CBC Programs Form 'Canada Week' in U.S.

School students in the United States will hear about Canada in special programs contributed by the CBC to Columbia Broadcasting System's regular school radio series, American School of the Air, during Canada Week—March 1-7. Canada Week was begun last year by Columbia in co-operation with the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation to promote international understanding and goodwill through the exchange of school radio programs.

From its Montreal and Toronto studios the CBC will present the following programs:

Monday—Choosing the Leader comparing democratic political procedure with other methods of appointing the head of the state.

Tuesday—Roger Sudden—a dramatization of Thomas Raddall's novel of 18th century Nova Scotia.

Wednesday—Microbe invaders—the battle against diphtheria and the production of anti-toxin.

Thursday — North to Canada—a program of all-Canadian music conducted by Geoffrey Waddington with commentary by Marcus Adeney.

Friday—Immigration—a panel discussion by four university students on population and immigration problems with special reference to Canada.

These programs will be broadcast at 5.00 p.m. EST over mid-east stations of the CBC Trans-Canada network and over CBS stations in the United States each day during Canada Week.

Microbe Invaders and Roger Sudden will be repeated in the two American School of the Air series regularly heard as exchange school broadcasts in Canada—March of Science and Tales of Adventure. For times please see program listings on page 3.

HOLY WEEK MEDITATION

Lenten devotional addresses by Dr. Derwyn Owen of Trinity College, Toronto, will be broadcast daily during Holy Week, Monday to Friday, at 5.00 p.m. EST, over eastern and mid-west stations of the CBC Trans-Canada network. The talks will deal with the events of Holy Week culminating with Good Friday.

Survey Business in 'Cross Section'

To help radio listeners understand how the latest developments in labor and business affect them as individuals is the purpose of a new weekly CBC series called Cross Section.

The series provides a regular survey of the latest events, trends and ideas in the fields of labor and business, by means of interpretive reports, interviews, biographical sketches, roundtable discussions and statements of varying points of view by representatives from the Canadian Chamber of Commerce, Canadian Manufacturers Association, Canadian Congress of Labor, Trades and Labor Congress of Canada, and other labor and business organizations. Some programs include illustrative dramas to show how individuals and their families can be affected by current changes in business and labor.

Cross Section is broadcast on the CBC Dominion network, Tuesdays at 8.00 p.m. EST in the East and 11.30 p.m. EST in the West.

Fey Adventures of a Leprechaun

A new series of adventures is in store for Timothy O'Brien, better known as Timothy the Leprechaun, now that he has left his familiar haunts with the rabbits to go farther afield.

For children who haven't been following this serial fairy tale, Timothy is a little old man with a wrinkled face and a long grey beard, who is really a leprechaun. At one time he had a bad accident and lost one of his legs, and so became the only one-legged leprechaun in Ireland. He was so sad about this, because he couldn't dance with the other leprechauns, that the Fairy Queen gave him a wooden leg — a magical wooden leg which turns into a flute when he takes it off.

The adventures of Timothy O'Brien are broadcast every Thursday on the CBC Trans-Canada network at 5.30 p.m. EST in eastern Canada, and at 745 pm EST for children in the west.

Self-understanding Basis of CBC Dramas

People who attempt to escape from reality or compensate for childhood feelings of insecurity in abnormal ways are the basis of the weekly series of psychological dramas called In Search of Ourselves, broadcast on the CBC Dominion network.

The March programs tell the stories of the woman who is prone to accidents, the woman who turns back (regression into childhood), the girl who suffers from anxiety, and the fanatic. At the conclusion of the plays Dr. J. D. M. Griffin, of the National Committee on Mental Hygiene (Canada) traces the history of these mental attitudes to their source and suggests what might have been done and what might still be done to help such people to understand themselves.

In Search of Ourselves is broadcast Fridays at 9.00 p.m. AST; 8.00 p.m. EST; 10.30 p.m. CST; 9.30 p.m. MST; 8.30 p.m. PST.

CBC PROGRAM NEWS

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Jessie Hagerman, teacher in East Ward School, Napanee, Ontario, makes good use of CBC school radio programs and other CBC broadcasts for a classroom project, according to a recent article which she contributed to "The School," a magazine for teachers and inspectors. This project may be useful to teachers in other parts of Canada and it is described here as a suggestion for "before and after" school broadcast activities.

Because of crowded conditions in the schools of Napanee, it was necessary for Miss Hagerman, when she returned to school for the current year, to face the same children whom she had already taught during the two previous years. Under these rather difficult teaching conditions she tried very hard to find some new idea—something that would be an inspiration not only for the children but for herself. The idea of "Canadiana" seemed to be one around which she might group most of the subjects of the curriculum.

As a beginning she asked each pupil to buy a loose-leaf notebook with the regular wide-spaced lines and a refill of plain paper; then called to mind a small booklet which they had made during the previous year, describing the CBC series on Canadian artists. Into these books they put the stories of the lives of the artists and drew full page original illustrations with the names of the artists printed in Roman letters across the page. These were colored with water colors, and the whole project formed most interesting art lessons.

This year she decided to enlarge the scrapbook to have several sections on various phases of Canadian life. She had her pupils search newspaper files for factual information to supplement the things they wrote and drew themselves.

In the poetry section of the booklet they made full use of the CBC series on Canadian poets by writing essays for their scrapbooks on the lives of the poets. The series of Canadian legends contributed another section to the book for which Miss Hagerman had the children design illustrations of totem poles or Indian scenes. She also encouraged her pupils to listen to programs other than school radio broadcasts, such as John Fisher's commentaries and stories on the Canadian scene broadcast Sundays, at 5.33 p.m. on the CBC Trans-Canada network.

In addition to the information on Canada gained from the CBC National School Broadcasts, Miss Hagerman read stories of Canadian scientists to her

Songs for Children Feature Age-old Art



In the West Indies the art of calypso singing is about 300 years old. The songs are characterized by their bouncy rhythm and by the intricate lyric improvisations which are the pride of the true West Indian artist. They are a combination newspaper and gossip sheet—and the composer and singer might be likened to a one-man radio station. The calypso singer weaves all the latest events and current happenings into his songs.

In this series of calypso songs for children, youngsters from all parts of Canada are invited to write to Lord Caresser, CBC Box 500, Toronto, about anything interesting that has happened to them that they think other children would like to hear. Lord Caresser will make up original calypso songs from the most interesting letters.

Music Makes Series Tells Story of Music

Beginning March 13, F. Renwick Brown will give brief histories of various phases of music in Music Makers, a music appreciation series for children. It is broadcast Saturdays, at 10.45 p.m. E&T on eastern stations of the CBC Trans-Canada network.

In the first program he will tell children about folk music and how it came to be written, illustrating his talk with recordings of different folk songs. Then, in subsequent programs, he will describe dance music through the years—modern dance music, the stately measures of minuets, national dances and waltzes and primitive dance rhythms from the Belgian Congo—tracing the development of various dance forms to the times and customs of different countries. March programs will also include descriptions of ballet music with recordings from famous ballets.

Music Makers is a series planned to entertain as well as to instruct children in music appreciation.

Sayers Play Adapted For Stage 48 Series

The Zeal of Thy House, a poetic play by Dorothy L. Sayers, British author and playwright, depicting an episode in the long and colorful history of Canterbury Cathedral, will be the Easter presentation on Stage 48 on Sunday, March 28. Adapted for radio by Andrew Allan. CBC supervisor of drama, it will be broadcast with original music by Lucio Agostini at 10.00 p.m. EST on the CBC Trans-Canada network.

The play has man's pride in his own achievement as its central theme and is woven around the tragic accident of William of Sens, who designed and rebuilt the greater part of the Cathedral choir after it was destroyed by fire in 1174. William of Sens was crippled during the rebuilding.

Miss Sayers' ability to portray the past in living words is known to Canadian listeners who heard her radio serial drama, The Man Born to be King. She is well-known to detective fiction addicts for her many books of mystery and crime.

The Zeal of Thy House was written for the Friends of Canterbury Cathedral and was first presented in the Chapter House at the Canterbury Festival in 1937. It was also successfully produced in London and later published in a collection of famous plays of 1938-39

Other plays to be broadcast on Stage 48 this month are The Concert, on March 7, and The Little God, on March 8, both by Joseph Schull; and a repeat performance from the "Stage 47" series of Lister Sinclair's radio adaptation of Sophocles' drama Oedipus Rex. on March 21.
