This Is Canada Calling

(This essay on the CBC's new international short-wave service was written by Gerald Winkler. Gerald is 15, and is in Grade 10 at Kelvin Technical High School, Winnipeg. The essay was submitted as an entry in the Kelvin Year Book Contest.)

A person returning to New Brunswick after an absence of a year or more would find some interesting changes in scenery. About two miles outside the town of Sackville, in a large field along the Tantramar River, and covering many acres of ground, is "Canada's New Voice." Stretching their titanic arms to the soaring heights of up to 380 feet are the giant antennas of our new short-wave station. To the by-passer no noise is audible, except perhaps the noise of the innumerable wild birds of that marshy region. It is hard to believe that at that very moment words and music from far away Montreal are being hurled into space from the curtains of fine metallic lace atop those towers, and are being received by our Canadian troops overseas as part of our plan to bring them closer to home.

A Morale-Builder

This is truly a morale-builder. Yet this new weapon in the war of words is versatile indeed, as proved by the experience of other countries. Germany is unscrupulous, but planned use of lies and verbal terrorism won the equivalent of many a battle for her. Italy succeeded in bringing a large portion of the Arab population to believe in Fascism by the use of propaganda. They even took the trouble to distribute free radios, so that the Arabs could listen. It is interesting, however, to note that these radios were permanently tuned to the Italian station, lest the temptation to see what Britain had to offer proved too strong.

Most of the programs for overseas will be presented from Montreal. Why, you may ask, locate the transmitter at such an out-of-the-way place, so that it is necessary to bring the programs hundreds of miles by special telephone lines or wire-lines, as they are called, before they can be transmitted? The answer is this: A station such as this, which we expect to cover the whole world, has to be placed in such a way that its signals will encounter the least possible

resistance on their journey into space. Again, the marshy ground conditions are excellent reflectors of radio waves, whereas other types of ground will rob the signals of some of their strength. For these reasons, Sackville was chosen.

Unique Construction

The actual construction is unique in its field. There is not anything quite like it anywhere else in the world. One interesting fact is that

the programs are focussed or directed to a certain point. That is to say, if a program is produced for French listeners, we make sure that it gets to France and not to Timbuctoo. This is done by use of reflectors, which are the curtains of metallic lace I mentioned above.

I wish I could peer into the future and tell you how well the station succeeded in entertaining Canadian

Ten Million Americans Follow BBC Programs

Nearly ten million Americans hear one or more British programs in the course of a week. This is shown by a national survey made last September amongst a cross-section of the adult population, of the extent of listening and the reactions to, six BBC programs which are picked up by American stations and broadcast locally.

The programs are Radio Newsreel, Transatlantic Call, London Column, American Eagle in Britain, Transatlantic Quiz, and Atlantic Spotlight. One or more of these, the survey revealed, were listened to during the week in question by about 14 per cent of the estimated 71 million adults in the U.S.A. who own radio sets.

Radio Newsreel, the program with the largest audience, was heard by 7.4 per cent, about 5,250,000 people. It was to be expected that it would be the BBC program with the largest audience in the United States, since this day-to-day radio chronicle of events told in narrative, commentary and sound pictures, is unique in radio and gives American listeners something quite new.

Lord Reith Here On Commonwealth Tour

Ottawa. (BUP)—Lord Reith, former Director General of the British Broadcasting Corporation, arrived here March 9, by plane.

The former BBC head is now on a 70,000-mile tour of the British Commonwealth of Nations to investigate telecommunications. During his stay here he will probably confer with the Minister of Munitions, Hon. C. D. Howe, and the Minister of Transport, Hon. J. E. Michaud.

Brophy To Rogers

Montreal. (BUP)—The appointment of Reginald M. Brophy, Montreal, as president and director of Rogers Majestic Ltd., Rogers Electronic Tubes Ltd., and subsidiary companies was announced here today. Brophy recently resigned as general manager of the Canadian Marconi Company to accept his new appointment.

Brophy, not yet 45, joined Canadian Marconi in 1919, and was among the pioneers of the radio industry in Canada.

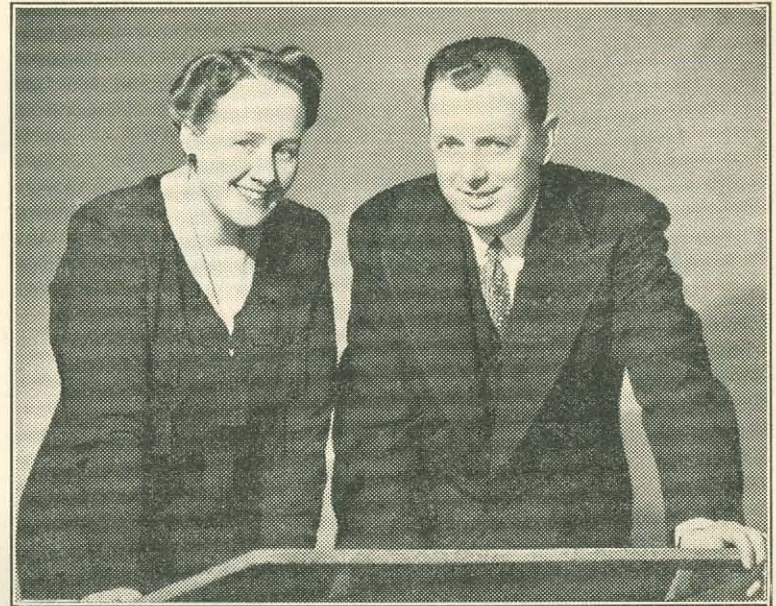

Roy Locksley Burns Much Midnight Oil

Roy Locksley, Winnipeg conductor, whose new vocal and orchestral program, *Winnipeg Presents*, will begin on CBC's Dominion Network on Sunday, March 25, at 10:30 p.m., frequently works all night at the clever musical arrangements heard in his two weekly shows from Winnipeg. A veteran musician long resident in Toronto, he likes the West and is making a place for himself in musical circles there. He says he never finds composing and arranging easy, no matter how long he works at it. Musical arrangements take a good deal of thought and care. The composer's intention, the limitations of the available orchestra, and half a dozen other factors have to be considered.

Locksley is a former musical director of the Navy Show, and was a member of the famous Dumbells concert party which emerged from World War I. He played trumpet with the Toronto Symphony Orchestra, and was a member of the CBC's Toronto audition board with Campbell McInnis and Lawrence Mason.

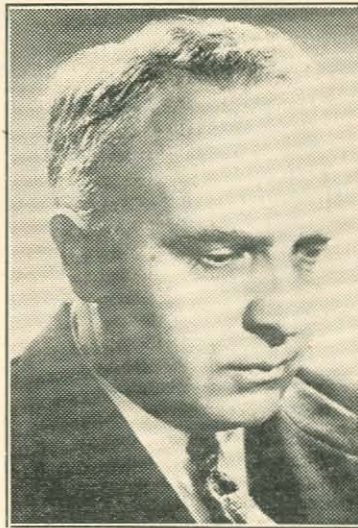

The Prairie Gardener

Summary of Broadcast, March 18, 1945.

1945 Victory Vegetable Gardens.

1. War conditions continue to make it necessary for us to grow at least part of the vegetables we require for home use. Not having all the sugar we need for canning fruits makes garden vegetables and annual garden fruits unusually important.

2. Fresh garden products are a valuable source of vitamins and appetizing meals. Since health values are greatest in fresh material we should grow our own as far as feasible.

3. The small garden should be planned for quality. Parsley, spinach, swiss chard, carrots, leaf lettuce, green sprouting broccoli, tomatoes and radishes make appetizing material for salads and greens. They will also supply enough vitamins A, B, C, and G. For highest value they should be fresh gathered just before using.

4. For "greens" all season: spinach, swiss chard, beets and green sprouting broccoli.

5. For plenty of salads: Onions, chives and garlic for pungency. For main use: Leaf and head lettuce, cabbage, carrots, celery, radishes and cucumber. Add tomatoes for acidity and vitamin C. Garnish with cress or parsley.

6. For best varieties of these and other vegetables consult your nearest Dominion Experimental Station and the best local gardener. Ask your provincial Extension Department for bulletins or leaflets.

7. For succession crops of one kind of vegetable plant several with different maturing dates rather than successive plantings of one variety.

8. Lettuce all season can be had by: 1, using Grand Rapids leaf lettuce started indoors, sown in the garden early and sown again about August 1; 2, start some plants of New York No. 12 head lettuce and possibly some Paris White Cos both indoors and in the garden in May; 3, make another sowing of head lettuce about July 20. (Dates will need changing in short season districts.)

9. Cabbage for succession: Golden Acre sown indoors April 1, set out in May will yield heads about July 1. Copenhagen Market and Danish Ballhead sown at the same time will provide fall and winter cabbage. If all sowings are made outdoors use early or mid-season varieties.

10. Early varieties don't usually produce as heavy yields as mid-season and late varieties of vegetables. Homesteader peas for main crop will outyield the earlier American Won-

QUESTIONS and ANSWERS

Religious Broadcasts

Who arranges the CBC's religious broadcasts, and how is the time allocated?—F.M., Winnipeg, Man.

[In a recent broadcast, the Chairman of the CBC Board of Governors said: "The CBC co-operates very closely with the National Religious Advisory Council in planning its religious periods. The Council represents all denominations and creeds, and the time is apportioned fairly and carefully so that each gets a proper share. There are three periods each Sunday on the network, a half hour each in length. In addition, several of our stations have entered into arrangements which provide for local broadcasts of church services on Sunday mornings. There are also CBC stations over which morning devotions are given each week day. All this is planned in co-operation with the National Religious Advisory Council."]

Network Wire Lines

I understand that coast-to-coast broadcasting is not done by wireless only, but that wire lines connect the various stations. What is the cost of these lines?—K.G., Edmonton, Alta.

[The CBC pays about one million dollars a year—about one-fifth of its total income—for the lease of lines from the wire companies. Population is so scattered and distances so great in Canada that network operation is costly. The BBC can hook up all its stations in England with about 975 miles of wire. With a quarter the population Canada needs eight times the wire mileage—8,000 miles.]

der. Where only one variety is grown choice must be made between earliness and yield.

11. *Where quantity is main factor* the latest variety that will mature a full crop is likely to be one to give highest yield.

12. *Beginners and small space gardeners* should stick to standard varieties of proved merit.

13. *Gardeners with sufficient time and space* can perform good service by experimenting with varieties and growing methods to find the best for a particular district.

14. *Market garden varieties* are not necessarily the ones of highest quality. Quantity yield is important to market gardener. Quality should have first place with home gardener.

15. *Starting vegetable plants* (tomatoes, cabbages, etc.) indoors, should be timed so that plants in good growing condition are ready at right time for setting out. Type of equipment (window, hotbed, greenhouse) is big factor in determining time to start. Keeping a garden diary and recording seeding dates provides a guide for following seasons.

16. *The seed order* for both indoors and outdoors should be made at once if not already attended to. Order early for better selection of varieties wanted.

BBC Charter Slated For Renewal in 1946

"The Times," of London has, in a leading article, just reminded the public of Britain, that the Charter of the BBC falls due for renewal or revision in 1946. In spite of the weaknesses, real or imagined, of a "monopoly" organization, the BBC has been, in the words of "The Times" leader: "the sole form of monopoly which can or should be tolerated by a free community . . . that which is operated as an independent service in the general interest and unceasingly subject, as the BBC has always been, to the direct and at times severe pressure of public opinion. This is the single but probably decisive test and justification for BBC."

"The Times" goes on to mention the services to the cause of the United Nations of the BBC. "Every stage of the remarkably rapid ascent of the BBC into a unique place in the national life has been accompanied and indeed powerfully assisted by both criticism and contention. But there is at present a distinct danger that the debate may be prejudiced because for more than five years the BBC has been on war service; the direct calls of the Government have in themselves been sufficiently heavy to treble its staff, or more. Many shortcomings, which are now quite unjustifiably cited by the critics as proofs of the inevitable ineptitude of a monopolist, have been imposed upon the programs in consequence. It is important for an impartial consideration of future broadcasting policy, not only to recollect the very high standard and reputation which the BBC had undoubtedly achieved before the war, but also to give full weight in the war-time record itself to the fact that, whatever faults of judgment, choice, or presentation there may have been in the home programs, the BBC has been able and privileged, by virtue of the honest qualities which it had cultivated from its first inception, to operate both as a midwife and a nurse of European liberation."

troops, and in attracting an audience of foreign listeners. But, at the time of writing, all I can say is that we hope to cover all the world, except the Far East, and to broadcast in numerous languages. As a matter of fact, at present those Germans who are willing to risk their lives to listen to the "enemy" radio (and there are some) may hear: "Hier ist Radio Kanada mit seinem Auslandsdienst. Wir rufen Deutschland" opening a 15 minute broadcast direct to Germany.

After the war there is another plan to be tried. If we can provide features of such high quality that domestic radio services in foreign countries will carry them over their own systems, our listening audience will be substantially increased. Very few of us would go to the trouble of tuning to London at 11:00 in the morning for news, but since it is on CKY anyway, we do not mind listening.
