Noxon Presenting New "World" Series

CBC listeners may follow Gerald Noxon through the door into the Department of External Affairs, and learn something of how Canada conducts her diplomatic relations with other countries, by listening to the new broadcast series "The World and Ourselves." This is a weekly presentation heard Fridays at 9:15 p.m. over the CBC Trans-Canada network.

On Friday, June 20, Mr. Noxon will introduce the speakers for the second program. The Canadian Ambassador to France, Major General Georges P. Vanier, will describe the duties and responsibilities of a Canadian Ambassador to the country to which he is accredited. An explanation of the organization, both at home and abroad, of Canada's Department of External Affairs will be given by one of its members, and the story of the department's origin and development will be told by Gordon Skilling, supervisor of the central European section, CBC International Service.

This is the second occasion on which Gerald Noxon has undertaken a broadcast series devoted to a description of Canada's growing im-

The next show—"The Lead Soldier and the Dresden Doll" (Sunday, July 15)—introduces stuffed tigers and giraffes, as well as other nursery land folk.

Long Live Regional Broadcasting!

(By L. A. G. Strong, in BBC Year Book, 1945)

It is a fact of human nature that, the smaller the social unit, the more violent is apt to be its sense of partisanship. The inhabitants of a town commonly feel more solidarity than those of a nation. A village cricket match will rouse more interecine loyalties than are usual in the supporters of a county team. A family, however divided within itself, closes fiercely against the outsider. This characteristic alone puts a strong case for the local broadcasting sta-

tion, as for the local newspaper.

But regional broadcasting is based on a wider foundation than any human foible, however deeply engrained or endearing. It does more than encourage local *amour propre*. Its value is, broadly, to provide a platform for the various kinds of British life; to give expression to those diverse individualities of thought and speech which make up the national character. Such expression has a two-fold if not a three-fold function. It satisfies each

CBC News Service Revises Programs

Current affairs commentaries on CBC networks will in future be separated from news bulletins and news programs, according to a CBC announcement just issued. Instead, additional periods for discussion of current affairs are planned, in which panels of authoritative speakers will discuss international developments from a variety of viewpoints.

During the war in Europe, commentators dealt primarily with war news. Today, much of the international news is controversial in nature, and capable of interpretation from more than one viewpoint. In order to encourage full freedom of discussion, it is felt that a well-balanced panel of commentators on current affairs is preferable to a single commentator associated with news programs as a daily feature.

CBC News Roundup, formerly heard Monday to Friday, 6:45 to 7:00 p.m., on the CBC Trans-Canada Network, was discontinued for the summer on July 13. It will start again in the fall, when it will be basically reportorial in character.

Plans are now being discussed for a new current affairs program on the CBC Trans-Canada network to be broadcast in the middle of the week. It will be similar to the present Sunday night Week-End Review, and the commentators will likely include those heard on the programs that are being dropped.

New plans are also being made for revision of news programs on the CBC Pacific and Mountain networks, to replace the present commentary at 12:10 a.m., but final details have not yet been completed.

region by supplying it with broadcasts of local as well as national interest (and, incidentally, by giving the local broadcaster a chance). It gives listeners an opportunity of learning about those who live in other parts of the country. . . . Local patriotism has its inverse side, which includes the privilege of ferocious grumbling: those who most scathingly aspersed their regional station would have been furious at any suggestion to abolish it.

The value of diversity in broadcasting cannot be exaggerated. A civilization which tends toward mass-production and uniformity needs the corrective of individual views and

In "The Little Lead Soldier and the Dresden Doll," Ray Darby has written a new story for a favorite setting of fantasy—midnight in the nursery, when the toys come to life and carry on their own intriguing affairs. The Dresden doll—prettiest of all the dainty ladies of the toy shelf—is as exacting as she is beautiful; she demands that her lover, the lead soldier, bring her the tail of the fierce tiger that roams the forest rug; she sighs for the blue wool flower that blooms impossibly high on the steep mountain of the cushion; she asks for a handful of stars. After risking his life to bring her all this tribute, the lead soldier—like many another man before him—discovers that the way to please his love is something quite different. Amusing songs for which Roy Locksley has written special music are a feature of the story. Production is by Esse W. Ljungh. "Once Upon A Time" originates in Winnipeg.

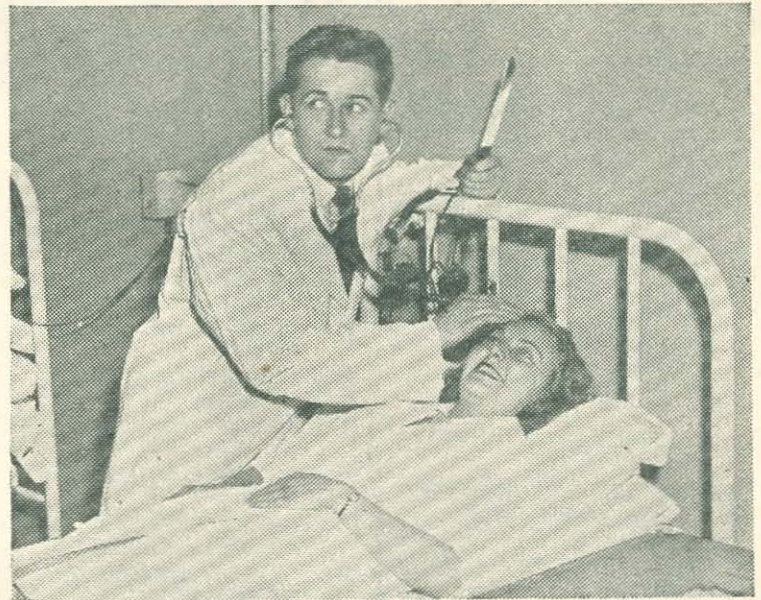
MORNING DEVOTIONS (9:45 a.m.)

When the curtain rings up at the CBC studios tonight the scene will have shifted from last week's glimpse of the Whiffletrees to the "Hometown" boarding house, where Brian Ashley, a newly arrived painter, (Hedley Rainnie), runs into a proper tempest when he tries to engage Joan Evans as his model (played by Alice Hill). The traditional clash between the world of art and the world of small town provincialism reaches a climax with Mrs. Grundy right in the middle of it all. But a happy denouement follows, as it does in all comedy dramas. Mrs. Grundy has the breeze taken right out of her calico sails when she finds the artist and the model flanked by a chaperone of infinite tact and flawless reputation. Bernard Braden, who has studied and experimented in radio playwriting while gaining a reputation as one of CBC's top radio actors, had several excellent scripts to his credit prior to the premiere of "Hometown." In this series he is swinging his spotlight to pick up the characters and incidents which are so often left out of focus in this era of stars. Every character of "Hometown" will have his turn at stardom sometime during the run of the series.

ways of life expressed in individual voices.

On the practical side, there are one or two points to be borne in mind if regional broadcasting is to live up to its responsibilities in the years that lie ahead. First of all, its standards must be kept high. That the performers are local should be no excuse for poor work. A bad baritone, an indifferent talk, a rough and ready orchestra should not be allowed on the air in order that local listening time be filled and fees go into local pockets. Also—an important corollary—local discoveries should not be restricted to their own wavelength. The best talent should be available to the biggest possible audience.

I am not sure that this isn't the whole strength of regional broadcasting, that it doesn't try to please too many people at once; the polite sin, the fatal sin, the worst of all the sins that broadcasting or any other form of entertainment or publication can commit; the sin to which those are most easily tempted whose audience is the largest; the sin which tells us at once that the broadcast lacks the courage of its convictions, because it hasn't any convictions.

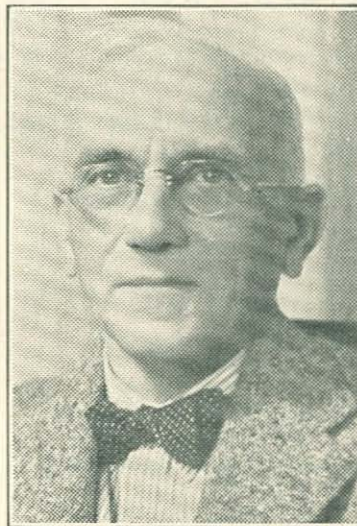

New Canadian Artist In Recitals on CBC

A young European artist, who has acquired a Stradivarius violin on indefinite loan and his Canadian naturalization papers for permanent possession, will be introduced to CBC listeners this week in the first of a series of four violin recitals. He is Gerhard Kander, now of Toronto, whose opening concert will be broadcast over the Trans-Canada network on Tuesday, July 17, at 8:00 p.m.

Currently studying with the great Canadian violinist, Kathleen Parlow, the 23-year-old Kander is a former pupil of Carl Flesch and Adolf Busch. He began his professional career at the age of 15, in Berlin, in association with Emmanuel Feuermann, and the Metropolitan basso, Alexander Kipnis. Since leaving Germany in 1938, Kander has been re-establishing his life in England and Canada in preparation for a concert career in the New World.

In his CBC recitals, the young violinist will be heard playing his prized Stradivarius. The Strad will go with him this Fall to fulfill solo engagements with Pierre Monteux and the San Francisco Symphony Orchestra, with the Minneapolis Symphony under Dimitri Mitropoulos, and with Reginald Stewart and the Baltimore Symphony, on the occasion of this orchestra's visit to Montreal and Quebec.

A distinguished Canadian, whose witty book reviews are equally popular with the miners and trappers of the northwest as they are with academic men, returns this week to the CBC's popular weekly series, "Books For The Times."

Johnny's Home, But Complications Go On

Two war veterans plunge headlong into a postwar battle of war nerves in the second broadcast of "The Johnny Home Show" to be heard on Friday, July 20, at 8:30 p.m., over the CBC Trans-Canada network. Launched last week for Canada's coast to coast audience, the comedy variety tells a serial story of Johnny Home and his pal, Sam Lightfoot, and the antics they go through in the process of moving into the civilian parade.

The first episode caught Johnny at that happy, apprehensive moment, of coming up for discharge. Now, installed in a new civilian suit, Johnny finds he isn't a civilian yet. The way is barred by an indulgent family who are prepared for anything, and even worse.

The role of Johnny Home is played by happy-go-lucky Jack Fuller, versatile star of radio quiz, variety, and broadcast drama. Bud Knapp is at his side as veteran pal, Sam Lightfoot. Well-known stars of Canadian radio are featured in the supporting cast, notably the versatile Al Pearce, pretty Peggy Loder, dramatic star Alice Hill, and others.

The show is written by Sergeants Frank Shuster and Johnny Wayne, who attracted attention far beyond academic circles when they began writing the music and dialogue for the University of Toronto "Follies" back in 1936. They are now just back from overseas where they have been entertaining troops as writers and comedians for the past three years.

The orchestra on "The Johnny Home Show" is conducted by Samuel Hersenhoren, and Jack Allison directs the "Swing Platoon" vocal ensemble.

Dutch, Czech Messages Shortwaved to Europe

Montreal.—As a service to people in Canada who are anxious to locate Dutch and Czech relatives or friends in Europe, the International Service of the CBC, in co-operation with the Canadian Red Cross, will commence the transmission of personal messages by short-wave to Czechoslovakia and the Netherlands. The messages will be included in the regular Czech and Dutch programs which are already being broadcast from the International Service transmitters. Messages will be limited to 50 words and must be submitted on forms obtained at local Red Cross Societies. Contents are to be of a purely personal nature and will be forwarded by the local Red Cross representatives to the head offices of the society in Ottawa. No charge is made for this service.

The Prairie Gardener

Summary of Broadcast of July 8, 1945.

Summer Gardening Hints:

1. *Cultivation* to keep the surface soil from baking and to eliminate all weeds is essential. Check flower and vegetable rows for weed seedlings hiding under the foliage.

2. *Stop cultivation* around fruit trees now in order to encourage new growth to harden off early in the fall but don't let any weeds go to seed.

3. *Check grafted plants* such as fruit trees, French lilacs, roses, etc., for sucker growth. All growth from below the graft should be pruned out. If plants are grown on their own roots this isn't necessary.

4. *Keep flower stalks removed from rhubarb* plants as going to seed exhausts the food storage in the roots.

5. *Remove withered flowers* from perennials such as iris, peonies, and delphinium so that all strength goes into preparing for next year's flowers rather than into seed formation.

6. *Disbud dahlias, marigolds, zinnias* and other plants if you want extra large flowers.

7. *Prune tomatoes to limit fruit* to three or four trusses.

8. *Chlorosis* or yellowing of foliage on shrubs and garden plants may be checked or overcome by soaking peat in a 10% solution of iron sulphate and burying it close to the roots.

9. *Pine Leaf Scale* common on spruce as well as pine must be
