DEATHS: Several personalities died during July. In music, besides Louis Armstrong, Ted Fio Rito died at the age of 70. A well-known band leader of the 30's and 40's he also composed "Charley My Boy" and "Toot Toot Tootsie." Carleton Young died at 64. He was well known at the COUNT OF MONTE CHRISTO and ELLERY QUEEN. Clifford Goldsmith, creator of THE ALDRICH FAMILY died at 72. Jack Hurdle died at 62. He was the director of many programs including BETTY AND BOB, PORTIA FACES LIFE, JUNIOR MISS. Cliff Edwards died at 76. He sold 74 million records. Also dead is Van Heflin at 60. Among other things he appeared in the SUSPENSE plays Song of My Heart 8/26/48; Three O'Clock 3/10/49; and The Shot 10/12/53. Also dead is Bill Thompson at 58 who appeared as many characters on FIBBER McGEE AND MOLLY. He was an excellent mimic and was an expert at dialect, having some knowledge of 19 foreign languages. I received a note from Hal Peary who attended the funeral. Among those in attendance were Edgar Bergen, Jim Jordan, Johnathan Winters and many others. Ray Bolger did the eulogy and Dennis Day sang "Danny Boy," one of Bill's favorites.

Also dead is Henry Hink, Bob Burn's adopted uncle and inventor of the bazooka. James O'Neal had an interview with Hink about 3 weeks be-

fore he died. The tape of the interview will soon be available.

He was 32 at the time and had already been in vaudville for 18 years. Anderson't career with Benny lasted about 30 years. Today Eddie Anderson is retired with ex-

tensive realestate holdings.

Also in the 8/8/71 edition of the Enquirer Yale professor James Barber says the man who projects the best "father image" will be elected president in 1972. Franklin Roosevelt, says Barbar, was a father president. The nation was in turmoil. People were frustrated, insecure and fearful of the future. Roosevelt's famous radio FIRESIDE CHATS project-

ed a warm, loving, family feeling.
PERSONALITIES: I received letters from three radio personalities last month. Hal Peary wrote me about Bill Thompson as mentioned before. Parker Fennelly wrote from his home in New York. He mentions that kenny Delmar, Minerva Pius, Pete Donald, and Parker Fennelly himself participated in a filmed television program devoted to the Fred Allen Programone of a number of segments pertaining to old time radio to be used by Educational Television (Channel 13, New York) in December.

Rosa Rio wrote a nice letter in appreciation for the article about her a few issues back. She is still giving many organ concerts as well

as teaching.

THE TAPE DECK: Roger Hill says: When taping transcriptions, wipe them with a soft cloth first, then wipe them with a damp cloth. Then while the ET is on the turntable, spray the surface with water in the stylus's path. It removes many pops and clicks, etc. Also be sure the amplifier has no loose tubes. Terry Black says: Often when you record on a 2-headed machine it doesn't give the proper playback levels for a 3-headed machine. If you have a 3-headed recorder and get programs that are on the soft side this may be the only reason. Just ask the dubber to increase the volume. Fred Dickey says about doublespeeding: Using a Heathkit cathode ray oscilliscope and an audio signal generator he tested both his Sony's. Without going into the technical results he sums up by saying that a copy originally made at 3 3/4 remains the same, essentially, in quality whether or not subsequent copies are doublespeeded or not. When he tried this on a cheap Airline he could definately generate and hear the squeal Tom Rockey mentioned last month ... I personally feel this is purely a personal decision. Try doublespeeding a good program. Then dub the same program at regular speed. Listen to both dubs. What you do then depends on whether you can hear a difference. (ed.) Tom Rockey says about tape: When he received his first shipment of DAK tape he found it dirty, low in output, and the reels were overful. Tom suggests Bell and Howell American, 1800 feet, mylar. He says it gives 100% output for input. No dropout or other problems. And it's only 99¢. Write to Palmer Electronics, 3560 North High, Columbus, Ohio ...

I've noticed many traders are beginning to trade by the reel or at least by the track. In most instances it's because of a saving in time.

What are your thoughts on this?

COLLECTORS: I've had several letters concerned about certain collectors who are apparently dishonest or never respond to letters or inquiries. I mentioned this last month and have a suggestion. How about an extensive list of traders recommended by all of you, similar to the list prepared by the RHSA, which unfortunately is now out of print. I can't do this unless I get your help and cooperation. This list won't be people I trade with or subscribers of this magazine necessarily. It will contain people all of you trade with. PLEASE send me the names and addresses of folks you have traded with or now trade with that you would recommend. This would probably be most or all of the people you trade with. Indicate those people who have rather large collections and/or do little trading except for certain people or unless some new material comes to light. Last month I asked all of you to send in detailed information about yourselves. I received exactly one letter. Perhaps this is to be expected. If I get a good response I will print the list of traders. If you don't think this is a good idea or isn't worthwhile let me know also. I'm trying to find the things that interest most traders and will find the time to do things YOU want.

For those that buy programs: It would be well to check out ANYONE you buy from, especially those outfits without a person's name and just a box number. It's almost impossible to reach them by phone. Write or call someone who lives near them or write or call one of the newsletters. I am getting names of people that are not recommended and will pass

the information on on an individual basis.

In the comics/sf/pulps field, according to Steve Lewis, the publisher of Stan's Weekly Express, an advertising publication awards a WE Seal of Approval to dealers and collectors who abide by an established code of practice. He also operates the WE Reporting Bureau to handle complaints and has followed through extremely efficiently in a couple of cases of mail fraud.

AN OPEN LETTER TO ALL COLLECTORS

After one year of systematic trading, I think that the following views are pretty pertinent. I believe that this is probably the most rewarding and least expensive of all the hobbies that I know. By and large the backbone of this hobby is represented by teachers, professors, doctors, lawyers, and many wonderful people who are too young to remember golden radio ... I honestly believe that most collectors are just wonderful people and will do anything for another collector friend. This hobby which is based on mutual trust has mushroomed to an unbelievable degree... Unfortunately there are many problems that I'm throwing open for comments. My first and foremost is being ignored by a fellow collector for a long period of time or not to get a reply at all to correspondence. There is nothing more aggrevating than waiting indefinately for as little as a card. (This is one of my chief gripes. Anyone who trades and/or writes newsletters must be willing to answer letters, even if it is just to say they are too busy to trade. The only time when answers aren't necessary is when you get unsolicited catalogs with NO personal message, not even how the person got your name. When writing to new people mention how you heard of them. ed.) I have traded with over 60 different collectrs and except for people like I found that everyone is very honest. Time delays are inevitable under extenuating circumstances and mail does get lost.

The second great problem is that there isn't a uniform grading system like in coins and stamps. In many cases faulty equipment produces flaws which then are circulated. I've traded 5 times for a SUSPENSE show, the Sisters and finally was able to get a decent program from Jay Hickerson. It all depends how critical one is as all copies were bassy and distorted. However, it seems that all the copies around were copied from each other. I have yet to find a copy of SUSPENSE, The Imposters that doesn't have a hum in it... I realize that catalogs are graded according to the owner's interpretation but how many shows are really overgraded. In closing let me remind you that the different shows were created in the fertile minds of the world's greatest writers and many are classics. New

material is constantly coming to light and it's a wonderful feeling to belong to a fraternity that shares old time radio...I want to thank all the collectors who have traded and tolerated me. I won't mention names as the list would cover a whole page but I'll be eternally grateful to Roger Hill for his guidance, help, programs, and comments always constructive and candid. Thank you, one and all...I wish you'd send in your ideas to Jay on how to upgrade and police this hobby. I don't agree that black listing is the answer except in the case of a real crook or an outright thief who preys on the innocent collector.

NETWORK RADIO

In this section from now on will be additions and corrections to my booklet on network radio. From Don Koehnemann comes information on CLARA, LU, and EM: Clara, Lu, and Em was a homey, topical, and humorous radio serial which originated from Chicago. he idea for this series was conceived by three sorority sisters at Northwestern University. For their plots they drew on the news of the day tied to the everyday life situations of "typical mid-America" families. Their characterizations as unsophisticated, ungrammatical "small Town" ladies made their political and other topical commentary all the more appealing to their nation wide audiences... Clara, Lu, and Em began as daily serial in 1930 on WGN and the NBC network and it ran until 1937. CBS revived it in 1942. In 1945 the program ended because, as Mrs. Helen Aing Mitchell (Em) said, the country became so serious about topical and political humor that it became impossible to write our spontaneous brand of it. " Clara was played by Louise Startey Mead; Lu by Isabelle Carothers Berolzheimer; Em by Helen King Mitchell. The organist for most of the series was Porter Heaps. The sponsors in the 30's were Palmorive and Super Suds. For the 40's it was Pillsbury.

Through the graciousness of the family of Mrs. Mitchell, who died in 1970, several recordings of the program have been made available in tape copies. Don has these copies and is making them available for trade. The quality is generally very good-very understandable. After listening to them I've decided they are the Will Rogers of the female set. Don has 4 complete programs of the 30's and excepts of 8 programs of the 40's. I highly recommend them. Write to Don Aconnemann for details as to how to get them. Please enclose a stamped envelope.

> THE CINNAMON BEAR contributed by TERRY BLACK

In case you missed that great listening experience back in the late 1940's, here is a brief resume. The syndicated serial was 26 episodes in length and was aired by various stations throughout the country. I heard the program several years in a row from Chicago when it was sponsored by Wiebolt's Department Store... The story concerns Judy and Jimmy Barton who search for the family's silver star which goes on top of their Christmas tree. They discover that the star has disappeared from the attic. Through happenings most magical they are lead by the Cinnamon bear into Maybeland in quest of the ornament. The benevolent villain, the Crazy Wuilt Dragon, the Wintergreen Witch, Fe Fo the friendly giant, Queen Melissa, and Santa Claus himself are but a few of the colorful characters the children encounter... In the early 1960's radio station WSOY in Decatur, Illinois, rebroadcast the series. The discs were found in the station basement. I was fortunate enough to tape all 26 episodes off the air and put them into circulation among collectors...Nothing concrete was known about the origin of the show, its production crew, and the cast of characters. I was able to contact Frank Nelson (Yeess-J Benny) whose voice I thought was Captain Tin Top. Mr. Nelson, who is married to Veola Vonn, the former Mrs. Hanley Stafford, contacted Bud Hiestand who narrated the show and between the two of them put together most of the details which they mailed back to me. The 77-year-old comedian was awarded a miniature Liberty Bell Wednesday, Aug 11 and was described as the most frugal man since Benjamin Franklin...Got another note from Hal Peary who says he and Walter "Leroy" Tetley recently taped a "voice over" for a new Keebies cookie. Hal is the scoutmaster and Walter is a scout named Leroy. He mentions that Walter Tetley was ill for nearly a year after a motorcycle accident, is walking again, but not fully up to par.

Henry C. Hink, the legendary "Uncle Hink" of radio comedian Bob Burns, died on July 15 in Van Buren, Arkansas at the age of 84. He had been in declining health for several years...Often referred to by Burns in his Table chows. Uncle Hink is best remembered as the inventor of the bazooka musical instrument (see "Hello Again" Vol 2 No 5)played by Burns. Mr. Hink was also mentioned in several of Burns' movies...Only a few weeks before his death Mr. Hink consented to an interview from his sickbed with this writer. He recounted several events in Burns' life and supplied information about his career as a radio performer...Mr. Hink recalled that he was the only resident of Burns' Van Buren that actually existed. Aunt Boo, Grandpa Snazzy, and others mentioned by Burns were strictly fictitious...Mr. Hink was actually related to Burns "about half uncles or something like that" as he puts it...This writer is in the process of transcribing the facts in that interview with Uncle Hink to paper and a story should be forthcoming in a later issue of "Hello Again." An edited version of the taped conversation with Mr. Hink is also being prepared and will be made available to interested collectors.

Just received special issue of Stan's Weekly Express. For those interested in trading, selling, or buying pulps, comics, and other related items it is a must. \$1.00 for 4 weekly issues. (Stan's weekly Express, Box 207-Daytonview Station, Dayton, Ohio 45406). This issue had a lengthy article on mail fraud. This occurs much more often in the pulp and comic field because of the amount of money involved and the number of transactions. Stan runs a reporting bureau (fee \$3.00 a year) which runs down complaints in the magazine field. I would offer these suggestions for us radio buffs, some already mentioned. 1. Try not to trade or buy from someone unless he has been recommended, or mentioned in one of the newsletters as willing to trade or sell. 2. Write to one of the editors of the various newsletters to find out about unknown sellers and traders. I am beginning to keep a list of people deemed undesirable by others collectors. These are people who don't fulfill their part of a trade, trade sloppy material and ignore follow-ups, sell sloppy material and do not follow-up on complaints. 3. Be careful of titles and Box numbers. While most are reputable it is impossable or at least very difficult to call a box number, especially if there is no name. 4. If you feel you are gypped contact me or one of the other magazines if they are interested. If we know the people we might try contacting them for you... I would welcome thoughts on this matter, as the answer is not an easy one. Also perhaps the issue is not that great in the radio field because of the infrequency of the problems.
