Most Countries Adopt Public Radio, Current Survey Indicates

Monthly Bulletins Of International Broadcasting Organization Study World's Broadcasting Systems

N excellent source of information on broadcasting the world A over is the monthly bulletin of the International Broadcasting Organization, which contains informative surveys of the radio systems in use in many countries of the world. The CBC's International Service receives these bulletins regularly.

In Public Domain

Various conclusions may be drawn from a study of the world's radio systems, but one is inescapable—that a system of simon-pure private enterprise in this universally-disseminated and universally-important in-

the world, would be a freak. Everywhere, radio is recognized as being in the public domain, necessarily under the control of public authority. Even in the United States, last stronghold of private enterprise in radio, the control exercised by dustry, if it occurred anywhere in the public authority, the Federal

Communications Commission, has increased enormously in recent years and continues to grow.

Recent IBO bulletins have contained studies of the history, present organization, and future plans of the broadcasting systems of Sweden, Turkey, Argentina, Denmark, Australia, New Zealand, and Germany. In each and all of these countries, the public authority plays a dominant role, in many cases owning and operating either the whole or a major part of the country's radio facilities.

Sweden

The Royal Posts and Telegraphs Administration is the principal authority in Sweden, working through contract concluded with the Radiotjanst Society. The latter is a joint-stock company consisting of 47 shareholders representing the Swedish press and manufacturers and dealers in tidio apparatus. The management consists of a board of directors, a governing body, a radio intee and a director-in-chief of broadcasting. The government appoints the chairman of the board of directors, and three members and their deputies. Two deputies represent the press and radio industry. The board of directors appoints the executive "governing body" and the director-in-chief. Radiotjanst has a staff of 300, of whom 145 work on programs and 35 on technical operation. Radio orchestras employ 36 musicians permanently, and the remainder of the staff consists of pro-

BRITISH AUTHORS (9:00 p.m. MDT)

British authors and critics will talk about their fellow-writers of the past and present in this series first broadcast in the BBC's Third Program and to be heard in Canada by transcription. Broadcasts will cover outstanding British authorsthe men themselves and their contributions to the world's literature. The opening program will be about Sir Phillip Sidney, the Elizabethan poet whose verse is regarded as one of the lasting ornaments of the age in which he lived. Sidney was as well a soldier and statesman, and a favourite with "Good Queen Bess." His writings, though not numerous, were of great literary significance, and included Astrophel and Stella (1591) the first important body of sonnets in the English language. The speaker will be Dylan Thomas, a young Welshman now living in Oxford, who in recent years has become known as a poet, short-story writer and broadcaster. From Toronto.

gram directors and assistants. Public control of the radio system is thorough and complete. Of the 38 medium and shortwave stations, 23 representing 95 per cent of the total power, belong to the state. There are no commercial programs.

Turkey

Broadcasting in Turkey is a public monopoly, an official service dependent on the general management of "Press and Diffusion," government department subordinate to the Ministerial Council. The board of directors of Radio Ankara is composed of a director and two assistants, one heading administrative, the other technical services. Broadcasting headquarters at Ankara has one large studio capable of holding an audience of 175 and orchestras from 80 to 100 players, and several smaller studios. New headquarters are under construction at Istanbul. The Turkish radio publishes a monthly review, "Radio." There are three stations in operation in Turkey, with a total power of 160 kw., and two under construction at Ankara and Istanbul, of 100 and 150 kw. power respectively. Other stations are planned at Izmir and Matatya. The Turkish radio system has a staff of 240.

Argentina

The broadcasting system of Argentina consists of governmental stations (Radio del Estado and Buenos Ayres municipal station), and private stations holding temporary licenses. There is one exception in the latter case—a license granted to "Empresa Editorial Haynes Ltda." for a definite period of 15 years, dating from 1935 and expiring in two years time. Besides the issuance of licenses, it is the business of the government "to regulate, guide, and control in general all wired broadcasting in Argentina." This is done by the Posts and Telegraphs organization under the Ministry of Home Affairs.

Denmark

Broadcasting in Denmark is controlled by a Broadcasting Council appointed by the Minister of Education and composed of 16 memberstwo representatives of the Ministry of Education, one of the Ministry of Public Works, five of parliament, two of the press and six of listeners' associations. The chairman and vice-chairman are selected from among the members, and are appointed by the Minister of Education. There is a director-general appointed by the Minister of Educa-

There are four stations in Denmark, two medium and two shortwave. All broadcast the same program. The medium wave stations are at Copenhagen and Kalundborg, and are powered at 30 and 60 kw. There is one experimental FM station, and a new shortwave station is under construction. The headquarters at Copenhagen has 16 studios, and there are studios also at Aabenraa, Aalborg, Aarhus, Esbjerg, Nykobing, Odense, Randers, Ronne and Skive, In the 10 years from 1936 to 1946, Danish listeners increased from 652,255 to 1,064,436. The broadcasting system has a total staff of 315

Australia

Australia has Class A, publiclyowned stations, operated by the Australian Broadcasting Commission, and Class B, commercial stations. The ABC has four shortwave stations for listeners in "outback" areas, but overseas shortwave is handled by Radio Australia, a division of the Commonwealth department of information, with which CBC's International Service maintains close contact. There are 134 stations in operation in Australia, 36 in capital cities. The ABC is a quasi-government institution, planned as a co-ordinated public utility, under a board of five commissioners. There is a fairly close parallel between the functions and charters of the BBC and the ABC. The total of license-paying listeners in 1947 was 1,610,000. This organization, like Canada's, exemplifies the difficulties of the large and sparsely-settled terrain, which make the dual system necessary, as neither license fees nor commercial revenue would be sufficient alone to cover the heavy costs. Australia's total area of 3,000,000 square miles is less than Canada's 3,695,000, but the conditions are similar. Individual commercial stations in Australia are under the control of the Postmaster-General. In addition to an ordinary license fee of £25 a year, the private stations are assessed five per cent of their gross earnings in any year in which they make a profit. Under the Wireless Telegraphy Act, no person, firm, or association can own more than one metropolitan station in any state, or four metropolitan stations in the Commonwealth; or four broadcasting stations of any kind in one state, or eight in the Commonwealth.

Mankind's Story **Told In Ballads**

CBC Presents Sunday Night Poetry Readings

Ever since man first learned to put words together, he has been writing about his life, his hopes and the world he lives in. Perhaps the simplest and most universal of these narratives are the ballads-rhythmic verse-stories often handed down through many generations. Beginning June 13, the CBC will present a broadcast series of readings, called The World's Great Ballads, Sundays at 9:15 p.m. MDT, on the Trans-Canada network.

Listeners are promised romance and adventure, mystery and some spine-tingling lines, for ballads deal with every phase of human activity and emotion. The first program will be made up of ballads about the supernatural, by the modern Irish poet and playwright W. B. Yeats, John Keats of 19th century British literary fame, and an early English balladeer whose name has been lost to history.

Yeats, who served the Irish Free State from 1922 to 1928 as a senator as well as contributing to Ireland's literature as a poet and playwright, wrote many of his lyrics about Irish legendry, in poetry of vague music and delicate nostalgia, Keats will be represented by La Belle Dame Sans Merci, a beautifully archaic piece about magic and "the doom of love." The ballad by the unknown author is called The Merry Pranks of Robin Good-Fellow.

The editor of this new series, who will provide listeners with informative and entertaining ballad lore, will be Lloyd Roberts, the son of the Canadian poet Sir Charles G. D. Roberts. A poet himself, and an essayist, Lloyd Roberts has written for radio and magazines, and was formerly a member of the Ottawa Press

Citizens' Forum To Confer At Regina

Each broadcast, which was carried on the national network, dealt with a different Canadian athlete who had left his mark in the annals of sport.

Part of the series was also broadcast abroad through the facilities of the International Service of the CBC.

Ghostly Drama To Lead New Series

CBC Summer Feature Will Also Include Music And Variety Programs

Some lines familiar to Toronto radio mystery fans of a decade ago will introduce a spooky CBC broadcast on Tuesday, June 15, at 7:00 p.m. MDT, 8:00 p.m. CDT, on the Trans-Canada network. Perhaps some will remember them:

In the late 30's, Rai Purdy was heard regularly in a local Toronto broadcast series, Out of the Night, which set many a listener looking apprehensively over his shoulder. Since people seem to like being scared (in the safety of their homes) the series was very successful. Hence the inclusion of the ghostly drama in the For Your Approval series.

An outstanding figure in the entertainment world for many years, Rai Purdy is also well known for the Canadian Army Shows overseas during the war. He now has his own radio production agency in Toronto.

Winning Broadcast Repeated On June 16 T. S. Eliot's Murder In The Cathedral To Be Heard Again As Wednesday Feature

A broadcast play in modern verse, Murder in the Cathedral, which was given its premier as a Wednes-Night drama feature last December, and which this year won a first award for the CBC at the Ohio State University's Institute for Education by Radio, will be presented again, this time as a recording. It will be heard June 16, at 10:00 p.m. MDT, 10:00 p.m. CDT, on the Trans-Canada network.

Adapted for radio by Lister Sinclair from a work by T. S. Eliot, Murder in the Cathedral tells in dramatic verse the story of the murder of Thomas A. Becket, Archbishop of Canterbury in the year 1170, before the altar in Canterbury Cathedral.

Judges at the Institute for Education by Radio, who reviewed program entries from both Canadian and American networks, recognized Murder in the Cathedral as a "superb adaptation for radio of a great literary work dealing with a theme of noble proportions." Judges stated that this production clearly demonstrated the dramatic power that may be had from excellent characterization and honest acting, coupled with simplicity and directness of production technique. Production was by Andrew Allan, CBC supervisor of drama.

Murder in the Cathedral will be preceded at 9:45 p.m. MDT, 7:00 p.m. CDT, by a recording of a talk on the play's relationship to general literary development after the First Great War, given by the British author and critic, Desmond Mac-Carthy, prior to the play's original performance.

Farm Broadcast Notes

Lloydminster Sale.

(The CBC's assistant Farm Broadcast commentator, Bob Knowles, attended the Fat Stock Sale at Lloydminster and the following is one of the reports he sent to Winnipeg for broadcast).

The Lloydminster Fat Stock Sale yesterday (May 24) averaged \$19.38 per pound. This was for the 175 head of club calves offered. That's a good average considering that the Grand Champion sold for only 33 cents per pound. The quality of this year's calves was uniformly good, in fact excellent, in face of the serious feed situation in the district last winter. The Grand Champion this year was a well-fed Shorthorn steer shown by Edna Thompson, of the Dewberry Club. The Reserve Champion was also a Shorthorn shown by Joan Aplin, of the Lloydminster Club.

Joan is a seasoned exhibitor at the Lloydminster shows. She won the Grand Championship in 1946 and again in 1947 and came very close to winning again this year. Edna Thompson's champion had just a bit more finish. In the sale, the champion brought 33 cents, with the reserve selling for 32 cents.

This morning Jack Buyers is judging the 160 purebred bulls and females and details on these will be sent in for the next broadcast.

Dick Painter, the warblefly expert is at this year's sale and he says only one animal was condemned in the showing for warbles. As a comparison, he says, five years ago he could have found warbles on most of the entries.

success in a farm community. For example, here's a story that came by way of Ivan Clark, Agricultural Representative at Maidston, Sask. He was reminded of it by Mrs. E. F. Friston, secretary-treasurer of the St. Walburg and district Agricultural Society.

As you know, St. Walburg is a thriving little community about one hundred miles north-west of North Battleford. In the early days, the operator of a creamery had brought quite a few dairy cattle into the district. But scrub bulls were often used and there wasn't much thought given to quality in livestock production. Before 1940 most farmers wanted large numbers of cattle but they weren't too concerned about how good they were. The accent was on quantity-not quality.

And about that time a Baby Beef Club was organized in the St. Walburg district. The University Extension Department and the Agricultural Representative, at that time John Allen, helped to establish this junior activity. Mr. R. J. Wourms was chosen as the first club leader. Mr. Wourms has since said that he wishes he had been a Baby Beef Club member in his young days. At forty he still thought that the taller an animal and the longer its legs, the better it was.

As Club Leader, he soon saw the importance of quality in cattle. And the Club members did too. In 1944 their representatives won the Saskatchewan competition and placed second in the National Club tests in Toronto. The members of that prizewinning team were Jim Webster and Louis Hardes. Jim is now attending the College of Agriculture and Louis Hardes is Secretary of the Agricultural Committee for his municipality. Last summer Jim was with the Agriculture Representative service as a Club Assistant. He went from club to club in the province, demonstrating the fitting, grooming and showing of cattle.

Well, the Junior Club was just the first step for the St. Walburg district. Interest in better quality production, developed through club activities, expanded into a wider interest in agricultural improvement. In 1945, the community held its first summer fair. Every year since then the number and variety of exhibits has increased. And a new activity was organized for this year. The Agricultural Society held its first Fat Stock Show and Sale on May 14. Here is the interesting thing about this sale. Only club members and exmembers were allowed to exhibit.

St. Walburg has an enviable record in farm progress over the past decade. In one sense this sale was a culmination of many of their activities. It was a demonstration to all of the value of quality production .-Broadcast of May 27.

The Prairie Gardener

Summary of Broadcast of June 6, 1948.

Last week the Prairie Gardener returned to the Prairie Region after spending the winter months in eastern Canada. His first point of call was the Dominion Experimental Station at Morden, Man. This visit was made the basis of comments that do not lend themselves to easy summarization. Listeners wishing information with regard to items growing on the Morden Station should address their inquiries to the Superintendent, Dominion Experimental Station, Morden, Man.

The Prairie Gardener is looking forward to renewing friendship in the Prairie Region and during the next three months hopes to visit many points of special horticultural interest to secure first hand information of value to prairie gar-

Summary of Broadcast of May 30, 1948.

More Garden Insects:

1. The health of plants must be safeguarded against insect pests and plant diseases but the gardener must never lose sight of the fact that remedies and controls are not substitutes for garden care. There is no chemical substitute for the work that must be done to maintain plants in healthy growing condition - quite apart from those measures necessary to met attacks from various plant enemies.

2. There is always risk in using chemical controls. Many ducts and sprays are dangerous to the gardener and his family. Great caution is always necessary in using killing chemicals. Chemicals carelessly used or used contrary to instructions may also harm crops.

3. The kind of chemical used must be chosen carefully in relation to the job to be done. Just as there are no magic medicines capable of curing all forms of human ills, so there is no miracle chemical to control all garden pests. Each pest and its habits and the plants it attacks must be studied to determine the particular prescribed remedy best suited to meet a particular set of conditions.

4. Root maggots attacking caband bage, cauliflower, turnips radishes can be prevented by taking action at setting out time or while plants are still small. Within a few days of setting out cabbage plants or soon after radishes are up apply a solution of corrosive sublimate or calomel. One ounce of corrosive sublimate dissolved in a little hot water should be added to ten gallons of water. Mix in an earthenware crock or glass container. Half a cupful poured around the stem of each cabbage plant is sufficient. Make three applications at weekly inter-

5. Potato "bugs" must be controlled promptly as soon as they appear. An effective dust can be prepared by mixing one part of arsenate of lime or arsenate of lead or Paris Green with ten parts of fine dust or cheap flour. Mix thoroughly in a closed container. Apply when foliage is damp. For a spray use 21/2 tablespoonfuls of the chemical to each gallon of water.

6. Spruce sawfly worms appear on spruce in late May or early June. Dust trees with derris or arsenate of lime, Pine needle scale can only be controlled when the young emerge from beneath the scales in early June. Spray with a cup of dry lime sulphur mixed with four gallons of water.

7. Blister beetles attack caragana and honeysuckles. Spray the foliage with Paris Green.

8. Rose snout beetles bore holes in rose buds. Pick and burn affected buds. When beetles attack bushes (June 15-July 15) keep flower buds and foliage well dusted with arsenate of lime dust prepared as for potato beetles. This is helpful but not fully effective.

9. Consult Dominion Entomological Laboratories at Brandon, Saskatoon and Lethbridge.

All-Delius Concert On Wednesday Night Orchestra Conducted By Geoffrey

Waddington, Frances James, Soprano Soloist

The music of Frederick Delius will be presented on CBC Wednesday Night, June 16, by a string orchestra directed by Geoffrey Waddington, with Frances James, Toronto soprano, as soloist. The broadcast will be heard at 9:00 p.m. MDT, 11:00 p.m. CDT, on the Trans-Canada network.

Frederick Delius was born in England of German stock, and although he lived most of his life in France, his music was virtually unknown there. He was mainly a self-taught composer, and his works were so characteristically English that it has been said, "Shelley, Wordsworth and Keats could not call forth the magic of the English landscape with greater certitude than Delius' music.'

Both of Delius' parents steadfastly refused ever to hear a note of his compositions because they had wanted him to follow a mercantile career. But, with a poet's soul and a musician's sensitiveness, he wasn't happy unless expressing himself in music. Though paralyzed and blinded during the 10 years preceding his death in 1934, he continued composing with the help of a fellow musician, and some of his most spirited and colourful works belong to this period.

Frances James, the soloist on the broadcast, is known for her radio performances and concert appearances in almost every Canadian city. The daughter of a Saint John, N.B., newspaper man, she moved to Montreal as a child, and studied at the McGill Conservatorium of Music, as well as in New York and Boston. She is the wife of Murray Adaskin, concert violinist.
