Welcome to our second catalog. Here you will find many new reels as well as new cassette listings. We've also enclosed our listings of old TV shows and radio-related movies, as well as publication listings.

Collecting radio programs is a great hobby. The listing you have in your hand is the result of over ten years of collecting. You will find the sound quality to be quite good. Many programs are recorded directly from the original transcriptions or are very close to them. Some programs may require close listening, but we try not to list "bad sounding" programs unless they are not available in good sound.

Most OTR (Old Time Radio) collections are stored on quarter-track reels. The abbreviations 1-L, 2-L, 1-R, 2-R are used to designate the tracks that the shows are recorded on. 1-L refers to side one, left track; in this case the show would be heard on the left speaker of your stereo. Most receivers and tape decks have some means of turning off the sound on the other speaker or track in order that you hear one program at a time.

Many other collectors prefer to collect on cassettes. This offers many conveniences, especially portability. However, for the long term, it is most economical to collect on reels. As a general rule, shows listed are one-half hour each unless otherwise noted. Two shows will fit on one 60-minute cassette.

All reels, unless otherwise noted, are 1800'. This means that at 3-3/4 ips you get 90 minutes per track, or 6 hours per reel. 1200' reels have 60 minutes per track, or 4 hours per reel.

We have had very good luck with them as long as the cassette played through completely on one side without fast forwarding or rewinding.

Texaco Star Theater (January 18, 1949). It's Uncle Miltie at his very best in this rare old program to celebrate the cable connection to the Mid West. It's live TV with all its mistakes—Berle's cue card light goes out in the middle of his monologue, and Berle blows his lines several times during a sketch. Guests are Tony Martin, Carmen Miranda, and Florence Desmond. All the original commercials are intact, pitched by Sid Stone ("Tell ya what I'm going to do!"), and the Texaco Showmen. NBC I.D. included. (Note: Due to the age of this kinescope, there is a slight skew at the top of the frame throughout portions of the program. It will not interfere with your viewing.)

Person-To-Person (1954/1958). Edward R. Murrow interviews Groucho Marx at his home in Beverly Hills, and Harpo Marx at his home in Palm Springs in this rare, behind-the-scenes look at the real Marxes. A collector's item!

The first ten minutes consists of the audience warm-up segment, done before the show actually went on the air. As the host begs and pleads with the audience to participate once they go on the air, the camera focuses on audience members and inanimate objects throughout the studio. Very interesting, and very funny!

People In Conflict (1959). A moderator and a panel of experts—a lawyer, a welfare worker, and a psychologist offer advice to guests seeking help. The first guest is a naive 19-year-old who got his girl friend pregnant and doesn't want to marry her, although he thinks she's "real swell, anyway." The second guest is a woman who wants to have her mother put away. Just your average, light 1950s TV show.

The Verdict Is Yours (1958). This is sort of a 1950s version of "The People's Court," jazzed up for prime-time TV. Sponsored by Lever Brothers and the CBS Television Network. This 60-minute courtroom trial consists of a jealous husband accusing his neighbor of hanging around his wife "a bit too much." As a countersuit, the neighbor is accusing the jealous husband of attempted murder because he threatened the neighbor with a gun. It's fun for the entire family! Jim McKay is the court reporter, who narrates the trial as if he was calling a sporting event (which he would later do). This was totally serious stuff in 1958.
