New CBC Shortwave Serves Australia

Governor-General And Australian And New Zealand High Commissioners Speak In Inaugural Broadcast

Montreal.—Canada and Australia are "the two main pivots upon which rests the future of the British Commonwealth of Nations," Rt. Hon. F. M. Forde, Australian High Commissioner to Canada, said in an address beamed by shortwave to Australia and New Zealand by the CBC International Service.

"Both Australia and Canada feel that, as senior members of the British Commonwealth, they will be called upon to play an ever-increasing part in maintaining the prestige and building the defences of the British Commonwealth," said Mr. Forde.

"And we both realize that the best guarantee of a just and lasting peace depends on a strong British Commonwealth on the one hand, and on the other a powerful United States working in close co-operation with the other members of the United Nations."

Manitoba Farmers For National Radio

Attempts To Break Down National Radio Denounced At Winnipeg Convention

CBC Farm Broadcasts and the National Farm Radio Forum were "invaluable to the farmer" and could not be carried on under anything other than a national radio system, according to a unanimous resolution passed by the Manitoba Federation of Agriculture and Cooperation, meeting in Winnipeg on June 25.

The resolution also contained a clause requesting the Dominion Government to "preserve" the CBC against present attempts by private interests to "break down national radio."

William Demarest Visits CBC Winnipeg

A cheerful and amusing visitor to CBC's Prairie Region headquarters last week was Mr. William Demarest of Hollywood, who was accompanied by Mrs. Demarest.

Mr. Demarest was in Winnipeg for the world premiere of a picture in which he appears, called Welcome Stranger. He spent a good deal of time at the CBC offices writing autographs for members of the staff, and accompanying them with humorous verses.

Foster Hewitt Seeks Upper Canada Alumni

A visitor to Winnipeg last week was Foster Hewitt, whose broadcast descriptions of N.H.L. hockey games are a regular Saturday night event on CBC's Trans-Canada network during the winter season.

Hewitt was en route in a cross-Canada tour during which he is renewing contacts with alumni of Upper Canada College, Toronto. He is the president of the Old Boys' Association of Upper Canada. In Winnipeg he met Sir Charles Tupper, Mr. Justice P. J. Montague, and others.

Hewitt's first broadcast this fall will be of an all-star professional game in Toronto October 15. On October 18 he begins his regular N.H.L. broadcasts.

CBC Unit To Record Calgary Stampede

International Service To Broadcast Great Western Show For Listeners Abroad

Out of necessity the western cowboys developed many skills in handling horses and cattle. In the old days they had to rope, break and ride the wild horses that roamed the plains, rope and brand beef cattle, and drive chuck wagons across miles of unbroken land to follow the herd. Mechanized farming and new methods of animal husbandry that are helping Canada to produce more food than ever before have not done away with the tasks of breaking horses or branding cattle. Though the cowboy in the old sense belongs to the past, his skill and enjoyment in taming wild animals is not forgotten.

For 62 years now, cowboys from all over the western half of the North American Continent have congregated at Calgary, Alberta, for an annual "stampede." For six days each July competitions are held to establish champions in the most unusual tests of strength, speed, skill and agility.

Over a third of a million guests are expected to gather this year for the Calgary Stampede, which has become the biggest event in the Continued on page 7

Music Transcribed For Heritage Series

"We of the twentieth century are the inheritors of music from many countries, written by men in many different styles. In these programs we bring you each week a fragment from that heritage."

These opening words in the program, Heritage of Music, broadcast from CBC Vancouver on Fridays at 9:30 p.m., give the reason for the title.

During the summer months, beginning July 11, the performers in this series will be a chamber music group consisting of five strings and five woodwinds led by John Avison.

Not many standard works have been written for such an ensemble, but last summer when this group performed for CBC, a considerable repertoire was built up. This will be added to this year, the CBC having commissioned two Vancouver musicians, Maurice Miles and Laurence Wilson, to transcribe works by Beethoven Schumann, Schubert, and Mozart for these instruments. Jacques Labrecque, tenor, will be the guest soloist tonight in this Montreal series. He has selected three songs by Scarlatti, Duparc and Strauss. The orchestra under the direction of Jean Deslauriers will play the overture to The Magic Flute, by Mozart; The Serenade from Edouard Lalo's ballet Namouna, the first movement of Gade's Novelette and Moto Perpetuo, by Lotter.

FLICKS AND FLASHES

(Dom. 9:30 p.m.)

This new series is a movie commentary by Susan Fletcher, a Toronto girl who went from CBC's 46 (1946 series, Toronto Stage drama) to New York, where she became assistant stage manager for Maurice Evans and Gilbert Miller. Miss Fletcher is now in Hollywood, where she has been talking to a number of highly-advertised people, such as Frank Sinatra, Katharine Hepburn, Mary Pickford, Walter Stewart Granger and Pidgeon. Margaret Lockwood. Her commentaries will add to the voluminous data upon the lives of these people already available to the public.

THE GYPSY (10:30 p.m.)

Conductor Cardo Smalley will summon up all the colour and excitment of the gypsy life in the old world in this new Vancouver series. Smalley, conducting the same orchestra which won wide popularity on the Gypsy Strings program last year, will carry Canadian listeners in imagination into the cities of old Europe, to the camp fires of wandering gypsy bands. Smalley's gypsy violin becomes almost a "personality" in itself, guiding listeners on their musical tour. While gypsy music predominates in the series, there will be wide scope in selections, and one program may include numbers from places as far apart as Vienna, Roumania, Turkey and Spain. As in the original Gypsy Strings series, traditional gypsy numbers will be presented from manuscript. They have been written down from memory at CBC's request by cellist Deszo Mahalek, a member of the orchestra. These are authentic gypsy and folk tunes which he recalls from his childhood days in Hungary. In addition, conductor Smalley has arranged to import a great many gypsy pieces from European sources. These are numbers not available in sheet music form on this continent and will be arranged especially for the series by musicians at CBC's Vancouver music library. Gordon Inglis is the announcer.

SONATA SERIES (11:00 p.m.)

Pearl Palmason, violinist, and Snolaug Sigurdson, pianist, heard in this series. Tonight they will perform Cesar Franck's Sonata in A Major.

PACIFIC PIANOFORTE

(11:30 p.m.)

John Beckwith, 17-year-old pianist now holidaying at the west coast, has been booked by CBC's Vancouver studios for four performances. Beckwith was born in Victoria and received his early musical education there. A few years ago he went to Toronto where he graduated in music from the University of Toronto, and in 1945 won the Hazel Ireland Eaton scholarship. At the present time he is studying at the Toronto Conservatory under Alberto Guerrero. Tonight he will play works by Beethoven, including Sonata in E Minor Opus 90, and Six Bagatelles. direct to Australasia and the South Pacific also included messages of greeting by the Governor General, Viscount Alexander, and Hon, James Thorn, New Zealand High Commissioner to Canada.

Months of planning led up to the inauguration of the new service which Mr. Forde hailed as "yet another link in the chain of friendship which joins the people of Canada and the people of Australia." Starting July 6, specially prepared one-hour Canadian radio programs will be beamed every Sunday across Canada and Pacific from the CBC International Service transmitters at Sackville, N.B. The programs will go out in the early morning to reach listeners "down under" at supper time the same day.

"Feelings of friendship and kinship between Australians and Cana-

dians have always existed," Mr. Forde said, "but never so intimately as since the arrival in Canada of the 10,500 Australians who trained here during the war under the British Commonwealth Air Fraining Scheme. These boys made friends for Australia from Vancouver Island to Halifax. They took home with them stories of the hospitality which the Canadians lavished on them and which have endeared the Canadian to the Australian. More than 500 of them took back home Canadian brides, and these young women are making friends for Canada from Perth in Western Australia to Cooktown in North Queensland.

"Through this new shortwave service which begins today, Australians will learn more about Canada and the Canadian way of life. They will learn what we Australians now living in Canada have come to realize so forcibly-that there are no two other countries in the world which have so much in common as have Australia and Canada.

"We are both vast countries with comparatively small populations and all the problems of development to contend with. We have both increased tremendously our secondary industries during the last war. In our homes and workshops we do the same things, we live the same type of lives and we try to solve the same problems

Ends of the Earth

"But although we are two nations pursuing parallel destinies, each eager to learn more about the other, and each inspired by feelings of the utmost friendliness with each other, we are at the opposite ends of the earth.

"It is true that you can make the journey by air from Vancouver to Sydney in the same time as it takes to travel from Vancouver to Montreal by train, but we must reconcile ourselves to the fact that only a minute percentage of Canadians will ever see Australia, just as a very limited number of Australians will ever see Canada.

"And so we must rely on a miracle of the modern world, such as the shortwave radio, to bring to the peoples of our two countries that knowledge which will make for greater understanding.

"And supplementing the radio, we have the films and the popular press, I have been very interested in the vast increase in the demand in both our countries since the end of the war for more information on each other, through the mass media of the film, radio and the press.

"It is this mutual interest and this aim to know each other better which ensures a closely knit British Commonwealth. Both Australia and Canada feel that, as senior partners of the British Commonwealth, they will be called upon to play an everincreasing part in maintaining the prestige and in building the defences of the British Commonwealth."

The Prairie Gardener

Summary of Broadcast of June 29, 1947.

Summertime in the Garden:

A. Chores:

(i) Summer sowings: a, In early July there is still time to sow radishes, lettuce, spinach and beets. July sowings of head lettuce will head up well in cool fall weather. b, Pansies sown in mid-summer make plants that winter better than old ones and that give larger spring bloom.

(ii) Summer pruning: a, Prune side branches to keep sweet peas bearing flowers on one stem per plant if you want longer stems and larger flowers. b, Prune side branches out of large flowered dahlias to secure giant blooms. The number of buds per stem should also be reduced. c, Calendulas, as well as many other flowers, keep blooming continuously if the flowers are kept cut. Don't allow flowering plants to produce seed if you want them to keep on blooming, d. Check tomato plants weekly and prune as necessary. Pinch the ends out of cucumber and squash vines to induce side fruiting branches. Keep seed stems removed from rhubarb, e, Thin the fruit on heavily laden plums and crab-apples to permit better development of the crop. Limit the number of runners on strawberry plants to the number necessary to produce the number of new plants desired.

(iii) Keeping the garden and grounds tidy: a, Frequent cutting but not close cropping will keep the lawn attractive. Edge the grass along margins with a sharp cutting tool. b, Dig around trees and shrubs. Don't compel them to compete with grass and weeds. c, Garden paths should be rounded up to shed water. Keep them raked and tidy. A little gravel or sand sprinkled over a well graded garden path makes a good roadway in all weather.

(iv) Order iris and peonies now for planting at the right time. Fall is a good time to plant many shrubs and perennials. Consult your nurseryman now.

B. Summer Visits: a, Visit your neighbours to admire their choice garden productions. Invite them to return the call. b, Organize an excursion to the nearest Dominion Experiment Station, University Plots, Forestry Farm, or municipal or provincial parks. c, Keep a note-book handy to jot down names of plants you would like to have in your own garden.

C. Share your garden treasures with others, particularly with the aged and the infirm.

D. Support the summer shows of Agricultural and Horticultural Societies by: a, membership; b, attendance, and c, taking part in competitions.

E Plan for a better garden next year by-a, making notes of the mistakes apparent in this year's garden, and b, looking for ideas now to meet the needs for a better planned and better kept garden next year.

One of the big events at the Stampede is the Bucking-Horse Riding Contest, in which cowboys ride untamed horses in competition for trophies and large cash prizes. Competitors must remain mounted for at least three "leaps" and perform specified feats of horsemanship until the judge is satisfied that both horse and man have displayed their

Another thrilling event is the Calf-Roping Contest. From his horse the cowboy lassos a wild calf. Then he dismounts and relies on his pony to keep the lasso rope taught while he catches and hog-ties the calf. The contest features co-operation between man and horse in skills developed in catching wild calves on the range for branding. Judging is on a time basis

The Wild Cow Milking Contest is one of the most exciting of all. Cowboys work in teams, one lassoing a wild cow and keeping it under control while the other attempts to obtain a half-pint of milk from the rearing animal. It is a mass contest with up to 50 cows and cowboy teams competing simultaneously. The first milker to reach the judges' stand with a half-pint of milk is the winner.

For the Wild Steer Decorating Contest the cowboy waits on his horse until a steer is released from the corral. He has to ride after the steer and place a ribbon around one of his horns. This feat is often completed in less than five seconds, but sometimes results in an amazing tangle of steer, horse and cowboy.

But the highlight of the whole Stampede is the chuck wagon race, always staged in the evening. The cowboys are camped outside their wagons. When the starter's gun goes off they have to load their stoves, cooking utensils and bed rolls into their wagons, hitch up their horses, and make two circuits of a halfmile track.

In connection with the Stampede, there are exhibitions of domestic livestock, farm produce and manufactured goods, and prizes for all sorts of handicrafts.

This year, the Calgary Stampede will be held July 7-12. Staff reporters and engineers will be in Calgary recording and broadcasting full accounts of all the main events for the CBC International Service.
