# Sport Discussion On Caribbean Forum

Montreal. — On Sunday evening, May 5, the International Service of the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation presented the fourth edition of "Caribbean Forum," a special feature beamed from Canada on the first Sunday of each month to listeners in the West Indies.

Sport and its Merits in the West Indies as Compared with Sport in Canada was the subject under discussion in the May 5 edition. This was the first time that Canadians have been invited to participate in a discussion on Caribbean Forum, on which West Indians at present residing in Canada are usually represented.

Those taking part in this broadcast were: Howard Scarffe. Saskatchewan; Phil Edwards, wellknown Olympic Champion and native of British Guiana; Edie Fallon, Quebec; Basil Abrahams, British Guiana; Kenneth Brown, CBC Producer of West Indian programs, and Paul Albury of the Bahamas.

## Death of Earl Kelly Ends Radio Career

Th death of Earl Kelly, of Vancouver, on April 15, removed from the radio scene a man who at one time bid fair to be one of the most interesting characters on the Canadian air.

To many thousands of listeners to the CBC trans-continental network about the years 1937 and 1938, Kelly's friendly "Good evening!" was a familiar greeting, one with which he invariably began his widely followed news broadcasts. His invariable conclusion, in which he wished "a restful evening" to men in remote places—lighthouse keepers, coastguardsmen, prospectors, trappers, fishermen, sailors and soldiers — was equally familiar and characteristic.

About Kelly's news broadcasts themselves there was always discussion as to whether people listened to them for the news or for his quaint manner of presenting it. But there was no doubt that he did give a clear and concise summary of the news, which, as a newspaperman of long experience, he could do quite effectively. Thousands, however, enjoyed his unique commentaries even when the news itself meant little.

He probably will. . . . Winston Churchill, when he spoke at Fulton, Missouri, said that there had never been a war in history that would have been easier to stop before it started than World War IIa terrible, and terribly true, thing to have said. Yet if you read back through Churchill's speeches before the war, you will discover, if you did not know it before, that he was talking at Fulton about the use that could have been made of the old League, no matter how imperfect and how weak its machinery had been.

Let us take a look at the new league-the United Nations Organization, and its machinery. You will find on examination that a good many of the defects of the Geneva machine have been repaired. Where that machinery was palpably weak, it has been in many cases strengthened. But you will find that the new machine also has defects and that these are being busily discussed by the same groups of people who criticized and helped to break down the old league.-G. V.
