Everywhere I read lately in OTR fanzines, I see pleas for fans to subscribe and support the fanzines. One fellow even claims that it will only cost the collector about \$5 a month to subscribe to all of the good

fanzines running today.


Being a member of the "skinflint" collectors---you know, those who buy Shamrock, DAK, or Capitol---and being a teacher, I just can't afford to keep my "habit" in a royal fashion. I doubt if the average collector can shuck out \$10 a month there, \$12 here, \$7.50 over there, and a chunk every now and then for tape and still keep his budget in hand.

The average collector is probably a family man who has talked his

wife into letting him buy at least two new or used recorders (and the Ms. can't understand why on earth you need two!). He's got kids who listen to his tapes (or if they're really small, play with the tape).

Mr. Average Collector must watch his pennies. He must look at each fanzine with a critical eye and decide if that zine fits his particular interest and is worth the \$1.00 or \$1.25 or \$2.00 that is being asked for it. Launching a new OTR magazine is a gamble and the editors should realize that collectors aren't a bunch of fish who snap up fanzines on any hook. They are people with limited budgets who must pick and choose with care...

Recently got an issue of The Big Bandwagon published by Roselle Scaduto, 3055 Hull Avenue, Bronx, NY 10467. For \$1.25, you get_four



pages of information on Tommy Dorsey, Martha Tilton, Bing Crosby (done far, far better in Memories), a quiz corner, and an ad or two. Unless this fanzine grows in size, I really don't think this kind of price can be asked for it. If I showed it to the graphic arts de-partment at our school, I think the kids would probably want to put out their own fanzine and charge \$1.25, too. Maybe a <u>year</u> from now the <u>BB</u> will be <u>Bigger</u> and Better.

An interesting book I picked up recently is <u>There's Laughter in</u> the Air by Jack Gauer and Dave Stanley, Written in 1943, the book discusses the best radio comedians of the day and gives sample scripts. One of Fred Allen's TOWN HALL TONIGHT broadcasts is condensed for the reader and features Jimmy Wallington, Portland Hoffa, and the THT gang. Other scripts include: BOB HOPE SHOW, JACK BENNY SHOW, EDGAR BERGEN AND CHARLIE MC-CARTHY, FIBBER MCGEE & MOLLY (the old mandolin show), DUFFY'S TAVERN, EDDIE CANTOR, ABBOTT & COSTELLO, AMOS & ANDY, ED WYNN, BABY SNOOKS,

MILTON BERLE. COLONEL STOOPNAGLE AND BUDD (with a Buffalo biography, no less), EASY ACES, BURNS & ALLEN, PHIL BARER, THE GREAT GILDERSLEEVE (hee hee hee hee). DURANTE & MOORE, JOAN DAVIS, JACK KIRKWOOD, and, finally, Raymond Knight's THE CUCKOO HOUR.

You know, I've read some of Chuck Seeley's remarks about Stoopnagle & Budd being a Buffalo show, but I had never read anything about the show. According to <u>There's Laughter in the Air</u>, F. Chase Taylor and Budd Hulick started their careers when a CBS line broke down and they had to fill the gap with some conversation. The conversation lasted for 20 years or so. The station was WMAK. Does it still exist in Buffalo? Editor, note

Taylor originally hit radio with NIP AND TUCK over WMAK in 1925 for the Buffalo Broadcasting Corporation. He served as an actor, continuity writer, announcer, production man, and probably janitor for the lit-

tle station.

Fred Allen called Stoopnagle the "Titan of Trivia --- the number one pin-up boy of the nation's psycho wards..." And he belongs to Buffalo... ((Jealous. -- CAS))

One comic I had never heard of until I found OTR is Al Pearce. I picked up a whole reel of his "Dole" season---1939-40---when he was swigging Dole Pineapple juice and I found his comedy gentle, with the same innocence that LUM & ABNER scored on.

His "Nobody home, I hope, I hope, I hope..." can be appreciated by

any person who has attempted to sell magazines, Christmas cards, or, in the case of Elmer (the Al Pearce salesman), corsets, toothbrushes, dental supplies, fire extinguishers, hot dogs, or other essentials to unappre-

ciative customers. Mr. Kitzel, Jack Benny's little buddy, appears on many shows, as does Mel Blanc.

One strange note I discovered was a commercial change in mid-season. On the April 3, 1940 show, Al announces that the show will take a four week vacation and return in May with Camel cigarettes as the sponsor. Bither Elmer couldn't sell pineapple juice, or Camel wanted the show so badly they talked Dole out of it. Hammamm...?

Usually I like to base this column on some central theme, although the ideas are sometimes disjointed. This one will not follow any theme, however. I have a whole bunch of notes to myself that don't go with anything else, so we will make this one just sort of a "grab-bag."

I read an awful lot of different OTR publications, and this seems

I read an awful lot of different OTR publications, and this seems to be a hobby with an extremely large number of them for the number of people involved in it. Several of them have, in the last few months, commented on the difficulty of these publications making it financially. The February issue of the <u>Mational Radio Trader</u> mentions that it expects one of the current publications to "fold" during 1978. They go on to say that they feel that, as OTR collectors, we should support these publications through our subscriptions. I disagree. It seems to me that if the publication truly offers walue for its price, it will succeed, and if it doesn't, it should close up. I subscribe to a publication that I expect to fold up, but do not plan to renew my subscription because I don't think it is giving true value for its price. It should fold.

In some cases, the publisher seems to be after our money and nothing else. An excellent case in point would be the <u>Great Radio Shows</u> and its publisher, Thomas Riggs of Vauxhall, New Jersey. He offered four quarterly issues for a one year subscription. He has issued only two (nothing since the Spring of 1977) and will not answer any letters, even when they are sent by registered mail and include a return stamped self-addressed envelope. He simply ignores them. Feeling that he should be investigated for fraud, I initiated proceedings against him only to find that he has just stayed between the lines on having legal action brought against him. Since he did deliver two of the promised four issues, the postal authorities can't move against him. Postal regulations say that if he returned <u>anything</u> at all it does not constitute postal fraud. The Post Office told me to move through the <u>Bureau</u> of Consumer Protection in Washington. The <u>Bureau</u> informed me that they have too small a staff to handle anything but problems involving large numbers of people, and obviously an OTR publication will not deal with large enough numbers for them. In any event, if <u>you</u> have subscribed to this publication and have not received anything at all, please visit the postal inspector at your local post office. If you did receive something, but not the full subscription, please write details to: Director, Bureau of Consumer Protection (MO-P), Federal Trade Commission, Washington, D.C. 20580. Maybe we can build up a big enough file on this outfit.

My basic point here is that we don't need to support the various publications because they deal with OTR. It is their responsibility to offer us sufficient value so that we will want to subscribe. I think that I have seen or subscribed to most of the OTR publications in existence today. In all of this I see only three really strong ones. Two of them are only issued quarterly, which is a very limiting factor in itself, and the third would be the publications of the OTRCOB, for which credit goes to Chuck Seeley. It is a labor of love on his part, unlike some of the commercial enterprises, and I have watched the IP and Memories continually show improvement, month by month, under his leadership. He is sure seeing to it that we get our money's worth and I am grateful for his outstanding effort. Enough on that subject.

This past Fall I saw a program on OTR that was excellent for gener-

This past Fall I saw a program on OTR that was excellent for general audiences, and that I recommend for your consideration in your community. It was entitled "Tune In" and was a 30 minute history of broadcasting put on by Pepsi Cola. It utilized two screens with slides and films, and a live narrator. Those old enough to remember OTR enjoyed it from that standpoint. Those too young to remember simply enjoyed it from the entertainment standpoint. I don't know the cost of the program (it was sponsored here by the local Pepsi Cola bottler and a local radio station), but information can be obtained from Mr. Chuck Nardizzi, Media

Last August I reported on my visit to the National Broadcasters Hall of Fame in Freehold, New Jersey. Travel and Leisure and TY Guide now tell us of the Museum of Broadcasting, started by William S. Paley, chairman of CBS. It features programming from both radio and TY, and numerous listening stations to listen to or watch, your choice. You are not allowed to copy them, however. They expect to have 18,000 radio programs by 1981. Admission is \$1.00 and it is open Tuesday through Saturday, noon to 5PM. It is located on the third floor at One East 53rd Street in New York City.

By the way, speaking of museums, when you visit Philadelphia, please be advised that the Atwater-Kent Museum has nothing at all to do with OTR. It deals only with the history of the city of Philadelphia.

I have often read about checking your local library for OTR programming. I had always dismissed this idea for my own city library as something that wasn't applicable here. When I was in last summer on something else however, I decided to check. They had 60 OTR cassettes and several record albums, so others were right. Don't overlook this bet at your own library.

Return with Jerome Collins now to the days when the west was young and adventure lay at the end of every trail.

With the flip of a switch he can help you remember Mister District Attorney, champion of the people, guardian of our fundamental rights to life, liber-

ty and the pursuit of happiness.
He can hearken back memories of the Shadow, who aided the forces of law and order and who was in reality Lamont Cranston, wealthy young man about town.

And he can nudge you back to the days when Jack Armstrong, the All-American boy, waved the flag for Hudson High.

ALL TRIN boola-boola is the sounds between the radio crackles that Mr. Collins has preserved on tape, 320 audio excursions into an era when housewives followed the adventures of Helen Trent and Our Gal Sunday, and when youngsters allowed three weeks for delivery of the magic

decoders that permitted the forces of good to triumph over the forces of evil.

Mr. Collins is a history teacherr at Maryvale High School, and he and the other members of the Old Time Radio Club of Butfalo trade recordings of some of the most famous — and some of the least famous radio shows of the first half of this century.

At 35, he is a little young to remember the quiver in Father Coughlin's voice when he pronounced the word "America." but Mr. Collins nonetheless knows as much about old time radio as Fibber McGee knew about Molly.

"WHEN YOU get into this." he said, "you learn lots of things — like the fact the Lone Ranger is the great-uncle of the Green Hornet."

'The Lone Ranger raised his brother's son, a boy who grew to become the father of the Green Hornet.)

Green Hornet.)
Monitoring early American
radio as if he were an FCC official in a time warp also has
helped Mr. Collins to increase
his understanding of America
before the landscape was littered with television antennae.

"You can learn more about the '40s and '50s by listening to Fibber McGee and Molly, and you can learn loads about the issue of partroitsm in this country by listening to the sermons at the end of the Lone Ranger or the Green Hornet," he said.

"YOU CAN tell it was a simpler period," he continued, "It's a slower period. Even with the war you didn't have the tensions you've got today."

The tapes permit him to get on a wavelength with another era. He has, for example, a tape of all the shows broadcast by station WJSV in Washington on Cont. 21, 1999 The broadcast, occurring in the third week of the European war, gives a portrait of the nation more than two years before America joined its destiny with the Allied Forces in World War

THE DAY'S histening includes a music show with Arthur Godfrey as disc jockey, a baseball game between the old Washing ton Senators and the Cleveland Indians announced by Walten Johnson, the Jack Benny Show and, ominously, a speech by President Roosevelt on wartime neutrality.

Mr. Collins has found there is more enjoyment in listening to America calling than in looking through the television tube.

"Radio makes you think." he said. "It was much better for your imagination. You had to picture something


"When the Lone Ranger came on television," he said, "I was disappointed. It was in black and white. I had visualized the Lone Ranger in color

One more thing in the line of recommendations. Although I am sure that we all prefer to trade, I assume that most of us do buy programming from commercial sources from time to time. I have tried, especially this Fall and winter, a large number of commercial outlets with varying degrees of satisfaction. There is one source that I have found to be truly outstanding, and have never seen it listed in any OTR publication. It is The Radio Vault, Box 9032, Wyoming, Michigan 49509. They have an outstanding catalog with complete descriptions and accurate grading. There is a charge of \$1.50 for the catalog, refunded with the first order. The service is excellent. They even send you a postcard notifying you of expected shipping date if there will be a delay of more than a few days. Finally, their prices are <u>very</u> competitive (custom reels often less in price than complete reels from other sources). I have personally found this source of commercial material far more satisfactory than any other I have tried.

WRAPPING PACKAGES: New rules for wrapping packages for mailing will be put into effect March 9 by the Postal Service. The most important one to remember is that masking tape will no longer be allowed to seal parcels because it is not strong enough. Although cord or twine can be used, reinforced tape is preferred. You won't need a paper wrapper if the container is strong enough by itself. Use a smudgeproof ink for the address and zip code, and make them big enough to read at 30 inches. Avoid markings such as "Do not bend" unless you have added stiffening material.




