## CBC To Cover San Francisco Assembly

Woodside, Philpott, Bowman and Fraser will handle big assignment.

Toronto.—Arrangements have been completed to bring Canadian listeners complete coverage of the United Nations Conference on International Organization when it opens at San Francisco, April 25. Speakers to be heard will include regular CBC commentators and news analysts Willson Woodside and Elmore Philpott, also R. T. Bowman, Southam Press Washington correspondent, and Blair Fraser, Ottawa editor of Maclean's magazine. Rene Garneau, French broadcasts supervisor for CBC international service, will broadcast for the CBC French network as well as overseas by short-wave.

The CBC will work closely in the matter of material and facilities with the British Broadcasting Corporation and the Australian Broadcasting Corporation in Veteran's Hall, where the conference is to be held.

CBC arrangements are in charge of D. C. McArthur, chief news editor and Neil M. Morrison, supervisor of talks and public affairs, assisted by Douglas Nixon of the CBC Vancouver newsroom.

In addition to these commentaries, CBC coverage will include actuality broadcasts of any open sessions of the conference, provided on an exchange basis by the American networks. Other press and radio representatives, as well as attending delegates, will speak over CBC networks in Canada and by short-wave to Europe on CBC international service.

## In Italy

## Two Victory Broadcasts Week of April 22

Beatrice Lillie, Fredric March, Joel McCrea, Portia White, to be heard on CBC April 22 and 25

Members of Canada's armed forces who have helped to make victory will see victory in the money-making this week. As special guests of the second CBC program in the Victory Star Show series—radio's top attraction in support of the Eighth Victory Loan campaign—Canadian heroes returned from the European war fronts will applaud a roster of high-ranking stars when they broadcast from the CBC Concert Studios in Toronto. The program will be heard over a combined CBC network on Sunday, April 22, at 7:30 p.m.

Coming to Canada for this special service performance will be the distinguished comedienne, Toronto-born Beatrice Lillie, described as Britain's sophisticated mistress of slapstick; Raoul Jobin, the French-Canadian tenor who has become in recent years one of the leading members of the Metropolitan Opera Company; Fredric March, whose career has been a parade of triumphs from Hollywood to New York, and Florence Eldridge, the gifted American stage actress who is Mrs. Fredric March in private life, and who has shared her husband's good fortune in the world of entertainment. This million dollar cast, assembled to invite Canadian

listeners to "invest in the best" while Canada's best and bravest look on approvingly, will perform under the direction of Rupert Caplan, CBC supervisor of production, Samuel Hersenhoren conducting the special music arranged by Percy Faith.

Percy Faith will be on hand again for the third of radio's five Victory Star Shows to be heard over CBC's combined Trans-Canada and Dominion networks, on Wednesday, April 25, at 7:30 p.m. (9:30 p.m. mountain time).

Sharing the national spotlight on this date will be New York's beautiful young entertainer, Joan Edwards, who has been Your Hit Parade star for over four years and who has numbered among her allies such maestros as Rudee Vallee, Paul Whiteman and—ssh—Frank Sinatra. Her most distinguished Canadian ally on this occasion will be Nova Scotia's Portia White, the young Canadian contralto whose American debut in New York last spring was described by the critics as one of the most brilliant song recitals in many years. Across the border again for the names of three other celebrities who are giving Canada their talents

## Europe Will Hear Canadian Speakers

Montreal.—The CBC International Service has announced the names of the speakers in its first series of talks on Canada's position as a world power prepared for listeners in Europe. Under the general title of "Canada in the Post-War World," the speakers will discuss Canada's plans for extending her good neighbour policy in the years to come. The series will be of particular interest in view of the United Nations Conference at San Francisco on April 25th, which will be attended by a Canadian delegation. These broadcasts will be heard in Europe on Sundays in English at 12.00 hours GMT (7.00 a.m. CDT) with a repeat broadcast at 17.15 hours GMT (12.15 p.m. CDT) and in French at 14.00 hours GMT (9.00 a.m. CDT) with a repeat broadcast at 18.00 hours GMT (1.00 p.m. CDT). All broadcasts will be heard over station CHTA, 15.22 megacycles or 19.71 metres.

The following speakers will be heard for the period from April 22 to May 13:

April 22: "Canada's Status as a Middle Power" — Rene Garneau, Graduate, University of Paris; Commentator.

April 29: "Canada's Global Good Neighbour Policy"—Gordon Skilling, on leave from the University of Wisconsin and author of "Canada's Representation Abroad."

May 6: "Canadians Are Good Neighbours"—Arthur L. Phelps, head of English Department, United College, Winnipeg.

May 13: "Canada in the Post-War World"—John Humphrey, Associate Professor of Law, McGill University, and chairman for the series.

Each talk will be ten minutes in duration. Copies are available from the CBC International Service, Montreal.

## McInnis First in Overseas Series

Professor Edgar McInnis of Toronto was the first speaker in the series "Canada and the Post-War World," beamed to Europe by CBC's International Service shortwave station, CHTA, 15.22 megacycles. Professor McInnis spoke on "Trends in Canadian External Policy," on April 8th. The series of broadcasts will continue under the chairmanship of Professor John Humphrey, of McGill University, Montreal.

### CHAMBER MUSIC (12:30 p.m.)

A new Sunday afternoon chamber music series directed by Adolph Koldofsky. The first broadcast is of Mozart's Flute Quartets in D and G. In succeeding concerts Mr. Koldofsky plans other chamber music works by Mozart, Brahms and Beethoven. On some programs his wife, Gwendolyn Williams, will appear as pianist. Mr. Koldofsky went to the west coast last fall to assume the post of concertmaster with the Vancouver Symphony orchestra. Born in England, he studied in Europe, has broadcast from Paris, and played in other cities. He was with the Hart House Quartet for four seasons, from 1938 to 1942.

### RELIGIOUS PERIOD (1:30 p.m.)

The speaker today is Lt.-Col. Robert Haggard, principal of the Salvation Army Training School, Toronto.

### CHURCH OF THE AIR (3:30 p.m.)

Rev. Oswald McCall, of St. Andrews-Wesley United Church in west end Vancouver, will conduct today's service. Coming originally from Australia, Dr. McCall was at Berkeley, California, for 17 years, where he had charge of First Congregational Church and conducted regular broadcasts over the church's own station KRE. At Chicago, he had charge of First Congregational Church. He went to Vancouver two

years ago. Dr. McCall is the author of nine books, the latest being "The Hand of God," published by Harper's. He has been heard once previously on the CBC's Church of the Air. He was with the Australian troops during the last war, accompanying them through Egypt, France and England.

The youthful "singing stars" to be heard today are semi-finalists in the contest for music scholarships of \$1,000, \$500, and \$250. Miss Gould (20) won second place last year; Miss Connor (19) also plays piano and violin, and sings in eight languages; Miss Ryan (21) born in England, has five languages at her command. Jean Deslauriers will lead the orchestra in "Indian Summer," by Victor Herbert; "I'm in the Mood for Love"; "Andante" from a quartet, by Haydn; and "Kiss Me Again," from Victor Herbert's "Mlle Modiste."

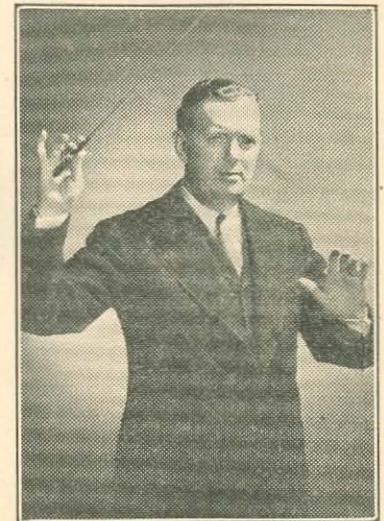
### STRING ORCHESTRA (9:30 p.m.)

**RECITAL (3:45 p.m.)**

Shakespeare's birthday will be celebrated in the English-speaking world again this week, and for Canada's radio audience a special afternoon recital of Shakespearean songs will be presented from Toronto. Stanley Hoban, baritone, will be the soloist. His program includes: "Blow, Blow, Thou Winter Wind!" from "As You Like It"; "Shall I Compare Thee to a Summer Day?" from "Sonnet XVIII" and "Full Fathom Five," from "The Tempest"; (Settings by Frederick Keel) and "England" (Hubert Parry). The music for the last-named song was written for Sir Esme Howard's paraphrase of the famous speech by John of Gaunt in the tragedy of "King Richard II."

**DON MESSER AND HIS ISLANDERS (5:00 p.m.)**

A joyful session of old time music gets right away in high as Don Messer gives his Lads the nod for Soldier's Joy, Rory O'More, Stacks of Barley and Rakes of Mallow. Charlie Chamberlain favors listeners with "Each Night at Nine" and the men in the services with that lovely Irish song "Little Town in the Old County Down."

**ST. GEORGE FOR ENGLAND (6:00 p.m.)**

"St. George for England!" is a cry that has rung around the empire down the centuries. Saluting the patron saint of England on the day set aside in his honor, a feature broadcast from Toronto under that title will be presented for a nationwide audience on the CBC Trans-Canada network tonight. Alan King is the author of the script, which will be produced and directed by J. Frank Willis, supervisor of features for the CBC. Samuel Hersenhoren will conduct the music. The story is a modern version of the legendary tale about St. George and the dragon. The cast will include well-known CBC radio actors.

**RHYTHM AND ROMANCE (7:45 p.m.)**

Parks and Burdett, duo-pianists, and Gwen Bradshaw, vocalist. Gwen sings: "More and More"; "Don't You Know I Care?"; and "I'll Be Seeing You." The pianos play: "Serenade for a Wealthy Widow"; "There's a Lady Down South"; and "This Can't Be Love."

**NIGHT MUSIC (10:00 p.m.)**

Henry Carey, who died in 1743, wrote both words and music of the charming song "Sally In Our Alley," but his music was forgotten about 1790, when the tune of an English folk-song, "What Though I Am But A Country Lass," was substituted. This is the tune we sing today. Marius Benoist and the string orchestra will play it tonight, in a modern arrangement by Frank Bridge. Other numbers on tonight's program are: "Prelude from String Suite" (McEwan); "Sarabande and Allegro" (Senaille); "Consolation" (Mendelssohn); "Humoresque and Longing" (Tschaikovsky); "Sarabande (Saint-Saens) and "Melody in F from Orpheus" (Gluck).

**AS SEEN FROM SCOTLAND (11:15 p.m.)**

Tonight's speaker is George Blake, Scottish novelist.

*Dinner Table Sabotage.* I don't want to add my voice to what I might call the Dinner Table Sabotage of the CBC. I'm speaking of conversations about the CBC which I've heard when people are casually talking, as they do around the dinner table. There's a good deal of readiness to express the merely negative, rather than the critical opinion. . . . Criticism is a careful, considered opinion, both pro and con.—Arthur L. ### DRAMA (7:00 p.m.)

"He's Married an English Girl," by Alan King, was so well received when presented in this Montreal series last

fall that it has been rescheduled. With so many war brides arriving in Canada, its theme is timely. The play analyses the character of an English girl, gives a description of her environment and tells what she will face in trying to fit all this into her new life in Canada. It helps to smooth out some of the heroine's readjustment problems.

### PAY PARADE (7:30 p.m.) (Dominion)

With announcers Bernard Cowan and Don Sims as hosts, jovial Johnny Perkins and his octette, a winsome girl singer, and a few hundred servicemen with their dancing partners, merriment is inevitable in this show from Toronto's active service canteen. A radio quiz game with cash prizes is added. Contestants in the Pay Parade quiz choose questions worth a full day's pay for some particular rank in the services, and if they answer correctly, win cash. Those who miss their quiz questions are given a second opportunity on the "bombshell" question at the end of the program. "Tiny" Perkins' 300 pounds of good humor adds weight to piano and orchestration. On April 26, Johnny leads in "Way Down Yonder in New Orleans," "Tin Roof Blues," and "Singing the Blues." Carrying the indigo color scheme through, vocalist Georgia Day will spotlight "Mean To Me," finishing on a happy note with "I'm Beginning to See the Light." Pay Parade alternates on the CBC Dominion network with the discussion broadcasts in "Servicemen's Forum," which originates in service camps across the nation.

### VOICE OF VICTOR (7:30 p.m.)

Excerpts from Noel Coward's "Bitter Sweet" will be heard tonight. Soprano Evelyn Gould, home from studies in Philadelphia for the semi-final contests in "Singing Stars of Tomorrow," will be the guest artist. She will be heard also in the ensemble, "I'm Beginning to See the Light," and "Love Walked In," and with the orchestra in the lively "Villanelle." William Morton, tenor will join Miss Gould in the choral and orchestral ensembles. The drama for this week is "Homesick Boy," a musical portrait of Stephen Foster's life and work by Lucille Kallen. The orchestra under Morris Surdin, will be heard prominently in the play production.

### DRAMA (10:00 p.m.)

The Winnipeg drama tonight is The Obstacle, by Edgar D. Smith of Calgary. To many people, the lady who gives the "advice to the lover-lorn" is something of a joke, but Marion Engel, in Edgar Smith's play, is one who takes herself and her work seriously, and offers her advice from the bottom of a stricken heart. This is the story of a famous surgeon, who makes a difficult choice in working for the happiness of his only daughter. His skill saves the daughter's rival and wrecks her chance of happiness, but his choice is right.

## The Prairie Gardener

Summary of Broadcast for April 15, 1945.

### Trees and Shrubs for Different Uses.

1. *Planting trees and shrubs* is a major operation and should be planned for permanent results. Mistakes and failures are costly so the problem should be approached cautiously.

2. *Visits to the plantations* of other gardeners, public parks, Experimental Farms, Forestry Stations, and local nurseries are among the best ways to get workable ideas and information.

3. *Trees for shade and street planting:* (a) American Elm—one of the best. In dry districts requires watering. In windy districts needs pruning to form a denser head with smaller more numerous branches. (b) Green Ash—upright and sturdy. It does well in heavy soil. It won't stand drought in light soil. (c) Manitoba Maple—better for shelterbelts than as an individual tree. Tends to produce a multiple trunk with crooked branches. (d) Soft Maples can be grown in some districts. It requires plenty of moisture. (e) Various poplars are useful for quick effects but as most of them are short-lived they should be alternated with more permanent trees such as elm and ash.

4. *Ornamental trees for groups and lawn specimens:* (a) Mountain Ash—the European variety in common use is subject to sun-scald. The Rocky Mountain variety is better in this respect. (b) Paper Birch—likes a cool moist well drained soil. Doesn't do well in hot exposed alkaline locations. (c) Spruce—Blue Spruce grown from seed vary in colour and quality. Koster's Blue Spruce is propagated by grafting but not available at present.

5. *Fruit trees* make fine ornamentals. They provide good foliage, give a generous display of bloom and are fairly rapid growers. Siberian Crab-apples, Manchurian Pears, and Manitoba Plums are useful for this purpose.

6. *Butternuts and walnuts* are being successfully grown in some districts. They require plenty of moisture.

6. *Shrubs:* (a) Bush Honeysuckles are very hardy. Available in wide range of varieties. (b) Lilacs—many new hybrids on the market. Selection of old and new types will give long blooming season. (c) Spireas—Van Houttei not hardy in all districts. Varieties introduced from Asia provide greater hardiness. (d) Many native shrubs make good ornamentals under cultivation. These include High Bush Cranberry, Buffalo Berry and Dogwood. (e) Roses for shrub-beries should be the very hard shrubbery types such as Hausa and Dr. Merkle.

7. *Vines:* Virginia Creeper, Wild Hops, Western Virgins bower, Chinese Clematis, Manitoba Wild Grape.
