CBC Winnipeg Launching Ambitious New Music-Drama Series

"Once Upon a Time," by Ray Darby, Scheduled on Trans-Canada June 3rd

Esse Ljungh Will Produce Thirteen Dramatic Fantasias, With Original Music by Roy Locksley, as Summer Feature From Winnipeg

"ONE of our biggest undertakings, which will strain our musical and dramatic resources to the limit," is Esse Ljungh's comment on his new series, "Once Upon a Time," beginning on CBC's Trans-Canada network Sunday, June 3, at 5:00 p.m. from Winnipeg.

Ljungh, as Prairie Region drama producer; Roy Locksley, as conductor; and Ray Darby, as author, are combining their talents in this ambitious series, which will run for thirteen summer weeks. They will use large dramatic casts, a concert orchestra specializing in novel effects, and male and mixed choruses.

Original Work

Author, conductor, and producer are aiming at originality in all phases of this work. The stories are original products of Darby's pen, Locksley is writing original music for them, and the production methods and effects Ljungh will use are new and striking. The opening program, Sunday,

June 3, is a repeat of Darby's successful play "Peter and the Bugs," done on CBC's Trans-Canada network on Christmas Day, 1944. The success of this program led author and producer to plan a complete series along similar lines. "Peter

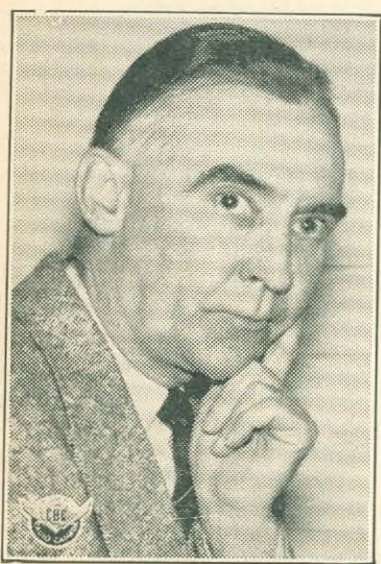
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Three Masqueters

Veteran Winnipeg Actors in Drama-Fantasy Opener

In the opening play of Ray Darby's new fantastic drama series "Once Upon A Time" (CBC Trans-Canada Network, Sunday, June 3rd, 5:00 p.m.) two veterans actors of Winnipeg will add another odd touch to their long records of varying roles.

George Waight, stalwart Winnipeg banker, athlete, and painter of charming water colours, made his most remarkable Winnipeg hit in a command performance of "Othello" before the Earl and Countess of Bessborough. George was known as a "natural" Othello. His massive physique, and swarthy-handsome features made the role inevitably his when John Craig produced the play with a Winnipeg cast in the far-off thirties. His role in the repeat of "Peter Smith and the Bugs," first in the "Once Upon A Time" series, is a

far cry from Shakespeare's tragic hero. He plays the Spider, a whimsical personage with a heart of gold and a tendency to humorous quirks of character.

George Secord, who will play the Beetle in "Peter Smith," wishes he had a dollar for every time he has said "Aha! me proud beauty!" on the repertory stage. George has played stock in a hundred towns and cities of Canada and the United States. He is the dean of Winnipeg's radio-acting fraternity, and is heard from CBC Winnipeg in the Thursday dramas, the Farm Broadcast, and many other programs.

Complete Election Service on June 11

CBC will provide half-hourly bulletins by regions as polls close

Toronto. — Canadian listeners, in every part of the Dominion, will be given a complete service of election bulletins, special commentaries, and election features on the evening of June 11, Federal Election day. Instead of its usual programs on both the Trans-Canada and Dominion networks, the CBC is offering the most comprehensive election coverage ever broadcast in this country.

This special election bulletin service will start as soon as the polls close at 6:00 p.m. in each different time zone across Canada—with the one exception of the Maritime Provinces, where the bulletins will start at 6:30 p.m. (Atlantic Daylight Time). There will be a five-minute election bulletin every half hour, prepared in the CBC's Central Newsroom, Toronto, which will give a compact summary of results across the whole country with the standing of the different parties. Following these general bulletins, local radio stations taking the CBC election service can cut in with additional bulletins giving provincial and local results in greater detail. In addition to the bulletins, the CBC is providing a number of special election features, including interpretive comment by Blair Fraser, Ottawa editor of Maclean's Magazine and well-known writer on Canadian affairs. In the intervals between bulletins and features, the CBC studios in Toronto and Montreal will provide musical programs.

The election service will run until midnight, or later if final results are not known by that time. After midnight, Eastern Daylight Time, the CBC Vancouver Newsroom will take over the responsibility of providing bulletins to the network.

In addition to the special election bulletins, all regular CBC news bulletins will, as far as possible, be carried at their usual times and will include up-to-the-minute election summaries.

Chief Radio Censor Is Winnipeg Visitor

A visitor to CBC's Winnipeg studios last week was Mr. Charles Shearer, Ottawa, chief radio censor for Canada, who is in Winnipeg to act in an advisory capacity with regard to radio censorship during the federal election.

Mr. Shearer had many interesting stories to tell of experiences in the censor bureau during the war.

"There have been very few instances indeed," he said, "in which censorship has had to step in with regard to radio broadcasting. In fact, radio censorship has been voluntary almost throughout the war, and we have left the responsibility for checking scripts almost wholly with the stations and network, which, however, have always been able to refer questionable material to us."

Mail Bag

Appreciation

This is one of the largest and most sparsely scattered municipalities in Saskatchewan, and so probably one of the places where the radio is most valued in the whole Dominion of Canada. We have just returned from our local V-E Day celebrations in the Community Hall of the only small village in some 540 square miles, where a gathering of 46 children and a hundred adults is a very large turnout. Personally, if I did not have a radio in my car, I should have found it difficult to tear myself away from the one in the house long enough to take my part in our community family gathering. I have been secretary here for some twenty-seven years, and the ratepayers are like a larger family to me, and I have a pretty clear conception of their feelings. I am quite sure that in expressing my own feelings I am expressing those of every home which has a radio, and I know of very few which have not. It is the general opinion that today's program has been the very best we have ever heard; in these thinly populated districts it has probably given more pleasure than anything else. To those of us—and over a hundred boys and girls who were born and brought up in this municipality are in the active services and nearly seventy overseas—to those of us, who have members of the family on what were so recently the fighting fronts, it has enabled us to feel we were celebrating with them. In one descriptive talk mention was made of the way the Canadian Wrens near Glasgow were parading and celebrating, and I saw my own girl marching along the streets of the homeland. We, too, could take our part in the salute to His Majesty, and stand at attention as we listened to his address to his people. . . . And while we are having our public holiday, and sitting comfortably by the fire listening to the great of the Empire, there must be hundreds of artists, technicians, announcers, and others, conducting this CBC program, who are possibly working harder than usual today that we may enjoy V-E Day to the full. I feel I would wish in some way to convey to these people—and am equally sure I am expressing the desire of my people here — our very grateful thanks for all the joy and pleasure they have given us. . . . On behalf of the pioneer farmers of R. M. Mantario 262, we thank you. And if this small expression of gratitude of a community for the great day of radio you have given us should be of interest elsewhere in the CBC, perhaps you would be kind enough to convey our feelings to the proper quarters.—C. 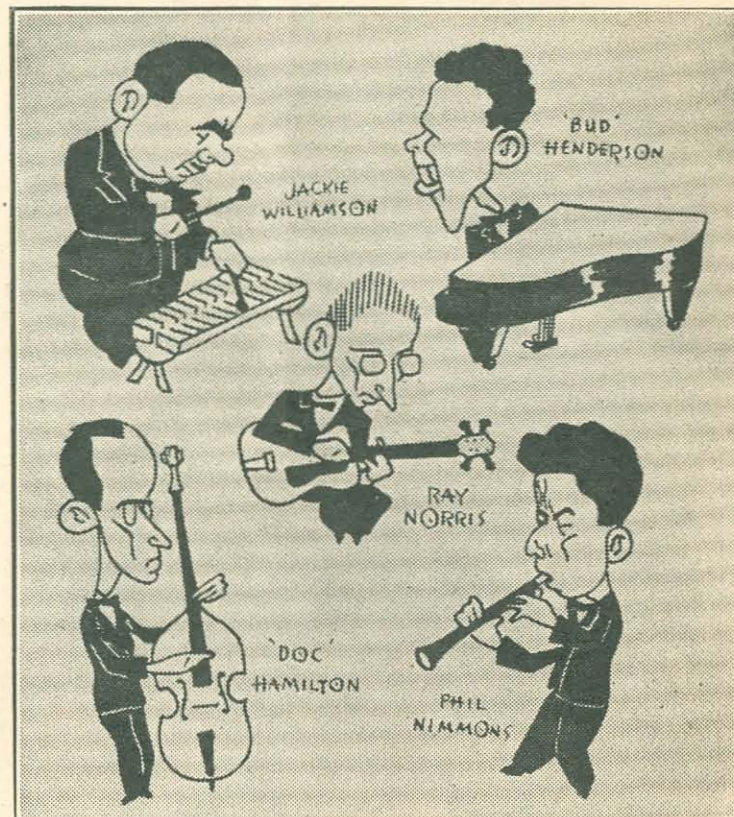

But if it lacks all these things, it does not lack men. These, Japan has in abundance; and it has ample resources to equip them with rifles and machine guns, mortars and artillery. So long as the Japanese soldier is prepared to die for his emperor, warfare against Japan will be long and bloody. . . . They are unbelievably tough. How long will they remain so? The Prairie Gardener

Summary of Broadcast for May 27, 1945.

Some Common Garden Pests

1. *Annual weeds must never be allowed to go to seed.* This means they must be destroyed when young, preferably in the seedling stage. At this time they are easily killed by raking or shallow cultivation.

2. *Purslane* is one annual that must be killed young. Its thick fleshy stems root quickly after hoeing if left lying on the ground. Even if not rooted fleshy pieces contain enough life to mature seed.

3. *A dust mulch* maintained by regular cultivation especially after reach rain or watering is desirable in conserving moisture. Weed seeds in surface soil won't germinate if the soil is kept loose.

4. *Perennial weeds* such as creeping rooted grasses and dandelions must be dug out and destroyed. In gardens this involves considerable hand work but there is no easier method. Once all old roots are destroyed thorough cultivation will keep seedlings from becoming established.

5. *The Beet Webworm* often attacks gardens in an "army" but is incorrectly called "the Army Worm." It is a slender green worm ¼-inch long with black lines and circles for decoration. It feeds on such weeds as pigweed and Russian thistle. Control: Destroy weeds in and near the garden on which it feeds. A furrow ploughed around the garden and baited with weeds fresh cut and dusted with one part Paris Green to fifteen parts dust is recommended when an invasion is threatening.

6. *Cabbage worms* should be kept under control from June to harvest. Dust plants with one part Paris Green to ten parts cheap flour or fine dust. Apply while leaves are moist. Derris Dust should be used instead of Paris Green after plants start heading. Derris is not poisonous to humans.

7. *Potato "bugs"* (Colorado Potato Beetle): Use an arsenical dust such as Paris Green mixed with flour or dust.

8. *Blister Beetles*: attack caragana, beans, potatoes, etc. Length up to three quarters of an inch. Colors: grey, black or metallic blue. Dust affected plants with Paris Green using same mixture as for Potato Bugs.

9. *Aphids* attacking garden plants may be held in check by means of Nicotine Sulphate Dust, but this is a contact poison and must actually hit the insect. Recipe: Shake together in a tight container two teaspoonfuls of nicotine sulphate and three ounces of hydrated lime. Use while fresh mixed.

10. *Tent Caterpillars* on currants and gooseberries may be dusted with Derris Powder.

11. For information on insect pests consult the nearest Dominion Entomological Laboratory.

Sees Human Crisis Facing Delegates

(DR. MALCOLM WALLACE, on CBC Citizen's Forum)

We are facing a unique crisis in the human story. That is the opinion of the ablest statesmen, scientists and soldiers of all nations. During the last five years, no one has dared to feel confident that civilization would not perish. Millions of young men, the flower of mankind, have been killed, and more millions of old men, women and children have died of hunger and exposure. . . . Great numbers of European cities have been reduced to rubble. Are men incapable of coping with this nightmare which promises to become more and more terrible? Here is the deliberate judgment of Major Eliot, one of the outstanding military authorities of the United States: "The latest types of weapons," he says, "the robot bomb, the rocket, the jet-propelled airplane, are, fortunately, coming into extensive use only as the war comes to a close."

If the collective intelligence of mankind is unequal to the task of preventing another war, these weapons and others even more terrible will be used in perfected form at the outset, perhaps with instantly decisive effect. If collective intelligence cannot find ways to control the terrible instruments which individual minds have brought and will bring into being, the human race and all its works will be destroyed in blood and fire."

This is the problem to deal with which the San Francisco Conference was summoned and we may well doubt whether human intelligence and imagination are capable of coping with such things. It is well that we should have clearly in mind the purpose for which the conference is called. It is *not* to determine the peace terms to be offered Germany and Japan. It is *not* to determine national boundaries in Finland, Poland or South-Eastern Europe. These matters will be settled by the Allies after the "unconditional surrender" of their enemies. The San Francisco Conference will *not* undertake to set up a complete system of world-government. It will have one single object in mind—to set up machinery calculated to prevent the outbreak of another world-war.
