## Morning Commentator Knows The Prairies

Marjorie Duff, CBC Speaker, Has Intimate Knowledge Of Rural And Urban West

Marjorie Duff, the new CBC women's commentator heard Mondays to Fridays at 9:35 a.m. over CBK Watrous and stations of CBC's midwestern network, is a speaker and reporter who is already—in the bloom of youth—a veteran of radio, with an intimate knowledge of both rural and urban living in two prairie provinces.

Miss Duff is a native of Grandview, Manitoba, who has lived also in Winnipeg and Regina, and in Outlook, Davidson, and Gull Lake, Saskatchewan. She knows both the cities and the small towns of the prairies, and speaks with an intimate knowledge of their needs and interests.

This talented member of the radio sorority is also a singer—a contralto who won first awards in her class on two occasions at the Saskatchewan Musical Festival. She holds the A.T.C.M. degree in both piano and voice. She sang, looked after traffic, and wrote continuity and publicity on Saskatchewan stations before going to Winnipeg in 1945 as a fashion editor in one of that city's big department stores.

In addition to her Morning Comment five days a week on CBC, Miss Duff does occasional reports for CBC's International Service.

## Note On Dictionaries

It is important to note that for pronunciation no single dictionary can be regarded as infallible. Dictionaries are useful for indicating the pronunciation of the less commonly occurring words, but in general they represent only the academic standard speech that is current at any particular time or in any particular region, and they tend to retain obsolete and sometimes pedantic pronunciations. For example, both Oxford and Century dictionaries indicate the proper pronunciation of *cocaine* as three syllables. Nevertheless, the dictionary should be frequently consulted—particularly by those who feel doubtful about the less usual words or whose knowledge of exact meanings is deficient.—*CBC Handbook for Announcers.*

## CBC Talks Specialist In Search Of Folklore

J. R. Scott of Toronto Will Visit Prairie Cities.

James R. Scott, of the CBC's Talks and Public Affairs Department, Toronto, who is visiting the Prairie Region at present, is a graduate of University College, University of Toronto, and did graduate work at Toronto and Harvard. He was assistant professor of English at the University of Saskatchewan for four years, and served in the same capacity at the University of Toronto.

In the CBC's Talks and Public Affairs Department, he concentrates upon the field of literary and cultural broadcasts, and is chairman of the CBC Sunday series *The Readers Take Over*, in which Canadian authors meet members of the reading public in discussions of their books. While in the West he will conduct two regular broadcasts of this series, in Regina and Calgary.

Mr. Scott has a keen interest in folklore, especially of the prairies, and is gathering material of this sort during his present tour. He is also interested in Little Theatre work, and is a graduate of the old Play Workshop and Hart House Theatre groups in Toronto. He acted as ad-

judicator in the Saskatchewan Provincial Drama Festival at Regina, April 17-19 this year. His first broadcasts were done from Saskatoon, and he was heard frequently on CBC during 1946 as a book reviewer. He is married, and lives in Toronto.

## Empire Exchange Of Broadcasters

London.—The recent arrival in England of Mr. John Proud, O.B.E., from Australia is the fruit of an agreement reached by the organizations which participated in the Commonwealth Broadcasting Conference of 1945 that the exchange of staff would be of mutual benefit to British and Dominion broadcasters. Mr. Proud, who is the Assistant Director of Talks at the Australian Broadcasting Commission, is seconded to the BBC for six months, during which time he will have opportunities to study the general working of the Corporation. He will be attached to the Talks Department. Plans are now being made for a member of the BBC staff to be seconded to the ABC for six months in exchange.—*From London Calling.*

## Seeking Folklore



JAMES R. SCOTT, of CBC's Talks and Public Affairs Department, Toronto, is at present in the West on a tour which will take him through Winnipeg, Regina, Calgary, Edmonton, and Saskatoon. In addition to conducting two broadcasts of the CBC series, *The Readers Take Over* (Sundays, 10 p.m. at Regina and Calgary, Mr. Scott will pursue researches into prairie region folklore. He is a former professor of English at Saskatchewan University.

## CBC To Record 29th Festival Highlights

Great Manitoba Musical Assembly Will Be Subject Of Half-Hour Broadcast April 28

A running commentary on one of the British Empire's greatest musical assemblies, the Manitoba Musical Festival, will be heard on CBC's midwest and central networks on Monday, April 28, at 10:00 p.m. from CBC Winnipeg.

This year's festival, the 29th annual, set a new record with nearly 20,000 contestants. The immense gathering, which overflows Winnipeg's million-dollar Civic Auditorium and occupies three other large halls in the city, is an event of absorbing human interest as well as a great festival of music. Distinguished adjudicators come from as far away as London and Glasgow to judge the entries. This year they are: Dr. E. Stanley Roper, organist of H.M. Chapel Royal; Michael Head, composer and pianoforte professor at the Royal Academy of Music, London; J. Peebles Conn, professor of violin and director of chamber music at the Royal Scottish Academy of Music, Glasgow; and Cornelius Fisher, prominent British musician and judge of instrumental classes.

A CBC producer, Sydney Dixon, of Winnipeg, will spend most of his time at the Auditorium and other centres during the week of the festival. He will have recording equipment on hand, and will collect impressions of the event, which will be dubbed into a half-hour program with running commentary.

Later, on Tuesday, May 6, a further program related to the Festival will be heard, when Mr. Dixon brings Festival winners to the microphone at CBC's Winnipeg studios.

### WHAT ABOUT YOUR MARRIAGE? (Dom. 7:00 p.m.)

Problems of marriage from the standpoint of a practical social worker will be dealt with on the next broadcast in the new CBC Sunday night series What About Your Marriage?, when the speaker will be Josephine F. Kilburn, supervisor of psychiatric social services for the province of British Columbia. CBC has scheduled this new discussion series in view of the growing concern amongst thinking people about the rising divorce rate in Canada and other countries. Miss Kilburn will point out in her talk some of the lesser difficulties that may actually be more common in ordinary households than divorce itself. She will seek to outline the basis of parental discord and its effect on the children concerned. From the viewpoint of the trained social worker she will try to indicate how recreational facilities, community centres and various new interests can help meet the situation. Future broadcasts in the series, will bring to the microphone a prominent lawyer and a prominent clergyman in eastern Canada.

### TONY MARTIN SHOW (Dom. 8:30 p.m.)

A musician who has written the scores for a number of well-known movies, and has a long list of song-hits to his credit (including the favourite, Sweet Sue), now directs the orchestra on the "Tony Martin Show," a new weekly radio program. He is Victor Young and he and his orchestra share the spotlight with vocalists Tony Martin and Evelyn Knight.

### TORONTO OPERA (9:30 p.m.)

A new venture in Canadian music will be brought to the attention of the CBC's Trans-Canada radio audience during the next five weeks in a series of five weekly broadcasts by the Toronto Conservatory School of the Opera which opened in October last year. Tonight's program will

consist of excerpts from Frederick Smetanas opera, "The Bartered Bride." The five broadcasts will be directed by Nicholas Goldschmidt, conductor of the Opera School. Performing under him will be the school's solo principals, a chorus of 32 voices, and a 24-piece orchestra. The Bartered Bride selections will be sung in English. The principals will be Mary Morrison, soprano, in the role of Marie; Ronald Stewart, tenor, as Hans, her lover; Robert Doree, bass, as Krushinu, her father; Louise Roy, dramatic soprano, as Katinka, the mother; and Andrew MacMillan, baritone, as the marriage broker, Kezul. David Hughes, baritone, and Jean Marie Scott, contralto, will be heard respectively as Misha, the landowner and father of Hans, and Agnes, his wife. The Toronto Conservatory School of the Opera, first of its kind in Canada, plans to provide musical training previously obtainable only in Europe or the United States, and to develop and promote a permanent operatic company. The Opera School is part of the Conservatory's Senior School, under Dr. Arnold Walter, musician and composer.

### THE READERS TAKE OVER (10:00 p.m.)

The program originates in Calgary this week, and the book and author under the CBC spotlight are "Who Has Seen the Wind?" and W. O. Mitchell, of High River, Alberta. Mr. Mitchell's book, which has occasioned much comment and has been enthusiastically reviewed by prominent American critics, is a tale of a small prairie town and its inhabitants. It has been praised for its humour and pathos. J. R. Scott, of CBC's Toronto Talks Department, will be chairman, and as usual, Mr. Mitchell will meet two of his readers, who will discuss the book with its author.

### SUNDAY SERENADE (10:30 p.m.)

Percy Harvey and orchestra, with Cora James as soprano soloist, are heard in this Winnipeg series. Mr. Harvey's selections tonight include a suite of Woodland Pictures by Percy Fletcher, including In The Hayfields, An Old World Garden, and The Bean Feast. Other numbers are: Estrellita, The Song of the Volga Boatman, Forget Me Not (McBeth), and Rubenstein's familiar Melody in F. Mrs. James will sing: Brazil (Barroso-Russell); Yours Is My Heart Alone (Lehar); and Ave Maria (Schubert).

*Summerfallow.* This CBC series of summer programs, which replaces the National Farm Forum between April and September, plays an important role in uniting Canadian agriculture. The Summerfallow broadcasts deal with a variety of farm subjects designed to acquaint regional farmers with agriculture in other parts of Canada, and to provide an entertaining and informative picture of rural life for the urban listener.

## The Prairie Gardener

Summary of Broadcast of April 20, 1947.

### More Garden Chores.

1. *Transplanting trees and shrubs, sowing seeds and raising plants indoors,* and transplanting to the garden have been outlined in previous talks. Other items follow.

2. *Spring Cleanup.* Many gardeners leave the garden cleanup until spring. It is important to gather up and burn all old plant tops and weeds, not only in the garden area but in fence corners and in adjacent areas. If a good "burn" can be secured without damage to permanent plantings of trees and shrubs it will destroy many weed seeds, insect pests and disease-carrying material. All material, however, such as leaves and grass, not infested with these pests, should be put in a compact heap. No humus should be wasted if it can be saved for manure making.

3. *Removal of Mulches* from strawberries and perennials should be delayed as long as it is safe to do so. Strawberries and perennials must be uncovered when growth starts but early growth is subject to late frost damage and should be held back for a week or two longer if possible.

4. *Garden Tools* should receive a check and necessary repairs made before gardening commences in earnest.

5. *The raspberry patch* that was not pruned last fall should receive attention now. All of last year's fruiting canes should be removed and burned. They may be carrying disease. In addition the new canes should be thinned freely. A few strong canes with plenty of room will produce bigger berries and a greater yield than a crowded growth of thin canes. *Currants* also require pruning. Late fall or early winter is the best time for this chore but early spring before growth starts is satisfactory. On *black currants* the best fruit is borne on one-year-old shoots. Other shoots should be pruned out freely. *Red and white currants* bear chiefly on two and three-year-old wood so the four-year wood should be removed first and then the balance thinned out if necessary. *Gooseberries* should have all wood three years or more old removed.

6. *Many perennials* can be divided and transplanted in early spring. Some exceptions should be noted. Peonies are best moved in September, Iris in mid-summer, and Oriental Poppies when the foliage has died down in late summer. Poppies of any kind are hard to transplant successfully in the spring.

Her London studies included sessions at Clive Curry's School of Drama, the Academy of Dramatic Art, and dancing and singing under Espinoza, Madame Denereaz, and Madame Nellie Rowe.

Cycle of Life and Promenade à mule, by Felix Fourdrain. Under Jean Deslauriers' direction, the orchestra will play Novelette by Gade; the first movement from a quartet by Smetana; Fugue for nine violins, by Arcady Dubensky; and Scherzo, by Tschaiakowsky.

The opera was done on contract for a London impresario, Charles Kemble, and the fee was £1,000. Von Weber spent his last strength on the work, seeking to provide for his wife and children after his death. Celebrated among the delicate airs of this famous opera is the Chorus of the Elves, which the choir of Winnipeg's Young Women's Musical Club will perform tonight, under the direction of Filmer Hubble, with Gwendda Owen Davies as piano accompanist. The program also contains other celebrated compositions — Schubert's paean of praise to heaven, Die Allmache (Omnipotence); the Barcarolle from the ballet music of the opera Lakme, by Leo Delibes; Follow Me Down to Carlow, famous Irish folk song; three songs by Brahms, Greetings, A Silvery Harp, and The Bridegroom; one of Burleigh's famous negro spirituals, Oh Peter Goring-a Dem Bells; a May Day Carol from Essex, arranged by Deems Taylor; and Maneen Veen, an old Manx folk tune arranged by former Winnipeg musician, Ronald W. Gibson, especially for the Young Women's Musical Club.

Yes? The Kipling Citizen says Mrs. Edward Clark of Inchkeith before she was married was interested in Herefords. Then she met her husband, who comes from a family of well-known Shorthorn breeders. The result — Mrs. Clark's Shorthorn, Jackie, was judged Reserve Grand Champion of Saskatchewan at the Regina Winter Fair—which, says the Kipling Citizen, is the equivalent of Winston Churchill showing Stalin how to smoke a pipe.—CBC Neighbourly News, April 12.

## Hanson Will Direct NBC Story Of Music

Instrumental and choral groups from the Eastman School of Music of the University of Rochester are being presented in the musical series of NBC's University of the Air, The Story of Music, heard over the CBC Trans-Canada network on Thursdays at 10:30 p.m. CST.

The series, inaugurated in February, was arranged by Gilbert Chase, supervisor of music of NBC's University of the Air and is under the general direction of Dr. Howard Hanson, director of the Eastman School of Music. The broadcasts cover a wide variety of music ranging from string quartets to works for chamber orchestra and various choral combinations. Most of the programs originate in Kilbourn Hall at the Eastman School.

The Eastman School, founded on an endowment from George Eastman, opened its doors in 1921. It supports three symphony orchestras, each of 125 players, a chamber orchestra, two symphony bands, choir and opera departments. Since it was started the school has graduated some 2,600 students.

Dr. Howard Hanson, the school's director, is in the forefront of American music educators and as composer and conductor, he has established wide contacts with an international public. In 1944, he was awarded the Pulitzer Prize for his Symphony No. 4, Opus 34.

**Soviet Delegates Visit BBC London**

The delegates of the Supreme Soviet, who were then in Britain, recently visited the BBC on the first anniversary of British broadcasts to the Soviet Union. The Soviet delegates were present in the studio during the transmission of that afternoon's Russian bulletin.

The Hammer and Sickle was flying over Broadcasting House when the delegates were welcomed at lunch there by the Chairman of the Governors, Lord Inman. Lord Inman explained to them that the BBC broadcasts day and night in 40 languages. "In these broadcasts," he said, "we try to present a faithful picture of the British way of life. We are convinced that the people of the world can be brought closer together by means of the radio. We hold tenaciously to the belief that broadcasting can play an immense part in strengthening the relationship between our two countries."

The Supreme Soviet Delegation also visited the BBC Television Service at Alexandra Palace.

Since its inauguration, the BBC's Russian Service has gained listeners in places as far distant as Siberia and Turkestan, and evidence of the popularity of the British broadcasts in Russian has been given by the Soviet delegates themselves.—From London Calling.

### A LIFE OF MY OWN (3:48 p.m.)

Is homemaking a full-time job? Does home life deteriorate if the mother has outside interests? Answers to these questions, based on personal experiences, will be offered by women from all across Canada, in a new series of radio talks, entitled A Life of My Own. The series will be heard weekly over the CBC Trans-Canada network. Each speaker will tell how she arranged her home activities so as to leave sufficient time for "a life of her own." She will also tell radio listeners how her vocation, hobby or community work has contributed to a happier family life. The opening talk in the series, today, will be given by Constance Garneau, of Montreal, the mother of three children, an active worker in voluntary organizations, and a frequent CBC broadcaster.

The aim of the schools is to improve farming and homemaking methods and to train students to be good citizens and community leaders. Mrs. Stiles will tell about the courses available to boys and girls at the school at Olds.

### ALAN AND ME (7:00 p.m.)

This weekly radio drama series designed for family listening will be heard an hour earlier, and on a different day, from now on. It was formerly presented on Fridays, at 8 p.m. The program concerns the activities of two small children, their family and friends. Leading roles are played by Alene Kamins, as Penny Clay; and Elliott Collins, as her brother, Alan. Doris Veale, at the Hammond organ, provides the music for Alan and Me.

### VANCOUVER DRAMA (10:00 p.m.)

A comedy satire of newspaper life entitled A Scoop For Henry Pepper, by Poppy McKenzie, is tonight's choice. The story is about Henry Pepper, a feature writer for a metropolitan newspaper. In his search for material he meets an old prospector who spins some very tall tales. Pepper expands these stories into a series of feature articles about a hidden plateau. At the end of the series his newspaper sends him together with the old prospector and a bush pilot to investigate conditions at the plateau. The story of what they find provides the climax to the play.

### CBC Carries Many Religious Broadcasts

Included in the great variety of programs arranged by the CBC for its Trans-Canada network listeners are the religious broadcasts, some of them heard regularly throughout the year and others on special occasions.

Among those heard regularly are the half-hour Sunday services, Religious Period (1:30 p.m.) and Church of the Air (3:30 p.m.), arranged by the CBC in co-operation with the National Religious Advisory Council. On special occasions during the year, the CBC brings outstanding religious events to its listeners. These include a Christmas Day service and a series of Holy Week Meditations during Easter.

Religious broadcasts on the French network follow a pattern similar to the Trans-Canada network.

### Program Preferences.

In the field of symphonic music, the Toronto and Montreal broadcasts have been on the usual high standards, and the Vancouver broadcasts have been more uniformly of good quality compared with their previous season. The CBC is worthy of much commendation also for bringing the usual N.Y. Philharmonic programs and for the sponsored "Met" broadcasts.

It seems to me that chamber music has been too much neglected in radio. Several seasons ago we had a series of farewell concerts by the Hart House string quartet; at present the Parlow quartet is giving a short series of broadcasts; Violin Sonatas was lovely also. But I could enjoy much more of this sort of thing.

The occasional "festival" broadcasts from Montreal and the present "Bach festivals" from Vancouver are worthy of special praise.

Outstanding in the non-music fields are Stage 47 and The Way of the Spirit. The latter is in my opinion second to none in its field, and the former has been greatly improved by its extension to one full hour and by the inclusion of some of the older plays along with contemporary ones. — Russ Walker, Regina, Sask.

## Thinks Business Men Are Misunderstood

There are intellectuals among the business men, and business men among the intellectuals, men who are giants in both worlds, like the late Lord Keynes, to take a striking example. (But) the point is that the majority—the very great majority—in the educated, professional classes and the business world, are nearly as distinct as oil from water; they do not mix; nor do they trust or understand one another. . . . Historically, it starts from the creation, as a consequence of the industrial revolution, of a swollen, highly-educated middle-class, drawing its income from industry, but whose eyes were turned away from business to the fields of culture and the professions. Today they live at so many removes from industry and trade that except purely as consumers they have lost the sense of contact and continuity. The rise of the rentier and the salaried professions may have engendered a temporary forgetfulness. But they do not explain the charge that business and the business man are fundamentally misunderstood and undervalued by the intellectuals.—F. C. Hooper, on BBC.
