More discs came my way and they are still marked with a D. If I know of one or two generation tapes (tapes that have gone through less than 3 recorders) they are starred (*). I am looking in particular for certain programs and I will list several each month. If dates or information about a program are incorrect please call it to my attention. I will be trading this summer - in fact I will have more time than usual, so keep the wants coming in. When you order throw in a few 15 minute programs that I can use as fillers in case enough time is left on the reel.

Highlights of this supplement are: May bands, Avenger, Sherlock Holmes, Big Town, The Big Show, South African programs, Cinnamon Bear, Dimension X, Fred Allen, Gunsmoke, Jack Benny, Suspense, X-1.
