IN FOND MEMORY: John Harrington, 66, Sep 17. Mr. Harrington was a wellknown spots and news broadcaster in Chicago for over 35 years. Walter Brennan, 80, Sep 21. Brennan was in 4 TV series: REAL MCCOYS, TYCOON, GUNS OF WILL SONNETT, TO ROME WITH LOVE...Claudia Morgan, Sep 17, 62. She was the daughter of Ralph Morgan and niece of Frank Morgan. Miss Morgan was Nora Charles on THE THIN MAN and played Carolyn Kramer on THE RIGHT TO HAPPINESS...Warren Hull, Sep 14, 71. Hull was best known as the emcee on STRIKE IT RICH on radio and TV. In 1941 he was co-interviewer with Parks Johnson on Vox Pop...Cliff Arquette, Sep 23, 68. Born in 1905 he quit school at 14 to go into show business. He played in a band and then went into vaudeville. He did his first radio show with Fred Astaire and later worked with Burns and Allen, Fibber McGee and Molly, J Benny, R Vallee and others. One of his early radio characterizations was the zany Mrs. Wilson heard on Glamour Manor and on the Dick Haymes program. He held the unique record of appearing on 13 different radio programs in a single day. In 1953 he introduced Charlie Weaver on the Dennis Day Show and later took it onto the Jack Paar and Hollywood Squares TV shows. An expert wood carver and authority on American history, he had a museum of hand-carved figures tracing the historical development of military dress in the US.....

Barbara Jo Allen (Vera Vague) was born in New York and went to school at Stanford in California. She studied 5 languages. Miss Allen first appeared on stage in London and later on Broadway in such plays as Shanghai Gesture and the Trial of Mary Dugan. In 1933 she joined NBC in San Fran. as an actress. Her first role was the lead in Carlton E. Morses's "The Witch of Endor." She was later heard on HAWTHORNE HOUSE, DEATH VALLEY DAYS, ONE MAN'S FAMILY. In the late 30's she created her hilarious spinster character "Vera Vague" for a radio staff party. Miss Allen was soon being featured in that role on the Signal Gasoline program and later brought the character to the Bob Hope show as a regular, blowing with "Professor" Jerry Colonna. Vera was a frantic, man-chasing, raspy-voiced screwball who always wore antediluvian headgear and outlandish clothers. It was a far cry from Miss Allen's real life personality -- as a smartly dressed, soft spoken brunette, with natural wavy raven black tresses and large brown eyes. She starred in many shorts and two-reelers as well as appeared in several feature films. Her second husband was Burton Yarborough. Barbara Jo Allen died on Sep 14, age unreported.

I doubt that Duncan Renaldo ever did the part on radio. Ziv still has the rights to the radio property as far as I know."

From Jim Blythe, 170 Walters Ave, Merrillville, Ind 46410; I have read with much interest the different views of bulk collecting vs. audited collecting and the supposed bitterness involved. Actually it is natural for one to have resentment at the boasts made by the volume collectors (of numbers)...for example it took me 140 hours to edit the some 30 reels of South American material that is now in circulation. The double track and double speed artists can dub this in a little over 30 hours... I spent over 40 hours editing the 1950 Johnson Family series which the speed artist can duplicate in a little over 3 hours... I don't know about other collectors but it takes me

half a day to dub two hours from discs...There seems to be two areas of resentment: the audited type collector resents the boastings of numbers by the volume collector and volume collector often resents the refusal of a trade by a person with rated shows...Remember there are two types of people in this world: those that believe there are two types of people and those who don't (that's a joke). However there does seem to be room for everyone in the hobby.....((I have covered this topic in great depth for several issues. With this article the topic will remain closed for a while-ed.))

TARZAN AND THE DIAMOND OF ASHAIR: This was the second Tarzan series on radio and actually did not appear in print until 1938 in Argosy magazine under the title "The Red Star of Tarzan" and then as the book Tarzan and the Forbidden City. The radio series was done four years earlier. Episode #1 first aired May 14, 1934. It was produced and directed by Fred Shields (father in Meet Corliss Archer). Cast included: Narrator: John McIntire..Helen Gregory; Karena Shields ..Brian Gregory; George Turner..Anton Tohome; Cy Kendall..Wolf: Vic Rodman..Magra: Jeanette Nolan..Tarzan: Carlton Kadell;.d'Arnot: Ralph Scott..Lal Taask; Donald Wilson..Larson: Victor Totel.
