#### Frequencies-a Loving Critique of OTR

#### Where are the Feuds of Yesteryear?

I've been thinking about feuds and how I miss them.

W.C. Fields versus Charlie McCarthy.

Jack Benny versus Fred Allen.

Groucho versus Everybody.

Feuds are fun. Contemporary celebrities either have no feuds or have boring feuds. I really don't care who stole Jessica's phone and what Ashley's dog did in Leonardo's house. I want feuds with punch, with power, with insults.

The great radio feuds are part of the grand American tradition of invective. Americans love throwing insults at each other, and have a deep appreciation for someone with a talent for it. American humor, from Mark Twain to Lenny Bruce, from South Park to David Chappelle, is filled with profane and poetic ways of telling someone you don't like them very much.

The golden era of American insult was the first couple decades of the last century, when a whole big mish-mash of cultural forces, including the Jewish theatre, successive waves of American immigrants, and the anything-goes world of Vaudeville ran pell-mell into each other. The resulting collision created American popular culture, as well as re-inventing that comic staple, the double-act.

Oh sure, there had been double-acts as far back as the servants of Shakespeare or even Aristophanes, but our native American soil did something to the two-man comic team: it democratized the concept. The classic Vaudeville double-act isn't a master/servant, it's two evenly-matched opponents, verbally sparring. Free speech and no clear social boundaries meant that two guys standing on a stage could fling insults back and forth at each other at will. What freedom! Try telling a Kaiser or a Czar that he's a knucklehead, and see what happened to you. But in America, anybody can say "nertz!" to anybody else, including the President, and get away with it. (And to those who believe that the office of the President should be above reproach, I say "nertz!")

Radio comedy was of course the comedy of Vaudeville. When you hear W.C. Fields roar that he's going to turn Charlie into firewood, and McCarthy fires back that he'll put a wick in his mouth and use him as an oil lamp, those jokes were written for a Vaudeville stage.



Fields had a nasty temper and may have truly hated that block of wood, but Benny and Allen were in reality good friends, only scripted rivals. Though their scripted feud did once at least burst out into something more spontaneous. After Allen, a notoriously quick wit, shot

out an impromptu zinger at Benny during one on-air showdown, Benny, who never improvised if he could help it, shot back, "you'd never DARE say that if my scriptwriters were here!" by John Longenbaugh

- A discovery table with material on other nostalgia organizations and a chance to meet their representatives, such as Sharon Richards of the Tex Ritter fan club.
- The REPS Outlet, offering hundreds of hours of shows on CDs, cassettes, in cassette packages and on vinyl that were donated to REPS.

The Outlet will also be stocked with CDs of uncirculated material from ET discs featuring the likes of Bob Hope, Jack Benny, Phil Harris and Alice Faye, Jimmy Durante, Red Skelton, Eve Arden and Blackstone. Attendees may also buy DVDs of "I Remember Mama" episodes and recreations from the 2005 Showcase.



And — this just in — a hundred copies of Movie Mirror and Photoplay magazines from radio and Hollywood's golden age will be priced to sell.

by the era's artists.

• Laura Leff, president of the International Jack Benny Fan Club, has sent REPS a collection of her books, all autographed, to sell on consignment. They include compilations of her fan club newsletter, "Jack Benny Times" from 1984 to 1995 and from 2000 to 2005; and her episode-by-episode synopsis of Jack's radio show, "39 Forever," Vol. 1 covering 1932 to 1942 and her just-released Vol. 2 from 1942 to 1955.

• And Danean MacAndrews, aka the RadioLady, will again supply REPS with hundreds of OTR MP3 discs, some holding up to a hundred shows each. Two dollars of

the \$5 price for each disc stays with REPS.

Danean promises to send an ample quantity of her CD that contains all of the installments of the "Cinnamon Bear" on one disc (episodes of the childhood classic will be recreated at this year's Showcase). She also has a new five-CD set of "Family Theatre" and an "OTR Westerns" CD with 110 shows.



#### SILENT AUCTION/RAFFLE:

Once again, REPS members, friends and guests have cracked open their closets and filled the Silent Auction to brimming for the latest Showcase, this year with the theme "Kids Again!" June 23-24 at the Seattle Center.

The fundraising mainstay in the Mingling Room ("Mingling" means "Fidalgo" in Freedonian) will this year be joined by a raffle in which attendees try for an item of memorabilia at \$1 a ticket.

Sharing the Mingling Room will be Registration, vendors, consignment sales and the REPS Outlet Store. See the accompanying article for details.

A sampling of the Silent Auction goods includes the following:

- The absolutely, positively last chance for fans of "Archie Andrews" to get the two-volume, four-CD "Archie" set; REPS sold the special edition at last year's Showcase, down to this one lone set. Like the others, it bears autographs from the three principals of the show: Bob Hastings, Rosemary Rice and Hal Stone.

- A book about Jack Webb and "Dragnet," with autographs by REPS actor friends who appeared on the radio and TV versions of the show.


