REMINISCING: From Hello Again, February, 1972: The Radio Collectors of America from the Boston area is embarking on a very worthwhile project. It is called "The Carlton E. Morse Radio Programs for the Blind." The group is presently making arrangements to donate copies of programs to the head librarian for the talking book records in the area. (Can you update this project?)...J. David Goldin was the subject of a rather lengthy article in the Jan 8, 1972 issue of the "National Observer." To quote 3 sentences: "One obviously happy lady in Florida has already ordered \$11,000 worth of old-time radio shows. The tapes, usually including the commercials, sell for \$10 for an hour's recording. 'She hasn't even scratched the surface of what we've got,' says Golden as he riffles through the clutch of morning mail...New Friends included Harold Cox, John Gatto, Bob Proctor, Dudley Sherill...The Paul Harvey News on ABC got renewed for the 19th consecutive year. (He is still going strong. He is the most listened to network show today.)

Collector of the Month: Bob Proctor is 23, single, from Clinton, MI and has 1200

shows. Most come from AFRS discs. Bob is also a good cartoonist.

(From **Don Koehnemann**) On November 5th, 1939, **Ballad for Americans** had its first stirring performance over the Pursuit of Happiness Program. Paul Robeson's performance of the work stirred the studio audience as well as untold thousands of listeners into applause rarely equaled. In its November 20th issue Time reported: "In the studio, an audience of 600 stamped, shouted, bravoed for 2 minutes while the show was still on the air and for 15 minutes later. In the next half hour 150 telephone calls managed to get through CBS's jammed Manhattan switchboard. The Hollywood switchboard was jammed for 2 hours. In the next few days bales of letters demanded words, music, recordings, another time at bat for Balled For Americans." A second performance on the air was made. Arrangements were made to have the great Negro bass, Paul Robeson, record the Ballad for Victor, with The People's Chorus.

(From Evan MacBride) Worthing Gibson pointed out in an article "Radio Horror; for Children Only," in American Mercury, July, 1938 that youngsters were becoming neurotic impressionables from listening to the Children's Radio Hour and urged the parents to do something about it. She stated that the adult knows the difference between truth and fiction (War of the Worlds hadn't aired yet) but the child may not...Mrs. Gibson concluded her article by citing a case of mental disorder where a young boy heard a program involving a corpse, 2 ghosts, a haunted castle and an ogre-like monster with one flaming eye. Her suggestion for this vice was to throw the radio out of

the window. The editor suggested "How about turning it off."

(Also courtesy of **Evan MacBride**) from Child Study Magazine, April, 1933: Programs rated poor for children by teachers and parents included Chandu, The Shadow, Marx Brothers, Little Orphan Annie, Myrt and Marge, Skippy. "Well, whoever believe in ratings anyway," commented the editor.

YOU AND THE LAW: (From an article in the March 26th, 1933 issue of the New York Times)

Radio and Copyrights: Radio material, both dramatic and that of a musical na-

ture, as well as programs combining music and dialog, may be copyrighted under the copyright law of 1909. No special provisions were made for radio at that time, of course, so radio material

is classified under several different categories.

"Dialog with dramatic action" may be registered in manuscript form, according to the copyright office of the Library of Congress, in the "dramatic composition" class. In "non-dramatic" cases, it has been permissible in some instances to register material in the category of lectures or addresses prepared for oral delivery. Material actually published in book form may be registered in the book classification. Unpublished "dramatic musical compositions" may be copyrighted before they have been used in broadcasting. (No wonder it is difficult to determine if a show is copyrighted)
