## Set Out Rules For Election Broadcasts

Available and non-available facilities and definitions announced by CBC

Broadcasting in the Federal Election Campaign, begun on May 4, continues this week and in subsequent weeks until Friday June 8, three days before the general election on June 11.

For the information of broadcasters, speakers and agencies, the CBC has set out certain guiding principles and policies for the campaign. Briefly summarized, they are as follows:

### (1) Available Facilities

(a) Free network time on the CBC Trans-Canada, Dominion and French Networks for political broadcasts by qualifying parties. All periods in CBC reserved time on stations of these networks. In addition, broadcasts are being offered on a series basis to a list of stations not basic on these networks, with the exception that not more than one station in a community will carry the series.

(b) Provincial subsidiary hookups of privately-owned stations on a commercial basis. These hookups must be confined to the boundaries of the provinces in which they originate, except in cases where outside stations are essential to complete coverage in that province.

(c) Individual privately-owned stations on a commercial basis.

### (2) Facilities Not Available

(a) The CBC's Trans-Canada, Dominion, and French Networks will not be available for purchase at any time, and the only political broadcasts which will be carried on these networks will be those referred to in (1) (a).

(b) CBC-owned stations will not be available for purchase, either individually or as member stations of subsidiary hookups.

(c) Regional (covering more than one province) or national subsidiary hookups will not be available for purchase.

(d) Privately-owned basic stations of the three CBC networks will not be available for purchase during periods reserved on them by the CBC for the broadcasting of network sustaining or commercial programs.

## Canada and U.S. Join To Tell Germans Facts

Montreal—A new campaign to get the truth about Allied military advances to the German people by both Canadian and American short-wave radio stations, is the latest example of United Nations unity. The facilities of the new CBC International Service have been placed at the disposal of the United States Office of War Information to drive the true facts of the war home to the Germans.

Newspapers and radio stations inside Germany which have survived the Allied bombardment are not painting the true picture as the Allies advance on all fronts. German soldiers and civilians, when overtaken by advancing armies, exhibit a pitiful lack of comprehension regarding the speed and extent of the allied drives. For this reason, the CBC volunteered to add O.W.I. German programs to those already being carried on the voice of Canada which is reported to be the strongest signal heard in Germany from North America.

The co-operation of the Canadian and American radio services in this way practically blankets the German air with the facts of the war. Two 50 kilowatt transmitters located at Sackville, N.B., are employed: station CHTA, 15.22 megacycles or 19.71 metres (during the day until 19.30 hours GMT or 2:30 p.m. CDT) and station CKXA, 11.705 megacycles or 25.63 metres (from 20.15 to 21.45 hours GMT or 3:15 to 4:45 p.m. CDT).

All broadcasts short-waved from United States and Canada are being interrupted during the day with special announcements in German. The CBC International Service has extended its hours of operation and now relays three periods daily in German, from the regular German O.W.I. broadcasts in New York, at 14.00 to 15.30 hours GMT (9 to 10:30 a.m. CDT), 20.15 to 21.00 hours GMT (3.15 to 4.00 p.m. CDT) and 21.15 to 21.45 hours GMT (4.15 to 4.45 p.m. CDT). In addition, a special Canadian presentation from Montreal in German is beamed to Germany at 21:00 to 21:15 hours GMT (4 to 4:15 CDT).

### OUR SPECIAL SPEAKER (7:45 p.m.)

## Plain Speech

From a small town in Saskatchewan recently came a letter to Dr. S. R. Laycock of Saskatchewan University, after one of his CBC talks. Dr. Laycock was impressed by the letter. An extract is given here, as written:

"I often wonder why our radio commentators and lecturers do not speak plainer words; people like to read and hear things that are easy to comprehend. They don't want to sit reading or listening by the radio with a dictionary in their hands, some may not even possess one. No wonder some of our youth and even adults prefer trashy stories on the radio and in books, because they are written and spoken in plain language.

"I had charge of the public library for a while, from this I know that people always looked for books written in a basic manner, perhaps this may not hold true in our cities, where people have opportunities of better education. . . .

"Adults can't go back to school and start all over again where they left off, they must find other ways and means, and those ways and means must be within the reach of grasping, such as your lecture can help a great deal if copies were distributed to study groups."

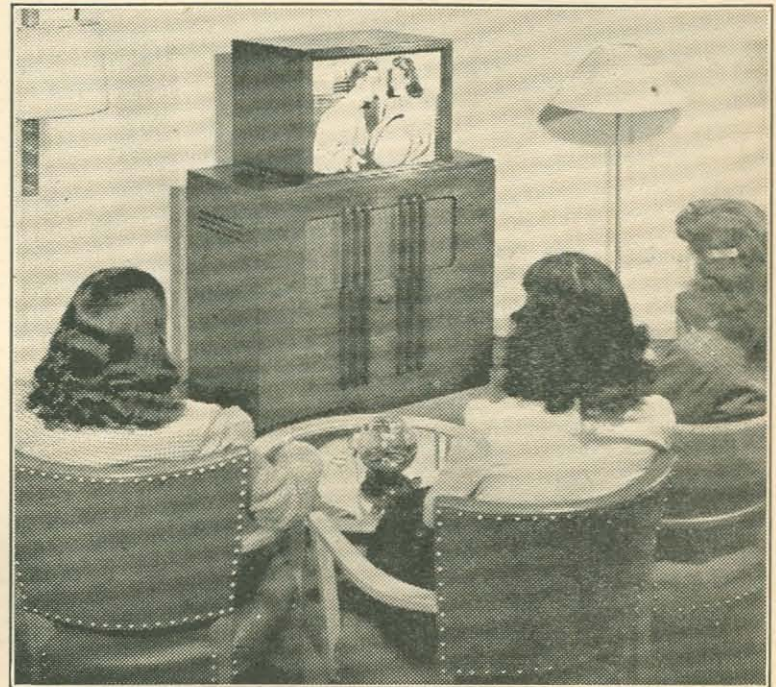

### The Prairie Gardener

Summary of Broadcast, April 29, 1945.

#### Early work in the Victory Vegetable Garden:

1. Site and Soil: In many cases the gardener has to use the site he has in his backyard. If the site can't be chosen to suit the crops he wants to grow then he should try to grow crops suited to the site. The same thing applies to the soil. However soil can be modified. Sand, peat and manure will make a clay soil loamy while heavy soil and manure added to sandy soil will give it better body.

2. Preparation of the Soil: Fall ploughing isn't practised as much as desirable. There are some soils that are better spring ploughed but this isn't general. Most gardens need well rotted manure added. This is better ploughed in the fall. If added in the spring the land should be firmed after ploughing with a packer or plank float as otherwise the soil's left too loose. A firm seed bed is needed to hold moisture and give good germination. On heavy moist land of course packing isn't necessary as a rule.

3. Fertilizers: The best all round fertilizer is well rotted cow manure. Where this isn't available commercial fertilizers may be necessary. The three things needed are nitrogen, phosphorus and potash. Nitrogen encourages strong growth of dark green foliage and is good for leaf crops like lettuce. Phosphates stimulate growth and hasten maturity. They're particularly good for fruit and seed crops. Potash helps in starch and sugar making. It also affects flavour. It's needed by celery, cabbage, beets and potatoes.

Most prairie garden soils have enough potash. Ammonium phosphate supplies nitrogen and phosphates. It hastens germination and crop maturity. Four ounces to fifty feet of row seeded about three-quarters of an inch from the seed gives good results. This applies in black prairie soil districts. On bush soils a complete fertilizer should be used. Consult the nearest Dominion Experimental Station for detailed advice.

4. Seeding: In farm gardens with long rows a wheel hoe with seeder attachment is a great labour saver. A wheel hoe can be made in a farm workshop. When seeding has to be done by hand the main points are to seed in firm bed, in moisture, and not to cover too heavily. Fine seeds shouldn't be covered deeper than half an inch. Distance apart of rows and rate of seeding depends on the kinds of crops, the nature of the soil and the amount of moisture for the crop. The lighter the soil or the drier the district the wider the spacing needed.

5. Cultivation: Early cultivation to kill weeds in the seedling stage saves work and moisture. Weed seedlings while small can be destroyed by raking the soil at frequent intervals.

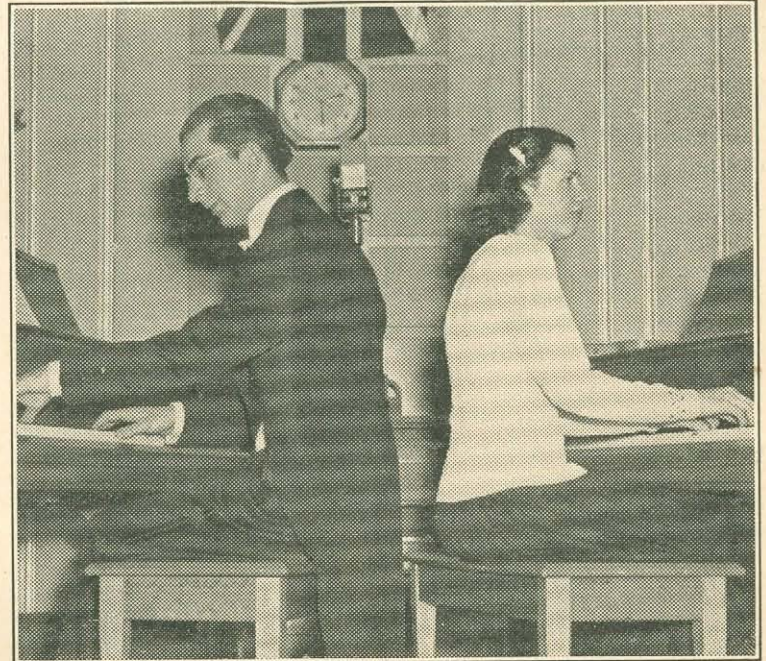

## Good Lighting

Electric lights are your first thought, I know, but we must face the fact that there are hundreds of farm homes in western Canada that do not have, and may never have, electric lights. No matter what kind of lights you have in your home, there are some fundamental facts about "good lighting" which I think you should consider if your house is to be lighted properly.

First, the absence of glare is very important;

Second, it is necessary that the light be of good quality;

Third, the light should be properly placed;

And fourth, there should be plenty of light.

If that glare or sharp brightness is to be prevented, the lights should be shaded. The bulbs of electric lights, the flames of both kerosene and gasoline lamps should not be exposed beneath the edge of the shade.

The quality of lighting is just as important as the amount of light. The best quality is soft and mellow. For example, an unfrosted electric bulb and a gasoline lamp both give a bright glaring light which must be diffused by a frosted bulb or a shade. The lining of the shade should be white or light in color to reflect as much light as possible. Open top shades will provide more reflection on upper walls and ceilings.

When considering the proper placement of lamps, both the angle and the height of the light should be watched for good lighting effect. The light should fall upon your work, rather than on your head or body. Thus all lamps should be placed to one side, and not directly in front of or behind you. There should be a lamp placed beside every spot where mother sews, or father reads, or where the children do their homework.—R. P. Frey, on CBC, Feb. 21.

**The Hydraulic Ram**

The hydraulic ram, a simple but efficient and effective pumping system that can be used wherever there is a flow of water from a spring, well or river, offers unlimited labor saving, and at the same time, all the comforts of a modern city home, including running water, bath and toilet.

The hydraulic ram is a small pear-shaped steel casting about as big around at the top as a soccer football. Inside is a valve and valve leather, as in an ordinary well pump, and that's all. The dome above it is filled with air, and it is the pressure of this air on the water flowing in that starts the ram working, and keeps it pumping water night and day, without stopping, and without requiring any attention. The only energy needed to keep it working is water, or hydraulic energy, and this can be obtained from a flowing well with a flow of as little as two gallons of water a minute. To measure the flow, let the water flow into a two-gallon pail. If it fills in less than two minutes, there is enough potential water energy to operate a hydraulic ram, and get out of the water-carrying chores forever.

Most heavy hardware and machinery supply houses stock these rams, or can order one for you on six weeks' notice. Prices range from \$35 for the smallest type, with a half-inch discharge pipe, to about \$50-\$60 for the largest one, with an inch-and-a-quarter discharge pipe. There are other, more expensive types of rams on the market, prices upwards from \$115, but the \$35 ram will do the same job.

If you have a fall or flow of water on your farm, then simply by installing a ram, you can have this water pumped to any part of the farmyard, including the upstairs of the home, or to a water tank in the barn loft. This latter could be used as a gravity water supply and is a very effective time and labour saver on a dairy farm. A hydraulic ram can lift the water 150 feet above the source of supply, and by lifting the water to a raised supply tank, or to the top of a house, you can develop a water pressure heavy enough to operate a pressure water system in the home, including a bath and flush toilet. Farmers who are fortunate enough to have a flowing well, spring or river nearby would do well to investigate the possibilities and potentialities of the hydraulic ram.

To further acquaint prairie farmers with its possibilities, Peter Whittall, CBC Prairie Farm Broadcast commentator, has recorded a special interview on "Hydraulic Rams For Farm Use," with L. M. Kilmister, the Farm Broadcast Mechanic, and this will be featured on the Farm Broadcast of Thursday, May 10th, (1:30 p.m.)—CBC Farm Broadcast, May 10.

**SET OUT RULES—Concluded**
