1978 INDUCTION CEREMONIES

My wife and I went to Freehold, New Jersey on May 21st. The program at the Sheraton that afternoon was to be the second annual induc-

tion ceremonies for the National Broadcasters Hall of Fame.

We arrived about an hour early for the scheduled 3 PM ceremonies. We strolled outside the auditorium, hoping that we could meet a radio personality. Just as I began to give up, a very familiar face came out of the dining area and passed me. I caught up with Rudy Vallee and asked to take his picture. He posed for one photo and then invited my wife to join him in a second photo. Alas, no more film. Mr. Vallee entered the auditorium and we reloaded. Five minutes later he reappeared and joined my wife for a photo. Alas, no flash. But Mr. Vallee was very pleasant (and patient) and waited until I got the desired shot.

Time came for us to be seated. By the time the ceremony began, all 400 seats were occupied. Fred Foy (famed announcer for THE LONE RANGER and Dick Cavett) was the MC. He was superb in introducing the Hall of Famers, even doing a fine job in impersonating several famous radio regions.

radio voices.

AMOS 'N' ANDY were the first inductees. Then came Edgar Bergen.

Accepting for Mr. Bergen was Irene Wicker, the SINGING STORY LADY. Next,

Eddie Camtor was inducted. Then the first inductee who was present was

given her Mikey (the mame of the silver statuette of an old radio microphone presented to each inductee). It was Jessica Dragonette, looking

really lovely. She has a new record out now.

Dan Dunphy, the famous sports announcer, came up next to receive his Mikey. He said that he was recently asked to make a record of his greatest sports events. He said that he was amazed at the lack of preservation of the old radio broadcasts. There were many of his old broad-

casts that he could not locate. Mr. Dunphy would be interested to hear from people who might have some of the broadcasts he is missing.

The next inductee was Lee DeForest, the inventor of the three-element electron tube (called the Audion). Clifford Lord, the president of the New Jersey Historical Society accepted for Mr. DeForest. hr. Lord's speech was by



far the longest. He went into a history of DeForest's inventions and expressed a worship for De-Forest.

John Gambling III accepted the next award for his grandfa-ther. RAMBLING WITH GAMBLING is a local New York radio show that is still on the air after 50 consecutive years. John Gambling Sr. originated the show. He was succeeded by his son, who is now priming his son to take over the show this year or next.

I really do not know much about the next three inductees: Leonard Goldenson, Leon Levy, and Leo Rosenberg. ((Can anyone shed a little light on the ac-complishments of these people? For starters, they're not to be found in Tune In Yesterday. The Big Broadcast, or Actor's Television Credits 1950-1972.-CAS))
Introduced from the audi-

ence were Anne Elstner Matthews (STELLA DALLAS) and Victor Hammer (CAN YOU TOP THIS?).

I was very happy to see

Don Wilson accept his Mikey.
THE JACK BENNY SHOW was my favorite show. Don sounded very gravelly. Once he began speaking I was able to close my eyes and hear him talking to Jack.

Rudy Vallee, the most interesting and famous of the group, was the last inductee. He disputed Fred Foy's comment that AMOS 'N' ANDY was the greatest radio show. Rudy said that he did not want to diminish AMOS 'N' ANDY's standing, but he said that his FLEISCHMANN HOUR was a showcase for all the great radio talents. He said that he had everyone on his show except Jack Benny. (Vallee's sponsor was Royal Gelatin and Benny's was Jello.) "So you see," said Vallee, "it was two against thousands," meaning how could the two stars of AMOS 'N' ANDY even compare with the greats featured on the Vallee show. Rudy Vallee was a real egoist, but very friendly and a bundle full of fun.
After a brief intermission, Mr. Vallee was slated to do a slice

of his dinner theater act. During the intermission I scurried around

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for autographs. I heard someone tell Don Wilson how Mr. Wilson helped make the Benny show what it was. Don turned around and said that Jack was great and that "He would've been great without any of us."
Mr. Vallee had an elaborate set-up for his act. He had a microphone that had buttons which his spotlights, slides, and music accompaniments.

He began by singing "This Could Be the Start of Something Big." He went into some funny stories and one-line jokes. He did a series of Wetracal jokes and limericks. The audience was in hysterics as many of the jokes were, well, not for the immature. As his show continued, Rudy went back into his past. The more he reminisced, the more people walked out. We felt badly for Rudy since he was donating his time and he was putting his whole self into his performance. It could have been because the day was getting long (it was now after 6:30), but by the time Mr. Vallee's act was over, there were only about 100 people left. During the show's final minutes, the lighting staff began dismantling the stage lights. We thought Rudy Vallee was terrific. After the show we went up to see him with several other fams. We found out much more about this wonderful, lively, soon-to-be-77, still-own-haired, opiniomated gentleman. We had a great time. The Mational Broadcasters Hall of Fame is

worthwhile joining. The Hall of Fame itself is a beauty and growing.

Once again it is time to delve into the days of radio past.

It was not unusual in the early days of radio to find such fine character actors as Santos Ortega or Les Tremayne playing similar parts on different radio shows. Jeff Chandler was the rare exception. He played probably

the radio: Mr. Boynton (OUR MISS BROOKS) and Michael Shayne. Riding the bus one day, Himan Brown, a young radio producer, and Julian Funt, a script writer, over heard an argument between a young female interne and her boyfriend. Thus was born the soap opera, JOYCE JORDAN, GIRL INTERNE.

Contrary to their radio image, both Lum (Chester Lauck) and Abmer (Norris Goff) were college edu-

In a final effort in the mid-Fifties, radio introduced a large number of Westerns, including LUKE SLAUGHTER, FRONTIER GENTLEMAN, FORT LARAMIE, and HAVE GUN WILL TRAVEL.

STOP THE MUSIC with Bert Parks as master of ceremonies helped drive THE FRED ALLEN SHOW, as well as THE EDGAR BERGEN & CHARLIE MCCARTHY SHOW, off the air. Edgar Bergen returned to network radio the following year (1952) and helped to force STOP THE MUSIC off the air. To help save his own show, Fred Allen had offered \$5,000 to anyone who missed a call from STOP THE MUSIC by listening to his show.

Phillips H. Lord was the creative genius behind such programs as SETH PARKER, MR. DISTRICT ATTORNEY, GANGBUSTERS, and DAVID HARDING, COUNTERSPY.

The last live broadcast of THE LONE RANGER was on September 3, 1954. This was episode 2956. Brace Beemer played the lead role from 1941 to 1954.

To improve his sagging ratings in 1945, Jack Benny ran an "I Can't Stand Jack Benny Because..." contest, with Fred Allem as one of the judges. One air. Edgar Bergen returned to network radio the fol-

contest, with Fred Allem as one of the judges. One of the selections rejected was "I can't stand Jack Benny because he helped build up Fred Allen and I can't stand him.

this is incorrect, you might publish that fact.


Also, I am interested in knowing whether or not there is more
