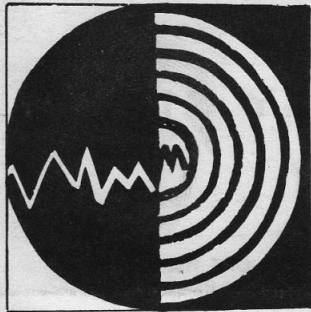

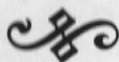

THESE PROGRAMS ARE INTENDED FOR THE PRIVATE USE OF OUR CUSTOMERS.

SOUND QUALITY: Unfortunately, there is no standard procedure for stating and obtaining the sound quality of these radio programs. We use the following terms and descriptions:

EXCELLENT: Near perfect sound, with few or no flaws. These shows may contain an audio skip or very slight hiss, hum or surface noise, but generally they sound just as nice as you might have originally heard them on the radio.

VERY GOOD: These shows contain minor defects (audio scratch, station drift, slight distortion, hiss, hum), but not enough to impair enjoyment of the show.

GOOD: These shows are marred by considerable hiss, hum, surface scratch or other defects. Listening requires close attention.

FAIR/POOR: These shows are muffled, distorted and/or contain serious defects. Listening requires full attention and shows in this category are not recommended to any but diehard enthusiasts of the show.

MAILING INFORMATION: All orders generally filled within 48 hours of receipt. Larger orders may take longer. Ordinarily, orders are shipped via the special 4th class rate for sound recordings. If you wish your order to be mailed via FIRST CLASS MAIL, please add \$1.25 PER TAPE. For AIR MAIL, please add \$1.75 PER TAPE. Canadians, please add \$1.30 PER TAPE.

TRADING INFORMATION: We are happy to trade on an hour-for-hour basis for programs not listed in any of our catalogues or supplements. In your letter please state sound quality, date, running time, title, and any other helpful information. However, please note that we are unable to trade for SHADOW, SUPERMAN, GREEN HORNET, or NICK CARTER or CHICK CARTER programs.

ALSO: The term "complete" usually means just that - nothing missing. It may also be used for a small number of programs with portions of the opening/closing/commercials missing. If the story is intact and the amount missing is not excessive, the term "complete" is used. Note that sustaining, syndicated (sold to individual radio stations), and AFRS programs generally do not contain commercials.

FINALLY: The running times of these programs are understood to be approximate, and may vary several minutes.

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 This supplement lists all programs obtained since August 3, 1970 and is complete to July 23, 1971. Another supplement will be published and distributed in approximately one year.  
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ADVENTURES IN MANHATTAN: "The Hooting Owl" vg/exc. sound. A new series of comedy-mysteries relating the adventures of the three Holiday brothers. Tonight - Jeffrey Holiday is invited to the home of a friend for a quiet weekend. But the quiet weekend is disrupted by several murders. CBS (30 min.)

ADVENTURES OF ARCHIE ANDREWS: March 15, 1947 Excellent sound with Swift's Premium Franks comm. The Andrews are invited to Mrs. Lodge's party on behalf of the Red Cross. Mr. Andrews is asked to tell a few of his favorite (and unbearably corny) jokes, but Archie manages to save the day with his impression of Al Jolson. NBC (30 min.)

ADVENTURES OF ARCHIE ANDREWS: May 15, 1948 Excellent sound with Swift's comm. Mrs. Andrews is awakened one night by a scream from Archie's room. He's had a nightmare, but it then becomes an almost incurable case of hiccups. In the course of curing them, the Andrews manage to either wake up everyone in the neighborhood or have everyone else call, thus preventing any of them from going back to bed. NBC (30 min.)

ADVENTURES OF LEONIDAS WITHERALL: Oct. 8, 1944 Excellent sound, sustaining. Leonidas discovers that someone has switched corpses on a train to Chicago. Mutual net. (30 min.)

ADVENTURES OF LEONIDAS WITHERALL: April 22, 1945 Excellent sound, sustaining. "The Corpse Meets a Deadline" Leonidas investigates the murder of a newspaper editor. Mutual net. (30 min.)

ADVENTURES OF TOPPER: July 5, 1945 This program, listed in the master catalogue, is now in EXCELLENT sound. (30 min.)

ADVENTURES OF TOPPER: Aug. 30, 1945 Excellent sound with Post Toasties and Maxwell House Coffee comm. Starring Roland Young. Topper pretends to be dead so he can escape a visit by his mother-in-law. WEAF, NBC (30 min.)

AGAINST THE STORM: May 30, 1941 Excellent sound. Sponsored by Ivory, which plugs its stockings offer. Professor Allen recalls an earlier Memorial Day in 1894. Now, on Memorial Day, 1941, the Professor and his wife Margaret wonder if wars will continue and pray that they will not. (If they only knew what December held in store) NBC (15 min.)

A. L. ALEXANDER'S MEDIATION BOARD: June 28, 1943 Excellent sound. In the first case, #14386, a man and woman have been living together for 24 years and have had eight children. Now, the husband denies they are married. The husband gets so belligerent that the program is momentarily taken off the air! (30 min.)

ALDRICH FAMILY: "The Cheese" March 30, 1944 VG sound with Postem comm. Henry hires a small boy to carry Mary's purse which contains the cheese for supper - then loses him! (30 min.)

ALDRICH FAMILY: "Closing Doors" AFRS wartime re-broadcast in vg sound. Musical interlude by Tommy Dorsey. Mrs. Aldrich is trying to teach Henry to close things behind him. She sends word downtown for Henry to come home and close the cellar door, but inadvertently starts a rumor that someone has wrecked the Aldrich home! (30 min.)

ALDRICH FAMILY: "The Letter" AFRS re-broadcast in excellent sound. Henry receives a letter from a girl he's never met and promptly arranges a date. Presented by the Special Service Division, US War Dept. (30 min.)

ALDRICH FAMILY: "The Motor Scooter" Sept. 14, 1950 good+/vg sound (some skipped grooves) Sponsored by Jello. Henry buys a used motor scooter, hoping he can get his father to finance the balance. But before he can talk to his father, he wrecks the scooter and ends up in financial trouble; the balance due is \$11.60. NBC (30 min.)

ALI COP: Episode #1 from the 1930s in excellent sound. Syndicated. In their playroom, Jerry and Janet Laurel discover that Ali Cop, their wooden clown, can speak! (15 min.)

AMERICA'S MOST INTERESTING PEOPLE: Dec. 5, 1938 Excellent sound. First show - on the air audition. People with unusual jobs are interviewed: A man who buys and sells anything and everything alive, from ants to elephants and rabbits to kangaroos; a woman who solves the problems of people who are in a hurry; America's oldest chorus girl (74 years old!); others. Mutual (30 min.)

AMCS 'n' ANDY: AFRS #267 in excellent sound. After Sapphire and her mother yell at him for his continual unemployment, the Kingfish decides to go into business. He opens up a branch office of Yale University and offers Andy an education... for \$100 tuition. (30 min.)

AMCS 'n' ANDY: Final show from 1960 in vg/exc. sound. The Kingfish is trying to get rid of his brother-in-law Leroy. Amos and Andy's original theme, "The Perfect Song," is played. CBS (15 min.)

ANSWER MAN: Nov. 22, 1945 Excellent sound with Trommer's White Label Beer comm. Albert Mitchell answers questions about sky writing, Benjamin Franklin, police strikes, a clogged rifle, the Golden Gate Bridge, others. Mutual. (15 min.)

ANSWER MAN: Nov. 28, 1946 12:45 PM broadcast in excellent sound. Sponsored by Grape Nuts Flakes, Colgate Toothpaste and Bird's Eye Foods. Questions are about fish, eyes, folding chairs, heights of Japanese men and women, odors from a fireplace, Daddy Long Legs, others. Mutual. (15 min.)

ANSWER MAN: Nov. 28, 1946 7:15 PM broadcast in excellent sound. Sponsored by Rayve Shampoo. Questions are about grasshoppers, the saying "It's raining cats and dogs," an inheritance, the cost of killing an enemy soldier, baseball, rubber trees, and others. Mutual Broadcasting System. (15 min.)

ARCH OBOLER'S PLAYS: "Revolt of the Worms" Chilling story in vg/exc. sound. No closing sig. A tale of horror unfolds when a scientist attempts to create the largest rose in the world. But his assistant accidentally throws some of the formula into the earth, and (20 min.)

ARMSTRONG CIRCLE THEATRE: "Dishonor System" Exc+ sound from the CBS-TV soundtrack. Complete with commercials. Douglas Edwards reports on this 1959 broadcast about cheating and fraud on the college campus. A free-lance writer takes a job at a "service" that writes term papers for students in order to investigate and expose the extent of college cheating. Highly recommended. (60 min.)

ATTORNEY FOR THE DEFENSE: Dec. 19, 1944 vg+/exc. sound. As "I Love A Mystery" drew toward the end of its original run in December 1944, many of the cast tried to find new jobs. Michael Raffetto ("Jack") assembled Barton Yarborough ("Doc") and Forrest Lewis ("Michael") for the cast of this prospective series (which never sold). It centered around Jonathan Brixton, a prominent San Francisco lawyer who specialized in people with problems far beyond the norm. In this audition show, Brixton agrees to help a young lady who has found the body of her employer and is suspected of the crime. (30 min.)

BABY SNOOKS: May 1942 "Maxwell House Coffee Time" show in good sound (surface scratch). The show has just been chosen by the Women's National Radio Committee as the top entertainment program on the air. After Frank Morgan tells the story of his life, Daddy explains to Snooks how he's making substitute sugar from lemons! Starring Fannie Brice and Hanley Stafford with John Conte, Harlow Wilcox and Meredith Willson's Orchestra. NBC (30 min.)



- BABY SNOOKS: "Lila Mae Comes to Visit" VG sound. Missing opening sig/comm/closing sig The Higgins household is thrown into a turmoil when Daddy's old flame comes to visit. There are indications that the flame may still be flickering! (30 min.)
- BABY SNOOKS: "The Movies" VG sound. Jerry Dingle, the postman (played by Danny Thomas), invites Snooks and Daddy to the movies where prizes are being awarded. In a dream sequence, Dingle imagines himself as the greatest vaudeville actor in the world. Carmen Dragon's Orch. plays "Anything Goes." AFRS (30 min.)
- BARRY GRAY: Oct. 27, 1946 Excellent sound. (3:45 am!) On Barry's all-night show, guest Al Jolson informally talks about his career and relates many fascinating details about his songs, movies, friends and himself. He sings "Rosie," "Sonny Boy," "April Showers," "California Here I Come," "Mammy," "You Made Me Love You," and others. WOR, Mutual, New York. (80 min.)
- BIG SHOW: Nov. 12, 1950 vg/exc. sound. Hostess Tallulah Bankhead introduces Groucho Marx (who is hilarious throughout the entire program), Meredith Willson's Orchestra ("Stardust"), a scene from "Breakthrough" (performed by David Brian, John Agar and Frank Lovejoy), Ezio Pinza ("September Song"), Fannie Brice and Hanley Stafford (in a Baby Snooks skit wherein Snooks wants to be an actress), Jane Powell ("It's A Most Unusual Day"), then the cast appears on "You Bet Your Life." Sponsored by Anacin, RCA Victor. NBC (90 min.)
- BIG SHOW: Nov. 26, 1950 vg/exc. sound (several skipped grooves) Hostess Tallulah Bankhead and Fred Allen spoof early morning Mr. and Mrs. radio shows; Ed Wynn and Jack Carson joke with Tallulah; Meredith Willson's Orch. plays "Love Is Such a Cheat"; Lauritz Melchior sings "La Priere d'une vierge." Then Ed "Archie" Gardner drops by to invite the gang to Duffy's Tavern, where Mindy Carson sings "Ask Me How Do I Feel?" Partially sponsored by Ford, RCA Victor and Anacin. Airchecked from WNBC, New York. NBC network (90 min.)
- BIG STORY: "Gambling and Divorce Can Also Mean Murder" Jan. 11, 1950 Exc. sound. Reno Gazette reporter Frank McCullough investigates the murder of Ed Wensel, found in his Cadillac, shot to death. (30 min.)
- BIG STORY: March 19, 1952 Excellent sound. Story of Allan Copperthwaite of the Helena, Montana Independent Record. A reporter gambles his own life to avenge the murder of a friend. Sponsored by Fall Mall. (30 min.)
- BILL STERN: July 6, 1945 Colgate program in excellent sound. Bill's on vacation, so H.V. Kaltenborn fills in. The latest baseball scores, then an analysis of war news. (15 min.)
- BILL STERN: July 13, 1945 Colgate program in excellent sound. Bill's still off, so it's H.V. Kaltenborn again with the latest baseball scores, then an analysis of the war news. (15 min.)
- BILL STERN: Sept. 14, 1945 Colgate program in excellent sound. Show #306 from Detroit, with special guest Brace Beemer (The Lone Ranger), who gives a short history of the program. (15 min.)
- BILL STERN: Nov. 9, 1947 Colgate program in excellent sound. First, the portrait of an inspired football team. Then Bill talks with Tommy Dorsey, who has an amazing sports story of his own! (15 min.)
- BILL STERN: Nov. 23, 1945 Colgate program in excellent sound. Show #316. Bill tells "The Profile of a Start in Radio" - the story of how Graham MacNamee started Frank Sinatra in radio. Guest is Frank Sinatra. (15 min.)
- BILL STERN: Aug. 1, 1947 Colgate program in excellent sound. Bill's on vacation tonight, and filling in is Frank Sinatra with sports stories from Bill's book, "My Favorite Sports Stories." (15 min.)
- BILL STERN: Oct. 20, 1950 Colgate program in excellent sound. Show #572. 12th Anniversary Show with very brief appearances by Eddie Cantor, Jimmy Stewart, Eleanor Roosevelt, Al Jolson, Linda Darnell, Joe DiMaggio, Sonja Hennie, Danny Kaye, Joe Lewis, Jack Benny, Herbert Hoover, Shirley Temple and Babe Ruth. (15 min.)
- BILL STERN: June 29, 1951 Excellent sound Show #606 Last of the series. No guests, but a brief history of the show, thanks from Bill, then a brief speech by a Colgate-Palmolive official, a long-time sponsor of the show. NBC (15 min.)
- BING CROSBY: Sept. 2, 1931 (7 PM) from KHJ, Los Angeles. Sound is near perfect. Bing's first radio program. He sings "Just One More Chance" and "I'm Through with Love." CBS. (10 min.)

BLONDIE: 1950(?) AFPS re-broadcast in excellent sound. Starring Arthur Lake and Ann Rutherford. Dagwood wins the grand prize on Mr. Dithers' punch board - "one genuine synthetic blue-white plastic diamond ring mounted in real platinum-type tin." (30 min.)

BLUE RIBBON TOWN: 1944 VG/exc. sound with Pabst Blue Ribbon Beer comm. Starring Groucho Marx with Leo Gorcey and special guest Jack Benny. Fay Mackenzie sings "Suddenly It's Spring." Bill Days sings "Now I Know." Everyone drops by to see if they can get a job on Jack's radio show. Ken Niles ann. (30 min.)

BOB AND RAY: vg/exc. sound from disc. Bob and Ray visit the castle of Dr. Ahkbar, the crazed director of Bob and Ray scientific research, for a progress report. (15 min.)

BOB AND RAY: Aug. 1, 1951 Exc. sound. Today: a salute to August, an episode of "Jack Headstrong, the All-American American," and a visit from Mary Magoon. NBC (15 min.)

BOB AND RAY: Sept. 15, 1951 Exc. sound Today: Excerpts from the new play "Mama Gets Life"; Nancy Evans sings "Stormy Weather"; the Bob and Ray "Great Lakes" contest; a man with an unusual occupation. NBC (15 min.)

BOB BURNS: Oct. 6, 1946 Exc. sound with Kolyos Toothpaste, Bisodol Mints and nurses. Shirley Ross sings "If I Were the Only Girl in the World." Bob's prize hog, Winston, has been kidnapped, so Bob goes to court to sue. Ray Sinatra's Orchestra. NBC (30 min.)

BOB LEWIS SHOW: Dec. 30, 1962 Excellent sound A slice of the world at 12:42 am One hour of hits from the "Silver Dollar Survey," interspersed with "Action Central News" (longshoremen strike...10,000 Russians in Cuba...tax cut essential) weather, sports and chatter. Taped from WABC, New York. (60 min.)

BOB HOPE: 1944 AFPS #72 very good sound, although this is taped directly from the disc. From the Marine Corps Airfield at the Mojave Desert. Comedy with Bob, Jerry Colonna and Vera Vague. Skinny Ennis sings "How Many Hearts Have You Broken?" Frances Langford sings "I'll Be Seeing You." In the skit, Bob's sponsor throws a homecoming party for him. (30 min.)

BOSTON BLACKIE: "Harry Baker" Exc. sound. Starring Richard Kollmar. Harry Baker offers Blackie \$5000 if he'll let him spend the night in his apartment. Next morning, all the clocks in Blackie's apartment are mysteriously stopped, and a short time later, so is Baker - by a bullet! (30 min.)

BOSTON BLACKIE: "Christmas Show" Exc. sound with Champagne Velvet Beer comm. Starring Richard Kollmar. Blackie, Mary and Inspector Faraday stop a thief who has allegedly stolen four diamond rings, but find he does not have them or his person. Turns out he gave them to Santa Claus. (30 min.)

BRAVE TOMORROW: Wartime episode in vg/exc. sound with Ivory Snow comm. "Out of the challenge of today, we build our brave tomorrow." Louise Lambert has arrived in Dustville, Texas, determined to take Marty, her wayward daughter, back to Westchester. (15 min.)

BREAK THE BANK: Feb. 1, 1950 Excellent+ with Vitalis and Trushay comm. Hosted by Bud Collyer and Bert Parks. Questions concern books, romantic songs, Lou Gehrig, beautiful girls and bloodthirsty pirates. The Bank starts at \$41201 NBC (30 min.)

BREAK THE BANK: Oct. 6, 1950 VG sound with Trushay and Sal Hepatica comm. Starring Bud Collyer. The contestants who correctly answer a series of questions from the category they've chosen have a chance to "Break the Bank" by correctly answering the final question. Today, the bank starts at \$13501 Win Elliot announces. NBC (30 min.)

BRIDE AND GROOM: May 1947 show in exc. sound. MC is John Nelson. Weddings were actually performed on this program. A history of how the couple met is given, and they are showered with gifts for taking part. Today - the wedding of Mr. and Mrs. L. Ray Stansel. (30 min.)

BROADWAY OPEN HOUSE: May 11, 1951 vg/exc. sound NBC-TV Commercials were inserted locally. The original late-night informal variety show (11 PM - 12 M) Starring Jerry Lester, Dagmar, Barbara Nichols, Wayne Howell, Milton DeLugg's Orch. Tonight: an Indian skit; "The Great Lester" magic act; Dave Street sings "Come Out and Kiss Me"; Dagmar talks about painting; the Orch. plays "Twilight Rhapsody"; a "Ma and Pa" skit. NBC-TV (60 min.)

BULLDOG DRUMMOND: "Operation Hi-Jack" Sept. 28, 1941 The audition disc for this famous show in excellent sound (slight surface noise). Capt. Drummond and Denny track down the Richards mob, hi-jackers responsible for terrorizing and killing truck drivers and stealing their valuable cargos. (30 min.)

BULLDOG DRUMMOND: Aug. 13, 1945 "Help Wanted" Exc. sound. Capt. Drummond's off on a secret government mission, so Denny relates this week's story. Frederick Trent, a vaudeville performer, dies, and the medical examiner says it was accidental. But Denny suspects it was murder! Mutual. (30 min.)

BULLDOG DRUMMOND: "Disappearing Ink" Exc. sound. Aboard a train, Capt. Drummond encounters a strange mystery when he finds lovely Linda Bennett in his room! (30)

BURNS AND ALLEN: 1941 "Swan Soap" show in exc. sound. Jealousy reigns in the Burns' house when Gracie receives a letter from her old boyfriend. He wants to come and visit her, but George has other ideas! Paul Whiteman's Orchestra plays "Hi Neighbor." (30 min.)

BURNS AND ALLEN: 1943 AFPS re-broadcast in excellent sound. Remote from Boston. Gracie wants guest star James Melton to feature "The California Thrush...Sugar-Throat" Burns at his next concert. But Melton isn't so sure he should unleash such a talent on an unsuspecting audience. (30 min.)

BURNS AND ALLEN: AFPS re-broadcast in excellent sound. Guest Rita Hayworth asks George and Gracie to spend the night at her house, since Orson is out of town. Gracie spends the evening trying to make George a genius like Orson Welles. Jimmy Cash sings "Wonderful One." (30 min.)

BURNS AND ALLEN: "George the Butler" vg+exc. sound. Bill Goodwin, a friend of the Burns', asks a favor: In order to get a leading role in an upcoming movie, Goodwin must convince the producer he's a stable, married man. He asks Gracie to pose as his wife for one evening. This leaves George the role of butler. (30)

BURNS AND ALLEN: "George the Plumber" AFPS re-broadcast in vg sound (slight cross-talk), though this was taped directly from the disc. George gets upset when Gracie talks about a former boyfriend who is very handy around the house, so Gracie loosens a bolt under the sink and asks George to fix it, attempting to build his confidence. But George gets the water pipes and the gas pipes crossed, and his troubles (and the laughs) are just beginning! (30 min.)

BURNS AND ALLEN: Presented by Special Services, US Army wartime program. VG (scratchy) sound. Jimmy Cash sings "After You're Gone." Guest is Van Johnson, who falls in love with Gracie! (30 min.)

BUSTER BROWN'S GANG: vg/exc. sound with Buster Brown Shoes comm. Saturday morning kids show. Host Smilin' Ed McConnell tells us a pirate story. Nasty old pirates kidnap a little boy's parrot. This show was done before a live studio audience full of kids. NBC (30 min.)

BUSY MR. BINGLE: May 27, 1943 vg/exc. sound (record scratch) Situation comedy. Starring John Brown, with Jackson Beck. J.B. Single owns a pin factory. Today, \$50,000 is stolen from the company safe, and all the employees are suspect. Mutual Broadcasting System, from WOR, New York (30 min.)

CAB CALLOWAY: Aug. 14, 1945 Excellent sound. This show is of special significance because it's Victory Day, and the show is interrupted for several bulletins announcing Japan's imminent surrender. From the Cafe Zanzibar, New York City, Cab and Orch. manage to play "Frantic on the Atlantic," "For Base Only" and "I Can't Give You Anything But Love." Mutual. (30 min.)

CAB CALLOWAY: AFPS #661 Excellent sound. From the new Zanzibar Cafe in New York City. Cab and the Orchestra play "Tea for Two," "All at Once," "Rosemary," "I Can't Give You Anything But Love," "Dawn Time," others. (30 min.)

CAMEL COMEDY CARAVAN: May 11, 1945 AFPS re-broadcast in good/vg sound (dropout in second half), although this was taped directly from the disc. Garry Moore and Jimmy Durante joke about Jimmy's oil pipeline and marriage. Roy Barry and the Orchestra play "Liza." Gary stars in a hospital skit. Gerry Sullivan sings "Anywhere." In the operatic skit, Jimmy plays a crooked sheriff in love with Garry's wife. (30 min.)

CAPT. VIDEO: "Captives of Saturn" Exc. sound, from disc. Capt. Video and the Video Ranger are off to Saturn to investigate the mysterious kidnappings of high officials in the universe. (10 min.)

CASEY, CRIME PHOTOGRAPHER: "Thunderbolt" AFRS re-broadcast in vg/exc. sound. A prominent physician is killed by a maniacal hammer-wielding psychopath. Casey believes that it was done by the same person who killed a famous playwright a week earlier, and he and Annie do their best to unravel the mystery. (25 min.)

CASS DALEY SHOW: March 31, 1946 VG sound. Adolphe Menjou visits the show, and Cass' Uncle Herman has bought a new suit for the occasion. The cast does a newspaper drama with Menjou as the editor and Cass as his girl Friday ("the rest of the week he's on his own!"). AFRS re-broadcast (30 min.)

CBS RADIO WORKSHOP: "Japanese Theater" Exc. sound. Starring William Conrad, John Dehner, Hans Conreid and Virginia Gregg. A radio adaptation of 14th century Japanese drama. The ruler of Japan loses his son in an ancient sacrifice. But the son does not die, and returns to become one of the nation's greatest warriors. (25 min.)

CBS RADIO WORKSHOP: "Epitaphs," based on Edgar Lee Masters' "Spoon River Anthology" Excellent sound. William Conrad narrates a series of vignettes, epitaphs from an Illinois graveyard that recall some of the now-dead residents of the village of Spoon River. (25 min.)

CBS RADIO WORKSHOP: "A Dog's Life" Excellent sound. Tony Schwartz has a new dog, and in candid fashion the CBS microphones follow Tony and his pet in an effort to document the actual story of a dog's life. Narrated by Ralph Bell. (25 min.)

CBS RADIO WORKSHOP: "The Endless Road" Excellent sound. What happens to a small, idyllic valley in primitive Latin America when a new road brings in civilization? Time payments, land foreclosures, washing machines, and yes, even Elvis Presley bring the happy, simple people a new way of life. (25 min.)

CHANDU, THE MAGICIAN: Episode #350 in very good sound. 1930s series. Frank Chandler is told about a lost ruby mine in Burma...and a new adventure begins. (15 min.)

CHANDU, THE MAGICIAN: Episode #381 in very good sound. 1930s series. Some of the missing Emeralds from the stolen bronze Buddha are recovered. (15 min.)

CHANDU, THE MAGICIAN: April 21, 1949 Hi-Fi sound (rough opening) Sponsored by White King Soap. An Englishman in the Sahara Desert is stirring up trouble with the Arab Tribes. Chandu investigates and finds the man is attempting to become King of Arabia! Mutual. (30 min.)

CHARLIE MCCARTHY: 1943 AFRS re-broadcast in very good sound. This show features another classic W.C. Fields-Charlie McCarthy encounter. After making a few cracks about Bergen's age, Charlie meets Fields in their neighborhood barber shop, where each waits for a trimming - and gets it! (30 min.)

COLUMBIA WORKSHOP: "Fall of the City" April 11, 1937 vg/exc. sound, although this was taped from the CBS master. Starring Orson Welles, Burgess Meredith and a cast of 200! Archibald MacLeish's famous radio play, written in verse. CBS (30 min.)

COLUMBIA WORKSHOP: "Marconi" Dec. 9, 1937 Taped from the CBS master, but sound is only good due to heavy record scratch. The workshop presents a dramatization of Orrin E. Dunlap's book "Marconi - The Man and His Wireless" in celebration of the 36th anniversary of the spanning of the Atlantic by wireless. William N. Robson directed. CBS (30 min.)

COLUMBIA WORKSHOP: "Farewell to Altamont" Nov. 14, 1946 vg/exc. sound. An excerpt from Thomas Wolfe's Look Homeward Angel with Art Carney in a small part. CBS (30 min.)

COMEDY SAMPLER: Excellent sound. The source of this commercial recording is unknown. Bob and Ray: "No Talent Hunt," a spoof of Arthur Godfrey's "Talent Scouts" and "This is Your Bed," a spoof of "This is Your Life"; Steve Allen: "What is a Freeman?"; Henny Youngman: "Take My Wife, Please!"; Stan Freberg: "St. George and the Dragonet." (15 min.)

COMEDY WRITER'S SHOW: June 13, 1948 Excellent sound. A show of professional joke-writers writing a show as they go along. With Leonard Stern of the Abbott and Costello show; John Murray of the Red Skelton show; Sid Fields of the Eddie Cantor show; and Roger Price of the Bob Hope show. Bob Ripley ("Believe It or Not") submits this week's outline - he wants the panel to come up with a variety situation-comedy show in which the comic is in financial difficulty; then, for the second half, Bob Ripley will be the guest star. ABC (30 min.)

COMMAND PERFORMANCE: AFRS #123 from 1944 in vg+/exc. sound. Ken Carpenter introduces Connie Haines ("Gee I Love My G.I. Guy"), Lena Horne ("Good-for-Nothing Joe"), Shirley Ross ("Thanks for the Memory") and Frances Langford ("I'll Be Seeing You"). The show is billed "For Women Only", but Bob Hope, Bing Crosby and Frank Sinatra drop by to comment on the proceedings and harmonize with "If I Had My Way." (30 min.)

COMMAND PERFORMANCE: July 12, 1946 vg sound (slight tracking problem) Host Bob Shannon introduces Phil Baker with a special version of "Take It or Leave It." All the contestants are in various branches of the service. The jackpot question (for \$450) is "What is the largest animal in existence?" (And nobody gets it!) (30 min.)

COUPLE NEXT DOOR: Program #1 AFRS re-broadcast in very good sound. Starring Peg Lynch and Alan Bunce. The family and Aunt Effie are motoring across Massachusetts, on their way to Boston. Today, they visit an antique shop along the way and buy a spinning wheel. (15 min.)

COUPLE NEXT DOOR: AFRS re-broadcast in very good sound. The family decides to go to Boston to visit some of the historical sights; Aunt Effie must stay home because she is ill. (15 min.)

CRIME CLUB: "Death Blew Out the Match" Dec. 2, 1946 Excellent sound Set on a fox-bound island, a classic case of murder where the butler did it . . . or did he? Mutual (30 min.)

CRIME CLUB: "Mr. Smith's Hat" Jan. 22, 1947 Excellent sound. A man calls the police to say he's going to be murdered. Ten seconds later, his daughter calls to say she's just found the body! Mutual (30 min.)

CRIME CLUB: "Silent Witnesses" March 27, 1947 Excellent sound An unusual story of a letter that was registered - by death! Mutual (30 min.)

CRIME CLUB: "The Sun's A Witness" April 3, 1947 Excellent sound. The shadows on a roll of film provide the clue to a murderer! Mutual (30 min.)

DANGEROUS ASSIGNMENT: "Assignment in the Islands" April 29, 1953 Excellent sound. Starring Brian Donlevy. Someone has been sabotaging the rebuilding of America's anti-submarine bases in the South Pacific. Mitchell is told to find the culprits and bring them to justice. Sustaining, NBC net. (30 min.)

DATE WITH JUDY: "Never Tell A Lie" AFRS re-broadcast in vg/exc. sound. Starring Louise Erickson, John Brown and Myra Marsh. Mr. Foster is appalled at his family's tendency toward "little white lies" and half-truths, and he lectures them on why one should never tell a lie. They resolve to be completely honest with themselves and others, but the plan backfires and Mr. Foster finds himself at the butt of every disparaging remark uttered in the house! (30 min.)

DAVID HARUM: c. 1940 Excellent sound. Sponsored by Bab-C Cleanser. Grandpa has recovered; John and Susan talk with David about their marriage; David questions Zeke about the disappearance of Silas Fink and the poorhouse records. (15 min.)

DAVID HARUM: c. 1940 Excellent sound. Sponsored by Bab-O Cleanser. David is apparently going to jail, and now he's mysteriously studying photography; David talks with John about his marriage to Susan. (15 min.)

DAVID HARUM: c. 1940 Excellent sound. Sponsored by Bab-O (25% camera premium). David is planning to stage a show to raise money for the poorhouse; Susan announces she will marry John next week. (15 min.)

DECEMBER BRIDE: Very Good sound. Starring Spring Byington, Hal March and Doris Singleton, with Hans Conreid and Joe Forte. AFRS re-broadcast. Matt and Ruth are trying to marry Lily off to a biscuit manufacturer. (25 min.)

DESCRIPTION OF THE COLLYER HOME: March 25, 1947 Very Good sound. A sensational story broke when one of the brothers was found dead in his Harlem mansion. It seems the brothers kept every bit of junk they had ever laid their hands on. They never threw ANYTHING away. WOR reporter John Wingate makes several short reports from the strange house. (15 min.)

DIMENSION X: "Pebble in the Sky" Very good sound. Time; the distant future. The galaxy has come under control of a race of super beings. One planet is planning a revolt - tiny, insignificant Earth. (30 min.)

DIMENSION X: "Marionettes, Incorporated" Excellent sound. A man of the 1990s buys a robot that is an exact duplicate of himself. The idea is to fool his wife into believing that he is always home, but complications develop when the robot shows feelings. NBC (30 min.)

DIMENSION X: "The Lost Race" May 20, 1950 Excellent sound. Why did men who inhabited the universe centuries ago destroy themselves? The crew of a spaceship stranded on a far-off planet learns the secret! (30 min.)

DOCTOR I.Q., JR.: March 6, 1948 Excellent sound. Sponsored by Mars, Inc., makers of Snickers candy bars. Questions include: "What do the letters I.Q. stand for?" and "Who was the U.S.'s first secretary of the Treasury?" The mystery personality is "Columbus." From Chicago (30 min.)

DOCTOR KILDARE: Program #19 in excellent sound. MGM syndication. An influential doctor at Blair General promises Drs. Kildare and Gillespie a new polio wing for the hospital if they can get his wife to lose twenty pounds. (30 min.)

DOCTOR KILDARE: Program #20. This program, listed in the master catalogue, is now in EXCELLENT sound. (30 min.)

DRAGNET: "Market Robberies" AFRS re-broadcast in excellent sound. Starring Jack Webb and Ben Alexander. "You're a detective sergeant. You're assigned to robbery detail. Three hold-up men have robbed and beaten two supermarket operators in your city. You've got a good description of the thieves. Your job -- get 'em!" (25 min.)

DUFFY'S TAVERN: AFRS #40 in vg/exc. sound. Guest is Phil Baker. Archie wants to get on Phil's quiz show "Take It or Leave It" so he can win money to invest in some oil stock. (30 min.)

DUFFY'S TAVERN: "Archie's Teacher" AFRS re-broadcast in excellent sound. Archie's old school teacher is visiting all of her old pupils to see how they have turned out. Archie is trying to straighten up the tavern (and some of his cronies' speech) in anticipation of the visit. (30 min.)

DUFFY'S TAVERN: Dec. 1, 1944 Good sound, although this was taped from the disc. Guest is Larry Adler. Archie tries to hire Larry to work in the tavern. AFRS re-broadcast. (30 min.)

EASY ACES: Feb. 18, 1946 Excellent sound, with commercials. Jane's trying to borrow \$100 to balance her household budget without letting Mr. Ace know about it; meanwhile, Mr. Ace wants to borrow \$3500 for a real estate deal. (15 min.)

ED WYNN: Feb. 12, 1935 Texaco Fire Chief program in very good sound (slight whistle). Starring Ed Wynn, Graham MacNamee and Eddie Duchin's Orchestra ("Solitude"). Ed jokes with Graham, talks about his latest opera "Teeth for Two," then answers listeners' letters. NBC (30 min.)

EDDIE CANTOR: Jan. 30, 1947 Pabst Blue Ribbon show in excellent sound. Special birthday show with guests Jack Benny, Peter Lind Hayes and Ralph Edwards. Eddie plans to start a new network, NBC (Nothing But Cantor), and tries to persuade Jack to finance it. Eddie sings "Yes Sir, That's My Baby." (30 min.)

EDDIE MAYHOFF: Nov. 19, 1940 "On the Town" Excellent sound "It's Ed Mayhoff on the East side, on the West side, on Broadway. Park Ave. in Greenwich Village. the Bowery, Uptown, Downtown - it's Eddie Mayhoff - the sidewalk reporter bringing you his impressions, caricatures and impersonations of the people of the city of New York." Ed impersonates a barker, a Negro shine boy, a songsheet salesman, the chairwoman at a women's club, others. WOR, N.Y. (15 min.)

EDDIE MAYHOFF: Nov. 21, 1940 Excellent sound. Tonight: New York's sidewalk reporter impersonates an uptown clubman, a singer auditioning for a Broadway booking agent, a saleslady, others. Mutual. (15 min.)

EDGAR BERGEN: Nov. 7, 1969 on TV's "Johnny Carson Show" Edgar talks about his beginnings in radio and does a short skit; Mortimer talks with Johnny. Broadcast quality. NBC-TV (10 min.)

ESCAPE: "Three Skeleton Key" Excellent sound. William Conrad, Elliot Reid and Harry Bartel star in this version of the famous rat menace yarn. (30 min.)

ESCAPE: "Treasure, Incorporated" vg/exc. sound. Starring Frank Lovejoy. An American wants to convert a tropical island into a tourist haven, but a million dollars in stolen jewels diverts his attention. He knows they are buried somewhere on the isle, but where? CBS (30 min.)

ESCAPE: "A Shipment of Mute Fate" Excellent sound (except for rough opening). Aboard a ship at sea, a bushmaster, the deadliest snake in the world, is loose and on the prowl. Now, the crew must carefully and cautiously search every dark corner, every gloomy hiding place. A classic from the "Escape" series, and repeated often. (30 min.)

ESCAPE: "Action" Excellent sound. High in the Alps, a man clings to the sheer face of an ice cliff, suspended 1000 feet above instant death, desperately trying to summon up enough strength and endurance to inch his way along the remaining twelve feet that lie between his perch and safety! (30 min.)

EXPLORING TOMORROW: "Liar" VG sound, with Ex-Lax and Readers' Digest comm. Narrated by John Campbell Jr. A company that manufactures robots discovers that one of its robots is telepathic! (25 min.)

FALCON: "Murder Knows No Borderline" 1946 AFRS re-broadcast in vg sound (record scratch). Mike Waring's off to Mexico for a vacation. But a girl he meets at the airport is later found badly beaten, and Mike cuts his vacation short to get to the bottom of it. (25 min.)

FAMOUS JURY TRIALS: "The State vs. William Wright" good+/very good sound. A ship's cook is charged with murdering the captain. No commercials. (25 min.)

FATHER COUGHLIN: Feb. 14, 1937 Excellent sound. Second program in the series. The Father is questioned about his views on Christianity versus Communism; then, in his "Thought for the Week," he discusses the Supreme Court and Liberty. (60 min.)

FATHER COUGHLIN: March 28, 1937 Excellent sound. The Father first discusses his new book, then tells the Easter story of Christ's death and Resurrection. From the Shrine of the Little Flower in Royal Oak, Mich. Mutual (30 min.)

FATHER COUGHLIN: 1937 "The Poplar Front vs. the Christian Front" Excellent sound (slight record scratch). "A rising challenge to Communism and to all foreign -isms from the lips of your fearless spokesman!" (60 min.)

FBI IN PEACE AND WAR: "Chaplain James" AFRS re-broadcast in excellent sound. Chaplain James McLain arrives in Clover City to undertake a Veterans' Monument Committee drive for funds. But McLain and his partner are swindlers, and they plan to leave town after they raise their \$5000. (25 min.)

FBI IN PEACE AND WAR: "Overexposure" Excellent sound. AFPS re-broadcast. A trio of crooks has added a new twist to the blackmail racket - an edited tape recording. (30 min.)

FBI IN PEACE AND WAR: "The Fence" Aug. 17, 1952 Superb sounding show taped directly from the CBS master. Sponsored by Lucky Strike. Tony Katana is a fence who specializes in double-crossing his clients. Ray Spence decides to turn the tables on Katana. Andre Baruch announces. CBS (30 min.)

FBI IN PEACE AND WAR: "The Traveling Man" June 10, 1953 Superb sound, taped directly from the CBS master. Sponsored by Brylcream, Lava and Nescafe. The delivery boy for a New York to Miami car-theft ring decides to go into business for himself. CBS (30 min.)

FIBBER MCGEE: This and the following seven shows have the same characteristics: Molly is ill and does not appear. VG+/exc. sound. Harlow Wilcox does the Johnson's Wax commercials, and at least several of the following are featured in each program - the Old Timer, Mrs. Uppington, Horatio K. Boomer, Nick Depopolous. Jan. 31, 1939 The Army is holding its winter maneuvers in Wistful Vista, and when word gets back to retired Major Fibber McGee, he decides to stop by and dispense some advice. NBC (30 min.)

FIBBER MCGEE: Feb. 7, 1939 Fibber spends the entire episode trying to fix a faulty window shade, with a little help from his friends. (30 min.)

FIBBER MCGEE: Feb. 14, 1939 A big snowstorm has hit Wistful Vista, and Fibber finds his water pipes have frozen. He goes down to the water company while the Old Timer attempts to build a fire in the McGee furnace. (30 min.)

FIBBER MCGEE: Feb. 21, 1939 Special guest is ZaSu Pitts. Fibber is asked to speak at a Roto-Wanis banquet when the scheduled speaker fails to show up. (30 min.)

FIBBER MCGEE: Feb. 28, 1939 A famous game hunter is in town looking for a partner for his next African expedition. Fibber wants to go, but first he must get rid of a mouse in his house. (30 min.)

FIBBER MCGEE: March 7, 1939 Special guest is ZaSu Pitts. Fibber opens a hamburger stand. (30 min.)

FIBBER MCGEE: March 14, 1939 Fibber is taking a course to help his memory. NBC (30 min.)

FIBBER MCGEE: March 21, 1939 Special guest is ZaSu Pitts. Fibber is afraid he's going bald. (30 min.)

FIBBER MCGEE: Nov. 23, 1941 Excellent sounding Johnson's Wax program. Molly speculates in a new "beauty clay" mine, but Fibber's sure the whole thing is a fraud. The Kingsmen sing "Katy Did." Martha Tilden sings "Jim." (30 min.)

FIBBER MCGEE: Aug. 12, 1944 Excellent sound (despite slight crosstalk) AFPS re-broadcast. A new house is being built next to the McGees, but according to Fibber, it's being built all wrong. So Fibber goes next door and instructs the builders to make a few changes...like adding a balcony and a swimming pool!! The Kingsmen sing "There I've Said It Again." (30 min.)

FIBBER MCGEE: "Cigarettes" 1944 AFPS re-broadcast in very good sound. McGee wants to get some cigarettes for his friend Doc Gamble, but the wartime shortage is causing him some problems. He decides to be a contestant on a local quiz show, "Smokes for Folks," where the prizes are cartons of cigarettes. Billy Mills Orch. plays "There Goes that Song Again." with Alice and Beulah (30 min.)

FIBBER MCGEE: "Doc Gamble's Cleanup" 1944 AFPS re-broadcast in excellent sound. The McGee's are worried that Dr. Gamble is working too hard during the shortage of physicians. So they decide to do a little cleaning up in the good doctor's house, with the usual chaos and hilarity resulting. (30 min.)

FIBBER MCGEE: Jan. 23, 1945 AFPS re-broadcast in excellent sound. McGee feels that he must use his "pent up" energy by fixing up the house. But he's having considerable trouble finding a project that is worthy of his talents. This show features Beulah and Alice. Billy Mills Orch. plays "Broadway Rhythm" (30 min.)

FIBBER MCGEE: Cancer Special in vg/exc. sound. Wartime. Fibber is worried because a good friend of his is scared to see a doctor for a check-up. This show features the closet! With Marlin Hurt as Beulah. ABC, Blue net, (15 min.)



His own show having been bumped from the air by one of the giveaway shows, comedian Fred Allen is gleeful over the FCC's 1949 decision to ban them.



In 1937 Mae West did an Adam and Eve skit with Charlie McCarthy and proved radio could be off-color.

FIBBER MCGEE: "New Pipe" vg+/exc. sounding Johnson's Wax program from 1949. Fibber takes up smoking a pipe - one that he got free with a generous trial size of tobacco - 3 pounds. The tobacco, aptly named "Old Mustard Mouth," has the peculiar habit of not staying lit. NBC (30 min.)

FIRESEIDE CHAT: Oct. 12, 1937 Excellent sound Pool feed from WOL, Washington President Roosevelt addresses the nation on financial, economic and agricultural affairs. He touches briefly on the international situation. Mutual (30 min.)

FIRST NIGHTER: Dec. 22, 1945 "Little Town of Bethlehem" vg+/exc. sound The annual Christmas show, starring Barbara Luddy and Clan Soule is presented for the ninth time. The sacred story of the birth of Christ. (30 min.)

FITCH BANDWAGON: March 9, 1947 vg sound with Fitch comm. Guest is Jack Benny. Phil is worried that Jack will not renew his contract for next season's show. Alice Faye sings "April Showers." NBC (30 min.)

FRANK MERRIWELL: "The Case of the Missing Records" vg/exc. sound The traditional football game with Princeton is about to start, but the eligibility records are missing and an important player cannot compete - and Frank himself cannot play since his own name is among the lists. NBC (30 min.)

FRANK SINATRA: Jan. 30, 1946 vg/exc. sound (a few skipped grooves) Frank sings "One More Dream and She's Mine," "Dearest Darling," "I Only Have Eyes for You" (with guest Benny Goodman's Sextet) and others. The Pied Pipers sing "Waiting for the Train to Come In." (30 min.)

FRED ALLEN: AFRS #48 from 1943 in excellent sound. Fred talks about the ham surplus and Mayor LaGuardia. Al Goodman's Orchestra plays "The Coast Guard Marching Song." Hi Lo Jack and the Dames sing "Take It Easy." Ed "Archie" Gardner guests as Fred is hit on the head by a beer barrel and taken into Duffy's Tavern for treatment. (30 min.)

FRED ALLEN: June 4, 1944 AFRS re-broadcast in excellent sound. Fred and Portland discuss the news, then Fred asks the residents of Allen's Alley "What is the hottest day you ever remember?" Hi Lo Jack and the Dames sing "Let's All Sing About Susie." Guest Peter Lorre talks about his childhood. (25 min.)

FRED ALLEN: Jan. 6, 1946 VG sound (hum) with Blue Bonnet and Tenderleaf comm. Fred talks about Bing Crosby and radio giveaway shows, then asks the residents of Allen's Alley "If you are a movie fan, what pictures and performances most impressed you in 1945?" Phil Baker stars as Fred tries to win \$8 on "Take It or Leave It" so he can pay his cab fare. NBC (30 min.)

FRED ALLEN: April 1946 Re-broadcast on AFRS' "To the Rear, March" program vg sound. Fred meets guest Leo Durocher in a restaurant. They do "The Brooklyn Pinafore." Fred's operetta. (15 min.)

FRED ALLEN: March 1946 Re-broadcast in AFRS' "To the Rear, March" program vg sound. Fred goes over to guest Ray Milland's house to ask him to star in "Another Lost Weekend," a movie about the pitfalls of candy. (15 min.)

FRED ALLEN: Oct. 13, 1946 vg/exc. sound with Shefford's Cheese and Tenderleaf Tea comm. Fred jokes about Columbus, cigarettes and sugar, and asks the residents of Allen's Alley "What did you do to observe Fire Prevention Week?" All the regulars and guest Tony Martin star in Fred's opera "The Radio Mikado." NBC (30 min.)

FRED ALLEN: Feb. 2, 1947 vg sound with Shefford's Cheese and Tenderleaf Tea comm. Fred talks about "fixing" races, snow and soot, then asks the residents of Allen's Alley "Have you ever won anything on a quiz program?" The DeMarco Sisters sing "Sooner or Later." In another of his pointed attacks on the Radio Establishment, Fred becomes guest Lauritz Melchior's agent and tries to get him a job on the radio. NBC (30 min.)

FRED ALLEN: May 11, 1947 This program, listed in the master catalogue, is now in VERY GOOD sound. (30 min.)

FRED ALLEN: April 23, 1948 Exc. sound with Ford comm. Fred talks about National Air Mail week, Ford, and Jack Benny, and asks the residents of Allen's Alley "What are you doing about your radio listening?" Fred tries to convince guest Bing Crosby to do the story of his life. a/c from WNBC-FM(1), N.Y. (30 min.)

FRED ALLEN: Excellent sound Material for the Fred Allen obituary program broadcast March 20, 1956 This is not the program, but the actualities that were used on it. Includes Fred discussing his theory of what makes people laugh and his early days in show business. Also, obit speeches by Bob Hope, Jimmy Durante and Jack Benny. (15 min.)

FRONT PAGE FARRELL: "The Blinding Light Murder Case" Oct. 30, 1950 Episode #1 in vg/exc. sound with comm. The cruel boss of a model agency is murdered, and the police have an open and shut case against one of the models. But David Farrell of the Daily Eagle thinks there's more to it. (15 min.)

FULTON LEWIS, JR: Jan. 25, 1939 vg/exc. sound The war in Europe is causing problems for the U.S. aviation industry; John L. Lewis vigorously opposes a third term for FDR; problems with the NLRB; other news. Mutual (15 min.)

GANGBUSTERS: "Soldier Boy" Excellent sound, complete with nationwide "clues." A shooting on the waterfront occurs, with no witnesses. Then, a \$43,000 payroll robbery. A soldier is sought by the police for information. (30 min.)

GARY OWENS: Friday, August 1, 1969 vg/exc. sound If you want to hear how far(?) radio has come in forty years, here's an hour (sans music) of famous "Laugh-In" personality Gary Owens' KMPC Los Angeles radio program. (30 min.)

GENE AUTRY: 1948 show in vg/exc. sound with Doublemint comm. Gene sings "Dixie Cannonball," "You Belong to My Heart," "Ages and Ages Ago," and tells the story of Marshal Bart Jackson. Pat Buttram talks about his pet duck. (30 min.)

GENE AUTRY: Tenth Anniversary show from 1950 in excellent sound. Featuring Pat Buttram and the boys, Charlie Lyon and Gene Autry's Blue Jeans. Gene sings "Down Yonder," "Blue Canadian Rockies," and tells the story of Joe Phillips. AFRS re-broadcast. (30 min.)

GLAMOUR MANOR: Oct. 3, 1946 vg sound Variety show with MC Kenny Baker ("Zip-a-dee-do-dah"), announcer Don Wilson and Sam Hearn as Schlepperman. Sponsored by Crisco and Ivory Snow. Kenny tries to borrow \$250 from guest Jack Benny. This show features Jack's famous vault. a/c from KECA, L.A. ABC net. (30 min.)

GO GET IT: Nov. 18, 1942 Exc. sound. In this quiz show, the contestants were assigned to bring ridiculous items back to the studio. Joe Bolton gives the assignments, Tom Slater finds out how and where the contestants got the required items. The first contestant, a sailor, brings back six ladies from a Turkish bath! Mutual (30 min.)

GOLDEN DAYS OF RADIC: Excellent sound. Tonight; famous Kentucky Derbys; Spike Jones' "Beetle Bomb" skit; Bob Newhart's spoof of TV travelogs; Jack Benny visiting his vault; Edgar Bergen and Charlie McCarthy with Marilyn Monroe, John Barrymore and W.C. Fields. (25 min.)

GOLDEN DAYS OF RADIC: Excellent sound. Tonight; Arthur Godfrey in 1934; Fred Allen and Harry Von Zell in 1940; famous radio commercials; Frank Sinatra singing a Halo commercial; Stan Freberg spoofing advertising. (25 min.)

GOLDEN DAYS OF RADIC: AFRS #3 in exc. sound (from disc) Tonight; Jo Stafford on the Carnation Contented Hour; an excerpt from a "Candid Microphone" show; Connie Mack discussing his life; Red Skelton show excerpt featuring Junior; the mean widdle kid. (25 min.)

GOLDEN DAYS OF RADIC: AFRS #27 in excellent sound. Helen O'Connell and Bob Eberle reunited with Tommy Dorsey and Jimmy Dorsey on March 3, 1956; an excerpt from Frank Fontaine's comedy shows; adventure show openings; Edgar Bergen and Charlie McCarthy on Fred Allen's show; Fred visits Allen's Alley. Frank Bresee hosts. (25 min.)

GOLDEN DAYS OF RADIC: AFRS #29 in exc. sound. Frank Bresee introduces Dorothy Lamour ("Personality"), a complete "Green Lantern" kids show; Jack Benny with Danny Kaye and Dinah Shore. (25 min.)

GOLDEN DAYS OF RADIC: Very good sound. Tonight; Jack Paar reading kids' letters from camp; Joe Penner (1938) taking an announcer's audition; Smith and Dale on the "Tonight" show, and his subsequent return. (20 min.)

GREAT GILDERSLEEVE: May 16, 1941 broadcast in excellent sound (a few skipped grooves). First show of the series, with Johnson's Car-Nu comm. Gildy arrives in Summerfield to take over his brother-in-law's estate. NBC (30 min.)

GREAT GILDERSLEEVE: "Child Psychologist" Excellent sound. Leroy is having problems with his school work, and his teacher thinks its due to a lack of concentration. Gildy believes a visit to a child psychologist may resolve Leroy's problem. (20 min.)

- GREAT GILDERSLEEVE: "Income Tax" Starring Willard Waterman. Excellent sound. It's income tax time, and Gildy is disturbed at all the money the government will be getting from him. In a dream sequence, Gildy owns all the money in the world. AFRS re-broadcast, complete in (20 min.)
- GREAT GILDERSLEEVE: "Rock and Roll" Excellent sound. Leroy is always listening to rock and roll, so Gildy takes him to a music store to give him an appreciation of good music. Guest is Katy Lee. AFRS (20 min.)
- GREAT GILDERSLEEVE: "Teacher of the Year" Excellent sound. Miss Henshaw, Leroy's school teacher, is thinking of leaving. Gildy and the "Jolly Boys" decide to elect her "Teacher of the Year" in the hope she'll stay. (20 min.)
- GREAT GILDERSLEEVE: "Vacation" Excellent sound. Gildy's secretary Bessie has a vacation coming, but has no place to go. So Gildy decides to take her, Birdie and Leroy to the mountains, and invites a relative of Mr. Peavy's to come along and keep Bessie company. AFRS (20 min.)
- GREAT GILDERSLEEVE: "Chamber of Commerce" VG sound (volume variation due to improper tracking on disc) Judge Hooker returns from Europe, and Gildy invites him to dinner. Gildy must tell the Judge that he (Gildy) is the new President of the Chamber of Commerce, a position previously held by the Judge. (20 min.)
- GREAT GILDERSLEEVE: "Love Thy Neighbor" Starring Harold Peary. Excellent sound. Gildersleeve is trying to be nice to an obnoxious neighbor, but the neighbor and his equally obnoxious son are making the job difficult. AFRS (30 min.)
- GREAT GILDERSLEEVE: "The Opera Comes to Summerfield" Dec. 1954 Excellent sound. The opera is coming to Summerfield, and Gildy is asked to work on the promotion committee. He refuses, until he gets a look at the beautiful young advance agent. NBC (15 min.)
- GREAT GILDERSLEEVE: "Conscience Fangs" Excellent sound. Willard Waterman stars. Gildy feels he's been neglecting his nephew, Leroy, lately, and resolves to become the boy's "pal." NBC (15 min.)
- GUESS WHO: May 20, 1944 Excellent sound. Sponsored by Sheffield Milk. A quiz show in which a recording of a famous voice or orchestra is played and the contestant has to guess who. The joking m.c. is Peter Donald. Mutual (30 min.)
- GUEST STAR: 1947 series #32 in excellent sound. Milton Berle and Kenny Delmar imitate famous radio comedians. (15 min.)
- GUEST STAR: Aug. 13, 1950 "The House of a Thousand Faces" Program #177 in vg sound. Audrey Totter stars as a struggling young actress who takes the job of time information girl while waiting for her "big break." (15 min.)
- GUNSMOKE: "Reward for Dillon" Excellent sound, with commercials. A woman (played by Jeanette Nolan) offers \$1000 reward for Dillon's life, after she learns that Dillon has killed her husband. (30 min.)
- GUNSMOKE: "Chester's Pa" Excellent sound, without commercials or closing sig. Chester's Pa comes to town, and Dillon discovers that Chester has been writing home a few little white lies. In his letters, Chester has told Pa that he's the marshal and Dillon's his deputy! (20 min.)
- GUNSMOKE: "The Hotel" This is the rehearsal for the actual show in excellent sound, featuring William Conrad and all the regulars. We get wrong music cues, laughing and breaking up, actors' asides, poor sound effects from "John" --- everything's wrong! Hilarious and fully recommended! (25 min.)
- GUNSMOKE: "The Hotel" Feb. 19, 1956 Excellent sound (very slight crosstalk) with Chesterfield commercials. Here's the show as it was finally broadcast. Enoch Mills is building a new hotel, but he encounters trouble with a rival and the hotel is burned to the ground. Enoch hires a gunfighter to protect the hotel as it is re-built. (25 min.)
- GUNSMOKE: "White Indian Boy" Starring William Conrad. Excellent sound, complete with a commercial for the 1958 Edsel (now there's a rarity!). A nearby rancher, after a gunfight with a band of Indians, comes to Marshal Dillon, with the story of having an Indian boy as a captive. Turns out the boy is white, not Indian. CBS network. (25 min.)
- GUNSMOKE: "Libby Redgate" Excellent sound. Libby Redgate is trying to keep her husband from "ruining" their son by taking him into town all the time and exposing the boy to wine, women and guns. (25 min.)

- GUNSMOKE: Excellent sound. A man is found three miles outside of Dodge, stabbed to death. But apparently he was killed somewhere else, then dumped near the city. This show was produced and recorded in Australia, and features the same characters and situations as its American counterpart, except for Marshal Matt Morgan. Morgan? (25 min.)
- HALLMARK PLAYHOUSE: "MacLeod's Folly" Jan. 6, 1949 Excellent sound, with comm. Starring Robert Young. During the Depression, a transient looking for work wanders into a hostile little town controlled by a political boss and a vicious police force. He goes to work for a small newspaper and begins a dangerous crusade against the town's "system." (30 min.)
- HALLMARK PLAYHOUSE: "Clay Shattered Doors" Jan. 13, 1949 Excellent sound, with comm. Starring Jane Wyman. Another excellent drama unfolds when a careless man causes an automobile accident while driving across a bridge in a snowstorm. The man's wife is killed, but her spirit hears the despairing voices of her husband and son, and she returns to life. (30 min.)
- HALLS OF IVY: "Mike Candor's Father" May 17, 1950 vg/exc. sound. The gentle charm and suavity of Ronald Coleman and his wife Benita Hume were exceedingly well met in this series about a college professor and his wife. Mike Candor's father has worked all his life to send his son through college. Now, Mike wants to return the favor and send his father through the university, but the father has deep reservations. NBC (30 min.)
- HAPPY DAYS: June 25, 1970 Excellent+ sound from CBS-TV. First show of the summer variety series recalling the music and comedy of the 1930s and 1940s. Starring Louis Nye, Bob and Ray (spoofing old radio shows), Jack Burns, plus impersonators of W.C. Fields and Laurel and Hardy. Tonight's guests are drummer Buddy Rich, big band singers Helen O'Connell and Bob Eberle, and Edgar Bergen with Charlie McCarthy. CBS-TV. (60 min.)
- HARDY FAMILY: "Andy's New Job" vg+/exc. sound (surface scratch) Starring Lewis Stone, Mickey Rooney and Fay Holden. Andy's parents decide to drop in and see how their son is making out in his new "junior executive" job. What Andy has neglected to tell them is that his position is that of "junior executive" office boy. MGM radio syndication. (30 min.)
- HARDY FAMILY: "Andy Takes Up Knitting" Program #49 in excellent sound. Andy and the Judge happen upon a mobile X-ray unit, and decide to get chest X-rays. The doctor tells Andy he is too high strung, and suggests that he take up knitting in order to relax. (30 min.)
- HARDY FAMILY: "Andy Bets on the Horses" Program #50 in excellent sound. Andy and Bezie (played by Dick Crenna) form a "syndicate" to get rich quick by betting on the horses. Mrs. Hardy, who is usually anti-gambling, suddenly develops a "system" to win every race. (30 min.)
- HAROLD TEEN: 1934 radio commercial for the new movie based on the famous comic strip character and his friends. VG sound. Features songs and scenes from the soundtrack, starring Hal Leroy, Chick Chandler and Rochelle Hudson. (15 min.)
- HEARTHSTONE OF THE DEATH SQUAD: "Terrifying Letter Murder Case" 1952 Excellent sound. A young woman who was a public stenographer is found murdered, along with a notorious gangster. Inspector Hearthstone believes the key to the crime will be found in a missing heir racket. CBS (30 min.)
- HELPING HAND: Aug. 14, 1941 FIRST HALF ONLY in vg/exc. sound with Ironized Yeast comm. John J. Anthony dispenses advice on personal problems. "The Case of Mrs. Flint" It seems her husband has brought another woman home to live! (and you thought YOU had problems!). (15 min.)
- HERE'S MORGAN: 1948 vg sound. Tonight's show is dedicated to the American school and features comments and satirical sketches about modern, progressive American grammar schools, high schools and colleges, their students and teachers. Stars Henry Morgan and Arnold Stang. Bernie Green's Orch. plays a medley of college songs. (25 min.)
- HERMIT'S CAVE: "From Another World" Story #294 from 1941 in good+/vg sound. A strange story about a force from outer space that takes control of several humans, killing them. Complete with Olga Coal comm. (30 min.)

HERMIT'S CAVE; "Plantation Mystery" Excellent sound (taped from disc) Episode #410 from 1943, complete with Olga Coal comm. Trouble arises on a banana plantation when an argument develops between the owner and his number one assistant. (30 min.)

HERMIT'S CAVE; "Castle By the Sea" vg/exc. sound, minus closing sig. A young couple is forced to spend the night in a castle by the sea. The old woman who lives there tells them a strange story. (25 min.)

HOLLYWOOD STARS SHOW; c. 1935 Al Jolson and Ruby Keeler promote the new Warner Bros. musical "Go Into Your Dance." Al sings the title song and others, and announcer Don Allen tells us the story line. Ruby sings "Have a Good Old-Fashioned Cocktail with a Good Old-Fashioned Gal." Helen Morgan is also featured. (15 min.)

HOUDINI SEANCE; Oct. 31, 1936 Excellent sound. On the tenth anniversary of Harry Houdini's death, his wife and friends attempt to contact him for the final time. (He doesn't return). (30 min.)

I WAS A COMMUNIST FOR THE FBI; "Little Red Schoolhouse" VG sound. Starring Dana Andrews as Matt Sevetic. In tonight's episode, Sevetic is given the assignment of introducing the communist philosophy to a local university through subversive contacts. At the same time, he is in danger of being exposed by a visiting communist official. (30 min.)

I WAS A COMMUNIST FOR THE FBI; "Panic Plan" Episode #77 in excellent sound. The summer is hot and the rainfall has been non-existent. With the reservoir running low, rigid water restrictions have been put into effect. The Communists start a rumor that the reservoir water is contaminated. (30 min.)

I WAS A COMMUNIST FOR THE FBI; "No Visitors" Program #78 in excellent sound. Matt is forced to assist in the killing of a local Red courier, who has apparently been giving information to the FBI. (30 min.)

INNER SANCTUM; "Wailing Wall" Good sound (dubbed from rather badly beaten discs) Boris Karloff stars as a man who murders his wife, then seals her body in the wall. Suddenly, he hears a low moaning wail coming from the wall! (25 min.)

INNER SANCTUM; "The Undead" Dec. 18, 1945 Excellent sound, with Lipton Tea and Soup comm. Starring Anne Seymour in a strange tale of the supernatural. An actor's wife finds a ten-year-old clipping with an announcement of her husband's death, and a picture of her husband. She travels to the grave of her husband's clipping, and finds . . . (30 min.)

INNER SANCTUM; "Death Demon" July 15, 1948 Excellent sound with Bromo-Seltzer and his stepmother's remarriage (sound familiar, Shakespeare fans?) a young man returns home. Certain his stepfather has killed his father (hang on, Hamlet). The young man finds himself possessed by a demon---the spirit of his murdered father, who controls his actions. (30 min.)

INTERVIEW; June 1967 KNBR (San Francisco) engineer Dave Amaral is interviewed about his collection of old-time radio programs. Excellent+ sound. (5 min.)

IT PAYS TO BE IGNORANT; Feb. 7, 1944 Excellent sound, sustaining. Quizmaster is Tom Howard, with Harry McNaughton, Lulu McConnell and George Shelton. The "experts" attempt to answer "What is a bread knife used for?" and "What time of year is best for winter sports?" Mutual net. (30 min.)

IT PAYS TO BE IGNORANT; Oct. 6, 1944 AFRS re-broadcast in excellent sound, with the same cast as above. Special guest is Deems Taylor. The "experts" have difficulty answering "How many notes are there in the musical scale?" and "What kind of wood was in the old oaken bucket?" (30 min.)

IT HAPPENED IN 1955; May 8, 1945 Excellent sound. Sponsored by the N.Y. Stock Exchange and War Bonds. Hosted by Del Sharbutt. Stories of the "future," ten years from now. Today - a man learns French in just four weeks in order to take a more rewarding job. Mutual net. (15 min.)

JACK BENNY; Jan. 16, 1938 Jello program in vg/exc. sound. Jack and Mary are driving to Los Angeles in the Maxwell. Then, the cast takes a look into the future to see what the show will sound like in 40 years. NBC (30 min.)

JACK BENNY; Jan. 23, 1938 Jello show in vg/exc. sound. Jack talks about his new picture. Kenny Baker sings "Love Walked In." The gang does a newspaper skit entitled "Behind the Front Page or Scoop Benny Scoop." NBC (30 min.)

JACK BENNY; Nov. 27, 1938 Jello show in vg/exc. sound. Jack talks about his cold and New York. Kenny Baker sings "My Reverie." The gang does a football skit called "Hold That Line, or One Moment Please." NBC (30 min.)

JACK BENNY; Dec. 11, 1938 Jello show in excellent sound. The cast kids Jack about not wanting to buy an overcoat; Mary reads a letter from her mother; Jack and Mary go Christmas shopping. NBC (30 min.)

JACK BENNY; April 4, 1942 Jello show in vg/exc. sound. Jack is kidded because his pants fell down in the Easter Parade; Dennis Day sings "In An Old Cathedral Garden." Don Wilson refuses to do the commercial; Mary reads a letter from her mother. NBC (30 min.)

JACK BENNY; May 3, 1942 Jello program in vg/exc. sound. The gang visits Jack at the Warner Bros. studio where he is making his new movie with guest star Ann Sheridan. NBC (30 min.)

JACK BENNY; Dec. 13, 1942 AFRS re-broadcast in vg/exc. sound. The show is from New York, and the cast kids Jack about staying in a cheap hotel. Special guest conductor Benny Goodman's Orch. plays "Hallelujah." Falstaff Openshaw drops by to bring greetings from Fred Allen. Special guest Gary Cooper and Jack go out on the town. (30 min.)

JACK BENNY; Jan. 7, 1945 AFRS #81 in vg/exc. sound. Next week the show will be in New York, so Jack goes down to his vault to get some money. At the train station, the cast runs into the expected ticket and station troubles. Larry Stevens sings "Don't Fence Me In." (30 min.)

JACK BENNY; AFRS #25 from 1945 in good/very good (crosstalk) sound, though this was taped from the disc. Jack, Mary and Phil go to see "Wonder Man," Danny Kaye's new picture about a ghost. But Jack dislikes the picture, saying the plot is too unbelievable. He goes home and starts to read a book about ghosts, with the result being a strange dream. (30 min.)

JACK BENNY; Jan. 9, 1949 Lucky Strike program in excellent sound (slight dropout in a few places). Jack meets guest Jimmy Stewart in a restaurant and tries to coerce him into making a picture that Jack will produce. CBS (30 min.)

JACK BENNY; Jan. 23, 1939 Lucky Strike program in vg/exc. sound. Jack is trying to get Don Wilson to sign his new contract by starving him; then he visits his dentist (played by Frank "Yeesees?" Nelson). CBS (30 min.)

JACK BENNY; Feb. 12, 1950 AFRS re-broadcast in excellent sound. From New York. Highly recommended, as Jack sticks a clothespin on his nose and does a very funny imitation of Allen's Alley, complete with the authentic "residents." The question is "Do you think television will replace radio?" (25 min.)

JACK BENNY; Oct. 1, 1950 show in excellent sound. Dennis sings "There Will Never Be Another You." Jack and the gang go to lunch. When they return, Jack finds that his Maxwell has been stolen! AFRS (30 min.)

JACK BENNY; Dec. 2, 1951 Lucky Strike show in very good sound. It's getting close to Christmas, which means its time for Jack and the cast to do their famous (and annual) Christmas shopping program. This year, Jack can't decide between the \$1.98 or the \$40.00 cuff links for Don. All the regulars are featured, along with Frank Nelson, Mel Blanc and Sheldon Leonard. (30 min.)

JACK BENNY; Dec. 14, 1952 Lucky Strike program in excellent sound. The annual Christmas show, with Mary, Rochester, Dennis Day, Bob Crosby, the Sportsmen Quartet and Don Wilson. This year, Jack buys a nail file for his sponsor and a gopher trap for Don. (30 min.)

JACK BENNY; May 31, 1953 Lucky Strike show in excellent sound. Jack tries to listen to the Indianapolis 500 race on the radio, but he gets everything from a quiz show to a little girl singing to a Mexican announcer. The Sportsmen do "Side By Side" (with Lucky Strike lyrics, of course!). (30 min.)

JACK BENNY; Dec. 13, 1953 Lucky Strike show in excellent sound. Another Christmas show which gives Jack an excellent opportunity to display his congenial stinginess. The only difference this year is that the cast is in Palm Springs instead of Los Angeles, and Jack has problems deciding between plain dates or dates stuffed with nuts for Don, instead of shoe laces or cuff links as in years past. CBS (30 min.)

JACK BENNY: May 29, 1955 Excellent sound. A note of sadness colors this show the final one Jack did on radio. Hereafter he would do his weekly TV show and forsake the medium on which he had figured so prominently for the past twenty-odd years. Jack jokes with the cast about this being the last show and has a hilarious bit with Twombly, the sound man (played by Mel Blanc) who wants to make his mark as a great sound-effects man. A fine show and a fitting end to one of the most phenomenal careers in show business. (30 min.)

JOE PALOOKA: Episode #7, listed in the master catalogue, is now in very good+/- excellent sound. (10 min.)

JOHN B. GAMBLING'S GYM CLASSES: Tuesday, Dec. 21, 1937 VG sound (varying volume levels due to improper tracking of disc). The original get-up-to-music-and-exercise early morning program, broadcast from the WOR studios in Carteret, N.J. Sponsored by Broadcast brand Corned Beef Hash and Hartz Mountain Bird Seed. John mixes the exercises with weather and time checks, jokes, birthday announcements and other asides. All music is played live by the studio orchestra (on 7 AM show!) (45 min.)

JOHNNY FLETCHER: "The Navy Colt" March 25, 1946 Audition disc in exc+ sound. Starring Albert Dekker and Mike Mazurki. A young woman hires Johnny and Sam, apparently trying to frame them for murder. Johnny solves the mystery with the aid of a Navy Colt revolver. NBC, Hollywood. (30 min.)

JOHNSON FAMILY: 1942 Excellent sound (a few skipped grooves) All voices in this comedy-drama about a Negro family are done by Jimmy Scribner. Mr. Sampson has come to the hotel to die. Papa Johnson seeks legal advice. (15 min.)

JOHNSON FAMILY: Aug. 25, 1944 vg/exc. sound. "Gorilla Joe" has barged into the Johnson house to take a furniture inventory, and Papa is scared to throw him out. Mutual. (15 min.)

JUBILEE: July 31, 1944 AFRS re-broadcast in excellent sound. Variety show with MCs Ernie "Bubbles" Whitman, Benny Goodman and his Orchestra ("Who's Sorry Now," "I'm Always Chasing Rainbows"), Art Tatum ("Song of the Vagabonds"), Lena Horne ("My Silent Love") and others. (30 min.)

KATE SMITH SHOW: April 12, 1946 AFRS #138 in excellent sound. Kate sings "Slowly," "Here Comes Heaven Again," "These Foolish Things Remind Me of You," and others. Guests are Dorothy Lamour ("Personality") and Ed Sullivan, who gives Kate an award. Ted Collins announces. (30 min.)

KRAFT MUSIC HALL: Nov. 12, 1942 vg/exc. sound. Bing sings "Praise the Lord and Pass the Ammunition," "Moonlight Becomes You," and others. Ginny Simms sings "Mr. Five-by-Five" and "Can't Get Out of this Mood" and harmonizes with Bing on "Dearly Beloved." The Charioteers sing "The Rose of Tralee" Also features comedians Ed Brophy and Victor Borge (telling how he took his car apart). Guest Edgar Buchanan stars in a skit about dentistry; Bing interviews a woman who works in a dive bomber factory. John Scott Trotter's Orchestra. NBC (60 min.)

KRAFT MUSIC HALL: Feb. 6, 1944 AFRS re-broadcast in excellent sound (#83) Bing sings "Moonglow" and "Night and Day" and jokes with Yuki. Bing and Marilyn Maxwell sing "Together." Special guests are Tommy and Jimmy Dorsey. (30 min.)

KRAFT MUSIC HALL: Nov. 18, 1968 NBC-TV soundtrack of "The Friars Salute Johnny Carson" Superb sound. Insults are thrown by the mayor of New York, John Lindsay, "Roastmaster" Alan King, Dick Cavett, Groucho Marx, Ed McMahon, Flip Wilson, Ed Sullivan, Steve Allen and Don Rickles. No commercials. (55 min.)

LADY ESTHER SCREEN GUILD THEATRE: "Blind Alley" Nov. 18, 1946 Excellent sound. Starring Edward G. Robinson and Broderick Crawford. A professor of psychology puts his training to the ultimate test when his home is invaded by a psychopathic killer. (30 min.)

LAND OF THE LOST: "Knives of the Square Table" Oct. 28, 1945 Excellent sound. This children's series each week presented the adventures of two young children who made friends with Red Lantern, a big red fish who glowed under water and talked! This week, Isabel and Billy journey to the undersea kingdom of lost spoons, forks and knives. There, they help the citizenry find a missing member of their clan. No closing sig. (25 min.)

LAND OF THE LOST: "The Lost Game Preserve" Jan. 6, 1946 vg/exc. sound. This week, taking the magic seaweed which enables them to breathe under water, Isabel and Billy travel to the land where all lost games such as Parcheesi, backgammon and cribbage end up. Mutual. (30 min.)

LIFE WITH LUIGI: Nov. 1, 1949 AFRS re-broadcast in vg/exc. sound. Starring J. Carroll Naish with Hans Conreid and Alan Reed. Luigi goes to a football game, but is seated on the side of the opposing team. (30 min.)

LIGHTS OUT: "The Coffin in Studio B" This program, listed in the master catalogue, is now in EXCELLENT sound. (30 min.)

LIGHTS OUT: "Love Comes to Professor Gildet" May 29, 1950 vg+/exc. sound from NBC-TV Sponsored by Admiral TV and Refrigerators. Starring Arnold Moss. A nuclear physicist has avoided romantic entanglements all his life, maintaining that he is "married" to his work. But love finally does come to the professor, in the unusual "Lights Out" tradition! Frank Gallup hosts. (30 min.)

LUM AND ABNER: "The Folding Cot" vg+/exc. sound. Complete. Abner wants to go fishing, but Lum has work for him to do. Abner's opportunity to escape, oddly, comes in the form of a folding cot. (15 min.)

LUM AND ABNER: The following twelve shows are all in excellent+ sound (dubbed directly from the discs), complete with Miles Laboratories commercials, and each runs 15 minutes.

LUX RADIO THEATRE: "National Velvet" Feb. 3, 1947 Excellent sound. Starring Elizabeth Taylor and Mickey Rooney with Donald Crisp. Enchanting story of a butcher's daughter and a bum kid who train a horse to win the famed Grand National race. (60 min.)

LUX RADIO THEATRE: "Ticket to Tomahawk" 1951 vg+/exc. sound with Lux comm. Dan Daily and Anne Baxter recreate their screen roles in this musical spoof of Westerns as a small-time theatrical group invades the West. (60 min.)

LUX RADIO THEATRE: "No Highway in the Sky" 1952 Excellent sound (no opening/closing sigs) Starring Jimmy Stewart and Marlene Dietrich. An absent-minded professor insists that a new commercial airliner is not safe due to metal fatigue. An excellent mixture of suspense and gentle comedy. (60 min.)

LUX RADIO THEATRE: "War of the Worlds" 1955 Excellent sound, minus comm. Starring Dana Andrews and Pat Crowley in George Pal's production for Paramount Studios. (55 min.)

LUX RADIO THEATRE: "Welcome Stranger" Excellent sound, minus opening/closing sigs and comm. Starring Cary Grant, Barry Fitzgerald and Pat Crowley. Delightful story of a young, carefree doctor who arrives in a small community to take over the practice of a conservative country doctor, getting involved with local girl and lovely little town. (50 min.)

LUX RADIO THEATRE: "Wake Up and Live" VG sound (surface noise) Host Cecil B. DeMille introduces this comedy starring Frank Sinatra, Bob Crosby, Marilyn Maxwell, Jimmy Gleason and James Dunn. An usher at a radio network (Sinatra) has a beautiful voice but is mike-shy. His girlfriend tricks him into going on the air and he becomes known as "The Phantom Troubador." AFRS (60 min.)

LUX RADIO THEATRE: "Cheaper By the Dozen" Excellent sound (minus opening sig) Starring Clifton Webb, Betty Lou Gerson and Rhoda Williams. Charming turn-of-the-century true story of the Gilbraith children, twelve strong, and their exacting father and mother. (60 min.)

LUX RADIO THEATRE: "Captain January" Excellent sound (slight volume variation at beginning; no closing sig) Starring Margaret O'Brien and Lionel Barrymore. Sentimental story of an orphan and her guardian, a lighthouse-keeper. (60 min.)

LUX RADIO THEATRE: "June Bride" Excellent sound, minus open/close/comm. Starring Ffcd MacMurray and Irene Dunne. Sophisticated comedy-drama expertly played and chock full of excitement. MacMurray plays a magazine writer and Irene is his boss. They're doing a feature story on June brides. (50 min.)

MAGIC KEY: Sept. 29, 1935 Second half only, in good/vg sound. Sponsored by RCA Victor. Announcer is Milton Cross. In Hollywood, Don Wilson interviews Mickey Mouse on his 7th birthday, then Walt Disney introduces "Mickey's Grand Opera." Paul Whiteman's Orch. plays "I'm Sitting High on a Hilltop." Amos and Andy discuss their careers in radio. NBC (30 min.)

MAIL CALL: AFRS #72 from 1944 in excellent sound. This show is dedicated to the fighting men of Illinois and is hosted by Jack Benny. Featuring the Delta Rhythm Boys ("Paper Doll"), Skinnay Ennis Orchestra ("Chicago"), Johnny Mercer ("G.I. Jive"), and Judy Garland ("Speak Low" and in a sketch with Jack) (30 min.)

MAJOR BOWES: Dec. 16, 1937 Sound varies between vg/exc. minus, although this was copied from the CBS master. Sponsored by Plymouth, Dodge, DeSoto and Chrysler. Honor city is Binghamton, N.Y. Tonight's talent includes tap dancers, singers, violinist, impressionist, trio, Irish tenor, opera singer. (60 min.)

MAN CALLED X: "The Laughing Lady" vg+/exc. sound with Frigidaire comm. Final show. Herbert Marshall stars as Ken Thurston, trying to put an end to the Mafia. Thurston is tipped off that a circus appearing in Sicily can lead him to the Mafia chieftans and flies to the island to complete his last mission. Columbia Broadcasting System (30 min.)

MAN FROM HOMICIDE: July 16, 1951 Excellent sound Dan Duryea stars as Lt. Lou Dana, the man from homicide. Old man Kelso calls the police, claiming that his brother-in-law is trying to kill him. Lt. Dana is assigned to the case. American Broadcasting Company. (30 min.)

MARCH OF TIME: Oct. 5, 1934 Good/vg sound Sponsored by Time and narrated by Westbrook Van Vorhis. Stories dramatized this week: Gen. Hugh Johnson retires from NRA; scandal in French government; Herbert Hoover attacks NRA; Henry Wallace defends FDR's administration; Bruno Richard Hauptman is indicted for the Lindbergh baby kidnapping. CBS (30 min.)

MARX BROTHERS: "Hollywood Agents" vg/exc. sound. From 1938, this show presents Groucho and Chico as two zany Hollywood agents. An opera number, comprising about three minutes of the show, has been cut. (15 min.)

MENGRIES FROM RADIC'S HEYDAY: 1965 Excellent sound. Produced by WPMQ, Cumberland College. Featured: Al Jolson, Pearl Harbor, Lone Ranger, Winston Churchill, KDKA, 1920 election returns, William Jennings Bryan, Clarence Darrow, Amos 'n' Andy, reports on Lindbergh's progress, W.C. Fields, Bing Crosby, Will Rogers, Eddie Cantor, Jimmy Durante, Burns and Allen, war news, etc. (60 min.)

MICHAEL SHAYNE: "The Case of the Mail Order Murders" Nov. 1943 Exc. sound. Starring Jeff Chandler. Shayne is hired to protect a man who has received a death note with several names, including his own, listed on it. Next morning, one of the men on the list turns up dead. Also starring Jack Webb (in one of his first radio shows) as Inspector LeFevre. (30 min.)

MICHAEL SHAYNE: "The Case of the Blood-Stained Pearls" July 29, 1948 Program #3 Syndicated. Excellent sound. An old man named Peters comes to Shayne with a wild story about three valuable pearls. A jeweler says they're worthless, but shortly thereafter, Peters is murdered. (30 min.)

MICHAEL SHAYNE: "The Case of the Left-Handed Fan" Excellent sound. An actress hires Shayne to protect her from an unknown killer. She suspects either her director or a wealthy admirer, both of whom are jealous of her supposed affection towards her business manager. (30 min.)

MILDRED BAILEY SHOW: Oct. 20, 1944 AFRS re-broadcast in vg/exc. sound. Mildred sings "Hold On," "I Didn't Know About You," and others. The Delta Rhythm Boys sing "Moonglow." Also featured are Charlie Shavers, Teddy Wilson, Red Norvo and the Paul Baron Orch. Special guest is Jimmy Dorsey ("I Got Rhythm"). (30 min.)

MISS PINKERTON, INC: July 12, 1941 First show of the series in excellent sound. Starring Joan Blondell and her then husband, Dick Powell, this charming comedy-adventure series centered around a young lady studying law who finds she has been left her late uncle's detective agency in New York. For her first assignment, she agrees to watch over a fabulous emerald at a society party, to prevent a possible theft. The supporting cast includes some of radio's greatest talents in some of their earliest known appearances: Hanley Stafford, Gale Gordon and Elliott Lewis. (30 min.)

MR. ACE AND JANE: Jan. 16, 1948 First episode of the new series in superb sound, taped directly from the CBS master. Today - Chapter 1 "Jane's brother Paul, who hasn't worked in 12 years, tries to borrow \$200 from Mr. Ace." Announcer Ken Roberts has a hilarious part in this show. CBS (30 min.)

MR. DISTRICT ATTORNEY: "The Case of One Slip Meant Death" Excellent sound, complete with Vitalis and Sal Hepatica comm. Starring Jay Jostyn, Len Doyle and Vicki Vola. Our crime-fighting trio is attending the circus when a tiger mauls one of the performers, killing him. The D.A. suspects foul play! (30 min.)

MR. DISTRICT ATTORNEY: "The Case of the Money Machine" April 11, 1951 Exc. sound with Sal Hepatica and Vitalis comm. Jay Jostyn stars. A mental patient who has an amazing facility for figures is "removed" from the mental hospital by a man who wants the patient for a carnival side-show attraction. He is billed as "The Lightning Calculator." NBC (30 min.)

MR. DISTRICT ATTORNEY: "Case of the Hijack Killer" Excellent sound. Starring David Brian, in possibly an audition for the later television series. The D.A. tracks down a man who has hijacked two auto carriers and killed both of the drivers. (30 min.)

- MR. KEEN, TRACER OF LOST PERSONS: "The Case of the Rushville Murder" Excellent sound. AFRS re-broadcast. A doctor's daughter is murdered, and one of his patients, an escaped insane woman, is suspected of the crime. (25 min.)
- MURDER BY EXPERTS: "Three's A Crowd" Excellent sound. Hosted by Bret Halliday, creator of Michael Shayne. The new piano-player at a nightclub is warned to stay away from the boss' wife. Unfortunately, the boss' wife has other ideas. Mutual. (30 min.)
- MURDER BY EXPERTS: "Return Trip" Sept. 11, 1949 Excellent sound. Hosted by John Dickson Carr. On a bus, three people and the driver are warned that an inmate has escaped from an insane asylum. They soon learn that he is one of them! Mutual. (30 min.)
- MUTUAL DEDICATORY PROGRAM: Dec. 29, 1936 Excellent sound. Mutual becomes a coast-to-coast network as it merges with the Don Lee net and several regional networks. Hosted by Gabriel Heatter, with messages from the Chairman of the FCC, the President of WOR, Frank Knight, George M. Cohan, and remotes from other stations along the network. 50 minutes of a longer show. (50 min.)
- MUTUAL-DON LEE DEDICATORY PROGRAM: Dec. 30, 1936 vg/exc. sound (slight volume variation in parts) A program celebrating the joining of the two nets, originating in Los Angeles from KHJ. Hosted by Conrad Nagle and featuring Hugh Herbert, Dixie Dunbar, Edward Arnold in scenes from "John Meade's Woman," John Conte, and many others, plus remotes from stations along the net. (90 min.)
- MY FRIEND IRMA: "Mrs. O'Reilly's Singing" VG sound (some volume variation at beginning). Starring Marie Wilson. Kindly old Mrs. O'Reilly, the girls' landlady, has been arrested for disturbing the peace as a result of her singing. At her trial, she plans to plead innocent, her defense being that her singing is art. (25 min.)
- MYSTERIOUS TRAVELER: "The Devil and the Deep Blue Sea" Excellent sound. Three treasure hunters in the Caribbean find a sunken treasure ship, and a ghost guarding it. Mutual. (30 min.)
- MYSTERIOUS TRAVELER: "Vacation from Life" Sept. 7, 1947 Excellent sound. A meek college professor finds an explosive mine on a beach and decides to put it to use. Mutual. (30 min.)
- MYSTERIOUS TRAVELER: "Murder in Jazztime" April 20, 1948 Excellent sound. A nightclub singer and her husband honeymoon in New Orleans, where the wife becomes obsessed with a jazz musician there. The husband murders the musician, but the man's music comes back to haunt him! Mutual. (30 min.)
- MYSTERIOUS TRAVELER: "The Lady in Red" May 30, 1950 Excellent sound. A newspaperman finds a mysterious lady in red turning up every time a death occurs. Her name turns out to be "Theda" which the reporter eventually realizes is an anagram for . . . Mutual. (30 min.)
- MYSTERIOUS TRAVELER: "The Planet Zeivus" May 1, 1951 A spaceship lands in the rubble of a distant planet. There, in the charred remains, the crew finds traces of a past civilization. A twist ending and in excellent sound. (30 min.)

- NEWS: Oct. 20, 1939 Excellent sound (first 17 seconds muffled). H.V. Kaltenborn reports. Indignant over slurs against N.Y. World's Fair; conflicting reports from Germany re peace; Lindbergh's second speech meets mixed reactions; pressure on Italy to stay out of war; other news. CBS (15 min.)
- NEWS: June 3, 1940 "The World Today" Excellent sound. William R. Shirer (Berlin); German propaganda statements re British secret service plans; Eric Sevareid (Paris); German bombing of Paris nets 200 casualties; Edward R. Murrow (London); RAF in Munich, Stuttgart areas. CBS (15 min.)
- NEWS: "Elmer Davis" May 30, May 31, June 1, 1940 Excellent sound. These are 3 complete newscasts done while Mr. Davis was employed by CBS. Flanders battle continues; German plane losses heavy; Italy may war in a week//FDR asks for authority to call reserve and guard//Dunkerque evacuation continues. (15 min.)
- NEWS: June 1, 1941 "Behind the scenes in the CBS newsroom" Excellent sound. Elmer Davis in an on-the-spot description of the newsroom operation in N.Y. covering the war. CBS newschief Paul W. White and Edward R. Murrow are heard in a transatlantic short-wave conversation, Murrow from London. (15 min.)
- NEWS: Oct. 30, 1941 "The World Today" Excellent sound. John Daly reports. Russians said repulsing German drive at Moscow; Sevastopol threatened; Edward R. Murrow (London); Russians defend Rostov; coal strike ends in Britain. Alexander Woollcott (London) discusses George Bernard Shaw at 85; Albert Warner (Washington); John L. Germany may hit Stalingrad from the south; Russia says the second front is now ineffective in Caucasus; Eric Sevareid (Washington) reports on the Congressional debate over McCormack-Patterson charges; Remotes from Robert Trout (London) and Chester Morrison (Cairo). (15 min.)

- NEWS: Aug. 11, 1942 "The World Today" Excellent sound. Quincey Howe reports. Hand-to-hand fight in Solomons; US bombs Canton; Eric Sevareid (Washington) reports on an Army spy hoax; Robert Trout (London); court martial; Chester Morrison (Cairo) on the U.S. supply system (15 min.)
- NEWS: Sept. 13, 1942 "World News Tonight" Last half only in excellent sound. William Ewing (Honolulu); conditions there; Norman Corwin (London) interviews two men who participated in the Battle of the Atlantic; Albert Leitch (Wash.); anti-inflation measures; Harry Marble (N.Y.); Axis propagandists hit FDR all week long; baseball scores. (15 min.)
- NEWS: Sept. 22, 1942 "The World Today" Excellent sound. John Daly reports. The Germans and Russians are engaged in fierce battles for Stalingrad as the defense of the city moves into its 30th day; Polish units sent to Mid East; Reports from Eric Sevareid (Wash.) and Charles Collingwood (London). (15 min.)
- NEWS: Sept. 5, 1943 *vr/exc.* sound with Douglas Shoes comm. John Stanley reports. Allies invade Lae and Salamaua; action in Italy; Russia is heading towards Stalino; Berlin may have been bombed; other news. Tonight, on the eve of Labor Day, John Stanley salutes the American war worker. Mutual. (15 min.)
- NEWS: May 2, 1944 "The Sinclair Headliner" First show of the series, in *vr/exc.* sound with Sinclair Gil comm. Frank Singiser reports. The world is waiting for D-Day; news of Allied bombings; the Montgomery Ward case; plane production dropped in April; other news. Mutual. (15 min.)
- NEWS: June 6, 1944 D-Day as reported by CBS News. Six hours, averaging very good sound. The great invasion, beginning with unconfirmed reports intercepted by Allied newsmen from German radio. These early bulletins are relayed by CBS anchorman Bob Trout with a degree of skepticism. Trout reports that CBS will work overtime until the Nazi reports are either confirmed or denied from Supreme Allied Headquarters "somewhere in England." The scene shifts to the Hollywood Palladium for an interlude of dance music, but almost immediately the report is confirmed: the invasion has begun! the longest day has started!! The first 4½ hours are continuous coverage, with the final 1½ hours made up of isolated newscasts. Voices of Eisenhower, FDR, DeGaulle and various heads of state are heard, along with newsmen Edward R. Murrow, Douglas Edwards, Quentin Reynolds, John Daly, Joe McCaffrey, George Fielding Eliot, Richard C. Hottelet, Charles Collingwood, Charles Shaw, Bill Henry, Ned Calmer and Quincey Howe. (SIX HOURS)
- NEWS: June 6, 1944 "Ten o'Clock Wire" *Exc.* sound A relatively unknown newscaster named Chet Huntley reports on the invasion; the AP correspondent who jumped the gun with the invasion story is comforted by the press; new Russian forces are expected in the fight against Germany; other news. CBS (15 min.)
- NEWS: Dec. 20, 1944 "The World Today" *vr/exc.* sound, no close. Douglas Edwards reports. Germany is using 13-15 divisions in Belgium; weather is bad. Glen Stadler (London); Buzz bombs fall on Allied lines. Tris Coffin (Wash.); Cabinet changes. Webley Edwards (Honolulu); Iwo Jima, Bonins raided. (15 min.)
- NEWS: Dec. 23, 1944 "The World Today" Excellent sound. Douglas Edwards reports. German offensive slowed; situation obscure. Richard C. Hottelet (Brussels); German dive-bombings. Ned Calmer (Paris); summary of use of airpower against Germany. No closing. (15 min.)
- NEWS: May 7, 1945 *Exc.* sound with Hoffman Beer comm. Fred Vandeventer reports. News of a false V-E Day; fighting in Prague; action in the Pacific; Congress has confirmed Truman's choice of Postmaster General. WCR, N.Y. (15 min.)
- NEWS: May 7, 1945 *Exc.* sound The eve of V-E Day! Pres. Truman is ready to go on the air; AP gets news of surrender; Times Square roped off for celebration; air attacks on Jap vessels; 48-hour work week may be suspended; blood donors needed. Airchecked from KGIN, Portland, Oregon. (15 min.)
- NEWS: May 9, 1945 Excellent sound Pool feed from the bombed out city of Berlin. Howard K. Smith reports. A very dramatic report describing the utter destruction of every recognizable landmark. (10 min.)
- NEWS: July 28, 1945 Excellent sound. A B-25 Bomber has just crashed into the 79th floor of the Empire State Building. Paul Killiam reports from near the gaping hole. Mutual. (15 min.)

- NEWS: Sept. 1, 1945 Excellent sound V-J Day A remote from the battleship USS Missouri in Tokyo Bay as the Japanese surrender. The complete ceremonies, including speeches by Gen. MacArthur and Admiral Nimitz, and from the White House, President Truman. ABC net. (50 min.)
- NEWS: July 1947 (Friday) Excellent sound. Robert Trout reports. The Paris Conference opens tomorrow, but eight invited nations plus Russia won't attend; British troops have been ordered out of Egypt; Pres. Truman will send Congress a report on US economic outlook; other news. (15 min.)
- NEWS: March 12, 1954 Excellent sound. Sponsored by Amoco. Edward R. Murrow lashes out at Sen. McCarthy. He plays recordings of the Senator and refutes them fact for fact. Highly recommended. CBS (15 min.)
- NEWS: April 27, 1965 Excellent sound. Edward R. Murrow memorial from CBS-TV Evening News program. Walter Cronkite reports. Short tributes from Pres. Johnson and Eric Sevareid. An excerpt from the famous 1954 "See It Now" program on Senator Joseph McCarthy is played. (10 min.)
- NEWS: "The Incredible Year -- 1968" Excellent sound. Narrated by Charles Kuralt. This program was not broadcast, but was sent to CBS affiliates for their own use. Highlights: The Pueblo; King and Kennedy assassinations; the Primaries, Conventions and Campaigns; Protest and the War; the Space Program. (55 min.)
- NORMAN CORWIN PRESENTS: "The Undecided Molecule" vz/exc. sound without close. A very unusual courtroom trial as a molecule is tried for having a mind of its own. Featured in the cast are Robert Benchley, Groucho Marx, Vincent Price, and Keenan Wynn. (20 min.)
- OFFICIAL DETECTIVE: "Stone Quarry Murder" vz/exc. sound (audio scratch) A man is found lying wounded in a stone quarry; his wife is found dead in their car. Lt. Britt investigates. (30 min.)
- OPENING OF THE NEW 6th AVE. SUBWAY: Dec. 14, 1940 Excellent sound. Dave Driscoll reports from the 34th street station. Mayor LaGuardia makes a short speech. WOR, New York. (15 min.)
- ORPHAN ANNIE: "Pirate Pearls" an isolated chapter from 1940 in vz/exc. sound with Ovaltine commercials, which plug the "brand new 1940 model two-in-one shake-up mugs!" Annie and Joe are watching a pirate ship, anchored at a cove above a fortune in pearls. Complete with authentic open/close. (15 min.)
- OUR MISS BROOKS: "Walter's Weather Report" vz/exc. sound, complete with comm. Miss Brooks is serving as acting principal of Madison High School in Mr. Conklin's absence, when suddenly she is facing a dilemma. On Walter Denton's homemade radio she hears that a hurricane is approaching, and decides to close down the school. But Walter's set is shortwave, and the weather report comes from Bombay, India. (30 min.)
- OZZIE AND HARRIET: Dec. 12, 1948 Excellent sound, with International Sterling comm. Ozzie becomes the family "gloom chaser" when he finds that Harriet and the boys are worried about their small problems. His concern with worrying produces some interesting psychological problems. NBC (30 min.)
- OZZIE AND HARRIET: Dec. 19, 1948 vz/exc. sound with 1847 Rogers Bros. Silver comm. It's Christmas time again, and this year the Nelson's have decided to be sensible; they've bought themselves a beautiful new radio-phonograph and decided that will be that. But eventually their resolve begins to crumble, and suddenly the rush is on to get the other something else. NBC (30 min.)
- OZZIE AND HARRIET: "Romantic Evening" Excellent sound. Neighbor Thornberry takes the boys on a camping trip for the evening, so Ozzie and Harriet plan to spend a romantic evening at home. But as expected . . . NBC (30 min.)
- PENNY SINGLETON SHOW: "Burglar Scare" Excellent sounding situation comedy about a widow with two young children. There have been several burglaries in Penny's neighborhood, and her friends are very concerned for her safety. But Penny is not, so her friends decided to "protect" her. Supporting cast includes Gale Gordon, Jim Backus and Bea Benadaret. NBC (30 min.)



- PEOPLE ARE FUNNY; Sept. 19, 1950 Excellent sound. Sponsored by Raleigh cigarettes. This program begins the show's 10th season on the air. The first contestant is sent out to borrow a family! Starring Art Linkletter. NBC (30 min.)
- PEOPLE ARE FUNNY; Oct. 3, 1950 AFRS re-broadcast in excellent sound. Starring Art Linkletter. A "bum" is sent to beg \$100; a bachelor has been sent 3000 miles to try and find a wife. (30 min.)
- PETE KELLY'S BLUES; Aug. 29, 1951 vg/exc. sound (surface noise) Starring Jack Webb in this series about the jazz age, set in the 1920s. A gangster's girlfriend suddenly develops a liking for Pete, much to his dismay because he's about to be forced into a wedding. But before he can take that long walk to the altar, his intended turns up dead! NBC (30 min.)
- PHILIP MARLOWE; "The Kid on the Corner" Exc. sound. Starring Gerald Mohr. The corner newsboy asks Marlowe to find his uncle, who has suddenly disappeared. Marlowe finds the uncle is a sometimes bookie, and is supposedly in possession of a bundle of money from a recent horserace. (30 min.)
- PHILIP MORRIS PLAYHOUSE; "Double Indemnity" VG sound. Gloria Swanson stars in James Cain's tense, exciting story of an insurance salesman coerced into a murder plot by an alluring wife and the subsequent investigation by the salesman's boss. (30 min.)
- PHILO VANCE; "Sterling Murder Case" vg/exc. sound. Political candidate Joe Sterling is murdered, and Vance's principal suspect is Frank Allen, campaign manager for Sterling's opponent. (30 min.)
- PLAYHOUSE 90; "The Weather for Murder" Excellent sound. Produced in Australia. One of two sisters who run a small tea shop aspires to become a great detective story writer. Her enthusiasm is considerably heightened when a cottage catches fire and a charred body is found among the ruins. (55 min.)
- PLAYHOUSE 90; "The Ghost Train" Excellent sound. Produced in Australia. Three travelers find themselves stranded at a small wayside train station on a stormy night. The stationmaster tells them a strange story about a ghost train and advises them to leave at once, but they decide to stay the night and catch the first train in the morning - a decision which they soon regret. (55 min.)
- PORTIA FACES LIFE; Nov. 1, 1948 vg sound with Post 40% Bran Flakes comm. Starring Lucille Wall. Portia announces she's going to have a baby, but her husband Walter has left her; meanwhile, in Ankara, Turkey, Walter is blind, but he learns some encouraging news. NBC (15 min.)
- PORTIA FACES LIFE; Nov. 2, 1948 vg sound with Post Foods comm. Bill and Kathy discuss the argument they had last night; Joan glances at Walter's letter. (15 min.)
- PORTIA FACES LIFE; Nov. 3, 1948 vg sound with Post Foods comm. Portia's neighbors question the mailman as to whether she has received a letter from Walter. (15 min.)
- PORTIA FACES LIFE; Nov. 4, 1948 vg sound with Post Foods comm. Joan tells Mrs. Randall about Portia having a baby. NBC (15 min.)
- PUT UP OR SHUT UP; Jan. 4, 1946 Audition program in excellent sound. Jack Barry m.c.'s this quiz show where the contestants have to put up a forfeit (such as a love letter or a man's girdle) before they try to answer the questions. (30 min.)
- QUEEN FOR A DAY; May 23, 1952 Excellent sound. M.C. Jack Bailey asks the five ladies why they want to be "Queen for a Day." The first lady wants Railway Express to find Josephine, her missing cat. Sponsored by Kraft Foods and Old Gold Cigarettes. Mutual. (30 min.)
- QUENTIN REYNOLDS; Jan. 26, 1942 Excellent sound. The famous commentator answers questions about the war put to him at a dinner in his honor. (15 min.)
- QUIET, PLEASE!; "Let the Lillies Consider" Excellent sound. A man spends enormous amounts of time cultivating the lillies in his garden. When his wife becomes jealous of the flowers, they seem to take on a spirit of their own, threatening her life. (30 min.)
- QUIET, PLEASE!; "Valentine" Excellent sound. A man fondly remembers his earlier days - the small town, a summer romance, and an unusual valentine. ABC (30 min.)
- QUIET, PLEASE!; "Clarissa" 1948 vg sound. A young man takes lodging in a creepy old house, overseen by a peculiar old man. A young child can be heard singing on the premises, and the old man admits it is his daughter, Clarissa. But the man's wife died 42 years ago, and the child cannot be more than eleven or twelve! Mutual. (30 min.)

- QUIZ KIDS; Dec. 6, 1942 Excellent sound with Alka-Seltzer comm. M.C. is Joe Kelly. First question: "What is the name of the telephone operator in Pine Ridge, Arkansas?" Other topics include morals, famous heroes, the Bible, temperatures and sponsors. Blue network. (30 min.)
- QUIZ KIDS; 1943 program in very good sound. Joe Kelly m.c.'s First question: "If you were in a hurry to drain the water out of your bathtub, would it drain quicker if you continued to sit in it after pulling the plug or if you climbed right out?" Other topics include literature, politics, math and "famous Allens." Guest judge is Jack Benny. Sponsored by Alka-Seltzer. Blue network. (30 min.)
- QUIZ KIDS; Oct. 3, 1948 Excellent sound with Alka-Seltzer comm. M.C. is Joe Kelly, who has just become a grandfather. First question: "The name of what fish, spelled backwards, is the name of a famous general?" Other topics include opera, music, science and children's stories. NBC (30 min.)
- RCA VICTOR SHOW; Oct. 21, 1945 Excellent sound. Sponsored by RCA Victor records. Host Tommy Dorsey introduces singer Gladys Swarthout ("I'll Remember April," "None But the Lonely Heart," "The Gambler's Wife" and others). Jay Blankton's Orch. plays "Chickery-Chick." Tommy plays "Body and Soul." NBC (30 min.)
- RED RYDER; "Timber Tornado" 1947 vg/exc. sound (some groove skips) Red and Buckskin observe a train wreck in which the owner of a lumber company is killed. Red suspects foul play and believes the woods boss is responsible. (30 min.)
- RICHARD DIAMOND; "The Jacoby Case" Excellent sound. Diamond is called in for consultation by police when a Mafia leader deported to Italy suddenly reappears in the U.S. Evidence of the gangster's return mounts when three witnesses who testified against him are found murdered. (30 min.)
- ROCKY FORTUNE; "The Museum" very good sound Starring Frank Sinatra as "that footloose and fancy-free young gentleman." Rocky is giving guided tours at the Museum of Ancient History when a woman on the tour disappears. He searches and finds her body in King Tut's tomb, but is then knocked unconscious. When he comes to, there is no sign of the body! NBC (20 min.)
- ROCKY JORDAN; "My Quiet Friend" April 10, 1949 Excellent sound. Starring Jack Koyles. Two hoodlums are forcing every nightclub owner in Cairo to sell their interests at ten cents on the dollar. Eventually they reach Rocky Jordan and insist that he sell his Cafe Tambourine. Jordan elects to join forces with another restaurateur, but his erstwhile partner is murdered before the two can find a way out of their dilemma. (30 min.)
- ROCKY JORDAN; "The Broken Wing" July 10, 1949 Excellent sound. An old friend in Cairo brings to Rocky Jordan his greatest treasure, and asks that he protect it with his life. That treasure -- his daughter. (30 min.)
- ROCKY JORDAN, SPACE RANGER; "Shipwrecked on Planet X" Excellent sound, from a commercial release. Rocky rescues a scientist and his young ward who have crashed on Planet X. (10 min.)
- ROGER KILGORE, PUBLIC DEFENDER; "The Case of Eddie Lewis" Oct. 12, 1948 Final show of the series in exc+ sound. Starring Santos Ortega and Staats Cotsworth. A prizefighter is stabbed in the shoulder, causing serious muscle damage. The victim blames Eddie Lewis, who maintains his innocence, but the evidence soon begins to pile up against him. Mutual. (30 min.)
- ROY ROGERS; March 4, 1951 AFRS re-broadcast in excellent sound. Roy and Clackity break up a gang of outlaws that has been raiding wagons. Dale Evans sings "Snow on the Mountain." Roy and Dale sing "Talk With the Lord" (30 min.)
- SALUTE TO BING CROSBY; Jan. 9, 1951 Exc.+ sound. Bing is celebrating his 20th anniversary in show business. MC Art Linkletter introduces Edgar Bergen and Charlie McCarthy, Mary Martin, William S. Paley (Chairman of the Board, CBS), Ella Fitzgerald, Amos 'n' Andy, Dorothy Kirsten, Louis Armstrong and Jack Teagarden, Judy Garland, Mrs. H.L. Crosby, Sr. (Bing's mother), Bob Hope, and of course, Bing. CBS (30 min.)
- SAH SPADE; "Subject: Edith Hamilton" Exc. sound (rough opening) Sam is hired to find the answer to an old unsolved death, but complications ensue when he is attracted to Edith Hamilton, the leading suspect. AFRS (30 min.)

- SHERLOCK HOLMES: "The Adventure of the Blue Carbuncle" Dec. 24, 1945 vx sound. Sponsored by Petri Wines. Starring Basil Rathbone and Nigel Bruce. On Christmas Eve, an old friend of Holmes' asks him to attend a party in disguise - as Santa Claus - in order to keep an eye on some valuable presents. (30 min.)
- SHERLOCK HOLMES: "A Scandal in Bohemia" vg/exc. sound. Sponsored by Petri Wines. Starring Basil Rathbone and Nigel Bruce. Holmes and Watson have three days in which to recover a photograph that would prove most embarrassing to their client, the King of Bohemia. Mutual. (30 min.)
- SIGMUND SPAETH'S MUSIC QUIZ: March 28, 1947 Last show of the series in exc. sound. The Tune Detective traces the background of some radio singing commercials and answers other musical questions relating to pianos, operas, the "Surprise Symphony," compositions, others. (15 min.)
- SILVER EAGLE, MOUNTIE: "Red-Coat Justice" fair/good sound, improving to good+ sound near the end. "The untamed North...where one man, dedicated to the motto of the Canadian Northwest Mounted Police, faces danger and death to bring in the lawless and maintain the right...the most famous Mountie of them all...the Silver Eagle!" Starring Jim Ameche (who had earlier been radio's All-American boy, Jack Armstrong). The Silver Eagle tracks down two outlaws who have stolen valuable gold dust from an elderly prospector and his wife. (30 min.)
- SILVER THEATRE: "Four on a Match" December 1940 generally very good sound. #11 of a new series. Hosted and Directed by Conrad Nagel. Starring Kay Francis in a comedy about the eternal triangle, with a trip to Havana and an unusual twist. (30 min.)
- SMILE TIME: Nov. 8, 1946 Excellent sound. The wacky, wild humor of Steve Allen, with Wendell Noble and June Foray. The Mit-Wit Network presents "Bertha, Girl Butcher," a parody of soap operas, plus we get a visit from Manuel Labor. Mutual. (15 min.)
- SPIKE JONES: June 18, 1949 Excellent sound. Starring Spike Jones and the City Slickers, George Rock, Dick and Freddie Morgan, Sir Frederick Gass, Dr. Horatio Q. Birdbath and special guest Diana Lynn. The City Slickers pollute the air with "Charlie My Boy", then the Musical Round-Table discusses(?) Chopin. Prof. Feetlebomb (Doodles Weaver) does a commercial for Footwaddle Toothpaste. Spike and the gang do a song parody on the want-ads. (30 min.)
- STEREO DRAMA WORKSHOP: "War of the Worlds" Excellent sound. This is another version of the famous H.G. Wells story, updated and produced by KFEN, San Francisco and originally broadcast in multiplex stereo. A warning is included several times during the show that this is not real, but only a dramatic production! Highly recommended. (60 min.)
- STOP THE MUSIC: Aug. 17, 1954 Excellent sound. The famous musical quiz program where musical selections were played and telephone calls to listeners were made. When the connection came through, a telephone bell was heard and the announcer cried, "Stop the Music!" If the contestant could name the selection, a \$50 bond was awarded. In addition, contestants had a chance to guess "The Mystery Melody" for a \$1000 bond and a trip to Paris. The show was such an immediate smash that Fred Allen, who was on opposite, announced a bond guaranteeing up to \$5000 to anyone who was called by "Stop the Music" while listening to "The Fred Allen Show." Today, MC Bill Cullen calls people in Smyrna, Delaware; Gary, Indiana; Tampa, Florida; among others. Ray Bloch's Orchestra. CBS (60 min.)
- SUSPENSE: "The Kettler Method" Sept. 16, 1942 Excellent sound. Strange happenings in a sanitarium high on a lonely hill during a thunderstorm as one of the inmates takes charge! An eight food guard, deranged men and brain operations are the chilling ingredients of this week's tale of "Suspense!" (30 min.)
- SUSPENSE: "One-Hundred in the Dark" Sept. 30, 1942 Excellent sound. At a meeting of the Artists and Writers Club in New York, five members discuss detective stories and their various twists. One of the men tells the story of a dinner party that turned into a search for a \$10,000 sapphire ring. (30 min.)
- SUSPENSE: "The Lord of the Witch Doctors" Oct. 27, 1942 Excellent sound (except for a few seconds of static). On the island of Zanzibar, the British have been awarded all trade concessions which are protected by the residency there. But two German agents have attempted to murder the sultan who awards the rights in order to have them awarded to Germany. (30 min.)

- SUSPENSE: "Two Sharp Knives" Dec. 22, 1942 Excellent sound. Famed character actor Stuart Erwin stars as the assistant chief of police in a small midwest town. When he and his superior apprehend a criminal they believe is wanted, they find in a matter of hours the man has hanged himself. But something doesn't ring true, and the two begin investigating the case. (30 min.)
- SUSPENSE: "Cave of All Baba" Aug. 19, 1942 Excellent sound. Dorothy Sayer's famous fictional detective Lord Peter Wimsey is dramatized in this story of a London ring of thieves. He infiltrates the "society" and is sentenced to death! (30 min.)
- SUSPENSE: "The ABC Murders" May 18, 1943 Excellent+ sound (from disc) Charles Laughton and Elsa Lanchester star in this tale of homicidal murders committed by a maniacal Englishman. His plan is to kill his first victim in a town beginning with the letter "A," then go on to "B," and so on. (30 min.)
- SUSPENSE: "The White Rose Murders" July 6, 1943 Excellent sound (one 30-second segment of static) Starring Maureen O'Hara in a study of homicidal mania. The melodic strains of "The Beer Barrel Polka" seem to accompany a strangler of young women who always leaves a white rosebud in their hand! (30 min.)
- SUSPENSE: "The Last Letter of Dr. Bronson" July 27, 1943 vg+exc. sound. Starring Laird Cregar in a story of scientific discovery. Dr. Bronson has a theory about murder - he believes that men are restrained from killing other men by five basic checks. Unfortunately, he gets a bit too involved in the project. (30 min.)
- SUSPENSE: "Beyond Good and Evil" Oct. 11, 1945 Good (first 2 minutes), improving to very good sound for the remainder of the program. Starring Joseph Cotten. A young minister arrives in Carlton to take over the parish from the elderly minister, who is in failing health. But the young minister is not the minister at all...he is an escaped criminal! AFPS re-broadcast (25 min.)
- SUSPENSE: "Black Path of Fear" March 7, 1946 VG sound. Starring Cary Grant. In Havana, a couple is having their first picture taken together when suddenly the girl is stabbed to death. The man is arrested by the police, but escapes and tries to locate the photographer whose picture may solve the crime! (25 min.)
- SUSPENSE: "Commuter's Ticket" Aug. 1, 1946 VG/exc. sound. Starring J. Carroll Naish, with Jim Backus and Howard Duff. A frustrated husband kills his philanthropic wife, then tries to arrange a perfect alibi for himself. CBS (30 min.)
- SUSPENSE: "Drive-In" Oct. 31, 1946 VG sound Starring Judy Garland (her only appearance on this fine series) A young girl working at a drive-in accepts a ride from a man who offers to take her to the bus stop in the pouring rain. But the man turns out to be an escaped murderer! (25 min.)
- SUSPENSE: "Chicken Feed" Sept. 8, 1949 Sound is excellent, though marred by a "wow" which is slight at times, considerably off-speed at others. Ray Milland stars as a lawyer who is caused enormous trouble - jail, robbery, killing - simply because he cannot locate a nickel to make a phone call that will get him out of jeopardy. (25 min.)
- SUSPENSE: "Mission Completed" Dec. 1, 1949 Excellent sound, with Autolite comm. (including one very funny one with Gracie Allen). Jimmy Stewart is exceptionally fine in this uncommonly suspenseful drama. A war veteran is completely paralyzed as a result of injuries sustained in a Japanese prisoner of war camp. Suddenly, he sees the commandant of the war camp on the street, but cannot communicate his discovery because of his paralysis. In his anxiety, the veteran finds he does have limited powers of movement, as he feverishly plans his long-awaited revenge on the former Japanese officer. CBS (30 min.)
- SUSPENSE: "A Korean Christmas Carol" Excellent sound, complete with commercials. Dec. 20, 1959 A tale of the supernatural, with an unusual twist. (25 min.)
- SUSPENSE: "Sixty Grand Missing" June 19, 1960 No opening sig. Starring Bernard Grant. Sixty grand is missing from a finance company holdup and Detective Johnny Dresser wants to find it. Complete, with commercials. (20 min.)
- SUSPENSE: "2462" Jan. 24, 1962 Excellent sound. One of the most significant dramas ever produced for radio. With it, radio reached its peak. In the best traditions of "Brave New World" and "Fahrenheit 451," listen as a poet of the future is condemned for writing poetry. CBS. (25 min.)

SUSPENSE: "Fleshpeddler" Superb sound (despite a small amount of crosstalk halfway through the program). Starring DeForest Kelly (who later gained fame as TV's "Dr. McCoy" on the "Star Trek" series) in his first major role. A booking agent tries to sign a ventriloquist and his life-like dummy, but meets with an unexpected refusal. Despite warnings, the agent begins to investigate. AFRS re-broadcast. (30 min.)

SUSPENSE: "Cabin B-13" AFRS re-broadcast in excellent sound. Starring Marfo. A couple on their honeymoon is taking an ocean cruise, and is assigned to cabin B-13. The husband goes to deposit a large sum of money in the ship's safe, but does not return. The wife then learns there is no cabin B-13 on the ship! (30 min.)

TALES OF THE TEXAS RANGERS: "Blind Justice" March 11, 1951 Excellent sound. Starring Joel McCrea as Ranger Jase Pearson. When a seeing-eye dog shows up without its master, foul play is suspected and the Texas Rangers are called in. National Broadcasting Company. (30 min.)

TENNESSEE JED: Aug. 10, 1945 Excellent sound with Tip-Top Bread comm. The cattle on the ranch all have hoof-and-mouth disease, and Cookstove's mortgage is due. Today - Tennessee and Cookstove must appear in court to testify against the men who are causing all the trouble at the ranch. Mutual. (15 min.)

TEX BENEKE: Sept. 11, 1948 Air Force "On the Beam" show in excellent sound. Tex and the Orch. play "Ramblin' Around" and "The St. Louis Blues March." Ronnie Doville sings "You Go to Ky Head." Connie Haines sings "The Darktown Strutters Ball." Final show for Tex and the orchestra. (30 min.)

THINK: "Mars is Heaven" 1953 Excellent sound (from disc). The Venture, a spaceship, has a successful launch from Earth. Destination is Mars. Everyone aboard is somewhat apprehensive as to what will await them on Mars, and whether or not they will make it. The trip starts uneventfully, until . . . (30 min.)

THIS IS RADIO: Aug. 30, 1940 Excellent sound, complete. A special program on the eve of the National Association of Broadcasters meeting, sponsored by the New York World's Fair and the San Francisco Golden Gate Exposition. A salute to radio, featuring Orson Welles, Morton Downey, Hedda Hopper, Gene Autry, Kay Kyser, Col. Stoopnagle, Olive Palmer, Professor Quiz, Folly Goldberg, Major Bows, H.V. Kaltenborn, Jessica Dragonette, Kate Smith, Paul Whiteman, The Lone Ranger, the Chairman of the FCC, the President of the AF of L, the President of the NAB, plus many others. Mutual. (70 min.)

TOP SECRETS OF THE FBI: "Vest Pocket Broadcasting Station" Excellent sound. Stories based on actual cases, reported by Melvin Furvis. "Former ace-agent of the FBI and the man who got Dillinger!" Tonight: the FBI smashes a narcotics ring by means of highly sophisticated electronics gear. Mutual. (30 min.)

TRUMAN HARPER: Dec. 20, 1942 Excellent sound. As World War II grew in intensity, rumors flew fast and furiously. To forestall many of them, Truman Harper took to the airwaves to answer the endless rumors in a rock-steady voice and manner. Today: Do the G.I.'s have to eat alfalfa for meals? Does Churchill have a financial interest in a German munitions firm? Many others. (15 min.)

TRUMAN HARPER: Oct. 24, 1943 Excellent sound. Sponsored by Groves Bromo-Quinine Cold Tablets, as is the above show. Today: Are all Chinese communists? Are the new Destroyer-Escorts unseaworthy? Do half our parachutes fail to open? Plus many others. (15 min.)

TRUE DETECTIVE MYSTERIES: "The Dream of Richard Lauber" Dec. 21, 1947 A crime classic, in very good/excellent sound, with "Henry Candy" comm. A married man poses as a carefree bachelor and eventually marries a young German girl. After the story, the editor of True Detective Magazine offers a \$500 reward for information leading to the arrest of a wanted criminal. KECA, Los Angeles. (30 min.)

TRUTH OR CONSEQUENCES: Jan. 17, 1948 Excellent sound with Duz comm. The first contestant must pretend he's Ralph Edwards -- even though Chester A. Riley (William Bendix) has just barged into the studio ready to tear "Ralph Edwards" limb from limb! Contestants are called to identify "The Walking Man." Harlow Wilcox does the commercials. NBC (30 min.)

TRUTH OR CONSEQUENCES: July 29, 1952 Excellent sound with Pet Milk comm. Broadcast from Chicago. Last week, the program locked a man in a sealed room in a hotel. He wins \$1000 if he rings in during the show, with no clocks or any other method of telling time to guide him! Ralph Edwards hosts. Ken Carpenter announces. NBC (30 min.)

TOM CORBETT: "Atmosphere of Death" March 18 and 20, 1952 A complete adventure in excellent sound, with Kellogg's Pep comm. Tom Corbett and Roger Manning are assigned to protect a special messenger from Venus, but they are caught off-guard and he is killed. Now they must locate the killer! (50 min.)

TOM CORBETT: "Mission of Mercy" March 25 and 27, 1952 A complete adventure in excellent sound with Kellogg's Pep comm. There's a student election at the Space Academy; meanwhile, a dangerous epidemic has broken out on Titan and all the children must be evacuated. (50 min.)

TOM CORBETT: "Double Cross in Space" April 1 and 3, 1952 A complete adventure in excellent sound. Sponsored by Kellogg's Pep, which offers Tom Corbett cut-out premiums. Believing he has flunked out of the Academy, cadet Manning leaves and joins up with a pair of prospectors who steal N7-2C, a valuable explosive. One of the prospectors is then found murdered, apparently by one of Manning's weapons. ABC network. (50 min.)

TOM CORBETT: "Mystery of the Sparkling Meteor" April 8 and 10, 1952 A complete adventure in excellent sound. Sponsored by Kellogg's Pep, which offers Tom Corbett cut-out premiums. While on comet watch patrol, a Captain sees a strange sparkling meteor, and shortly thereafter becomes seriously ill. The meteor turns out to be an asteroid of death which must be destroyed! (50 min.)

TOM CORBETT: "A Holiday of Terror" April 15 and 17, 1952 A complete adventure in excellent sound. Sponsored by Kellogg's Pep, which offers Tom Corbett cut-out premiums. Tom, Roger and Astro have arrived at an isolated mining village on Venus where they expect to enjoy a week's leave. Instead, they find the little town has suffered a mysterious raid of almost unbelievable violence! (50 min.)

TWO THOUSAND PLUS: "A Veteran Comes Home" A veteran of a war on Mars returns to Earth and the son he has never seen. He tells of the horrors of the war: sand spiders, torpedo pistols, atomic grenades, sonic beams, and tooth flowers that can bite off a leg. (30 min.)

UNCLE DON: Aug. 14, 1945 Excellent sound. Missing final minute. Preceded by war bulletin. Uncle Don announces birthdays, sings songs and tells stories. Mutual network, from WOR, New York. Sustaining. (15 min.)

UNCLE JUDGE BEN: May 26, 1951 Audition disc in excellent sound. Episode #1 Today we are introduced to Judge Ben Taylor and the daily routine of the Hatfield County courthouse. Starring Forrest Lewis. Produced by Carlton E. Morse. (15 min.)

UNIVERSAL NEWS: Dec. 31, 1935 VG sound (scratchy) Seymour Berkson, managing editor of Universal Service, a worldwide newsfeature service, selects the 12 outstanding news events of 1935. WOR, Mutual network. (15 min.)

VALIANT LADY: Oct. 2, 1941 Excellent sound with Bisquick comm. Joan's husband is suffering from a blood clot on the brain which is changing his personality. WFAP, New York. NBC (15 min.)

VIC AND SADE: 1942 Excellent sound with Crisco and Ivory Flakes comm. Sade is suddenly deluged with telephone calls from people asking if they can come over and visit. Red Network. (15 min.)

WE, THE PEOPLE: Jan. 26, 1947 VG sound with Gulf comm. Hosted by Milo Boulton. This program featured human interest stories. The first guest is a woman who held up a bus in traffic for twenty minutes. Celebrity guests include baseball star Hank Greenberg, Broadway singer Ella Logan, and Jack Benny and Mary Livingstone. CBS (30 min.)

WEIRD CIRCLE: "A Terribly Strange Bed" Excellent sound. The story of a sadistic fat man who enjoys squeezing people to death. Syndicated. (30 min.)

WELCOME NEIGHBOR: Aug. 11, 1939 Excellent sound. Remote from the New York World's Fair. Dave Driscoll and Tom Wolf interview various workers and visitors to the fair. Includes a fascinating interview with Olga, a woman with no head! Mutual. (30 min.)

WELCOME TRAVELERS: April 12, 1953 Excellent sound (slight tracking problem at beginning of disc), with P&G commercials. M.C. Tommy Bartlett recruited travelers passing through Chicago's train, plane and bus terminals and invited them to appear on the program to tell the human interest stories behind their trips. The first guest extols the virtues of small town living. NBC (30 min.)

WHAT AM I OFFERED?: June 21, 1947 Excellent sound. Bob Dixon m.c.'s this novel quiz show. It begins with an auction, then the contestant must answer a question. If he answers it correctly, he gets the item he bid on. But if he answers incorrectly, he must pay the show. WCR, N.Y. (30 min.)

WHAT'S THE NAME OF THAT SONG?: March 30, 1946 Excellent sound. Dud Williamson m.c.'s this musical quiz program, the forerunner of TV's "Name That Tune." Contestants guess at song titles and lyrics. KHJ, L.A. Mutual net. (30 min.)

WHEN A GIRL MARRIES: Nov. 1, 1948 vg sound with Calumet Baking Powder comm. Phil and Kathy make plans for their new baby son; on the highway, Harry Davis picks up a stranded man who has a gun! NBC (15 min.)

WHEN A GIRL MARRIES: Nov. 2, 1948 vg sound with comm. Ann has bought the house next to Phil and Kathy's; at the Davis farmhouse, Joan anxiously waits for Harry. NBC (15 min.)

WHEN A GIRL MARRIES: Nov. 3, 1948 vg sound with comm. Ann thinks about her recent decision; Harry's rider forces him to take a different road; Joan has a nightmare. NBC (15 min.)

WHEN A GIRL MARRIES: Nov. 4, 1948 vg sound with comm. Joan awaits Harry's return (still); the stranger has knocked out Harry and is now driving the car! NBC (15 min.)

WHISTLER: "Death in the Air" vg/exc. sound. Mary Alberti devises an ingenious scheme to trap racketeer Fred Blake into confessing to her husband's innocence of a murder charge. CBS (30 min.)

WHISTLER: "The Avengers" Excellent sound. Fifteen years ago, Frank Maddox killed his brother. Now, it seems his brother has come back to kill him! (30 min.)

WHISTLER: "Fog" vg/exc. sound. A young man develops amnesia and disappears for an hour as a result of a fall. However, during that hour there is a murder, and all the evidence points to the young man. CBS (30 min.)

WHISTLER: "House of Fear" vg/exc. sound. A young woman marries a much older man, but soon becomes disenchanted and the marriage is dissolved. Shortly thereafter, she meets a former boyfriend and soon remarries. But the house the couple moves into holds a terrifying secret for the wife. (30 min.)

WHISTLER: "The Judas Face" Excellent sound with Signal Oil comm. 1946 A movie actress' "million dollar face" is disfigured in an accident on the set. Thinking her stand-in is responsible, she resolves to even the score. CBS (30 min.)

WHISTLER: "The Go Between" Jan. 22, 1950 vg/exc. (surface scratch) A complicated tale of blackmail and murder that begins when a husband finds out his wife is going to divorce him. Re-broadcast over AFPS. (30 min.)

WHISTLER: "Attorney for the Defense" AFPS. Program #134, from July 16, 1950 Excellent sound. The wealthy Randolph Abbott has been murdered by his lawyer. The dead man's daughter has been accused of the crime, and the lawyer decides to prepare a brilliant defense for her. (30 min.)

WORLD'S FAIR CLOSING: Oct. 31, 1939 A WCR-Mutual special program with remotes from the fair. Ed Fitzgerald, Al Guiseppe, Mike Todd and Jerry Danzik report. Highlights: New Jersey signs to come back to the fair in 1940; a description of the Midway amusement area; Jack Teagarden's orchestra at the Mardi Gras Casino. Mutual. (30 min.)

W2XOR-FM TRANSMITTER DEDICATION: Aug. 1, 1940 Excellent sound Simulcast by WCR-AM and FM (W2XUR). The first broadcast of what would later be WCR-FM, and the first regularly scheduled FM broadcast in New York. The show begins with a selection by the WCR Symphony. Dave Driscoll, from the FM transmitter, introduces Major Edwin H. Armstrong (the inventor of FM broadcasting, but he refuses to speak), the Chief Engineer, and the President of WCR (who discusses the future of FM). (30 min.)

X MINUS ONE: "Cave of Night" VG sound. A space pilot is destined to orbit in space forever unless the Earth can build a second space ship in time to rescue him. (25 min.)

X MINUS ONE: "The Parade" Good/vg sound. We all love an advertising campaign and a big fun-filled parade....so who would have suspected anything wrong when ads began to appear with the phrase "The Martians Are Coming!" Who indeed?? NBC (25 min.)

X MINUS ONE: "The Man in the Moon" May 29, 1955 Excellent sound. A nationwide Federal Missing Persons Bureau broadcast is interrupted by a strange S.O.S. Triangulating to locate and stop the offender, the bureau discovers the source of the broadcast is the moon! (30 min.)

X MINUS ONE: "A Gun for Dinosaur" March 7, 1956 Good/vg sound. For a price you can take a trip back in time to bag yourself a dinosaur, but there's a very real danger....you may never come back! (25 min.)

X MINUS ONE: "A Pail of Air" March 28, 1956 Excellent sound. A terrifying tale of the future. The Earth has been dragged away from the Sun, and the atmosphere is slowly freezing from the cold. The last family on Earth tries to survive against insurmountable odds. (30 min.)

X MINUS ONE: "The Last Martian" Aug. 7, 1956 VG sound. A newspaperman is given a strange assignment: Find out about a man in a neighborhood bar who claims that, two hours ago, he was a citizen of Mars! (30 min.)

X MINUS ONE: "A Wind is Rising" Oct. 3, 1957 Excellent sound. An Earth outpost on a strange planet has a bad time against high winds and odd creatures who crave sugar. (20 min.)

YOU BET YOUR LIFE: Oct. 25, 1950 AFPS re-broadcast in excellent sound. Starring Groucho Marx. The secret word is "air." The #2000 Question concerns the Civil War. (30 min.)

YOU WERE MEANT TO BE A STAR: June 10, 1945 excellent sound. Last of a series of six test broadcasts. An unusual program that takes the letters of listeners with marital problems and dramatizes them. Then, the situation is replayed as Hollywood stars would react under similar circumstances. Sustaining. (30 min.)

YOUNG LOVE: Jan. 13, 1950 Excellent sound with Ford comm. Starring Janet Waldo (radio's "Corliss Archer") and Jimmy Lydon ("Henry Aldrich" in the many films Hollywood turned out about the Aldrich family) in this lighthearted and charming series about a young married college couple. Today, they are given a wedding present - an atrocious lead candlestick. CBS (30 min.)

YOUR HIT PARADE: Oct. 22, 1938 Complete, vg/exc. sound with Lucky Strike comm. "I've Got a Pocketful of Dreams" plus others) features a 13-minute "Promotions Unlimited" skit with W.C. Fields and Hanley Stafford. Buddy Clark and Freda Gibbons (later known as Georgia Gibbs) sing, Al Goodman conducts the Orchestra. CBS (45 min.)

YOUR HIT PARADE: Aug. 28, 1943 AFPS re-broadcast in vg/exc. sound. Frank Sinatra sings "All or Nothing at All," "You'll Never Know," and others. Bea Wain sings "Put Your Arms Around Me Honey," "In the Blue of the Evening," and others. The Hit Paraders sing "In My Arms," "Sunday, Monday or Always." (30 min.)

YOUR HIT PARADE: Dec. 4, 1943 AFPS re-broadcast in excellent sound. Frank Sinatra sings "Sunday, Monday or Always," "Oh What a Beautiful Mornin'" and others. Joan Edwards sings "How Sweet You Are," "My Heart Tells Me," and others. The Hit Paraders sing "Paper Doll," Mark Warnow's Orchestra. (30 min.)

YOUR HIT PARADE: May 6, 1944 This program replaces the one listed in the master catalogue, and is now in excellent sound, complete with Lucky Strike comm. The show runs 40 minutes, missing two songs of the 45 minute show. (40 min.)

YOUR HIT PARADE: July 22, 1944 vg/exc. sound. Frank Sinatra sings "Sweet Lorraine," "Swingin' on a Star" and others. Bea Wain sings "Amor" "I'll Be Seeing You," and others. The Hit Paraders sing "I'll Get By." (30 min.)



With music director Mark Warnow, Frank Sinatra rehearses the number-one song of the week for a 1943 Hit Parade broadcast. Sinatra was then at the height of his popularity. "It was the war years," he explained later. "There was a great loneliness, and I was the boy who'd gone off drafted to the war. That's all....."

YOUR HIT PARADE: Sept. 16, 1944 AFRS re-broadcast in vg/exc. sound. Frank Sinatra sings "It Could Happen to You," "I'll Walk Alone," and others. Joan Edwards sings "It Had to Be You," "Amor," and others. The Hit Paraders sing "Time Waits for No One," and "I'll Be Seeing You." (30 min.)

YOUR HIT PARADE: Sept. 30, 1944 AFRS re-broadcast in vg/exc. sound. Frank Sinatra sings "It Could Happen to You," "I'll Walk Alone" and others. Joan Edwards sings "How Many Hearts Have You Broken" and others. The Hit Paraders sing "It Had to Be You." Mark Warnow's Orchestra. (30 min.)

YOUR HIT PARADE: Dec. 2, 1944 AFRS re-broadcast in vg/exc. sound. Frank Sinatra sings "There Goes that Song Again" and "The Trolley Song." Joan Edwards sings "Don't Fence Me In," "Dance With a Dolly," and others. The Hit Paraders sing "I'm Making Believe." Mark Warnow's Orch. plays "Jersey Bounce." (30 min.)

YOUR HIT PARADE: Dec. 9, 1944 AFRS re-broadcast in vg/exc. sound. Frank Sinatra sings "I Dream of You," "The Trolley Song" and others. Joan Edwards sings "Dance With a Dolly," "Always" and others. The Hit Paraders sing "Don't Fence Me In." Mark Warnow's Orch. plays "Everybody Step." (30 min.)

YOUR HIT PARADE: Dec. 30, 1944 AFRS re-broadcast in very good sound. This is Sinatra's final appearance on the "Hit Parade." Frank sings "Always," "I Dream of You" and others. Joan Edwards sings "There Goes that Song Again" and others. The Hit Paraders sing "The Trolley Song." (30 min.)

YOUR HIT PARADE: 1950 AFRS re-broadcast in excellent sound. This is the "Hit Parade's" latter format, with Snooky Lanson, Dorothy Collins, Eileen Wilson, the Hit Paraders and Raymond Scott's Orchestra. This week's top tunes: "Play a Simple Melody," "Count Every Star," "Mona Lisa," "The Trolley Song," and #1 "Good Night, Irene." (30 min.)

YOUR WEIGHT IN GOLD: June 8, 1944 Bud Collyer hosts this program where the amount of money the contestants can win is determined by their weight! Excellent sound. Sustaining. Mutual. (30 min.)
