I'd Rather Eat Than Be a *Movie Star!*

Fame and fortune—or health and happiness? The story of a decision one star had to make

FORTIFIED with a sense of humor (and a steak with all the trimmings), Gale Page said good-bye to her movie career for the benefit of cameramen. With the completion of "Four Mothers," she intends to concentrate on radio, believes she'll be healthier, happier

When stories were released from Hollywood that Gale Page, movie and radio actress, would retire from the screen at the completion of her next picture and devote all of her time to radio because necessary dieting was ruining her health, those in the know smelled a publicity stunt. That is not true. Miss Page is sincere in her intention to quit the screen. Here, in her own words, are the reasons why. It's a story every woman who ever has dieted—or has ever thought of going on a diet—should read.—Editor.

HAVE yet to find a diet which gives me a chance to live and eat normally. As long as I am in pictures I will be faced with a problem—keeping below my normal weight in between pictures in order to avoid the special dieting and massage when I am scheduled for my next role. Over a period of nearly three years, in which I have made twenty pictures, that ever-present problem has become

something of a nightmare to me.

It has brought me to a point where I realized it was beginning to make inroads on my health, both mentally and physically, inroads that would become serious if I persisted in dieting, and going through routine on routine of massage and exercise to boot.

After I had trained down for Warner Bros.' "Four Mothers," now in production, I said to myself squarely, as I stood before the long glass in my dressing-room at the studio, noting every line of my pared-down figure: "Do you want to go on this way, and risk health, happiness, and peace of mind?"

That wasn't an easy question to answer, for picture work is stimulating, and I have enjoyed it. But I felt that I had reached the place where I must make a decision. I lined up all the changes in myself since I'd begun to be haunted by the voice of diet. Some of them I'd figured out myself and others my friends and family had

conscientiously figured out for me.

Among other things, my sense of values was getting warped, my temper was edgy, and I was losing some of my capacity for enjoyment, which meant much to me. Obsessed by the idea of dieting, I was developing a single-track mind. Why, I'd even been guilty of dragging my diet into social conversation!

WHEN I was invited out to dinner, I worried for fear I shouldn't be able to eat what was served. When I invited friends to my home, it meant continually wracking my brain for menus that everyone would enjoy and not make me conspicuous because I was on a diet. The routine of my whole life had to be lined up to conform to eating at odd hours.

At the end of that self-analysis, I came to the conclusion that there are a heap of things more necessary to normal, gracious living than just being a perfect thirty-six and having to de-

vote hours on hours to keeping down to those measurements. A figure wasn't everything. Neither was a career in motion pictures.

I decided I would be happier and healthier in radio. So I am giving up my regular screen work with the conclusion of "Four Mothers."

Like thousands of other women who have really gone on a diet, I had little or no idea of the problems that it could entail, or how it could dominate every waking moment and even invade my dreams. Certainly I felt as though I needed all the courage of my pioneer ancestors when I realized what it meant to me. That may sound a little on the wacky side to those who have never gone through one or several stiff periods of dieting; but those who have know—and definitely—that it takes plenty of courage.

My first experience came during high-school days. Although I never was referred to as "fat folks," I veered to the plump side, thought how nice it

would be to be willowy, and decided to go on an orange-juice diet for a week and see what happened. My mother had other ideas on the subject when I mentioned it to her; but I was so persistent that she finally consented, provided our family doctor approved the idea.

And right here I should like to say that any girl who goes on a diet without first consulting a physician is opening the door for ill health to step in. What may be all right in one case can be all wrong in another, especially if there is any tendency toward anemia, diabetes, or an abnormal glandular condition. Furthermore, I should like it understood that any reactions I may give out of my own experience in dieting did not spring full grown, like Minerva from the head of Zeus. Rather they are the product of slow growth over a period of years and the result of serious study and observation during that time.

But to get back to my first diet and my resolve to see it through. To all outward appearances no one in the family took my efforts seriously. Mother provided the oranges and I drank as much juice as I could take every day. My doctor, wise man, had suggested that rather than any prescribed quantity, knowing that I would need it; and I averaged from ten to a dozen glasses daily. But along about the third day I began to have a terrible gnawing sensation in my stomach and to feel a little light-headed. I rated zero in all my classes that day, with the exception of physical education, and I skipped that. Wrestling with a diet was plenty of exercise.

I thought I had better consult the doctor, but when I described my symptoms he just regarded me casually and said they were quite natural. There was nothing to be alarmed about. I didn't realize then that he took that attitude deliberately to cure me of the notion of dieting when there was no need for it. I was so hungry and upset that I resented his callous manner and secretly hoped that he would tell me to go back to eating my regular meals.

I DIDN'T want to lose face before my family and friends, so I stuck it out, and lost seven pounds. But even as I bragged about that, I secretly resolved—never again! It did not occur to me, not being gifted with premonition, that I was getting a taste of what the future had in store. I'd accomplished what I started, and that was that. Or so I thought at the time. Later I found that the diet had created a false desire for more food than I had been accustomed to eating; and it wasn't long before I had regained all and a little more than I had lost.

However, that didn't worry me. In fact, I forgot all about it, as my time was fully occupied with school work and a little more weight that I had succeeded in losing.

I'd always been interested in dramatic work, and when I finished school I got a job in stock in Spokane, Washington, my home-town. When I didn't have a part in the weekly performance, and sometimes between acts of the show, I sang at a local radio station. That was fun, and I loved it. Dieting was the farthest thing from my mind, and was to be for some time to come.

In 1933 I left Spokane and went to Chicago, where I did nothing but radio work, something I had looked forward to ever since my first broadcasts in Spokane. I'd never thought of going in the movies. It was my good friend, Irna Phillips, author of NBC's "Today's Children," who suggested the idea, after I had been given a dramatic role in the show. Through her help and encouragement my radio work was showing steady improvement, and it is really to her I owe the chance I was given to come to Hollywood and make pictures. When I was tested for roles at Warner Brothers, Irna wrote the test material which won me my contract.

WHEN I left Chicago for Hollywood near the close of 1937, all set to continue my radio work and start a brand-new career in the movies, I felt as though I had been handed the world with a fence around it and a lake in the middle. Dame Diet was the last person I thought of meeting. During the years in Chicago, she hadn't crossed my path, for Mrs. Diet and the microphone, unlike the movie camera, have little in common. But the lady was right there to greet me the first time I stepped before the camera, which makes you appear larger than you really are. I would have to diet and take off ten or fifteen pounds. Those were the orders.

Recalling then the experience of my first orange-juice diet, I decided I didn't want to repeat that. Yet I wasn't going to allow those extra pounds—which the camera said must come off—to stand in the way of my work on the screen. This time every ounce of food I ate was measured for caloric content. Every bit of fat and starch was eliminated. Breakfast consisted of fruit and black coffee. Lunch, more fruit and raw vegetables. Dinner, a broiled lamb chop, steak, or fish and a salad of fruit or vegetables. I was allowed 800 calories daily, and I never exceeded that. To be truthful, I was so eager to lose those pounds that I often just nibbled at the food I could eat.

In addition to dieting, I went through a stiff massage and exercise routine daily to hurry the work along. My flesh was kneaded, pinched and spanked until it was sore. During exercise periods, I rocked, rolled, stretched and twisted. When I finished, I felt as though I had been in the ring with Joe Louis for at least ten rounds. It wasn't merely physical pain and fatigue, it was a psychological battering too. This was serious business, and there was no time to waste in the short period allotted before the cameras started grinding.

But when the studio call came I had won in so far as the losing of extra weight was concerned. Mentally, I was upset and nervous. I kept wondering, once the picture was finished and I could eat normally again, if the combined effects of the diet, massage, and exercise would be lasting or whether it would again result in a false desire for food. That thought nagged at me, and when I began really to eat again I was careful to avoid too much starch and fat. But even at that, it wasn't long before I had regained my normal weight (135 pounds) and added a few more units. From

then on the biggest thing in my life was trying to keep my weight down.

Now my family happens to be the type that celebrates all occasions, big and little. And those celebrations, like most, called for a simple spread of some sort. Naturally they resented the fact that I must keep on a strict diet, nibble a piece of fruit or a raw vegetable while they were eating slices of cheese cake or specially made onion sandwiches. It took a lot of fun out of those get-togethers. Not that I'm a regular glutton for food and live to eat. I don't crave thick soups and gooey desserts hidden under mounds of whipped cream. I just like gooey desserts on occasion.

I began to resent the eternal don't's and the fact that I had to be continually dominated by the career voice of calories, which was forever warning—"You've already had your quota, sister; and anyway, the foods your family is eating are not included on your diet."

I didn't want to be a spoil-sport at every party I attended. I wanted to lead a normal, happy life. So in between pictures and radio work, I dug up other diets and tested them. I tried the banana-and-milk way, guaranteed to take off pounds and keep them off. But that failed.

Next came the broiled-lamb-chop-and-pineapple route. That, too, worked temporarily; but I couldn't spend the rest of my life eating nothing else.

Then I tried a special elimination diet that included plenty of vitamins, containing an alkalizing or cleansing ash. It was the best I found in my search. Here it is:

One hour before breakfast, which consisted of two whole oranges, with just the peel and not the white skin removed; an apple or pear, a glass of cold water, and one cup of black coffee. I had two large glasses of cold water. At 11 o'clock, I had two more whole oranges, one glass of water. For lunch, at 1 o'clock, one bowl of clear vegetable soup, sans any meat stock; one tomato with the skin, one whole carrot, unskinned; two more oranges, and one glass of water. At 3 o'clock came a large glass of unseasoned tomato juice, one apple, one whole orange, and a glass of water. Dinner at 6 allowed me another cup of vegetable soup, one whole grapefruit on a half a head of lettuce, prepared with mineral oil and lemon-juice dressing; six stalks of celery, with the leaves; one whole tomato; one more orange, and one glass of water. At bedtime, the juice of half a lemon in a cup of hot water—and another orange!

AFTER the prescribed week on that diet, I had lost eight pounds and felt better than I had after any other. But it didn't solve the problem of sitting down to meals with my family and eating what they did. It still meant preparing my food separately from that served the others. On the surface these may seem only minor hardships but by this time they had become major ones.

Too, there was another and far more important reason why I decided then that I couldn't allow my life to be dominated by the obsession of dieting. Why "Four Mothers," the picture on which I am now working, will be my last. And when it is finished, why, I'll

devote my entire working time to radio, and take a chance on television, should it, too, demand the rigors of dieting.

I have a son, and I'm sure every mother will forgive me when I say I think he is a pretty fine boy. He is a typical American nine-year-old who likes to have picnics at the lake when we spend vacations at our summer home in Washington. He dotes on going trout-fishing, and cooking the catch over an open fire.

We've always had grand times together, and I want to go on having them. When we plan corn roasts and watermelon spreads, I want to enjoy them with Fritz and his gang, not sit in the shadows nibbling a lettuce leaf and a wafer.

I can console myself that should I ever have a yen to return to pictures, there still is South America—where movie audiences prefer curves—or other roles which might fit my figure!

PRESENT-DAY war films are a depressing and grisly lot, but before the days when machines and specialists in mass murder dominated the fighting scene, war could be—and was—a romantic business in which the soldier of fortune who fought his adventurous way around the world cut

a colorful figure. Such a figure is young Victor Mature in the new Hal Roach film, "Captain Caution." This is a tangy, salt-water tale, woven about the hand-to-hand conflicts and sea battles of the War of 1812. For it, one of the largest dry-land fleets ever to be assembled was built on the Roach

lot. Across the decks of this fleet, hand-to-hand conflict raged with the love of beautiful Louise Platt awaiting the victor. One rough-and-tumble engagement between Mature and Bruce Cabot, for example, took two and a half days to film. Mature lost seven pounds, Cabot five in the scrap.

WHEN THE CAPTAIN of the "Olive Branch" (Robert Barrat) is wounded defending his ship, he dies in the arms of his daughter. Mature (center), the first mate, takes charge and immediately surrenders to the English, thus incurring her hatred. She dubs him "Captain Caution," giving the film its title

LORETTA YOUNG, foremost exponent of filmdom's bachelor glamour girls, deserted the ranks of the single lassies July 31 at the Church of St. Paul the Apostle in Westwood, just outside of Hollywood, to become the wife of Thomas H. Lewis, ad-agency radio executive.

Confirming the seriousness of her rumored romance some months ago, Miss Young told a *MOVIE AND RADIO GUIDE* reporter, "At least, the rumor this time is about a friend." The romance between Loretta and Tom started when he directed her in a Screen Actors' Guild radio show a year and a half ago.

Desiring no publicity and the privilege of a private wedding, the pair were married in a chapel, with only

close relatives and intimate friends present. They were attended by maid of honor Georgiana Young, Loretta's sister, and best man Dr. Charles Ranney Lewis, Tom's brother, who flew in from Troy, N. Y. The bride's gown, made by Irene, popular movie-set modiste, was voluminously full-skirted, with a softly draped side-flaring bodice in iridescent water-lily-blue tulle, harmonizing with her unique bouquet of blue water lilies and pink hyacinths. Intimate detail: Waiting outside the church during the wedding were about 1,500 fans who wished to catch a glimpse of the most glamorous bride of the season, and in the rush to get close to the newlyweds when they left the chapel the mob surged past police lines and trampled

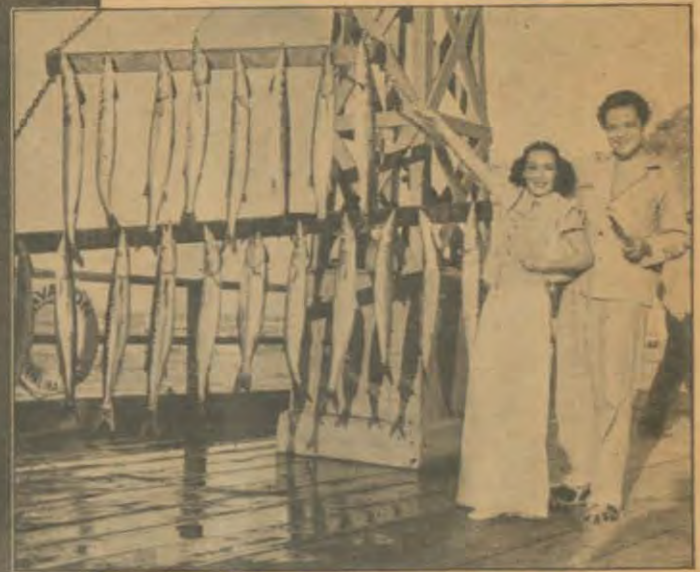
the bride's gown, ruining its train but not the couple's happiness.

Curious note: June has been mistaken not only for Alice Faye but for Constance Bennett and many other blond Hollywood luminaries—everyone, in fact, but the one star she would like most to resemble, Carole Lombard.

IN HOLLYWOOD one often hears the remark that if an actor had to take a regular salesman's job he wouldn't make a cent. This statement was up for proof on Saturday night (July 27) when nearly a hundred stars arrived at the Farmers' Market in Hollywood and offered their services as sellers of produce. It was all to help the Red Cross, of course, but the actors were really tested in salesmanship. Shirley Temple, escorted to the candy booth, was afraid she might "eat up all the profits," but when eager fans broke two showcases trying to buy her wares

Shirley was taken home to escape possible injury. Despite the fact that Frank Fay sold asparagus at \$2 a stalk, and the riot squad was called out to keep the fans in line, Bob Stack had a terrible time trying to get rid of the pineapple juice and boxes of Jell-O assigned to him. (Better ask Jack Benny how next time, Bob.) Warren William sold tomatoes by the box, and in a burst of ambition tried to auction off a whole crate. He got stuck with his own first bid! Desi Arnaz and Lucille Ball brought in plenty of Red Cross shekels when they auctioned off a wedding cake in the bakery concession. (Desi lost his mother in the mob and, turning to Lucille, said, "I'll bet she's watching Shirley Temple." She was.) Harold Lloyd's two daughters had always wanted to sell ice cream, so Harold made them assistants in his booth. He wore a chef's hat and sold ice-cream cones for a dollar. Surprised patrons didn't dare ask for their change. At midnight, when most of the five thousand buyers had gone, Morgan Conway was still trying to auction off some drawn ducks. But the event of the evening was Mischa Auer and Albert Dekker's attempt to sell a live baby pig. Mischa had been doing a noble business in hot nuts and was so flushed with success that he offered to help Dekker sell the pig. In the spirited bidding between the two—and one customer who left in the middle of the proceedings—Dekker bought the pig. He took it home and staked it in the garden. In the morning the garden was a wreck. Off to the butcher's went Dekker. The butcher was sorry, but the pig wasn't fat enough to be killed. The payoff: Dekker is lodging the pig out in the valley until it's edible, and the actor is thankful all he has to sell in the future is his personality on the screen!

GINGER ROGERS is lining up lead-

ing men and looking them over for her next picture, "Kitty Foyle," the Christopher Morley tale of a modern girl and her ultramodern problems. Patric Knowles and Richard Carlson have both said they were being considered for the very good role of the society boy who is a little weak-hearted when it comes to settling the robust facts of life. Charles Lang, an engaging newcomer and friend of Helen Parrish, is also in the show-up. Latest news is that RKO would like to have Bill Holden.

ORSON WELLES invited the Hollywood press to RKO-Pathé studios in Culver City to celebrate his official starting date on "Citizen Kane." Unfortunately, M-G-M chose the same afternoon to preview "Boom Town," so Orson was not exactly overwhelmed. Citizens of Culver City, who had heard rumors that Welles was going to bring entirely revolutionary methods of picture-making to the screen, were puzzled that afternoon to see the producer-actor-writer-director on the studio lawn acting in what appeared to be an old-fashioned flicker. Cameras of ancient vintage ground out a long shot of a canvas backdrop showing the White House, with Ruth Warrick and Orson, as a bride and groom, in the midst of their wedding party. The groom, with brilliant yellow gloves, played the scene in what appeared to be slapstick. It would appear that the Hollywood girls are prepared to throw glamour to the winds in favor of good acting scenes. Kay Francis makes her big entrance in RKO's "Little Men" driving a buggy which is stopped when a month-old mule runs in front of the horses. Kay's dialog is nearly drowned out in the braying of the little mule's mammy. But then, Kay is the actress who was quoted several years ago as saying, "If they would give me \$75,000 for the job I'd stand in the window of the May Company nude and blow soap bubbles!"

NELSON EDDY may not be the

most accomplished pianist in pictures but he definitely can play, as he will in M-G-M's "Bittersweet." For a scene in which he played "Zigeuner" to Jeanette MacDonald, the recording was made simultaneously with the filming by the Technicolor camera. Walter Ruick, Eleanor Powell's pianist, played Noel Coward's music offstage while Eddy fingered a muted piano for the camera. More intricate than it sounds, Mr. Eddy must play exactly as does the pianist not seen by the camera for the sake of visual synchronization. Running through the scene several times, the music went easily except for one run, which caused the star a little difficulty. The trouble was smoothed out when the singing Eddy laughingly shouted: "Look, play it straight and don't make up any fairy-tales about the phrase. Do I look like Jose Iturbi?"

JOE PENNER, past master of the "double take" art on the screen, did his best double take at a free performance in Syracuse, New York. When Joe left for a personal appearance with Universal's "The Boys From Syracuse," he said good-bye in California to his director, Eddie Sutherland. Eddie, it seemed, wouldn't be able to make the trip, wished him luck and so on. Joe arrived in Syracuse, met the mayor, and headed a parade down the main street in the mayor's car. The fans called out "Hi, Joe" as he passed and Joe graciously bowed and waved. But right on the busy corner, a strange thing happened. GENE TOWNE and **GRAHAM BAKER** have been taking bows for their clever publicity stunt in bringing Elsie to Hollywood for "Little Men." But concurrently they are trying to keep anyone from discovering they are not so well informed about flowers. They constructed a large garden set, supposedly in New England, and were proudly showing it off to some eastern visitors. One was singularly unimpressed. "What's wrong?" asked Towne. "Don't you like it? Doesn't it look authentic?" The visitor shook his head gloomily. "Authentic? No, Mr. Towne, I'm sorry to say it isn't authentic. In New England you don't find roses and petunias blossoming in the garden at the same time!"

WAYNE MORRIS gave a waitress in the Paramount commissary a note to deliver to Preston Foster, who was lurching at a near-by table. THE French love of characterization is strikingly preserved by Brian Aherne, who is THE star, giving an outstanding performance in this ebullient story of middle-class life in Paris before the war. The tale it unfolds is that of a bicycle-shop proprietor, Aherne, who has ambitions of jury duty. His life ambition finally realized, he sits stubbornly for acquittal of a murderess, Rita Hayworth, whom eventually he takes under an assumed name into his home and shop, where he mercifully gives her work. His motives are misunderstood by a fellow juror who discovers the secret, and by Aherne's son, who falls in love with the girl.

Really, the story is very clever and off the beaten path. Its conclusion remains a surprise unto the end. And acting ability is not only displayed by Aherne but by Miss Hayworth, Glenn Ford (his son in the story), Irene Rich (his wife), and Evelyn Keyes, a newcomer.

Suspenseful, this picture contained more drama in the making than most films do when shown. Henry Wilcoxon's brother was killed in action during the last few days of work on the film.

IF YOU'RE looking for Clark Gable, Spencer Tracy, Claudette Colbert and Hedy Lamarr cast in roles that were written to fit their best acting abilities and enacting a fast and furious story of love and fighting in the wildcat oil fields, here's the place to invest your movie-budget money. "Boom Town" has everything—story, action, love, fist-fights, fires, mud-puddles, revolutions, big business chicanery and even a court scene.

Excellent support is supplied the big foursome by Frank Morgan, who plays an oil-well-supply salesman, and likewise by Chill Wills, a sheriff who becomes cook-and-bottle-washer for the wildcatting Gable and Tracy.

From here on in, the two play lone games, and while one is up in the money, the other is down. Eventually they merge once more, only to come to another impasse when Tracy, sees the prospering Gable neglecting his missus for the beautiful Lamarr, whom he employs as a confidential business spy. That situation is ironed out when Tracy breaks Gable again to bring him back to his wife; as the picture ends the triumvirate starts out once more in search of adventure.

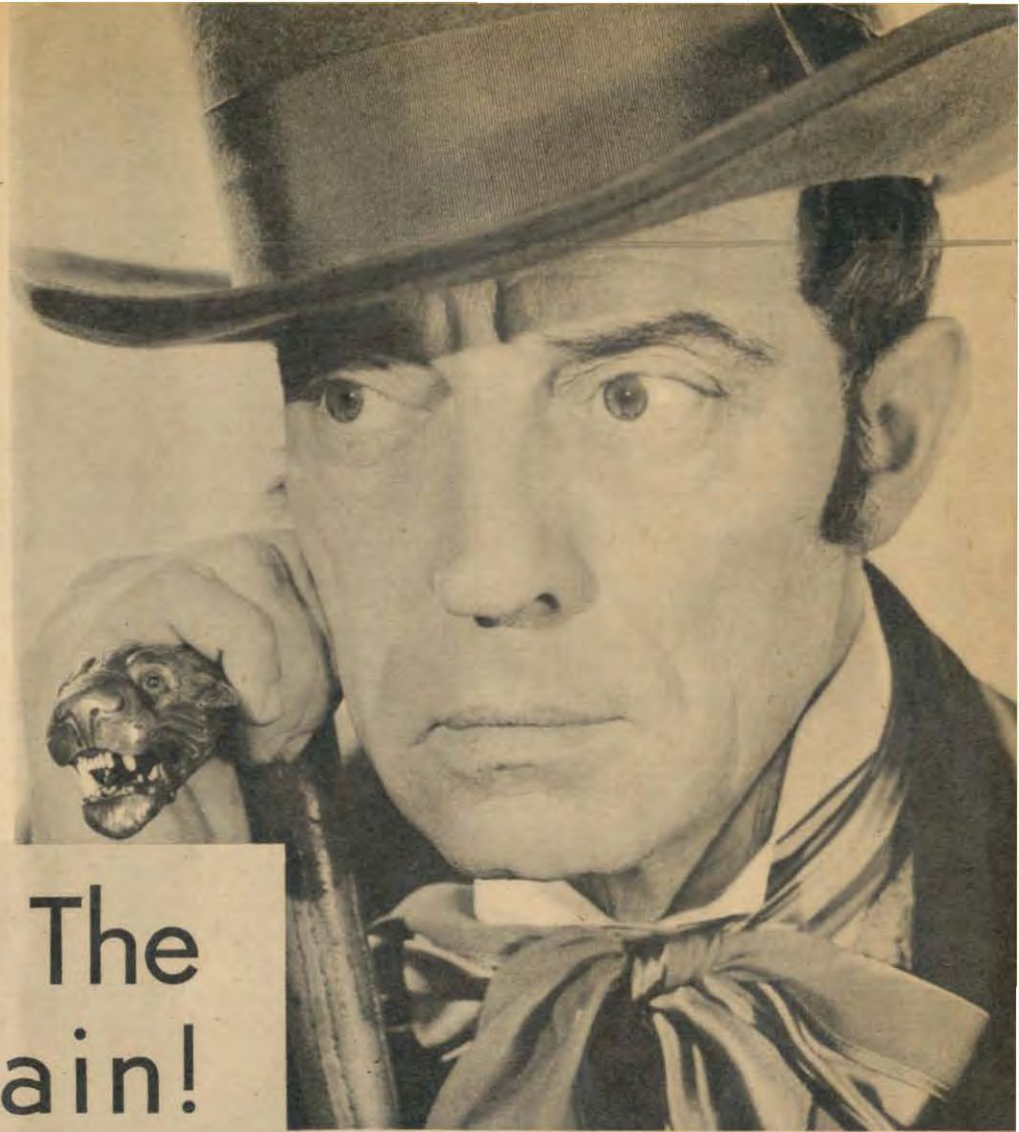
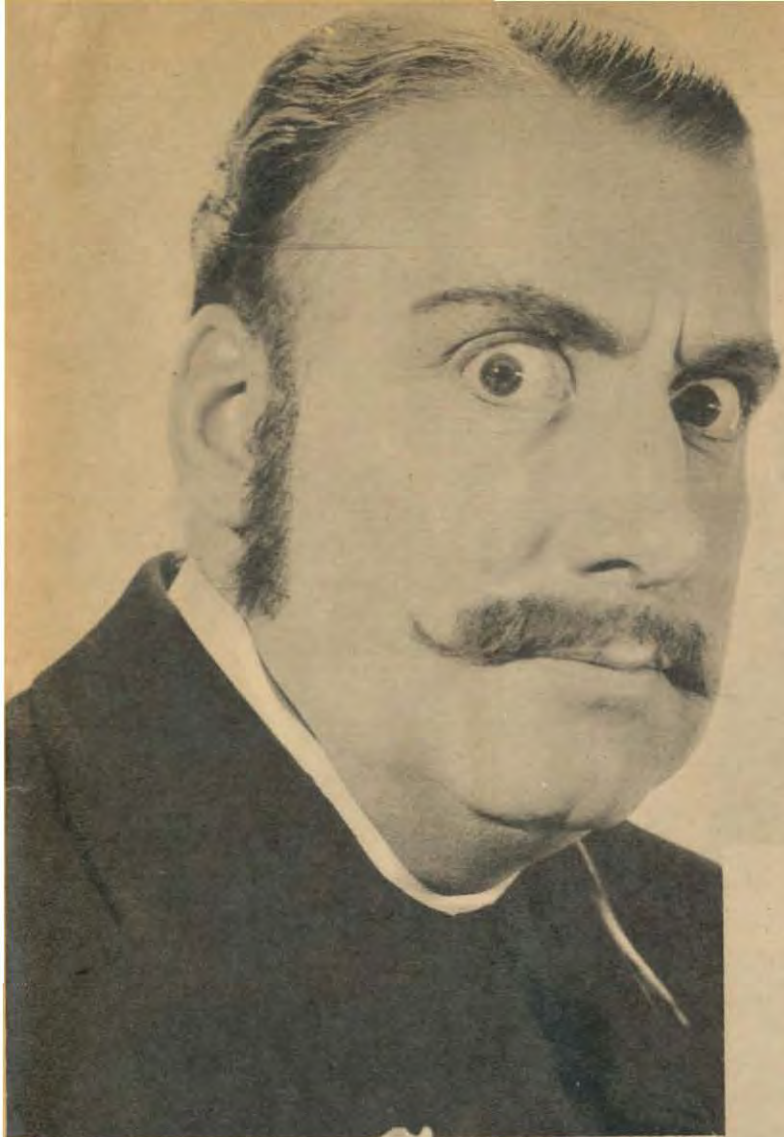
LOVERS of the written exploits of John Paul Jones, Stephen Decatur and Admiral Perry, and those who have liked the newly released "The Sea Hawk," will be bound to find the War of 1812 sea-fighting and hand-to-hand cutlass combats of "Captain Caution" thrilling entertainment.

Louise Platt comes into her own as the star and daughter of the captain of the square-rigged trader, the *Olive Branch*. Victor Mature, as first mate of the ship and suitor for her hand, advances his career several notches with A-1 stripped-to-the-waist fighting scenes in which his powerful physique will be salve to the feminine box-office. Bruce Cabot, as the slippery villain Slade, makes a better than strong comeback for acting honors. 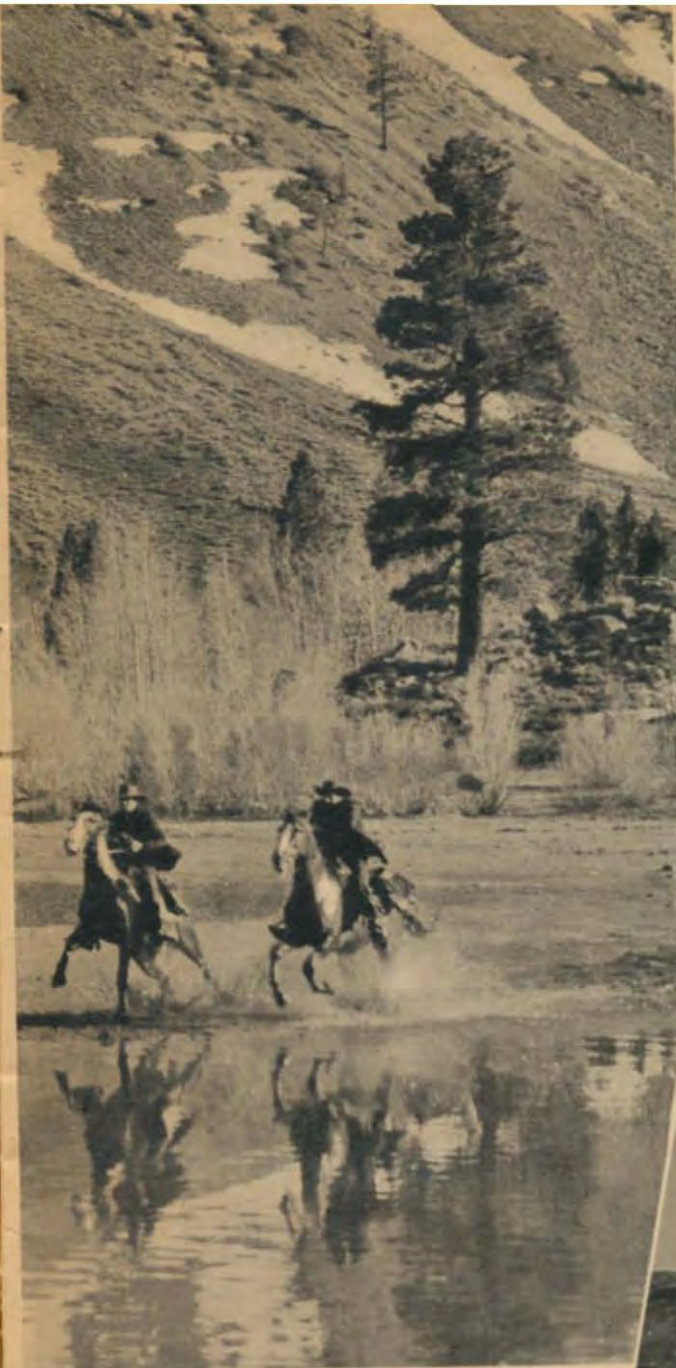

IF YOU see an abacus or a zither, a stuffed ptarmigan or an 1860 locomotive in a movie, you may be sure the needle-in-a-haystack department was responsible for finding the article and delivering it on time to the studio sound-stage. It's Hollywood tradition that the propman never says "no" to any request. He creates weather, cooks food, cures headaches and makes blood run. It's all in the day's work.

Costumes are handled by the wardrobe department, but if a costume has to catch on a thorn and tear, or look dusty and worn, then it comes under the heading of Props. Food is handled by the commissary, but all food on the set which is photographed is from Props. Some actors are on a diet. Some won't eat meat. For the non-meateaters, Props fixes lamb chops made of candy. (Fudge and almond paste. They're good, too.)

Remember in "Alias the Deacon," when Big Boy Williams played a tough pugilist and had to take a bite out of a baseball? Despite his grimaces before the camera, he rather enjoyed the experience. Props had made a baseball with a cocoanut center and white-fudge covering, tastily tinted with life-like vegetable coloring. Just a big bonbon, that's all!

Take the matter of blood. Each propman has his own formula for this substance of life. Over at 20th Century-Fox they like carmine and glycerine. The chief of props at Goldwyn won't tell what he uses. Says it's his own secret mixture. You may be sure, however, that it isn't the real thing. Real blood dries up at once under the hot lights. Beet juice serves in many

instances. Recently at Universal, while making "House of Seven Gables," the actors rebelled when they were asked to take a mouthful of beet juice to portray death from a hemorrhage of the throat. The property man substituted chocolate syrup, and the actors "died" happily.

Don't envy actors who eat ice cream endlessly for a banquet scene. It's only mashed potatoes. If the scene is a distant shot, the ice cream is a tasty concoction of plaster of Paris, delicately colored.

You can find all manner of edibles in the prop-shop of every studio, and each one can stand years of hard wear, only needing a paint job once in a while. Racks of lemon pies. Huge cakes. Tempting hors-d'oeuvres. But not a taste in a carload.

OUT at Hal Roach studios, one female bit player didn't eat meat—but she was supposed to grab a leg of roast animal and tear into it for a scene in "1,000,000 B. C." Props took care of her difficulty by making her a leg of roast pig cunningly molded of macaroni paste. The girl ate it wolfishly,

and everybody was happy about the whole thing.

When the hero gets his mouth stuffed with cotton wadding or waste, he experiences very little real discomfort. The wadding is cotton candy, the kind you buy at Coney Island, and it melts in his mouth.

When Blondie washes dishes in a scene for the popular "Blondie" series, she dips her hands in a lather composed of cold water and whipped cream. Reason: Real lather dries up at once under strong lights.

Whipped cream is a propman's stand-by. It makes swell lather for horses which supposedly have been ridden hard and long. It is grand for mad dogs that foam it at the mouth. All barber-shop scenes use it for shaving-cream. In hair-washing scenes, like the one in "Green Hell" when Joan Bennett makes a lather on her dark tresses, the shampoo is whipped cream. So, next time you top your strawberry shortcake with whipped cream, treat it with respect. Hollywood could hardly make a picture without it.

Candy is another valuable adjunct

to the propman's box of tricks. Clear sugar candy, molded into the form of a wine glass, is used in instances where the actor, under emotional strain, crushes the glass in his bare hand. (Candy won't cut.) Similarly, the vase that is cracked over the comedian's head is often the work of a confectioner.

Ever hear of an "edible fog"? Most fog-scenes are created by blowing finely vaporized vegetable or mineral oil into the air of the sound-stage. In order to make the fog more bearable to the nose, oil of wintergreen is added for sensitive stars' nostrils. By wetting the walls of the sound-stage, this kind of fog can be controlled up to any height, depending on how far up the watermark goes. Fog clings to wet places.

Cornflakes are probably ordered in greater quantity than any other food product used in the Hollywood movie mills. Many carloads arrive at studios where snow scenes are to be enacted. Only requisite—the flakes must be *untoasted!* Hence a good blizzard on the scene is just so many tons of breakfast blowing around. The sound of snow crunching underfoot cannot be obtained from the snowflake flurry, so Props dumps several bags of salt on the stage—and there's your necessary sound-effect. Studios used to use powdered marble for this, but it's dangerous if it flies into your eyes, so it's seldom used any more.

When Bette Davis, in "Elizabeth and Essex," broke the mirror that reflected her aging face she was in no danger from flying particles of glass. That mirror was candy, coated with bright varnish.

Propmen love to make spiderwebs, and their works of art would make any self-respecting spider green with envy. Rubber cement, blown from a spray-gun, can turn a cheerful room into a haunted old castle with webs in all the corners. Remember those spiderwebs that Bob Hope and Paulette Goddard dodged in "The Ghost Breakers"? They were spun by that old spider, the propman, and aged with powderings of gray-colored fullers' earth.

In "The Thief of Bagdad," soon to be released, you'll see Sabu, the little Indian boy, battling with a monstrous spider on a huge web. Props made the web out of white rope and tastefully sprayed it with spun glue and rubber cement. The spider is moved with wires and is as big as a washtub. The scene is guaranteed to give you nightmares.

Insects are the propman's real trouble. He not only has to make 'em—he has to find 'em!

Paramount needed 250 cockroaches for "North West Mounted Police." (Don't ask me why!) So Props painfully gathered the required number and put them in a box. When he returned hours later, he discovered that only *half* of the roaches remained. Had Props studied his natural history, he would have remembered that cockroaches are *cannibals*, hence one-half had eaten the rest.

THOUSANDS of big red ants caused havoc with the 20th Century-Fox company while scenes were being filmed for "Brigham Young" at Big Bear, California. Ants were needed for a particular scene, so the property department spent days trapping them by sinking glass jars in the ground along "ant highways" where the varmints could fall into them. No sooner had the scene started than Tyrone Power and Linda Darnell, seated near the prop ant-hills, began squirming and ruined the "take." A few seconds later and the camera crew was doing the

SECRETS IN THE SKY

Our secret weapon against Hitler's business blitzkrieg to the south: What is it?

What are the citizens of South America thinking about? Their governments met in Havana to plan a united front against Hitlerism, but what does the ordinary fellow in the street think? Uncle Sam knows. He knows because our seventeen short-wave stations beamed on South America have brought a flood of answers. Their content augurs well for the battle we must fight.—Editor.

IN MIDST of the clamor for planes, tanks, ships and guns it will sound like something out of Benny and Allen to say that the United States is armed to the hilt with microphones. No humor is intended. It is one of the solemn and deeply important facts of our national preparedness.

As Europe has proved dramatically, radio is the fourth arm of a nation's fighting forces. Its short waves whispering in a soldier's home can be as demoralizing as enemy bombs against his battle-line. It goes ahead of the armies by weeks, months and years to pave the way. It is the long, strong arm of propaganda.

Whatever else is lacking, in this branch of warfare America is full-girded and ready to fight. Although few Americans are aware, fourteen government-licensed American short-

wave stations are in operation. Scattered from Boston to Miami, from New York to San Francisco, they uphold American democracy to the world a total of more than one hundred broadcasting hours each day. All were required by Washington on July 1 to lay plans to step their power up to 50,000 watts, a move as significant in its way as an order for 50,000 fighting planes.

Our special stake in this war of propaganda (the American broadcasters use such euphemisms as "Good Neighbor Service") is nothing less than all of Latin America. If and when Hitler and Mussolini shall have wrecked the British Empire, these vast, rich lands under the Southern Cross are next on their war maps. Informed men, including some of our most realistic industrialists with plenty at risk, doubt that any actual invasion will be attempted. Invasion is quite unnecessary; huge German and Italian populations are already entrenched. It will be a war of business agents, not of guns, according to this belief, and it has already begun.

Long before the European war opened, German and Italian short-wave stations—chiefly the German stations—were beguiling the Latin-Americans with open attacks on deca-

dent democracy, Gringo dollar diplomacy, Yankee imperialism. Since his victory on the ancient battlefields of Europe, Hitler has redoubled the aggression in this hemisphere. The new German activity, rife from the Rio Grande down to Cape Horn, has been highlighted in the round-up of a dozen Nazi agents in Uruguay in June, and more recent reports that the Argentine is considering an offer to barter its surplus pastoral products for German planes and guns, the latter to be accompanied, of course, by German technicians.

THE business blitzkrieg is on, and the issue is plain. By barter, subsidy, threat, and every device known to a dictator, Hitler hopes to strangle American trade in the Latin republics, draw the entire southern continent into his own economic orbit, and destroy completely the solidarity with which North and South America planned to resist Nazi, Fascist and Communist penetration into this hemisphere.

In this odd sort of war our short-wave stations are not only our main fighting force; they are also our secret service. To them each week come thousands of letters from listeners all over the world, each letter telling

something between the lines. The National Broadcasting Company, operating stations WRCA and WNBI, received forty thousand letters from eighty-three countries, protectorates and territories in 1939; this year the mail has piled up at double that rate.

A good half of the NBC mail comes from Latin America. This, obviously, is the most important correspondence, a voluntary Gallup poll showing what the neighbors to the south really think of us and how the fight is going. But let that pass for a moment. In a war it is wise to know first what the other side is thinking and doing. What has our short-wave secret service discovered about Germany and Italy?

Well, for one thing, there are apparently quite a number of Germans who are doing their own thinking and who are determined to know more than they can learn from the controlled Nazi press and radio. NBC beams an hour of German each day, including the latest news of the world. Until the Nazi government made it a crime to listen to any foreign broadcast, NBC was receiving from two hundred to three hundred letters a month from German listeners. In January and February, 1939, just before Hitler issued his first warning against listening, more letters were re-

ceived from Germany than from any other country in Europe, Great Britain included. In April, 1939, Hitler decreed two and a half years in prison for anyone who repeated anything heard by short wave, death for anyone who printed such information. That failed to keep the Germans away from their sets, for NBC received 117 German letters in July and 127 in August of that year. War was declared in August and the next month Hitler increased the penalties to two and a half years for merely listening and death for repeating anything thus heard. Since then the German mailbag has shrunk to a vacuum.

Several hundred letters a month from a nation of 60,000,000 persons will not seem to mean much, until you make a comparison. NBC beams an hour each day to France and there were no listening restrictions in France in 1939. The French wrote 1263 letters that year; the Germans, with all the curbs put upon them, wrote 1225—sufficient indication that thousands, and perhaps hundreds of thousands, of Germans were listening then, and probably still are.

The letters the Germans wrote, when they still dared to write them, were guarded in tone and are not worth quoting except for this one

which was smuggled out: "Most Germans listen to foreign reports and not to those here. We are just as uninformed as in the Middle Ages, even with newspapers. The impudence with which they lie is unbelievable." Germany can be seen only through a glass, darkly, but when we turn to the other end of the Axis there is a ray of light. Hitler and Mussolini were plainly not eye to eye during the long, slow months that built up to the lightning Nazi thrust against Holland, Belgium and France. There were no short-wave restrictions in Italy. Italians were allowed to listen to anything they could catch. Some of the Italian letters received in New York are footnotes to history:

From Varese—"Always war and more war. When will this scourge cease?"

From Montella—"Your broadcast is particularly approved by us Italians because it effects that collaboration which is the basis of civilized people."

From Seprio-Mozzate—"The news broadcasts are extraordinarily authoritative as to their sources and free from any partiality."

person, would make one ashamed of himself."

The prize Italian letter came this May from a high Fascist official seated in Addis Ababa to help govern the conquered Ethiopians. Addis Ababa is apparently a capital worth while avoiding. "I am awfully pleased to hear your voice at my radio," writes the forlorn general, "so that you are a friend to whom I come every night about twenty-three o'clock of this time. I may say that your emissions are heard here wonderfully well and that your voice clings so sweet and friendly. Will you please say in your next emission that I shall be pleased to get in connection with young lady of about 35/8 years on purpose of exchanging stamps and friendship?"

On behalf of international good-will NBC asks that the general's name be withheld. And, alas, there will be no more of such gallant intimacy. On July 11, following first contact of the British and Italian fleets, which London described as "The Mediterranean Boat Race," Il Duce took a lesson from Hitler. He edicted that no Italian could list to the serpent short-waves evermore.

Now, what is Latin America thinking? Latin America is our biggest foreign market, and when things are settled in Europe may be our only one.

IN 1938 we supplied 33.9 percent of all of the Latin-American imports. Germany had jumped its hold from 10.8 percent in 1929 to 16.2 percent in 1938. Hitler's aim, as stated earlier, is to drive us out completely. Whether he can do it or not depends, of course, on how well American business can compete on a price basis. But there are deeper considerations. In the world we live in today ideology has become a part of international economics.

That may sound like pretty deep talk and far removed from radio, but radio, oddly enough, is at the heart of it. The German short waves are controlled by the government, and with them, the long, subtle arm that reaches right into a man's hearthside, Hitler is trying to sell all German industry and the entire Nazi way of life. Here in the United States radio is privately owned and operated, and the government has allowed industries and business firms to sponsor international programs pretty much as they sponsor them on our own domestic networks. Thus, in this busi-

ness blitzkrieg, American business is free to do its own punching. Hold tight. It's the Directory of Directors against Funny Mustache.

THUS far the results have been hilarious. Standard Oil had reason to believe itself amiably hated by Latin-Americans, especially those of Mexican persuasion. With some trepidation, the oil octopus sponsored the first fight between Joe Louis and Chile's Arturo Godoy last February. Something more than twenty thousand letters flowed in from Latin America, and Standard Oil is still trying to survive the fact that each letter was one of praise, as for example these from Mexico: "I hereby wish to convey my most sincere congratulations to the Standard Oil Company of New Jersey," and "I wish to congratulate the Standard Oil Company and other products which exalt that company." More than ten thousand persons stood in Central Park in Havana to listen to that broadcast, and Adam Hats was quick to catch the point. Adam Hats has signed up to sponsor all fights promoted by Mike Jacobs during the next twelve months. Thus, we have not the American army and navy saving the Western Hemisphere but a bunch of Madison Square stumblebums. And what has Hitler to offer in opposition? Tanks and planes will not do in this kind of a total war, and Max Schmeling is washed up.

As for the rest, see what you can read into the following typical letters from south of the border:

Peru (Lima)—"Please send me a photograph of the Statue of Liberty." Ecuador (Quito)—"Your voice makes me think of a faraway land where I would like to live today. Let us believe that there is a world where life can be beautiful and carefree, even if only for a moment."

Chile (Talca)—"I listen to your news bulletin every evening; in my estimation it is the only true news service in the whole world."

Colombia (Giradot)—"The Spanish hour rates highly because of its culture and propagation of friendship between all Latin-American countries and the United States, a nation which only a few years ago we doubted and feared."

Cuba (Havana)—"We wish to inform you that before the afternoon papers came out we heard on your powerful station the Spanish version of the speech by the President of the

THE first time Kate Smith sang "God Bless America" on the air millions of listeners felt the hair ripple up the backs of their necks and glorious gooseflesh tingle over their spines. It was one of those rare peaks of emotional experience peculiar to radio.

Irving Berlin, who wrote the song, wasn't satisfied with his work. Ted Collins, Kate Smith's manager, at first considered it a one-time piece of showmanship. Kate herself was afraid she'd just be accused again of flag-waving.

But the people who heard it knew it for what it was and took it to their hearts. Here was a song of songs.

"God Bless America!"

It was the pulse-beat of a freedom-conscious people; and now all America is singing it with ringing voices and rapt faces. It's a new unofficial national anthem, perhaps one of the greatest of all song hits. Therein lies a truly amazing story—amazing not only for why and how it happened but amazing, too, that it could happen at all so electrically, so expansively.

It is something wonderful that a Russian-born tunesmith of Tin Pan Alley, a radio songbird with a sentimental heart, and a nation newly aware of its place as a sanctuary of democracy should all become suddenly, simultaneously tuned to the same key and strike a chord that would echo beyond their own control, borne on the waves of circumstance. It's almost a miracle, even for radio. There's a hint of destiny in it all.

It might have been fate that kept the song on the shelf for twenty-one years. It's really that old. It was first conceived by Irving Berlin back in 1917, while he was in training at Camp Upton, Yaphank, L. I. Fortunately for today, the song didn't get beyond a pigeon-hole. America was then fired with the ideal of a war to end war. The nation wanted not songs of home and peace but stirring songs of action. "God Bless America" had to wait for another time.

The time came and history was almost repeated. Not quite. There were war clouds abroad, but America was staying clear. Irving Berlin was in Europe at the time that Chamberlain and Daladier bowed to Hitler at Munich in the fall of 1938, and he saw the makings of World War II. He came back to the United States soon afterward with a heartfelt urge to write a great song for America—a song that would be a national prayer of gratitude and supplication.

"You have to have been in Europe to know how wonderful America is," says the song-writer who was born Isidore Baline in a little town in south Russia fifty-two years ago but who has lived most of those years in America as a naturalized citizen.

Casting about for a theme suitable to his purpose, Berlin remembered the song he had filed away twenty-one years before. He dragged it out of a pile of discarded manuscripts, polished it up, and then began to wonder what to do with it. He was hesitant, because he didn't want to be accused of cashing in on Americanism.

Here fate showed its hand again. Kate Smith and Ted Collins, her manager, were looking for a special song for Kate to introduce on the CBS "Kate Smith Hour" November 10 in honor of Armistice Day. There is some public confusion about whether Berlin made the suggestion to Collins or vice versa. But Berlin himself in an interview on NBC's "I'm an American" last July 13 said Collins came to him seeking a special tune. In any event, coincidence—backed by our ripeness for a new musical Declaration of Independence—brought Berlin's "God Bless

The Story Behind "GOD BLESS AMERICA"

Shelved for twenty-one years,
now, in a few months, it has
become our new national prayer!

America" and Kate Smith together.

Collins heard the song at Berlin's Seventh Avenue office, and it was decided Kate should hear it. The manuscript was taken to the Smith-Collins offices on Broadway near Columbus Circle. There Kate heard the song for the first time and sang it herself. It sounded like the thing she wanted—a nice, singable, stirring melody. Kate suggested only minor changes in the lyrics and the musical phrasing to suit her style. Then her arranger, Tony Gale, made the original arrangement.

CAME the night of November 10, 1938—the day before Armistice Day; six weeks after the Munich Pact; just a month before the opening of the significant Pan-American Conference at Lima, Peru. The millions of loyal Kate Smith listeners tuned in for the usual enjoyable variety show. It was the usual kind of show until only a few minutes before the close. Then Kate spoke this simple but memorable speech into the CBS Playhouse microphone:

"And now it's going to be my very great privilege to sing for you a song that's never been sung before by anybody. One that was written especially

for me by one of the greatest composers in the music field today. It's something more than a song—I feel it's one of the most beautiful compositions ever written, a song that will never die. The author—Mr. Irving Berlin. The title—'God Bless America.'"

Then she threw back her head and sang it with all her magnificent voice and sentimental heart.

None of the principals had been extremely enthusiastic about it. That's why it was done with a minimum of flourish—which helped. Early the next day, however, things began to happen. Telephone calls, wires and letters started pouring in praising the song and asking for more. So Kate kept singing the song. Between November 10, 1938, and her last broadcast before the summer vacation in 1940 she sang it sixty-one times. She'll be singing it again when her nighttime show comes back in the fall.

The song was originally meant to be done on the air exclusively by Miss Smith. But a song like that transcends business agreements. It becomes public property, in a sense. So permission has been granted for other radio performances. Tony Martin and Andre Kostelanetz' orchestra have done it

three times. Margaret Speaks sang it over the air from the Republican Convention in Philadelphia. It was performed once on "Musical Steelmakers." Kenny Baker received permission for one performance. Such permission is granted by the Collins and Berlin offices if the song is used in a dignified, patriotic manner on a dignified program.

Although radio planted the seed of "God Bless America," the song has sent its roots and branches abroad through many other media. It is being played in thousands of schools and public concerts, is even included as a "must" on some concert programs. It was played at both Republican and Democratic national conventions and almost stole the show from both Willkie and Roosevelt. Its words have been inserted in the Congressional Record as a gesture of honor. Innumerable by-products have sprung up—"God Bless America" banners, buttons, framed mottoes, fireworks displays.

The song has been recorded once—by Kate Smith and Jack Miller's band for RCA-Victor. The record is a very popular item on the phonographs in restaurants and taverns—where they used to cry over "Sweet Adeline."

The sheet music, since it was published in December, 1938, has climbed to the number one spot among best sellers.

Both the Smith-Collins and the Berlin offices disclaim any desire to profit financially from the phenomenon. Berlin has established a trust fund for all profits, which are to be used for patriotic purposes among the youth of America, especially the Girl Scouts and Boy Scouts. These organizations were selected for special grants because "the completely nonsectarian work of the Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts is calculated to best promote unity of mind and patriotism, two sentiments that are inherent in the song itself."

NO SONG has ever flamed into our country's consciousness more spectacularly than "God Bless America." "The Star-Spangled Banner," to be sure, electrified a young nation, and it is still our supreme song of proud triumph. But it was over a century before it was officially proclaimed our national anthem in 1931! Stephen Foster's genius is only now fully appreciated. The minstrel songs had to spread by horse-drawn and steamboat travel from town to town to make their hits. Later smash tunes like "Let Me Call You Sweetheart" got around a little faster and farther by phonograph and higher-pressure sheet-selling.

"God Bless America"—in spite of the cries of "phony Americanism," "mawkish sentiment," and "flag-waving" from a few radicals and super-realists—seems to be a song of destiny. Now more than ever. Free France has fallen. Hitler looks to Great Britain—and beyond. The Americas are linking hands for democracy. Our own government builds planes and ships and plans to conscript and train fighting men. The nation is alert and confident of its ability to withstand any onslaught, yet hopeful of a continuation of peace. We need a song that combines words of peace and homeland with a tune of marching vigor—a song to inspire a crusade for unity and strength.

That seems to be the place of "God Bless America." The paints and the canvas were ready. Fate made a few bold strokes with its brush, and remarkably the pattern took shape and color. That's the amazing story of "God Bless America."

A story that has only begun.

She wrote the song in memory of her late husband and took it over to Tommy Dorsey for him to give it the once-over. Tommy had it played and liked the tune so much he had it published by his own music firm. With the cooperation of all his bandleader friends, Tommy has put the song right at the head of the list of current pop tunes, which is making Tommy and Miss Lowe smile—aplenty.

T. Dorsey, incidentally, is giving the amateur song-writers a break, which is really something if he can do it. He has inaugurated a series of weekly contests on his NBC program every Saturday afternoon from 5 to 6 EDT. If you want to submit a song, write to Tommy at the Astor Hotel in New York City for an application blank. Warning: Do not send in your song before filling in the blank!

Benny Goodman is out of the Mayo Clinic and has been recuperating from his recent operation. He's going to be busy for the next couple of weeks organizing a new band. Most of his crew stayed in California, some of them joining up with Artie Shaw. Lionel Hampton has had a desire to form his own band for some time, which he expects to do now that he is free. Goodman and his new band are expected to get going the latter part of this month.

Abe Lyman and his orchestra opened at the Bon-Air country club right outside of Chicago. When he got in town, Abe asked some of his friends to suggest a place for him to live that wouldn't be too far away from the club, but the first consideration was "it should be very quiet." There was only one hotel within miles of Chicago, so that's where the bandleader moved in. He returned from work that night at four in the dawn and it was one of the West's hottest nights. Abe claims it took him at least two hours to fall asleep and then he was awakened by a baby crying in the next apartment. No sooner had he fallen asleep again than he was awakened by the shooting of guns at Fort Sheridan, where the soldiers were practising maneuvers. That was as much as he could stand. He got dressed, packed his bags and moved to a hotel in Chicago.

Bandoings

Horace Heidt and his crew are on their way to California to make their "Pot o' Gold" movie. We saw Horace while he was at the Edgewater Beach Hotel and noticed a considerable change when we first laid eyes on him. He's been on a diet ever since he signed to make the picture and had dropped twenty-two pounds. . . . Hollywood is building a new dance hall to be called the "Palladium." Tommy Dorsey will be the first bandleader to open the place on October 1. Tommy

is going to play at the Canadian Exposition in Toronto, which will be held August 29-September 7, as will Eddy Duchin and Sammy Kaye. . . . Glenn Miller pocketed \$4,000 for one night when he played to seven thousand dancers in Kansas City on July 27. . . . Jimmy Lunceford is back at the Casa Manana in Culver City, Calif., and will try to break his own record established last year. He is heard twice weekly over CBS. . . . Gray Gordon won the court battle brought on by another bandleader who claimed prior rights to the use of "Tic Toc" music.

Jack Palmer, formerly with the Harry James crew, has switched his vocal-instrumental work to the Larry Clinton band. . . . Charlie Barnet's vocalist, Harriet Clark, is quite an eye-ful, and nobody appreciates it more than Charlie himself, so the gossips say. . . . Edythe Wright, formerly with Tommy Dorsey, is on the road tour with Barnet to help out on the vocalizing side. . . . You won't be seeing Paul Whiteman with his band outside of New York any more. He's through with the road and is going to stay in the big city. . . . Louise Tobin, who sings with Will Bradley's band, is Mrs. Harry James, the same gal who used to warble for Benny Goodman.

Latest addition to the Bob Crosby band is the "Bob-O-Links" quartet, comprising three boys and a girl, whom he hired while playing in Detroit. Bob and his crew are broadcasting from Santa Catalina Island.

TOMMY DORSEY—"And So Do I" (Victor 26660, \$0.75)—A composition by Eddie DeLange, Paul Mann and Stephen Weiss, played by the Dorsey band in medium sweet tempo. Connie Haines does the vocalizing. An ideal arrangement for the T. Dorsey style of music-making.

KENNY BAKER—"A Pretty Girl Is Like a Melody" (Victor 26664, \$0.75)—An Irving Berlin tune of yesteryear, given a new lease on life by the fine tenor voice of Kenny Baker. David Broekman conducts the orchestra which accompanies the Baker tenorizing. This new recording of the still popular Berlin tune will no doubt be a standard item for some time to come.

GLENN MILLER—"Angel Child" (Bluebird B-10796, \$0.35)—Another recording of a tune that was a favorite years ago. Arrangements are exclusively "Miller," in medium sweet-swing tempo, with sax choir and the trombone quartet taking over the instrumental spots.

The Farmers Take a Wife

Meet the bride, Sophronia, on the "Barn Dance" Saturday

THERE'LL be a big time in the hayloft this Saturday night. Sophronia will see to that! She'll be making her radio debut, and the four men who made her what she is today will introduce her with appropriate ceremonies to the NBC "National Barn Dance" audience.

Never did anyone come out as Sophronia will come out. When Brenda Frazier and Cobina Wright, Jr., made their society debuts, they didn't even have bells on their toes. But Sophronia!—she'll have not only bells but also blocks, horns and pie-pans draped a la *Vogue* about her torso. That's a triumph for the common class, for Sophronia is just a plain washboard dressed up. It's also a triumph for the single standard, for our heroine was once considered neuter and now she's the acme of musical femininity.

The Hoosier Hot Shots, who make novelty music on assorted instruments, including the all-important washboard, didn't give Sophronia this break just out of the chivalry in their hearts. These four sons of the midwestern soil are realists; and there's quite a business factor in the rise of the inanimate musical fixture to female-name billing.

The story goes back to 1930, when four young fellows from back home in Indiana decided to pool their musical talents and the rhythm in their bones and try to make more than just an

enjoyable hobby out of their caper-cutting music. Charles "Gabe" Ward could make a clarinet do anything but sell tickets. Frank Kettering slapped happy rhythm from a bass fiddle. Kenneth Trietsch was right "in there" with banjo, guitar or tuba. His brother, Paul "Hezzie" Trietsch, could contribute two novelty music-makers (which were later to become famous trade-marks)—a toy slide whistle and a washboard on which he rubbed rhythm with thimbles on his fingers, augmented by auto-horns and other down-to-earth articles. The combination seemed to fit together, and thus the professional Hoosier Hot Shots came into being.

They were a versatile foursome and they were headed places from the start. But they soon ran into a real problem. It didn't stop them, but it certainly had them puzzled over how to solve it or hurdle it. It popped up with regularity that would discourage anyone less stubborn than a Hoosier.

Theater owners said, "Get a girl in your act and we'll give you top billing." Newspaper editors said, "Sorry, boys, but we can't run that picture. If there was a girl in it—"

To put it coldly, they were up against a clear case of lack of sex-appeal. It's not that they're woman-haters. They're all married and have families. It's just that they couldn't figure out how a girl would fit into

the act, and they couldn't find the right girl. They tried and kept trying. They held hundreds of auditions. They found plenty of singers, plenty of eye-appealing singers, but none with the exact Hoosier Hot Shots touch.

Ten years have passed since the Hot Shots got together. They have come a long way in public favor, in spite of their girllessness. They're radio fixtures now, favorites of the "National Barn Dance" and transcription shows. They just recently made a movie with Gene Autry, "In Old Monterey." Gabe Ward has built a fine home out of his share of their recording royalties. They're in constant demand all over the country for personal appearances. Of course they're happy. Yet there has been a fly in the ointment.

PEOPLE still say, "Boy! if you fellows had a girl in your act—." That's what has had their goat—till Hezzie had his brainstorm . . .

Sophronia!
They had been looking everywhere for a girl partner, and here, right under their noses all the time, was the answer. The Hot Shots have always spoken of the washboard as "she," in much the same way that ships are spoken of. They've always called "her" Sophronia in an off-hand way.

When Hezzie got his inspiration, it seemed at first too much like a Frankensteinian experiment to create a girl

made to order for their act out of a common washboard. But he told his partners about it, and the more they thought about it the more it seemed to be the solution to their problem.

They changed Sophronia's voice—actually put bells and horns with higher pitch on the washboard. They dressed her up in style from head to foot. And the forgotten woman of the act was ready for her big chance.

The Hot Shots wouldn't deny it's a show stunt—dolling up the washboard in feminine attire. But the whole thing is really more than a gag. The Hot Shots are satisfied that they have extricated from under their hides the thorn that has been pricking them for ten years. If they haven't been able to add real sex appeal to their act, they have at least added a burlesque of it, knowing that satire quite often gets more attention than reality.

For complete triumph the Hot Shots anxiously await only the public reception of Sophronia's debut. Sophronia of course has no feeling in the matter. She'll simply do her best Saturday night when Hezzie tickles her corrugated ribs with his thimbles and trust to the public whim to give her a hand.

NBC-RCA SELLS UNITED STATES TO THE WORLD

WHILE European short-wave stations work on a twenty-four-hour basis turning out war-propaganda news for world consumption, our own international stations are also providing a world radio service but of a different sort. Our own programs for reception in foreign countries include unbiased newscasts, talks on timely subjects, eye-witness accounts of major sporting-events, broadcasts of opera and symphonic concerts and dance music by name bands.

Outstanding among our international stations are twin transmitters WRCA and WNBI, which are operated by the Radio Corporation of America and the National Broadcasting Company. Uninterrupted short-wave broadcasting by RCA-NBC was begun from the United States to the rest of the world in 1928. During the next decade, interest in short-wave reception and the number of short-wave stations on the air had increased to such a tremendous extent that RCA-NBC felt it was time to expand its program service. In July of 1937 a completely reorganized and expanded short-wave service that included programs sixteen hours a day and in six languages was officially inaugurated. Now, with the entire world depending upon us for unbiased news as well as for "laughs" and entertainment to relieve the strain of living under war conditions, NBC once again has moved to meet this demand by increasing the power of its two transmitters to 50,000 watts each. The extensive system of beam aerials, which now serve European and Latin-American audiences, are also being further improved.

The International Division of NBC, which now consists of a staff of more than forty men and women headed by capable Guy C. Hickok, has just moved to larger quarters in Radio City. This group plans, prepares copy for and directs all international programs broadcast by WRCA and WNBI. That these programs are popular with foreign listeners may be judged from the fact that more than forty thousand letters were received in 1939 from listeners in eighty-two countries. This year more than sixty thousand letters are expected. The whole south wall of the International Division

offices is covered by hundreds of photographs of listeners, thousands of envelopes bearing strange and interesting stamps, and many other curios—even the footprints signature of a favorite dog—which all bear testimony to the tremendous listener interest in these programs.

The RCA-NBC stations are not only received with loud signal-strength in Latin America and Europe, territories to which they are specifically beamed, but they are also well heard throughout the major portions of the United States, and provide many interesting programs for our own English, Spanish, Portuguese, German, French and Italian listeners.

jitterbug. It turned out that after being cooped up for two days, the ants were really hungry. They made for the nearest lunch, which happened to be Tyrone and Linda. Props was yelled for and ant barriers were built around the ant-hills so that the scene could go on.

Sometimes it isn't getting insects—it's keeping them away! During the making of Deanna Durbin's new picture, "Spring Parade," there's a scene in a cake-shop. Nobody loves a bit of cake more than Deanna, and she furtively nibbled on a luscious pastry while waiting to start emoting. Props caught her at it and looked very horrified.

"DID you eat some of that pastry?" he asked.

"Yes," admitted Deanna, surprised. "Didn't it taste—funny?" queried Props.

Deanna frowned. "Well—it tasted different," she said thoughtfully. "Why?"

Props sighed. "I sprayed everything on this set with fly-spray," he told her. "And besides—that pastry is two weeks old!"

Deanna hasn't eaten a bite of prop food since.

Animals are props unless they are actors. If that puzzles you, here's the answer. Jiggs, the trained chimpanzee that acted with Dorothy Lamour in "Typhoon," is an actor. He receives good money for his work and is treated like a star. But birds and animals used in scenes as part of the surroundings are under the care of Props. He gets 'em, feeds 'em, and sees that they don't kill one another or him.

Laurel and Hardy have their own propman, who used to be assistant to a magician. He's called Bob. The other day he was faced with the slight problem of creating a rope palatable to a goat. There's a scene in the new Laurel and Hardy picture wherein a goat eats the rope that tethers him. A goat's gustatory quirks aren't as silly as generally believed. Contrary to the Sunday comic strips, a goat will turn up its nose at tomato-cans and freshly laundered shirts. Bob didn't worry long, though. A succulent grass rope nicely coated with light chocolate was devised. The goat ate the rope so fast that Bob was kept busy making new ones for retakes of the scene. Altogether, the animal gorged about one hundred feet before the scene was pronounced okay.

SPEAKING of goats reminds one of tin cans, and that, in turn, recalls the horrible job Props had during the filming of "Grapes of Wrath," when ten thousand tin cans of assorted shapes and sizes and ages had to be garnered from the Los Angeles dump-heaps to "dress" the set of the migratory town where the Joad family lived. Eight truck-crews raided the city dumps for two weeks, sorting the cans out of the refuse. The cans were put through a chemical dip to guard against any disease that flies or mosquitos might carry, then stacked until a heap twenty-five feet high marked the edge of the shanty town. Afterward? They were carefully carted back to the city dump.

Or take rags. No studio has really dirty rags handy because they would be unhealthy for the actors to wear. But in "Hunchback of Notre Dame"

hundreds of extras had to dress in what appeared to be filthy, ragged clothes. The costume department made the clothes out of burlap and patches, then they were run through wringers and machines that tore and ripped them artistically. After that, Props dusted them liberally with colored fullers' earth and rubbed grease-paint on them for that much-desired filthy look. Result—two hundred of the most unsavory ruffians ever to face a camera.

Out at 20th Century-Fox they've just finished a thriller called "The Return of Frank James." It's a sort of sequel to "Jesse James." The propman on this picture had to be a railroad man as well. An ancient locomotive had been rented from the Sierra Railway for use on location, nearly sixty miles from Modesto in California's central valley. While waiting for the train to steam up for the shot, the director turned to Henry Fonda.

"Do you think that's enough steam?" Fonda shook his head. "It would look better if we could have more," he replied.

But old No. 18 engine couldn't deliver another puff, so the well-known trouble yell sounded on the air.

"Hey—Props!" In two hours, Props had made a trip into Modesto on a handcar and returned with fifty pounds of dry ice. A box was rigged inside the locomotive's side exhaust and the ice sprinkled around.

When the engineer opened the valve, the exhaust steam blew over the dry ice, causing a dense, smoky cloud of steamy vapor to issue from the exhaust-pipe.

"MAGNIFICENT!" chorused the director and cast.

Even the soundman was delighted with the effect. As for the locomotive engineer—who was no actor but the real thing—he still hasn't recovered from what they did to No. 18!

Perhaps the most difficult props to find for pictures at present are those needed for pictures such as "The Man I Married," "The Mortal Storm" and "Storm Trooper." These films deal with the Nazi regime in Germany, and it is difficult to secure articles of furniture in use in every-day life in the Germany of today. Props, however, contacted German refugees in Los Angeles and rented from them household articles they had salvaged from their homes over there. In several cases Props was even able to find pieces of furniture and utensils made of the new ersatz materials. The tough problem was with German newspapers. None could be found of recent date because it is impossible to get them from Germany, and the anti-Nazi attitude of these pictures precludes any help from Nazi officials in this country. Props fixed it by having the studio newspaper-press copy the mastheads and formats of German papers and print them with headlines of recent date.

Only one present-day German gas-mask could be found in Hollywood, and many were needed for the pictures shooting, so the propmen of the different studios loaned the one mask around and copied it, turning them out in exact replica by the hundred. Special molds had to be made to cast the main headpiece, which is of rubber, as well as the metal attachments. An air-raid would not catch Hollywood nap-

Mr. John Nolan, Buffalo, N. Y.—GLADYS SWARTHOUT, mezzo soprano, was born in Deepwater, Missouri, December 25, 1904. She was graduated from Central High School, Kansas City, Missouri, in 1920; was a student at the Bush Conservatory of Music, Chicago, from 1920-23. Her vocal studies began when she was twelve. During the following year she was giving a recital in her home town of Deepwater and failed to negotiate a high note in a difficult aria. To the astonishment of everybody, she turned around on the platform and demanded of her teacher, who was accompanying her, that they start over. On the second attempt Gladys sang the high note so truly that the moment she paused to take breath the audience broke into applause. Members of a wealthy Kansas City family who happened to be present offered to finance the little Swarthout girl's musical education after the recital was over. Their aid was accepted for several years and repaid by Miss Swarthout early in her professional career. She went on to study at the Bush Conservatory, and while there she was extremely active professionally. She sang in fashionable suburban churches and in the city's larger theaters controlled by Balaban and Katz. Miss Swarthout had not thought seriously of essaying opera, but friends prevailed upon her to seek an audition with the Chicago Civic Opera Company. Without knowing one complete role, she obtained an audition and was accepted. After a summer in Europe and three seasons with the Ravinia Opera Company in this country, she sought an audition with the Metropolitan Opera Company, was accepted, made her debut during the season of 1929-1930 and appeared in fifty-six performances, topping all her associate artists in the total number of appearances. Miss Swarthout was married to Harry Richmond Kern, who

died in 1931. She is now married to Frank Chapman, Jr. Miss Swarthout is five feet four inches tall, weighs 118 pounds, has dark-brown hair.

Mrs. Franklin Roosen, Omaha, Nebr.—YVETTE's real name is ELSA HARRIS and she comes from Birmingham, Ala.

Miss Jewelle Carper, Rochester, N. Y.—Although French in appearance Arnold Moss was born in Brooklyn of French-German parents. He received his academic schooling there but attended the College of the City of New York in Manhattan. He graduated in 1927 with honors. During his college days Arnold wrote considerable light verse which appeared, together with illustrations also from his pen, in the college comic publication. The milestone that marked the end of his college life was not, however, passed at that time. He remained at C. C. N. Y. for an additional year and a half as an instructor. Arnold then felt a sudden urge to see Paris. With three telephone calls—one to resign his position, one a wrong number and one to book passage—arrangements were made and he sailed for Europe. He spent eight months living in Paris and various French provinces. Returning to America, Moss joined Eva Le Gallienne's Civic Repertory Theater as a student-actor. At first the minor roles fell to his lot . . . at the end of the season Eva Le Gallienne asked him to remain with her company for the following year. That year he appeared in "Living Corpse," "Romeo and Juliet," "Good Hope" and "Martine," which was his own adaptation and translation of a modern French play. He played the leading male role opposite Estelle Scheer. The following summer Moss was visiting in Cleveland. He applied for an audition at WTAM for the purpose of presenting a series of poetic readings, but before he had time to present his program ideas he was signed as an announcer. He did not long remain in Cleveland, as he

was due in New York for the fall season of the Civic Repertory Theater. In the spring of 1931 Moss once again went to European shores, spending six months in the Basque provinces of southern France and northern Spain. Returning to New York in November, he again began broadcasting, this time for CBS. Since then he has appeared on both NBC and CBS as announcer and actor. In appearance Arnold Moss is dark and his face is distinguished by exceptionally large eyes. He is five feet ten inches in height. Wears double-breasted dark suits and conservative cravats. He speaks French as perfectly as English and Spanish almost as well. His hobby is translating foreign plays into English. Hates football. Would rather see one bullfight than a hundred ball games.

Miss Mary Keith Lake, Germantown, Tenn.—FRANK MUNN, once known as Paul Oliver, was born February 27, 1895, in New York City, the son of a New York policeman. His mother died when he was little more than a week old, and the rearing of the future tenor was left in the hands of his grandmother and his father. It was while working on his first job as shuttle-boy in an embroidery factory at three dollars a week that Munn decided singing was a lot more fun than watching for empty bobbins. His family and friends encouraged this penchant, and Frank became a student under Dudley Buck in New York. By the time he was twenty-five Munn had made his debut over a New Jersey station and had received an offer to make recordings. Mike fright was secondary to the uncontrollable quaking he experienced when he sang for his first record. Once he had gained self-confidence, Frank was in constant demand for recordings. Radio as the next step was natural. In 1926, early days of network broadcasting, Frank teamed with Virginia Rea, and under the names of Olive Palmer and Paul Oliver they made one of the most popular vocal combinations on the air. Frank likes golf and fishing. He prefers the seashore and country to the city, likes to cook goulash. Football is Frank's favorite recreation. He weighs 220 pounds, is five feet seven and one-half inches tall.

ping today, not if they yelled for the propman.

At RKO they were shooting a scene in a hay-field for the picture "Little Men." Kay Francis was in the scene, and Kay is allergic to hay. Props saved her sinus by sprinkling the hay liberally with perfume, and Kay went through her scenes serenely, unmarred by fits of sneezing which would have ruined the dialog.

IT'S impossible to mention Props without once again referring to Laurel and Hardy. These two funsters shoot "on the cuff." In other words, they think up their bits of action and gags as they go along. Nobody, not even they themselves, know what is going to happen next. All this keeps their propman on his toes. He never is sure when he will have to produce a break-away automobile or a rabbit with six legs.

Just the other day Stan and Ollie thought up a swell gag which consisted of eating a triple-threat banana. They conceived a banana-within-a-banana-within-a-banana! Gag was to peel the fruit and find encased another banana. And another one again within the second banana. In the end, the final banana contains—nothing. The idea was explained to Props, and within a half-hour every fruit-stand and market in Culver City was cleaned out of bananas. This was in order to find bananas of exactly the same shape and grading down delicately in size so as to work out the telescopic business. It was a major task. After working with twelve dozen bananas, Props pronounced success. By that time, of course, the ingenious Laurel and Hardy team had thought up another swell gag to follow on the heels of that one.

This was a delayed-match gag—a match that would only flare a few seconds after striking it. This was done by wiring the match.

As we left the set, Props was busy turning a kitchen into chaos by using the "reversia" idea. Gadgets which do opposite from what they are supposed to do. His masterpiece was the stove, whose burners blazed when the wrong handle turned. Light a match to the front right burner and the left rear one flames. Never a dull moment with Laurel and Hardy—especially for their propman.

EVER see any studio prop money? There's a rule that Uncle Sam's currency can't be photographed, so not only stage money but hundreds of good old Confederate bills can be found in prop departments. Even some of Pancho Villa's worthless money fills the prop safes. Most studios print their own bills with pictures, believe it or not, of character actors in place of the customary portraits found on bills. Around the edge of Paramount's stage money is printed "this money is worthless," in fine type as a border. Rather startling, too, as they look just like real greenbacks.

All in all, Props is a combination animal-trainer, magician, lost-and-found department and manufacturer all rolled into one. Most women could use him around the house for a day or so. Maybe he could find a light-bulb to fit in that tricky porch lantern. Maybe he could even get the electric cigarette lighter to work.

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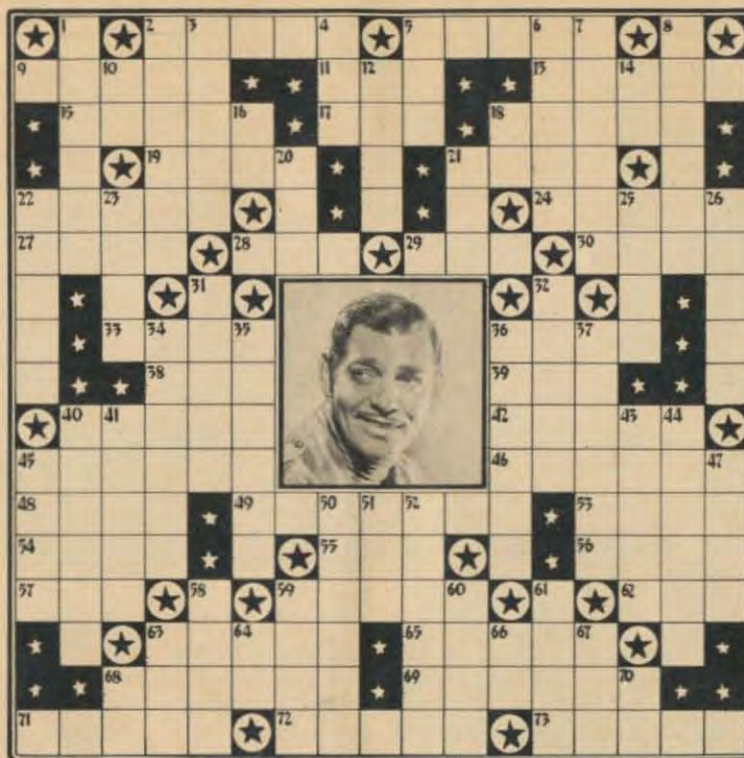

United States of America, our dear (sic) Roosevelt."

Brazil (Marcelino Ramos)—"I get London, Berlin and Moscow quite well, but your station comes in stronger and clearer. Recently I was seated in a park in a distant city in the evening. I noticed people grouping around a loudspeaker in the middle of the park. I soon learned the reason. They were awaiting the news from Radio City."

Brazil (Paramalido)—"The old man, my father, enjoys the broadcast one hundred percent and is at the receiver every day listening, and during that time not even a check for \$100 would get him away from his radio."

Chile (Punta Arenas)—"Greetings from this southernmost city in the world. Your news bulletin I consider far superior to those of England and Germany."

Paraguay (Puerto Guarani)—"Democracies will never like a war because they want to find happiness for all through peace and justice. It is important that your nation, great through progress and liberty, strong through justice and liberty, give adequate support to the other democracies of the world in order to placate the irresponsible regimes."

Dominica (Ciudad Trujillo)—"I was particularly interested in the transmission of President Roosevelt's speech addressing the world in general, and Hitler and Mussolini in particular, in an effort to maintain peace in this world."

Argentina (Mendoza)—"You must increase the power of your stations, which would be a great factor in opposing the detestable Nazi and Fascist propaganda."

Haiti (Jacmel)—"Compliments on your news report. Its impartiality and its objectivity inspire confidence in us here because you do not indulge in propaganda, do not preach any ideology, do not defend any cause."

Mexico (Rio Blanco)—"As a constant listener to your powerful station I heard today the first program of your new series called 'Life in the United States.' This program will be of great importance to us Spanish-Americans, who have no opportunity to become well acquainted with your great country. Instead we just learn to hate it, from the beginning of childhood, for reasons too ridiculous to mention, as the present policy of the United States is not even a shadow of what it used to be."

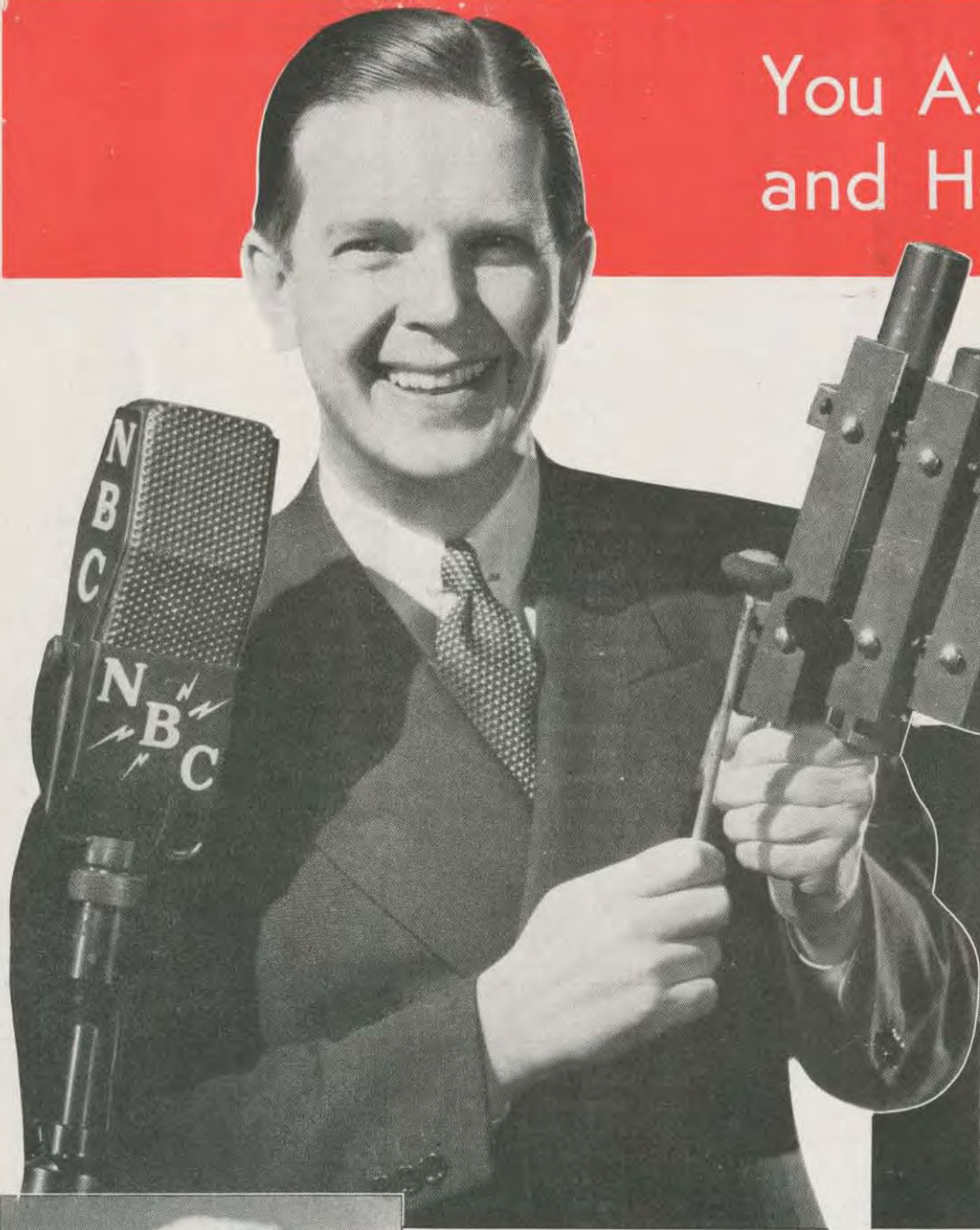

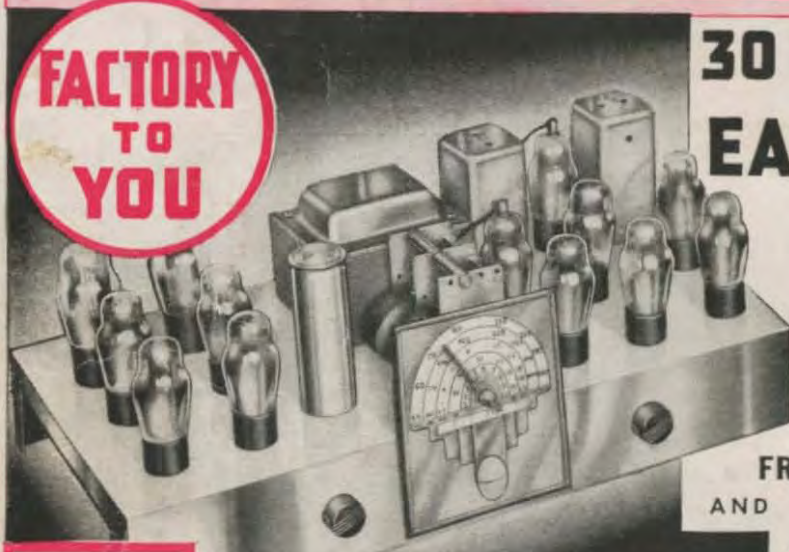
