Silent Auction

Thanks to generous donors and bidders, the Silent Auction raised \$1,500 at **The Good Ol' Days** Showcase, June 24-25 at the Seattle Center.

Out of some 70 items arrayed on tables in the Mingling Room, top money went to a framed animation cell for "Roger Ramjet" from 1965. David Speelman paid \$125 for the cell, donated and signed by Dick Beals, who created the voices for Yank, Doodle and Dee, shown in the scene with Dan, listening to Roger. The Dick Beals signature proved good on two "fantasy"

Alka-Seltzer bottles celebrating his first half-century as the voice of Speedy, claimed by Don Lacky

and Ginger Malmer.

The signatures of Bob Hastings, Hal Stone and Rosemary Rice, stars of *Archie Andrews*, turned four items into fundraising gold. Hal Stone and Neal Shulman took

ownership of framed transcription discs of an *Archie Andrews* episode with a healthy contribution to the Guest Travel Fund. Two more signed and framed discs are expected to be in the 2006 auction. The trio also penned their names on two

Archie Andrews commemorative T-shirts donated by Jerry and Barbara Williams. One went home with Don Lacky and, the other, with Kim Bragg.

Barbara Schwarz of the Friends of Vic & Sade and William "Bill" Idelson, the voice of Rush, also executed a one-two punch to raise funds. Barbara

donated the book, <u>Vic and Sade</u>, the <u>Best Radio Plays of Paul Rhymer</u> and Bill signed it. Don Lacky was the winning bidder. Likewise, a photo of the *Vic and Sade* cast, donated by Frank Rosín and signed by Bill, went to Gary Hagan.

Among other books in the auction: <u>Great American Broadcast</u>, signed and donated by author Leonard Maltin; Ray & Meridy Erlenborn con-





Barbara Schwarz opened the session by informing the audience of Bill Idelson's career from his beginnings on radio in Chicago in

1931 through his many radio performances in other radio programs and his progression into television as a performer as well as a writer and producer.

With Bill's help we talked about the fact that the program was on so early in the day that NBC really didn't know if any one was listening to this sustaining program in the very early days. However, a trial sponsorship by a margarine company had to be withdrawn after 8 weeks ...

the audience response was so great the manufacturer had to withdraw because they could not keep up with the demand for their

product.

Bill chose the script for Saturday afternoon in which he introduced a very early "character" that Paul Rhymer used in early scripts, "Mr. Johnson". It was obvious that Bill had very fond memories for this event.

Bill shared some memories of Bernardine Flynn, Art Van Harvey. Clarence Hartzell, and Paul Rhymer. His memories were warm and gave the audience a number of reasons to laugh.

Up Close with ... Donald Buka

Host Hal Stone described Donald Buka as "one of the premiere radio actors I've ever had the pleasure of working with". It all began, Donald told us, when at the age of ten his parents gave him two alternatives: "dancing school or elocution school. Elocution sounded exciting."

This led to an audition with Alfred Lunt and Lynn Fontaine, resulting in "two imaginative, creative years with them," and a role in Robert Sherwood's play There Shall Be No Night.

After that, Donald says, "Hunger came ... I then tried to get into radio in New York, but

for a while nothing happened." Then a call came from Charles Warburton at the Blue Network. Through Warburton, Donald learned radio technique and won a role at *Let's Pretend* at the relatively late age of 17.

We had a chance to see a video of Donald's stirring

finale scene with Miss Davis in Watch on the Rhine, as well as a clip from The Street with No Name, where Donald, playing a hoodlum, crashes through a window and is gunned down by the police. "Actually they filmed me moving up to the window, and a stunt man went through it."

X Minus One

"The Lifeboat Mutiny." **Bob Hastings** and **Donald Buka** both did many of the *X Minus One* shows when it was on the air. And, they did a great

job on this one, as did director **Dick Beals** when he became the robotic voice of the space lifeboat. It was jokingly observed that the audience should have been more participative, eating some of the well described Drone food "**geisel**" and in joining in on the Drone national anthem. There was more ad-libbing in this show than in any other in memory and it added to the fun flavor. 
The original stars made generous comments afterward, stating "This is the best cast and the best production of Archie we have ever done, on the air or at a convention!" High praise for all.





Carlos (Bill Brooks) sets up a kidnapping investigated by Harry Nile (Larry Albert)


Some Good Ol' Days at REPS

Cowboys & Cookies



acting is static then they didn't see Hal buckle his swash as Long John Silver type pirate. The fact that he wasn't completely exhausted after that is amazing.




