Dear Allice Faye ...

A LETTER TO ALICE FAYE FROM DOROTHY, DAUGHTER OF LILLIAN RUSSELL

YOU'RE now making a movie in Hollywood about a great woman who was known to the world as Lillian Russell. That isn't any light responsibility. The stories that grew up around Lillian Russell in her lifetime and continue today, eighteen years after her death, threaten eventually to obscure her real personality. And that would be a pity. For her real personality was far more colorful and far more exciting than all of the stories combined.

Men will tell you Lillian Russell was an extravagant, pleasure-loving woman and will ask you to interpret her that way. Or men will tell you she was a narrow, vengeful creature and will ask you to interpret her that way.

But I knew Lillian Russell well. And I should like to tell you what she really was like so you may interpret her faithfully and so, when your picture is shown in May, the public may give her the understanding and the love she so richly deserves.

You see, Lillian Russell happened to be my mother.

The world thinks of Lillian Russell primarily as a great beauty. She was a great beauty. That is irrefutable. The women of her time could have no greater compliment than to be told they looked like her. Everything she did, everything she wore, became a vogue. And when I was a little girl, home from school, and she read me fairy-stories, I always imagined the Queen of the Fairies looking exactly

like her, having a voice rich and soft and lovely like hers, and walking, as she walked, with quiet grace.

oh, yes, she was a great and famous beauty! But she wasn't primarily a great beauty. Primarily she was a woman. And so, for all the brilliance of the famous diamond sunburst she wore over her heart, she often was sad. And so, even though good family men dreamed about her and fabulous men of the world surfeited her with their wealth, there were other men—men



she loved-who would have broken her heart had it been less deep, less great.

But to be specific. And to go back, for just a paragraph or two, to my mother's girlhood so you may better understand how she came to grow up the way she did and how she remained true to herself in spite of everything.

HER father was Charles E. Leonard of Knight, Leonard and Company, Chicago printers. successful mother, Cynthia Leonard, was a pioneer in woman's suffrage with Susan B. Anthony, also a woman who had the temerity to bob her curly hair when this wasn't considered chic but downright eccentric, if not a little indecent. There were eight children in the Leonard family, and of the eight five sur-vived, all girls.

The nuns in the Sacred Heart Convent in Chicago discovered my mother's beautiful voice. And shortly afterwards, when she was sixteen, her mother took her and her sisters to New York so her sisters might enter a proper finishing-school and she might study voice with Leopold Damrosch.

In spite of one or two earlier appearances on the stage, it was when a family friend arranged for my mother to sing for Tony Pastor, and he engaged her and she changed her name, that

her professional career really began.
"I might not be a success," she told
Tony Pastor. "And I wouldn't want to bring shame to my family."

"No need to risk it!" he said. "Choose another name!"

He held up a large board with a list of first names and a list of last names on it. And out of those names "Lillian Russell" was born.

"Those names are wonderful to-

gether," my mother exclaimed with the charming enthusiasm she always was to show at the smallest things. "Look how the 'I's stand out!"

At the end of the New York season Tony Pastor clamored for her to go on the road.

"I won't permit it!" her father stormed. "No unmarried daughter of mine tours with a theatrical troupe!"

The scorn he put into those last words had results he couldn't possibly have anticipated. He had been proud of my mother because her skin was

creamy and her was gold hair and the blue of forget-me-nots was in her eyes. Because she sang with a lovely voice. But never before had he encountered her spirit. And he was to be proud of this, too, one

day. Immediately she married the musical director for Pastor, Harry Braham. Together they

went on tour. And at the same time, because of the ardor she had for the theater always, she promised herself to elevate the profession. Actors and actresses must not be social outcasts

but eminent members of society. Her marriage with Harry Braham lasted until their six-month-old baby died, about two years. His death was an accident. His father gave him an overdose of paregoric, unaware that his grandmother had given him paregoric earlier in the evening. My mother, returning from the theater, found her baby dead.

Still very young, only twenty, she would not listen to the explanations of her husband. And she would not talk of the tragedy to anyone, even her mother. She was, as she was to continue, inordinately proud. That, I think, was her great fault as well as her great virtue. In future years I was to watch her live through several experiences I knew to be almost more than she could bear. But I was never

to see her grief. She let no one see it, I think, unless it was Maggie, her personal maid for thirty years.

Maggie adored my mother beyond any other human being. She tried to pattern herself after her. She used all the Lillian Russell beauty preparations. And I often found her trying on Moth-

er's clothes before the pier glass. "Charge it to the Madam," she would say when she went shopping. She was proud to be famous as Lillian Russell's maid and proud too of the limitless credit my mother had everywhere, from Tiffany's to the smallest novelty shop on Fifth Avenue. The Japanese spaniels which succeeded one another-for my mother never was without one-adored Maggie next to Mother herself. And when Mother traveled it was Maggie, strutting a little, who carried her beautiful, priceless jewels.

Looking backwards I feel very grateful to Maggie, Miss Faye. For, as you'll understand, a woman as famous and beautiful and, finally, as rich as my mother had need of someone who loved her unselfishly.

I can see Mother coming home from a shopping trip, dropping into an easy chair in her room, saying, "Maggie; chair in her room, saying, "Maggie; get me my old friends." Whereupon Maggie would fetch her soft, comfortable old oxfords. Then, likely, Mother would take off her corsets and put on a beautiful, loose kimono. And if it was eleven o'clock a.m., anyone who was there would be excused and Mother's door would close.

THERE was great mystery about Lillian Russell's activity between eleven and eleven-thirty. Newspaper writers argued she spent this time putting a rare enamel on her handshaving a milk bath—reveling in her jewels. They never guessed the truth. And they wouldn't have believed the truth had anyone told them. She spent this time reading the Bible.

"Half an hour out of twenty-four hours is very little to give to God,' she used to say.

When she went to church she at-tended High Episcopal services. But she was never in any sense orthodox. My mother liked to study all religions. And I think she described the divine law by which she lived completely when she told one of the priests who visited us: "I believe God is in my heart. And if I do unto others as I would be done by, surely I will not fail

This I know: My mother longed for peace and family ties and a husband she could love because he, in turn,

WHEN you portray Lillian Russell, Miss Faye, show her as a woman kind and intelligent, with simple ways. For she was like that. In spite of her renowned diamond crown, the rare Chinese porcelains she collected, her chinchilla coat worth a king's ran-som, the rich chic of her gowns, and the pretty vanity of the Lillian Russell curl in the middle of her forehead.

Only once, as far as I know, did my mother enter Rector's. That was on a New Year's Eve. I was there at a party and she came to reassure herself about my friends and my surroundings. The Waldorf and Sherry's, on the other hand, saw her fairly often in the "olden days." When she wasn't appearing in a play she went there to Sunday night suppers. Champagne was her drink. But she never took much of it. Drunkenness she abhorred. Once wine was poured for her she had her glass replenished with charged water to avoid embarrassing talk.

In 1883 my mother married again. Her second husband and my father was Edward Solomon, son of a court musician to Napoleon III and a ladyin-waiting to Empress Eugenie. My father's parents always considered his first marriage—by which he had a daughter—most unfortunate. And

when he became unhappy in that marriage they encouraged him to accept an offer to conduct for Arthur Sullivan in the United States. They would, they assured him, arrange for his divorce. Word that the divorce had been granted came to him shortly before my mother received her Jersey decree from Harry Braham. Immediately she was free, they were married.

They loved each other with excitement and tenderness and some trust and much jealousy; all things that go to make a great romance. And when I was born they told everyone they must be the Fates' very favorite chil-dren. "Daute," Mother called meshort for daughter.

I was two when they had their London triumph. Publicity-agents preceded them across the sea to set all England talking of Mother's beauty. "Press-agents are conjurers," she often said. "I have not bad eyes and a

good complexion but I also have pressagents. So I'm world-famous as a beauty. My sister, who really is a beauty, has no press-agents. So she remains obscure."

But I digress . .

Triumphs are dangerous. bring the spotlight upon you. They publicize your earnings. They raise

greedy hands in threatening gestures. They cause you to turn sick at the false, avaricious claims made upon But you've long since discovered

all this for yourself. I know . . . One night as my mother and my father came out of the stage door, making their way to their carriage through the crowds with difficulty, a

woman screamed loudly at them.
"Look!" she cried. "Man and wife, they say they are! It's a lie! They're not married! He's my husband. And this here's his daughter!"

She was my father's first wife. His people had given her the money she required to get a divorce. But they had been in error in believing the decree ever was made final.

My mother returned to the Mayfair house which she and my father had leased only long enough to pack her trunks. Then she went on to a hotel to await the first boat home. Her producers threatened suit if she left England. "Sue!" she told them. My father and his parents, who adored her, pleaded forgiveness, patience, understanding. But once again my mother refused to listen to anyone. Once again she flew to the Jersey courts. In exactly eleven minutes her marriage was annulled. Legally then she

was free. But not emotionally. For years later when word came of my father's death she turned pale, and for days after that she spent much time

Sorrow, heartache, disillusionment
. . Women who are brave suffer all
these things and emerge from them greater and stronger. Mother became queen of comic opera. The Metropolitan sought her for grand opera. But she would have none of it. "I'd rather be a queen amongst fools," she said, "than a fool amongst queens."

SHE lived by the clock. She was bathed and dressed and ready for breakfast at eight o'clock. She planned all menus with her cook. Twice a all menus with her cook. Twice a week she herself went to Jefferson or Washington market. One hour every morning she worked out in her private gymnasium. And it was Jim Corbett, who ought to know, who said she used her punching-bag like a professional boxer. Luncheon, necessarily, was her social time, for she dined lightly at five o'clock in order to be in good voice at the theater. At noontime our table was laid with places for her four sisters and their children, all of whom lived near by. And everyone knew (Continued on Page 53)

THOMAS A.

The life of Thomas Edison is living proof that the American way is the right way

"The true test of civilization is not in the census, nor the size of cities, nor the crops—no, but in the kind of man the country produces."

—Ralph Waldo Emerson.

THIS quotation is used by M-G-M to set the keynote for "Edison, the Man," a sequel to "Young Tom Edison," which stars Spencer Tracy as Thomas Alva Edison.

Because the story of Edison—who rose from the humblest ranks to take an immortal place among the benefactors of mankind—serves as a constant inspiration to American youth and because his life is a living testimony that American civilization has met the test of producing worth-while men, Movre and Radio Guide not only chooses it as its picture of the week but gives the following brief biography to supplement the film "Edison, the Man," due in the nation's theaters soon.

Thomas Alva Edison was born of poor parents in Milan, Ohio, in 1847. His family moved to Port Huron, Mich., while he was still very young and at Port Huron, Edison received three months of schooling—all the formal education he ever had (this phase of his life will be remembered from "Young Tom Edison"). At eleven, he was a newsboy on a railroad line, later became a telegrapher and his early inventions were in the telegraphic field.

Moving to Menlo Park, N. J., in 1876, he invented the carbon telephone transmitter and then the phonograph. He did not make the first practical electric light. In all, he held more than 1,200 patents.

During World War I, Edison headed

patents.

During World War I, Edison headed the U. S. Navy Consulting Board, a body set up to utilize American resources in prosecuting the war.

Of particular interest to movie-goers is the fact that he invented a motion-picture machine in 1887 and, even then, dreamed of linking it to his phonograph in such a way as to produce talking pictures. Although not fully successful, in 1913 he did build a talking motion-picture machine which synchronized sound and pictures. synchronized sound and pictures.

SPENCER TRACY, who will be remembered for his portrayals of Major Rogers, Henry Stanley and Father Flanagan, has his most memorable role here as Edison, the Wizard of Menlo Park and an American immortal

Two Happy People

House of Two Gables, in which our Mr. Street visits the famous couple in their native habitat

In the first part of "Two Happy People," Mr. Street told of Carole Lombard. In the second part, he dealt with Clark Gable, her husband. Here, in the third part, Mr. Street goes to visit the Gables on their ranch in the San Fernando Valley.

HERE is no swimming-pool at the House of Two Gables.

And that means something in flamboyant Hollywood, where, to snatch a bit of Peglerese, many folks

have yachts so big that their lifeboats have lifeboats.

But Clark Gable, the crown prince of Graustark, and his wife, Carole Lombard, court jester of the realm, are trying to make a good job of earnest, simple living on a twentyacre farm at Encino, far enough from Hollywood to miss the smells but close enough to get to work when the whistle blows.

I was rather surprised to learn that the Gables had no swimming-pool. A private swimming-pool is as much a part of Hollywood existence as ballyhoo, bread and bourgeois. In the South, to judge your social status, they might ask you who your grandfather was. In the East, they might check you in Dun and Bradstreet. But in Hollywood, they'll ask about your swimming-pool. And if you expect to be a big frog, you've got to have a big pool.

And here two of the biggest names

in the movie industry didn't even have a footbath! It didn't make sense. Mr. Gable explained it. He was sitting over there in the corner of his livingroom, sort of half sprawled in a big chair. On a maple table near him were two good books, Phil Stong's "Horses and Americans" and "How Green Was My Valley." Mr. Gable was wearing his house-slippers. The big mule, mutt and musket man has tender feet. That doesn't mean he's a tenderfoot, but the bottoms of his feet are very sensitive and tight shoes are agony to him. I like that. There's something homey about a man whose dogs hurt him. After all, the Kid from Cadiz is a country boy. And when he gets home it is his prerogative to take off his shoes and wiggle his toes in his

slippers.
"Tell you about that swimming-pool business," he said. "Mrs. G. and I are going to put one in this summer, maybe. I'll show you where in a few minutes. If a couple moves into a place where everything is made to order, then they might soon get bored with it. Nothing to look forward to, you know. To enjoy a home a fellow has got to keep adding to it. So we are going to build our own pool; that is, supervise the building of it. And next year we're going to put in a ten-

SN'T it MAR-ve-lous!" Mrs. G., the firecracker girl, jumped from her chair as though she had been sitting on a tack. She sort of flitted across the room and bummed a match from her

husband, then went back to her chair and sat on her feet and gave her husband a chance to do the talking, which, after all, is something that any wife

should do every now and then.

The Gable farm — some call it a ranch, but it seems sort of silly to call a twenty-acre farm a ranch—is near Highway No. 101. There's a wall around the place, and when you drive up to the big gate you have to get out of your car and press a button and then whoop into a telephone. If you are admitted, a buzzer buzzes on the gate. It swings open. And lo! you are within the bounds of the House of Two Gables. The lane wanders up to the side of the house. There are beds of sweet peas and white pansies. Mrs. Gable often gets down on her glamorous knees and works her flowers.

A Buick station-wagon is parked near a live oak, hard by the side of the house. Mr. Gable's pet gun and his hunting-clothes are in the stationwagon. A dog runs out and barks at

you. A black cat races across the lawn. You get out and stretch and drink the heady air, which smells of oranges, sweet peas, black earth and good wood.

The size of the house surprises you. It is not a mansion. The house itself looks like a cross between New England and Tennessee. In New England they would call it a cottage, and in Tennessee they would call it just a house. It is made of stones and clapboard, primly white with gay yellow awnings.

Mrs. G. selected the awnings and somehow they remind one of Carole Lombard — fresh, gay and flapping. Mrs. G. is a humdinger at decorating a house. She's one of those rare persons who can take two bits' worth of chintz and a pair of scissors and make something that looks pretty. She dec-orated the interior of their home and the appointments are correct-simple and soothing. There is no clash of colors. Mrs. Gable realizes that colors play an important part in a person's life and that raucous colors can whip a man's emotions into an omelet. She is not the kind of lady who will have an orchid bathroom, or even a gaudy bathroom. If Clark Gable had to shave in an orchid bathroom he

probably would cut his own throat, and maybe hers, and any jury of men in the world would call it justifiable homicide.

The small rock porch of the house is bare, and Martin, the butler, an-swers the door. Martin is an institution there. He is colored and grinny, and he calls his employers "Mis'ah an' Mis' Gable." All of the Gables' servants are colored. They have only three -Martin, a cook and a houseman.

ONCE inside the house, I forgot that I was in California. This couldn't be southern California. Gaudy, gooey Hollywood couldn't be just over yon-der a bit. This was Connecticut! That beautiful old rubbed wood, that fat old fireplace, the blackened andirons, the poker, Cape Cod lighter, the brass vessels, well rubbed; and the smell of good books—yes, it was Connecticut, a bit of New England that strayed away and came to rest 'way out here where there are no snows.

Mrs. Gable has an airy, fuzzy rug on her living-room floor. It's a tan-nish, grayish color and the walls are simple and unburdened with knickknacks. The chairs are big and comfortable, sturdy; strong enough for a

big man to plop in and big enough for anybody to curl up in. A few books are scattered here and there. have been read, too, and are thumbworn. A hall connects the living-room with Mr. Gable's den, and a bathroom is just off the hall.

Mr. Gable's guns are in a case in his den. He goes in for shotguns, mostly, but he also has some good rifles and pistols. His fans send him many firearms, including some of those funny old things that are good for nothing except to collect dust. Many of these he gives to museums. There are several fine old prints in the room. In one corner is his backgammon table. He and his wife often battle for hours at the game and sometimes as much as thirty cents changes hands. They both are fair bridge players.

The Gables use the same office at

their home and the same secretary.

Just off the living-room and down two steps is the dining-room, with a long table, old high-back chairs and low-hanging lights. The fireplace is in this room. There are two small tables in the room and the Gables often eat breakfast on one of them. They eat their dinners at the big table. The bar (Continued on Page 54)





What Are My Rights?

"Those We Love," a popular serial drama, leaves the air abruptly. A loyal listener protests. Is she justified?

N MARCH 28 the radio serial "Those We Love" left the air. The decision to abandon a show so popular that it had just been voted second place in the serial-dramatic division of Movie and Radio Guide's Star of Stars Poll brought an avalanche of protesting letters down upon the heads of the sponsors, the National Broadcasting Company and to this publication. Listeners vigorously assailed the dropping of a show they had learned to love and to follow regularly.

But what are the listener's rights in radio programs? What voice does he continue others, and what rights should done his part and, after becoming tied he have? What are the sponsor's rights? What are the rights of the broadcaster? More important, what are the responsibilities of the three groups?

Letters which have poured across our desk from outraged listeners assert again and again that they have purchased the sponsor's product regularly. They assert, further, that the abandonment of the program is similar to a magazine, which has been running a gripping serial, announcing that it had determined to discontinue the story just as it had reached an interesting part. have in decisions to abandon shows. In short, the listener feels that he has

up in the involvements of the story, has been left high and dry.

The commercial sponsor may have seemingly good reasons for letting the show drop. Perhaps it has not sold the quantity of goods the sponsor felt was necessary to its continuance. But doesn't the sponsor who uses radio to make a profit owe a certain obligation to a public he has taught to listen to his show which transcends personal gain?

What are the network's obligations and rights? The network lives or dies by listener interest. Its obligation is directly to the listener, and if a program

like this is commercially unsuccessful, but highly popular, does it not become the network's duty to continue such a program on a sustaining basis?

This is not the first time programs have been summarily dropped from the air or so shifted about in time that listeners are greatly inconvenienced. But with such an excellent test program as "Those We Love" at hand, it is the editor's opinion that this is a good time to determine the rights and, more important, the obligations and responsibilities of all parties involved. Listeners are invited to write to the editor, giving their opinions of this situation.

The earlier Sibelius composed the "Pelloas and Melisande" suite, and causes wonderment (to those who know his symphonies) that he should have been attracted by such a febrile and altogether delicate subject as the drama by Maeterlinck. The music has moments of charm, but Debussy's opera is so much closer to the spirit of the author that Sibelius' purely symphonic version seems unconvincing and even inappropriate. He is much more at home in the sturdy creations he has made of Finnish sagas and tunes, folk and original. and original.

and original.

Henrietta Schumann does well to revive the ingratiating and ebullient Rubinstein measures. His D Minor Concerto is neglected unduly, for it still has much to offer in the way of gentle lyricism, dazzling passages, and keyboard passion in the flamboyant grand manner of the romantic period. Miss Schumann knows expertly how to handle that always exciting style of writing and performance.

Rubinstein's greatest pupil, Josef Hofmann, keeps the D Minor Concerto abidingly in his repertoire. Another eminent Rubinstein graduate is Josef Lhevinne, and he too brings the work to the platform occasionally.

Taylor's "Peter Ibbetson," easily the best American opera, here offers some of its most attractive moments in the Suite arrangement by the composer. Herrmann, still flushed with the recent triumph of his "Moby Dick" cantata at its premiere with the New York Philharmonic, registers with lighter moods in the short examples on today's program.

The Schuman symphony is from the pen of a young New Yorker not yet thirty years old, whose "Overture" made a highly agreeable impression when it had its first hearing at Carnegie Hall a few months ago.

Good Will With Music

By Leonard Liebling

N THE western hemisphere these are days of good-willing between our country and South America, brought about, of course, somewhat by war conditions in Europe and a desire for mutual defense against non-democratic aggressor nations which stand as a very tangible threat to our

It has been found that music is a powerful ethical medium for establishing good will, and, as radio listeners know, the past few seasons brought many interchanged broadcasts of concerts and operas between our part of the world and South America.

President Roosevelt and his cabinet organized a special committee for cementing closer musical relations with our Latin-American neighbors, and as I have the honor to be one of its members, I can attest to the deep interest and warm sincerity of everyone connected with the undertaking. Its working will bring many highly important musical programs to the air this summer and next season.

The first significant step on a large scale was the Leopold Stokowski idea to take an American Youth Orchestra on a tour of South American cities. Then followed the announcement of a similar project organized by NBC and its symphony orchestra under Toscanini. The two plans met with instant enthusiastic response from the South American lands, and many appearances were guaranteed by them to help meet the immense transportation and salary costs of the two trips.

Nothing is known up to now in detail as to the programs to be presented by Toscanini and Stokowski, and as the pair are in a measure placed in artistic rivalry, much speculation is rife in musical circles as to the repertoire they will offer at their concerts.

FOR instance, thought arises, and is being discussed, concerning the proportion of our own music to be performed by the two maestros. How much of it is in prospect-if any-and which compositions may be scheduled?

When I say "if any," I have Toscanini chiefly in mind, for when he made his famous European tour at the head of the New York Philharmonic Orchestra in 1930-goodness, how time flies!-he

listed not one single work by an American. Since then the peerless one has seen the light a bit more, and his NBC activities programmed several symphonic examples from the pens of our native creators.

Part of the purpose of the intended tours to South America surely is to show its audiences what we are achieving musically in the United States, and the picture seems incomplete without letting them hear a goodly representation of our composing activities. Certainly when foreign conductors come here they invariably offer music of their own countries, so turn about seems only fair play. We have had some Mexican and South American baton visitors of recent seasons, and through them we made acquaintance with excellent symphonic scores from "South of the Border." A school of fine composers is flourishing there as vitally as our own in this country.

WITH all due respect to the great European classic and romantic works, would not the South Americans logically be interested to learn what we are producing musically besides our jazz and swing, just as we have now learned that they also function musically too outside of the familiar tangos, rumbas and paso doble?

Let us see what Messrs. Toscanini and Stokowski intend to do.

THE LAST OF THE TROUBADOURS. The Life and Music of Carl Michael Bellman (1740-1795). By Hendrik Willem van Loon and Grace Castagnetta. Simon and Schuster. \$2.50.

One of the most delightful of the series of books on folk-music of various countries by Hendrik van Loon and Grace Castagnetta is this one on Sweden's greatest troubadour. Carl Michael Bellman, an obscure government official in the eighteenth century, was beloved by all Sweden for his verses and tunes. He wrote most of them in taverns with gay companions, accompanying himself on the lute, which, because of his example, is still expertly and extensively played in Sweden. The king, Gustavus Adolphus, became his patron, and Bellman flourished until the king was murdered. His songs, fortunately, were taken down by various people and have come down to us in the form of a great Swedish tradition. When Swedish people get together at a festive gathering, they don't sing "Sweet Adeline" or "The Sidewalks of New York" but they immediately go into one of Bellman's ballads. They always know all the words and frown on anyone who sings one wrong note. Much of the music is derived from Moart, Pergolesi and even Bach.

Grace Castagnetta has made easy, fluent and completely charming piano transcriptions of the songs and of course Hendrik van Loon illustrates them with his inimitable drawings. Besides he prefaces the book with an amusing account of Bellman's life, in which, incidentally, he includes a goodsized slice of Swedish history which makes highly interesting reading in view of the present international situa-

The next time you have a party, and get sick of singing the same old songs, remember old Bellman, he'll give you a lot of pleasure.

Musician of the Week

Henrietta Schumann

TOS" would be a good name for her. She has over a hundred in her repertoire and on the Sunday Music Hall broadcasts has played over fifty-six since she started in 1934. However, concertos aren't Henrietta Schumann's only stock in trade. She has a repertoire of over a thousand pieces and is ready at the shortest notice to play them any time. And she looks as though she just came out of school a few years ago-which she did!

Born in South Russia of German ancestry, Henrietta Schumann came to America in 1925, just after the great anyone she meets whom she thinks she's going to like. Her voice, free from any Russian accent, is low and pleasant and she talks rather lazily. She has a funny little chuckle which she uses frequently, except when she's down in one of those Russian "Ah, what's the use of anything!" spells. Her husband leaves her severely alone to get over them. He knows that probably the next minute she'll be beaming with pleasure at something or other.

She has a passion for staying up until all hours of the night, but not in night spots. She prefers her own home or that of friends, or a small restaurant

famine in Russia. Her father, a professor of piano, decided that conditions were so bad in Russia that his children weren't getting a proper general nor musical education. So he moved to America and settled in Syracuse. Henrietta, who had been studying the piano since the age of two and had appeared publicly since the age of eight, was entered in the Eastman School of Music and graduated with top honors two years later.

When she made her New York debut, the critics sat up and took notice. Here was a woman pianist who played with the power and authority of a man, whose technique was startling and whose poise and confidence were that of a veteran. They unanimously prophesied a brilliant future for her.

Omnivorous in her desire to learn, Henrietta studied indefatigably, exploring new and unfamiliar compositions, building up a solid and truly staggering repertoire. When she appeared on NBC for three years once a week, she never repeated a piece.

Tall, with a round, high-cheeked face, big eyes, small round nose and a wide friendly mouth, Henrietta's chief trait is her complete unselfconsciousness and her immediate friendliness with

where they're not particular what time they'll close down. Her reading tastes are widely varied, while her husband prefers Shakespeare and the Bible, which gives them a pretty good literary coverage. He also is one of the best dancers going and his tango is something to write home about.

Naturally Henrietta's apartment overflows with music, and up to a short time ago resembled the back room of a music store. But then she married, of all things, a neat, orderly and efficient American from Philadelphia who took things firmly in hand. Now all the music is stacked neatly in rows, with an impressive index and key to the index which puts any office system to shame, it's so simple to use. Henrietta blinks a little at the change, but finds the whole arrangement very handy. Now if her husband can just convince her to put the right music in the right place when she's through using it, the chances are that he and Henrietta will celebrate their golden Henrietta will wedding anniversary.



Programs from foreign countries

SHORT-WAVE PROGRAMS BEAMED ON NORTH AMERICA

BEFORE the advent of "beamed" or "directive" transmissions, short-wave reception was more or less a haphazard affair, and there was no way of knowing with any degree of certainty that a particular program heard one day would be heard the next day.

Omnidirectional broadcasts are radiated with an equal intensity in all directions and therefore only a small portion of the total signal-strength can be received at any one point. In directional or beam broadcasting all of the signal-strength is concentrated in a single direction. like the beam from a searchlight, and therefore those listeners whose receiving aerials are in the path of this beam will receive tremendously amplified signals. This advantage is particularly apparent on a day of poor reception, when you probably will fail to receive any foreign programs except those specifically beamed on this country. Using the same transmitter and the same power but by merely switching from an aerial pointed away from you to one pointed toward you will often mean the difference between receiving a perfectly intelligible broadcast or receiving nothing at all.

The locality in which a certain broadcast is to be received is regulated not only by the direction in which it is beamed but also by the angle at which it is transmitted. For example, a broadcast from Ber-lin may be well received in eastern North America but heard only poorly or not at all in western North America, since to insure reception on the Pacific Coast both direction and angle of the beam must be changed slightly. In the following table listeners will find a simple guide to the leading short-wave

Candidate Gracie Allen invites you to con presidential issues from the screwball point of view

COUPLE of months ago Gracie Allen was just the feminine half of the Burns and Allen radio team, pioneer radio comics with a large following. This week Gracie will be the official nominee of the "Surprise Party," which holds its first national convention in Omaha unless some smart Aleck throws a monkeywrench into her smooth-functioning political organization. A few months hence — say, next November — Gracie may be the first woman ever to be-come President of these United States to hear her tell it.

If Gracie, rising from the depths of something-or-other to the heights of something-else-again, does manage to nose out both the Democratic and Republican nominees for the presidency come November, then the saga of her rise will be the sort of saga which can be written only here in America. Whether it will necessarily prove that the American way is the best waywell, we'll leave that to you.

We are able to positively assert that Gracie will be the Surprise Party's nominee at its convention on May 17 because the indomitable Gracie has permitted no other candidate to so much as drop an ostrich feather into her own private campaign ring, much less a hat. In fact, the twenty-five thousand delegates who will east their ballots in the Surprise Party Convention in Creighton University Stadium on May 17 are not only instructed to vote for Gracie but wee betide them if a dissenting voice is heard. That goes for hubby George Burns,

too.

If anyone has the idea that Gracie is not taking her campaign seriously, they have but to follow her through the minutiae of a campaign which has rapidly spread to the four corners of the land. Gracie is doing everything that the other candidates do and have done in years gone past-kissing babies, making speeches, making promises-and has added a few wrinkles of her own to boot. In the matter of kiss-ing babies, for example, she is happy to plant a smack on the brow of all girl babies, but when it comes to men babies, Gracie is waiting until they

"I will make no fireside chats from the White House between April 15 and October 15," Gracie promises voters and radio fans, "It is asking too much and I don't know how President Roose-velt stands it. Washington is awfully hot in summer, and to make the President stay at the fireside after April or May seems a crime."

WHICH just goes to show that Gracie's approach to matters political is entirely new and wholly re-freshing. Walter Winchell was led to remark that the only flaw in her political armament is the fact that her campaign speeches and promises are not half so funny as those of the Republican and Democratic seekers after the same honor.

"If you get to be President, will you let George Burns write for the papers?" we asked Miss Allen.

"Don't be silly," she retorted, irked.
"He won't have to write for them.

We'll just call up and have them delivered.

We felt it was time to get down to serious matters involving her candidacy and leave personalities out of it. "How do you think you and the

Senate will get along, Miss Allen?"

"Well, I've always admired his brother, Mack Sennett, and I don't know why we should have any trouble."

Miss Allen has been giving her attention of late to a study of foreign affairs in view of the grave problems involved in a Europe at war, so our next question concerned the Neutrality Bill. "If we owe it, let's pay it" was her illuminating view on this touchy business. Miss Allen is particularly concerned about the Dies Committee. She is heartily in favor of continuing its work. "If we didn't keep the Dies Committee going, who'd color our Easter eggs?"

SHE had us there, so we turned the subject to the matter of the national debt. Every candidate talks about the national debt, the Republicans deplor-ing it, the Democrats explaining it. But not Miss Allen. Miss Allen is downright proud of our national debt. "It's the biggest in the world, isn't it?"

We were beginning to get a slight idea of why Gracie has become such an important national figure-a threat, if you'll take a liberal definition of the word, to all other candidacies for President in 1940. And make no mistake about it, Gracie is a threat. In St. Louis last month, she received one write-in vote for the presidency although her name wasn't on the ballot. The same thing happened in Chicago. In Menominee, Mich., voters—a bit confused about what Gracie was running for, elected her mayor. Later the city fathers disqualified her because she wasn't a resident of Menominee. "See what I missed," Gracie said. "But then, a person can't live every-

Troop 11, Boy Scouts of America, Mankato, Minn., writes to ask: "What can we do to help your campaign?" Down in Beaumont, Tex., Miss Allen will share the speakers' platform at a Democrats convention Elliott Roosevelt and Vice President Garner. ("He's another candidate," Gracie said disparagingly.) In Salem, Oregon, the Oregon Republican, a newspaper "for Republicans of Oregon," invites Miss Allen to use its columns in disseminating her platform. You see, party lines are crumbling before her, and in every part of the land millions — well, thousands — anyway hundreds of voters are getting on her bandwagon.

Meanwhile, Gracie's campaign goes on apace. At the moment, she is busy preparing her keynote address for the national convention in Omaha. Omaha, incidentally, is rolling out the barrel for Gracie, and plump mayor Dan Kelly promises the Allen delegates that the lid will be off May 14-18, period of the convention. The convention, in-cidentally, coincides with Omaha's Golden Spike Days, a celebration commemorating the completion of the first transcontinental, railroad, the Union Pacific. This accounts for the fact that Omaha citizens will turn out to greet Gracie and political machine in beards and old-fashioned dresses and for the fact that business establishments in Omaha will wear false fronts reminis-cent of the old days.

At first, Gracie was rather insulted when she heard about this. "It's like saying grass will grow in the streets of American cities if I'm elected," she insisted to her brother-in-law, who is

sand heavily bearded citizens will parade through downtown Omaha with the only light coming from electric torches hidden in their beards.

Whether she is elected or not, Gracie is convinced that the Surprise Party is no flash in the pan but a live and potent political group which will make its effects felt for years to come. Well, at least for weeks. To this end, Gracie has busied herself with togging up the party in regular trappings, including a party song, a party slogan and a party symbol.

The party song, given largely to urging voters to cast their ballots for Gracie, ends with the lines:

". . . So, vote for Gracie, Keep voting all day long!"

The Democrats have a donkey as their symbol, the Republicans, an elephant. Gracie isn't content with any-thing so commonplace. The Surprise Party has adopted the kangaroo as its symbol—or, to be more exact, two kangaroos. There is a mother kangaroo and, in the mother's pouch, a baby kangaroo. "That ties in so well with

our slogan," Miss Allen explained. The slogan: "It's in the bag!"

The Surprise Party was born at a luncheon in Hollywood—the Brown Derby was the exact site, for the enlightenment of future historians—late in February. Not even Gracie, who announced its formation that day, had any idea where it would lead. In fact, she doesn't yet know where it will lead, although she's fervently hoping the end of the trail will be No. 1600 Pennsylvania Ave., Washington, D. C.

II F THE voters of America see fit to elect someone other than me to the presidency," Gracie said on the eve of the convention, "then it won't be my fault—" And it won't, either. "They'll have only themselves to blame for

"It's almost like the President's train," Gracie enthusiastically burbles. Her campaign tour will compare fa-vorably with any yet made by a presi-dential candidate. First stop will be in Las Vegas, Nevada, where Gracie will address the citizens on behalf of her campaign from the steps of the city hall. Next day, in Salt Lake City, Allen supporters will stage a gigantic parade and old-fashioned political rally for her; in Denver, she will speak at a huge luncheon; in North Platte, she will be guest of honor at a political soirce. At some thirty other stops, Miss Allen will address crowds from

the rear of her train.

ESPITE all the swing kings, champions et al. who have risen to the fore in the last four years, there remains but one King of Swing Benny Goodman. When the rest of bandom scoffed at swing as not being commercial enough for the mass American public, it was Benny who stuck to his guns and, after several years of headaches and heartaches, finally put his music over. From the time his brand of exciting rhythm and jazz improvisation first clicked at Los Angeles' Palomar in the spring of 1935 and on the "Let's Dance" program over NBC the "Let's Dance" program over NBC the same year, jitterbugs, musicians and even some longhairs flocked to the Goodman swing standard. Currently airing over NBC from Los Angeles' Cocoanut Grove and recording for Columbia, the King's band is as great as it ever was—despite the graduation of Gene Krupa, Harry James, Bunny Berigan, Teddy Wilson and Bud Freeman. His original quartet has grown up to be a sextet, including drummer Nick Fatool, Greenwich, Conn.; bassist Arthur Bernstein, New York City; vibraphonist Lionel Hampton, Louis-ville, Ky.; electric-guitarist Charles ville, Ky.; electric-guitarist Charles Christian, Oklahoma City, Okla.; pian-ist John Guarnieri, New York City, and Goodman, Chicago, Ill., on clarinet. The group is at its best in its Columbia waxing of "Gone With What Wind." The remainder of the band lines up: Clarence Basey, Detroit, Mich., Toots Mondello, Boston, Les Robinson, Chi-cago, Jerry Jerome, Plainfield, N. Dance-orchestra popularity comes and goes like the wind. As personalities and styles vary from year to year, the leading ten in the Star of Stars band division also vary. But none of the newer lights have been able yet to challenge those old favorites, Wayne King and Guy Lombardo. It's true again this year. The contenders include currently popular Horace Heidt, Orrin Tucker, Glenn Miller. Kate Smith is still radio's favorite songbird, with

Kate Smith is still radio's favorite songbird, with Nancy Martin coming up with her fellow Breakfast Clubbers to win second honors. Bonnie Baker's popularity was expected and well deserved; Dotty Lamour's lapse proves how soon listeners forget.

A look at "The Lone Ranger's" signal victory in the Children's Program division, with a group of P. T. A.-approved sustaining shows pressing for second honors, would seem to indicate that parents have voted their favorite juvenile show into first place, then gone on to vote for what they think children should hear. "Information, Please," as an amusing means to a liberal education, won the Educational Program division. Don McNeill rounded out one of the most spectacular showings of the whole Star of Stars Poll, winning the Best Master of Ceremonies division as well as Best Variety Program and Favorite Program for his "Breakfast Club." And now, we leave listeners to make the many other interesting observations which can be made from this 1940 roster of radio's great.





don't take a cut. Ask for a raise, You'll get it. I promise!"

Lederer came to Mother. "Dressler's through," he announced. "I told her she'd have to take a cut and she de-

manded a raise!"

"She's awfully funny," Mother told him. "And I have no intention of carrying the show alone, even if I could. And, George, my contract requires my approval of the members of my supporting cast, you know."

MY MOTHER'S income grew to be five thousand dollars a week, an unparalleled salary at that time. And it represented a financial responsibility of which she was mindful. Carefully she listened to the bankers and industrialists who were her friends. Slowly she learned to discipline herself about money, to resist the temptation to speculate or to make parasites of relatives and friends. Her charities, however, were numerous and in the hospitals there were many beds which she endowed.

In time, she came to love another man as she once had loved my father. wealthy was the tremendously Jesse Lewishon. And while they waited for his health to improve so they might be married, he showered her with luxuries beyond the dreams of most women. He gave her jewels famous among the jewelers of the world for their color and fire. He gave her horses that caused men on the boulevards, connoisseurs of horseflesh, to turn and marvel. He gave her a house at Lawrence, Long Island, and throughout the summer season the twenty-odd guest rooms were filled with their mutual friends. And he seldom gave my mother a present without giving me a present too, just as wonderful in its way.

Had Jesse Lewishon been a well man my mother might have had happiness during the years they had together. But worry about his health and sympathy for his pain always stood in the way of complete joy. Many mornings when I came downstairs for breakfast I found my mother already had left for Sherry's, where

he had had an attack in the night. For in spite of all his wealth, he could not pay anyone to nurse him as Mother

She adored him. And by every sign he adored her too. Which makes what I have to tell you next inex-plicable. While my mother was on what was to be her last tour—it having been decided they would marry upon her return—Jesse Lewishon ran away with another woman, a woman named Edna McCauley, who had been Diamond Jim Brady's girl.

When Mother came off the train there were the usual clamoring crowds waiting for her. And while she bowed, gracious as a queen, and smiled, beautiful as a goddess, her eyes searched for him. For the first time in years for often he had gone to meet her when he should have been in bedhe was not there. I think she must have known then.

Surely when she reached home she knew. For this time the florist shops had not been emptied so her house would be filled. No orchid plants lined the stairway. No American Beauties, the color of glory, spilled out of silver urns. No bowls of daffodils and tulips and lilacs and snapdragons turned the drawing-room into a spring garden. In the whole house there was only one bowl of flowers to greet her, a tiny bowl of lilies of the valley on her bedside table-from me.

It was Diamond Jim Brady, Mother's good friend, and one of the kindest men who ever walked this earth, who telephoned her and told her what had happened.

"You" Jesse and my Edna, Nell," he said. "They've run off together. Have dinner with me tonight. We'll talk it That will make both of us feel better."

The next day Mother said: "Daute, I think we need to go shopping in Paris." That was all. But I knew then and in the years that followed that it hadn't been as simple for her as all that. The unhappiness she would not voice lived in her eyes. You can see it, even in her last photographs.

It wasn't long after this, in 1912, when my mother was fifty-one, that she married Alex Moore, an ambitious and brilliant man who was editor of the Pittsburgh Leader (not owner, as she always believed) and campaign manager for Theodore Roosevelt.

Diamond Jim Brady begged her not

"Marry me, Nell," he said, "and re-tire. It's time. We've always been good friends. I'll give you a million dollars. With no strings to it. You can make it right over to Daute if you want to." (He knew that above everything else

Mother wanted to insure my future.) But Mother shook her head. "It wouldn't work, Jim. You and I would understand. But the public wouldn't."

She was a woman wise and kind and good, Miss Faye. I'll never forget that Christmas Eve when I was ill with pneumonia. In the evening, just about dinner-time, my physician telephoned Mother that my fever was rising, that he was afraid the flag was up.

I still can see her as she came through the door, wonderfully beautiful in her dinner gown of blue, brocaded in silver, the miniature of mewhich she never went without-fastened at her shoulder. She pulled a chair close to my bed. Her hand reached for mine. I vaguely remem-ber a nurse saying, "Can't I bring you a tray, Mrs. Moore?" The next thing I knew the indistinct gray light of early

morning filled the room. It was Christmas. And my beautiful mother was still at my bedside with her hand on mine.

And there was that time the surgeons told us my foot, badly broken in a fall from a window, must come off. She thought then only of how she might give me courage. Sarah Bernhardt, my idol, was playing in Pittsburgh. So my mother went to the hotel where the famous French actress was staying to tell Sarah Bernhardt, who carried on although she had lost a leg, what was ahead of us and to ask for some message that might fortify me.

She came back the next morning with a photograph on which Sarah Bernhardt had inscribed, "What is the loss of a foot when you have God's greatest gift-the mind . .

It gave me, as she knew it would, the courage I needed. It does still!

Over a period of years at this time my mother had campaigned for the Republican party. And, aware of how valuable her services had been, the party was anxious to show apprecia-

"Miss Russell," President Harding said one day when she and Alex Moore were visitors at the White House, "we want to do something for you, somewould you like to go to as ambassa-

"I've never been to China," my mother said quietly, well pleased. should dearly love to go there.

There was no embassy in China, only a legation. But they would create an embassy for her. She had, in truth, kept the promise she had made herself as a young girl. She had elevated her profession. For she had come to be the respected and admired friend of presidents and kings.

Until a Chinese embassy could be established they made my mother inspector of immigration abroad she might acquaint herself with dip-

She did great things in Europe. She exposed the doctors who supplied unhealthy peasants with a clean bill of health after taking their last dollar from them, thus costing the United States the hundreds of thousands of dollars spent eventually in sending these same peasants back home. she campaigned, tirelessly but without success, for a bill that proposed our ports be closed to immigration for a period of five years so there would be jobs enough and to spare for the men who came home fit from the World War and later for those who came home unfit when they should be rehabilitated.

N 1922 my mother died. She was buried with the full military honors accorded a colonel, honors which I think no other woman ever has re-The epitaph on her mausoleum is, I think, a simple truth. "The world is better," read the letters carved in read the letters carved in stone, "for her having lived."
That was my mother, Miss Faye.

She isn't famous because she was a great patriot, a wonderful mother, a glorious woman. I know that. famous because she was an international beauty and the toast of her time. But I wanted to write and tell you about her as I knew her because I thought it would help you, even when you're portraying her in glamorous and worldly and gilded moments, if you knew her great heart.

And now good night . . . and God's blessing on you . . .

is to one side of the dining-room and there is an ample supply of drinks available, mostly Scotches and brandies. Gable is not a drinker, but he likes a cocktail once in a while. He keeps Mexican beer and serves it in German mugs. The walls of the dining-room and bar are decorated with prints of horses.

I didn't go upstairs. I wasn't asked up, and I am glad. The Gables are too well mannered to show their bedrooms to strangers. Their house is not a museum and they refuse to have it treated as such. However, there are only two bedrooms in the house—a bald hint that there's no room for guests.

They bought the place from Raoul Walsh and did it over. They worked on the place before they were married and have just about got it like they want it. Amazingly enough, their investment is only about fifty thousand dollars. They are two of the best money-makers in movies, but they live on a fifty-thousand-dollar farm.

One of their prize possessions is a grandfather's clock, and it's Mr. Gable's job to keep it wound. He vows he could fix it if it broke. He is very proud of the fact that he's good with his hands and his workshop is one of his favorite hangouts. It is off to the side of the house and is equipped with good tools. You can tell the way the man grips a hammer and the way he fondles a saw that he appreciates good tools. The barn is near the workshop, and yellow hay pokes out of the loft. The stables are hard by the barn, and there is the palace of Judy the mule, one of my favorite characters in Hollywood. Old Judy just stands there, flapping his ears to chase the flies away and not at all impressed that he is in the service of the crown prince of Graustark. Mr. Gable understands his mule and the mule understands him, which, to my mind, is the best compliment I can pay the crown prince. You can't fool a mule. Mr. Gable can loop a collar around Judy, hook the traces to a harrow and get on down a furrow. It was quite a sight to see Clark Gable-alias Rhett Butler, Mr. Christian, et al.-following the north end of a south-bound mule, sweat pouring down his face, his muscles rippling under his shirt and cussing old Judy as only a mule-skinner can-tender, crooning cusses, the only kind of language that any good mule understands.

SQUIRE GABLE does three-fourths of his own plowing. He uses a tractor most of the time, but when he's got some downright serious plowing to do he uses old Judy. He and his wife both have saddle-horses, but old Judy snoots them.

They work only one hand on the farm, a fellow named Fred, whose wife, incidentally, has a new baby. The Gables often go to see Fred and play with the baby.

They raise truck on their farm, and some hav.

Mr. Gable does most of his work on his place over week-ends, but he usually knocks off at the studio in time to get in a few licks of work at his house. They have two cows and a calf.

There are eight hundred trees on the place, including some magnificent old oaks and pepper trees. They have fifty orange trees. He recently joined a marketing agency, and one day the co-op sent out its men to harvest Mr. Gable's orange crop. They picked, graded and packed the fruit and Mr. Gable realized a dollar and twenty cents on his crop!

The chicken-yard belongs to Mrs. Gable. She has a flock of one hundred New Hampshire Reds, and chicken-runs are all nicely wired and partitioned. Mrs. Gable knows her chickens. She keeps them separated and gets a maximum production of eggs. Early every morning, while the crown prince and jester are sleeping, a light goes on in the henhouse and the Reds go to work. She often gathers the eggs herself, sells them for top prices and keeps her own records. Just for the information of folks who love chickshe uses a laying-mash and a scratch feed. Each flock has a little fountain of bubbling water. The farmer's wife believes that good water is the secret of healthy chickens.

SHE will talk your ears off about chickens and she knows her stuff. In fact, she'd rather talk about chickens than movies. She also has ducks and gresse and pheasants.

"I like game birds to eat," she said.
"Even game chickens are good to eat."

She is quite proud of her selection of a gift for Margaret Mitchell, who did "Gone With the Wind"—unquestionably her husband's greatest picture. She knew Miss Mitchell (Mrs. John Marsh) is not the kind of person to whom you send an ordinary gift. So when she and her husband returned from Atlanta, where they met Mr. and Mrs. Marsh, Mrs. Gable sent four fat chickens to Mrs. Marsh. Of course, sending chickens from California to Georgia is something like sending coal to Newcastle. But anyway, it was an original idea. Mrs. Gable is full of them.

The Gables raise most of their food, excepting their meat, of course. But all of their fruits, vegetables, fowl and milk comes from their place. They roast their fowls and seldom fry them, for they believe it is a waste to fry chickens. After all, if you'll feed a fryer a little while longer you can get a good roasting chicken—and more meat.

That's a good insight into the Gables. They are thrifty folks. They are not stingy, but they watch their finances. Gable has a seven-year contract calling for two million dollars, and Miss Lombard, a free-lance, gets plenty when she works. But the government bites out a hunk of their income.

Mr. Gable stands all household expenses and they operate on a small budget.

"As a matter of fact, we have no budget at all," said Mrs. Gable. "I can't make them work. We don't spend any more than we have to, and that's that"

They are soaking their profits away in annuities and bonds.

"The day I have enough money to assure me an annual income of ten thousand dollars for life, I'm going to knock off," said Mr. Gable.

He pointed to beyond an old live oak where his land leveled off to a spot flanked by orange trees and a vegetable patch.

"That's where we're going to build the pool."

"Isn't it MAR-ve-lous!" echoed Mrs. Gable gleefully.


