DEATHS: Carl Frank, 63, Sep 24. Carl was a member of Orson Welles's Mercury Theater company. He also announced THIS IS YOUR FBI and THE MAP OF TIME.

CHARLES CORRELL: Two white men in blackface, drawling thick Harlem accents into the radio microphone, created a landmark in the history of US broadcast entertainment .. AMOS AND ANDY ... In the 1930's the nation would slow almost to a halt when, at 8PM each night, Charles Correll and Freeman Gosden enacted their version of life in Harlem. Correll, who played Andy with a mineshaft-deep bass voice, died Tuesday, Sep 26 of a massive stroke. He was 82... He was in Chicago where the series originated to attend the dinner that radio station WGN, where it all began, gave for him every few years. "I feel a tremendous sense of personal loss," said Gosden from his home in Palm Springs, Cal. "We were partners for 32 years and friends for 50. It's a rare partnership that lasts that long in the business wereorked in. " .. Amos N' Andy went on the air in 1928 and in the 1960s moved to television with an allblack cast replacing its white creators. But the civil rights movement was gathering strenght then, and many blacks felt the show ridiculed them. After 100 episodes and a protest from the NAACP, the show was discontinued, although reruns were still being shown as late as 1965. Correll wasn't ashamed of the show, saying he and Gosden were laughing with Blacks, not at them. "I know the Negores have had a tough time lining their lives and I'm for any gain they can make constructively, " he once said ... Born in Peoria, Ill., Correll was originally a bricklaye and once said he got into show business because he had to quit work

for 6 months of the year anyway because of the cold Illinois winters. He teamed up with Gosden, a former tobacco salesman from Richmond, Va in 1918 and they presented amateur shows. "We got to know Negores and and their entertainment. Sometimes we even wore blackface ourselves in minstrel shows when the end men failed to show up, "Correll once said...When they were offered a chance to do a serial on WGN in 1928, it seemed natural to them to do it in the same black dialect they had used on stage. The show rose in popularity, first was on NBC then CDS.

WILLIAM BCYD: There have been 16 different Tarzens, 6 Lone Rangers, 2 Supermen, 3 sets of Batmen and Robins and a litter of Lassies. But there could be only one Hopalong. William Boyd, who made Hopalong Cassidy a fixture of the early days of television died late Tuesday night, Sep 13, He was 74. Boyd was the first of the Western actors to foresee the riches that could be made in television and parlayed a series of cheap movies made years before into one of television's biggest hits worth millions of dollars. He so identified the black-clad, silver haired Hopalong with himself that no other actor could take over and after he retired he refused to give interviews for fear children would see he was not the saintly knight of the sagebrush he played... Boyd became a multimillionaire by getting 66 old Hopalong Cassidy films he made shown on television. In 1952-53 with Gabby Hayes he made 26 Hopalong episodes for television.

FEATURE ARTICLE: MORE ON THE SHADOW BY John Warden Radio's greatest Man of Mystery can trace his origin back to the February 1929 issue of "Fame and Fortune," a Street & Smith pulp magazine based on high finance and the stock market. Author George C. Jenk had been commissioned to write a novel for the issue and came up with "The Shadow of Wall Street" in which Compton Moore became the Shadow, a green-hooded figure with "Awful, glittering eyes" and "A strange, mocki" laugh," ti wage a battle against the crooked financiers and swindlers of the market. Although the character proved immensely popular, the stock market crash provided its ultimate demis. Then, in 1930, Street & Smith sponsored a OBS Thursday might radio show called STREET & SMITH DETECTIVE STORY MAGAZINE HOUR. The 30 minute program was narrated by a haunting voice that introduced each drama and revealed news at the end about the forthcoming issue of the sponsor's magazine. The voice, known only as The Shadow, caught on and, in order to protect their property, S & S decided to copyright the character in its own magazine... and so in March of 1931, the first issue of "The Shadow Magazine" was released with a novel by Maxwell Grant (Actually Walter Gibson) titled "The Living Shadow." It was then revealed that The Shadow in the story was the same Shadow that broadcast the radio program. On Jan 5, 1932, the show officially became "The Shadow" and was heard Tuesdays at 10:00 EST on CBS for 5 weeks: 1/5/32 "Dynamite Moll"; 1/12/32 "Wee Willie's Ghost;" 1/19/32 "Turn of the Tide; " 1/26/32 "Friday the 13th; " and 2/2/32 (Title unknown.). On Oct 5, 1932, "The Shadow" switched to the NBC Red network and was broadcast until April 26, 1933 on Wednesdays at 8:00, later at 8:30. The mood of the program is best expressed by the following ad from "The New York Times" 9/25/32: "The Shadow Reappears -- The mystery voice of the air, bringing more tales of the strange, the weird and macabre, again makes its appearance with the stage set for Oct 5 at 8 PM. These original mystery stories dealing with baffling occurrences in all parts of the owrld, center around the sinister presence of the Shadow whose identity remains unknown." ... Not yet having reached the desired audience, the program remained off the air until Oct 1, 1934, when it returned to CBS to be broadcast Mondays and Wednesdays at 6:30. With its return the program changed its format so that The Shadow was no longer the mysterious villain and yet he had still not attained the formula that would prove so successful in 1937; He was still no more than a narrator, much in the vein of a later radio development, THE WHISTLER. One interesting feature of this season, however, was the use of The Shac ow's secret code. Radios of "The Shadow Magazine" are familiar with his method of transmitting orders to his operatives. He would take a phone call of radio breadcast and emphasize certain important words. The stressed words, when removed from the context of the rest of the message would compose the instructions). From "The Shadow Magazine" (11/ 1/34, The Chinese Disks), the following excerpt shows how this was adapted to the radio show: "THE SHADOW SPEAKS. Over the air, twice a

week, the Shadow cries out his challenge to crime...Listen to his voice, hear his wierd laugh...and from the closing announcement of each program learn his message which he sends to all Shadow readers and Shadow Club followers. Catch the emphacised words, as the agents of the Shadow do when on the trail of crime. Then check yourself by the decoded messages which will be printed on this page every issue...The Shadow said: On Mon. Oct 1, "Crime does not pay"...On Wed., Oct 3: "The Law is just"...This

format continued until the series ended on March 27, 1935. When the format was altered in 1937, making the Ahadow a hero with a secret identity and "the power to cloud men's minds," many characters were culled from the highlt successful pupl novels and added to the program in an attempt to provide a basis to familiarize the series to the m many readers of "The Shadow Magazine." Commissioner Weston, Instector Joe Cardona, Moe "Shrevie" Shrevnitz, reported Clyde Burke and secret service operative Vic Marquette all found their way into the broadcasts, although most of them had to suffer norm share and the service operation. although most of them had to suffer many changes in the process. As far as I know, only Margo Lane had the distinction of being created solely for the radio show and then later making her way into the magazine. From 1937 to late 1939, The Shadow's powers were enlarged in their scope to include mental telepathy, super-ventriloquism and an ability to enter into a state of suspended animation. These extra abilities tere frequently used and provided for many interesting stories. As in the pulps The Shadow also made frequent use of a short wave transmitter to get instruction to Margo. In fact, he often lugged the device (invisibly, of course) with him on his missions against the forces of evil ... After the fame of his "War of the Worlds" broadcast became too much for Orson Welles to remain in the role of The Shadow, a search was immediately started for a replacement. Since there was very little time involved, the role was placed in the capable hands of actor Bill Johnstone who had played many supporting parts in the series since 1937. Johnstone first portrayed The Shadow at the end of 1938 and went on until april 16, 1944. Agnes Moorehead continued in the role of Margo Lane for the remainder of the 38-39 season and was then replaced by Marjorie Anderson, another experienced member from the supporting cast. From Sept. 24, 1944 to April 15, 1945, The Shadow was played by John Archer with Marforie Anderson continuing her role as Margo. Steve Courtleigh and Laura Mae Carpenter played the heroic couple for about 2 months in 1945 (9/9/45-10/21/45) to be replaced on Oct. 28, 1945 by Bret Morrison and Lesley Woods. Although Morrison remained in the role until the last broadcast of the series, Lesley Woods was later replaced by Gertrude Warner and Grace Matthews. (This and the article contributed by Pat Murray in the September issue give as a complete history and background of The Shadow that I have seen anywhere ed)

Unfortunately, most antenna installers and salesmen of Hi-Fi equipment are under the misimpression that for local reception all one needs is either an indoor TV rabbit-cars or a simple 300 ohm Dipole made out of wire: For fringe reception (which many sadly misinformed "experts" claim to be not more than 60 to 75 miles) what is recommended

is the sharing of your TV anterma.

Just to set the record straight, unless it is not possible to erect an outdoor antenna, an inside antenna should never be used for reception unless someone is only concerned about a few local mono signals.
For clear stereo reception, an outside antenna is a MUST. In fact only a Fh Yagi should be used. If you have stations in two (2) markedly different directions, two (2) Yagis should be used with a switch at your set. If there are desired stations in more than two(2) directions, then a good quality Tagi should be used along with a rotor. The more elements that the Yagi has, the better (they come in 3, 4, 5, 6, 8, 10, and 12 element configurations).

Stick to a name brand, don't use a mongrel such as Archer. I know from the sad experience of a neighbor how inferior the Archer brand of Yagi is. Your Yagi should be as high as possible, and if you are in an area which has much electronic interference, a 75 ohn down lead is recommended. In fact, if the new RG-6/U cable is used, there will be less loss in 100 feet of this lead-in cable than in 100 feet of 300 ohm cable; these cables have true 100 pergent shielding against line pickup. This new cable that I refer to uses a foam irmer insulation, and

the shield is a solid sheath of aluminum.

Should for one reason or another you need much more than 100 feet of lead-in cable, an antenna mounted pre-amplifier is recommended. There are only a few such units made. All of the tests that I have performed have indicated that all but one brand will overload if you have one or more FM stations who's transmitters are within 10 to 15 miles of you, If you have any specific questions or would like to know where to get the antennae that I recommend, feel free to write to me.

The FM antenne that I recommend the most is the Model FM-4, FM-5, and FM-12 as manufactured by the Finney Company of Bedford, Ohio. The

Channel Master Stereo Probe is also a good antenna.

There are two (2) excellent FM pre-amplifiers that are available. One is the Blonder-Tongue Model CLA, and the other is manufactured by a company known as JFD and it is their Model SP 2888. The JFD will not overload, from high input (local) signals, where as the Blonder-Tongue might. If you have trouble in obtaining any of these items, drop me a line as I can get many of them for you for wholesale.

Before ending this column, I must comment on distant FM reception. With the good quality antennae and low loss lead-in cables that are available today, combined with a good quality tuner; good stereo reception can probably be gotten at a distance of up to either 50 to 100 miles and mono reception from between 60 to 120 miles in an average location depending on whether the stations are low powered (3000 watts or less) or high powered (over 3000 watts). In fact with many of today's FM stations operating with 50,000 wattsl good dependable stereo reception is not unusual for distances up to 125 or even 150 miles.

I sincerely hope that this month's column has been of hite to many of you. As you know, many of the old shows are being run today on FM stations and some of the taping I have heard is terrible, usually due to poor antenna systems. If you have any questions, Please Write.
