THE TAPE DECK: Howard Brenner and I have commented the last two months that catalogs should be detailed and that all programs listed should be listened to first. Here are some comments:

CRAIGE SNADER JR: "Those who put out catalogs should listen to the shows first. All programs should be identified carefully. Ideally the shows should be listed alphabetically but this would require a new relisting each time a new reel is received." (An alternative is to issue alphabetical supplements-ed.)

Ken Piletic: "All tapes in my library are listed in my catalog. The tapes listened to have a quality code. The tapes not listened to do not. It is my practice to trade for anything I don't have. When I make bulk trades I have no idea what I will be getting, except that it will be something not listed in my catalog. I agree that it would be nice to know the dates, sponsors, networks, story line, etc. before ordering a program, but in most instances this information is not available. I feel that the program name, episode name and date, if available, should adequately describe the program. Quality should also be indicated." (Some collectors only want shows complete with sponsor and network identification-hence the need for this information for these collectors. Ken is one of the very few who list programs by reel AND alphabetically-ed).

ALLAN ROCKFORD: "I agree that programs should be described as completely as possible. It also takes a long time to listen and compile the information. Almost all have us collect old shows as a hobby. and don't do it full time. If one is in the business to make money then he should be expected to have a listing with full descriptions. One way to get a full catalog is to copy someone else's description, without bothering to check it out. This is how errors get started and grow. While this saves time and work it does nothing for accuracy. Thank goodness for those people hard at work researching various shows for dates, stars, etc.

MARTY LEWIN: "It is generally impossible for high volume collectors to listen to every second of their shows. If people want to trade on this basis it is up to them and I think that most collectors realize that the catalogs of some of these high volume collectors are not accurate. On the positive side, some of these big collectors, such as Don Pellow, have done a great deal to help new collectors.

MAIL RATES: Rates are going up Jan 5th. First class: 10¢...Air Mail 13¢...post cards: 8¢...special 4th class rates: 18¢ for first pound (1 tape) 8¢ for each additional pound (tape). Third class rates are also going up. I will try to absorb this increase myself without increasing my subscription rates.

WNHC is in New Haven, Ct...WIOD, Miami, Lone Ranger and Great Gildersleeve; 6:30-7:30...WWNY, Watertown, NY; Lone Ranger, M, W, Fr at 7:30...WOUR-FM; 96.9; Utica, NY Mon at 9:00PM; National Lampoon Hour...WBNF-AM, Binghamton, NY 1290; Mon-Sat, 7:00; various shows...CBM-AM, Montreal, Can 940; Shadow; Mon, 5:00...Also on Fri at 7:30 different program every week.

TWO RADIO PIONEERS: contributed by Ray Nemece...Talking to a person who did a daily radio program back in 1921 has to be a thrill for anyone interested in oldtime radio. Well, a couple of days ago I talked to two such people and, of all places, in a city of about 4000 population...The city was Tuscola, Ill and the early radio broadcasters were Raymond Muir, 73, and Curt Marsh, 67. Both are natives of the Tuscola area; both were employees of the James L Bush grain brokerage in 1921. Mr. Bush started broadcasting grain markets from an amateur station known as 9JR. March 17, 1921 has been recognized as the official start of the broadcasts which were done 6 days a week. Later that year 9JR became WDZ, Illinois' oldest radio station...James Bush, Raymond Muir and Emory Stalker took turns doing the market reports every 30 minutes in those first few weeks. In June 1921 when school was out, Curtis Marsh joined the company. It was to be Raymond Muir and Curtis Marsh doing the reports daily for over 20 years. Mr. Marsh left during World War II to work at Indianapolis. Mr. Muir continued to broadcast the markets daily until October 1945 when WDZ, under new management, dropped the half-hour reports from the Bush office...Although both men spent most of their broadcasting doing the grain quotations, they did broadcast other programs. Mr. Muir remembers when he did the play-by-play on bridge games...In 1932 and 1933 WDZ had an act known simply as the WDZ Trio. It consisted of Smiley Burnette, Denver Darling and Earl Parker. When one was missing or they wanted a quartet, Curt Marsh was added...When WDZ moved to Decatur in 1949, Curt Marsh did a daily program from Tuscola for about 7 years. He finally left the air in 1956...Raymond Muir still works at the James L Bush offices in Tuscola, James Bush, the founder of WDZ, which for many years called itself "The Third Oldest Station in the Nation" died December 1956... Smiley Burnette is probably the most famous alumnus of WDZ but many old fans of the Grand Ole Opry will remember Lazy Jim Day and the Singing News. He started the singing news on WDZ in 1936 and the station continued to broadcast the Singing News every day for ten years...Mr. Muir and Mr. Marsh worked with many famous WDZ personalities in an era when almost all of WDZ programs were live. They can recall the difficulties with equipment. The early transmitters were built by their engineers, first by Clyde Wiley and later by Mark Spies...The whole story of WDZ

would take many pages but Raymond Muir and Curtis Marsh were broadcasting markets before any other station did. WJZ was the first station to broadcast markets in the world....and we would like to recognize them as two of radio's real pioneers.

BOTH ARE WARTIME AND AFRS MYSTERY PLAYHOUSE FORMAT; THE FIRST DATED 10/6/44 DEALING WITH NORA BEING DRUGGED AND INCLUDES AN APPEARANCE OF ITS RECURRING CHARACTER, EBENEZER WILLIAMS, SHERIFF OF CRABTREE COUNTY [PLAYED BY PARKER FENNELLY]. THE SECOND DEALS WITH A MURDER IN A MUSIC STORE CALLED "BEETHOVEN BENNY'S." ANOTHER SHOW OF INTEREST IS A THIRD NERO WOLFE ENTITLED "THE LAST LAUGH MURDER," WHICH SEEMS TO HAVE A DIFFERENT CAST THAN THE TWO PROGRAMS ALREADY IN CIRCULATION, POSSIBLY SANTOS ORTEGA AND LOUIS VITTES. A FURTHER NEW SHOW BEING CIRCULATED NOW IS A FIRST EXAMPLE OF A CRIME DOCTOR, THIS PARTICULAR ONE BEING A NETWORK PRESENTATION [COMPLETE WITH PHILLIP MORRIS COMMERCIALS AND "JOHNNY STEPPING OUT OF STORE WINDOWS ALL AROUND THE COUNTRY"] DATED MAY 20, 1945. A FINAL SHOW OF INTEREST IS ACTUALLY A PSEUDO-DETECTIVE DRAMA ENTITLED "TIME TO KILL" FROM TALES OF FATIMA ON MAY 28, 1949. IT STARS THE SHOW'S HOST, BASIL RATHBONE, AS HIMSELF [AND SPOOFING ALL HIS PREVIOUS DETECTIVE ROLES] ATTEMPTING TO SOLVE HIS OWN "MURDER." THIS WAS SOMEWHAT OF A DEPARTURE FROM THE SHOW'S USUALLY MORE SERIOUS [BUT OFTEN POORLY DONE] DRAMATIC FORMAT.
