
**SHOWCASE 2007**

# How I Spent My Seattle Vacation

This was my first time at the REPS Showcase, but it won't be my last.

I had the privilege of directing both of the Friday evening re-creations: "Pinocchio" (Lux Radio Theatre) and "The Fred Allen Show" (guest-starring Jack Benny). And what a cast I had!


The only actor I'd actually worked with before was the wonderful Shirley Mitchell (who did a bang-up job as Portland Hoffa), but it was a thrill to direct such a wide array of amazing talents. I've been a fan of Frank Buxton since the 1960s, when he hosted "Discovery" and starred in Woody Allen's "What's Up Tiger Lilly?" and I was delighted to find that he does killer impressions of both Parker Fennelly and John Milton Kennedy. I was particularly impressed by Seattle's own Larry Albert, who captured not only the sound of Fred Allen's voice and his easy style of delivery, but also his quick wit and his ability to come up with well-placed ad-libs. My old friend Frank Bresee was pitch perfect as Cecil B. DeMille. Then there was Disney "Legend" Ginny Tyler, who, in addition to Pinocchio and Figaro the cat, mastered "Mrs. Nussbaum' on just a few days notice. Bob Hastings, of whom I've also long been a fan, was hilarious as Kenny Delmar and Senator Claghorn. Donald Buka, who threatened to come to the read-through in his pajamas after delays kept his plane from landing until 3am, stole every scene he was in -- whether as Falstaff Openshaw, Gepetto, or Stromboli. Elizabeth Ripley was a real trouper, singing beautifully as the Blue Fairy and stepping into several other roles on virtually no notice. Gloria McMillan was just right as the Hollywood starlet waxing rhapsodic about Lux Soap Flakes. And last but not least, the incomparable Eddie Carroll, who gave so generously of his talent throughout the weekend, and whom I got to direct both as Jiminy Cricket and as Jack Benny.

A few words about Pinocchio, which had the most disastrous rehearsal I've ever experienced. We had no read-through, and in our alotted two and a half hours we managed to get through the show a total of once. Everything that could go wrong, did. The actors somehow seemed to have three different versions of the scripts, with the same dialogue on different pages, and some with no page numbers at all. Sound effects - particularly those

involving a whale getting ready to sneeze - required some last-minute creative improvisation. Last minute cast switches were necessary because of schedule conflicts. One of our stars even had to leave mid-rehearsal when a close friend was rushed to the hospital. But when we went "on the air" a couple of hours later, the performance was practically flawless. Amazing.

I should mention that the Pinocchio rehearsal was also one of the funniest afternoons I've ever spent (another reason it took so long). To give just two notable examples, at one point Eddie Carroll decided to deliver one of his "Jiminy Cricket" lines not as Jiminy, but as Jack Benny--hand on cheek and all--causing the entire cast to crack up for several minutes. And when Gloria, in the Lux commercial, asked announcer Frank Buxton how he could possibly have known that she had received nylons and lingerie for Christmas, Frank was supposed to say "Well, it's really not fair, Gloria. I read somewhere the other day that lingerie and stockings are the most popular Christmas gifts for women." But Frank, in his perfect John Milton Kennedy voice, instead deadpanned, "Well, Gloria, I have to get up pretty early in the morning to peek in your bedroom window."

By the time I managed to pick myself up off the floor, I knew that this wouldn't be my last REPS Showcase.





### Silent Auction and Sales

Thanks to generous donors, bidders and buyers, REPS fundraising efforts at Showcase 2007 brought in more than \$3,000.

Filled with items donated by REPS members, friends and Showcase guests, the Silent Auction drew a total of \$1,625; the raffle, more than \$150, and the REPS Outlet Store, nearly \$1,200. All proceeds go to defray the costs of staging Showcase.

Raffle winners were as follows:

- Framed transcription disc of half a "Jack Benny Show" broadcast on April 28, 1946: Bruce Forsberg.
- Three framed Bing Crosby recordings: Clif Ferguson.
- Showcase authors collection Dick Beals' "Think Big" and Frank Bresee's "Radio's Golden Years": Terry Mahoney.
- Etcht-Kraft woodcut depiction of Amos 'n Andy: R.L. Kidd.

Over in the Silent Auction, Lee Hewitt prevailed with a \$70 bid to buy the disc with the first half of the "Jack Benny Show."

The hardware of the Golden Age of Radio — tube radios — proved to be a hot commodity in the auction.

REPS member Bill Buckley of Spokane brought over a carful of radios to donate. One, a reproduction, sold in the REPS Outlet Store for \$20. The others set off bidding blitzes in the Silent Auction. Ken Bertrand held off other contenders to take home a Westinghouse console model for \$95 and a General Electric tabletop radio for \$46. Ken Korhonen wrote in the 18th and final bid — \$135 — to own a Philco console radio.

For \$30, John Warmington snapped up a Zenith clock radio, donated by Inez Schaefer.

Many bidders set their sights on two genuine Red Ryder BB guns signed by Tommy Cook and Frank Bresee, who each played Little Beaver on the radio show, accompanied by a special REPS CD of the show. Don Lacky laid claim with a \$100 bid to a gun paired with a print of a wartime season's greeting signed by Tommy. John Watkins plunked down \$80 for the second gun, this one with a copy of Frank's "Radio's Golden Years." Disappointed bidders will have another chance at next year's Silent Auction, where two more of the REPS-donated BB guns will be on the table.

Another famous Frank — Sinatra — also commanded some bidding respect. At stake was a three-item package: a 20-cassette, 30-hour collection, "Frank Sinatra and Friends," donated by Radio Spirits; a framed original photo of Frank from Linda Moschell; and bobby-sox style Barbie Loves Frankie collector's doll set, donated by Terry Campbell. No swooning for Margarita Anorijic; she held her cool against other Frankie fans to plunk down the \$90 final bid.

Books were also big in the Silent Auction. Ray Erlenborn's copy of "The Great American Broadcast," inscribed to the premier sound-effects artist by author Leonard Maltin, went to Don Lacky for \$40. Clif Ferguson also paid \$40 to secure a copy of "My Last Years With Bing," signed by author and Showcase guest Kathryn Crosby.

John Jensen's perennial contribution to the Silent Auction — framed photos of old-time radio performers from John Archer as "The Shadow" to "Chase & Sanborn Hour" stars Edgar Bergen and Charlie McCarthy — again proved popular. Nine photos sold for nearly \$150, with some left over for next year's auction.

Ditto for framed signed photos of Tommy Cook and radio co-performers. Five brought in more than \$100, with more in store next year.




I hope the leadership at REPS decides to host another one in 2008.



### Library News ... We found some Errors

We get the CDs for our library from several different sources. Most of them are from remasters taken from the original ET disks or original tapes.

One of our sources for CDs apparently had a faulty preference file in their computer. Although the content of the CDs in our library is correct, some of the CDs have incorrect titles inside the CD. For example, a *Richard Diamond* CD has the correct *Richard Diamond* episodes as written on the CD but the title when you put the CD in a computer might say *Sam Spade*. In any case the CD is correct for content and catalog number. It may take us awhile to find the ones that have errors on the inside titles.





### How to use the Cassette, CD, DVD Libraries.

First of all each library is distinct. Catalog numbers in one library will have a completely different content than another. It is necessary to identify CD, Cassette, or DVD along with the catalog number. At the present time there are no Missin the library.

REPS Members may check out 10 CDs or 10 Cassettes or 10 DVDs for \$6.00. It is also possible to check out a double order 20 CDs or 20 Cassettes for \$12.00. This covers the cost of mailing and maintaining the library. You may mix Cassettes, CDs, and DVDs in the order.

At most of the meetings a few *grab bags* of 10 Cassettes or CDs are available for checkout from the library. Sometimes new members are confused, these are for checkout and and then returned to the library after use. The *grab bags* are not for sale.

Checkout forms are available at the meetings, by request in the mail, on the web site, and a new form included with each library checkout. The library may also be used with the internet using PayPal. Instructions for that use are on the web site.
