"This Precious Freedom" Gets on the Air After a Struggle

THIS is the story behind the broadcast which many of you heard on Friday, October 11. It was called "This Precious Freedom."

Arch Oboler wrote the play and arranged for Raymond Massey to be its star. He submitted his completed manuscript in advance to NBC. Word came back that the play could not be broadcast. It was too frightening. It might cause panic. With that complaint Mr. Oboler and his sponsors had to quarrel.

They contended that this was a play designed to arouse our civic and military somnambulists to reveal with the scalpel-edge of stark drama the menace to our liberties.

In short, here were two honest but opposed viewpoints.

Now the important thing to us is that neither party placed a chip on its shoulder, daring the other to knock it off. But each got to work on a compromise. The Oboler script told of a man coming back from a vacation in the Canadian Wilds. He had been a good businessman and a good citizen, but for one month he had been out of touch with life. In his absence a new dictator government had risen. What had happened in Norway and Holland and Belgium had happened here.

NBC felt that such a play criticized our own government's preparedness efforts. Oboler sent his play to Washington, and the Army Intelligence Division approved it. The play had a fifth-column army overthrowing our government in Washington. That might have damaged certain racial groups within our borders. Oboler changed it, had an army come from across the ocean. The original introductory line was "This is a situation . . . that we hope will never happen here." They changed that to "That can NEVER happen here."

So "This Precious Freedom" went on the air, with Raymond Massey giving his best air performance to date. We hope every fat cat in the land heard it. We hope its message stung them out of their complacency.

We need messages like that, and we need more of the spirit of cooperation which makes such broadcasts possible. We tell this story of behind the scenes because people so often raise the cry of network censorship. Usually it is a lie. Network censorship consists of attempting to give to us listeners the best programs in the world in a way calculated to be of the greatest benefit to the greatest number of persons. The open-mindedness of both NBC and Arch Oboler

in the case of "This Precious Freedom" is proof enough.

TOM MIX is dead, but his memory will remain in the minds of three generations, a bright fantasmagoria of adventure, romance, and blood-tingling swashbuckling. He was killed October 12 on the Arizona desert when his car turned turtle. Mix was born in Pennsylvania, son of an Irish captain of the U. S. 7th Cavalry, his mother was of Scotch and Cherokee Indian blood. He went to VMI, served in the Spanish-American war, the Boxer Rebellion, Africa, and the Philippines. At the height of his screen career, he was paid \$10,000 a week plus a bonus for each picture he made. He never drank or smoked. His famous horse, Tony, who is now thirty-five years old, survives him. The night of Tom Mix' death, Bill Stern put an interesting story on the air. He said Mix had always carried a lucky penny. It had been given to him by his father. Last week he lost it. Advertisements and inquiries failed to find it. Investigators who went to the scene of Mix' wrecked automobile searched the ground for clues to the cause of the wreck. Half-hidden in the dirt, they came upon the lucky penny. Either it had slipped from his pocket and fallen into the bottom of the car, or he had lost it at that crossroads during a recent previous trip.

Tom Mix is dead, but he leaves us memories that are rich with his example of clean, vigorous living.

HURRAH for the producers of "Thief of Bagdad" and "Little Bit of Heaven." Each is a great piece of entertainment. Neither has in it a drinking scene.

THE GIRL ON THE COVER. Charming assistant professor to Kay Kyser, amiable educator of radio's "College of Musical Knowledge," is Ginny Simms. Her flashing personality and her nice singing voice have been important factors in the musical quizmaster's success. In fact, his success has been hers, too. That applies to all of Kay's orchestral activities. When crowds of enthusiastic dancers applaud—as they do for no other dispensers of dance music—they're applauding Kay AND Ginny. When "College of Musical Knowledge" went on the air, Ginny did her part in creating the air of horseplay and informality which made it a hit. Ginny also shares Kay Kyser's success in films, first making "That's Right, You're Wrong" with him, and soon to be seen in a second, "You'll Find Out." Both are RKO pictures. Ginny began life as Virginia Helen Simms in San Antonio, Texas, but spent most of her girlhood in California. As a Fresno State College coed, she did her first singing with two schoolmates, with whom she quit school to form a "Triad in Blue." It was in Chicago, however, that Ginny got her job with Kay Kyser and rose to fame with him at the band-making Blackhawk Restaurant. Miss Simms has blue eyes and light-brown hair. REDSKIN *and* REDCOAT

EDWARD G. ROBINSON'S *Double Life*

The roles he has played have left no mark upon Robinson the actor, but they've influenced the life of Edward G. Robinson the man!

EDDIE ROBINSON, who with his current portrayal in "A Dispatch From Reuter's" has definitely stepped into Muni's shoes as the chief character actor of the Warner Bros. lot, is thinking seriously of growing his beard permanently. That's because Eddie wants to stick to such roles exclusively, and so he's going around these days not only with hirsute thoughts in his head but with homicide in his heart. Even before Reuter it was a far cry indeed from Little Caesar's tommy-gun to Dr. Ehrlich's magic bullets, and in Eddie's estimation at least the microscope is infinitely mightier than the shoulder-holster. So Eddie wants to bump off, once and for good, the guy who brought him all his breaks.

It isn't that Eddie is ungrateful, but he does feel that he shouldn't have to continue his career any longer with a gangster straddling his shoulders.

The truth is that Eddie believes he's now beyond all those melodramatics and he has his eyes focused longingly upon an Oscar or two. After all, they would go very well with his gallery of old masters—and he didn't have any old masters when he first came to Hollywood.

The Edward G. Robinson of those days is almost as different from the Edward G. Robinson of today as is Little Caesar himself from Dr. Ehrlich. And yet, by a curious anomaly, each is inseparably a part and an outgrowth of the other, and intermingled with both is a dash of radio's Steve Wilson. It is usually said that an actor creates the characterizations he portrays, but it is just as true that when an actor consistently portrays certain characterizations they inevitably help to create the psychology of the actor. That is what has happened, in a large sense, to Edward G. Robinson. He is by no means the same man this year as he was even last year, and still, while he turns the pages of a scientific book which Dr. Ehrlich might peruse, he nevertheless puffs one of Little Caesar's cigars.

Those cigars, by the way, considerably antedate Little Caesar himself. Eddie began smoking them during his student days at Columbia University, where he took his M. A., and he graduated to cigars because most of the students smoked pipes and Eddie, even then, wanted to be different. He averages four an hour, lights one the in-

stant he wakes up and snuffs one out the last thing before he goes to bed.

Eddie didn't desert the pipe altogether, however, and is almost as proud of his collection of over three hundred meerschaums, calabashes, etc., as of his Van Goghs and Gauguins. Among his collection, Eddie has pipes ranging all the way from the huge porcelain stein-like affairs of his native Roumania, which look as though they would hold a quart of beer, to little carved ebony ones from China that will take no more than a pinch of tobacco. His own favorite is a long, clay churchwarden, such as Mr. Pickwick might have smoked in the London taverns.

Eddie would have fitted in pretty well with that literary tavern crowd, at that. Boswell and Johnson and all the rest of them would have been the joy of his heart. For Eddie dearly loves academic discussions. His library is the biggest, and he has read every book in it.

There's the story about the technical director who went to the Huntington library—world-famous for its collection of original manuscripts, etc.—for certain information on a period picture. He couldn't find the data he was looking for at all.

"I GUESS," said his assistant after they had searched and searched, "we'll have to go to Eddie Robinson's."

Now that the war has overshadowed practically all other things, the plight of children who are bombed out of their homes has become almost an obsession of Eddie's. In addition to opening his art gallery to the public for the benefit of the Red Cross and appearing at benefits for war sufferers, Eddie has sent literally box-loads of clothing and food to British refugees for children. He is sympathetic for the grown-ups too, but they don't move him like the kids. Perhaps that's why, when he buys a newspaper, Eddie invariably gives the newsboy a dollar.

For practically all other purchases he counts his change. Eddie Robinson will cheerfully pay a king's ransom for a painting, nevertheless he's no spendthrift. He believes that, in addition to the connoisseur's delight he gets from them, good pictures are a good investment.

"Take a good look at that one," he remarked once to a friend he was

showing through his gallery. "The guy who painted it starved to death but it's enough in itself to prevent me ever doing likewise."

That's another of Eddie's near-obsessions. No matter how much money he accumulates he can never quite lose the actor's fear of insecurity in his old age. He knows how close the calls can be and what little foibles of fate make all the difference between affluence and poverty.

There was, for instance, Eddie's own initial experience in Hollywood, which takes this story back to Little Caesar and shows how narrowly the world might have missed Little Caesar altogether.

Eddie's original cinematic gangster debut, as a matter of fact, wasn't in "Little Caesar" at all but in a now mercifully forgotten epic entitled "Deadlines at Dawn," starring Joseph Schildkraut and Barbara Kent. Eddie had come to Los Angeles in "The Racket" on the legitimate stage, and he was almost heartbroken when Howard Hughes bought the play and made it as a picture with the late Louis Wolheim in the role which Robinson created on the stage. Wolheim, though a former college professor and a superb actor—his Kat in "All Quiet on the Western Front" remains one of the classics of the screen—was a plug-ugly rather than a suave racketeer. Eddie Robinson was passed over because he hadn't a picture name.

So Eddie, deprived of his own vehicle, did "Deadlines at Dawn" and registered a complete miss. He was practically broke and about to ship his trunk back to Broadway when a call came from Warners' for him to make a test in Little Caesar.

THEREBY hangs a tale, for the test director wanted to pattern Little Caesar after Louis Wolheim's characterization in "The Racket"—a long-shoreman in evening dress. Eddie Robinson bucked.

"I'll show you what a real racketeer actually looks and acts like," he said. He left the stage and came back as the public has since learned to know him: nattily tailored overcoat, jaunty fedora hat, even the spats. That, it might be said, is when gangster films were born, and since then the characterization which he created has become a part of Eddie himself. He has at least a dozen overcoats, all of that velvet

collar, form-fitting type. He has at least twenty hats and all of them, except for his evening toppers, pulled down slightly over the right eye. And the spats have become as much a part of him as his socks.

It was Eddie who originated that now swank little trick of leaving the last button of his vest unbuttoned. He had eaten a pretty heavy dinner one evening, unbuttoned the button, and chanced to look at himself in a glass. The button remained always unbuttoned after that, and at first Hollywood, then New York, and finally London copied it.

Eddie had a lot to do with popularizing double-breasted suits, too. When he first started to wear them in his pictures, single-breasted coats were greatly in the majority, but soon they were passe. Eddie found that he could reach for a shoulder-holster much more conveniently with a double-breasted jacket, and it seemed to hide the gun bulge more effectively, too. The then Prince of Wales, subsequently Edward VIII, took up the double-breasted type and the tailors had a Roman holiday. Not that the Prince of Wales packed a gat, of course, but Little Caesar did all of that.

Walking along the boulevard, even as he is today, Eddie could easily be, and almost always is, recognized as Little Caesar. Little Caesar has become a part of him. Now Eddie doesn't like that and wants to be recognized in the Dr. Ehrlich and Paul Julius Reuter characterizations instead. Hardly to the point where he'll go around wearing those old-fashioned clothes though, for Eddie is above all things a natty dresser. But he's apt to blossom forth in a Van Dyke and one of those beribboned *pince-nez* like Paul Muni wore in "Zola" almost any day. Or even in a pearl-gray topper like Muni's present boss, Darryl Zanuck, wore upon his last visit to England. Eddie has a pearl-gray "bowler" already, but he wants one more outstanding role before he wears it. When in New York, but not out on the Coast, he carries a cane.

Eddie's home life is almost ideally happy. His wife, the former Gladys Lloyd, who retired as an actress when she married Eddie, shares not only all his tastes in the arts but herself has a flair for writing. She contributes regularly to a Beverly Hills magazine.

One of their greatest pleasures is the cozy little buffet suppers which they give to a select few—for all his success, there is nothing ornate or ostentatious about Eddie's entertaining—and the same guests come most of the time. Eddie, incidentally, likes to eat and is as much a connoisseur of good food as of good music, literature and pictures. The Robinsons always have a season box at the Hollywood Bowl concerts and really enjoy music of the heavier sort.

HE IS very definitely concerned about world and social problems and particularly about his fellows who are less privileged than he. His was one of the most emphatic voices to be lifted in Hollywood when the critical battle was raging over "Grapes of Wrath," and he greatly deplored the plight of the dust-bowlers which the novel so emphatically brought out. Characteristically, he did something about it, and what he did was characteristic of him. He found a little boy and a little girl who were living with an uncle and aunt in a migratory camp, and established a trust fund to take them clear through boarding-school.

Sure, Edward G. Robinson is a bit positive at times. There are those in Hollywood who call him a social climber, perhaps because they can't crash his intimate set. He's sometimes "hard to handle" and wants things done his own way. His opinions are emphatic, particularly as they relate to his work. But all in all Little Caesar is a pretty human sort of a guy. He visualizes himself as a great actor, and so the gangsters that have been so good to him get in his hair. In striving to attain the heights, it would be ridiculous to say that he doesn't see in Paul Muni's absence from the same lot a swell break for himself. Now, he hopes, he will get away from Little Caesar.

In all probability, Eddie will frankly refuse ever to gird on his gun again. In that respect he is frankly envious of Paul Muni. For Muni, you see, never was Little Caesar. And Eddie's afraid that, do what he will, he'll never live him down.

HOLLYWOOD UNDER FIRE

A target for both deserved and undeserved attacks, the film capital will always survive!

With this instalment, Mr. Baskette concludes a survey of the long series of attacks which Hollywood has withstood during its spectacular rise. Written in the light of the latest charge, now disproved, that the film capital is a hotbed of Communism, it is the record of Hollywood's continuing struggle to retain the good name to which its achievements entitle it.—Editor.

THE Nineteen-Twenties marked the official passing of the old, giddy, gilded Hollywood.

New fashions raged as wilted ones were tossed aside. New stars replaced fading lights in the movie heavens. Boom-town Hollywood had no reason to beware the present or fear the future. Only minor ripples marred the placid surface of the Hollywood goldfish bowl. Around the midriff of the decade the mysterious death of movie magnate Thomas Ince aboard his yacht started whispers. Mildred Harris' divorce suit against Chaplin banded Hollywood's good name about pretty roughly for a while, with intriguing domestic implications. Outside of the perennial damnations for slot-machine divorces, anti-Prohibition parties and gargantuan salaries, however, Hollywood got along very well.

There was no cloud in the southern California sky above Hollywood.

But beyond the blue horizon an inquisitive Congressman named Martin Dies was to paint the town Red with a Communism investigation. Mae West was to glorify the professional shady lady, and the resulting wrath of organized religion was to scare Hollywood within an inch of its life. And a secretive Hollywood executive, Paul Bern, was to marry the platinum beauty, Jean Harlow, and then shoot himself in the most mysterious manner.

Jean Harlow was at the zenith of her career as seductive, sexy Hollywood screen pet when she surprised everyone in Hollywood by marrying Paul Bern in a lavish ceremony at the home of her mother, Mrs. Marino Bello. Bern was twice Jean's age, forty-two to her twenty-one. He was a major executive at M-G-M, Jean's studio, a veteran of eighteen years' success in motion pictures.

Paul Bern presented a \$60,000 home to his blond bride and the happy couple moved in. One evening, two months later, he suggested that Jean spend the night with her mother, Mrs. Bello.

The next morning Paul Bern's body was found shot through the head, a plain case of suicide. A note left for Jean read: "Dearest Dear: Unfortunately this is the only way to make good the frightful wrong I have done and to wipe out my abject humiliation. You understand that last night was only a comedy. Paul."

Perhaps hysterical Jean Harlow Bern understood what the cryptic note meant—but if she did she denied it. Certainly no one else did. Police were mystified and suspicious. Hollywood buzzed with guesses. The stark

honeymoon denouement leaped to the front pages and stayed there as Jean tried to hurl herself over the balcony of her mother's home in wild hysteria.

The subsequent revelation that Paul Bern already had another and secret wife, Dorothy Millette, and Dorothy Millette's suicide shortly afterward, only deepened the mystery. The mysterious suicide of Paul Bern haunted Jean to her grave. Again Hollywood had heard the distant, crackling whip-lash of a public scourging. It was not to feel it, though, until a year later.

The Legion of Decency purity purge of Hollywood, anyone will now admit, was good medicine. It turned out to be what the doctor ordered to rid Hollywood of a moral lethargy into which it had steadily declined.

The background of the Movie Reformation of 1933 is a long story. To coax reluctant box-office quarters out of a busted public, depression-taxed Hollywood had resorted to crime, sensation and sex. Gangsters, public enemies like Dillinger and his blood-stained brotherhood, were being glorified in a rash of screen crime sagas. There was a cycle of going-to-have-a-baby pictures.

Then along came Mae West.

MAE flounced into Hollywood from a flaming background. Her play, "Sex," had been condemned in New York as obscene, and Mae had served a hitch in jail as a result. But Mae caught on in a big way in "Night After Night." Her suggestive wisecracks, "C'm up 'n' see me sometime," and so forth, became national punchlines and passwords. Her street-walker's strut was copied by every cutie in the land. In no time at all Mae was the biggest box-office star Hollywood had. She had glorified a fancy lady and struck it rich.

If Mae West did not actually force the Legion of Decency boycott, certainly she epitomized the Hollywood era of bad taste that brought it about.

That storm descended in April, 1934, when the Legion of Decency was inaugurated by the Catholic Church. Long before there were rumblings. The Most Reverend Amleto Cicognani, Rome's apostolic delegate to the United States, voiced an early challenge to U. S. Catholics to take action against immoral films. Canon William Chase announced that "all three great religions—Catholic, Protestant and Jewish—are unanimous in demands for reform." A delegation of women hissed congressional opposition to the Federal Censorship bill in Washington.



One day Cardinal Dougherty of Philadelphia issued a letter to his flock. "To stay away from them (Hollywood films) is not merely a counsel," wrote the Cardinal, "but a positive command." That week the ushers in Philadelphia movie houses played hop-scotch over the empty seats.

An eleven-point platform of Hollywood self-discipline went into effect at once. Joe Breen, unofficial representative of the church's new purity forces, moved to make the Hays office a powerful censorship clearing-house. Titles, scenarios, still pictures, publicity and advertising ever since have been passed on for decency and good taste. The Hays production code—originally written by a Catholic priest—is now strictly adhered to.

Hollywood took its Legion of Decency drubbing like a little man. And it was one drubbing Hollywood richly deserved.

But Hollywood is bigger now and its audience is more tolerant. A federal investigation for subversive Communism, however, is something else again. It's serious.

Of course, the Red flag had been waved over Hollywood many times before Congressman Martin Dies arrived officially to investigate. Any concentrated artistic colony such as Hollywood, crammed with writers, actors, directors and other experimentally thinking people, is bound to be open to "isms."

Big-salaried stars are perfect "taps" for charity subscriptions, relief donations and such. They are always subscribing to this and that fund, half the time ignorant of just where the money goes. That was revealed a couple of years ago when a number of stars, including—of all people—Shirley Temple, were branded Red sympathizers because some donations traveled indirectly to a Communist-sponsored cause.

The Hollywood Anti-Nazi League has enjoyed a pink reputation for years, and several privately financed organizations now operating in Hollywood to fight German-American bundsters and Nazi propagandists still have a definite radical aura. Certain stars, such as Melvyn Douglas, James Cagney and Fredric March, have long been known as students of liberal politics. Melvyn Douglas, particularly, is active in political work.

But last August, before a Los Angeles grand jury, one John L. Leech, former "chief functionary" for the Communist party in Los Angeles, flatly testified that Lionel Stander, J. Edward Bromberg and James Cagney

were members of the Communist party, that Franchot Tone, Fredric March, Francis Lederer, Humphrey Bogart belonged to Communist "study groups." He accused them all of contributing substantial monthly sums to the Communist cause. Leech advanced similar accusations against Jean Muir, Luise Rainer's husband, playwright Clifford Odets, Hollywood scenarists Marian Spitzer, Tess Slessinger, Buddy Schulberg, Frank Scully, Lester Cole, and directors Fritz Lang, Herbert Biberman and Frank Tuttle—painting a picture of Communism stretching through Hollywood like a wild cancer.

Meanwhile Martin Dies and his investigators headed for Hollywood, hinting ominously, as they had for months, of shocking subversive exposures.

"AND the name of every actor or actress," thundered Dies, "no matter how popular or wealthy, will be announced to the public as cleared or found guilty."

So far, Fredric March, Humphrey Bogart, James Cagney and Melvyn Douglas have been officially cleared by Dies. But not until Humphrey had received hundreds of wires threatening to boycott his pictures. Not until Jimmy flew from his farm in Martha's Vineyard to rescue his Hollywood reputation. Not until Melvyn offered to abandon the picture he was making and devote his valuable days to vindicating himself before the Dies delegation. Not until Freddie March and all the rest appeared in person, submitted their books, witnesses and sworn testimony. Every star accused has issued vigorous, indignant denials, and Francis Lederer threatened to sue for a million dollars. But all this only made the Red hunt in Hollywood more exciting. And Hollywood found itself under fire again.

The smoke has cleared now, mostly. It reveals nothing more terrifying than a town inhabited by citizens whose hearts are uncommonly large and whose emotions have sometimes been exploited by selfish and unpatriotic interests.

Hollywood is no hotbed of radicalism and our stars are not Communists. We know that, even though denials rarely overtake accusations. The most gratifying evidence of the new stature of Hollywood is the fact that no one really expected to find that Jimmy Cagney or Humphrey Bogart was in league with Moscow. In the old days it was different. Every one was suspect, even after being cleared by courts and police.

The new Hollywood produced such pictures as "All This, and Heaven Too," "Rebecca," "Our Town," and "Grapes of Wrath." But it is also the product of those pictures, for only great minds and talents working together could make such pictures, and any town with such minds and talents must survive every sort of attack to continue the worthy work of entertaining and inspiring a nerve-racked world.

Refusing to believe, bravely but fearfully Miss Carroll sent frantic cablegrams to her family in Kent and to official British sources for information. The replies proved the truth of her sister's death. On September 13, the actress had received a letter dated September 2, probably the last message from the deceased, which read: "Dearest Madeleine: Life here in London is one air raid after another. It really is getting a bit much. We have had some rather frightening bombing, and no matter how brave you are, when you hear the planes flying low and then the guns firing your tummy turns to jelly. How peaceful it must be over where you are—no war and no air raids—just warm sun. I will say good-by to you now. Cross your fingers for me! Gigs."

Ray Milland was in receipt this week of a letter giving a graphic account of how his mother, Mrs. Elizabeth Mullane, escaped death during a German bombing raid over Sussex, where she is engaged as the superintendent of a hospital for children. All had hurried to an underground shelter and came through without a single injury. A bomb fell so close that it demolished the dairy of the hospital, several cows, and caused a milk shortage . . . Ida Lupino likewise had word from her family in London saying that their house is one of the two left standing in the block. The message came in the form of a letter from her father, Stanley Lupino, veteran of the English stage, who is air-raid warden for his district. "I haven't shaved for two weeks," he wrote. "I am living in a cellar."

"The Thief of Bagdad"

IN THE mad scramble for amusement to divert audiences from thinking of harrowing conditions of the day, here is the perfect antidote, a picture of purest fantasy and absolute charm. "The Thief of Bagdad" completely entertains for its one hour and forty minutes of running time.

The most spectacular element in this picture is the color photography, which is so startling that even blase Hollywood critics went off the deep end in their acclamation. Each new scene is a marvel of color which, were there no exciting action, would be worth watching. But there is action, and plenty of it, with screenwriters Lajos Biro and Miles Malleon having given us a completely modernized version of the Arabian Nights tales all wound up to perfection for the talented Sabu's delineation of that entrancing and entirely lovable little thief, around whom the story is evolved.

One of the most interesting facts about this picture is that it is so perfectly cast. One couldn't imagine a more likely thief than Sabu; Conrad Veidt as the villainous Jaffar portrays with excellent finesse the cruel pretender to Ahmad's throne; John Justin, as Ahmad, gives an intriguing performance as the romantic interest and the close friend of Abu (played by Sabu). June Duprez makes an enticing impression with her beauty and intelligent interpretation of the sultan's daughter. And Rex Ingram, as the fantastic genie whom Abu releases from a bottle after he has been imprisoned there for thousands of years, is lusty and thrilling.

A comical highlight of the picture is when the magic horse falls to pieces while in full flight over the city. All of the magic is captivating and very well executed, from the smallest effects to the wonder of the flying carpet. Scenic effects are breath-taking. While most of the picture was made in London, a lot of the background was made in the United States, including scenes of the Grand Canyon.

Handsome twenty-one-year-old John Justin has his first film role in "The Thief of Bagdad." A British discovery, he spent three terms at the Royal Academy of Dramatic Art, got his first break in a London production of "Dear Octopus," and was selected from hundreds of candidates for the role of Prince of Bagdad. Justin, a R. A. F. reserve officer, is now in service and has had his share in the bombing raids over Berlin.

At last, Charlie Chaplin and Jack Oakie as the Dictators!

Charlie Chaplin in "The Great Dictator"

TIMES SQUARE the night of October 15 blazed with Klieg lights as the rich and the middle rich, the dowagers and the politicians, the famous and the unknown crowded into the Astor and Capitol Theaters for the double world premiere of the movies' newest sensation, "The Great Dictator," by the movies' oldest sensation, Charlie Chaplin. Charlie was there. And with him came Paulette Goddard, Jack Oakie, Joan Crawford, Douglas Fairbanks, Jr., Meredith Willson and many others from the Hollywood scene. From New York came the little mayor, F. H. La Guardia, Franklin D. Roosevelt, Jr., publisher Roy Howard, novelist Fannie Hurst, society's party-leader Elsa Maxwell, New York Senator Robert Wagner. From England, where Hitler means more than laughs, came Lady Mendl and H. G. Wells. And as Charlie in the role of Hynkel, dictator of Tomainia, burlesqued Hitler for two hours and ten minutes on Broadway, the real Hitler conducted his most destructive raid yet in his aerial war on London. We sat and watched and listened as the film unreeled and we realized that burlesque can often bring home more vividly than high-powered phrases and figures the real story of dictatorship. This film tells such a story.

"Liberty takes a nose-dive," says Charlie as he introduces his story. In the role of Hynkel, dictator of Tomainia, Charlie is surrounded by his minister of propaganda, Garbitsch (played by Henry Daniell), and Field-Marshal Herring (played by Billy Gilbert). Charlie also plays the Jewish barber who is caught in the whirlpool of persecution. Paulette Goddard is that barber's Jewish friend.

As the dictator, Charlie had the audience roaring as he made his speech to the Reichstag. He talks for four minutes in German, ending each sentence with ". . . ung stunk." Calmly the radio English commentator says, "Hynkel has just spoken of the Jewish race."

Magnificent is Jack Oakie's portrayal of Napaloni, dictator of Bacteria—a perfect take-off of Mussolini. Oakie comes to Charlie to sign a treaty. Charlie won't sign until Oakie removes his troops from the Australisch border. Oakie won't remove the troops until Charlie signs. Finally Herr Garbitsch suggests privately to Charlie that he sign and then double-cross Oakie and move on Australisch as the first step in a campaign to become dictator of the world.

As Hitler goes into seclusion before making big decisions, so Charlie goes duck-hunting to decide on the putsch.

In the meanwhile, Charlie, in the role of the Jewish barber, has been thrown into a concentration camp and has just escaped. Guards looking for him run across the duck-hunting dictator, think he is the barber and throw him into prison. The barber, disguised in a German uniform, escapes into Australisch, but at the exact moment the dictator is expected. He is mistaken for the dictator and held in reverence. The putsch is successful and the barber, mistaken for the dictator, is taken on a victory parade. He must speak. Here Chaplin points the moral to his story—that life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness must be the goals of all men. The picture ends on this stirring note of the Jewish barber, mistaken for a tyrant, but rectifying his mistakes.

We heartily recommend this great motion picture.

IF YOU saw "The Underpup," which first brought little Gloria Jean to public attention, you will certainly want to see this, her latest effort and her best to date.

"A Little Bit of Heaven" is somewhat of a sequel to the former picture, except her uncles have increased in number to include such old-time favorites as Noah Beery, Sr., Charlie Ray, Monte Blue, Maurice Costello, Fred Kelsey, William Desmond, Kenneth Harlan, together with Pat O'Malley, Frank Jenks. Altogether, Gloria comes to the screen this time with an even dozen uncles, all of whom received spontaneous applause.

It is obvious that producer Joe Pasternak has set the sails of Gloria Jean along the same course that he used so successfully with Deanna Durbin. The story concerns Gloria's discovery as a singer in a tenement quarter when she comes to the microphone of a man-in-the-street radio broadcast. Despite Grandpa C. Aubrey Smith's endeavors to keep the family's position unimproved and happy, Gloria and her family are lifted from the slums when she is demanded by a radio sponsor, and of course the family goes haywire with its newly acquired wealth. When Gloria observes what her success has done to the family, she takes measures to return all of its members to sanity through the aid of her dozen uncles and a plan she contrives. It works, but to tell how would spoil the picture.

Love-interest is adequately supplied by a most-glamorous-appearing Nan Grey, who plays Gloria's older sister, and Robert Stack, who photographs better with his darkened hair, cast as a radio announcer.

An outstanding performance is rendered by comedian Billy Gilbert in the part of Tony, restaurant owner who in the opening of the picture is the vocal teacher of Gloria. His comedy aids, little Butch and Buddy, are swell too. Hugh Herbert as Gloria's father, and Frank Jenks as her Uncle Dan, supply many laughs, as does Stuart Erwin as Stack's stooge.

By all means, see "A Little Bit of Heaven."

EVER since the first day Cleopatra beaded her eyelashes with warmed black wax and painted her lids with cobalt, and Marc Antony said, "Gee, honey, you look *swell!*" women have put firm faith in make-up as a beauty lure.

African native girls smear rancid butter on their hair and paint their faces yellow. And get their men! The Indian women of the Amazon country paint a scarlet line down their noses and add a gold ring for charm. Persian ladies prefer kohl-rimmed eyes and a red spot on the bridge of the nose. South Sea native girls file their teeth, and Indo-Chinese gals put gold-leaf on their ears. It all adds up to the same thing—beauty!

In case you are laughing at these quaint and primitive customs, just take a quick look at your own scarlet fingernails. (If your toenails aren't painted to match, then you're not a 1940 glamour girl!)

If you scoff at the idea that a curious brew of a tiger's tail, parings from your own fingernails, and two toads, well boiled, won't produce a perfect complexion, just remember that in many places in India this is considered equal to two hours at Elizabeth Arden's salon. Also, just to prove that we're not far from witchcraft of a sort, take a look at the list of ingredients that are needed for the make-up department of any motion-picture studio. Please note that many of these items appear on your own dressing-table.

It takes two hundred different chemicals and substances to fit out a good studio make-up man's working laboratory. Here are a few of them: Yak's hair, mortician's wax, acetone, colloidion, aluminum powder, bronze powder, gold dust, lanolin, animal fats, cochineal, paraffin, mineral oil, mineral pigments, extract of quince seed, slippery-elm bark, orris root and skins of fish. Where's the magic? Well, lanolin is an extract made from sheep's wool. Cochineal is coloring-matter from a tiny bug imported from South America. It's in your lipstick. The bugs are sterilized and chemically pure—still, they're bugs. Quince-seed extract is a basis for wave-lotion. So there's your witch's brew, 1940! Next time you see a newsreel of some ignorant savage with a ring in her nose, just yell out "Hi, sister!"

Since the jungle ladies follow the advices of their favorite medicine-man for beauty advice and love-secrets, let's go to *our own* witch-doctors and get an earful of their formulae for lure-charms. Here are the names and the places where they practise their devilish cunning. Jack Dawn, at M-G-M studios, can be found in a huge office paneled in dark wood. He's a mighty chief out there. Next to his office is a white laboratory and make-up room, lined with tubular white lights and clear mirrors. Jack plies his brushes in this sacred domain and imparts his secret skill on the faces of Hedy Lamarr, Myrna Loy, Greta

Garbo, Jeanette MacDonald, and all the rest of the famous stars that shine under the flag of Leo the Lion. Jack has recently perfected a new third-dimensional make-up. It's a powder base, and two similar bases that are lighter and darker in shade for high-lights and shadows. With this make-up, skilfully applied, short noses can grow longer, long ones shorter, narrow eyes widen and double chins melt into shadows. Just one of the little secrets of a big make-up man.

Out at RKO you'll find Mel Berns in his sanctum, whose walls are covered with pictures of stars past and present who write their thanks to Mel for his skill. Ginger Rogers changed her blond hair to brown at Mel's advice. It was Mel who brought out the beauty of that vivid girl, Lucille Ball. You'll see the result in "Dance, Girl, Dance," her new picture. Like the rest of the big make-up men, Mel says *never* apply lipstick except with a brush. When it's on, blot your lips with a tissue until no lipstick comes off. Then you don't leave telltale smudges on hankies and glass rims. To say nothing of kisses!

AT UNIVERSAL Studios Jack Pierce holds forth in a make-up department that prides itself on beauty *and* its opposite! In one corner of Mr. Pierce's office leers a life-size mask of the Frankenstein monster who is Jack Pierce's own charming child. In the big make-up chair before a wall of mirrors Jack Pierce created not only Frankenstein and his terrifying bride, but the mummy, the Werewolf of London, and the Invisible Man. His beauty sanctum is a chamber of horrors, and no one is prouder of these spine-tingling pets than Mr. Pierce. He has a corner on the goose-pimple market, and the more audiences that cower in delicious terror, the more Jack Pierce rubs his hands with glee and models new ideas for his Stygian brain-children. When the Frankenstein monster was first created, Jack Pierce had to cover Boris Karloff's face with a veil when he walked from the make-up department to the sound-stage, leading Boris by the hand so he wouldn't stumble in his lead-filled size-twenty-four shoes. This was done to save the nerves of visitors on the lot and surprised executives who had not yet made the acquaintance of the Frankenstein monster.

The rest of the studios are taken care of by a brace of brothers who seem to have the make-up business in the palms of their collective hands. The Westmore brothers—and there are five of them—can be found at 20th Century-Fox, Paramount and Warner Bros., as well as in their own salon of beauty on Sunset Boulevard. The head of the House of Westmore is Perc, who creates the excellent characterizations of Bette Davis and Edward G. Robinson and the rest of the Warner Bros. band of stars. While

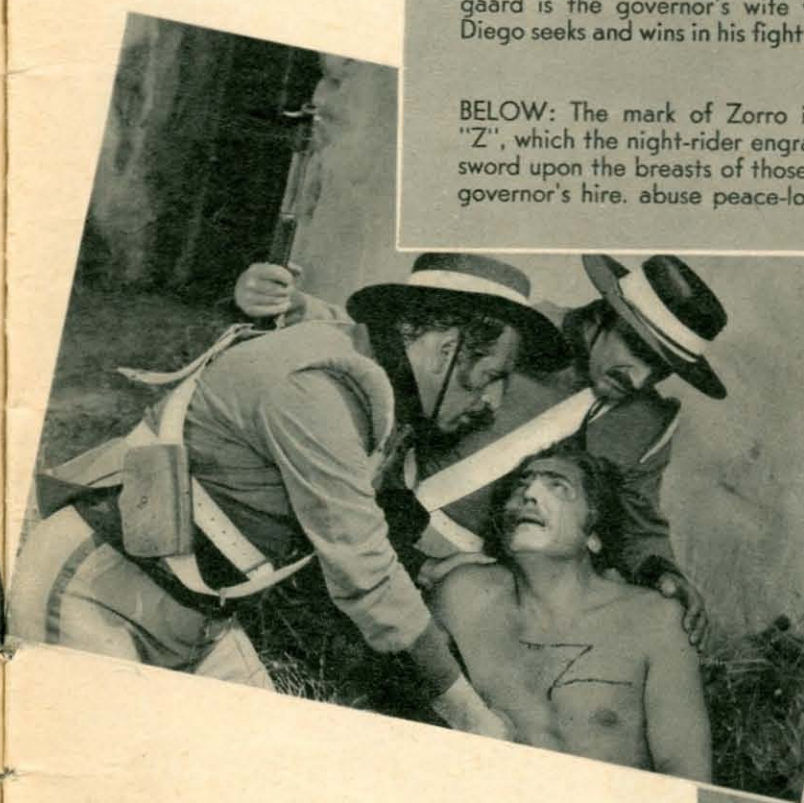

"When a Girl Marries"

BEST problem play on the air is "When a Girl Marries," CBS Monday-through-Friday serial. Here is the story in brief. Sylvia Field (Joan Tetzel) is engaged to Phil Stanley (Michael Fitzmaurice), playboy son of Stanwood's first family. (The town is named for them.) On the night of their engagement party, Joan meets and falls in love with Harry Davis

(John Raby), struggling young attorney who is assisting her father. Mr. and Mrs. Field are separated, and it is against the arrogant Mrs. Field's (Frances Woodbury) wish that Joan breaks her engagement to Phil and marries Harry. On the rebound, Phil marries Joan's best friend, Eve Topping (Irene Winston). All goes well with the young Davises the first year.

Divinely happy, they face and solve the problems of any young newlyweds. Life for the young Stanleys is not so sweet. When Phil constantly points out to Eve that he still loves Joan, their marriage fails. Meanwhile, Harry has become jealous of Joan's wealthy friends, especially of Phil, who is now seeing Joan again. Because Joan fails to understand her husband's point of

view, a barrier comes between their love, and Joan's father, who had been able to solve many of their problems, has been forced to go to California to reclaim his failing health, leaving the young couple to face their greatest problem alone. The problem: "Can two young people with such entirely different social backgrounds as these two find happiness as man and wife?"

the irrepressible Oscar

OSCAR LEVANT doesn't think he's particularly smart, in spite of the fact that he seems to know everything from obscure Bach fugues to the price of candle-wax in Sarawak.

"What do you mean by smart?" he asks querulously, in that knock-the-chip-off-my-shoulder voice which "Information, Please" fans know so well. "An intellectual? Who calls himself an intellectual? I guess anyone who writes a book on economics is automatically an intellectual. I'm not!"

One of the biggest troubles about Oscar Levant is that his mind moves so fast he can't finish talking about one subject before three more burble over into his conversation. Listening to him and his succession of spontaneous quips and adamant observations is like gorging yourself on verbal smorgasbord.

Oscar came into the public eye the hard way, and has lodged there like a large and sometimes irritating cinder. Aside from his omniscience and smart-guy chatter, he's made his mark by a flair for well-timed insults, bright sayings and an undeniable charm that can pull him out of the most impossible situations.

Also—lest we overlook any vital statistics—Mr. Levant is allegedly on chummy terms with some ten thousand musical selections that he can recognize at the drop of an octave. You are free to believe this statement or not, as you wish. After all, there are some limits to credence.

The fact remains, he's a superb musician. Pianists rank him as a fair player but hardly a Paderewski. His scope of musical ability is more amazing. Oscar talks with a Broadway accent that you'd normally expect to find in the mouth of a Times Square taxi-driver. He's written and arranged popular tunes, including movie theme songs. He worships the works of George Gershwin, who was one of his closest friends. Yet symphony orchestras and strict artists who have to brush the hair out of their eyes play Levant's serious compositions with aplomb, applaud solo performances by the gifted Levant fingers.

He's crazy about baseball games, and drinks mediocre coffee in quantities that remind you of a chain-bucket system. Bedtime is usually around 5 a.m. He can tell you facts about Rumanian politics, Chinese history, or who played third base for the Red Sox during 1937.

In other words, you just can't pin this guy Levant down to any definite mental boundaries.

"What I know," he says, "is really superficial." That settles the point.

When Oscar Levant makes a statement, there's no appeal. Only Clifton Fadiman will disagree with him. Oscar is very fond of Fadiman and has great respect for his opinions.

That's unusual, because there apparently aren't many things Oscar has a genuine respect for. But when he does, it's a respect born of sincerity, and a respect that reveals an unusual side to this wise-cracking, pun-making bad boy of "Information, Please" whose sauciness has endeared him to millions.

Oscar Levant is sincere about his music—real music that springs from talent and not from the flimsy fame of popular tunes. He grows oddly somber when talking about international affairs, even to the exclusion of his personal interests. Then, as we have said, there is the immortal Gershwin, whose disciple Oscar is.

If you get analytical about his erudition and ask Levant the usual corny question on where he learned so many things, he'll answer you this way: "I had nothing to do for so long—nothing to do but see pictures, plays, listen to music—that I picked up a lot of information. If I had had a job, I wouldn't have had the time."

To say that he is forward in his social dealings is expressing the situation in generous terms. Oscar will be like a St. Bernard puppy in a one-room apartment when he wants to. For all his mental acumen, the "Information, Please" expert can act up like a spoiled child, and demands constant attention. When he wants to talk, he talks—and you'd better be a good listener. His remarks will be sharp and painful as a paper-cut or bludgeoning as a black-jack, if the inclination hits him. He can take a minor point and quibble it into an international situation.

"I HAVE qualms about my forwardness," he admits, "but have nothing to take its place. I am conscious of that, yet don't know what to do about it."

There is a legend—there are myriad Levant legends—that he makes a point of leaving a valuable book at each of the homes of his best friends. Method in this madness becomes apparent when relations have been strained to the buckling-point. Oscar can then come around at the crucial moment to get his book. By a concentrated blitzkrieg of charm, the situation is usually glossed over and the social status quo restored.

Levant, according to reports, is beginning to accept mundane standards of this world a bit more graciously now that his second marriage, with June Gale, has turned out so success-

fully. He shaves almost every day and combs his hair quite often. From a hotel room that looked like the training-camp of a monsoon, he has graduated to a neat West Fifty-eighth Street apartment and a certain amount of domestic quiet, amidst conventional furniture that Mrs. Levant's own good taste picked out.

His first marriage to a Hollywood chorus girl was hardly a portrait of bliss. "Why didn't we get along?" he asks blandly. "Incompatibility. Besides, I think she hated me . . ."

There is a rumor that Oscar once invited all of his first wife's chorus-girl friends to the Levant menage, then made them sit on the floor, Japanese fashion, while he played Bach fugues on the piano. From all indications, this first sally into the Elysian fields of matrimony was consistently marked by a succession of small explosions, one of the greatest being over the question of how long it takes to boil an egg.

Levant has been virtually catapulted into fame by the double-barreled success of "Information, Please" and his recent best-seller, "A Smattering of Ignorance," which takes high-brow music for a ride around the park in a delightfully impertinent style. He's a trifle lukewarm about the book-review notices he received. "The women seemed to dislike it most," he admits. "The dissenting reviews were consistently women's. I noticed that out in the Midwest the criticisms were severest—even the men out there said I wasn't 'the type of fellow they would like to know.'"

Of course you can't say that Oscar Levant wasn't known before this double phenomena of fame took place. During the past fifteen years Oscar has played jester, stooge, ingenue and general utility wisecracker to a very select coterie of literary, social and theatrical folk that includes such names as the Gershwins, Harpo Marx, Moss Hart, George Kaufman, William S. Paley. Many of his waking hours were spent at a somewhat color-drenched New York establishment known from Times Square to Hollywood and Vine as "Lindy's." It was here that he first exercised the smart-alecky tactics that, by some miracle of public patience, finally burgeoned him into a reputation as a wit. Or, as pudgy Alexander Woollcott puts it, "a wits' wit."

Oscar Levant arrived in New York at the age of fifteen with a suitcase in one hand and not too good an idea of how to make a living in his head. Apparently it didn't matter much, because he landed a job playing piano for a dancing-school that taught little girls the rudiments of the ballet.

"Child's play," Mr. Levant called it.

The next bread-winning assignment of note was as pianist with a certain Mr. Ben Bernie at a fashionable nightclub. There he learned the rather valuable success hint that if you misbehave badly enough people will get to know you.

Shortly after this epochal point in the Levant life, Oscar's path crossed that of a modern genius—George Gershwin. The association has had a strong and inspiring effect on him ever since. Levant became a stanch hanger-on, frequenting the Gershwin household constantly, teaming up in two-piano combinations with the "Rhapsody in Blue" composer during recitals.

IT WAS at Gershwin's ever-crowded home that he met many of the celebrities who were so amused by his antics that they lent a hand to Oscar's climb up the ladder. The ladder led, shortly, to Hollywood, where he began writing movie theme songs and collaborating with Billy Rose on popular numbers.

They still remember Oscar quite well on the West Coast from the repercussions of that 1933 visit. He is reputed to have insulted, either deliberately or inadvertently, everyone of importance in the entire film industry. They loved it.

His second invasion of the film capital took place only recently when he joined forces with Bing Crosby in a cinematic thing called "Rhythm on the River" that is short on plot but long on Crosby crooning. Levant plays the part of a deadpan-dyspeptic, surly secretary of a phony song-writer. Definitely in his element, he makes dry, well-timed cracks, takes a few runs up and down the keyboard and berates everyone within sight. The critics seem to think it was pretty passable, so Oscar can now add Thespianism to his other heterogeneous talents.

What happens when "Information, Please" finally goes off the air—if it ever does—is still a mystery to Levant. "I can't afford any fantasy of indulgence," he declares prettily. "Who can think these days in terms of the future? Besides, my future is unimportant now . . . to hell with that. I'm interested in international affairs. This is a real situation. Even thinking in terms of yourself is selfish."

Levant thinks that John Kieran is probably about the keenest of the regular experts on "Information, Please" when it comes to general knowledge and good memory, "although," he adds with rare tact, "they are all entirely different. I can't say who was the brightest guest expert we ever had. It

would be rude to all the other people who have appeared as guests."

The daily Levant routine is about as topsy-turvy as you might expect. He seldom goes to bed before dawn, and often attends a fight or night baseball game, then comes home and takes his wife to a one a.m. movie along Broadway. Probably a good bit of this sophisticated insomnia stems from the fact that he drinks anywhere from thirty to forty cups of coffee each twenty-four hours. He never touches alcohol, but ranks as an inveterate chain smoker, throwing head waiters and gourmets into shuddering dithers by puffing cigarettes throughout each course of the finest meals.

LEVANT doesn't like to walk, usually takes a cab wherever he goes, never wears a hat, reads the daily paper voraciously. Roosevelt is his choice for President, and he leaves the casual listener no doubt about the matter. Recently he attended a party and was driven home in a sleek limousine, slightly smaller than a Pullman car. All his companions seemed to be wearing Willkie buttons. Levant looked around him, then made a dry crack about how wonderful transportation has been during the Roosevelt regime . . .

His New Deal proclivities make it doubly embarrassing when you bring up that famous episode on "Information, Please" that sent a nation into gales of uncontrolled mirth. "Whose autobiography," asked Clifton Fadiman, "opens with the sentence, 'I was born homely . . .?'"

Levant's paw shot ceilingward with the speed of a skyrocket. "I know," he snapped. "Mrs. Roosevelt."

There was silence—awkward silence—and then a tide of laughter swept from the studio across the continent. Oscar went crimson as a ripe tomato.

(The correct answer, you should know, is Marie Dressler.)

He's still pretty penitent about this colossal boner. "I'd like to make a public apology to Mrs. Roosevelt," pleads Levant. "I have never gotten over that. I've felt so damned guilty. I go for her in a big way—she's my favorite woman."

Maybe, suggested the interviewer, a week-end at the White House would patch things up.

"To hell with that," said the irrepressible Oscar. "I'd just like to meet her . . ."

TO THE tune of their theme song, "Comin' Thro' the Rye," the Lombardo brothers, et al., led by the debonair Guy, have come a long way up the musical ladder since the time they started out together in the old home town of London, Ontario, Canada. The saga of the Lombardos is almost a history of the great upsurge of modern dance music itself, for it was only a year or so before the formation of the Lombardo band that America woke up to find itself dance-crazy. In contrast to the demand for "hot" jazz, however, the Royal Canadians in 1923 were offering smooth, melodious dance music. In the years that have since elapsed, this soft, simple music of the Lombardos has come to be almost a type in itself—the sweet melody, the unusual orchestrations, muffled brasses and slow crooning rhythm readily identifiable. Only occasionally has the band bowed to current music crazes. This year the Royal Canadians are cognizant of the dance public's demand for rumba and conga rhythms. But, by and large, slow-tempo music is still the order of the day.

The Lombardo band today boasts fourteen members, with four of them being Lombardos. Brother Carmen, No. 2 man in the band, plays the saxophone and sings the solo numbers. Carmen also composes, being the author of such hits as "Sweethearts on Parade," "Coquette" and "Footloose." He has been known to send a new composition to brother Guy under a pen name, hugely enjoying the praise the members of the band heaped upon the supposedly absent composer. 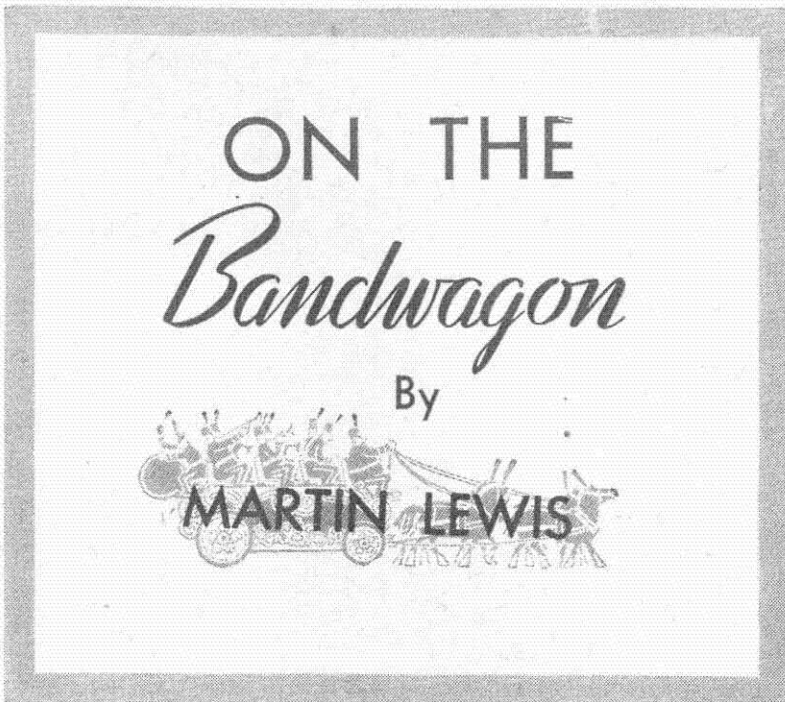

A NATIONAL MAGAZINE has charged that W. J. Cameron, of "Ford Sunday Evening Hour," is anti-Semitic, and that he once wrote a friendly letter to Fritz Kuhn, ex-head of the Nazi Bund. A New York newspaper reports the Ford hour will use Jewish artists to disprove charge.

THE Democrats have sewed up two solid hours for election eve broadcasting on NBC's Red and Blue networks and on Mutual, only one hour on CBS—all for a last-minute drive to get voters to go to the polls the next day and vote Democratic. The Republicans have one hour that night on CBS, otherwise the Democrats would have bought another hour on that network to make it unanimous.

If Norman Thomas and Samuel Leibowitz need some money to further their political campaigns for U. S. President and New York judge respectively, they can each claim twenty-one dollars at NBC. The money is in payment for their appearances last March on "Celebrity Minstrels," the checks having been held up pending receipt of the Social Security numbers of the gentlemen.

The Wendell L. Willkie speech on behalf of charity October 20 was free to compensate for Roosevelt's free charity speech the week before.

Stay at Home November 5

The best way to get quick and accurate results of the November 5

election is to stay in your own living-room and keep your radio going. The networks will give this election the most elaborate coverage in history. CBS, NBC and Mutual are already setting up facilities to shove commercial shows out of the way, hold the airwaves open to immediate use and operate on a twenty-four-hour basis to flash the election returns to the world. In addition to tie-ups with news services to bring reports from all parts of the United States into the radio news-rooms, the networks will have mikes in the various political headquarters, in the homes of the candidates, and in other spots which may produce news or human-interest sidelights.

War Creates News

Some say it is British propaganda; some say it is news of a human-interest character caused by the war. We refer to the recent trend of radio in turning its ears to British war-refugee children. A few days ago NBC put on a two-way program so that English refugee children in America could speak to their parents in England. It was touching to hear the little tots tell about their new schools, tricycles, American hospitality, and to hear the parents inquire of their health and send their love. Said one newspaper reporter on the sidelines: "How can the Nazis lick opposition like that?" The other Sunday, little Princess Elizabeth, heir to the British throne, went on the air to give a message to all the English children now in this country. Such programs carry an appeal that no trained adult speaker can possibly command.

No, the Nazis Didn't Get Him!

Richard Boyer, foreign correspondent for the newspaper *PM*, was scheduled to go on "We, the People," but didn't show. Since he had just returned from Germany, "We, the People" jumped to the conclusion that something must have happened to him, gave a very dramatic explanation of "... up to this moment, neither we nor the editors of *PM* know where Mr. Boyer is, or what's happened to him." Many listeners and news services, thinking that perhaps pro-Nazis had kidnaped him, telephoned for information. None was forthcoming. Mr. Boyer remained absent. Next day your reporter did a little checking to

find that Mr. Boyer was well and happy, that he was only taking advantage of the opportunities of a democratic country for a bit of democratic celebrating which even a democratic radio broadcast should not interrupt.

It's Daddy Levant

Mr. and Mrs. Oscar Levant are parents of a six-pound fourteen-ounce daughter, their first child, born at Medical Center October 12 . . . A \$250,000 libel suit against commentator Edwin C. Hill has been decided in favor of the radioman . . . The mother of Meri Bell, singer-wife of announcer Dell Sharbutt, died recently in Indianapolis . . . Clifton Fadiman and Andre Kostelanetz are auditioning a program for Coca-Cola . . . Kenny Baker wants to adopt twins and has registered with a half-dozen child-adoption agencies and at several foundling homes for that purpose. Baker prefers that the twins be less than a year old.

The Power of Helen Hayes

At 8:26 p.m. EST, twenty-six minutes after Helen Hayes began her play "Love From a Stranger," lightning struck WJR's transmitter, knocking the Detroit station off the air for two minutes just at the point when Miss Hayes' drama of suspense was at its height. The loss of those two minutes ruined the play for Michigan listeners, who rushed to the telephone to call the station to supply the missing clues. WJR, unable to satisfy them, wired CBS in New York for a resume of the closing minutes of the drama. Then, during the regular 11 p.m. news broadcast, WJR broadcast that resume, allowing its listeners to know how the play turned out. We think this is a perfect example of how seriously interested listeners take real drama. Perhaps other dramatic programs could take a lesson from it and increase the quality of their fare to command a like consideration on the part of the audience.

Observation

With the close of the New York World's Fair on October 27, the end of politics on November 5, baseball out of the way, we have only to wait until the end of the football season for radio to get back to normal schedules.

NBC reports that there is a trend toward programs concerning military service, camps and recruiting, as well as of descriptions of actual service. One of the most recent was the special airing of Charlie McCarthy's being given a warrant as a "master-sergeant" in the Army Air Corps—at which the dummy cracked the suggestion about putting hostesses on bombers, then sneezed and excused himself, "I must have been in the draft!" . . . Burns and Allen have set aside a "draftee reserved-seat section" of fifty seats at their weekly broadcasts so that draftees will be given preference in seeing the show . . . "You'll Find Out," and the lot's executives are so well pleased with it that they are discussing with Kyser the possibility of his returning here in the spring to make a third film. Al Pearce is also being considered for a picture; meantime, his fast-talking actor Dick Lane has a part in Harold Lloyd's "Three Girls and a Gob," which is now shooting. Republic Studios are turning into celluloid Phillips Lord's "Mr. District Attorney" and "Milkman's Matinee," which is based on the famous New York all-night platter program.

Fibber's Funnyman in Films

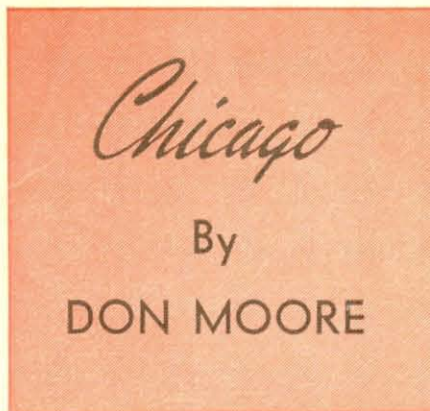

making "Elizabeth and Essex," Perc was trying red wigs on Bette Davis for her role as Queen of England. One after another the wigs were put in place and Bette stared at herself in the mirror. Finally she tossed the last wig on the floor, heaved a sigh, and moaned, "I look just like Harpo Marx!"

Wally Westmore takes care of the make-up on some of the screen's most glamorous girls. Carole Lombard, Claudette Colbert, Dorothy Lamour, Madeleine Carroll and Gail Patrick, and hosts of other Paramount lovelies listen to his words of advice and surrender their faces to his ministrations trustfully. Wally had a new kind of problem with the fair Madeleine Carroll. While making "North West Mounted Police," the golden-haired star was surrounded by a dark-haired, dark-skinned cast. In order that she not look too white by contrast, Wally had to make up Miss Carroll with a darker color than her natural skin tone. The opposite tactic was necessary while filming "Virginia," which had a "light" cast, and also was in Technicolor. Wally made up Madeleine in this picture with her own fairness emphasized. Proving he's a psychologist as well as a make-up expert.

Out at 20th Century-Fox, Ern Westmore has, until lately, had the tender faces of Shirley Temple and Jane Withers under his care. Make-up on screen juveniles is a slight problem, since they cannot look made up and yet must be for the camera. Ern is an expert at child make-up as a result of the influx of moppets at the studio. He also manages to curl Alice Faye's eyelashes alluringly; and it was Ern who perfected the make-up of Linda Darnell that showed up her beauty so well that she's now a star.

If you think make-up is reserved

exclusively for people, you're wrong! Animals are often made up, too. Six white horses were dyed red, blue, green, yellow, pink and lavender for "The Wizard of Oz." They nearly died when they saw one another. In "Lives of a Bengal Lancer," an innocent king-snake was turned into a deadly cobra by adding a hood made of fishskin to the surprised reptile. Even birds get their share. While making "Tom Brown's Schooldays," an English sparrow was needed in a scene. No trained English sparrows could be found, so a tropical bird with green plumage was used, and given a paint job of dark gray to simulate a sparrow.

Even fruit gets make-up! Tomatoes receive a coat of rouge and a polish for the Technicolor cameras, and stripes on apples are painted brightly so they'll show up. Bite into some prop fruits or vegetables on any studio set and you're likely to find them flavored strongly with grease-paint.

Here are some beauty hints from the wizards of the business. May you profit by them. Jack Dawn advises older women with tendency to double chin never to wear white next to their faces. White reflects light upward, drawing attention to the chin line. Wally Westmore says the best soap for a woman's face is men's shaving-soap! Why? Purest and mildest, men leave it on their faces fifteen minutes and it never stings. A quick turn around the studios results in these notes.

If you've truly black hair, give it a faint blue rinse to bring out that raven's-wing sheen. If you've white hair, a faint lavender rinse makes it whiter. Patricia Morison uses blue for her black tresses, and isn't it beautiful! And you can thank May Robson for the lavender-rinse tip. On a high hair-do where your ears show, try

using your powder base on those ears and a bit of rouge at the lobe. Makes you look younger. (Billie Burke does this.) Hedy Lamarr, to go one better, puts rouge in her nostrils for that my-proud-beauty look. Luise Rainer dusts her eyelids with gold-colored powder. Very come-hitherish. If you want to try out a new make-up against a new color, put paper the color of your new dress next to your face and then experiment with lipstick and rouge. Several packages of crepe paper in the new colors should be part of every woman's make-up shelf. It's an M-G-M idea. For fall clothes, brown eye-shadow. Dark brown for brunettes, light for blondes. For a natural effect in daytime, just use your darkest shade of powder base for eye-shadow.

Wally Westmore says to begin revolutionizing your make-up at your dressing-table. Make-up comes to you sterilized and germ free. How many women keep it that way? Buy your powder puffs by the dozen and use clean ones always. Keep your eyebrow pencils sharpened and your mascara brushes washed out. And don't use what I suspect you use for moistening. Mascara was made to mix with water! Keep your mirrors bright and a good light over them. If you already do all this you're unusual, but if you take Mr. Westmore's advice you'll be on your way to the beauty the stars achieve, for they keep their make-up scientifically clean. Try the Westmore watchword and look your bureau drawer in the eye!

So there's your mumbo-jumbo. We've lifted the lids of the witches' kettles and heard the incantations of the wizards. May you profit by their discoveries and may your beauty shine forth like the diamond on Hedy Lamarr's forehead. Or the gleam in John Barrymore's eye!

The Scrap Iron Quartet decided to attend Penn State together, the college of which Fred's grandfather, William G. Waring, was original founder and first president. Thwarted in this, they organized the Waring-McClintock Snap Orchestra. In his Junior year Fred left college and concentrated on the band—Tom, Fred B., Poley and Nelson Keller going with him. In 1921 they definitely decided on Waring's Pennsylvanians as a tag. From then on the band continually increased in number, then featured performers were added. Fred is married.

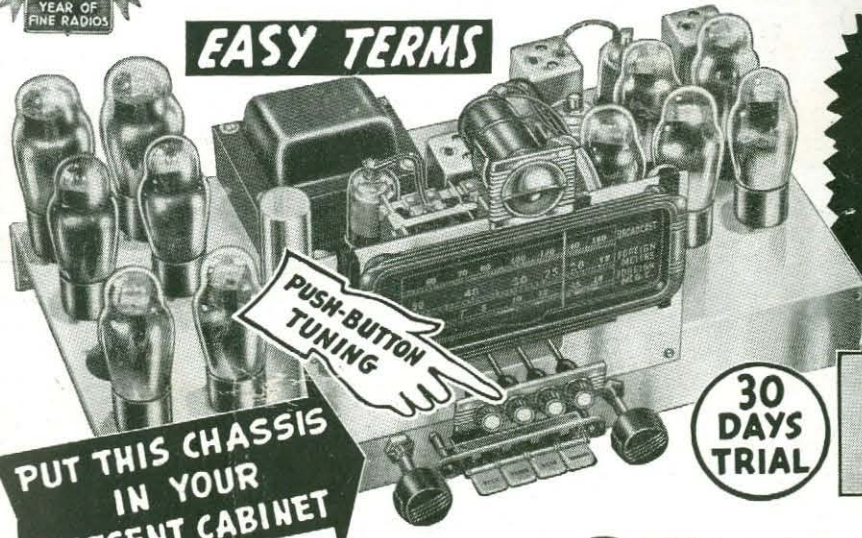

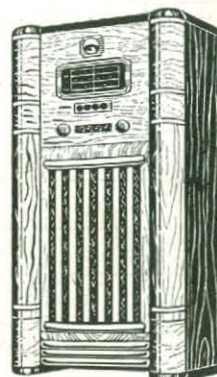
