Editors Discuss Farm Prospects

(From CBC Summer Fallow Broadcast, August 20, 1945)

In its Monday evening Summer Fallow series on August 20, the CBC presented a symposium of opinion from leading agricultural journalists in Canada. The Prairie Region was represented by J. T. Hull, joint editor of The Western Producer of Saskatoon; H. S. Fry, associate editor of The Country Guide of Winnipeg, and Martha Olson, of The Farm and Ranch Review, Calgary. The summaries of opinion upon "Peacetime Prospects for Canadian Agriculture," as given by these speakers, are presented below:

Hull

What will happen to agriculture in western Canada in the coming years depends more upon what happens in other spheres than that of agriculture, and in places other than western Canada.

We have learned more in the last decade than we ever knew about food and human welfare and the whole world has been aroused to the importance of making food abundant and available to the people of every section of society. We start with the estimate of competent authorities that of the two thousand million people in the world, one thousand million are inadequately fed; that even in advanced countries where the evidence has been collected, a large section of the people cannot afford a diet that modern nutritionists say is required for health, strength and physical well being. And yet it has been estimated that during the great depression, when the distribution of food was governed by market prices, food enough to feed 70 million people was actually destroyed while millions were in want and producers were reduced to poverty.

These are consequences of our economic order which must not be ignored in an effective agricultural policy. It has been amply demonstrated that food in abundance is easily within reach, from the producers' side; it is not easily within reach from the distribution and consumption side. That was unanimously recognized in the decisions of the food and agricultural conference in 1943, and through that conference governments have accepted

the responsibility of insuring adequate production and adequate distribution of food.

As a general proposition however, that production and distribution cannot be assured within our present price economy except on policies, national and international, by which consumption is definitely increased within the prevailing purchasing power of the masses and the income of the producer is not reduced. In plain words, the implementation of the decisions of the Hot Springs Conference demands subsidized prices for consumers and adequate remuneration for producers, and that requires world wide co-operation. Agriculture can easily do its share but production alone will not ensure the well-fed world envisaged by the Hot Springs Conference.

Western agriculture is prepared and equipped to give a full contribution to plans for carrying out recommendations of the Hot Springs Conference and, given the outlets required by those recommendations by national and international policies, it can face the future with confidence. If it has to operate in a com-

South America Gets Regular DX Service

Montreal. - The excellent reports which have been received at CBC International Service headquarters in Montreal concerning reception of the special aviation broadcasts beamed to Latin America have hastened the inauguration of regular broadcasts from Canada, During the meetings of the International Civil Aviation organization in Montreal, test programs have been prepared and transmitted daily. Plans have now been completed for regular weekly broadcasts in Portuguese, Spanish and English directed to listeners in Central and South America and the West Indies. The broadcasts to South America will be heard over station CHOL, 11.72 megacycles or 25.60 metres and those to Central America and the West Indies, on station CHTA, 15.22 megacycles or 19.71 metres. The programs will be heard every Sunday evening from 6:00 to 9:00 p.m. CDT, as follows:-

petitive price economy the outlook is none too good for either producers or consumers.

Fry

What you are really asking me to do is to solve the riddle of the civilized world in two and a half minutes. The problem is so complex that even if a single person knew all the answers, it would require much more than this short time to give them. You ask us what we think, which is immaterial; what we all want to know is what are the prospects. These are problematical.

All human civilization is tied to the land, which highlights the fact that two-thirds of the world's population farm for a living. Canada's economy is basically an export economy; and this is truer of the prairies than of any other part of Canada. This fact, too, brings our farmers daily into competition, whether they fully realize it or not, with farmers all over the world. We have on the prairies 70 per cent of the improved farm land in Canada, with a larger acreage per man and a higher degree of mechanization; which is to say, that we can produce wheat with the best in the world and grow feed for livestock as cheaply. We are nearer the great food-importing countries of the world than any other surplus-producing country; and with high employment in manufacturing and commerce, our home market will provide a more profitable outlet than before the war. With the aid of science, education and irrigation. prairie agriculture can be stabilized and diversified, and the effects of our somewhat vagarious climate somewhat modified.

We can even now produce wheat, barley, oats, seed grain, forage-crop seed, turkeys, eggs, poultry, honey, bacon, hogs and cattle with any other part of Canada and with most other countries.

It is true that we do not always farm our best, but along with farmers elsewhere we have come nearer to it in wartime than ever before, because prices were good and we were geared to win. If a lasting peace is established between nations both economically and politically, and if our domestic economy develops in equity as between agriculture, industry, labor, transportation and finance, I believe that the peacetime prospects for agriculture in the prairie provinces will be very bright.

This belief can be seasoned with faith, hope and charity to suit individual tastes, but one thing I am personally very sure, that only close co-operation and broad sympathy

Jean Beaudet, CBC supervisor of music, is conducting this series, and on this occasion the artists will be Violette Delisle, who will sing the title role; François Brunet, as Gerald; Eugénie Havard, as Mallika; and Lionel Daunais, as Nilakantha. The scene of "Lakmé" is in India, and the plot can be best summed up in Kipling's famous words, "East is East and West is West, and never the twain shall meet." Gerald, an officer in the British Navy, meets Lakmé in a sacred garden. They fall in love. She is the daughter of a Brahman priest who swears vengeance upon the intruder and finally succeeds in stabbing him. Lakmé has the wounded Gerald carried to a hut in a forest, but when her nursing has restored him to health he is persuaded by a fellow officer to return to his duty. Lakmé poisons herself and dies. Delibes' setting of the story is lyrical rather than dramatic. In it he has captured much of the haunting melancholy and enchanting wistfulness of the Orient as well as much of its color. "Lakmé" was produced in 1883, at the Opéra Comique de Paris. The "Bell Song" of the second act is celebrated.

Maple Leafs. A family man now, he has abandoned the sporting career in favour of his tenor voice.

PROM CONCERT (9:15 p.m.)

Portia White, contralto, who has made musical headlines in the United States and Canada during the past two years, will be the Prom Concert's guest soloist this week, with the Toronto Philharmonic Orchestra. Directing the orchestra as guest conductor on this date will be Englishborn Stanley Chapple, making his first appearance before Prom audiences. He has appeared with leading symphonies in Europe and the United States, and was associated with Serge Koussevitsky in the operation of the Berkshire Music Centre from 1939 to 1942, when the war forced the temporary closing of the centre. Mr. Chapple conducts the orchestra in Suite in E Flat, by Gustav Holst; Two Elegiac Melodies, by Grieg; and Brahms' "Academic Festival Overture." Portia White fills a return engagement with her Prom appearance this week. Still in her teens, the Halifax contralto is well known to concert audiences in Canada's major music centres. Her New York debut at Town Hall early last year and a command performance before the Governor-General the Earl of Athlone and Princess Alice, are two of the highlights in her concert career. She will be heard tonight in the aria, "Air de Lia," from the Debussy cantata "I'Enfant Prodigue," and "O Don Fatale" from Verdi's opera "Don Carlos."

No one in Canada was more pleased and thankful to hear last week's great news of the end of the war than the farm housewife. For nearly six years she has put up with all the varied restrictions, shortages, controls and inconveniences that wartime brings to the country, as well as to the city, and now she is very glad that the end of many of these little annoyances is in sight. Most of all she is happy that her son, or perhaps her daughter, is coming home. But in the midst of her happiness she has time for a thought of sorrow and sympathy for the neighbor family who must carry on without the loved one who will not return, and there are many of them. That is the cruel price of war.

The farm wife has worked hard these war years—help has been scarce—until this season crops have been heavy. Ofter she has had to work outdoors. Many a time she has fed the calves and the pigs when the menfolk have worked late in the field. She has raised her chickens and turkeys and tended her garden and she knows that she and her husband have done their bit to feed the hungry world.

Again in spite of shortages, she has kept the children well dressed. Day after day she has put up their lunch and packed them off to school with the hope ever burning in her heart that this day would come; that they would grow up in a world at peace, a world free of strife and sorrow she has seen twice in her lifetime. She has worked hard; now she is hoping that things will be easier, that she will have more time to call her own, more of the things that make life worth living.

Of course she knows she will not have one of those picture-book kitchens in her home all at once. But she does hope for some of the conveniences that industry will provide, now that it has turned from the making of warplanes and shells. Perhaps she can have a power washingmachine, perhaps a water system in the house, perhaps a freezer to keep summer foods for winter meals. All these things and many more are in her plans and her hopes for a better home for her family. Most of all in her hopes and her prayers is a world for them in which there will be no more war

Heard CBC Show in Holland; Now Sees It

Home from the Low Countries and the Italian front, a smiling young Vancouver soldier sat in the CBC's Vancouver studios recently and told how he'd planned this visit when he was thousands of miles away—to come to CBR and see a broadcast of a show which he'd heard often overseas

He is Cpl. Wes Smiley, R.C.O.C. First thing he was down at the studios to meet producer Archie MacCorkindale, ask a million questions about the show, and arrange to see its Monday night airing on the Trans-Atlantic net and by shortwave on the CBC's International Service.

Smiley had served in Sicily, Italy, and in Holland as far as Groningen. He listened on his tank radio to the armed forces network, which featured programs by American, British, and Canadian radio, and decided immediately that this show was his favourite. So at CBR it was arranged for him to meet songstress Juliette, baritone Carlos, and maestro Laurence Wilson.

The Prairie Gardener

Summary of Broadcast of September 9th, 1945

1. The Second Saskatchewan Provincial Fruit Show held in Regina August 29-30 was a real success with just about as many entries as last year despite poorer growing season. Features of the show in addition to many fine competitive entries were the displays of fruit staged by the University of Saskatchewan, the Dominion Experimental Farm, Swift Current, and the Dominion Forestry Stations at Indian Head and Sutherland. Fruit from the Swift Current area captured many prizes and indicated that fruit growing has promising possibilities in southwestern Saskatchewan.

The University display included many promising apple crabs hybrids as well as three varieties of grapes, very good Nanking cherries and an attractive sour cherry seedling of good size and quality.

The Forestry Farms display included excellent Rescue and Piotet apples, Sylvia and many hybrid seedling crabs, and sour Russian cherries.

The Swift Current exhibit played up Rescue, Heyer's No. 12 and No. 20 apples as well as several of the Rosthern Seedlings.

- 2. The Regina Horticultural Show held at the same time and place as the Fruit Show was a good effort for a poor season. Gladioli provided the greatest number of entries and were of good quality.
- 3. Regina, the Queen City of the Plains, with its well treed boulevards, artificial lake and lovely parks and including the extensive lawns and tree plantations on the grounds of the Legislative Building, is an outstanding demonstration of man's ability to build his environment to high standards of beauty even on the open treeless plains.
- 4. The Annual Meeting of the Saskatchewan Horticultural Societies

 Association held in Regina at the same time as the Fruit show elected a woman, Mrs. C. O. Pollock, of Melfort, as its President for 1945-1946. Delegates were present from all sections of the province. Reports indicated a revival of interest in the work of horticultural societies. Plans were made for an extension of activities during the following season.

Epidemic Of Bears

The bear population of these prairie provinces is increasing and spreading until it has become an epidemic. They are stealing pigs, and killing young cattle. Something will have to be done about it. One farmer told me last week that bears and wolves are increasing because so many of the young men have been away to the war. When they get back the animals will know that the war is over. Bears are dangerous and from an account in the Flin Flon Miner I read that an engineer in the Herb Lake area was brought down to hospital by plane for treatment
