## CBC Resumes Normal Broadcasting Hours

Toronto.—Following a 30-minute reduction in broadcast time each day during a lengthy wartime period, the CBC Trans-Canada network has resumed peacetime hours of operation. The Dominion network, which was not in operation when this curtailment went into effect, also increases its hours on the air. CBC networks now sign off at midnight instead of 11:30 p.m. E.S.T.

The reduction of broadcast operations in each time zone across the Dominion helped to lengthen the life of a large amount of equipment, some of which could not have been replaced. Some of the vacuum tubes used in the 50kw stations are water-cooled affairs that cost as much as \$3,000. The earlier network sign-off was put into effect at all but one of the broadcasting stations owned or operated by the CBC. Station CBA, Sackville, N.B. was the exception and operated until midnight during the period of economy.

In reducing its hours of operation, the CBC set an example that was followed widely in the United States. Orders affecting both length of broadcast time and power of transmitters were issued by the Federal Communications Commission in the U.S., long after the practice was established in Canada.

## Business Aided by Public Investment

What will it not take to bring our obsolescent cities and our countryside up to the potentialities of modern science and modern techniques. . . . More and more we are beginning to learn that public investment helps private business.

## 97-Year-Old Listener Appreciates 'Eventide'

One of the most-appreciated letters to be received by producer John Wickham Barnes at the CBC's Vancouver studios was the note from a prairie man who marked his 97th birthday on Sunday last week.

Here are a few quotes from his letter: "I have thought so many times I would write just to let you know how I love to listen to Eventide. You are so far away, yet so near over the radio, that as I listen I feel we are touching somehow soul to soul.

"I am getting up in years, have good health and live with my boys eight miles northeast of Winnipeg. I had a choir in Ontario in 1875, and then in Manitoba for about thirty-five years.

"Please continue giving us our Eventide program, for others enjoy it as I do. God bless you all."

The CBC's Eventide broadcast has been a regular Friday evening feature from Vancouver (9:30 p.m.) since it was inaugurated two and a half years ago. Producer from the beginning has been Mr. Barnes, with readings by E. V. Young and chorus

directed by Dalton Baker, with Sydney Kelland at the organ.

## Announce Rules For Television Stations

Washington.—No person or company may own, operate, or control more than one television station in the same service area or more than five in the United States, under regulations announced by the U.S. Federal Communications Commission last week. Provision was made for television licenses totalling more than 400, with seven each in New York, Chicago, and Los Angeles.

Station identification by both sight and sound is required by the operators, and recordings must be announced as such except when used as background. Stations are required to operate a minimum of 28 hours weekly, and present chain broadcasting regulations apply to the television system.

## Foster Hewitt To Do Sport Series For CBC

Toronto hockey broadcaster begins new Dominion Net. series Dec. 20

An all-round sports program for Canadian troops overseas in the European zones of occupation as well as the repatriation centres of England, is now being broadcast over the CBC International Service. Called Foster Hewitt Reporting, the program features the famous Foster ("He shoots . . . he scores!") Hewitt, assisted by announcer Alan McFee. Already broadcast overseas for several weeks, the program is to be brought to Canadian listeners at home beginning Thursday, December 20, at 7:30 p.m., over the CBC Dominion network.

Foster Hewitt doesn't confine himself to the blade and stick game in his new series, but covers as many summer and winter sports as possible in the various departments into which his program is divided.

Included are reports on the current sports picture in Canada; a topical interview with some sports celebrity; a sports editorial in which Foster rambles at random; a question box period when Hewitt endeavours to answer sports sticklers submitted by listeners; stories from the past — famous sports events that made history, reconstructed complete with sound effects; and a sports calendar bringing listeners news and comments on coming events in the world of sports.

The program is one of several especially instituted by the CBC as entertainment features for the armed forces still overseas.

### CANADIAN YARNS

(11:15 a.m. and 12:15 a.m.)

"The Tree of Dreams" is the second of three stories by Marius Barbeau—to be broadcast in this series. It is the tender story of Hurukay, an old Huron Indian of Lorette who had a dream that came alive, a dream that the image of the Child had been entrusted him as a special messenger to be carried across the valley to the manger in the new Huron chapel. "The Tree of Dreams" is not only a charming story, but, as in all his folk tales, Marius Barbeau has captured the spirit of a former age. His tales come from the people themselves and have been handed down through many generations. Roger Baulu is the raconteur at the microphone.

### THE WAY OF THE SPIRIT

(11:30 a.m.)

The visit of the Angel to Zacharias and Elizabeth will be the theme of the biblical dramatization, "The Way of the Spirit," this morning. The story tells of the birth of John the Baptist, the son of Zacharias and Elizabeth, and prophet of the Messiah.

### CANADIAN PARTY (12:30 p.m.)

For the nationwide radio audience and Canadian men and women in uniform overseas the CBC's Vancouver studios are preparing a package of music and fun in the Dec. 9 "Canadian Party." Musical highlights include the winsome songstress Juliette in her own special treatment of the current novelty hit, Chickery Chick. Harry Pryce and his band supply popular melodies and plan to feature a new composition, British Columbia March, written by John Roland, of Victoria. Two servicemen will be heard. Emcee Bob Morrison, back in radio after service in the Navy, is a former easterner now freelancing on the west coast. Baritone Ernie Prentice recently returned from the R.C.A.F. to join the cast of Music From The Pacific at CBC Vancouver. His solo will be the current song It's Been A Long, Long Time. It is expected that special features on the program will be handled by former war correspondent Bill Herbert, and former airforce PRO Ray Mackness, who plan to describe the view from Grouse Mountain near Vancouver, and report on such side-lights of post-war British Columbia as renewed activity on the waterfront and Christmas shopping cues.

### RELIGIOUS PERIOD (1:30 p.m.)

Rev. Martin Reid, rector of St. Augustine of Canterbury Church, Montreal, will be heard today.

### SINGING STARS OF TOMORROW (4:30 p.m.)

The two young singers to be heard today are Elizabeth Benson Guy of Halifax, and Muriel Niven of Calgary. Miss Guy is 20, single, a dramatic soprano, pupil of Dr. Ernesto Vinci at Toronto Conservatory, and sings in English, French, Italian and German—about 150 songs. She took second at the St. John Musical Festival in 1943, had her own radio program in Halifax, plays the piano, likes grand opera and lieder. Her mother and four aunts were trained musicians. She will sing: L'insana parola, from Aida, and Villa from The Merry Widow. Muriel Niven is married, 21, a dramatic soprano, pupil of Glyndwr Jones and Frederick Newnham, sings English, French, German, and Italian—200 songs. She sang on this program in 1944. She likes grand opera, oratorio, lieder and ballad, plays the piano, and is a soloist at Wesley Church. She will sing: Dich Theure Halle (Wagner), and Devotion (Strauss).

### MUSIC BY MOZART (6:00 p.m.)

Four of Montreal's Gagnier brothers, Réal, oboist; Armand, clarinetist; Guillaume, horn player; and Roland, bassoonist, will be heard tonight in this series. There are six Gagnier brothers, all prominent artists, in Montreal. Dr. J. J., CBC orchestra leader, is best known. Another is the father of Claire Gagnier, young soprano who recently made her CBC debut. The works to be performed are Mozart's Serenade in C Minor (K388) and Divertissement in B Flat Major (K270). Appearing with the Gagnier brothers in the performance will be Ronald Luckett, oboist, Frank Massala, clarinetist, Joseph Massala, horn player, and Harry Crout, bassoonist.

### WEEK-END REVIEW (7:30 p.m.)

Dr. H. L. Stewart, of Halifax, will review the news.

### OUR SPECIAL SPEAKER (7:45 p.m.)

Albert Rhys Williams, American author and lecturer, will be tonight's special speaker. "There Will Be No War With Russia" is the title he has given his talk. Mr. Williams has just arrived at the Pacific Coast from New York, after a lecture tour of the Eastern United States. He is retiring temporarily to his home on Vancouver Island to write three books, but will go to Vancouver for his CBC broadcast. His talk will outline nine points of similarity between Canadians and Russians and will deal with the atom bomb.

### STAGE 46 (8:00 p.m.)

"Babes in the Woodwinds" is tonight's play from Toronto—a revival from the hit list of CBC's "Stage 44," first broadcast in May, 1944.

Claire Murray and John Drainie, of Toronto, have pooled their talents for drollery and satire in a sportive piece about two members of a symphony orchestra who make their way to heaven equipped only with their woodwind instruments. The plot involves a conductor, the Angel Gabriel and bedlam. The dramatists are husband and wife. The original cast has been reassembled for the broadcast. Bernard Braden and John Drainie are the woodwind babes; Hedley Rainnie is Gabriel, and Lister Sinclair plays the conductor.

### RECITAL (9:15 p.m.)

Clement Q. Williams, baritone, devotes his quarter hour recital this evening to the songs of Alexander Von Felitz. These include: Silent Woe, It Was A Day, Secret Greetings, Child Voices, Anathema, and Resignation. Enid Conley will be at the piano.

### SUNDAY NIGHT SHOW (9:30 p.m.)

Lucienne Delval is in Montreal after a year's absence in New York where she was heard on the Blue network's "Piano Playhouse." Rusty Davis has taken advantage of her visit and invited the popular deep-voiced Lucienne to appear on his Sunday Night Show tonight. Lucienne will be remembered principally as the singing star of the program "Sur les Boulevards," which had an exceptionally long run on the CBC's Trans-Canada network.

### SOLILOQUY (10:30 p.m.)

Harold Green and orchestra, and Maxine Ware as vocalist, are the performers in this series. **THE MAGIC CHORD (5:30 p.m.)**

A "Magic Chord" is being struck for the Christmas season in another of those fanciful series of Mary Grannan tales which go over the airwaves coast to coast for listeners old and young. The daily broadcasts of The Magic Chord will be heard over the CBC Trans-Canada network, Monday to Friday, for the two weeks preceding Christmas week, beginning Monday, December 10. Each day there's an adventure, says Mary Grannan, supervisor of children's broadcasts for the CBC, and originator of the "Just Mary" and "Children's Scrapbook" broadcasts. Mary is gathering her "Magic Chord" people—Billy and Bunty, and Topsy and Scooty the mouse, who will act as guides for Billy and Bunty when they set out for bookland, circusland and fairyland. The series takes its title from a group of chords, Lou Snider wrote especially for the theme.

**STORY TIME (7:00 p.m.)**

Hans Andersen's fairy tale, The Snow Queen, will be presented in three consecutive weekly instalments starting tonight. Part 1 tells how little Kay gets a splinter from the goblins' mirror in his eyes and in his heart, and is stolen away by the Snow Queen. The "Once Upon A Time Lady," Josephine Barrington, is in charge of the broadcasts.

**ELECTRIC HOUR (Dom. 7:00 p.m.)**

The skill in blending melody displayed by the 40-piece orchestra in this series is due to the fine group of musicians who make the orchestra, and also to the violinist-conductor, Paul Scherman. Scherman's tall figure is familiar around CBC's Toronto studios, where he directs a continuous round of rehearsals and broadcasts, easily and affably, even when he is busiest. Asked what he likes most about radio, his answer is: "Its purpose and message is for all—rich and poor, old and young. It creates a better understanding among peoples." Scherman's studies and travels have taken him from the Toronto Conservatory of Music to the

Royal Academy in London, and to New York, Paris, and Berlin. By birth he's a Torontonionian, but he can manage nicely in French, German, or Russian conversation. Before his conducting days, the violin was his main interest. A soloist of repute, he will appear as guest artist with the Toronto Symphony Orchestra in January. In the Monday, December 10 broadcast of "The Electric Hour," Scherman will conduct the orchestra in "Tales from the Vienna Woods," by Strauss, and "Malaguena," by Lecuona. The orchestra will also accompany guest soprano Frances James in Gershwin's "Summertime," and in the aria, "Depuis Le Jour," from Charpentier's opera, "Louise." The "Forward with Canada" feature of the program, narrated by John Drainie, with special musical settings by Godfrey Ridout, will be about Fredericton, capital of New Brunswick.

**RHYTHM AND ROMANCE (7:45 p.m.)**

## The Prairie Gardener

Summary of Broadcast of December 2, 1945

*The chrysanthemum midge* attacks indoor chrysanthemums and if not controlled causes distortion of foliage and loss of flowers. It is a tiny 2-winged fly. The female lays eggs on young buds and stem. When hatched the larvae crawl about for two or three days then burrow into tender tissues where they shortly pupate, emerging later as flies to start another crop of midges. The injury to the tissues causes the formation of very small galls or swellings somewhat lighter colored than the leaves. Control: Spray in late afternoon every second day for 5-6 weeks with solution of 1¼ teaspoons of nicotine sulphate and 1 ounce soap in 1 gallon of water.

*Propagation of Plants* (continued from November 18 and November 25):

(g) *Depth of planting seeds* affects germination because temperature and aeration may be decreased although moisture increases at greater depths. There is a narrow limit of depth from which some seedlings can reach the surface on account of limited food supply in the seeds. In too shallow seeding lack of moisture may retard germination or winds blow the seeds away. Depth of seeding must be related to the size and kind of seed, the nature of the soil and the season of the year. Fall sowings insure better germination of many seeds since they require the conditions available in early spring before ground is dry enough for working.

(h) *Another factor in germination is vitality of seeds.* Seeds kept in storage may lose their vitality partially or altogether after one to two years. Garden balsam seed retains vitality over five years but delphinium seed is of little value after one year. Fresh seed not more than a year old is always safest. Old seeds should be tested during the winter.

(i) *Vegetative propagation* of plants is not as commonly used as seed propagation but is extremely important, especially where trueness to a parent type is a necessity and seed cannot be depended upon for this purpose.

(j) *Cuttings* for vegetative propagation may be made from roots (oriental poppy), special stem tissues (potato tubers, bulb scales, etc.), stems (geraniums), and leaves (begonias, African violets). Green cuttings in summer are not extensively used by nurserymen for the propagation of many shrubs and even some perennials such as bleeding heart. This is best done in a small greenhouse where the temperature, humidity and light can be carefully regulated.

More Flaws Found by R.C.D. Department

To the CBC's Prairie Region Program Schedule, on two or three recent occasions, has fallen the office of Radio Claim Debunker (R.C.D., a very unchivalrous order).

Notably, within recent memory, the Prairie paper assailed a Montreal claim to harbour "the dean of Canadian radio women," and asserted the superior claim of Miss Lillian Shaw of Winnipeg. Now the campaign must be carried farther afield.

In an American magazine dated Oct. 8, 1945, a claim is put forward for Lt. Commander Robert J. Stull, of the United States Navy, that he was the "first man on the air." The claim is based on the circumstance that Lt. Commander Stull spoke over a radio telephone operated by Charles Herald, radio teacher of San Jose, California, in 1911—and is believed to be without foundation, since radio telephony was going strong in Great Britain and on the European continent in 1910, according to well-established evidence.

A Canadian magazine which publishes an advertisement to the effect that the world's first broadcast was heard over KDKA, Pittsburgh, on November 2, 1920, also comes under the eagle eye of the R.C.D. department. This, says the advertisement, marked the birth of the great radio industry. But the Canadian Marconi company was broadcasting from Montreal in 1919, and a Winnipeg man, D. R. P. Coats, did a broadcast from the Toronto Exhibition in August, 1920, both events antedating November 2, 1920.

An unselfish and public-spirited desire to get history straight for once is the sole motive behind the R.C.D. campaign.

**Canadian Programs For Men Overseas**

Toronto. — Musical reminders of home are going regularly to the men and women of the Canadian forces still stationed overseas. The regular transmission of programs from home is one of the tasks of the CBC International Shortwave Service and the broadcasts are carried to the recreation centres and camps in Britain through the recently organized Canadian Forces Radio Service.

Programs that soldiers used to listen to back home, such as Don Messer's Orchestra, from Charlotte-town; Vancouver's Fiesta and Classics for Today; the Western Five, from Ottawa; Quebec's Ma Chanson; the Prairie Schooner from Winnipeg; and Paul Scherman's Latin American Serenade, Kay Stevenson's The Old Songs, and Clary's Gazette from Toronto, are regularly broadcast from Canada and rebroadcast on the C.F.R.S.

There are other programs designed primarily for listening in Britain, intended as a little bit of Canada for the lads who will be staying in Britain until spring. Foremost of these is Canadian Party, a gay musical variety which moves across the Dominion and changes its format every week. This program was arranged as an outcome of a recent visit home by CBC program expert, Gerry Wilmot, director of C.F.R.S., who is now back in Britain with plans completed for more special broadcasts for the troops. The broadcasts of Canadian Party are also presented for home listeners over the CBC Trans-Canada network on Sundays at 12:30 p.m.

Succeeding the Allied Expeditionary Forces Program at the end of the European war, the C.F.R.S. will be in operation until the final repatriation of Canadian personnel. The service is conducted by the CBC and the Canadian Army, assisted by the BBC. Its object during sixteen hours of programs daily is to furnish Canadian news and entertainment and to provide a vehicle for discussion.

Somebody asked General de Gaulle what he thought his own title in history ought to be; and he replied grimly, "Charles le Temporaire" (Charles the Temporary). As against this, the French have a saying—*Il n'y a rien qui dure comme le provisoire*.

... The man is cold; he is stern; he is aloof; he is uncompromising; although, if you thought that he lacked humour, you would be making a great mistake. He has humour, and plenty of it, but it is nearly all on the acid side. . . .

He is proud—proud in, though not necessarily of, himself; proud in his country, with a pride that suffers almost physical hurt when he feels that France is being treated as a second-class power. . . . He has enormous physical courage, courage never better shown than during the liberation, when he walked down the aisle of Notre Dame with his head up, while others around him were diving under the pews for cover from the shooting that had suddenly broken out.

One other thing . . . the General is not of a forgiving disposition, and if justly or unjustly he takes a strong dislike to somebody, that somebody is out for all time. Incidentally, . . . it is just as well to know that he does not love the British, but he admires and respects us, and today, perhaps more than ever before, he realizes that our two countries must, to use the old hackneyed phrase, "either hang together or hang separately."—Thomas Cadett, on BBC.
