YOU must see "Our Town." Everybody should see it. Somehow, your editor missed getting around to it until this week. Belatedly, but no less enthusiastically, we are tossing our hat in the air and turning cartwheels of appreciation. "Our Town" is a great picture. Perhaps it is the greatest ever made. We don't know who decides things like that, but we do know that no photoplay we ever saw reached down into our hearts as deeply and as poignantly as this one. In this business of editing a publication, the highest obligation, according to our lights, is to give pleasure to one's readers. We accept that obligation. We urge all who have not seen "Our Town" to see it. No use beating around the bush, we think this picture will provide every sensible person with his greatest emotional experience in a theater. When the genius of men puts such works as this on the screen, there is no greater entertainment.

Then we prefer being undignified and off balance. We prefer sincere and honest enthusiasm to frigid intellectualism because we believe that every person who sees "Our Town" because of this suggestion will sit down and write us a "Thank you" note.

To Sol Lesser, who produced it; to Sam Wood, who directed it; to Thornton Wilder, who wrote the original stage play; to Mr. Wilder and Frank Craven and Harry Chandler, who wrote the screen play; to William Holden, Martha Scott, Fay Bainter, Beulah Bondi, Thomas Mitchell, Guy Kibbee, Stuart Erwin and all who contributed, this editor gives thanks for an unforgettable evening.

Alice IN HOLLYWOODLAND

A girl reporter's adventures in Hollywood's social whirl!

THERE probably isn't an honest-to-goodness movie fan who hasn't said at least once, "If only I could get to Hollywood and see the stars in person."

Five years ago I said it. I was working as a reporter, columnist, proof-reader and desk-duster for my father's weekly newspaper, the *Journal and Republican*, published in Lowville, New York (pop. 3,000). My father received passes for the two little movie theaters in town, and between them I managed to see a picture a night.

I had kept a scrapbook of Garbo for ten years, plastered my bedroom walls with star photos, worn a prize-winning black-felt hat that I fondly believed had once graced the head of Ginger Rogers, and read and believed positively every word I could find about Hollywood.

Thousands dream about going to Hollywood. I went.

I wangled a job on a local paper, which necessitated my going to the movie studios every day and to the usual society events to which a film reporter might be bid. After the excitement of actually seeing Ronald Colman kissing Madeleine Carroll and walking as coolly off the set as though nothing had happened had worn off slightly, my curiosity awakened.

On my rounds I kept hearing exciting snatches of talk about the night Hedy Lamarr played the drums at Cary Grant's beach-house party, and the moonlight musicales at Anatole Litvak's. I asked a few of the old-time columnists why one couldn't see the stars at play in their own homes or at private parties in hired hotel ballrooms. I was sick of seeing them on "dress parade."

The difficulties were explained to me. There are over three hundred writers for the press in Hollywood. Obviously a star can't invite them all to a barbecue for twenty of her friends. Obviously, too, if the star invites but one member of the press, some of the others will have a few pointed words to say in print about the incident. All the other columnists, with the exception of Louella Parsons, who had worked out her own deal long before, were content to go to studio or press-agent parties and leave the others alone.

Not me. If the stars couldn't invite me to their parties, I could crash 'em.

The day after I made up my mind to make my dream come true or else, Marion Davies issued invitations to a circus party at her Santa Monica estate. It was to celebrate William Randolph Hearst's seventy-fourth birthday, and all of the most famous stars were to be there. This would be the party to crash. I made a few cautious inquiries and learned the worst. No one had ever crashed a Davies party. There were cannons on the sea-wall and squads of police guarding all gates. Everyone to whom I broached the subject laughed.

THE night of the party I put on a plain black dress, coat and hat and drove to Marion's beach-house, bolstering my courage by telling myself that there wasn't any harm in just looking over the possibilities of getting in. The police very chummily let me park in the garage while I allegedly waited with a beating heart for a mythical man from Warners' studio who was supposed to "take care of me." I sat for one hour wondering how in Hollywood I was going to get inside the circus tent that had been put up beside the house. To make things increasingly tense, one of the state policemen dragged a sobbing young blonde in a maid's uniform to a police car and took her away. She had tried to crash as a servant.

Some studio people came along. I didn't know them, but they had seen me on the Warner sets. They thought I worked at Warners, bless their hearts, and I waltzed right into the tent with them. They told the gatekeeper I was "all right."

Once in the tent I melted away from my "friends," and with a sinking heart discovered that it would be two hours before the guests would arrive.

So, although I was inside, I might be thrown out any minute—before anyone arrived. I began a nightmarish effort to avoid detection that I still would rather not think much about. The tent, furnished exactly like a circus, with sideshows and concessions, was crawling with people, but it didn't take long to realize that every one of them had a right to be there—and I was as conspicuous as a fly in the proverbial soup!

My first thought was to hide out in the ladies' room. I found it about the same time two girls from the orchestra who were to sing that night came in to change their clothes. It was too dangerous to stay there and chatter, although I did say that I was singing, too. They accepted the statement without a tremor, and I got an idea.

I went back to the tent, stowed my hat and coat away under the grand

no right to be here. I've been told to ask you to leave."

Well, three o'clock in the morning was fair enough, although the party was just getting interesting. I said meekly I'd go. But I had to pass Mr. Hearst's table on the way. And there he sat in a red-and-gold ringmaster's outfit. Suddenly I didn't want to go home. I went right over to Mr. Hearst and all in a breath I bleated: "I crashed your party and someone has asked me to leave, but I'm having an awfully good time and I don't want to go."

"You don't have to go, young lady," said the Lord of San Simeon. "Why don't you sit down right here and have a glass of champagne?" So I sat down, and while I was drinking my champagne Norma Shearer decided to go home and said good night to me as though I were one of the Hearst family. Since we'd never been introduced, I wouldn't have missed that little bit of insight into the social rules of Hollywood for anything.

My staying would have been a secret between Mr. Hearst and me if I hadn't worried about that clown. I was sure the tent was full of clowns just waiting to rush me to the street. I wandered about and worried and worried, and I told Walter Winchell all my troubles. Walter took my hand and we went to Mr. Hearst and through the whole thing again. Only this time I had a witness, Walter had a story (which he printed and aired) and that story won for me a by-line on my column. The next day I awoke to find myself infamous, and for months after

piano on one of the two orchestra-stands, and looked around to see if I couldn't make myself useful.

I buttered corn for the popcorn man; sat for test photos in the dime-photo booth, struck up an acquaintance with a bass-viol player (carefully keeping the viol between me and prying eyes).

Although several people looked at me suspiciously, everyone thought I was with another concession. The guests finally began to arrive and I was safe. But like Cinderella, my hour came. Only the hour was three a.m., not midnight. A clown, still masked, snagged my arm. "You know you've

I was pointed out as the girl who crashed the Hearst party. I was on my way to bring my dreams into the difficult realm of reality.

During the four years of my popping up in places I had no right to be, I've arrived at showers without presents, at costume parties with no costume, at \$50-a-plate dinners without a dime. And always I have been without an escort. You know that old proverb, "He travels fastest who travels alone." It works. But there have been times when I was left so alone that there was no one to talk to but the waiter with the fizz-water.

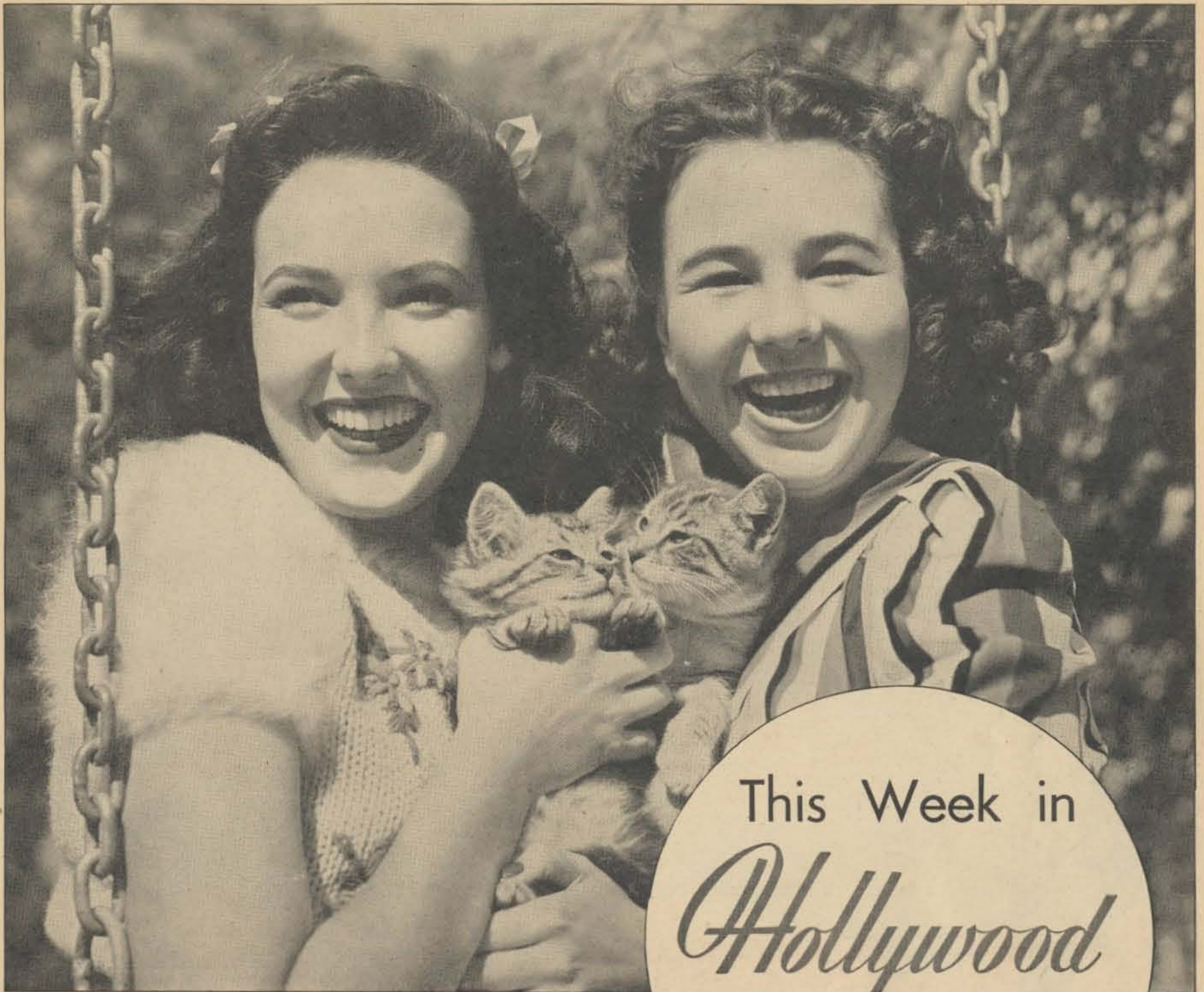

LORETTA YOUNG and TOM LEWIS are being congratulated on their marriage, which took place Wednesday, July 31, at the Church of St. Paul, Westwood Village, Rev. Francis G. Quinan officiating. The bride, 27, one of filmdom's most popular bachelor girls, long starred by 20th Century-Fox and now free-lancing, was last seen in the Columbia comedy "The Doctor Takes a Wife." Never-wed Tom Lewis, 38, advertising-agency radio-producer, met and fell in love with Loretta eighteen months ago while producing the "Screen Guild Theater" broadcasts, on one of which she appeared. Plans: They will honeymoon in Mexico City, dwell in Beverly Hills. Mrs. Lewis will continue her career.

DON AMECHE, who has just com-

RKO-Radio Pictures is advancing the production expense and distributing the picture at cost. Stars who at this writing had agreed to act in the film without salary include Brian Aherne, Freddie Bartholomew, Madeleine Carroll, Ronald Colman, Gracie Fields, Errol Flynn, Joan Fontaine, Greer Garson, Cary Grant, Sir Cedric Hardwicke, Charles Laughton, Anna Lee, Vivien Leigh, Herbert Marshall, Victor McLaglen, Ray Milland, Anna Neagle, Merle Oberon, Maureen O'Hara, Laurence Olivier, Sabu, C. Aubrey Smith and Claude Rains. In addition, nearly one hundred leading and supporting players have volunteered. This star-spangled cast will be directed by Edmund Goulding, Alfred Hitchcock, Zoltan Korda, Frank Lloyd, Victor Saville and Herbert Wilcox. Con-

tributing authors are Dr. A. J. Cronin, John Van Druten, James Hilton, Aldous Huxley, W. P. Lipscomb, R. C. Sheriff and Doddie Smith, with Lipscomb co-ordinating and Alma Reville (Mrs. Alfred Hitchcock) working on the final screen play. Problem of billing the top-flight stars was solved by alphabetized billing of the cast.

FAITH BACON, recently threatened with litigation for using the label "Cutest Little Nudist," made plans for furthering her career while bedded in the Santa Monica Hospital after an operation. Having turned down a Detroit producer's offer of \$50,000 for a year's fan-dancing tour, Faith put faith in her future in the ballet field. Following completion of twelve nickel-in-the-slot film shorts in color, she will go on a concert tour, accompanied by her own "civic" orchestra. Questioned by a MOVIE AND RADIO GUIDE reporter about the subjects of the short films, Miss Bacon said: "I've made only one with fans, and doubt if I will allow it to be released, as there are so many mercenary dancers who copy and care nothing for art. These movies will be mostly outdoors, with the sea or brooks and wild life featured. I will do my faun dance covered with natural growing leaves, and the little fauns will eat them off me!!!" CLARK GABLE, known as one of the friendliest stars in the movies, made a friend for life when a Minnesota theater-owner, on a tour of M-G-M, decided that the one thing to make his Hollywood visit complete would be a picture of himself with Gable. The publicity man showing the exhibitor around the studio was nonplused, but, after some insistence from the visitor, hesitantly asked Clark to pose with him. Clark not only posed but, having some free time between scenes, talked to the guest for twenty minutes. Result: The publicity man was given the laugh at his trepidation by the theater magnate, who said: "I could tell from Gable's pictures that it would be 'Clark' and 'Jim' right away. What were you scared of?"

JEANETTE MACDONALD, sweltering in velvets for her role in "Bittersweet," bemoaned more than the costume the heavy Victorian corset she had to wear. Then remembering the picture she made several years ago with gypsum "snow" as a background

"The Sea Hawk"

Cast: Errol Flynn, Brenda Marshall, Claude Rains, Donald Crisp, Flora Robson, Alan Hale, Henry Daniell, Una O'Connor, James Stephenson, Gilbert Roland, Jack La Rue, et al. A Warner Bros. picture; produced by Henry Blanke; directed by Michael Curtiz, who also directed "Four Daughters" and co-directed "The Adventures of Robin Hood."

WEAVING its way through a maze of spectacular and historic adventures, "The Sea Hawk" is one of the most thrilling and colorful screen offerings of the year. Strangely and timely, too, the story concerns the effort of King Philip II of Spain, in 1585, to conquer the British Isles by means of (1) "fifth columnists"—Don Jose de Cordoba, his ambassador, and Lord Wolfingham, Queen Elizabeth's counselor—and (2) an overpowering fleet which he was completing.

English privateers, who called themselves the Sea Hawks (and were nothing less than officially sanctioned pirates), were England's first line of defense. The leader of all the Hawks, Geoffrey Thorpe (Errol Flynn), was the most daring adventurer of them all. "The Sea Hawk" is Thorpe's story of the victories and defeats he tasted in the service of the queen and the thrilling picturization of his romance with half-Spanish Dona Maria de Cordoba, played exceedingly well by beautiful newcomer Brenda Marshall.

Queen Elizabeth once more is convincingly portrayed by Flora Robson, who played the same role in "Fire Over England." Portrayals of first order likewise are tendered by Claude Rains as Spanish Ambassador Don Jose de Cordoba, Donald Crisp, Alan Hale, Henry Daniell, Una O'Connor, James Stephenson, Gilbert Roland, Jack La Rue and almost all the huge cast.

Most elaborate and costly were the properties required for the super production. A marine or "tank" stage occupying over two acres of ground and requiring a million gallons of water was built on the Warner lot. Its building is over a half city block long, its roof eighty-five feet (eight stories) high. Thirty complete ship models were discarded before final plans for the "Sea Hawk" and the "Madre di Dios" were approved. Then 375 men worked in several shifts daily for eleven weeks to build the 135-foot, 127-ton British hulk and the 165-foot, 142-ton Spaniard from 200 tons of lumber (enough to build 250 four-room cottages), 2,000 tons of steel, four miles of rope and 3,000 yards of sail canvas.

Costume cost of the picture exceeded \$100,000. The average sixteenth-century dress worn by the girls weighs twenty-two pounds; Miss Marshall's weighs thirty-six; Miss Robson, as the queen, wore forty pounds of gown!

"Young People"

ANSWERING those who said Shirley Temple's last film with 20th Century-Fox would be the finish of her career, "Young People" surprisingly reveals Shirley at her entertaining best. Her undeniable talent, coupled with the laughable antics of experienced comics Jack Oakie and Charlotte Greenwood, produces one of the best of all the Temple pictures, although the picture lacks some of the lavishness earlier associated with her films.

Shirley, cast as the adopted daughter of vaudeville troupers Joe and Kitty Ballantine, is in fast company. The Three Ballantines, Shirley, Oakie and Miss Greenwood, play the vaudeville circuits, finally "arriving" by being booked into the Palace. Then, at the height of their supremacy on the five-a-day, they retire to a small New England town where they plan to be "regular people." With the best intentions in the world, the first day the trio is in town they start a feud with Hester Appleby (Kathleen Howard), a mean-minded school-teacher who rules the community, and her co-ruler, Dakin (Minor Watson).

As each effort to become members in good standing of the Vermont village ends in a greater disaster, the Ballantines are really ostracized when Shirley, aided by her foster-parents, takes over the school recital and turns it into a kiddy classic featuring rumbas and hot choruses. Finally, when the three throw in the sponge and decide to return to the stage, their departure is interrupted by a hurricane. With the rescue of a group of children, they at last are accepted as members in good standing in the community.

Shirley, in this picture, progresses from a cute child star to a really adept dancer. She does intricate tap routines, and exhibits a genuine flair for comedy and emotional acting. Oakie and Miss Greenwood, in their first pairing, do such a good team job that it's a good bet the two will reappear together shortly. Music by Mack Gordon and Harry Warren is lilting, with five tunes featured.

Spontaneous applause throughout the preview demonstrated Shirley's continued following, with a buzz of "oh's" and "ah's" bringing the theater alive at scenes from her earlier films cleverly interwoven into the picture.

THE latest of the "that's how bandits were made" pictures, "When the Daltons Rode" is the routin', tootin', bang-bangingest film in months.

Randolph Scott, as a young lawyer, comes to a small town in Kansas to look up his family friends, the Daltons. Mary Gordon plays the mother, and Brian Donlevy, Broderick Crawford, Stuart Erwin and Frank Albertson portray Grat, Bob, Ben and Emmett, respectively. Kay Francis is cast effectively as the fiancée of Crawford who falls in love with Scott. The Daltons are peaceful farmers until Harvey Stephens brings his surveyors, tells the Daltons they have been living on land which hasn't been properly surveyed, and must leave. Erwin, to save one of his brothers from being shot, knocks a surveyor down, inadvertently causes his death. At the trial, he is given a raw deal. The Dalton boys revolt. Crawford turns in his deputy's badge and the brothers turn outlaws, accompanied by Ozark, the Daltons' ranch-hand (Andy Devine).

Some of the most exciting blood-and-thunder hold-ups, train robberies and chases in picture history are included in the historic epic of one of America's most famous bands of outlaws. The dramatic escapes are breath-taking, with the final disastrous gun-fight full of intense suspense.

Although the real Victoria had a thick German accent, Miss Neagle's interpretation is more keenly attuned to the times. The German qualities both of Victoria and her consort Prince Albert are touched upon very lightly.

Second to the importance of the performances is the pleasing and at times truly breath-taking effect of the Technicolor. Actual views of the palaces of Windsor, Buckingham, St. James and Balmoral are like living paintings.

Likewise there is a timeliness evident in this bit of history that runs beneath the nostalgia of days remembered. "Queen of Destiny" deals only with Victoria's life as a ruler, beginning with the moment she proposes marriage to Prince Albert. Although wars, riots, a huge industrial fair and other matters of state take a necessary part in her affairs, this is the story primarily of her love and family life within the walls of the palace.

"Queen of Destiny" portrays, faithful to history, a way of life that is passing, in all its charm and with all its failings. It is a film that no thinking person can afford to miss.

Joan Bennett, an American married to German Francis Lederer, who is getting his second citizenship papers, goes with him and their son, Johnny Russell, to Germany to check over the running of a factory owned by Lederer's father, Otto Kruger. The family is met by Anna Sten, old friend of Lederer's and an ardent Nazi disciple. Very quickly the German-born husband is infused with enthusiasm for the new Aryan ideals by his former sweetheart.

A breach is opened between husband Lederer and wife Joan when he refuses to help her deliver money from a friend in America to a prisoner in a concentration camp. Just as staunch in her determination to refuse acceptance of Nazi principles, Joan then goes to Lloyd Nolan, an American newspaper correspondent, who helps her.

With the announcement by her husband of his determination to stay in Germany, divorce her and marry his Nazi sweetheart, keeping the child, she turns again to her reporter friend, who gets both of them out of the country.

Notable is the ridiculing of the Nazi pompousness and smugness, the pungent, earthy dialog which avoids all feeling of propaganda while it reflects clearly the situation in Germany.

If audiences throw themselves into the spirit of the thing, this new venture in movie-making will cause a lot of merriment; without audience participation the picture loses its punch.

The tone of "Gold Rush Maisie" is much more serious than its predecessors, but still there is plenty of humor packed into its footage. Her breakdown with her jalopy on a lonely desert road is enough to put any audience into hysterics, and Maisie really pays off when she tells Lee Bowman, "You've been awfully kind in a nasty sort of way."

Slim Summerville, as Bowman's hired man, makes the most of his every scene, and Mary Nash, John Hamilton, Scotty Beckett and Virginia Weidler—particularly Miss Weidler—do fine jobs of acting. Two sons of famous fathers, Wallace Reid, Jr., and Victor Kilian, Jr., are seen as the Sullivan brothers, young prospectors who are among the mining camp's leaders.

A complete Arizona ranch, with barn and livestock, was re-created on an M-G-M sound stage as the principal setting in the film. Not quite so elaborate as the ranch setting is Miss Sothorn's wardrobe. She wears two cheap dresses and an old pair of dungarees which, with a pair of oversize boots, constitute her entire wardrobe.

NEW YORK, N. Y.—Radio is having its own war—a war over music. In New York headquarters is the American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers, better known as ASCAP. To this organization belong most of the men who write most of the songs that you hear on most of the programs. To realize profits these men license radio stations to broadcast their compositions. In the beginning the fee was moderate. Year by year ASCAP has increased the cost of that license until today the demand is for \$4,400,000.

Broadcasters, long irritated at this set-up, are rebelling. First step was to set up BMI (Broadcast Music, Inc.), an organization to compete with ASCAP. And recently CBS and NBC made another move in the offensive, announcing: (1) They would do away with all ASCAP music as of January 1; (2) they would eliminate immediately all restricted ASCAP numbers which require special credits; (3) they would require all sustaining programs to include at least one non-ASCAP number on each program, the number of selections to be increased monthly; (4) they would close their doors to all song-pluggers; (5) and they appealed to sponsors to push non-ASCAP music.

How will all this affect listening? It will bar many familiar tunes from the air; it will cause many programs to change theme songs; it will bar such composers as George M. Cohan, Billy Rose, Irving Caesar. On the other hand, it will introduce a new crop of song-writers and songs.

LONDON.—English broadcasters have completed underground, bomb-proof studios "somewhere in England" so broadcasting can function without interruption during any Nazi attack. Above ground the studios are protected by anti-aircraft batteries and machine-gun nests.

NEW YORK, N. Y.—A far-reaching decision in its effect on local radio stations was handed down recently by the U. S. Circuit Court of Appeals in New York. The court ruled that a broadcaster, in playing ordinary phonograph records over the air, did not infringe the rights of the copyright holder, and therefore was not a violation of law. The decision was made in the case of RCA seeking to prohibit station WNEW from playing its records.

IN NEW YORK with Wilson Brown

World War I called for stirring patriotic songs to meet the spirit of the people. George M. Cohan, the "Yankee Doodle Dandy," came through with "Over There" and "It's a Grand Old Flag." As World War II boils, Mr. Cohan comes forth with another soul-stirring number, "This Is Our Side of the Ocean," which he presented on the "Cities Service Concert" August 2.

"Radio Guild," the dramatic show, has been on NBC since 1929. On July 28, NBC sent out publicity calling it "Radio Guide," which indicates we're on their minds, too. . . . Father Coughlin plans a return to the air in October. . . . Del Sharbutt, announcer, and

Meri-Bell, singer, who are husband and wife in private life, may become the same in public life if their new show, "Mr. and Mrs. Is the Name," is sold. . . . Andre Kostelanetz and Lily Pons are in Hawaii on vacation. . . . With the end of June came the end of one-half year of 1940 broadcasting. If figures interest you, here's what the networks grossed during those first six months: CBS, \$20,457,372; NBC Red, \$19,326,846; NBC Blue, \$5,233,030; MBS, \$2,031,323.

"Let's Pretend" Eleven Years Old

Nila Mack's "Let's Pretend" celebrates its eleventh year on the air this month. . . . Waverly Root and Victor Lusinci, Mutual reporters in France, have returned to the United States. . . . The NBC Symphony takes to the air October 12. Toscanini takes the baton November 23, ending December 28. . . . Cecilia Evans (Debby in "The Goldbergs") is another who is playing in summer stock. . . . Actress Sunda Love has just spent two weeks in cool Canada. . . . Bob Trout's home caught fire, but damage was slight. . . . Margaret Speaks goes to her native Ohio August 25 at the invitation of Gov. John W. Bricker to sing at the Ohio State Fair. . . . Ken Murray is dickering for a job with Ben Bernie's former tobacco sponsor.

Through loudspeakers the other day came a woman's voice saying, "This is the Columbia Broadcasting System." Columbia was in a dither. It has no woman announcer. It happened that Dorothy Mallinson is doing production work on "Short Short Story" while Orrie Hancock is on vacation. At the close of the program the announcer wasn't on hand. There was

nothing for Dorothy to do except to rush to the mike and fill in. A woman's voice in this spot is not new. "Hour of Charm" tried it years ago.

Word from the Fahnestocks

Some months ago we announced that the barnstorming Fahnestocks (mother and two sons) sailed for the South Seas and that they would be heard regularly over NBC, bringing to us the music of the natives of the islands. But nothing happened. We have just received word from Mrs. Mary Fahnestock explaining that it's all because of the war. In Tahiti, she said, "our plane was sent home, our guns sealed, and our radio silenced."

It cost the networks \$235,000 to broadcast the Democratic convention. . . . Doris Dudley of "Meet Mr. Meek," and Frank Farrell, Manhattan newspaper reporter who is said to have engineered the 1939 Charlie McCarthy kidnaping, are spending a lot of time together. Doris, once married, has two young sons, Skipper and Little Butch. . . . Somewhat ironical was the fact that the Jewish play, "The Goldbergs," done by a Jewish cast, relinquished its time so Hitler's speech to the Reichstag could be broadcast. . . . The Metropolitan Opera is for sale at \$250,000 for the season, a figure \$125,000 below previous quotations. . . . Alice Frost of "Big Sister" is vacationing in Idaho.

Richard Maxwell, now running two programs, is radio's top champion of good deeds. His program of comfort and cheer now has 160 Good Neighbor clubs in 131 cities of nineteen states and Canada with a total membership of 18,245 persons. Here are just a

few of the things these clubs do: Entertain shut-ins, roll bandages, provide medical care to the poor, give vacations to orphans, wheel-chairs to impoverished invalids, food and clothing to the poor. Maxwell's other program, "A Friend In Deed," dramatizes humanitarian acts. Listeners are invited to nominate persons who have done distinguished humanitarian work. Typical of some of the names to be honored are Louis Braille of France, Elizabeth Gurney Fry of England and Dr. Livingstone Trudeau of the United States.

The effect of the heat depends a lot upon the amount of moisture in the air. So it is in New York you hear the line, "It's not the heat; it's the humidity." The temperature can be low, the humidity high, and the result nearly unbearable. Mutual, to be funny to sweltering New Yorkers, cut in on its New York station to give a reassuring weather report, mentioning temperatures but omitting humidity readings. Said the announcer: "In Goshen, Indiana, the temperature is 99 degrees. In Effingham, Illinois, it is 101. In Chicago, it's 103. And in Death Valley—well, we won't even tell you what that is. But in New York the official temperature is only 87 degrees. Now aren't you glad you live in New York?"

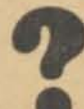

SIX years ago Mary Noble (Vivian Fridell) was Mary Curtis, an Iowa stenographer who fell in love with and married Broadway matinee idol Larry Noble (Ken Griffin). Today Mary is desperately trying to sidestep stardom in the movies so that she may remain "backstage"—simply a wife and mother. How she arrived at her

present dilemma has been told to radio listeners in fifteen-minute installments on "Backstage Wife" since 1935, and her perplexing problem is the result of an accident. As ever, the immediate future of "Backstage Wife" is uncertain but fascinating. It unfolds Monday through Friday, NBC.

Names like Raymond Gram Swing, Elmer Davis, H. V. Kaltenborn, Major George Fielding Eliot, John B. Kennedy are all important names in radio-dom. They stand for men who can analyze and predict the pulse of Europe's ailments. Ailments, alas, that may soon spread to our shores.

There is not a one of these men—these, and even many more qualified to judge and evaluate for millions of American radio listeners—not one who does not freely and openly admit that Adolf Hitler has definite ambitions in this western hemisphere, in North America. Their decisions are not based merely upon Der Fuehrer's replies to President Roosevelt—for these, after all, are replies made up of words.

It is the acts—the possible, probable acts of subtle aggression, the economic and territorial inroads—that we must fear. And, according to these highest-paid experts, they will come.

America plays a definite role in Hitler's scheme—a scheme not merely for a new Germany but for a new world in which the doctrines of Nazi socialism will, by his own admission, be supreme for the next ten centuries.

That one man could so warp the world in the span of a decade is fantastic.

But these are fantastic days. The Hitler aims in this hemisphere—inviolate for a century behind the shield of the Monroe Doctrine—are mainly economic at the moment, say such men as Kaltenborn, Swing and Cesar Saerchinger.

"Economic and political," declares H. V. Kaltenborn of NBC, voicing a precise bit of Hitler philosophy in the words: "Who cares who owns it so long as I run it?"

Raymond Gram Swing of Mutual echoes these thoughts: "Hitler's ambitions are chiefly economic, but will be to control governments."

Major George Fielding Eliot, CBS

expert, differs when he declares: "The Nazi system does not make such distinctions. It integrates political and economic objectives."

And, completing a round of network opinion, CBS' Elmer Davis states the Nazi aims as he sees them—"probably territorial, though very likely through stooge Fascist governments."

This is YOUR world they're talking about.

South America comes first. South America is only six hours by fast bombing plane from our southern shores. The sea is not so green there nor half so wide.

WE KNOW, of course, that the influx of Nazism is seeping across the lands of our Hispano neighbors. We know of Nazism in Brazil, the Argentine, Bolivia, Chile and Peru. We know of it through Central America, in Guatemala, Salvador and Mexico.

And now, painfully, we are beginning to know of it in the United States.

No Nazis here, you say? It does sound ridiculous on the face of it. How could anything so mad and wrong and ruthless as Nazism gain a foothold in these United States where people are Republicans or Democrats and fight each other with ballot-boxes?

Elmer Davis and Raymond Gram Swing both admit there are Nazi inroads on the American way of life. Strongest in South America—but creeping north in a hardy, stubborn lichen.

The course of world-empire building must run smoothly, without a pause. Hesitancy means loss. Hitler knows that. Take, for example, the sentiments of the volcanic Mr. Walter Winchell who, while not exactly an international analyst, is frequently bothered by fifth columnists before the eyes. "He won't lose any time at all," says W. W. "Dictators have got to keep going. Hitler has to keep his army moving. He should give his soldiers a rest! One of them might bump him off. Bring on the champ—that's Hitler's attitude..."

H. V. Kaltenborn is somewhat in harmony on this same point. "Hitler's revolution is dynamic. He must, like the Ark, keep a-moverin'."

But Cesar Saerchinger, pioneer NBC broadcaster and a foreign correspondent of long standing, takes a different slant. "There must be time," he asserts, "for recuperation before Hitler turns his full attention to the Americas—especially time to build up a navy, unless he captures the British navy, which is very unlikely."

Major Eliot, as a militarist, agrees. "There will necessarily be a period of consolidation and preparation, but small-scale enterprises of various sorts (jockeying for position, so to speak) may be expected at once."

And from Johannes Steel, onetime financial adviser to the pre-Hitler German government, newsman abroad, author and radio commentator whose analyses are heard on both East and West Coasts—comes the opinion that "Hitler cannot afford to lose any time. He will either establish his world dominion within two or three years or the entire structure built up by the German Reich will collapse. No one knows that better than Hitler himself."

The experts are telling us, in effect, that if you listen closely you can hear the flutter of a flag. It has a great swastika in a white circle upon it. It waves over more and more of the countries to the south. And Nazism, stealthily, softly, surely, infuses its disintegration into the blood of the United States to do the will of Der Fuehrer from within.

It is easier that way than storming our shores, than flying heavy-bellied bombers across three thousand miles of green water.

"He will outbuild us," predicts Raymond Gram Swing, "naval... air... army. He will hold the strategic bases with his allies. He will tell us what to do." That is the plan as Swing sees it.

Elmer Davis is not so sure of what aggressive route the Hitler forces may take against us. "Possibly all methods," he admits, referring to fifth col-

umn, bases in the Caribbean, activity in Mexico, cooperation between Germany and Japan in the Pacific. "The Nazis usually try everything at once."

Kaltenborn adheres more to the boring-from-within theory. "Undermining our morale—spying out our defenses—fifth-column work in all Latin-American countries," is his belief.

Outraged America may well say of the man with the mustache who heads the Reich: "What does he think we are, anyway?"

Well, in the opinion of most of the experts, he thinks we're a pushover. And, in the opinion of most military experts (say what you will about Hitler, he's still a military marvel) the United States, in its present state of preparedness, is a pushover.

"He does not underestimate us," according to veteran Kaltenborn, "but he has a few good Nazis here who are to help him reduce the competition."

The fifth-column marches on, unseen and silent as a stiletto.

"THE German mind," according to Major George Fielding Eliot, "is always inclined to underestimate its opponents. This is especially likely if Germany overcomes Britain."

Walter Winchell is vituperative and pigeonholes Mr. Hitler with the single statement: "He doesn't think anybody is his equal."

The war sweeps closer. The handwriting was on the wall years ago in "Mein Kampf." It showed that if Hitler's plans came to success, there would be no Monroe Doctrine and, even worse, no United States to enforce it.

Thus far his plans have clicked off with the precision of a solar eclipse. What must be done if we are to protect the United States? Granted... it must be done fast. But what?

Here's what radio's minute men think:

Swing:—"Save the British navy and

the empire and its shipyards." Kaltenborn:—"Thorough moral, political, economic and military unity and preparedness."

Steel:—"Aid Great Britain to win the war with all measures short of sending an expeditionary force across the Atlantic."

Saerchinger:—"A two-ocean navy, a first-class air force, and universal military training of young men reaching twenty-one (rather than selective service). Don't forget the co-ordination and expansion of essential industries in government aid. Equally important is the further development of social legislation. Economic (as well as social) democracy must be our goal."

For a solid, sensible nation, America knows too much of mass hysteria. We run, sometimes, before men from Mars. Adolf Hitler thought this epochal event extremely amusing. There is little doubt that he counts upon his fifth column to secure the results unwittingly achieved by Orson Welles.

How, then, can we suppress the fifth column? By good old-fashioned witch-hunts? By a Gestapo of our own? By suppression of our highly vaunted free speech, free press, free radio?

"No," says Saerchinger, "but they should be curbed. Slander, including group slander, should be made severely punishable by law."

"I am for free speech," declares Raymond Gram Swing, "not for treasonable action. Make sure that actions are stopped which imperil the good, and most free speech is a blessing. Don't drive dissension underground."

"We should give them freedom of speech and press, but not the abuse of same."—Winchell.

Forbid the radio, press, public platform to anyone who professes Nazism, Communism or Fascism in this country, advocates H. V. Kaltenborn.

The United States Army grows—but slowly. Blueprints pile upon blue-

prints, planning great factories and assembly-lines that will whisk together in mere hours giant, solid bombers and fighting-planes that travel with the speed of an adder's tongue. The shipyards are busy with the echo of rivets.

Is this itself enough? There are still men who move in the night, who tap telephone wires and probe the defenses of our coasts. They are the unseen army... the army that today, alas, wins wars.

OUTBUILD the combined dictators," advises Raymond Gram Swing. "We must either outbuild them or appease them..."

Assemble a Gargantuan army, a mammoth navy—but trap the fifth column with its snooping, sabotage and insidious terrorism, insist Major Eliot and Elmer Davis. "We must guard against hysteria," admonishes Cesar Saerchinger. "Suppression of treason to democratic institutions and principles," warns H. V. Kaltenborn, "is immediately important."

This is your country that they're talking about!

Not the British Isles, not Sweden, not Roumania. The shadow of the swastika is beginning to slither across the cities of the East—across the mountains and the prairies and the forests of the West that all comprise the world's most successful democracy.

These men to whom you listen each night for sane, measured analyses of international affairs freely admit it. Fantasy changes, in this strange century, so soon to fact. In the realms of Hitler's hopes is the conquest of this nation.

"Heute gehoert uns Europa... und morgen die ganze Welt!" America often brags that its greatness has been built by far-seeing men.

Now, it appears, is the time to maintain it by the same method.

UNDER the tired summer sky of a Europe weary with war, march the drab-gray columns of Hitler's troops.

And as they march, they sing. "Heute gehoert uns Europa..." Young faces, determined faces—stern in their steel, bucket-shaped helmets. "Heute gehoert uns Europa, und morgen die ganze Welt..."

There is a rumble of motors... the clank of steel caterpillar treads... the staccato shuffle of feet... and the demon whine of a Stuka dropping from nowhere, then vanishing as quickly as it came—above a column of lonely smoke.

"Heute gehoert uns Europa," sings the troops.

"Today Europe is ours." (A Europe in shambles is theirs... a Europe plowed under and ready for sowing of the seeds of Nazism.)

"... und morgen die ganze Welt!" "And tomorrow the whole world!" Did you hear?

"And tomorrow," boast the tramping troops, "tomorrow the whole world!"

How many million soldiers sing this common German marching-song each day, we can only guess in wondering silence.

America is part of the whole world. America, say the experts, is part of Hitler's plans. There have been Austria and Czechoslovakia, then Poland, Denmark, Norway before he smashed over the Low Countries. Now it is France where the swastikas wave. Tomorrow, admit the experts, it is very likely to be England.

And the day after tomorrow? For a nation that has the reputation of foresightedness, America is singularly calm and loathe to realize that peril creeps so close. America will admit there is peril—true. In its newspaper editorials, its discussion forums, in the talk of the man-on-the-street there are strong words about a military maniac who is crushing the world out of all shape.

But that, they tell themselves, is far across three thousand miles of green water that sparkles when the sun shines and is very ugly in the storms.

We have here, as in all countries,

Luncheon at the Waldorf

SOMEbody once said that if you ate enough luncheons at the Waldorf, you'd cross oyster forks with practically every celebrity in the world.

Mother brought me up to disbelieve in generalities, so I personalized the statement and did it. I mean I ate luncheon at the Waldorf every day for a week and here's what I saw . . .

An internationally known maharajah holding hands with a Powers model . . . Franchot Tone, winking over a demi-tasse at his ex-wife, Joan Crawford . . . Fannie Hurst, talking bridge systems with Ely Culbertson . . . Dorothy Thompson, poring over a letter from her son away at school in Arizona . . . Tallulah Bankhead, fabulous in furs and jewels, flitting from table to table, murmuring to everyone, "Hello, my darling. I remember you so well. What's your name?"

When you set it down on paper this way, luncheon at the Waldorf sounds pretty glamorous, doesn't it? Divorced movie stars sharing a secret joke in public—famous novelists discussing contract rules with bridge authorities—stage stars, society women, travelers, writers . . .

It is glamorous, too, but not the way you think.

I've had some of these celebrities on my "Luncheon at the Waldorf" program—named that because that's exactly what it is—and I know their secrets. The glamour connected with their lives isn't in the jewels they wear, the set they travel in, the headlines they get. It's in the fact that once, not too long ago, they were not celebrities at all. They were just individuals like you and me—people who wanted a chance and got it.

But more than that, they are individuals who happened to be born in or to migrate to America—the only country in the world today where a tot like Shirley Temple can make a million dollars before she's eleven or where a man like Eddie Cantor can skip from a crowded tenement in the ghetto to an estate on Great Neck without a single titled ancestor or moneyed antecedent to recommend him. Shirley had talent and Eddie had talent plus a will to succeed. They both were fortunate enough to be born in America.

Here, and only here, can such things be.

DOROTHY THOMPSON is a swell example of what I mean. Where, for instance, but in a democracy could this small-town Methodist minister's daughter grow up to become a rich and famous columnist with seven and a half million readers—a columnist able to address her published words to the government and the people of the United States of whom she speaks freely as "ostriches," as "muddle-headed," and as "afraid to wake up and live."

Here, where we accept free speech and a free press as casually as we order a pack of cigarettes or a chocolate soda, we are not much impressed with Miss Thompson's daring words, but if she lived across the Atlantic, daring is what her words would be called and incarcerated in a concentration camp is what Miss Thompson would be, instead of lunching pleasantly at the Waldorf.

In fact, Miss Thompson's whole case history is a lesson in the advantages of living in democratic America. She wasn't born with a silver spoon, but like Temple and Cantor and Henry

When Ilka Chase crosses oyster-forks with the world's great—but we'll let Miss Chase tell it

Ford, through diligence and ingenuity, she has been able to acquire several.

The story I like best about her ingenuity wasn't used when I interviewed her over the air, but since it's been published and is not a great secret, I'll retell it here. Miss Thompson, as foreign correspondent for the Philadelphia *Public Ledger*, jaunted through Europe during the twenties, interviewing people like Hitler and covering incidents like the first Karlist Putsch and the Sinn Fein kidnaping of Archbishop Mannix. One day she flew from Vienna to Czechoslovakia to interview foreign minister Eduard Benes. On the return flight, her plane was grounded in a tiny Czech town.

She wanted to wire her story to the United States, but she hadn't enough money, so she suggested that the story go collect. The clerk wanted to see her Czech press card first. Miss Thompson had no Czech press card. Trapped, she made what I think a most ingenious, a most American move. She asked for a telegraph blank, addressed it to Benes and wrote as follows:

"Beloved. Will you bring pressure to bear to have all officials working in this post office fired? Signed, Sweetie."

P. S. Miss Thompson's interview went collect. Mr. Benes never saw the telegram.

Ely Culbertson was my guest on "Luncheon at the Waldorf," too. Maybe you heard the broadcast. We chatted about his house and his children and his bridge and his autobiography but we didn't mention those sojourns in jails in Russia and Mexico as a revolutionist, his experiences in the hobo jungles of Canada and California—in Spain as an anarchist—his early struggles, his poverty. He mentions all these in his book, "The Strange Lives of One Man." He mentions his travels all over the world and his fun everywhere—also, the fact that it took America to make him a millionaire.

It was in 1921, I think, that Culbertson started on the bridge career that made him rich and famous. Ely and his father were down to their last fifty dollars. They divided it into two parts,

twenty dollars for living expenses and thirty dollars for Ely's gambling fund.

Invested in auction at half a cent a point, this thirty dollars earned for Culbertson \$150 a month until he began to look for higher stakes and larger incomes. He found both when a newspaper picture led him to Lucella Shelton, New York bridge instructor, who offered him a job as her assistant.

"The first day there," Ely says now, "Mrs. Shelton taught me her ideas on bridge and instructed me in the Work and Whitehead systems. The second day, I explained my theories to her. The third day, I became head of the studio and she, my assistant!"

A few years later, Culbertson was a millionaire.

But it could happen only here, as Culbertson himself realized when he made a trip abroad. There, looking back on the democracy that he'd left behind, he wrote: "I used to smile indulgently when I heard some simple American say to all who wished or did not wish to hear, 'America is the greatest country in the whole world.' But I became convinced that America is the greatest country in history."

Fannie Hurst was a guest on my program. Today, she is a woman known throughout the world for her books, which include such works as "Lummock," "Back Street," and the more recent "Great Laughter." She writes novels and magazine stories and scenarios. She's rich, celebrated, the darling of drawing-rooms from Coast to Coast.

But it wasn't always like that. Yesterday, she was like you or your best friend or the woman next door. She was a kid back in Hamilton, Ohio, and after she had a few years at college, she worked as a saleswoman and waitress and once she went across the Atlantic Ocean in steerage to get atmosphere for a book.

Europe is probably full of women like Fannie. Women who want to write, want to make money, would be willing to sacrifice comfort for local color. But Europe is not full of successful publishers and editors and

movie producers who are willing to subsidize young writers as many of our American publishers do.

Nope, it took America to provide Ohio-born Fannie Hurst with a handsome fifteenth-century apartment.

Sometimes at the Waldorf you'll see a tiny, dark woman lunching with a short, intensely interested man. It's Lily Pons, and the man who flew to Hollywood thirteen times to propose to her—her husband, Andre Kostelanetz. They honestly appreciate America.

Lily, you know, was born in France and Andre in Russia. Today, France has fallen to Hitler. French colonies are capitulating, one by one. But Lily is still giving parties for Allied relief. Ask her how America responds and she'll reply, explosively: "American generosity. *Sans bornes*. Without limit. Never did you see anything like it. Such warmth the Americans have. Such great heart."

OUR national great heart was demonstrated to Lily herself in 1931, the year she made her debut at the Metropolitan. "On the very first day," she says, "I found out why I love America. It was my debut. I was nervous. A little walk, I decided, would calm me.

"I went out on Broadway. Into a little dress shop. And do you know, they recognized me even before I am a success. They recognized me from my pictures in the paper. They were so kind. 'You will be a great success, Madame,' they told me. O, their friendliness. It did me good."

Andre has a story about our democratic attitude, too. He was a successful conductor in St. Petersburg before the Revolution drove him to America. He took out his first papers the day after he arrived here.

"I went to see a Russian friend," he says. "He asked me to play for him. Two days later he writes me a letter.

"He says I am 'a first class musician and to go on, son, you will soon be at the top.' He says that America recognizes true art better than any country in the world.

"He is right."

Lily and Andre have seen a lot of America's impulsive charity, its democracy, its kindness, so different from what they know of their native lands. To illustrate, they have a little story about the Good Samaritan, told three ways—the Russian way, the French way, the American way.

Says Russian-born Andre: "The Good Samaritan story would be a little different in Russia. A Russian Samaritan would cut a big hunk of black bread, serve a bowl of hot soup and pour hot tea and vodka into the suffering stranger until he was sure the stranger was above all earthly troubles . . ."

Says French-born Lily: "In France, the *paysant* Samaritan would give to the stranger bread, butter and wine. He would let the stranger sleep in a barn. But money, no, I do not think a French *paysant* would give money.

"The way Americans respond to distress is unheard of in Europe. Here in America, I am sure the stranger would receive not only food and clothes but also a job, if possible."

a lot this summer is "I Am An American," a stirring patriotic song somewhat along the lines of "I Love America," and introduced on the air and on records by Gray Gordon.

"THEY'RE off!" Thousands shout it. And almost before the words have died, less than half a minute later, the thousands are cheering a diminutive speed demon as he flashes across the finish line.

X, Jr., driving a home-made, midjet super-special, is the winner of America's shortest, most novel, perhaps most colorful race—the final of the All-American Soap Box Derby.

Who is this mysterious X, Jr.? This Sunday will tell. Sunday the grand finals will be staged in Akron, Ohio, on the specially built, 1,100-foot inclined track called Derby Downs, with probably 100,000 spectators looking on, with newsreel cameras grinding, and with all three major networks broadcasting to the nation this struggle of coasting cars, designed, built and driven by boys.

The real name of X, Jr., won't be known till Sunday. But this much can be recorded on the dope sheet in advance. He'll be a resourceful lad who knows how to plan well and build well; who knows how to take victory as an obligation to do still bigger things and defeat as a sporting challenge to try again. He'll be both a dreamer and a daredevil. He'll be, in short, an all-American boy who has a lot of fun doing things better than the average.

He'll have to be like that, because a lot had to happen before young X, Jr., could cross that final finish line, even before he could go to the final starting line.

Our hero started working toward his goal several months ago. First of all he read the announcements about the event in his home-town paper. He found that boys between eleven and fifteen, inclusive, were eligible, and that let him in. He learned that the activity was sponsored nationally by the makers of Chevrolet cars, and that a newspaper had charge of local preliminary contests in individual towns and cities. In his home town the race was to be conducted by the *Plaintown News*.

X, JR., told his parents about the contest, that he wanted to enter. Mom said it was too dangerous, he might be injured in an accident. Dad at first said it would just be a lot of mess around the house making the thing, and besides he probably wouldn't have a chance to win anything. Then it occurred to him that his boy did seem to have unusual mechanical ability. Why not let him try? He finally persuaded Mom it would actually be good for the kid.

X, Jr., went to the offices of the *Plaintown News* and got a copy of the rules so he'd get started out right from the first. He wanted a masterpiece of automobile craftsmanship; nothing less would do. He had seen pictures of the sleek, scientific models that had run last year, and he couldn't compete with them in a makeshift toy like the kid next door coasted around in. He'd have a super-soap-box, maybe even better than the one in which eleven-year-old Clifford Hardesty, of White Plains, N. Y., won the 1939 national championship.

He rummaged around the neighborhood for sturdy pieces of wood and dragged in some discarded tin from old road signs, and he went to work. Dad was itching to demonstrate just how to put the materials together. But the rule-book said "nix" on outside help. He had to do the actual work himself. The only thing he would let Dad do was pay him for mowing the

lawn to help buy second-hand wheels and axles. Steering-wheel and springs he salvaged from a junk heap for a few cents, and he wound up well within the maximum cost of \$10 for the whole machine.

Dad couldn't resist offering advice on the construction. That was legal, so the boy tolerated it. But he had read that Edgar Bergen and other celebri-

ties were sponsoring some young drivers in Hollywood, and he thought it would be all the more credit to him to build his car without much advice. He was smart enough, however, to let Dad and the manual-training instructor give him a few good tips. There were some grown-up problems about building a racing-car.

Working carefully, our hero got his chariot done only a few days before the Plaintown championship race. It was within the length and weight limits of eighty inches and 150 pounds. And it looked classy. He took it to a hill outside town for a test run. "Boy, what a buggy!" he told himself as it sped down the grade.

Came the day of the Plaintown race, and X, Jr., lined up with several dozen other boys. Mom and Dad were there, as was virtually all of Plaintown. Said Dad, "We turned out a nifty little number, huh?" Mom just frowned, still thinking of accidents.

IT WAS over quickly, and X, Jr., rolled over the line with flying colors, twenty feet ahead of his nearest rival. It was a great day what with the acclaim of the crowd, the silver trophy, the right to compete in the national contest. One slight accident cast a shadow over the boy's triumph. A couple of cars locked wheels and one lad scratched his face and arm. Mom didn't think they should let their son take that trip to Akron for the finals. Too far from home, too risky.

"Aw, gee whiz, Mom! I can't be a sissy all my life, can I? How do you expect me to grow up to do big things unless I get out and do something now? This is my big chance. You want

me to go to college, don't you? Well, don't forget the first prize in the race is \$2,000 on a college education. Don't forget that!"

So to Akron went X, Jr., jubilant, inspired, confident. The *Plaintown News* sent him on the train as part of their sponsorship. And in Akron now he and the 131 other contestants from all over the country are big-shots for three days. At Derby headquarters in the Mayflower Hotel, all employees from bell-boy to chef call them Champ Brown, Champ Jones.

Finally, with Derby Downs packed and such celebrities as race driver Wilbur Shaw officiating, the cream of the crop lines up for the final half-mile-a-minute dash to youthful fame—and the scholarship.

Our hero, X, Jr., is among the finalists. Red, white and blue streamers flutter from

his steel safety helmet.

A tense, breathless moment and—"They're off!"

Who is X, Jr.? He may be any of the racers—any of the fifty thousand boys who participated this year in the nation-wide Soap Box Derby. Tune in this Sunday and get a sporting thrill, and find out.

SOVIET RUSSIA EXPANDS ITS SHORT-WAVE FACILITIES

SOVIET RUSSIA has been somewhat of a mystery element in the present European conflict. Without actually being a belligerent power it has played an active role in behind-the-scenes activities. Should Soviet Russia decide to throw its entire military might and vast resources into the struggle, which now seems to be entering a final and decisive stage, victory would probably be assured to that side receiving the Soviet aid. Soviet Russia will enter this war only if or when it considers it greatly in its own interests to do so. Meanwhile, both sides watch every new Soviet move with bated breath. Moscow's diplomatic and military moves are generally clothed in great secrecy, but the general trend of events that can be expected are usually apparent to those who listen to the Moscow short-wave broadcasts.

Short-wave activities, already on a huge scale, are being stepped up as rapidly as the engineering output of Soviet Russia will permit. Radio-Center, Moscow, huge and mysterious broadcasting headquarters for all radio activities in the Union, is open twenty-four hours daily, pouring out Communist propaganda broadcasts in more than a dozen languages. Acre upon acre of directional antenna permit the focusing of these broadcasts upon any part of the world at will. These broadcasts are sent out on dozens of different frequencies and upon complicated broadcasting schedules which are changed from month to month as seasonal changes dictate. Transmissions from Moscow are as a rule not well received in the United States due to the fact that they must cross Arctic magnetic fields before reaching us and these often divert or completely cancel the signals. However, from time to time these Soviet broadcasts get through with tremendous strength.

FROM THE EUROPEAN ARENA: Broadcasts over the Hungarian short-wave station are now taking place according to the following revised schedule: Daily, over HAT4 (9.125), directed to South America, from 7 to 8:20 p.m. and directed to North America, from 8:30 to 10 p.m. EDT. The later hour for the North American program should provide better reception for listeners in this country. . . Transmissions from the Paris short-wave stations (formerly Paris Mondial) are gradually being resumed by the Nazi authorities now in control. According to August Balbi of Los Angeles, Calif., these may now be heard daily as follows: On 15.24 megs, from 1:30 to 4:30 p.m. and on 9.52 megs, week-days, from 1 to 2 a.m. and on Sunday mornings from 2 to 3 a.m. EDT. Program announcements and talks in French, German and English are included in these broadcasts. . . Short-wave listeners are asked to report reception of special experimental broadcasts from Rome, which are

being sent out daily from 12 mid. to 12:30 a.m. EDT, over 2R08 (17.82), 2R06 (15.30) and 2R015 (11.76).

GENERAL NOTES: The presidential elections are over in Cuba, with nominee Colonel Fulgencio Batista the winner, but short-wave station COK, which was put on the air for the sole purpose of electioneering for him, is still broadcasting. According to Charles Ramirez of Havana, Cuba, COK now operates on dual frequencies of 11.57 and 16.200 megs, daily from 1 p.m. to 12:30 a.m. EDT. COK broadcasts a lot of fine Cuban music and much information of interest about Cuba, especially for English listeners. . . In order to better acquaint the public with amateur radio, Mrs. Kay I. Kibling, trustee for New York World's Fair amateur station W2USA, is presenting a program called "Ham Radio" every Monday at 3:30 p.m. EDT, over Mayor La Guardia's station WNYC (810 kilocycles). . . Jamaica station ZQ1 (4.75) is now on the air daily except Sundays from 7 to 7:30 p.m. EDT.

They are the Gables, Taylor and Stanwyck, Colmans, Chaplins, Fairbankses, Myrna Loy, Jimmy Cagney, Norma Shearer, Bette Davis and so on. These folks entertain mostly in their homes, seldom go beyond a small circle of intimate friends, and surround their activities with as much privacy as is possible.

The second circle is lamé society—I mean those who frequent the few decent cafes in town, swarm to the race-tracks, have huge parties for charity. Their leaders are at present the Basil Rathbones, flanked by Elsa Maxwell, Connie Bennett, the Darryl Zanucks and the Jack Warners.

Third comes contract society, which is more fluid than either of the above-mentioned groups. Anyone who comes to Hollywood with a fairly good contract can belong. It is composed of New Yorkers, foreign one-picture imports, overnight successful blondes and former name stars who are making a comeback. This group frequents everything where their pictures will be taken—cafes, polo and tennis matches, premieres and previews. And it wouldn't be kind to mention a name, because when they are left without a dotted line to sign on, they are immediately forgotten in favor of the constant flow of incoming contractees.

Hollywood's latest craze is for celebrities in some other field than their own. The reason is simple. The other fellow's life looks more glamorous, even to a movie star who is supposed to have cornered the glamour market. Basil Rathbone will envy the fabulously wealthy Maharajah of Kapurthala (who is very charming and hasn't any more wives than Basil). Everyone flocked to a party Madeleine Carroll gave for his excellency the minister of Egypt, M. Amine Youssef Bey, and the British consul, Francis E. Evans, and Mrs. Evans were the most popular couple in the movie colony before their recall to London. Paulette Goddard likes to entertain artist Diego Rivera, the Edward G. Robinsons gave a one-man showing of their friend Boris Lovet-Lorsky's sculpture. And Pulitzer-prize writer Louis Bromfield is always a popular dinner guest.

COUNTESS DI FRASSO didn't understand party procedure in Hollywood when she first came to town. She issued her invitations to a costume ball with the mistaken idea that the stars would be glad there'd be no press or photographers. Finally, one cameraman got in to take their pictures (MOVIE AND RADIO GUIDE's Jack Albin) and then everyone was happy!

The press at the party consisted of little Phyllis-marie. The countess and I were equally surprised to find me there, because three hours before the party began I had been admitted to the house by a new butler and taken smack up to the countess' bathroom. There she was in a black-satin robe with a golden crown embroidered on the pocket, putting on her eyelashes for the evening. I was told quickly and in no uncertain language to get out and stay out. I didn't even have a minute's grace to explain to her the new butler's error.

I retreated to the door-step. It was a cold, damp night. The chauffeur offered to let me sit in his car, but I suspected he might whisk me away if I got in it. Another servant opened the front door a crack and hissed that I'd surely get pneumonia if I didn't go away. When he saw that I was serious to the point of tears about my stand-up strike he softened unexpectedly. "Would you like some brandy?" I said I would, and a moment later a footman came with a glass of brandy.

Brian Aherne was among the first of the guests. He thought it was simply brutal for a poor little waif like me to be left freezing on a door-step. He took off his big overcoat and draped it around me. I sagged with the weight. The countess must have sagged, too, when Brian told her what he'd done, for I was very swiftly brought into the house.

When you crash a party anything can happen. Everyone at the Emerald Bay Yacht Club banquet at Lucey's owned a yacht. I've never been on one, and I was getting into deep water as sea terms lapped around the bar. Donald Crisp rescued me from total shipwreck. His wife was writing a script at M-G-M and couldn't make the banquet. Mrs. John Ford, hostess for the evening, suggested that I remain as his dinner partner. There's no more charming a gentleman in Hollywood than Donald Crisp. He gallantly offered to take me home afterwards, but first excused himself for a moment. He didn't come back. Several weeks later I met him on "The Old Maid" set at Warners.

"Good Lord," he said, "I've been looking all over for you. My wife was in an automobile accident the night of the party and I completely forgot my courtesies to you."

There often arise amusing differences in economics. For instance, the night of the Westside Tennis Club party a wealthy producer's wife overheard me calling a taxi and startled me half out of my wits by whispering: "Have you got any money?" I looked at her ermine and diamonds and sleek white-satin gown and faltered, "Enough for cab fare home." "Good," she said, "drop me off on the way."

Ouida Rathbone gave a memorable wedding-anniversary costume ball, to which Gene Raymond went as an all-white-and-pearl Romeo and Jeanette MacDonald in Norma Shearer's Juliet gown; a dinner party in a specially draped silver-cloth room; a wedding for son Rodion with walls of gardenias hemming the garden and, among the guests, Myrna Loy in clinging black jersey. Mrs. Rathbone specializes in portable dance floors, multiple bars and flower-filled marquees.

The impeccable Basil Rathbone is Hollywood's most polished host. Only once did I see him lose his ivory-smooth manner. It was at the wedding of his son. The nuptial march pealed out melodiously for bar after bar, but nothing happened. Basil peered up the path, at the head of which stood the immobile bride and groom. Finally, in a frenzy befitting a temperamental director, Basil leaped up the path and beckoned the couple frantically to "come on."

Costume parties are a pain in the budget to a reporter, who gets paid very little even in Hollywood where all the salaries are supposed to be fabulous. But when, thanks to Louella Parsons, to whom I went for help, I was invited at the eleventh hour to Mr. Hearst's seventy-fifth birthday

party, I decided that \$18 for a rented colonial costume was a necessity. At that, I spent more money than David Niven. The colonial costume party was the one at which Norma Shearer appeared as Marie Antoinette, with her dinner guests in powdered wigs, pink satin and pearls. Norma sent a note to David informing him what to wear. (Now that David is in England I can tell this.) Niven likes a good time. He and Cary Grant wear pajamas to costume parties as a rule. He ignored Miss Shearer's request and arrived amid pompadours and plumes as a Ku Klux Klansman in an old sheet. I'm sure Miss Shearer never forgave him.

ONE of the most rollicking down-to-earth parties I crashed was Bette Davis' Tailwaggers ball. Everyone was there, even party-hating Gary Cooper and reticent Howard Hughes. We played musical chairs, that game in which you line up twenty people and nineteen chairs, and you try not to be left without one when the music stops. In the middle of the game I had a terrible decision to make. There was one chair that Bette Davis and I both made a dive for. As an adoring fan, I wanted to curtsy and say, "Pray be seated, Miss Davis." But as an active player in the game I wanted that chair myself. I took it, and Bette, a second too late, landed in my lap. I lost out next time around to Miriam Hopkins.

A silly thing happened at Bing Crosby's southern party, given at his home for the Marching and Chowder Club. I waited until after midnight before I got up the courage to crash it, for Bing is notably not overly hospitable to the press when he's at home. I was met in the driveway entrance by a detective, whom I persuaded to let me talk to Bing. We walked down the drive to a big minstrel-show tent which was filled with stars in Dixieland costumes. The detective and I searched through the crowd for Bing. I saw him, in blackface and a minstrel's red-and-yellow outfit. "There he is," I said to the detective. "Where?" he asked, staring right at him. Crosby was so amused when I explained what had happened that he broke his rules of the house and let me stay.

But the most embarrassing moment I ever had was at the Gene Lockharts' house. The Lockharts like mixed groups at their parties. This one included an airline pilot, the Irvin S. Cobbs, a Swedish painter, and Lloyd ("Magnificent Obsession") Douglas. We played that terrible game in which you have to act out syllable by syllable the name of a book, song or play. They gave me "Springtime in the Rockies." Well, I sprang all over the best furniture and threw rocks until I ached, but no one guessed it.

Hollywood parties and people change overnight. I became the only unescorted girl to be allowed in the Trocadero. One night after a big premiere I tripped up to the door, practically stepping on Claudette Colbert's slippers of gold. Joe, the doorman, was so excited that he forgot my special privileges. He wouldn't even let me send a message through to the manager. I waited for an hour, and when all the celebrities had gone in, I finally got past Joe. About three weeks later I was walking up Hollywood Boulevard when a car drew up in a great splatter of honks.

It was Joe. "I'm sorry about that night," he said. "And by the way, if you hear of a good doorman's job, let me know. The Trocadero's closed!"

Too many radio programs are too strongly slanted toward the actors' viewpoint rather than that of the listener-consumers the sponsors want to please.

We listeners don't begrudge a sponsor's touting his wares, but the standardized method isn't salesmanship. Any canvasser who came to our doors with such cut-and-dried rigmarole would have the door slammed in his face. At best, the ballyhoosers don't know when to stop. Many may make a sale and then go on and talk the listener out of it again.

A sponsor should consider the types of persons his product is purchased by and slant the program to his actual buyers. Approvals of a program are really no good unless they come from those who buy the sponsor's goods. Slanting of programs is too heavily influenced by the professional entertainers who give us what they like in place of what we like.

Fashion Problems

YOU'VE undoubtedly noticed by this time that for every popular costume-picture there is a resultant revived interest in the fashions of that period. There has never been a motion-picture story that lends itself more picturesquely to style expression than "All This, and Heaven Too," with Bette Davis in the role of Henriette. As unruffled as a lily and almost as lily pale, Bette Davis gives us a heroine whose gentleness, poise and demurely decorative femininity are definitely what Robert Browning, the poet, described as the "half-angel and half-bird" variety.

In her portrayal of the little French governess whose bitter-sweet romance rocked history, Miss Davis wears thirty-five costume changes, many of which awakened such enthusiastic murmurs from her feminine audience that I finally persuaded one of the fashion-designers at Warner Bros.' studio to sketch a modern adaptation of one of the more popular ones for those of you who are lucky enough to be able to design and make your own clothes.

Remember, however, when you

wear a dress based on an 1840 fashion, that a large part of its charm lies in the grace and winsomeness of the person who wears it! Those girls of yesterday had something that we moderns might very advantageously add to our allure equipment. Perhaps it was because they had in such abundant degree the kind of charm that inspired the toast, "To the ladies—today our equals, yesterday our superiors!"

But I am inclined to think, rather, that it dwelt in what the Grand Duchess Marie of Russia recently described to me as the truest definition of charm, "A never-failing consideration of other people's rights and feelings!" Try out this little formula the next time you envy someone who is referred to as a charming woman, and see if it doesn't increase your own quotient!

Meanwhile you might keep in mind the "little things" so characteristic of Miss 1840 that are *you* in 1940!

Your *waistline*—is it slim and sweetly curved to conform to the style of a century ago? Exercise and slimming diet will whittle it down to more glamorous proportions.

Your *bosom*—is it high, wide and accented just enough to be alluringly feminine without resembling a bolster? An uplift brassiere (with points a la Balinese) will achieve this for you. But be sure that your shoulder-straps are short enough to hold your bosom up where nature intended it to be. La belle poitrine is a characteristic part of yesterday's charm portrait. You can have one, also, if you will choose your brassiere as carefully as you would a hat.

Your *hair-do*—does it reveal a smooth, placid brow, two neatly groomed eyebrows (take a bow, twissors!), a powder-free, well-brushed hairline? Do you know that coronet braids give a madonna look to certain young women? That frizzly bangs are irresistible on piquant faces? Miss 1840 was aware of these things—and used them to her advantage.

Your *make-up*—is it a soft and natural-looking one rather than theatrical? Are your lips pink and inviting rather than of the "mind-the-paint, Mister!" variety? Are your eyes emphasized just enough to be brilliant, without looking hard?

Your *throat*—is it made up as daintily as your face, the back of your neck hair-free and spic-and-span-looking? Are your elbows soft and dimpled? (If not, try softening them with a ball of cotton that has been dipped in cuticle-remover, after you're certain that they're soap-and-water clean. Follow it with a massage with Jergens Lotion and see how pretty they look and how sweet they are to touch!)

Last of all—your *voice*—is it a modern voice, shrill, nasal, pitched to be heard above subway clamor and street traffic, or is it a gentle one, the kind that a little-lad-grown-tall loves to carry in his remembrance? Your vocal portrait can always be retouched, you know, and no part of you is quite so imagination-stirring or so soothing to the senses.

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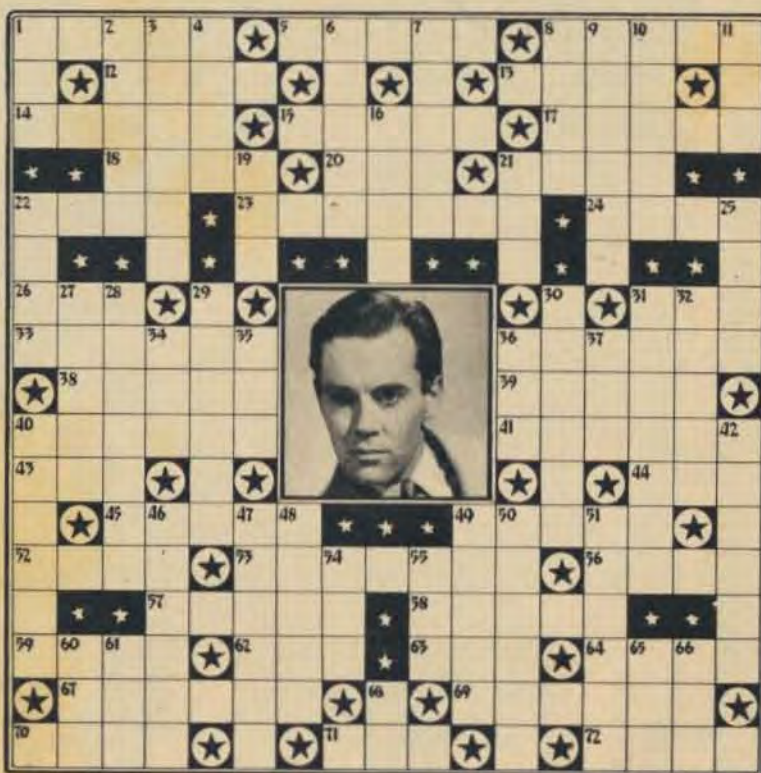

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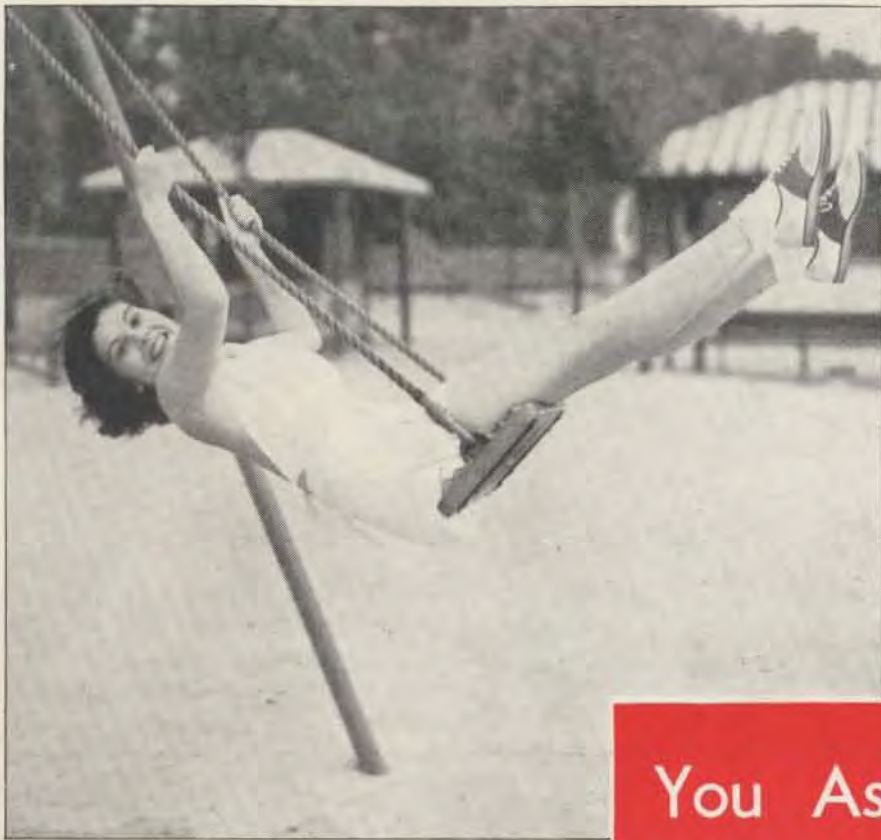
