interest in the show. They include Zero Mostel, Jack Klugman, Agnes Moorehead, Arthur Hill, Kevin McCarthy, Celeste Holm. The name of the program will be the CBS RADIO MYSTERY THEATER. There will be 200 new episodes with 165 repeats. Apparantly the 4 major outlets, including WCBS in New York will not carry but hopefully many of the 250 other CBS stations will. NEW PROGRAMS: In or soon to be in my collection: 30 minute JACK ARM-STRONG; SUSPENSE: Kaliedescope and Another Man's Poison (from T Black); EVERYMAN'S THEATER (from Al Grossman)

MYRT AND MARGE: Myrtle Vail, co-star of MYRT AND MARGE, was born in 1888 in Joliet, Ill. At 19 she married George Damerel and the next year their daughter, Denna, was born. The 2 and later the 3 of them traveled the vaudville circuit for several years. In 1931 Myrtle conceived the idea of a new radio show. It centared around 2 sisters and their lives in show business. Myrtle played the part of the older sister, a good-hearted trooper always looking out for her younger sister, Marge, played by Donna. Sponsored by Wrigley and introduced with "Poor Butterfly," it premiered on Nov 2, .1931. It was broadcast from Chicago and in 1932 received the New York Mirror award for the most popular dramatic show on radio. It ran in the evening until 1937 when it was shifted to the daytime. Donna died in 1941 and the part of Marge was taken over by Helen Mack, but the next year the show was dropped. The f fans were outraged but it was never brought back. In 1949 a television pilot series was made but the pilot was labeled a mess by Myrtle and it never saw a TV audbence. Many actors were introduced on this show such as: Cliff Arquette, Dave Garroway, Ralph E wards, Raymond Johnson, Tyrone Power, Ed Begley...Myrtle is now living in Chicago. She has guest starred on numerous Chicago radio or TV shows and at 85 she is working on an updated TV version...(If anyone knows Myrtle Vail's address in Chicago please let me know so I can send her a copy of this)

YOO-HOO MCLLY'S BACK: (Contributed by Charles Stumpf) When she was a teenager, Gertrude Berg entertained audiences with comedy monoloques about a character she had created in her mind, whe fictional Maltke Talnitski. Years later, in 1928 whe gave the character a new name, Molly Goldberg, and a legendary radio (and later stage and TV) series was born... The RISE OF THE GOLDBERGS was first broadcast on Nov. 20, 1929 as a sustaining program. Mrs. Berg was featured as Molly and James Waters was heard as her husband, Jake. The show was sponsored by Pepsodent Co. for three years but they dropped it. Temporarily off the air, Mrs. Berg tried her hand at another series in 1935, THE HOUSE OF GLASS. It was the story of a man named Barney Glass who ran a small hotel. Joseph Buloff was featured with Mrs. Berg, who was heard as his wifem Bessie. Again sponored by the Palmolive-Peet Co. it was heard for a half hour each week. It was doing very well until a new comedy team, Burns and Allen, were scheduled opposite it and knocked them right off the air. Mrs. Berg kept herself busy by authoring another serial drana, KATE HOPKINS ... Palmolite then decided to sponsor the Goldbergs and sney returned to the air. The role of Uncle David, Molly's father's brother, was created by Menasha Skulnik who played it for 19 years. The character proved to be so popular that he was moved in permanently with the family The role was later taken over by Eli Mintz... On Feb. 26, 1948 a stage presentation about the Goldbergs, authored by Molly herself was opened. It ran for 156 performances thru July 10, 1948. A television series was started on Jan 17, 1949, and there was also a motion picture about the Goldbergs in 1951, titled simply Molly. In 1961 McGraw Hill Book Co. published Mrs. Bergs memoirs-The book is titled MCLLY AND ME. Gertrude Berg passed away on Sep 14, 1966... And now we are to have a new

Molly. On Sep 11, 1973, a new musical stage production titles MOLLY opened at Boston's Shubert Thertre. Kay Ballard was starred and Eli Mintz is featured in his role of Uncle David. The reviews, however, were not too favorable. Molly opened in New York on October 8th...

FOR NOVICE COLLECTORS

YOU NEED NOT BE OVERWHELMED BY THE STATEMENTS OF SOME COLLECTORS THAT THEY WERE "THE ORIGINAL HOBBYISTS IN OLD TIME RADIO" OR AS ONE DEALER CLAIMS (WHO WOULD NOT EVEN HAVE BEEN BORN AT THE DATE OF THE

FOLLOWING ARTICLE], THAT "THIS IS A HOBBY THAT HE CREATED." I HAVE YET TO MEET ANYONE WHO HAS BEEN COLLECTING SINCE 1938 AND I SUSPECT THAT THE HOBBY EVEN ANTEDATES 1938.

With radio rapidly becoming a vital factor in everyday life as well as a medium of entertainment, a new and growing hobby is the collection of recordings of noteworthy broadcasts. Main drawbacks to the spread of the fad is the expense involved and the difficulty of obtaining the recordings. Such collecting is at present limited

principally to insiders.

Among the notable broadcasts that provide collectors' items are the recent Mars invasion dramatization by Orson Welles, King Edward VIII's abdication, the Hindenberg Zeppelin explosion, Anthony Eden's address at the English Speaking Union meeting, last year's Ohio River flood and the New England hurricane. Others include descriptions of various sporting events, such as prizefights, football games, tennis matches, world series contests, etc. Also there are many specialized musical programs, including NBC's Toscanini Series, the CBS airings of the Sunday afternoon Philharmonic orchestra concerts, Paderewski's recent piano recital from Lausanne and the Saturday afternoon Metropolitan Opera performances, as well as various hot swing selections and noteworthy arrangements of popular tunes by name bands.

Extent of such collecting is still limited to a small circle, but has been growing lately. As a rule most of those doing the collecting are broadcast officials and performers. That does not take into consideration the performers who obtain recordings of their own programs to correct possible errors or to use as demonstrations of their work, but refers merely to those who collect transcriptions to play in their

homes for guests or other purely social reasons.

In general, recordings of broadcasts are expensive, running anywhere from \$10 for a 15-minute broadcast upwards. In cases of bootlegged or pirated recordings of big-name concert organizations, such as the NBC symphony, the Philharmonic and the Metropolitan Opera, the platters are exceptionally high priced and difficult for the uninitiated to obtain. Reason is that the selling of such recordings is contrary to copyright law and might be liable to heavy penalty. In general, therefore, only small fly-by-night outfits are engaged in the business and they operate very much on the sneak. Only a limited number of persons well known to such operators can obtain the transcriptions, even at the steep prices.

In the case of swing and similar dance transcriptions, it is a question where the law might apply. Probably almost every bandleader has recordings of many of his own most distinctive and most popular arrangements and certainly few of the leaders would object to their

rivals obtaining their recordings as collectors 'items.

One of the most complete libraries of sports broadcasts is believed to be that owned by Ted Husing.[ed. note- Does anyone know whatever became of this collection?] It includes every one of his sports broadcasts of recent seasons, including grid games, horse races, track meets, tennis matches, ball games. Spieler first studies each recording to note and correct his mistakes, then puts it in his home library for possible later social use.
