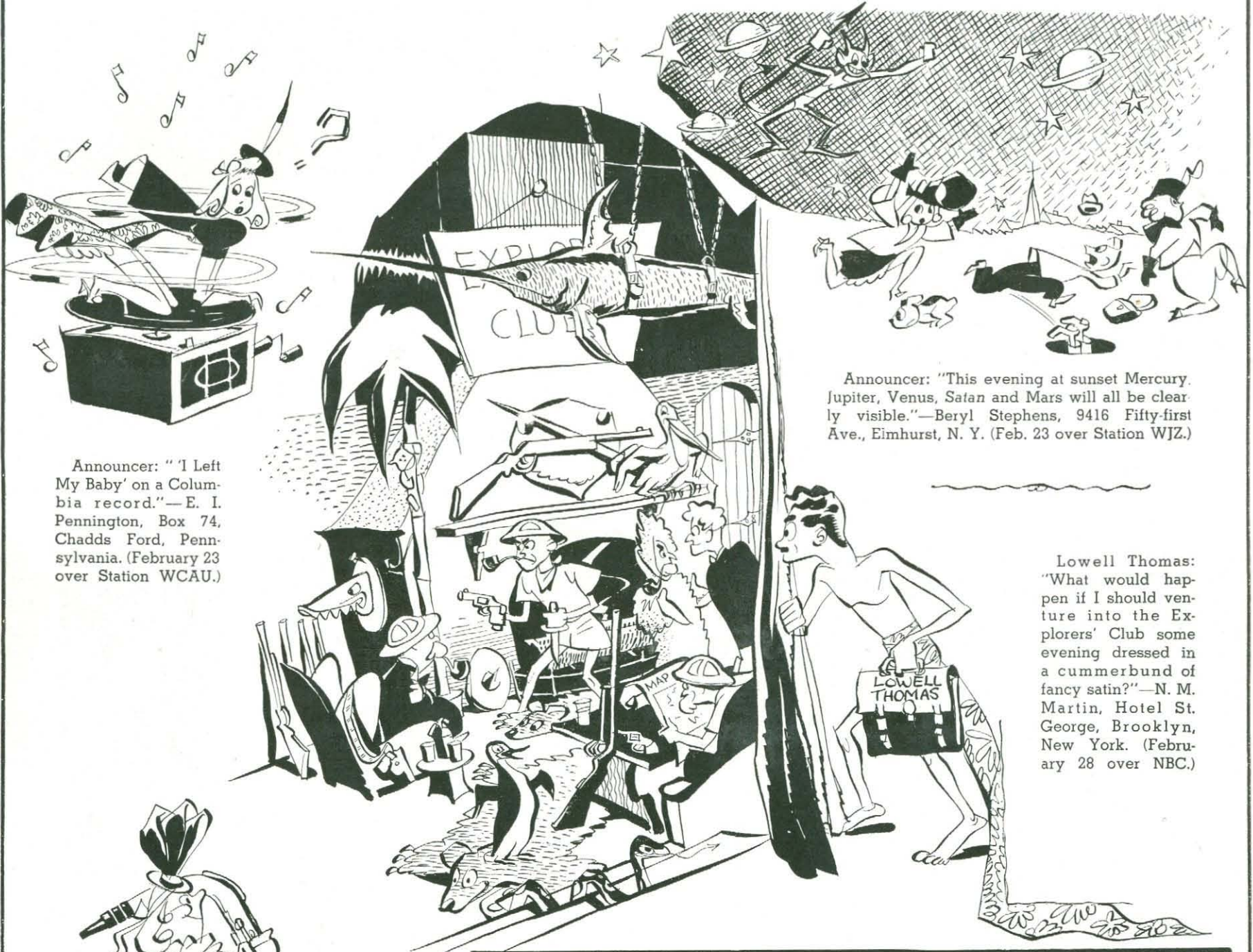

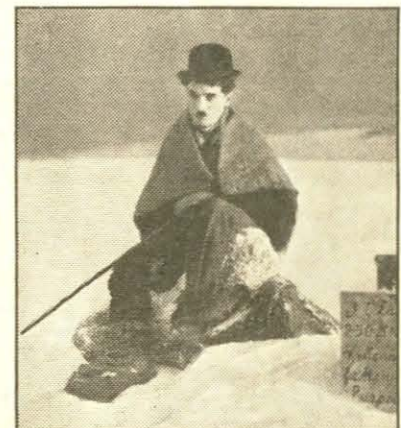

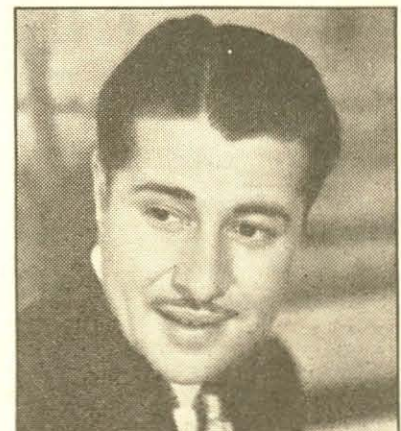

PINTO RIDES *the* AIRWAVES

You'll like this
little story of
the Massey pony

NO ONE knew when Pinto was born or who his dam or sire was. He was just a wild horse roaming the mountainous range of New Mexico until that fateful day when he was rounded up with a herd of other wild horses and corralled onto the Yellow Bluff Ranch of Henry Massey, at Roswell, New Mexico.

But on Friday night, when The Westerners step up to the microphone on the "Plantation Party" broadcast, Pinto—in spirit—will be the honored guest as these singers of the Old West pay tribute to his great heart in a new song recounting his heroism. Behind the heroism of this wild range-pony, behind the song you will hear when you tune in "Plantation Party," lies a dramatic story.

Had Pinto been the usual thin, flea-bitten range-pony—not worth the trouble to break—no song would have been written about him. But he wasn't. Somewhere back in his vague ancestry had been royalty, and the glistening black coat of the wild stallion, broken only by the two snowy white forefeet, and his fiery temper and defiance of everything human, were the marks of his inheritance. Henry Massey, old-time rancher with a knowledge and love of horses, knew that here was the finest saddle-horse that ever had set hoof on Yellow Bluff Ranch. The breaking-in of Pinto was a task he undertook himself, and the result was a sure-footed cowpony whose endurance and stamina became almost legendary. Pinto became Henry Massey's own mount, and no one else ever sat in his saddle.

In fact, there was no reason for any of the Massey children—seven boys and a girl—to use their dad's horse, for each had his own. Pinto, on the other hand, had no qualms about the children whom he learned to love. He used to love to push them around the wooden corral with his soft nose, enjoying their laughter and neighing to attract their attention whenever he saw them.

Massey had always been fond of music, and as the children grew up each of them was taught to play a dif-

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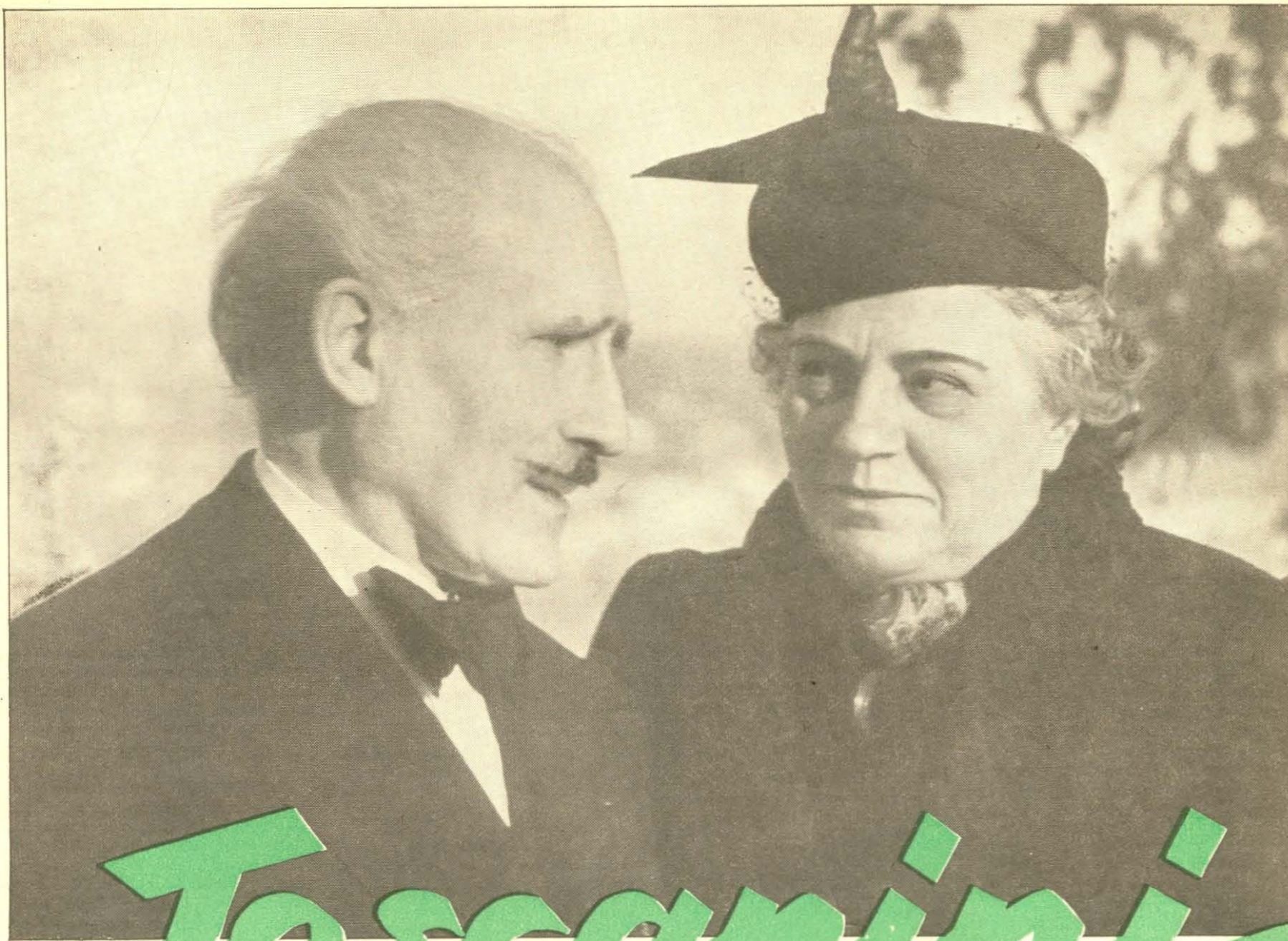

Toscanini

A strikingly human picture of genius at work—and at play—is this new behind-the-scenes story of Toscanini

TO THE world which has long known Arturo Toscanini as the musical perfectionist he is, his recent return to the air on Saturday nights is important news. Wherever radios are heard and pictures printed or stories written, the seventy-two-year-old maestro is known as an orchestra-leader with a fearful temper, an unflinching memory and the power to lash his musicians into virtual frenzies of fine playing. The world might know, too, that the National Broadcasting Company pays Toscanini \$4,000 per broadcast, that NBC even takes care of the income-tax payments which would be due on these sums.

But beyond that, the world knows little of this silver-haired and patrician-featured genius, for Toscanini—more than any other modern man of music—has kept his private life strictly private. Who, for example, attending a formal Toscanini concert, could conjure up a picture of this dignified musician, clad only in his underpants, sipping cham-

pagne in a backstage dressing-room? Who could imagine him unbending enough to romp on the green lawn of his suburban home with a five-year-old granddaughter, or giggling at her grinning imitations of his conducting? Yet, these are actual pictures of the real Toscanini—the Toscanini of flesh and blood and bone who lives his life away from the podium even as you and I. Let's pierce this veil of mystery, visit the man.

ON SUNDAYS, Mondays, Tuesdays and Wednesdays, Toscanini is free. He spends those days at a large, rented estate at Riverdale, a suburban community on the Hudson. Residents of Riverdale, learning of his intention to move there, were thrilled with one exception—the postman. The postman, too, had been thrilled to hear that a great conductor was moving on his route, but when he learned it was Toscanini, his face fell. "Toscanini is all right," he said, "only I'd hoped it would be Sto-

kowski and Garbo." There, where it's quiet, Toscanini arises each morning at six o'clock, goes straight to his Steinway piano where he plays scores and, at times, sings in orchestral parts he cannot simulate as a pianist. He usually awakens everybody else in the house with his singing and playing.

Everybody else includes Mrs. Toscanini and, quite often, his five-year-old granddaughter, Sonia, as well as her mother, Mrs. Vladimir Horowitz, wife of the famous pianist and Toscanini's daughter. Sonia, who already shows great promise as a pianist, is the only soul who dares to take issue with the great Arturo about music. She not only apes his facial expressions while conducting music heard via the radio, but has even criticized his technique of conducting with gestures which have brought tears of laughter to Toscanini's eyes. Those who work close to the maestro—in his household—do not blanch with fear at his approach as do many musicians who bandy about tales

of his fiery temper. They know him for the simple, affectionate and hard-working musician he really is.

Toscanini will stop for breakfast and then work again until noon, when he takes time out for lunch. Soup is his favorite food. If he has no rehearsal in the afternoon, he romps with Sonia on the lawn if she is at Riverdale or goes for long—and fast—automobile rides. He has the most complete disrespect for speed laws, can't bear to "creep along." In the evening, he tunes in the radio and listens for hours to all kinds and qualities of music. He reads widely in both Italian and English—Keats and Shelley are his favorite poets—but he likes best to curl up in bed at night with a musical score.

BUT on Thursdays—when he holds rehearsals—and on Saturdays, the day of his broadcasts, it is different. At 10:30 Saturday morning, Toscanini arrives at his dressing-room in the RCA Building (where NBC is located) and changes

from his street clothes. He dons a loosely fitting pair of trousers and a mohair jacket—picked up in Switzerland—which buttons to his neck. At 11, he goes into studio 8-H and starts rehearsals promptly. Rehearsals run until one o'clock with only one time-out during which musicians can stretch and smoke. Toscanini doesn't smoke. Following rehearsal, he returns to his Riverdale home.

Promptly at nine o'clock on Saturday night, Mr. Al Walker, receptionist at NBC, calls for him and the Toscaninis and Mr. Walker, driven by Toscanini's chauffeur, leave for the studio. Toscanini seldom speaks during this drive. Neither do the others. They drive under the RKO Building by the Fiftieth Street ramp and park their car underground. They walk the short block to the stage elevator which takes them to the eighth floor. Mrs. Toscanini goes to the studio, Toscanini and Walker directly to his dressing-room. His name is on the door in gold leaf and it is used exclusively by him now. There he changes from tuxedo to strictly formal wear.

Meanwhile, guests are arriving in the studio. On the main floor of the studio, two NBC page-boys in blue uniform are busy seating the guests in hard little metal folding-chairs with straight, uncomfortable backs. Upstairs, in a smaller balcony where the chairs are soft and comfortable, guests in very formal wear sit. People like the Gene Tunneys, the Will Hayses, the Fredric Marchs, U. S. Senators, ambassadors, diplomats are here.

At ten o'clock, studio lights fade, stage lights come on. Musicians in formal wear slip out from either wing,

take their places on the stage, start to tune up. At about 10:15, Toscanini enters from a doorway at the audience's left. Instantaneous applause greets his entrance.

Because Toscanini, more than other conductors, conducts with his hands and face—never with his body—guests come early to get seats close to the front and to either the left or right so that they may catch glimpses of his face. Toscanini never moves on the podium, but musicians—and those in

the lucky seats—can tell whether he is satisfied from his expression. Sometimes his expression is pleading, sometimes furious. Perspiration is plentiful. It runs down his forehead, drips from the end of his nose. At intermission he changes his clothes completely, they are so soaked with perspiration. When the concert is ended, Toscanini takes his first bow stiffly, from the waist. If he is called back again—and he always is—he walks to the podium, bows and then motions the orchestra up with a

gesture that eloquently says, "Some of this applause must be for you, too." Then, sometimes, he places his hand on his concert-master's shoulder, smiles. It is the only time he smiles. The orchestra remains standing until after he has left the stage.

Toscanini goes directly back to his dressing-room where Walker—he calls Walker his "shadow"—awaits him. Walker wipes the perspiration from his brow with a towel, unties his tie. When Toscanini has undressed to the point where he wears only shorts and undershirt, he pulls off his undershirt hurriedly, throws it blindly over his head. Then he wipes his body and, sitting down in trunks only, sips a glass of champagne which has been brought him from the Rainbow Room atop the RCA Building. NBC furnishes the champagne. About twenty minutes after the broadcast ends—it is scheduled to end at 11:30 but Toscanini often runs over (Toscanini and President Roosevelt are two people who can run long or short without being cut off by the networks)—Toscanini dons a blue terry-cloth bathrobe, also the gift of NBC, and receives a few visitors in his dressing-room. When the visitors leave, he dresses, goes down the elevator, walks to his car where Mrs. Toscanini awaits him. They drive to a restaurant, dine and then, back to the quiet of their Riverdale home for another week of playing with Sonia, playing scores and listening to the radio.

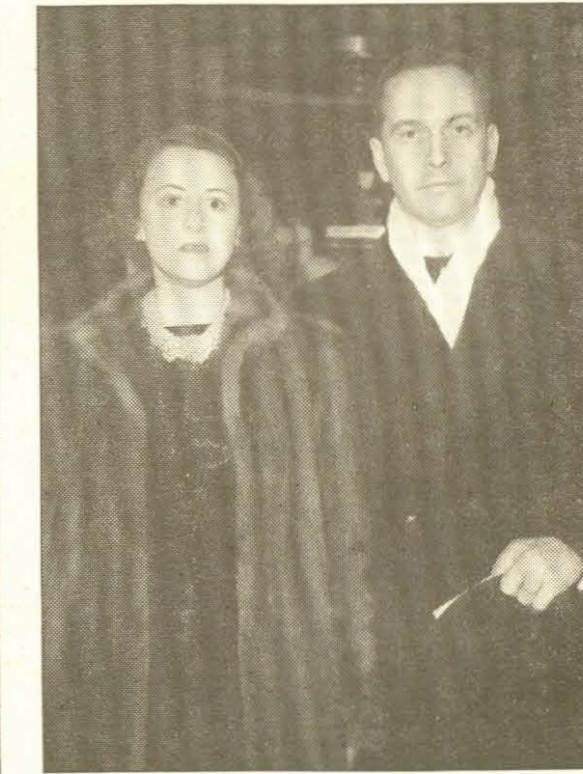

GREENSBORO, N. C.—A two-year-old boy was recently brought into the charity ward of the Sternberger Hospital in Greensboro. He was dangerously ill with abscessed ears and was so extremely anemic that a blood transfusion was necessary that night to preserve his life. No one of his blood type could be found. Radio station WBIG broadcast an appeal at 11:30 p.m. for a type two donor. Before midnight seven with the proper type of blood arrived at the hospital and twenty-three others called. Volunteers varied from high-school boys to two Assyrian bakers still in their aprons. The boy is recovering.

This is "Bing Week"

HOLLYWOOD, CALIF.—After twelve years in Hollywood singing for his supper—and eating well!—Bing Crosby was selected as 1939's "Outstanding Young Man" by the U. S. Junior Chamber of Commerce. As a result this week is being promoted as "Bing Week." The award was presented to "the little man who wasn't there," for Bing was too busy to attend the award banquet.

PROVIDENCE, R. I.—Aiming at an ultimate network of about fifty schools, the Intercollegiate Broadcasting System, sponsored by Brown University, is set tentatively to begin regular broadcasting April 15 on the country's first intercollegiate radio network, at present linking five or more eastern colleges.

NEW YORK, N. Y.—The "Lord Haw Haw" of Nazi propaganda fame, whom short-wave fans delight in hearing because he's so funny, has been identified as one William Joyce, an American-born Fascist. He is said to have a wife and family living in England. The identification comes from London and is supposed to be authentic.

Radio Plays Slot-Machines

CINCINNATI, OHIO.—The slot-machine was put on trial in an unusual experiment conducted by station WKRC in Cincinnati. Two "one-armed bandits" were kept in operation all day, and reports on the play were given periodically. The day's percentage showed a return of only forty cents to the player for each dollar invested. On the basis of the day's play, chances of hitting the jackpot figured to be 1 in 1,398. The experiment seemed to prove pretty conclusively that you can't win.

HOLLYWOOD, CALIF.—Rudy Vallee recruits a novel "radio jury" of twelve

tourists visiting Hollywood to obtain "typical audience reactions" to his new show. After each show the jurors fill out questionnaires, which are then studied by officials with a view to achieving a show with maximum audience appeal, thus setting an example which other shows may well follow in the future.

NEW YORK, N. Y.—Paramount has completed arrangements with the "Vox Pop" radio program for its show of April 11 to originate in Albany, Ga., as part of the world premiere of "The Biscuit Eater."

OBERLIN, OHIO.—Latest boiling-over of the "Pot o' Gold" is the case of a

theater-goer in Oberlin, Ohio, who was present in the Apollo Theater show when he was phoned by the Tums show as the week's winning name. The theater had been one of those offering to double the Tums award to anyone called by the radio program but present in the Apollo at the time. The patron therefore claims the theater owes him \$2,000. But the theater maintains it had dropped out of the movie exhibitors' insurance campaign before the incident occurred.

WASHINGTON, D. C.—A bill to amend the Communications Act "in order to preserve and protect liberty of expression in radio communication" by limiting the powers of the FCC was introduced in the House by Rep. J. William Ditter (Rep., Pa.) and is said to be winning support of the broadcasting industry.

HOLLYWOOD, CALIF.—The first film director to invade the field of television, Steve Sekely, has been signed by the Don Lee experimental television station, W6XAO, to direct two one-hour plays, the most ambitious effort yet attempted by West Coast television. The first play, "The Ides of March," has a cast of fourteen actors, headed by Shirley Thomas and John Barkley.

NEW YORK, N. Y.—Metropolitan Opera broadcasts will not end March 23 as previously announced, although the season closes in New York on schedule. The company will tour eastern cities, from each of which opera broadcasts will be picked up.

WASHINGTON, D. C.—The FCC has approved new rules to permit limited commercial operation in television beginning September 1.

The latter trio are still waiting for time to be cleared so they can go on the air for your telephone company.

Theft on Ellery Queen Show

Who stole Lyn Murray's baton? Lyn is the orchestra-leader on the "Adventures of Ellery Queen" thriller, so this is a vexing problem to "Ellery" because Lyn has commissioned the great sleuth to bring to light the culprit . . . CBS here announces that the Orson Welles dramas will continue on a sustaining basis after the sponsor withdraws. It's understood that a clash over the type of drama broadcast brought about the parting of Welles and the soup-maker . . . Announcer Dell Sharbutt and his wife, singer Meri Belle, are awaiting their second visit from the stork . . . The stork will also make a stop in the home of Paul Owen of Fred Waring's glee club in a couple of weeks.

Until Louis Fehr, a New Yorker, went before the "So You Think You Know Music" microphone, he had appeared on twenty-one other quizzes, always finishing among the winners. To prepare himself for the musical quiz he attended seventeen broadcasts as spectator. Then he walked with a swagger to the microphone the other Sunday to compete with three others. He finished last!

Dinah Shore, safe on a CBS Sunday commercial with Ben Bernie and Lew Lehr, confides that the only other time she had anything to do with CBS (she had been given her build-up at NBC)

was a couple of years ago when she attempted an audition, only to experience the bitter shock of not being able to sing anything; she was that nervous! . . . Reason Dinah didn't go on the Bernie show March 10 as announced was that Mary Small's contract included that show, and the programmers had overlooked the fact . . . "Ellen Randolph" script writer, Vera Oldham, is fighting pneumonia. Luckily for listeners, Miss Oldham is several weeks ahead on her writing so that the show goes on as usual . . . "The Aldrich Family" will again go into the Jack Benny Sunday evening spot when Jack and his gang vacation during the summer months . . . A seventeen-year-old boy was arrested and charged with breaking into the CBS television studios (which are not yet operating) and stealing a carton of television tubes . . . John Barrymore of the stage is expected to guest with Charles McCarthy when Charlie begins broadcasting from New York soon. All of the publicity that Barrymore garnered a few weeks ago by feuding with and then making up with his wife is paying off as far as radio dates for "the great profile" are concerned.

Seldom does Clifton Fadiman of "Information, Please" fame err. The other Tuesday he asked in what picture was the law firm name, "Ungledinger, Ungledinger and Murphy," used. That brought an immediate call from Groucho Marx in Hollywood who said the firm name was "Ungledinger, Ungledinger and McCormick," that there was no "Murphy" in the thing, and that he ought to know because he was in the picture, and that he was sorry he forgot to reverse the phone charges.

Jane Froman to Broadway

In case you've wondered what has happened to Jane Froman, the soprano, she has just been booked to star with Ray Bolger and Jimmy Durante in a musical comedy to be titled "Keep Off the Grass" and due on Broadway in April . . . After the short-wave broadcast of the Louis-Godoy fight to South America, NBC received almost 5,000 letters from our Latin-American neighbors, which may indicate that other such special events will be short-waved on a commercial basis . . . After Lowell Thomas reported the recovery of a lad who was stricken with lymphatic leukemia, he received innumerable telephone calls from doctors who wanted more information on the case. The cure of the disease was the first in medical history . . . Marge Anderson lost a job on the "Manhattan Mother" program because her voice resembled that of the leading lady, Kaye Brinker. Tsk! Tsk! March 3rd's "Silver Theater" script had to be rewritten for Kay Francis to eliminate all r's. Her "roadster" came out "woadster," etc. . . . Smiley Burnette, Republic's comic cowboy, cast regularly in pictures with Gene Autry, won't work with the latter's aired "Melody Ranch" for money reasons. 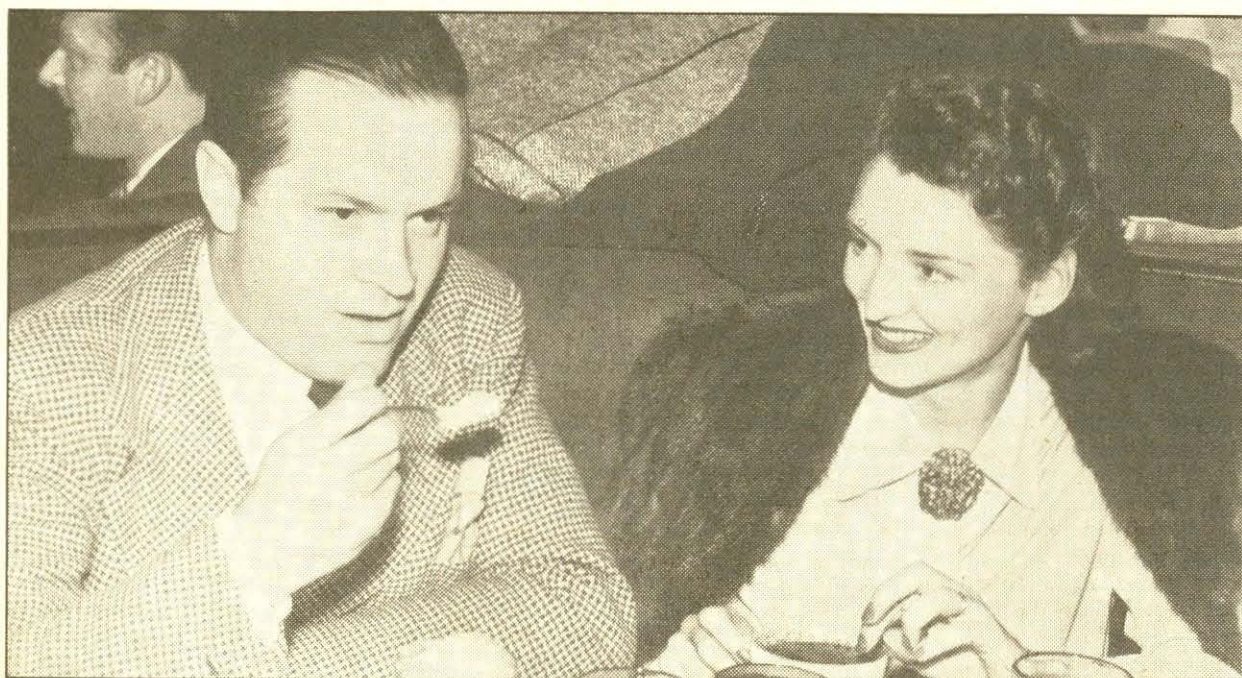

RUDY VALLEE is back with a show which promises to be as good or better than anything he ever presented. That Rudy is back is good news to those who got the Vallee habit in his ten years of network entertaining. That he is back with the same old magic which made him a pioneer and trail-blazer is good radio news for all listeners.

The new Vallee show presents a cute new idea, which is that a musical-comedy framework, a group of good and sometimes illustrious actors, and a hap-

less comedian can make good listening. They also undertake to prove that all of these elements operating as a man's dream can be hilariously funny.

Early in this first program, Rudy went sound asleep and dreamed that he was Christopher Columbus. Mary Boland, who was on the premises, became Queen Isabella. Andy Devine turned into a suspicious Ferdinand. Each gave spirited performances which lent meaning to Columbus' burlesqued love-making and money-raising activities. However, Hollywood's own cut-up and pugilist, called "Slapsie Maxie" Rosenbloom, turned in the standout performance. As Vallee's valet and masseur, he produced laugh after laugh. Typical gag: Vallee—"Maxie, are you doing any fighting this year?" Maxie—"I don't know, boss. How about you?"

One innovation is to have no announcer. Vallee and a singing chorus set the stage with a choral fanfare built on "My Time Is Your Time." Vallee's

own plug for his sponsor at the session's half-way mark was easy to take.

Specially distinguished was the production work. Sound-effects, timing, cues, and music in this difficult-to-produce program fitted together perfectly. Bows should be taken by Vic Knight, who is responsible for both the grand lyrics of the program's original music as well as the production job.

All in all, here is as hopeful a new show as any season has presented. On the promise of the first broadcast, listeners have good reason to return to their habit of making one night each week "Vallee night."

But calling this new program "bob-tailed" is not fair. Any broadcast which provides so many stars will not short-change its listeners.

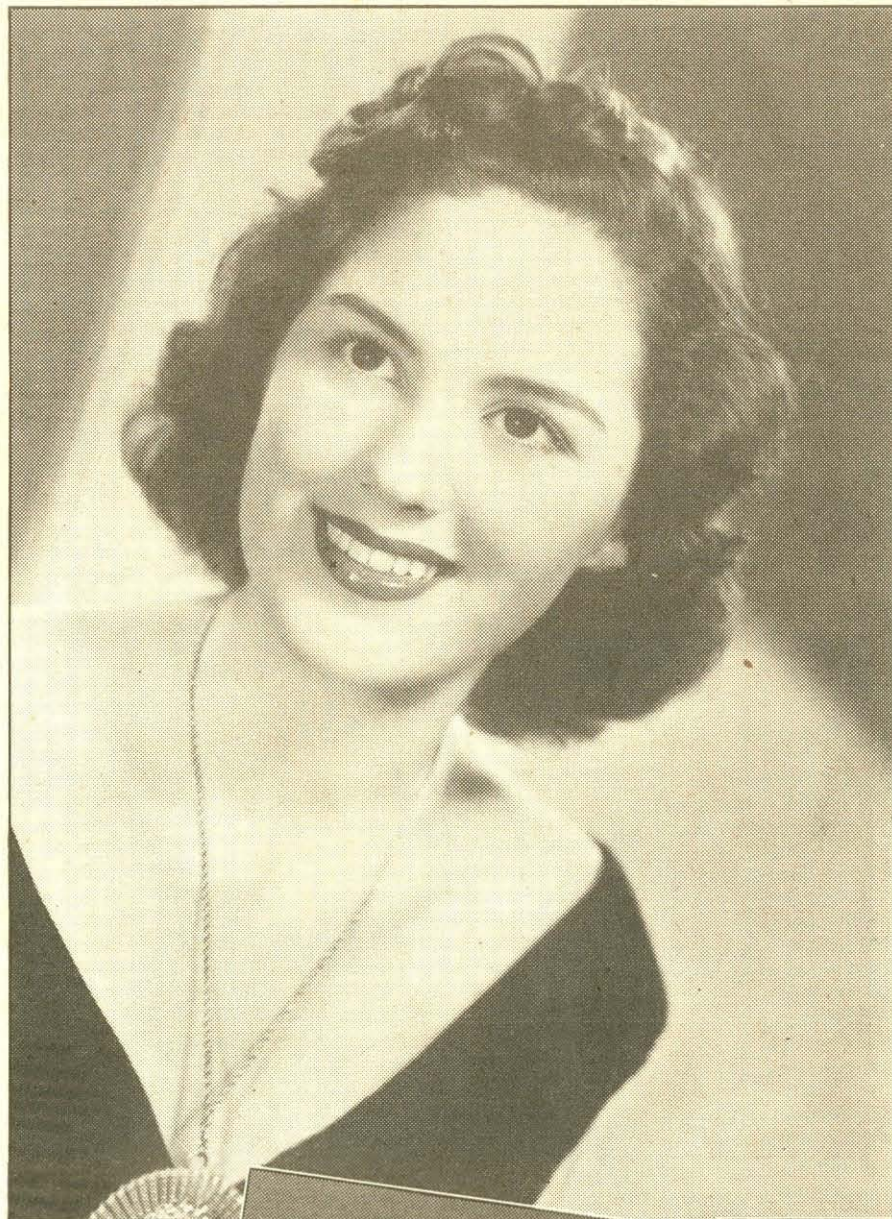

which later came to be known as the group of "The Five," consisting of himself, Borodin, Moussorgsky, Cui and Rimsky-Korsakoff. They all subscribed to the theory that they should write "nationalist" music and utilize the folk-tunes and dance rhythms of their land, but each one treated the material in his own distinctive fashion, as exemplified partly in this program.

Following them, but not copying them, came some lesser creators, mostly devotees of the Chopin-Liszt schools, and finally Russia produced the last

(Sibelius), *Suite from "Garrick"* (Albert Stoessel), the Orchestra; *Piano Concerto in C Minor* (Beethoven), Ernest Hutcheson and Orchestra; *Leonore Overture No. 3* (Beethoven), the Orchestra.

How Deems Taylor, that versatile gentleman, finds time to compose operas in the intervals between writing books, radio-commentating for the Philharmonic and elsewhere (in and out of New York) and serving as music consultant for CBS is a deeply dark mystery to many of us in the artistic profession.

Nevertheless, here is Deems with a new opera called "Ramuntcho," the libretto based on the novel of the same name by the late Pierre Loti, French author. The story is about a young soldier who leaves his betrothed to go to war; and her mother, against their marriage, intercepts and withholds letters the pair exchange while he is away. Each believes the other faithless, and when the swain returns, he finds that his lady-love has become a nun.

I heard Taylor's score at a private musicale, and admired greatly its lyric style, singable melodies and skill in orchestral characterization.

Albert Stoessel, professor at the Juilliard School of Music, wrote his opera "Garrick" to a libretto by Robert Simon, music critic of the *New Yorker Magazine*, and the work was premiered at the institution several seasons ago. The plot deals with a romantic episode in the life of David Garrick (1717-1779), famous English Shakespearean actor and manager of the Drury Lane Theater in London.

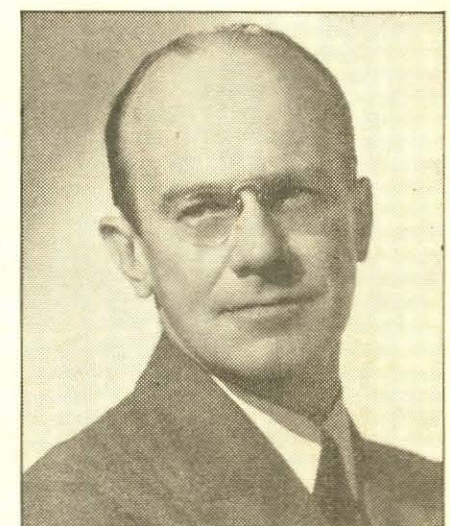

It is always good to hear the frank emotionalism and rich melodies of the earlier Russian symphonic composers, differing strongly in purpose and effect from the music of their present-day successors.

Strangely enough, just after the middle of the nineteenth century, Mili Balakirev (1837-1910) founded what he called the "new" Russian school,

of its great Romanticists, Rachmaninoff and Scriabin, before the advent of the post-war modernists, Stravinsky, Prokofieff, Mossolof, Miaskowsky (he has written about twenty symphonies so far!) and the greatly gifted but often impishly prankful Shostakovich.

One does not have to be familiar with all that history in order to enjoy the present program, but at least it helps to know something about the ideals and methods of its composers.

Vocal Winners and Losers

By Leonard Lieblich

SPRINGTIDE brings buds on trees and budding careers for the victors (as well as blights for the losers) in the Metropolitan Auditions of the Air. Sunday both the winners and the losers will know the best and the worst respectively, as the results of the winter's contests are then to be announced, the successful singers being picked from the list of lucky finalists: Eleanor Steber, soprano, of Wheeling, West Virginia; Emery Darcy, baritone, of Chicago and Hollywood; Arthur Kent, bass-baritone, of New York City; Lydia Summers, contralto, of Benton Harbor, Michigan; Gertrude Gibson, soprano, of Hawthorne, New York.

This department, always deeply sympathetic to young singers of unusual talent, listens to the Auditions with probably no less concern than the sponsors of the program and the judging executives of the Metropolitan, and interestedly follows up the subsequent doings of the winners. In all this, however, the department encounters some puzzling snags and real confusion, based on the few really significant stage appearances allotted by the Metropolitan to the victorious contestants.

For instance, of eight previous winners, only Leonard Warren seems to be favored frequently with leading roles, and, be it added, he won success in all of them. As for the other young artists, Arthur Carron had scattered appearances in some good parts, and Anna Kaskas had more opportunities; Thomas L. Thomas has not been in the casts for the past two seasons; John Carter was heard at a Sunday night Metropolitan concert and in several small roles.

Another circumstance that befuddles this conscientious department is that some Audition singers who had not won were given engagements at the Metropolitan. Jean Dickenson tried twice unsuccessfully and yet sang the vital role of Philine at the "Mignon" performance of last January 26. Raoul Jobin, Canadian tenor, tried in the Auditions on December 31 and was lifted out to do a chief tenor role, Des Grieux in "Manon," at the Metropolitan on February 19. On the same stage, Rise Stevens, only an Auditions runner-up, has been featured consistently and triumphantly as a star! Do you agree that these things are as difficult to solve

as an operatic crossword puzzle? One wonders just what the Auditions rules actually are, and whether they have been broken or just bent.

Of the judges, Wilfred Pelletier is on record as demanding good voices; Earl Lewis desires acting ability; John Erskine wants good looks; Edward Johnson's condition is repertoire.

Our guess as to the probable victors this year: Eleanor Steber and Emery Darcy—and we wish them well for the future, win or lose.

This Week's Opera

On shipboard, Tristan, true to his mission, refuses to approach Isolde until in fury she imperiously summons him through Brangaene and commands her to prepare a deadly poison for him in the form of a drink. Secretly she determines to share the draught with him, but the devoted Brangaene, divining the purpose, brews a love-potion instead. Tristan and Isolde drain it and fall rapturously into each other's arms.

Act II: The castle of King Mark. The lovers plan a last meeting, aided by Tristan's false friend, Melot, who takes

AFTER the premiere of Wagner's "Tristan and Isolde" at Munich in 1865, and its other early performances, the composer, always strongly convinced of his own genius, must have had at least some misgivings about his opera. Critics of the period mostly condemned it as "ugly," "dissonant" and "indecent," singers called it "unsingable," orchestral players declared it "unplayable."

You who know your musical history are aware of the sequel to the story. Today "Tristan and Isolde" is a sure-fire drawing-card at any opera, and especially at the Metropolitan, particularly when Flagstad and Melchior sing the title roles. Now, where the angels dwell, Wagner probably looks down contentedly upon the earth—and looks about him in vain for music critics!

The opera opens aboard ship. Sir Tristan, a knight, is returning to Cornwall from Ireland, where he had forcefully abducted the Princess Isolde as a bride for his uncle, King Mark of Cornwall. She occupies a curtained part of the vessel, together with her favorite companion, Brangaene. Previously, Tristan had warred against Ireland, killed Isolde's betrothed, suffered a serious wound and was nursed back to life by her. The couple fell in love, but without revealing it to each other.

the monarch on a nocturnal hunting-expedition. The impassioned pair come together in the moonlit garden, while Brangaene stands watch on the ramparts. Suddenly Mark bursts in, guided by the villainous Melot. The noble-minded king is tragically grieved rather than angered at Tristan's deception, and reproaches him sadly and philosophically. Melot takes matters into his own hands and stabs Tristan.

In the last act, on a terrace of Tristan's ruined castle in Brittany, Kurvenal, his devoted follower, is nursing the knight, whose anguish and yearning for Isolde prevent his wound from healing. Kurvenal has sent for Isolde, and several times Tristan deliriously imagines that she has arrived. A shepherd is on the watch out to sea and mournfully blows his pipe until a joyous strain announces to Kurvenal and the sick man that the expected vessel nears. Kurvenal runs to meet Isolde, while Tristan, in ecstasy, totters from his couch, tears off his bandages, and dies as his beloved takes him in her arms. A second ship lands, bearing Mark, Melot and a group of soldiers. Kurvenal attacks the party, kills Melot and is himself slain. Isolde sinks down over the body of Tristan, and during the music of the "Liebestod" (Love Death) she slowly expires. —Leonard Lieblich.

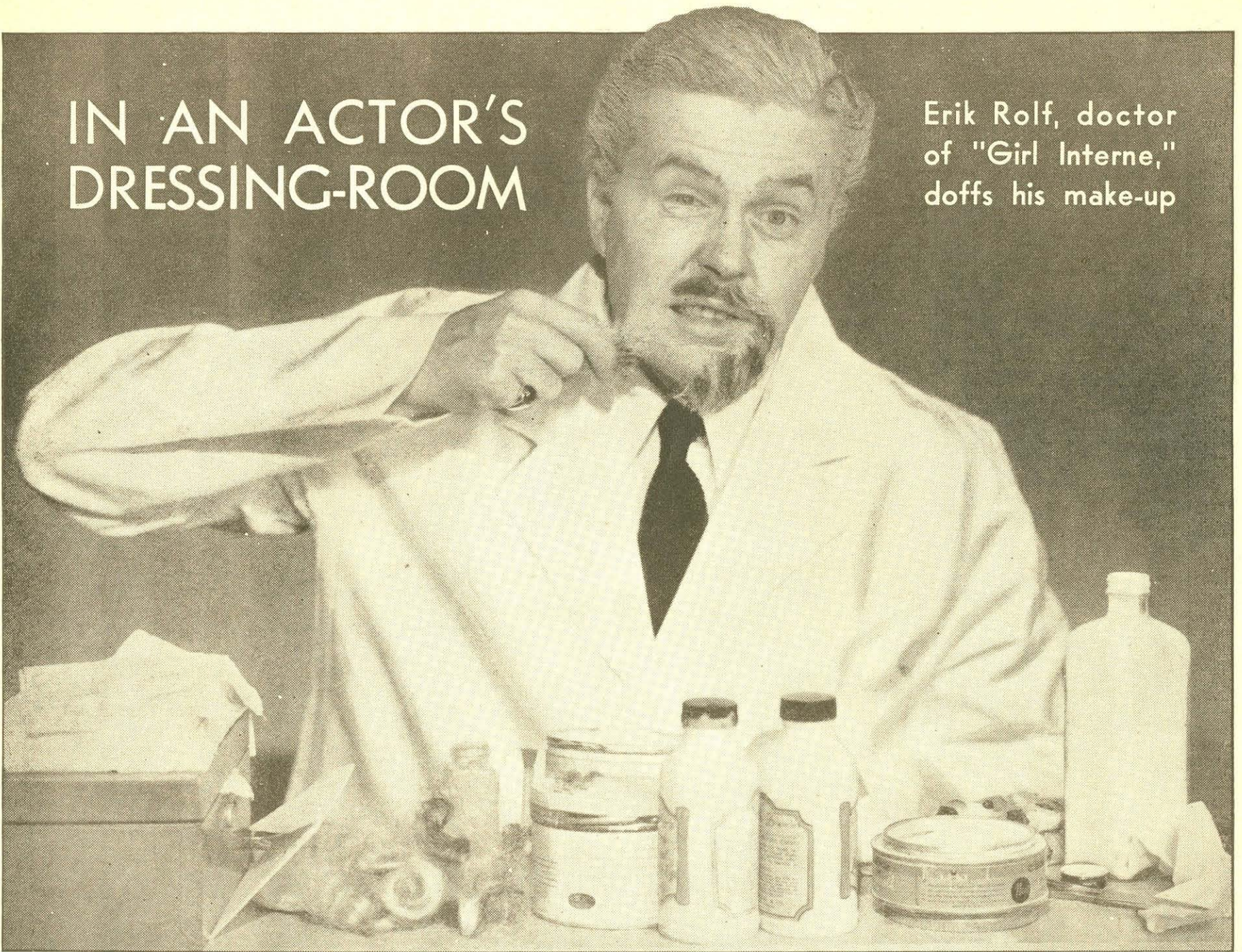

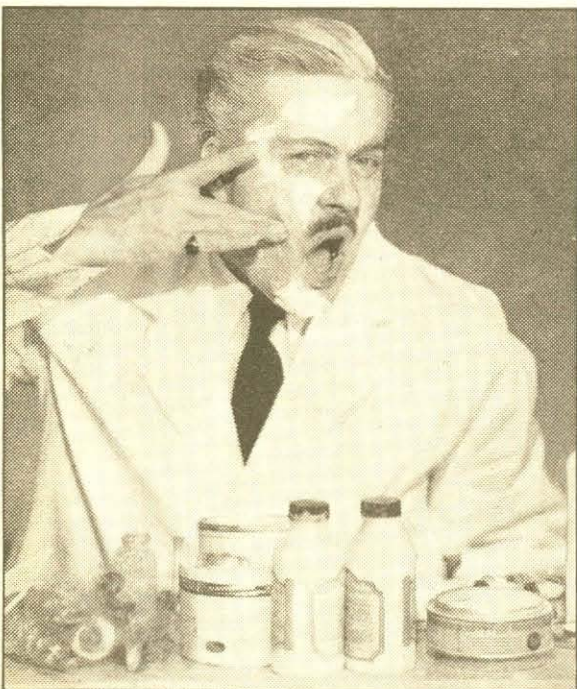

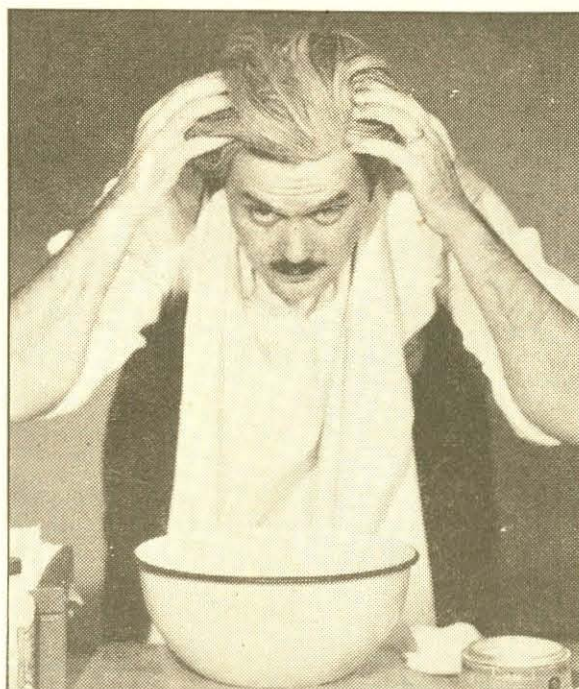

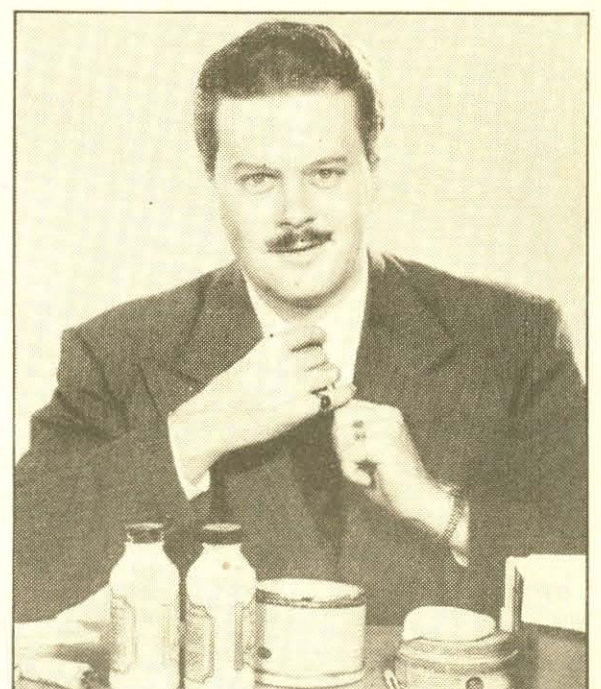

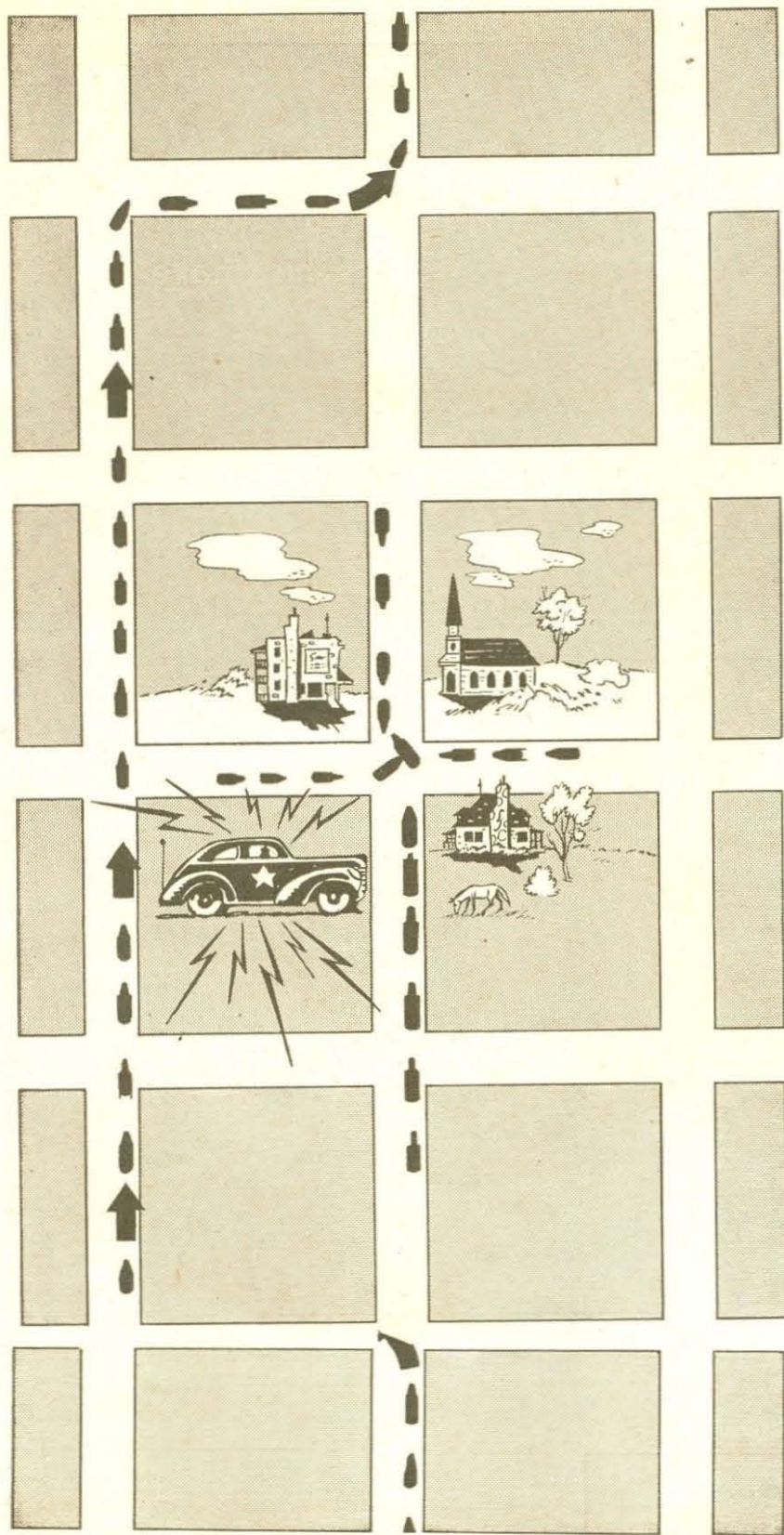

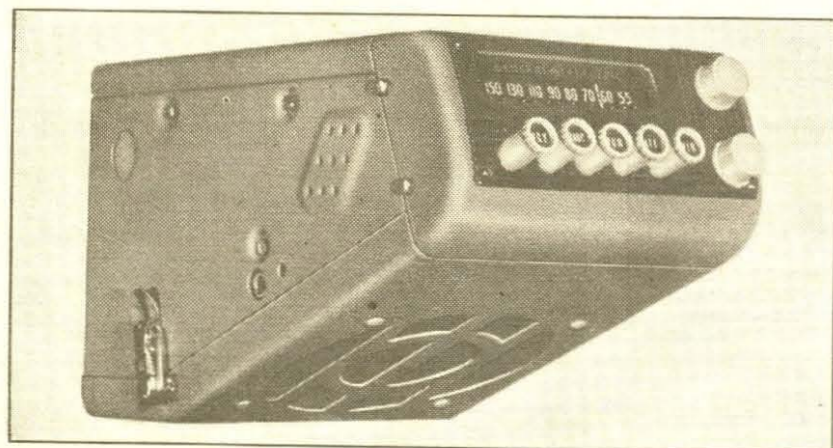

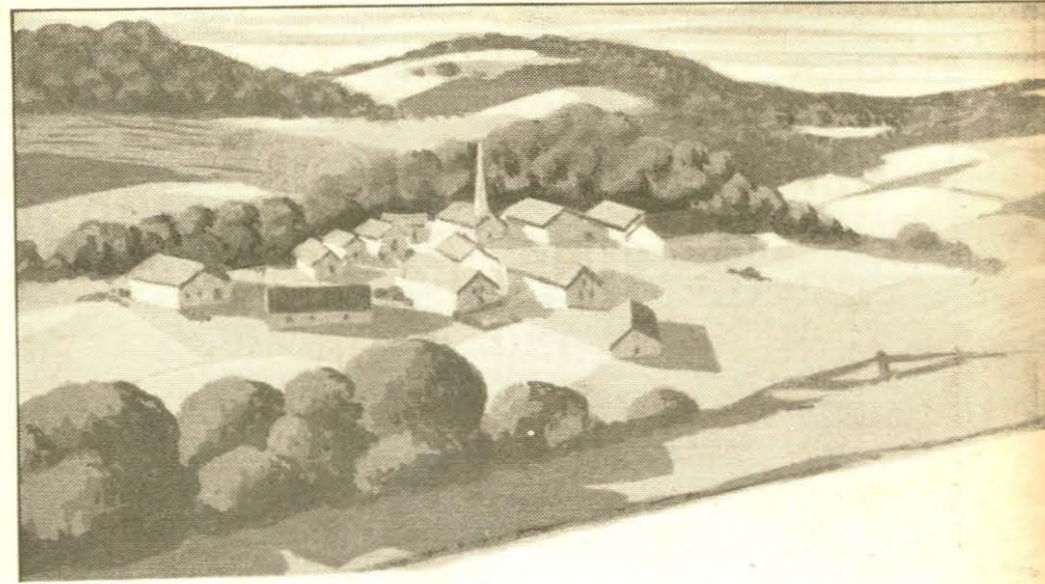

Radio Takes to

Extend your listening pleasure everywhere with an auto radio!

THE first man who did it was shame-faced and embarrassed when the sound of taunting klaxons wafted through the open windows of his sedan. But secretly he was overjoyed. That morning he had taken the innards of his parlor set and moved them into his automobile. They sat now with tubes aglow on the back seat, and a saxophone sextet's harmonies flooded the countryside. Why shouldn't a battery set work just as well while rolling down the highway as sitting in the house? It did work, and thus was born the first automobile radio.

Today seven million of us have Mayor Fiorello La Guardia of bustling New York City has what is probably the most imposing auto outfit. He not only receives; he sends. His car is literally a rolling broadcasting station. With both loudspeaker and microphone, he keeps in touch with his office, holds conferences and gives decisions while racing about his city. The auto radio has come a long way.

Have you a car radio? If you are an owner of one of America's twenty-six million automobiles, you certainly have a set at home. Your pleasure and profit in listening should be available everywhere. These paragraphs are to give you facts that may help you make up your mind.

For instance . . . What is the best automobile radio on the market today?

Answer: There is no best. Absolutely not, despite what you are told. But some are better, and these are the ones you should consider. But which are these better sets? How can one choose?

First, we consider the car. In this instance, it is brand new, a 1940 model. Most of today's car sets are built in. They are streamlined until it is impossible to see where the radio begins and the instrument panel ends. Mostly, those sets are installed at the factory.

They are made in huge quantities by radio-set manufacturers and sold at special discounts to the car-makers. They are just as good as mass-production methods can make them, which is usually very good.

What about the price? That is fixed, too. Home radios have been bought for years on a dual price scale. There is the list price and the bargain, or cash, price. The cash price in most cities is generally, if one knows where to shop, about one-third off. Dealers call it "price cutting." We'll call it a "trade condition" and let it go at that. But with automobile radios, things are different. One pays the price asked.

BUT what if one wants to install his own radio? Or what if one wants to buy a different make? The right answer depends on the car. Mostly, radios and cars are put together with the least possible waste of space and trouble. To switch brands is something a car dealer doesn't enjoy. Nor does he want to take out an expensive set and put in a cheaper one. Try him out next time you buy a car. You will learn that negotiation and compromise will have to be the means by which you get the radio you want.

But what radio do you want? Choose your car radio for only three reasons:

1. Reliability of the maker.
2. Performance required.
3. Tone quality.

First, what about the maker? In this period of cock-eyed consumer research and half-baked economic theories, some parties have attempted to bring into disrepute the American practise of advertising. Those parties have rumored that the advertised product is a hollow shell compared to something made down the street in a handyman's basement.

Don't you believe it! Despite all claims and counter-claims, a man is still only as good as his bond;

Here are facts which will help you decide what radio to select

and a company is only as good as the way it lives up to its promises. Buy your car radio from a company you respect. Buy on reputation. Ask your friends what radio manufacturer they respect. Buy where you know satisfaction has not only been promised but has also been delivered.

Point two: Every man does not require equal performance. A city driver who drives about through local streets can pick up local station-signals easily. A Montana rancher has a different problem. How can one decide? Usually, the number of tubes in the set indicates its performance. Usually, a six-tube set will out-perform a five-tube set, and a seven-tube set will out-perform one with only six tubes. The best test is an actual demonstration.

Point three: What about the tone? The ear is a curious mechanism. It can be fooled so easily. Or its perception dulled. Play a perfect tone to most radio listeners, then play that same tone as it is produced by their own home radio, and every one of them will choose the tone with which they are familiar. The ear rejects perfection if that perfection is something strange. Don't fall for a sales talk about high fidelity until you have heard that high fidelity. Listen to any radio you expect to buy. Ask for a demonstration and buy the set that pleases your ear.

Physically, this year's automobile radios are only a little different. The corners of 1939 models have been knocked off and rounded, the dials have been streamlined, and the push-buttons have been made less knobby. That's about all. If possible, consider a push-button set for your own car. It has advantages.

For example, the man or woman who drives around town must fight traffic. He needs his hands and his wits, but especially his hands. Push-buttons and the pre-set dial enable him to shift from station to station without removing his eyes from the road or his hands from

the wheel except for a single automatic movement. As a safety measure and as a convenience, the push-button set is grand for the local listener.

A long-distance driver has another problem, however. He speeds into and out of many station areas in fairly rapid succession. No push-button set-up in the world will help him. He must dial for his entertainment. For him, the best advice is simply this: Buy a set with the largest, best-lighted dial possible—and don't try to tune in a program while taking a curve.

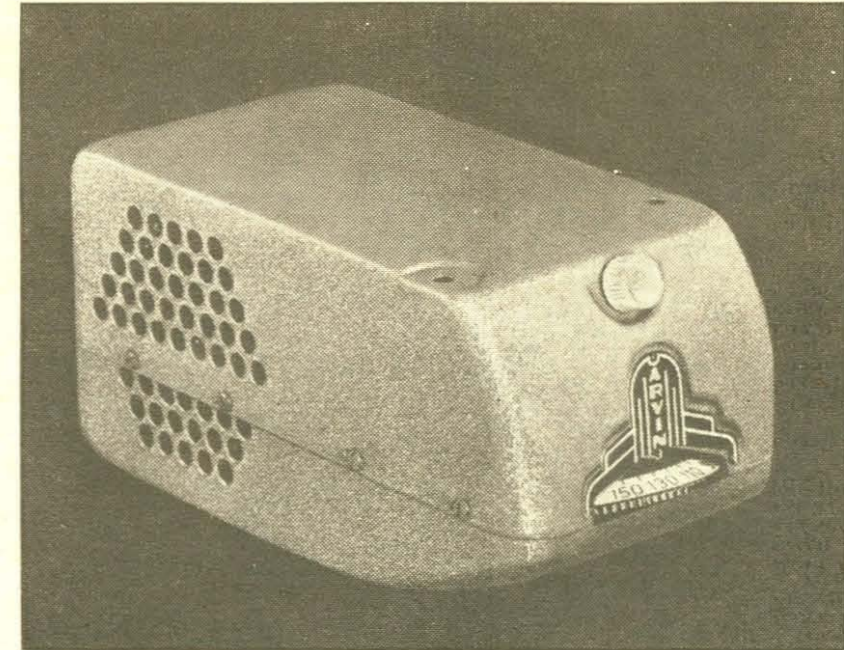
Is there any best antenna installation? Radio engineers have experimented for months to produce the best reception in any given car. Wherever they have placed their antenna, rest assured they do it for good and sufficient reasons. Many owners like to buy their own aerials. For them, the popular rod aerial is best.

While an automobile radio is only a convenience today, because of the entertainment it provides, the year may not be far off when state or national laws will require them. For one reason, they offer a solution to America's continually mounting traffic problem.

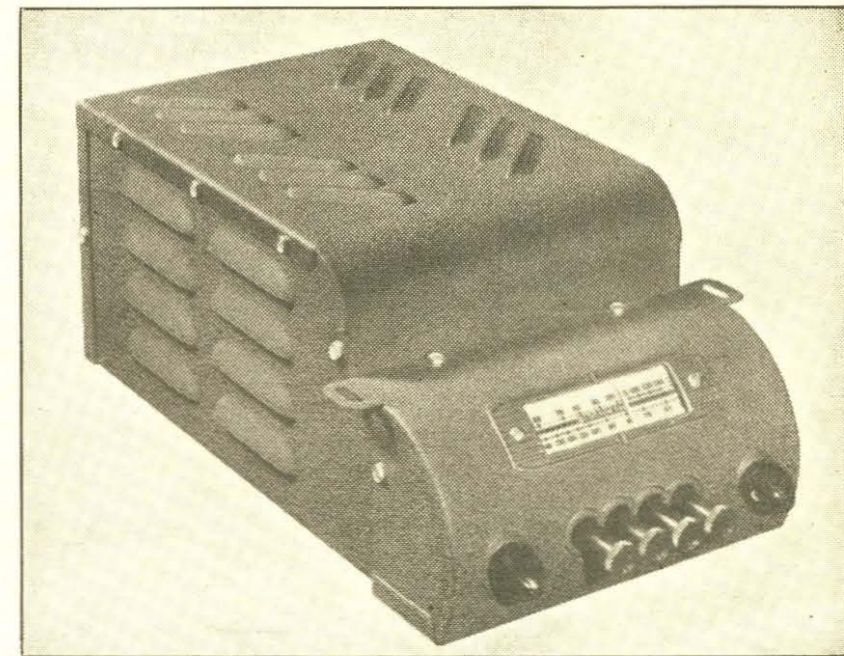
RECENTLY, a local test was made of a sample system designed to clear traffic jams. All cars with radios were tuned to 550 kilocycles. Police cars broadcasting on that frequency toured the county searching for Sunday traffic tangles. Whenever they were located, motorists who were approaching the jam were warned to detour. Result: Less jams at busy cross-roads and more contented motorists.

Many a cross-roads crack-up results when a tired driver speeds through stop-signs or red lights. Mile-a-minute tourists in strange territory often hurtle off darkened curves they don't know are there. At night, signs may be hidden. Snow and rain can obliterate the best markings. Crashes mount and

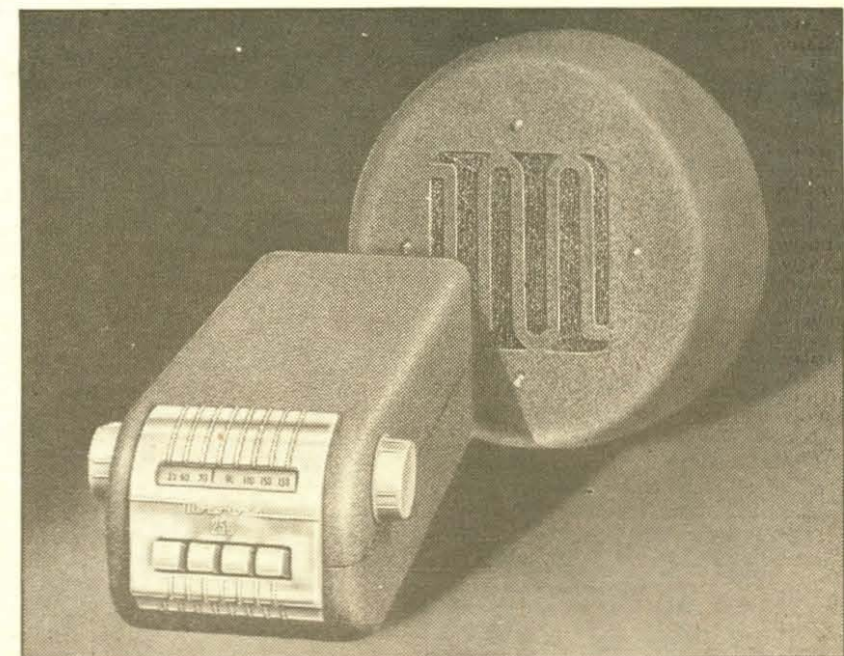

JITTERBUGS and sweet-music lovers alike acclaim bespectacled trombonist Glenn Miller as the number one pied piper of 1940. In one year the Miller band has risen from an insignificant swing crew, one-nighting through New England, to its present top-notch position airing for Chesterfield Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays over CBS from New York's Hotel Pennsylvania and recording for Bluebird. Miller's appeal isn't restricted to any one department of modern music. He will kick the roof off any ballroom with a wild jazz version of "Running Wild" for the jitterbugs, modulate to a slower, more subdued arrangement of a ballad like "Careless" for young dancers, then apply a Viennese touch to "Beautiful Ohio Waltz" to give the older folks a treat. It's the versatility and change of pace of the Miller musical style that prognosticates long life at the top of the heap for the band. Glenn's own arrangements featuring his "golden" saxophone tone, full eight-man brass choir and brass rhythm figures, his masterful handling of his men, boundless energy and painstaking thoroughness in rehearsing the band are responsible for the clocklike precision and teamwork that identifies the Miller band everywhere.

Probably the largest dance band on the air, the Miller organization of nineteen lines up with Al Klink, Danbury, Conn., Wilbur Schwartz, Newark, N. HOW TO LISTEN TO PANAMA

FOR interesting English and Latin programs direct from Panama—the crossroads of the world—tune to HP5G (11.785), in the 25-meter band.

HP5G might be called a "one-man station," since the colorful personality of its manager, globe-trotting soldier-of-fortune George Williams, completely dominates its field of activities. An ex-British naval officer with twenty-five years' experience in radio, he was in fact the ship's operator who, in 1918, tapped out the famous message from Admiral Beatty, commander-in-chief of the British fleet, to the commander-in-chief of the German high fleet, which read, "The German flag will be hauled down today, Thursday, at 15:57, and is not to be hoisted again without permission." Despite his British origin, he is an ardent supporter of democracy and has often been heard to say, "Good will can do more to bind the Americas together—and thus keep war from our shores—than the doubling of the United States Navy, the building up of the United States Army, and even the two large oceans which divide us from the old world with its continuous wars." Mr. Williams is, however, best known for his English "Radio Newspaper," which he has been airing every weekday from 12:30 to 1 p.m. and from 6:30 to 7 p.m. EST, for the past five years. This is by far the most popular English news period in all the Latin Americas and its listeners number untold thousands, not only in Central and South America, but in the United States as well. News items for the "Radio Newspaper," gleaned from an incessant stream of radio and cable dispatches, are short, informative and pertinent. It is, in fact, not uncommon for George to scoop some of our leading news com-

mentators. The fact that short commercial plugs for the local butcher, baker and candle-stick maker are woven into the period does not seem to detract from its interest.

Judy Garland gets a scare as cops unearth a kidnap plot!

HARDLY was Judy Garland over the thrill of being named the year's best juvenile and winning an Academy Award, than three carloads of police skidded to a stop in front of the Garland Canyon home, announced a threat had been made to kidnap Judy—and that they were there to see the plot wasn't carried out. Police radios crackled with instructions, cars were stopped, strangers questioned. The neighborhood was in an uproar in a jiffy.

Soon Robert Wilson, a 19-year-old Buffalo, N. Y. transient, was in custody. His plot to abduct the young singing star, drive her into the mountains and hold her for \$50,000 ransom resulted in his being booked on a charge of suspicion of kidnaping and being held for a mental examination. He had become panicky, "tipped off" the police to his plan via telephone. It was this "tip off" on his own contemplated crime that proved his undoing.

TO THE public, the news of the kidnap plot was very exciting. Judy herself can be excused for feeling a bit nervous about it. But to Hollywood, the threat was simply another in the never-ending real and imaginary plots against the stars.

Judy's studio (Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer) wasn't any too pleased over all the hue and cry. Officials branded all the excitement as a "super-colossal production by the police department."

Behind that attitude is to be found the real story of the manner in which kidnaping threats are handled in Hollywood. Threats of one kind and another constantly are being intercepted by the studios, at the rate of about 1,500 per year. Few of these threats ever reach the public prints, and only

in rare instances is the Federal Bureau of Investigation called in.

Usually these plots are handled almost entirely by studio police, who quietly and efficiently investigate each threat and take whatever measures are necessary to protect their stars. A lot is done, but little said. The public usually never hears about it—and the stars, themselves, except in rare instances, never know their safety has been threatened!

Reason for that attitude on the part of the studios is to keep resultant and too sensational publicity from being spread about their players and the film capital. It's only in isolated cases—like the Judy Garland threat—that the system fails to work.

"The Primrose Path" with Ginger Rogers, Joel McCrea—a review

Cast: Ginger Rogers, Joel McCrea, Marjorie Rambeau, Henry Travers, Miles Mander, Queenie Vassar, Joan Carroll, Vivienne Osborne, Carmen Morales. An RKO-Radio picture produced and directed by Gregory LaCava, who also directed "My Man Godfrey" and "Stage Door."

PREVIEWED recently in New York, "The Primrose Path," starring Ginger Rogers and Joel McCrea, brings to the screen a brunet Ginger in pigtails as the only respectable member of the Adams tribe—just as disreputable a family as you'll ever want to meet. Homer Adams (Miles Mander) has a weakness for gin and the Greek poets; Mamie, his wife (Marjorie Rambeau), keeps the family larder stocked by taking week-end trips with strange men; Grandma (Queenie Vassar) says

what she means and has things to say; Honeybell (Joan Carroll), the youngest daughter, takes after her mama—and Ellie May (Ginger Rogers) wears pig-tails—even after she's grown up—to escape the unwelcome attentions of the unwholesome denizens of Primrose Hill.

Out of this bizarre set of characters comes a fascinating story of young love in the romance of Ginger and Joel McCrea (Ed Wallace) who runs a hamburger stand. Ginger's family is the villain of the piece, and it's their complete disrespectability and Ginger's shame in belonging to such a tribe that causes the course of true love to take several detours before she and Joel really get together to live happily ever after.

Taken from the play, "The Primrose Path," by Robert Bruckner and Walter Hart, the theme is a daring one for a motion picture, and the role Ginger Rogers plays is a sharp departure from anything she ever has done before. How the public will take Miss Rogers in this type of picture remains to be seen.

NONE of the actors wears make-up in the film (a technique first tried in "The Grapes of Wrath") although a make-up man was on the job anyway. Winifred Kay, who worked on the story with Allan Scott and Gregory LaCava, made several trips to waterfront dives in San Pedro, took stenographic notes on conversations she heard, but by the time they were brought to the screen, she didn't recognize them!

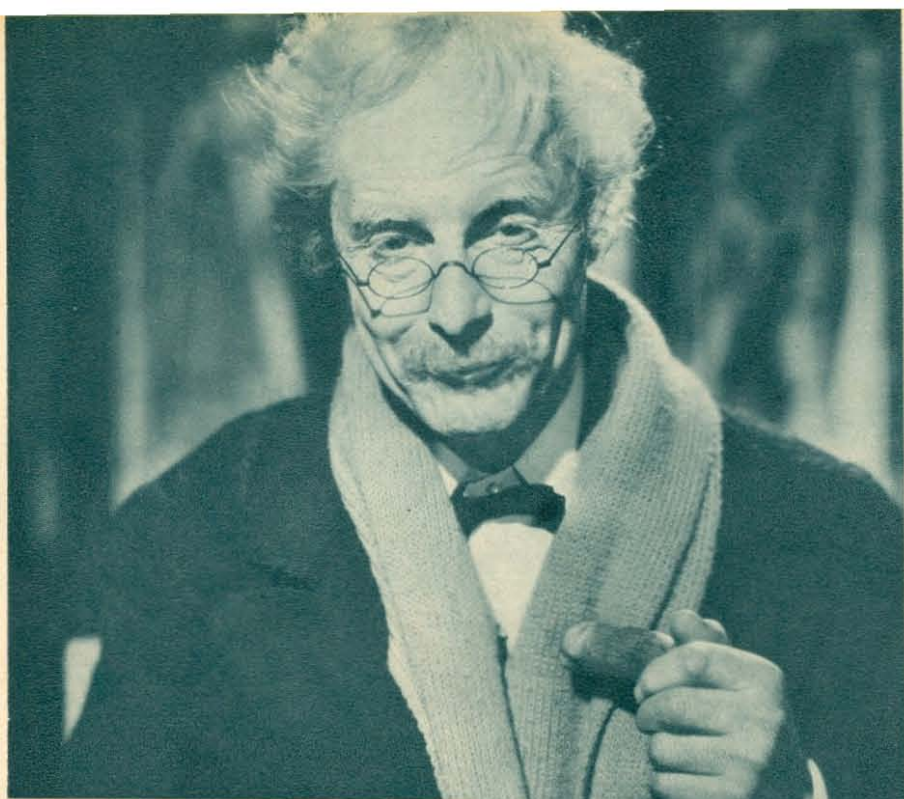

OSCAR GOES TO ENGLAND

America's talent takes a back seat as Britain's Vivien Leigh, Robert Donat win Academy Awards

VIVIEN LEIGH, English-born actress (in costume and portrait, above) was "Oscared" for her acting in "Gone With the Wind"

MOST important event of the year, from the point of view of the army of artists and craftsmen who make the wheels go 'round in the motion-picture industry, is the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Science Banquet. It is for this affair that accomplishments are reviewed, and recognition, in the form of golden statuettes chummily known as "Oscars," is awarded to productions, actors, actresses and technicians alike.

This year's Academy Award Banquet, held February 29 at the Ambassador Hotel's famous Cocoanut Grove, was a prestige-smashing, tradition-shaking event, because:

Great Britain walked off with the "best actor" and "best actress" awards in the persons of Robert Donat and Vivien Leigh, who were presented with golden Oscars for their performances in "Good-Bye, Mr. Chips" and "Gone With the Wind," respectively.

One picture—"Gone With the Wind"—won ten out of a possible seventeen awards including the "best picture," "best screen play," "best actress" as well as "best color and film editing" honors.

Hattie McDaniel won the "best supporting actress" award for her characterization of the Negro mammy in "Gone With the Wind," the first time a member of her race had ever been honored by the Academy.

In addition to the 4,000 members of the motion-picture industry who usually vote, this year's balloting was opened to the ranks of motion-picture extras, who availed themselves of the privilege 8,000 strong, making the number of votes cast in this recently completed election the largest in the history of the event.

Two awards were made posthumously—to Douglas Fairbanks, Sr., first president of the Academy, whose

Oscar was accepted by Douglas Fairbanks, Jr., and to the late Sidney Howard, whose work on "Gone With the Wind" won the "best screen play" award.

JUDY GARLAND, M-G-M starlet, was given an Oscar for an outstanding series of performances in the juvenile classification. Several years ago Shirley Temple was given this same type of a special statuette for her

exceptional talent as a child actress.

Most unexpected event of the evening was David O. Selznick's praise of the work Olivia de Havilland did in "Gone With the Wind," a fine tribute in view of the fact Hattie McDaniel—for her performance in the same picture—won the "best supporting actress" award.

Most dramatic moment of the evening came when Hattie McDaniel, presented with her award by Fay Bainter, broke down after a few words of thanks, couldn't continue, and walked from the platform with her eyes full of tears.

FUNNIEST remark was Bob Hope's, who introduced several speakers. Said Hope, at the speakers' desk, surrounded by the golden Oscars to be awarded:

"I feel as if I were in Bette Davis' living-room." (Miss Davis has won two awards, was strongly in the running for a third this year for her performance in "Dark Victory.")

Hollywood definitely has taken off its blinkers, says what it believes and thinks, is worrying less and less about the tender feelings of certain factions and groups. Likelihood: Gable's parting shot to Scarlett, "I don't give a damn," started an emancipation, made producers realize that the Hays code has made ostriches of a lot of them.

ANN SHERIDAN'S a busy little girl these days, buzzing from one picture into another, and her studio (Warner Bros.) announces all the rushing about is to enable Ann to accept an invitation from Northwest State Teachers College, Denton, Texas, to become a member of that institution's faculty for the summer session. 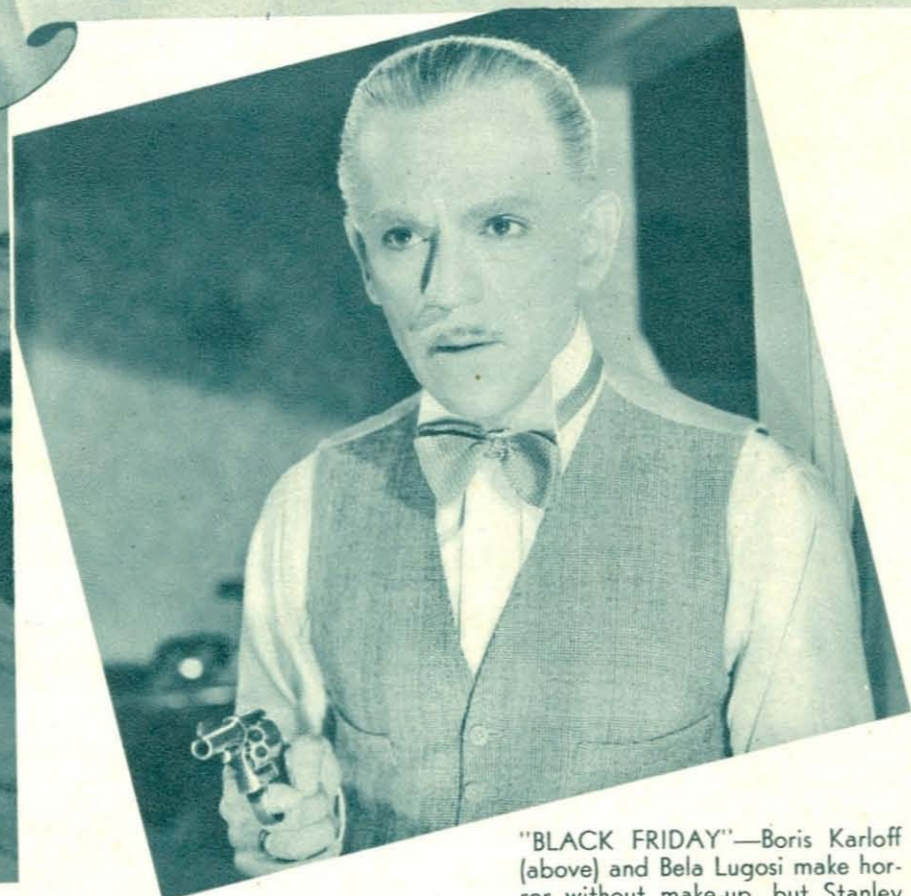

SELDOM in a single week does Hollywood send out two such slaphappy hits as "Road to Singapore," selected as one MOVIE AND RADIO GUIDE picture of the week (see Pages 26 and 27), and "Too Many Husbands," which is hereby selected as co-picture of the week. Melvyn Douglas, whose amazing "Mr. Williams" screwy detective series has marked him as a comedian of top rank, is joined here by Fred MacMurray and Jean Arthur, no mean comedians in their own right. The story is made to order for them. Fred and Melvyn are the publishing firm of "Cardew and Lowndes," respectively. Jean Arthur is "Mrs. Cardew" until the arrival of the unhappy news that Cardew, an adventurer at heart, has met death on some distant exploration trip. The resultant readjustment finds Jean marrying her husband's partner, Lowndes. When Cardew—who wasn't dead at all—returns, Jean's efforts to choose between the two (and their efforts to influence her choice) are both amazing and side-splitting. The same dizzy hilarity which marks the film also marked its making, and both the cast and crew got many laughs during its production. In one scene, for example, Melvyn pops a hastily written note into his mouth to keep Fred from reading it, swallows the note. A large supply of "notes" was made by property men from a parchment-thin candy, but when the scene was shot, Melvyn actually had to swallow a real paper note: Fred and Jean, liking the flavor of the candy notes, had eaten them all! Two male leads for a single feminine lead also posed its problems, but Leroy Prinz, dance director, solved them neatly by originating a new dance—"Doing the Threesome"—which Jean, Fred and Melvyn execute in this picture. Wesley Ruggles, who inherited the camera crew left by the eminent Frank Capra when he left the Columbia lot, credits much of the film's success to that gang. But Wesley Ruggles' past record amply shows where the lion's share of the credit is due.

"SHOOTING HIGH" solves no deep social problems, deals with no weighty subjects. As a matter of fact, it is planned and produced for its simple entertainment value, and with that in mind, its producers have turned out a musical-comedy western that makes several departures from the plotted course of such features.

To Jane Withers fans, accustomed to a plump, childish hoyden; to the Gene Autry followers, used to his bang-bang westerns, this picture will be a distinct surprise—and a not unpleasant one. For here is a Jane who is strictly streamlined and a shrewd and accomplished sub-deb. Autry delves into comedy with a fine hand and in a manner not entirely unlike that of the late Will Rogers.

It was quite a few years ago that Gene was a telegrapher for a railroad in a small Oklahoma town. To while away the long hours, Gene used to sing and play his guitar. One night, while he was singing, a stranger walked in, handed him a wire to send and cautiously told Gene that he might make good some day if he worked hard at his singing and playing. When he had gone, Gene saw the signature—Will Rogers. Since that day Gene's

deepest ambition is to emulate the Oklahoma sage. This is his first step along that line.

The story is concerned with the grandson of a two-gun sheriff who is being crowded off his range by a cross-roads banker whose daughter he loves. The various ramifications of the story are nicely told, the whole picture moves with speed and ease to its very modern climax. "Shooting High" is a good picture, one in which Autry, who came to the screen from radio, shows really great promise.

JUST to prove that it isn't their horrible make-up alone that causes goose-pimples to rise on the flesh of the arm-pinchers who like to be frightened to death, Boris Karloff and Bela Lugosi, past masters at horror, go into this blood-curdling little venture without make-up. And, take it from this reviewer, "Black Friday" isn't a film for the kiddies or those who suffer from heart trouble.

The ingenious story revolves about a college professor, played by Stanley Ridges, who has the brains of a criminal transplanted in his head by Dr. Boris Karloff, his close friend. (Who but Boris would have thought of this?) With the criminal's brain, the professor goes on periodic killing-sprees between carrying on with his professorial duties. Ridges, incidentally, has the creamiest part in the whole picture and emerges as a rival to both Lugosi and Karloff as breath-taking horrifiers. Definitely not for abhorers of horror.

ENTERTAINING—and how!—is this eternally appealing story of the good little bad boy whose heart is set on owning a dog but whose mother, with her new-fangled book ideas on rearing children, has placed a ban on canine playmates. A sparkling and very real cast—including Ernest Truex as the father who is just a kid at heart, Dorothy Tree as the mother who finally admits her error, and Ann Todd as little Orvie's sweetheart—might be folks who live on your own street, so naturally do they delineate the characters from Booth Tarkington's immortal story.

But as Little Orvie, eight-year-old John Sheffield, recruited from the stage, where he appeared in such parts as Pud in "On Borrowed Time," easily romps home with top-acting honors. When John was two years old, his parents—stage people—placed him in a special dramatic school at the University of California. So young John, called upon to speak 582 lines of dialog and to appear in 145 out of a total of 225 scenes in "Little Orvie," is perfectly at home. In addition he does a monolog—six pages long—which is reminiscent of the

comic page "Skippy" and guaranteed to make all parents think at least twice before saying no with unequivocal finality to their youngsters.

"Little Orvie" is packed with humorous episodes—as when the Great Dane rushes through the house knocking over adults after Orvie had purchased a half-interest in him—and episodes which would bring tears to the most case-hardened oldsters—as when Orvie decides to run away from the home where he has been so unhappy. But throughout it all, you'll recognize some child in your own neighborhood with whom you've laughed, on occasions, and whom you've bawled out on others.

Tyrone has an Irish wit, biting as a barb, which he curbs, knowing how devastating it can be. But his day is made when he can reverse the tables on pranksters.

TYRONE POWER is a paradox. He is shy and sophisticated, an enthusiastic romantic and a cold realist. Innately simple, he appreciates grandeur. His humor is subtle—occasionally bitter. He is ambitious and impatient.

Behavior is the unchallenged barometer of what a man is, the one true key to a man's character. Perhaps no phase of Tyrone's character is so well developed as his loyalty and his sense of appreciation.

In New York, for example, there is an unpretentious little restaurant which bears an eye-catching (and incidentally a till-filling) sign. It boasts—"Tyrone Power's favorite restaurant." Tyrone, himself, helped hang it.

Not so many years ago a lean and frequently hungry young actor was a customer at that restaurant. Many a meal he ate "on the cuff." Time passed and the young actor became a motion-picture star. He came to New York for a holiday. Hundreds were massed in the Grand Central Station shouting his name when he arrived. Hundreds more choked the entrance of his hotel.

He slipped away through a back door, went directly to the small restaurant to see Jack and Frank, the owners. Daily he came to eat there—let it be known where he ate, for it was good for business. On his last day in New York the owners asked: "Could we put up a sign saying you ate here?"

It would help." And so the sign was painted, and an hour before Tyrone's train left for the Coast, he was precariously perched on a ladder—hammering in the final nail.

It was during the same trip that Tyrone had installed in his suite three telephones and an extra operator, so that not one of the friends of the old days would fail to reach him.

He solved the autograph problem by asking fans to leave their books, their pamphlets, their scraps of paper at the hotel desk with their own names and addresses. In the tumult and hubbub of a tempestuous vacation he found time to sign everything—to arrange for delivery to their owners.

EQUAL to his sense of loyalty is his sense of justice. Tyrone now owns an apartment house on the outskirts of Hollywood, named after him. It represents an old score settled—a promise made and kept.

Blackout for Blondes!

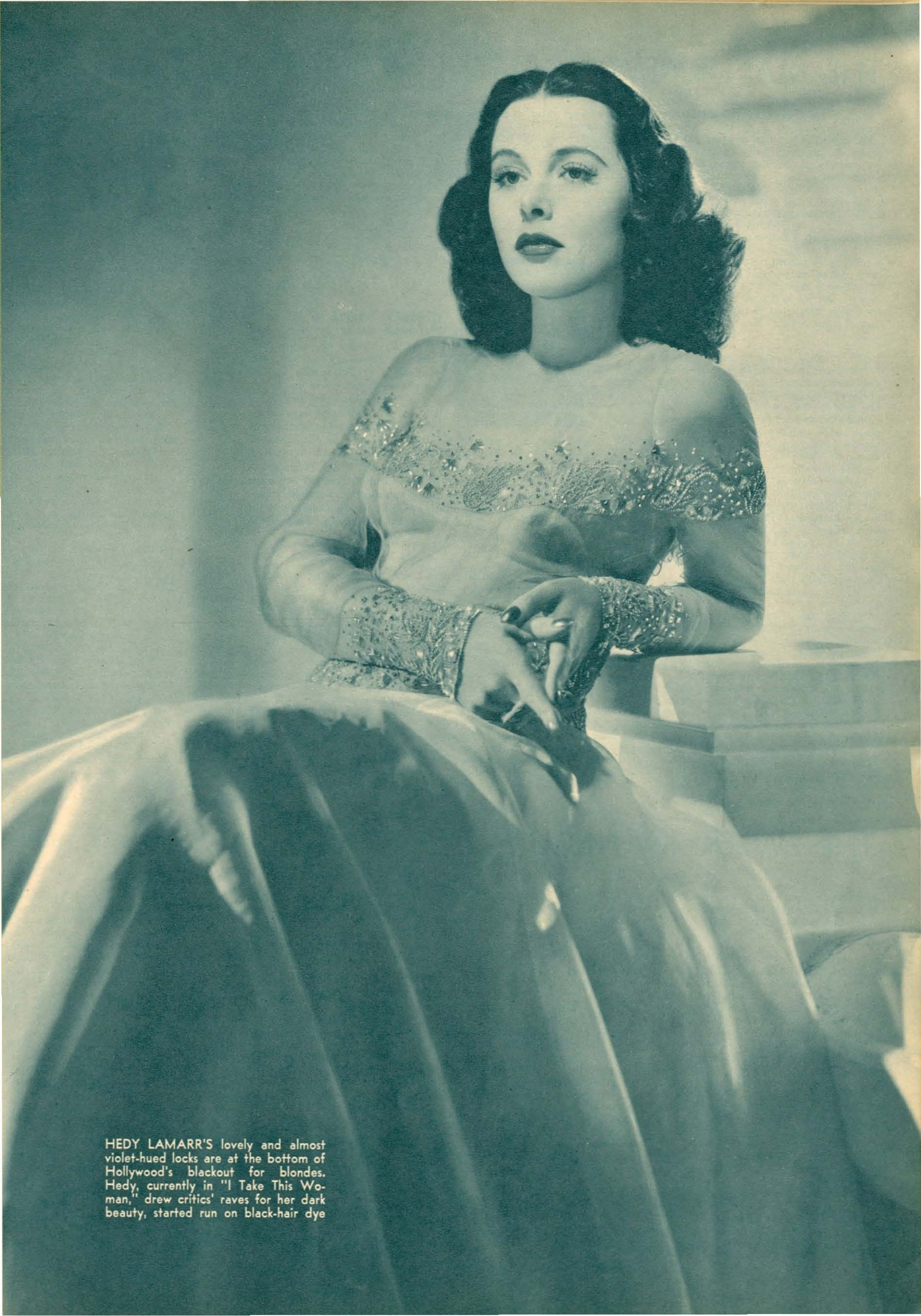

HIS sense of humor has, in the past, frequently beguiled him from quick and turbulent decisions, and from the periodic moodiness to which all artists are heirs. Today, of course, he has Annabella, and a new serenity—a complete peace and satisfaction which dissuades him from too much introspection, and from too much analysis of realities which no brooding can change.

Tyrone has sharp dislikes. For people who sign their letters to him with "More Power to you." For stupid or crafty flatterers. For people who call him "sweet." As a youngster, hearing that word applied to himself, he bought a gallon of sour pickles, stuffed himself to dizziness with them in the childlike faith that it would add vinegar to his nature and be evident in his appearance.

He has today that sharp seasoning which makes a boy a man. He has an emotional courage—for how, otherwise, could he have escaped the wily traps laid for his heart until he himself fell deeply and completely in love?

He has physical courage, which prompted him to argue long and bitterly with his director against letting a stand-in do those dangerous riding scenes in "Jesse James."

He has an instinctive faith in people, checked by his sophistication, by the cynical wisdom which has become his through the tough years of ambi-

tious reaching, and the treacherous years of fame.

But somehow he has retained an innate simplicity. He and Annabella worship in a tiny, poorly endowed church, which together they decorate each Sunday before services with great armloads of flowers. Tyrone's idea

Tyrone Edmund Power the 3rd was born in Cincinnati, Ohio, on May 5, 1914. His was a theatrical heritage, and very early the blood of his forebears made itself felt. "When will I be grown enough to be an actor?" he would insistently ask his mother.

At seven he was given his first role.

with great acting, took him into the Canadian woods for two months. Intensively the elder Power trained the boy in timing, in drama, in interpretation and delineation of character.

"If you are to be an actor, see that you are a very good one," the father cautioned the boy.

In 1931 the elder Tyrone appeared for a season of Shakespearian repertoire in Chicago. Young Tyrone was given a small part in each of the plays.

At the conclusion of the season, Tyrone Power, Sr., was signed by Paramount to star in the talkie version of "The Miracle Man." The boy was to have a start in pictures.

Tragedy intervened. The elder

Power was taken ill on the set—died a few short hours later in the arms of his son.

It was Christmas Eve, 1931.

On young Power's slim shoulders now rested the responsibility of carrying on a distinguished name.

For months he could find no work. Universal signed him for a projected series of pictures which was to star the sons of famous fathers. The plans blew up—Tyrone was jobless again.

For better than two years he remained on the Coast, eating irregularly, sleeping in attics and storage rooms and a garage. For part of this time he was with the Santa Barbara Community Theater. At the studios it was always the famous "brush-off."

He gave up. With twenty dollars in his pocket he left for New York.

He stopped off in Chicago, joined the movie company appearing at the Century of Progress. He read comics to the kiddies over the air on Sundays for ten dollars a reading.

He finally arrived in New York—cold, hungry and bedraggled, with two one-dollar bills in his pocket. He was given food and lodging by a friend of his father's—then he set out to find a job. He found one with Katharine Cornell, first as an understudy to her leading man, later in a real part of his own in "Romeo and Juliet."

IN 1936 Twentieth Century-Fox tested and signed him. He was assigned to "Sing, Baby Sing," starring Alice Faye and Shirley Temple. The director kicked him out of the cast—"Go back to Broadway and Shakespeare," he advised. "You'll never make a movie actor."

Alice Faye went to bat for the humiliated, beaten boy. He was given a second chance in "Girls' Dormitory." He appeared in it briefly, in the very last part of the picture.

His name did not appear in the cast of characters.

A week after the picture was released, five hundred letters came to the studio asking his identity.

The world had discovered Tyrone Power!

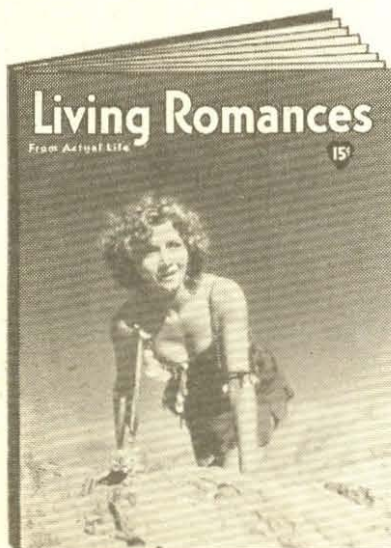

THE new chew-and-chat program called "Luncheon at the Waldorf" might as well announce itself "For Women Only." If you're a man, you wouldn't like it, and the people behind the program probably wouldn't care. If you're a woman, you're a potential listener and a potential market for the sponsor's cigarettes. The program is planned for you, and it's you we're telling about it.

In brief the format is this: Ilka Chase, actress and society figure, entertains fifty guests at a bona-fide luncheon in the famous hotel in New York. The eating is assumed to be over when the program comes on the air, for everybody is in high spirits and limber-tongued. Under the expert guidance of the hostess the guests chat about recipes, gardening, social doings, fashions, and news of interest to women—especially women who feel the touch of sophistication.

There are name guests of honor. On this program it was Dorothy Thompson, America's foremost woman commentator and columnist. She chatted intimately about her farming, "hoping she would make enough money writing to pay for it," and about writing, jesting that "people who know don't write and people who write don't know, so I try to know the people who do know." Most interesting part of the chat concerned Miss Thompson's projected trip to Europe. Her objective, said she, will be to dig up facts Americans are quite in the dark about—what is happening to refugee children, to people in conquered areas, to the average European man-in-the-street. This is the type of information which isn't easily come by through the usual avenues of radio and newspaper.

The program in general fills the need of a radio focus for the multitudinous things which interest the woman of today, and it does so in a manner interesting to its desired audience.

Experts say that radio can stop it.

They suggest a small broadcast station at every corner. It will have a range of only a few hundred feet. But car radios which are tuned in will suddenly speak out with a shrill and unmistakable warning tone whenever danger lies ahead. No storm or sleepiness will muzzle that voice. Thousands of lives will be saved.

Many states are considering such a protective net of midget stations right now. Don't be surprised if 1941 finds your own set tossing you a needed warning whenever you approach one of these radio lighthouses of the future.

But this is 1940. Whether you need a replacement set, a good auto radio for your present car, or a new radio-

equipped limousine, you can choose from an interesting and efficient line. Each may be judged on its technical merits, but such judging requires the services of an expert. Most radios will be bought and will deliver perfect satisfaction because their manufacture has reached a plane which automatically guarantees good performance.

So:

Buy from a manufacturer you respect.

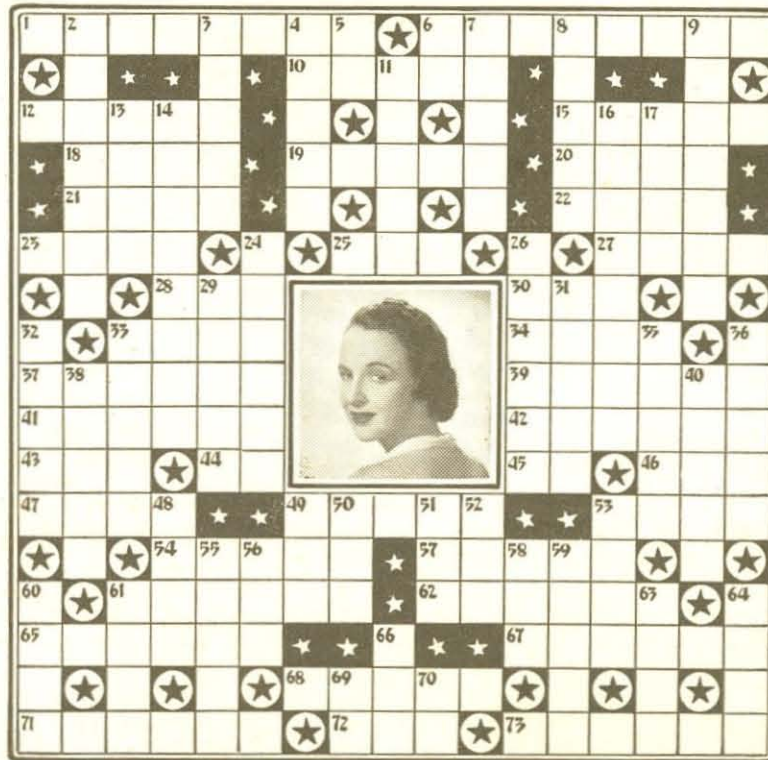
Consider the performance you require and buy a set which will deliver that performance.
