Mr. Curling

Fred Graham died the other night after a long illness, and Saskatchewan, and especially Regina, lost one of curling's best friends.

Mr. Graham was Mr. Curling of Saskatchewan. From the time he took the reins as secretary of the Saskatchewan Curling Association, he became almost nationally known as a promoter of good sport. He never missed a bonspiel, either as official or player, and it is said he could call every curler in the province by his first name. He knew curling so well that he was one of the best at the game. As third man with Bill McGillivray in 1928, he helped to give that rink the power it needed to win the provincial title and a trip east in quest of the Dominion championship. Mr. Graham also shared in the first curling broadcast in this part of the country. That was in the days when microphones were stationary, and the announcer couldn't move all around the rink.—*Bill Good, on CBC, Jan. 10.*

The Bleak Sisters-- January and February

Not many people, we fancy, even in normal times, regard the first few weeks of the year as a period of exhilaration. Christmas and New Year festivities are over and we return to our desks and our benches in a Monday morning mood—only more so. The next break, we know, will not be due till the spring. Plainly these are thoughts that may occur to one in peace time. In war time such breaks are less significant, mainly because they hardly exist and anyway are not marked by festivities that matter. But the absence of cakes and ale hardly mitigates the January bleakness. This year we have been enjoying as they say—some seasonable weather . . . and its impact has not been softened much by adventitious aid. "That," we hear the Fuel Controller say, "is as it should be." . . . As for Jack Frost, he has indeed been giving us full measure. One might say he has turned on the heat. "The coldest Christmas since 1890," we read in our papers. "From December 24 to 26 the day temperatures were the lowest since 1872, the first

year for which systematic recordings are available." Since then frost has more or less kept up his offensive, pushing out his spearheads and probing our soft spots. Nor is there any reason to believe that he is lacking in reserves. January and February are ideal months for frost.—*BBC Listener.*

Ottawa.—Dean Adrien Pouliot, of Laval University, Quebec, has been reappointed as a Governor of The Canadian Broadcasting Corporation. The reappointment took place on Sunday (Jan. 28) and he was able to attend the remaining two days of the three-day meeting of the Board of Governors of the CBC.

Some child will be doing his best and get a C, while another child loaf and gets an A. Children realize this sooner or later and become discouraged at the prospect of always having to compete and knowing they will never win. . . . I think we are committing a wrong against our children by making them subjects of such a system in their formative years.—*Vivian Morton, on CBC, Jan. 19.*

PARLOW STRING QUARTET (12:30 p.m.)

The Schubert "Quartet in D Minor" is the work to be performed today. Schubert composed it early in 1824, when he is said to have been oppressed by thoughts of death. The opening movement, Andante, is devoted to the struggle with Death, and in the second movement Schubert has recourse to his songs, writing variations on the theme that underlies his "Death and the Maiden." "Death as the Demon Fiddler" is the theme of the Scherzo movement, while the Finale is in the character of a Macabre dance. Critics consider the quartet to be among Schubert's finest works and for spiritual quality one of the finest in all chamber music literature. The members of the Parlow Quartette are Kathleen Parlow and Samuel Hershoren, violins; Robert Warburton, viola, and Isaac Mamott, 'cello.

Samuel Barber is an American composer who won the Prix de Rome in 1935 and the Pulitzer Prize, 1935 and 1936. Peter Warlock is an English composer. His "Curlew" is a song cycle written for tenor voice, flute, English horn and string quartet.

Laura E. Jamieson, British Columbia M.L.A., speaks from Vancouver on citizenship study groups. She will report on the Montreal League For

Women's Rights, the Toronto Women Electors' Association, and the Women's School For Citizenship in Vancouver. Born in Bruce County, Ontario, Mrs. Jamieson was educated at Toronto University. She was one of the group who campaigned for the women's vote in British Columbia from 1913 to 1917, and was for eleven years a judge of the Juvenile Court in Burnaby. She was one of the chief organizers of the Working Girls' Co-operative Association which set up residences for young women in war work on the west coast.

"How do young Canadians stationed in Halifax or en route overseas, spend their leisure hours?" That's a question that navy men's parents and relatives regularly ask of Navy League officials. The Navy League is answering the question through the co-operation of the CBC by presenting a broadcast from the League's United Services Forum in Halifax. Listeners will hear the final period of a championship series hockey game between Canadian service teams. Foster Hewitt, internationally famous play-by-play announcer, will describe the game, and with him will be the CBC commentator John Fisher who will tell Canadians who's playing, who's watching, and what they all look like.

MONTREAL SYMPHONY ORCHESTRA (8:00 p.m.)

(Dominion)
Yehudi Menuhin, world famous violinist, will be the guest artist tonight, playing with the orchestra in Brahms' Concerto for Violin, in D Major. Désiré Defauw, conductor of the Chicago Symphony and artistic director of the Montreal Orchestra, will conduct. Yehudi Menuhin made his debut in London in the Brahms' Concerto. He was then 13 years of age and the conductor was Fritz Busch. Now a mature artist in his thirtieth year. Menuhin has had a more illustrious career than most musicians twice his age. Born in New York City, he made his first public appearance at the age of seven at a San Francisco Symphony Young People's concert. His first nation wide appearance was when he played the Beethoven Concerto with the New York Symphony under Fritz Busch at the age of 11. By the time he was 18 he had given recitals in 73 cities in 13 countries.

Defauw will conduct Mozart's Overture to "Don Juan" as the opening number of the broadcast program.

SHOW TIME (9:30 p.m.)

Roy Locksley's once-a-month program—which, if rumour doesn't lie, will become once-a-week shortly—is a sort of miniature operetta tonight, with a charming set of cameo sketches from "A Cycle of the Motley," by the "modern English Gilbert and Sullivan," Oliver and Teschemacher, done by the chorus and orchestra, with special arrangements by Locksley. The program opens with an invitation to the show:

Pierette here the prettiest maid is—Don't be nervous, married ladies! Pierrot with such sighs and poses—Husbands, don't turn up your noses!

Harlequin, a baritone, and Columbine, the sweetest known, sing for the listeners' pleasure, and the little scenes pass on to a roundelay; Harlequin's song, done by the men's chorus; a good-night song, and, finally, the Passing Show. Interspersed in the half-hour fantasy, Locksley has arranged a special excerpt from Vincent Youman's "Hit The Deck," which will include: "Sometimes I'm Happy," "The Harbour of My Heart," and "Hallelujah." He has a sixteen-piece orchestra and a mixed choir of twelve voices.

CBR SYMPHONY (10:30 p.m.)

Two young western musicians, Nick Fiore and Constance Stefanik, will be heard as soloists tonight. Nick Fiore will be heard as flautist in the "Telemann Suite for Flute and Strings," and Constance Stefanik as soprano soloist in the aria "Ocean, Thou Mighty Monster," from von Weber's opera Oberon. The program will also include the "Symphony No. 5 in B Flat," by Schubert. Miss Stefanik is a Winnipeg girl who has been making her career on the west coast in recent seasons. Although this career was interrupted by a serious motor accident, she has now regained her health, and plans to go to New York this fall to continue her studies. For a time, during the present war, she toured with USO shows in the central United States from Chicago to Fort Worth, Texas.

QUESTIONS and ANSWERS

Of Things To Come

I listen to the program *Of Things To Come* on Tuesday nights, and have attended one Citizens' Forum meeting, but I do not know how this series is organized? Can you inform me?—Mrs. H. R. R., Winnipeg, Man.

["Of Things To Come" began in the spring of 1943 and was continued in the spring and fall of 1944. Basically, the purpose is a discussion of Canada in the post-war world. Morley Callaghan is the permanent chairman, who travels from city to city, accompanied by a CBC producer—John Fisher at present. Public meetings are held in the cities, and the broadcast originates on the stage at the meetings. Usually three speakers, chosen by the CBC Talks Department, are heard, and at the conclusion of the broadcast the meeting is thrown open for discussion. Citizens' Forum groups exist throughout the Dominion. Anyone may form one. Simply gather a few neighbors around your radio, listen to the discussion, and go on with the debate among yourselves when the broadcast ends. In Manitoba, get study bulletins, and have a summary of your findings broadcast by communicating with Stanley Rands, Adult Education Office, University of Manitoba, Winnipeg. The Saskatchewan secretary is K. W. Gordon, University of Saskatchewan, Saskatoon, and the Alberta secretary is F. W. Peers, University of Alberta, Edmonton.]

Drama Scripts

Does the CBC ever use drama scripts written by Canadian authors?—J. M., Regina, Sask.

[From April, 1943, to March, 1944, more than 600 scripts were read by the CBC's Drama Department, all voluntary and unsolicited. The plays used were chosen from these. The bulk of submissions were made by Canadians, although a few writers in England, Australia, New Zealand, South Africa and the U.S.A. submitted plays. Five-sixths of the plays broadcast were by Canadian authors.]

Summary of Broadcast, Feb. 11, 1945

THE SEED ORDER

1. *Catalogues and dealers.* Examine as many catalogues as you can. It helps you in the selection of the right dealer as well as the right varieties. Buy from reliable firms.

2. *Several drafts of the seed order* are necessary. The first one should contain your choices of what you'd like to grow. In a second draft this list can be cut down by striking out the least important things. The final draft must fit your garden space, your needs, and your pocket book.

3. *Standard varieties* should be used for all main plantings. New varieties may be bought for test but should be used experimentally the first year.

4. *The problem of new varieties* flooding the market is a serious one that should be studied by horticultural societies. Many of the new varieties haven't much value and are foisted on the public as a money-making scheme. Some organized and controlled plan of testing, naming, and marketing new varieties appears to be needed.

5. *Vegetable seeds.* Order more than one variety to give succession and lengthen season of use. Order varieties according to household use, i.e., Golden Acre cabbage for summer salads, Danish Ballhead for sauerkraut, etc. Select varieties for quality as well as estimating quantities needed.

6. *Flower seeds.* Flowers are grown for beauty so consult the womenfolk who have a developed appreciation of aesthetic values. Get the best seed you can. Choose the best standard varieties according to purpose. Cheap seeds produce weedy flowers of little value. Avoid new and untried varieties in main plantings or conspicuous spots. Plant a few varieties for trial in short rows in the back yard each year. Extend your knowledge of varieties by trial and by observation of what neighbours and experts are growing.

Dr. Peter Pan

Worry isn't the complete answer to the problem . . . but we do know that high blood pressure is more common than it used to be. This is partly explained by the fact that nowadays more people are living to the age when they tend to develop it. These times are full of stress and hurry, with not enough time for rest and relaxation. It's not always easy to avoid hard work and worry in days of war, but here's something that we should all try to remember. There should be a part of each of us that never grows up, a part that likes to play and "have fun." Of course, there are lots of exceptions, but I've found that the commonest type of high blood pressure patient is the man or woman who has "put childish things behind him" and has forgotten how to play.—A Western Physician on CBC Homemakers' Program, Jan. 24.

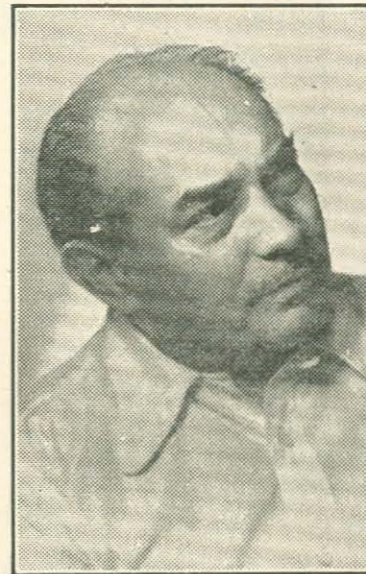
RHYTHM REVUE (6:00 p.m.)

I've already chosen my post-war crystal, says a famous Washington hostess. And so on, *ad infinitum*. I can't help wondering what effect all that is having on us. If it only means that we're taking a lively interest in our houses and our cars, that's fine. But isn't there a chance that it is giving us a lopsided picture of our post-war world? If too many of us are identifying the end of the war with new crystal and a dream kitchen—well, it's just too bad for our brave new world. I have a healthy respect for the power of advertising, and I know how that power is directed at the moment. We'll need to be pretty strong-minded to resist it! If we're really in earnest, we might do something to act as a counter-balance. If we think there is too much emphasis on the material side of our post-war plans, we'd better do some talking and thinking and planning from the other point of view. We'd better start putting on some propoganda for a world in which spiritual values—as opposed to material, of course—take first place.—Christine Leslie, on CBC, Jan. 11.
