons; Barnaby Jones; Charlie's Angels; Dallas; The Fall Guy; Emergency and The Streets of San Francisco. He wrote the 1976 film The Life and Times of Grizzly Adams.

The Ten Commandments; Julius Caesar; The Defiant Ones; Angels in the Outfield; North by Northwest; 12 O'Clock High and Patton are some of Mr. Dobkin's feature film credits. Larry is in every scene of Patton, doing something, somewhere in the background. George C. Scott's wife wouldn't let George do the film unless Larry Dobkin was there to keep George sober. For five months of shooting—all over the world.

Memories ...

Larry ... made me feel privileged. He would spend time talking to just me. Joy Jackson

When Howard Culver and I were expecting our first "baby", the baby unexpectedly arrived 2 1/2 months early and was two, instead of one. Howard mentioned at a rehearsal that we were not quite ready for such an event and didn't even have a sleeping place for one baby, let alone two. The next day, here came Parley Baer and Larry Dobkin, both with bassinettes, which had just been outgrown by their little daughters! So sad that both Larry and Parley are no longer here. Over the years, REPS folks have been very fortunate to develop close relationships with the actors and other professionals who "were" radio. Their names roll off our lips ... we can recognize their voices when listening to old shows ... we get to see many of them each June. One of those folks was Larry Dobkin. I don't profess to know him anything like as well as his many acting buddies, but we did talk on the phone from time to time, particularly as his health was declining. It always has seemed to me that, yes, he was the epitome of "tough guy" and that he kind of liked being that. I saw and experienced a surprising tender side to Larry that he expressed more privately. I'm guessing that those closest to him would be able to verify that.

I noticed this before ever meeting him, but then as we watched him work, you could feel it in the room. We're a fortunate group to have hung out with and to have experienced his talent first hand.

The Erlenborn Project Report

The Erlenborn project was born at Showcase X, June 28, 2002. Meridy, wife of Ray Erlenborn, told me they were going to move to the Motion Picture Home, and there was no storage for Ray's sound effects. There were a couple of collectors in Los Angeles that would take them, but Ray didn't want his "stuff" just collecting dust in someone's basement. Ray wanted his "children" to be used. Ray and Meridy wanted them to go to REPS, but we'd have to go get them.

Meridy and I worked out the details during July and August, after getting the Board's approval. Details like arranging for a truck, arranging for a storage locker, booking airplane tickets, and arranging for pick-up of the drivers at the airport. Paul Feavel developed a fund-raising appeal to REPS members, to support this effort. Over 100 members (114) contributed \$6,224, and the two drivers donated all their expenses during the trip.

The plans:

Part I involved flying two volunteers (Christopher Conrad and Terrence Chriest) to California, Ray and Meridy picking them up at the airport, loading up the truck and driving it to Seattle. Getting storage locker, getting shelves and doing inventory. Part II consists of bringing Ray and Meridy to

Seattle in April, when Ray will give a sound effects demonstration at the April meeting, conduct a "master-class" on sound effects, hold a reception for the donors and an intimate dinner for the largest (over \$100) donors. Then at Showcase, Ray will do another demonstration of sound effects. Also installing brass plaques "Ray Erlenborn collection—REPS" on those pieces where applicable, and spiffing up the collection and the McKenzie machines.

Part III is to produce a CD that contains Ray's demonstrations and the master-class, a re-creation (probably from Showcase 2003) using those sound effects, and other Ray things (like photographs). This will be a multimedia CD, and proceeds of its sale will help offset the storage of the collection. Part IV is to devise a rental checkout procedure, so that the collection will pay towards its upkeep, and a volunteer to take care of the collection. My thanks to the many donors who made this project possible, and the folks that gave of their time and expertise: Terrence Chriest, Christopher Conrad, Paul Feavel, Mary Fichtenberg, Emil Oana, Dave Selvig, and a special thank you to Meridy and Ray Erlenborn. Without all of you, this project wouldn't have been such a success.

REPS Annual Report for 2002

Currently REPS has 261 members, including 54 honorary members, compared to 260 at this time last year. Special guests at REPS programs included Dal McKennon, Harlan Zinck, Dick Beals, Frank Bresee (by

phone), and Jim & Pat French.

REPS continued its partnership with the Museum of Flight and KIXI Radio by recording and broadcasting "Spirit; the Story of the Spirit of St. Louis", an original radio play written by Joy Jackson to celebrate the 75th anniversary of the historic flight. REPS launched a community outreach program bringing the story of Old Time Radio and REPS to retirement communities, civic organizations and community centers. George Fowler and Steve Holden generously donated their extensive OTR tape collections to REPS. These collections total approximately 1600 reel-to-reel tapes. REPS is grateful to Ray Erlenborn for donating his entire collection of sound effects equipment and related material to REPS. Contributions to support the transportation, storage, and maintenance of this equipment plus a workshop on its use by Ray have reached over \$6000.

An original radio play "Don't Mind Me", in the tradition of Suspense, was written by John Jensen and performed by the Radio Readers. Paul Feavel led an effort to produce a second "Winter Holidays on the Radio" CD, following the highly successful first CD last year. The CD included 100 old radio shows plus two new shows produced by Jim French.

Finally, we were saddened this year by the loss of Bev Bartell, Larry Dobkin, and Parley Baer, but we are

grateful for their relationship with REPS and they will be fondly remembered.

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
