## The Running-W Is Banned and Westerns Become Humane

THE days of the running-W are over. The running-W was a barbarous wire device which, when attached to the forelegs of horses, tripped them at the right moment, enabling exciting pictures to be taken by action-hungry Hollywood directors. Horse-lovers are happy that the efforts of the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals has been able to persuade the movies to take this step. William Randolph Hearst, through his daily column, was the spearhead of the campaign. "Collier's Weekly" added its own resolute editorial backing. Then the Motion Picture Producers Association passed a resolution banning the running-W.

The technique of accomplishing this improvement in the treatment of horses is of extraordinary interest, for it reveals the sort of astigmatism under which too many Hollywood producers are suffering. It reveals that it took the combined editorial support of the Hearst newspapers and one of America's greatest magazines to get action. If the thing was wrong, the producers should have seen it and banned the running-W long ago. But they didn't. Early efforts to convince them brought rebuttals that what they did in the movies was of no concern to outside organizations. Some producers profess the same attitude toward our own "attention calling" with reference to drinking-scenes in movies. Unnecessary drinking is wrong; no one scene, perhaps, but surely when they are piled up night after night. When will they also ban unnecessary drinking-scenes?

Well, a free press and the right to criticize has ended the agonies of a few dumb brutes, thanks to the newest ruling of the Hays office. We hope producers will come soon to have as much consideration for the children to whom their pictures are shown.

AT THIS YEAR'S BEGINNING we wonder what new movies we would like to see made, and an answer comes to us in the reply Carole Lombard made recently to an inquiring reporter who asked, "What book interested you most in 1940?" "I find it very easy," she said, "to name James Street's powerful novel, 'Oh Promised Land.' It has vigor, it is strong with reality, and it concerns an exciting part of American history. It is of the stuff our country was made from, and Mr. Street gave it loving attention."

"When Ruth Lowe," he writes, "wrote 'I'll Never Smile Again,' she never dreamed that she and her song would be one of the points of argument. But she is. The radio chains point out that Miss Lowe, whose hit was performed more than sixty thousand times last summer, didn't get a cent from performing rights because she wasn't permitted to join ASCAP on the basis of one hit. Yet one of the class AA members who got \$18,000 as his yearly fee had only one of his songs played ONCE. The radio chains argue that they would rather pay Miss Lowe full value for 'I'll Never Smile Again' than pay eighteen thousand dollars to a class AA member who isn't delivering anymore."

As a listener, we must agree with the networks.

THE BORROWED TIMERS of the state of Washington should all be dead, if we can take the word of doctors who have tended them. Suffering from incurable ailments, they were given only so long to live on this earth by the best medical advice they could find. But they live on. Her family is prominent in Spokane, Washington, society and had no leanings toward the entertainment world. Miss Page had soon attracted a large audience in Seattle and, more important, the attention of NBC officials, who brought her to Chicago and starred her in network musical shows. A short time later she deserted musicals for radio-serial parts which brought her to the attention of Hollywood talent-scouts. She took a screen test and her first film was "Crime School," followed by "The Amazing Dr. Clitterhouse." She is best known perhaps for her work in the "Four Daughters" films. # The Life and Loves of

# QUEEN BETTE

Bette Davis was reared on goat's milk and thrived upon spankings. In every instance, she has come up smiling

OUR subject for examination this week is Bette Davis, whose paradoxes, pulchritude and common sense have left your correspondent completely under the spell of this remarkable young woman. I warn you, the things I say must not be held against me. Usually I take a great deal of delight in pin-pricking Hollywood, dehorning its sacred cows and deflating its fatuous nincompoops. But even cynics do not scoff at genius, and if Miss Davis is not a genius she can pass as one until the land of bombast and ballyhoo gives us another actress who is worthy to stand in her shadow.

Miss Davis is an American institution—a wise, tolerant Yankee who has heaved the standard of cinema art to its highest peak, toting the load on her own little shoulders. Again I warn you, if I go overboard please charge it to hypnotism.

Anyway, Miss Ruth Elizabeth Davis, slangy, slacky Queen Bette, who gave Oscar his name and then began collecting the little fellows as though they were tin soldiers, sat over there in the squishy comfort of her armchair. She had tucked one of her 4A feet under her and, completely relaxed, was prattling platitudes about life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness, including love and labor.

Miss Davis was saying something about how diligently she was seeking peace. Inasmuch as everybody, even Hitler, is seeking peace, the statement seemed a bit trite. But Miss Davis is impressive even when she says trite things. Watching her hands, her feet, and a few other things, I suddenly thought of the time a smart studio executive told her she had no more sex appeal than Slim Summerville. A few years later she did "Jezebel."

I thought of the time an English judge suggested that Miss Davis was a spoiled, mercenary young lady. And for no reason at all I was sore at the judge. He may have been right, but it enraged me to think that some be-wigged, smug bigwig, a subject of their Queen Elizabeth, should hint that our Queen Bette was a bad girl. Suppose

one of our judges said that their Queen Bess was a propaganda agent, a plump Scotch girl who enjoys the job of being queen. England wouldn't like it. I am anxious to help England win her war to save our own necks, but I won't have their judges talking about our Queen Bette. The mere fact that the judge was probably right has nothing to do with it. You can't expect a young man hypnotized by Bette Davis to be rational. Throw me a rose and a pea-shooter and I will join the million American males who are anxious to do joust for the last of the American succession of queens, a succession that includes Pocahontas, Martha Washington, Dolly Madison, Aimee Semple McPherson, Susan B. Anthony, Scarlett O'Hara, et al!

They'll tell you in Hollywood that wherever Miss Davis is, that's New England. She talks muchly about New England, New Hampshire snows, the murmuring pines, Boston cod, Rhode Island reds and the Massachusetts mortgages. Miss Davis can do many things, but she cannot take New England to Hollywood. It won't work. You can build a New England house in Hollywood, you can put a Cape Cod lighter by your fireplace, but it's still Hollywood. Hollywood is like China. It assimilates everything that goes into its maw. Queen Bette has been assimilated by Hollywood. It is New England's loss and America's gain.

For if she still was fiddling around the Cape Cod Playhouse we never would have had the first real movie queen since Mary Pickford. And, unlike Miss Pickford, Miss Davis can act. "I was a wicked brat when I was a child," Queen Bette said. "I was jealous and headstrong."

The Queen still is headstrong and there's a bit of the brat about her. But thank heavens for brats. Conformists and placid folks are such bores.

In her autobiography Miss Davis writes: "Like Tristram Shandy, I have no exact recollection of my birth but have to rely for particulars on the word of my elders. The evidence, as

presented by my mother, establishes the fact, at least to her satisfaction, that I was born in Lowell, Mass., under a cold, leaden sky that unleashed sleet and rain coincidentally with my first earthly cries, a result that seems to have given rise to a family belief that bad weather and I are inextricably bound up with each other."

Miss Davis acts much better than she writes. She neglects to say when she was born, but by casting around a bit we discovered the secret. It was on April 5, 1908. She says she was born in Lowell. Her studio says she was born in Boston. We wish they would get together on this little point. Warner Brothers and the Queen have disagreed about many things, but they surely should be able to get together on the star's birthplace. We'll take Miss Davis' word for it and give her birthplace as Lowell. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. R. F. Davis.

Her family moved to Somerville, near Boston, while she still was a baby. There was a blizzard that winter and Miss Davis vows that for four days she lived on nothing but water. There is no New England conservatism about Miss Davis. I don't believe that anybody who had the price of food ever lived on water for four days near Boston. New England may be bare, but it's not that bare. However, the Queen can do no wrong so we'll have to take her word for it.

"I was considered a delicate child," she said, "and my diet largely was goat's milk."

By the time she reached the age that Mr. Milne has made famous, she developed a passion for bugs, worms and rats. It served her well, for as a child she learned something about the things she would have to tolerate in Hollywood. One day she offered a dead rat to one of her mother's guests and her mother spanked her.

Miss Davis has been getting spankings all of her life. The theater has spanked her several times. Warner Brothers spanked her. An English judge laid it on her and fate slapped her flat. Love gave her a beating and life has given her a trimming. But she has never complained. That's why she's the Queen.

MISS DAVIS is not wholly New England. There is some Virginia blood in her. Her Grandfather Davis taught Negroes in Virginia. That should endear the Queen to the cavaliers. Her mother's name was LeFevre. When Bette first went on the stage she used the name of Favor. Her sister, Barbara, gave her the name of Bette.

When she was eight her father, a patent-lawyer with a lot of brains and not much bankroll, and her mother were divorced. Bette and Barbara were put in a boarding-school and her mother became a photographer in New York.

Bette was fourteen, a gawky girl with prominent teeth and stringy hair, when her mother sent her to Cushing Academy, and it was there that she decided to be an actress. There she met

Harmon O. Nelson, her first sweetheart, who later was her husband. They played together in "Seventeen."

She was graduated from the Academy in 1926 and went to New York. By pulling wires here and there she got an interview with Eva Gallienne. The Great One heard the Queen read a few lines and told her, "You are a frivolous little girl. Your attitude toward the theater is not sincere."

Actresses are notoriously bad judges of talent. The next year Miss Davis went to John Murray Anderson's School of the Drama. She paid her tuition on instalments, which blasts forever, I hope, the Hollywood tale that she had a scholarship. Later Miss Davis did have a scholarship to the school, but she never finished there. Instead she took a small part in "Broadway," which was playing in Rochester. Her mother told her to learn the parts of the two leading feminine players. Her mother insisted that on opening night one of the stars would break her leg. One of the stars did sprain an ankle and Bette got the role. However, she was fired from the job a few weeks later.

AFTER being pushed around for several years, she got the lead with Donald Meek in "Broken Dishes." Then on into "Solid South," opposite Richard Bennett. It was Bennett who called her a ham actress, and the Queen went to the mat with him, lashing him with verbs, battering him with profanities and drowning him in vitriol.

In 1933 Universal gave her a test. So did Sam Goldwyn. Somebody in the Goldwyn office told her to straighten her teeth and she put on braces. No one met her in Hollywood and the Queen entered by the back door, as it were. As a matter of fact, a studio man did meet the train and sized up the passengers. However, he decided that there wasn't an actress in the carload, although he had stared at Miss Davis.

It was Universal who told her she had no sex appeal and let her go.

Miss Davis hasn't the kind of sex appeal that Hollywood goes for, but the lady has sense appeal. She is a bit pop-eyed, and there's nothing languid about her. Her ash-blond hair is not natural, but she can give most Hollywood women a handicap of two sarongs, a husky voice, a tight-fitting sweater, nine frills and twenty furbelows and put more stirring sex into one glance than the lot of them. The Queen is a woman, as fiery as Spanish love, as clean as a waterfall. She reminds a fellow of good soap and bright starlight. And, gentlemen, that's sex appeal. Or maybe I'm still hypnotized.

Murray Kinnell, who had worked with Miss Davis on the stage, recommended her to George Arliss, and that grand old man selected her to play opposite him in "The Man Who Played God." Actually Mr. Arliss was playing godfather. Because of him Warners gave Miss Davis a long-term contract. They cast her in a number of fair-to-middling shows and then tossed her

into "Of Human Bondage," a show that still ranks among the best.

Today directors call her a director's dream. Some critics say she has brought to the screen a greater intellectual and artistic honesty than any American actress. For my part you can eliminate the word American. All in all, my two bits' worth is that Miss Ruth Elizabeth is the greatest actress ever to play consistently in movies.

IN 1937 she had a blow-up with Warners. That was when that English judge said the Queen was a silly American girl. Miss Davis' fight with Warners was fundamental. She was under contract, and the law says a contract is sacred. The lady had turned in some great performances, and Warners, trying to make hay while the sun shone, cast her in some stinkaroos. Miss Davis rebelled. An artist who does a good job in "Of Human Bondage" will fight rather than work in the kind of boiler-plate stories that Warners was dishing out to her. It's the age-old fight in Hollywood. Producers select the stories. Many producers are artists, but many others know no more about stories than Rip Van Winkle knew about Sanka coffee. The fight simply was whether or not some ham producers could tell this great actress what kind of stories she must work in. Warners said she would either work for them or she wouldn't work. The great sacred rights of property! Miss Davis was a piece of property to them. She told them off and lit a shuck for England. In the litigation that followed, Sir Patrick Hastings,

K. C., ruled against her and said, "This is rather a naughty young lady. What she wants is more money."

What the Queen really wanted was a chance to prove that the ability to act is a guarantee that a person may act in the story of his or her choosing. But the dear English judge found for the sacred rights of contract. Shades of Magna Charta, Runnymede! Miss Davis had the chance to be the Joan of Arc of the movies. Well they burned Joan. They only blistered the Queen. So she came back to Hollywood to do as she was told.

The foundation of the Hollywood structure is that an actor under studio contract must take orders from the producer. But Hollywood learned a lesson from Miss Davis, and although she has been cast in some weak stories, she has never been kicked around again.

One of the really smart cracks from

the Queen was, "Domesticity is all right if it's not carried too far." There is wisdom in them there words—more wisdom than the learned king's counsel showed. Perhaps that explains why the Queen's marriage to Mr. Nelson didn't work. She called him Ham. He was a bandleader. They fell in love when she was fourteen and there are many who believe they are still in love.

Mr. Nelson divorced Miss Davis. He charged that she studied her parts in bed.

What is the true story behind Bette's divorce from Harmon Nelson? What are the chances of their reconciliation? How does Bette Davis really live? Comedian Joe E. Brown and his wife, Kathryn,

will be formally remarried on the occasion of their silver-wedding anniversary December 24 . . . "North West Mounted Police" is breaking all Paramount Studio box-office records for the past ten years, and the same lot's "Arise My Love" is running a close second . . . Jeffrey Lynn is the latest actor to "strike"; he refused to work in the cast of "Jinx Woman" because he considered that the screen play was "all Brenda Marshall" . . . Wayne Morris has patched up his difficulties with Warner Bros. . . . SHOT with action, importance and authenticity, "Flight Command" is the first of the major pictures depicting the United States Air Corps methods of modern training. It's definitely a first-class story of the air, with much excellent photography of impressive flying.

The combination of educational data and good drama is what makes this picture entertaining. It provides some of the most thrilling air action yet photographed.

Life in a naval flying squadron is mirrored, with the "Hell Cats" as a typical group. Taylor becomes an unwelcome member of the outfit through varied circumstances, and is even more disliked by his associates after a series of mistakes due to his inflated ego, but eventually he makes friends with the rest of the gang. When Ruth Hussey's brother (played by Shepperd Strudwick) is killed in a crash during a fog-landing experiment, Taylor tries to help her forget her loss. Misunderstanding his motives, the "Hell Cats" believe him to be in love with her—and she is the commander's wife. Trouble follows, but Taylor vindicates himself with a thrilling rescue of the commander,

played by Walter Pidgeon, whose plane crashes on a beach at Guadalupe.

Acting honors might be well divided between the three leading players, with Ruth Hussey outstanding in her role as Pidgeon's loyal but misunderstood wife. She makes an important personage out of a commonplace character. This is one of Robert Taylor's best portrayals, and Walter Pidgeon does a top-notch job. Shepperd Strudwick in the role of the young inventor of the fog-landing device does excellent work.

"LOVE THY NEIGHBOR" is a laugh riot from beginning to end, and especially from beginning to end, because even the title of the picture is humorous and the finish is a panic.

As might be suspected, since it stars both Jack Benny and his radio-feud opponent Fred Allen, it is based upon the quarreling of the pair, and the situations in which they might become involved, but never have.

"Love Thy Neighbor" is a farce comedy with musical relief provided by Mary Martin chiefly, with the assistance of the Merry Macs, Virginia Dale, Rochester, and Theresa Harris. It opens with Benny dressing to celebrate New Year's Eve, 1940, and being provided with an ancient tin horn and confetti saved from previous New Years. He drives Rochester to the dock in New York, where Rochester has a date to meet an incoming boat bearing his sunburned sweetie-pie, Josephine (Theresa Harris), who by coincidence is employed as the maid of Mary Allen (Mary Martin), niece of Fred Allen, who likewise goes to the pier to meet his incoming niece and wife, Barbara (Verree Teasdale). When Benny's Maxwell

has a rear-end collision with Fred Allen's limousine, the fun starts, and it doesn't end for a solitary minute until the picture finishes. Benny is casting a new show for Broadway and is still without a leading lady until Mary Allen comes into his life disguised under the appropriated name of Virginia Astor. She gets the job of leading lady with the idea of taking Benny down a peg or two. At least that's what she sets out to do, but eventually she falls in love with him.

This is the best acting job yet to hit the screen for Benny and Allen, and Mary Martin also proves herself a talented actress. Scene-stealing credits go to Rochester (Eddie Anderson) and Josephine (Theresa Harris).

### "Santa Fe Trail"

"**S**ANTA FE TRAIL" is an unusually thrilling action melodrama with plenty of chases, shootings and burnings, but it has very little to do with the construction or extension of the Santa Fe Railroad. By rights, this picture should have been entitled "John Brown's Body."

Frankly speaking, the picture is stolen right out from under hero Errol Flynn (cast as Jeb Stuart) and Olivia de Havilland (who plays the part of "Kit Carson" Holliday) by excellent actor Raymond Massey, who portrays John Brown, number-one abolitionist.

Story begins in 1854 at a West Point commencement, with seven men who within the decade are grown to be powerful generals in the great Civil War, and enemies of one another. In the fateful seven are Jeb Stuart (Flynn), George Custer, enacted by Ronald Reagan, Flynn's rival for the hand of Kit Holliday, and Rader, a meanie portrayed by Van Heflin. Rader incites trouble at the Academy just prior to the commencement, which causes a fist fight between him and Jeb Stuart, for which Stuart's

Oh, yes, "Santa Fe Trail" has plenty of action, shootings and burnings, but there is an important love-story, too.

# ABOUT THE ALLEN-BENNY BENNY-ALLEN FEUD

When they brought Benny and Allen together for a film, they got a fight! Here's a true tale of a gag gone wrong

**F**EVER an innocent bystander picked himself up an unexploded time bomb, it was Paramount studio when it decided to capitalize on the famous Jack Benny-Fred Allen radio feud and make a movie of it called "Love Thy Neighbor."

The studio knew it was in a jam before the ink on the deal was dry. There in its mitts was a mess of TNT, liable to blow everything sky-high at any moment—and nothing for it to do but hang on and hope for the best!

A fine kettle of fish that was, when a million bucks or so of the studio's money was plunked in the pot.

Like the rest of the country, the Paramount bigwigs had accepted the three-year-old Benny-Allen "feud" as an inspired form of American kidding which helped sell pudding, tooth-paste, and gasoline. Week after week

they had listened to Fred hurl barbarous insults at Jack from New York on Wednesday nights and heard Jack answer in kind from Hollywood on Sunday. They pegged it all as good clean fun and darned smart showmanship in both camps.

The truth, therefore, came like a bolt from the blue.

The truth is that the feud started as a gag, but somewhere along the line it got out of hand. Too many of the harpoons, perhaps, hit too close to home. It's still kidding now, but underneath the surface of those sledgehammer wisecracks or stinging jibes it's kidding strictly on the square!

That can be dangerous business, and Paramount knew it before the first day's shooting schedule on "Love Thy Neighbor" was finished. By the time the picture was completed, everyone had a first-class case of the jitters. A

good face was put on it for outsiders; people spoke of the "grand fun" on the sets and the "million laughs a day" everyone had got out of it. But behind closed doors of conference rooms and in private huddles, the words "strain" and "tension" were heard and felt.

That all Hades didn't bust loose instead of the occasional fireworks which enlivened the fifty-six-day schedule was a tribute to the personal integrity and good sportsmanship of both Benny and Allen. Each suffered painful wounds, but they licked them in the privacy of their own lairs. Too much was at stake for an open ruckus.

So, at least, is the opinion of Ted Tetzlaff, the drafted referee of the battle. As cameraman on the picture, his was the impartial eye which saw the fight from start to finish and spotted its many nuances. And his was the delicate job of seeing that a fair break was had by all in the finished product and keeping the battlers in camera range.

"For instance," Tetzlaff observed, "Jack always has been notoriously careless about camera angles. As a valuable piece of studio property, he always has assumed we would protect our interests in that respect, in which he was correct. He relies on us utterly to guide him into the best camera breaks and see that no one upstages him. Even with Allen in the same shot with him, he continued to be careless and off guard.

"Allen, on the other hand, definitely was on guard every moment, as a man must be when he lives by his wits. He seemed to feel he was an outsider in enemy territory, and adopted the defensive policy of watchful waiting. I didn't have to tell him to 'cheat' a little (which means turning the face more toward the camera) or warn him about being upstaged (which means being forced into the background of a scene). Someone evidently had done a very thorough coaching job on that subject before he stepped foot inside the studio, and the points remained fresh in his wary mind."

No master mind was needed around Paramount to deduce that Benny and Allen are not the bosom buddies and old college chums the general public thinks them. That became quite apparent from the day Fred arrived in town to start work on the picture. Each was casually polite in his "Good morning, Jack" and "Good morning, Fred," but there all social relationships ended. Not once did they lunch together in the studio commissary or visit in the other's home. Each had his own "clique" on the set and kept to it, Benny usually sitting with his writers, Eddie Beloin and Bill Morrow, and Allen with the two agents he brought with him from New York, Howard Reilly and Walter Batchelor. Unlike the comedy team of Bob Hope and Bing Crosby, who cook up new gags for their pictures by hashing them out together before presenting the idea to the director, Fred and Jack held to their lone-wolf policy. When either had an idea for new material he took it to producer-director Mark Sandrich, who in turn talked it over with the other.

So pointed did the situation become, in fact, that a studio wag one night painted a broad white stripe down the center of the studio street which separated their dressing-rooms. The implication was obvious.

Jack Benny prepared for the beginning of film work with Allen by taking a long vacation in Honolulu, where, according to him, "I was met on my arrival by 27,000 people, which is four fans and two Kanakas more than greeted Shirley Temple. They

were lovely to me. They all put leis around my neck. It's bad luck to take a lei off, so I had to carry 27,000 leis around. That sort of dulled my mind, so I think I'll take another rest before going into this picture with Allen."

Which was a mighty fine thing, for—as Jack well knew—once he and Allen were brought together on a single set the fireworks would begin. And they did. Allen's reaction to the Benny statement about his reception in Honolulu was perfectly in character.

"The only reason that there weren't 27,000 people to meet Benny on his return here," he slurringly remarked, "is because extras cost more in Los Angeles than they do in Honolulu—and Benny wouldn't put out that kind of dough."

The whole shebang actually started three years ago when a nine-year-old guest on one of Fred's programs played the difficult violin composition called "The Bee." As one of the running gags of his show, Jack had talked a lot about playing "The Bee," but somehow the promised performance never came off.

"Just imagine," Allen ad-libbed into the microphone. "This young man can play a piece perfectly which that Benny can't even attempt after forty years' practise!"

**B**ENNY cracked back the following week, and the "feud," which was to grow into a national institution, and ultimately into "Love Thy Neighbor," was on. As the word-war raged and the public's interest mounted, several movie producers saw in it the germ of a picture idea, since Benny was an established picture star and Allen twice had made excursions into the cinema field.

One of the producers—Mark Sandrich—finally did something about it. He outlined a story, based on the feud itself, in which Benny and Allen would play themselves. Paramount okayed it and gave permission to approach Allen on the deal. Sandrich took the story to New York and showed it to Fred. There he struck his first snag.

Fred liked the story and the idea of co-starring with Jack. But he doesn't like Hollywood and never has made any bones about it. Sandrich pleaded, argued and coaxed. Finally Fred gave in and signed on the dotted line to make the picture in time for a December, 1940, release.

Clear sailing from there on? Not a bit of it! Three giant hurdles remained to be taken.

First, the story itself. Here you had two top comedians, each famed for a distinctive style of comedy, pitted against each other in a race for laughs. Each would rather have his throat slit than lose that race, and understandably so, since laughs are a comedian's bread and butter. Again, there was the matter of footage on the screen; Fred couldn't be expected to stooge for Jack or vice versa.

The general skeleton of the story was prepared by two of Sandrich's ace writers, Ernest Pagano and Zion Myer. It is a hilarious elaboration of the "feud," with Allen stealing Rochester away from Benny; Benny retaliating by stealing the Merry Macs from Allen's show; a wild brawl which lands them both in jail; a chase in which they both almost drown; and a grand mix-up concerning a Broadway show in which Jack finds himself under contract to Fred. Woven through it is a gay romance in which Benny finds himself in love with Allen's niece, played by Mary Martin.

The skeleton next was dressed with dialog by Jack's own writers, Beloin and Morrow, who prepare all his ra-





dio and picture material and are under personal contract to him. Finally it was sent to Allen, who liberally (and with sardonic satisfaction, no doubt) exercised his privilege of re-writing any of his own lines and situations in the story.

How carefully Sandrich mapped his plot is revealed in the final statistics on footage. Benny appears in seven scenes with Allen, eight with Mary Martin, five with Rochester, three with Mary Kelly and six alone or with other members of the cast. Allen's scene score added up to seven with Benny, seven with Mary Martin and Verree Teasdale, two with Rochester, one with Miss Martin and three alone, two with Miss Martin and three with Miss Teasdale. Final score, twenty-nine to twenty-eight in favor of Benny.

Second hurdle to be taken was the matter of billing. The public may not give a continental hoot about who gets mentioned first in the ads and on the billboards, but artists and actors get themselves in a terrible stew about it.

The problem was solved in a novel fashion for the title sheet on the screen. Jack's name flashes on first. Immediately Fred's appears above it. Jack's jumps on top of that, then Fred's jumps again. Finally the letters end up in a free-for-all. Cold legal documents, however, were necessary to settle the official billing for newspapers and billboards. Jack's contract with Paramount states his name must be mentioned first, except in the case of a female star of equal importance. Then, gallantly enough, the lady's name may come first. Fred's agreement states he must be co-starred with equal billing but that Benny's name alone may precede his. Thus the official billing will read "Jack Benny and Fred Allen in 'Love Thy Neighbor'" with the Benny and Allen names in the same size type and the name of the picture in type twenty-five percent larger.

Who was it said the little things are the important things in life? Apparently it's so.

The third hurdle was the matter of world-premiering the picture. Jack wanted it in his home town, Waukegan, Illinois. Allen held out for his stamping-grounds at Old Orchard Beach, Maine. The studio compromised on New York City.

Even the propboys on the picture took no chances with wounded pride for either prima donna. One day Benny requested a glass of water. While propman Roy Krueger dashed to bring it to him, assistant Verne Baine rushed one to Fred. Allen wanted a pencil Krueger got one for him—and Baine presented one to Benny. Benny mentioned the need of a cigar. Krueger promptly got one for him—and Baine just as promptly handed one to Allen.

"This is all wonderful," Allen said, "but I don't smoke cigars."

"You can throw it away for all of me," Baine calmly informed him, "but you've got to take it. This department's strictly neutral and we're staying that way!"

**IT WAS** the trigger quality of Allen's wit which placed Benny at a disadvantage in many of their extemporaneous battles and kept a coterie of hopeful listeners within sound of the Allen voice at all times. There was the day the two were doing a scene which called for Fred to comment bitterly on the undesirable aspects of Jack's face. Just as he began the prepared lines, "Your face, Benny," all the electrical power in the studio went dead. "Your face, Benny," he improvised instantly, "not only stops clocks but cameras and lights as well."

Against such rabbit punches, Benny usually was helpless, for while he is every bit as funny as Allen, his greatest asset is his delivery of lines. It's not what he says but the way he says it that brings the roars of laughter from his listeners. It must be remembered, too, that Jack is dependent on what others write for him, while Fred writes all his own material and is the acknowledged master of extemporizing gags for any situation. Every once in a while, however, Jack hung one on Fred which sent him to the ropes.

Such a day was the one when Fred mournfully was confessing his unhappiness with his role.

"Cheer up, Fred," Sandrich consoled him. "This is your third picture and the third time's the charm."

"He might also be said to be going down for the third time," Jack contributed. "Sort of committing artistic suicide."

The first hint referee Tetzlaff had that the feud kidding was kidding on the square came with Jack and Fred's first scene together. It's a violent argument with both men in character, Fred as the cocky, brash puncher and Jack as the bluffer who starts out bravely but backs down when his bluff is called. Much to everyone's surprise, Jack kept getting out of character, and apparently with deliberation.

Suddenly the truth dawned. If Allen was to be allowed to yell and rant, then by jeebers Benny was going to yell and rant just as loud and long!

The final stab in the back came recently when Allen threw that fast curve about Benny's relatives. He said, you may remember, that Jack should be glad to get second billing because his relatives all read from right to left anyway.

Jack burned, but the two gentlemen it really put behind the eight-ball were Messrs. Beloin and Morrow, his official mouthpieces. Orders went out to "top that gag—or else!"

Two heads are said to be better than one. At this point in the feud it remains to be proved. So far the advantage seems to be with Allen.

## "CHAD HANNA"

SET in the moth-eaten, hungry days when small circuses were striving to gain a foothold in an America which had little money for frivolous things, "Chad Hanna," made from Walter D. Edmonds' famous magazine serial, "Red Wheels Rolling," has an epic sweep and a stirring tale to unfold for movie-goers. Nunnally Johnson, distinguished for his work on "The Grapes of Wrath," was associated with Darryl Zanuck as its producer. Johnson also did the script for the film and assigned to Henry King, who made "Drums Along the Mohawk," the task of directing it. After assembling his top-notch cast for the film, King set to work to seek out locales which would approximate the Erie County (N. Y.) locale of Edmonds' novel, traveling more than six thousand miles in his quest. The cast traveled more than four thousand miles to and from location sites despite the fact that none of these sites was farther than fifty miles from Hollywood. Greatest difficulty, however, was the handling of animals necessary for the circus sequences. The first day four hours of shooting were wasted because a gibbon perched in a tree over the microphone insisted upon chattering—and the gibbon wasn't even a member of the cast but a pet living on property adjacent to the set. A short time after, Tony, a rented lion, became ill and held up production. What made Tony ill, they found later, was the red interior of his cage, so colored for the benefit of Technicolor. The cage was repainted green and Tony recuperated. "Chad Hanna," a 20th Century-Fox production, was released nationally in December, 1940.

Wagner was always fascinated by the ancient German song-contests and based two of his operas on them, "Die Meistersinger" and this one. It tells the story of a noble minstrel, Tannhaeuser, who comes to the Wartburg on the eve of a singing-contest to court Elizabeth, daughter of the Landgrave of Thuringia. He does not reveal that he has recently been at the court of Venus (opening scene of the opera) where he had been indulging in sensuous pleasures. At the singing-tournament (Act II), which opens with Elizabeth's ringing aria "Dich, teure Halle" (Thou Dear Hall), most of the knightly contestants, including Wolfram, Tannhaeuser's friend, sing of the beauties of virtuous love. Tannhaeuser, contemptuous of them, recklessly answers in a song praising Venus, thereby throwing the contest

into an uproar. The knights wish to kill him but Elizabeth intercedes. Tannhaeuser, repentant, joins a band of pilgrims heard chanting outside to beg forgiveness of the Pope in Rome. The third act shows a road in the valley of the Wartburg. Elizabeth prays for Tannhaeuser's salvation before a roadside crucifix. Wolfram tries to comfort her, but she leaves him and he sings his beautiful "Hymn to the Evening Star." Tannhaeuser appears, and begs Wolfram to tell him the way to the Venusberg. He recounts that the Pope has refused him pardon, saying that his salvation is as remote as the chance that the papal staff he carries might blossom. Venus suddenly appears in a vision, trying to tempt Tannhaeuser back to her. But bells are heard tolling, announcing the death of Elizabeth. Her funeral procession approaches and as Tannhaeuser sinks dying of grief on her bier, pilgrims arrive carrying the papal staff which has miraculously bloomed. Outstanding numbers in the opera are the great overture, the wild sensual Venusberg music, the "Evening Star," Elizabeth's prayer and the pilgrims' chorus.

Since Raymond Scott discovered Mozart last year in his "Eighteenth Century Drawing Room," taken from Mozart's third piano sonata, a lot of people have found that Mozart isn't as highbrow as they had thought. In fact they had to admit that he could write a good tune, good enough to keep running through their heads. Here is a whole program of Mozart, without benefit of Raymond Scott, and if you listen carefully, you'll probably hear a lot more good tunes. The piano concerto, written at the same time as his better-known "Coronation" concerto, was also titled "coronation" and he frequently played both of them on the same program. Written toward the end of Mozart's lamentably short life, it is, like all his later works, filled with tender and moving melody.

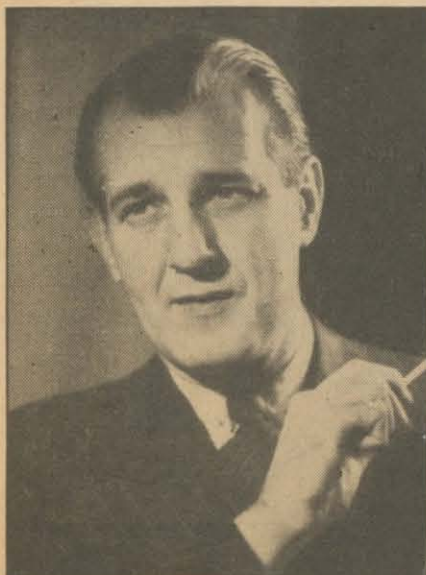

## News from the Music Front

"THERE is too much talk about music for the intellect. I believe that music should appeal to the emotions rather than to the intellect."

The young woman who recently made that statement is the person responsible for planning some of the best chosen and most artistic programs on the air, those of the "New Friends of Music." Hortense Monath, one of the better-known young American pianists, is also the wife of Ira Hirschmann, founder and patron of the New Friends. Hirschmann is vice-president of Bloomingdale Bros., one of New York's largest department stores. He looks youthful enough to be just starting in business, instead of holding down a post of such importance. Both he and his wife are young and enthusiastic, with an enormous zest for life, and a deep and profound love of music. However, although many people love music, few do anything about it. These two did.

For years Hirschmann had it in the back of his mind to start a series of low-priced concerts for New York music-lovers. Miss Monath had the same idea in a more concrete form. She wanted to give chamber music, of which there was very little at that time. But instead of presenting only string quartets, she planned to use all types of chamber music, featuring different instruments and combinations of instruments. She also believed that the concerts should run only for an hour and a half. She figured that the public would like the novelty. Hirschmann agreed with her. And so did the public. The New Friends concerts are now sold out every year in advance. Next season will be their fifth.

Miss Monath follows no definite plan in choosing the programs. She and her husband begin around January to think about the next season. She admits frankly that she is no musicologist, and that since she has started doing this, she has added immensely to her musical knowledge. She plays most of the music over on the piano, balancing one piece against the other, deciding how they will fit together. She is careful not to have too many things of a kind on one program. Quartets alternate with piano trios and quintets for wind in-

struments. This year there have been two new departures. Modern music was featured for the first time by the New Friends, and there will be two solo concerts by Alexander Kipnis and Lotte Lehmann. Miss Monath was criticized for including modern music. But she declares that there is no such thing as "modern," only good or bad music. An audience reacts to good music no matter what idiom it's written in, she finds.

Chamber music has always been considered as the highest form of music, and many people find it hard to understand. True, for those who play an instrument there is nothing more pleasant than to gather together at home and scrape away by the hour at trios and quartets, just for the fun of it. But to listen to four other people do it for two hours in a concert hall was a different thing. The New Friends, guided by Miss Monath, has provided a different slant on chamber music, and has, over the air, made it cultural fun for thousands and thousands of people who never even knew it existed before.

WORD has just come through that Rise Stevens, young American mezzo-soprano of the Metropolitan, has signed a seven-year contract with Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer to make movies co-starred with Nelson Eddy. She leaves for Hollywood in

May after her current season with the Metropolitan Opera Company has been completed.

### Record Review

PIANO CONCERTO NO. 3 (SERGE RACHMANINOFF), played by the composer with the Philadelphia Orchestra under Eugene Ormandy. (Victor M-710, \$5.00.)

This is easily one of the finest piano concerto recordings in existence. Rachmaninoff not only plays his own work with all the verve, rich emotion and technical virtuosity demanded by the piece, but the reproduction of the piano tone is almost perfect. If you are a Rachmaninoff lover, this should be the high point of your record collection. It should also stimulate you to write to all of the broadcasting networks and beg for his appearance on the air. That is the surest way to bring him to radio. —V. L.

## Musician of the Week Andre Kostelanetz

Portrait of Mr. K., whose wife is Lily Pons, whose music is as famous as hers

"I DO NOT know a begonia from a petunia. But Lily, she knows the names of all the flowers, and she can tell which is which. I think it's wonderful." Andre Kostelanetz was holding forth on his favorite topic, his wife, Lily Pons. It is just as difficult to persuade him to talk about himself

as it is to get Miss Pons to talk about herself. But on the subject of each other, they are bursting with eloquence. It seems that Lily's gardening is a serious business, and not at all the usual publicity nonsense. "Prima donna loves flowers" with the p.d. in an organdy dress and floppy hat daintily wielding a trowel is an old press standby. But with Lily it's workman-like overalls, the proper tools and plenty of grubbing in the dirt.

"Recently we went to visit one of the most famous herb gardens in the world, near Washington," Kostelanetz recounted. "The place is filled with every kind of herb, medicinal as well as food. They all looked like grass to me. But Lily knew every single one of them by name."

Lily also likes birds. She has an aviary in their Connecticut home, and if she's talking to you and a bird flies by she breaks off in the middle of a word to watch it. This must make conversation fairly slow in the country. An addition to the bird family (not the Kostelanetz family) is arriving Christmas morning. Lily has wanted a parrot all her life, and her husband has bought her one for Christmas. It talks and sings. In fact it reminds Kostelanetz of a dramatic soprano—he didn't say which one.

What Kostelanetz appreciates most in his wife is that "She's cheerful without being annoying about it. She has a fundamentally wise philosophy of life, and all the little things that bother most of us, she seems to be able to distill in her mind and to relegate to their proper place."

Neither Kostelanetz nor Miss Pons has ever seen a performance of "The Daughter of

the Regiment" in which Miss Pons appears this year, so her interpretation is entirely her own and not based on any tradition. Tradition, Kostelanetz believes, is all very well in its way, but is made to be broken at times. He is and always has been a firm believer in popularizing good music and making

it intelligible to the public, even if unorthodox methods are employed. Walt Disney's classical vaudeville cartoon "Fantasia" enchanted him, and he believes it will be a powerful stimulant to the public to hear more good music. He himself several years ago cut big symphonic works to fit them into a half-hour program. He was uncertain how such a thing would be received, and consulted Deems Taylor for the composer's attitude about cutting.

"What would you say if anyone cut your music?" he asked Taylor, who gave the following answer: "If there were some good reason for cutting it, I wouldn't mind at all."

LIKE most musicians who have been in radio for any length of time, Kostelanetz has developed the long view, and aims to please the greatest majority of people. That he has succeeded is evident by the hundreds of thousands of people who turn out every summer when Kostelanetz and his wife make their annual tours together. A record audience last summer was two hundred and fifty thousand people in Chicago. "That is more than the dictators get," remarked Miss Pons, who finds their tours very exciting.

In spite of all the publicity it received, this marriage looks as though it will be a long and satisfying one. A union of two normal, intelligent people who share the same interests, like the same things and share the same sort of wisdom, it is indicative of the new type of marriage among professional artists as exemplified by the Lunts, the Clark Gables, Grace Moore and her husband, and Gladys Swarthout and Frank Chapman. —V. L.

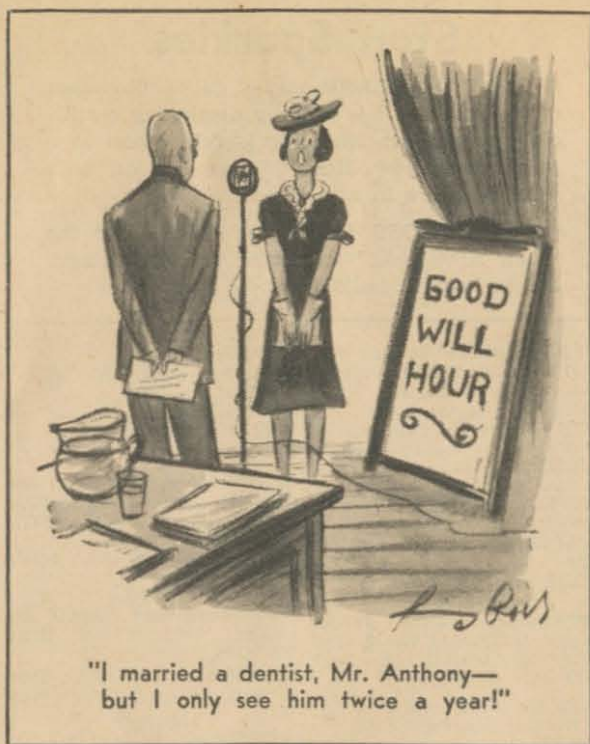

**A**S A former salesman-demonstrator of musical instruments in Cleveland, Ohio, orchestra-leader Freddie Martin found it hard to sell the Lombardo band. What he did manage to get from them, however, was a sympathetic interest in his expressed desire to give up the selling game and take up a career devoted to music. In fact, Carmen Lombardo went so far as to take young Martin under his wing—not as a member of the orchestra but as a pupil and observer. Later, when the Royal Canadians were planning to be absent for a week from the Music Box Cafe, leader Guy insisted that Freddie form a band of his own and substitute for them. After the engagement the band was broken up, Freddie realizing that before trying to become a professional leader he should acquire more playing experience. With this decision, he got himself hired to a traveling band, toured this country and Europe, worked many cafes, clubs, theaters and one-night-stand jobs. In 1932, having felt that he had fully served his apprenticeship, Freddie again formed his own orchestra, instrumented according to the ideas he had picked up during the years of his playing with other outfits. The tutelage of the Lombardos is, however, evident in the Martin band presentations, most of them bearing a faint resemblance to the soft-music style which for years the Royal Canadians have never departed from. Since its formation the band has played many top-notch hotels and clubs; also playing on many radio shows, both sustaining and commercial. As a result, Freddie's name has become known from Coast to Coast. Present members of the orchestra posed in the special MOVIE-RADIO GUIDE photo above are as follows: First row (left to right): Russ Klein, Reid Christiansen and Clyde Rogers, saxophones; Freddie Martin, leader and sax; Charles Bilek, Eddy Berg-

# NOW IT CAN BE TOLD

How politicians spent \$2,000,000 in radio time to elect a President

THE tumult and shouting are over, but the days of our recent election are still bright in our memory. Things happened during those hectic weeks about which every listener should know, things that show the workings of this democracy.

They say that twenty millions of dollars were spent by the Republicans, that the Democrats weren't far behind. Nobody has audited those claims. But what was spent on the air has been audited. We have the record, and it is an amazing and absorbing one.

Politicians spent two million dollars for a pencil-mark. That pencil-mark was an "X." An "X" scratched on a ballot is an instrument of democracy. It can change the path of national policy. It can change Presidents.

Early in the race, politicians realized that radio would win or lose their race. So the money poured out. It was a golden, gleaming stream of two million dollars. NBC got just under \$1,000,000 from the embattled Democrats and Republicans. CBS netted better than \$500,000, while Mutual's sales of political programs passed the \$250,000 level.

Long before the late lamented-by-some campaign began its rollicking career, the heads of all three major networks met in a quiet room and settled a number of important matters. They agreed that after the general conventions where the candidates were nominated, no spokesmen on forums or group discussions were to be allowed, injecting unconscious plugs into theoretically non-partisan programs. Faking of audience applause by transcriptions or paid studio hand-clappers was taboo, but genuine applause at halls and political rallies was considered bona fide. Anonymous voices were not to be used. Party plugs could not be dramatized. Networks refused to issue publicity on political talks, other than routine program listings, or release the texts of any speeches.

As a matter of fact, looking back at the whole campaign, they were about as partial as a marble statue of Christopher Columbus.

There is always a benevolent body of men in Washington, called the Federal Communications Commission, ready to rap on the knuckles any broadcasters who fail to operate "in the public service, convenience and necessity."

We know now that all radio scripts, behind the closed doors of the networks, were guarded closely to be sure no toes were trod upon. The extent of such caution reached old-ladyish extremes. CBS, according to re-



ports, coined a set of resolutions to keep funny-men from inadvertently embroiling the network. A well-known comic found the innocent word "indispensable" had been stricken from his script because the censor feared someone might link it with that slogan about the "indispensable man." Another had a line black-balled because the word "egg" appeared in it—

during the week that Willkie figured as target for an ill-wisher's missile of this category.

It was at the heated height of the campaign, we now learn, that smart-boy Winchell's sponsor wired him curtly in these words:

"Positively no political comment Sunday night."

Winchell, who would undoubtedly have been a first-class Patrick Henry if he had lived in Colonial days (and there are people who wish he did), wired back at once.

"I intend doing an editorial," he asserted, "urging the people to unite no matter who the winner. If no can do, please let me know so I can get laryngitis."

One of the most impressive set-ups in the entire furor of electioneering was the kilocycle madhouse staged by the determined Democrats, late in October, when Roosevelt expounded nationally from Philadelphia's normally sleepy Convention Hall.

According to the post-election confession of roly-poly, well-liked George Wilfred Johnstone (who prefers to be dubbed "Johnny" by his omnipresent friends), this cost the Democrats something in the vicinity of \$90,000. Johnstone served as radio director of the Democratic National Committee, playing a stealthy (and rather well-matched) game of chess with Wells (Ted) Church, who fulfilled a similar function over on the G. O. P. side of the tracks. Both men, ever mindful of slender budgets, were forced to purchase air time where and when it would do the most good—all with the acumen and foresight of a frugal housewife buying carrots and lamb chops for a fifty-seven-cent budget-menu dinner.

Caution, however, went whirling off on the wind as the campaign grew to its crescendo. The radio bills mounted high above original appropriations, because radio was proving the best, hardest-hitting way to win votes.

On the eve of the President's address from Convention Hall, Johnstone learned that mike-minded F. D. R. wanted to talk for forty-five minutes—although only thirty had been purchased nationally. The networks re-

**P**OOOR Henry Aldrich! He has a sister and he hasn't. In "The Aldrich Family," Ann Lincoln played the role of Mary, the sister. Then the sponsor dropped her and put Jone Allison in the spot. She lasted about four months and was dropped because "she sounded too sophisticated." Betty Wragge took up where Jone left off. That didn't work. Judy Parrish was tried December 19. If Judy isn't on when you read this, don't be surprised, judging from past history. In all, 225 girls have been auditioned for the job since the program has been on the air.

### Jack Benny Comes and Goes

Ten thousand persons put in requests for the seven hundred seats available to watch Jack Benny broadcast his last New York program, December 22. Thirty-four million persons stayed home to listen. Jack and Fred Allen are jointly contributing a one thousand-dollar scholarship to Stuart Canin, fourteen-year-old New York violinist, who played "The Bee" on Fred's show in December, 1936, causing Fred to crack at Jack's fiddle-playing, thus starting the famous Allen-Benny feud. Jack's visit made it possible for Dennis Day, tenor, to spend part of the Christmas holidays with his family here.

### Those Nasty Nazis

Irving Berlin titled it "God Bless America" but in Germany they call it "God Blast America." The Lynda Lee involved in a Baltimore breach-of-promise case is not the Linda Lee

of the late "Believe It or Not" show. The latter Linda is happily married. The soprano introduced as Vivian on "Hour of Charm" is Hollace Shaw, who used to be a star soloist on CBS. Reason Shirley Ross is on the Ben Bernie show is that Ben moved to Hollywood and Carol Bruce had to stay with her Broadway show. Boake Carter is romancing a Miss Jean Newell. Col. Stoopnagle is trying to get Ruth Nagel, daughter of Conrad, to come to New York for an appearance on his "Quixie Doodle" just because their names rhyme. King George VI's Christmas broadcast came from "somewhere in England" with anti-aircraft guns and troops patrolling to assure his safety. We had always thought of Christmas as the season of peace on earth and good-will to all men.

### Without a Skirt

Broadcasting without a script is nothing new, but broadcasting without a skirt is. Elizabeth Reller, Ann Malone in "Young Dr. Malone," did the latter the other day when she was drenched with coffee. She gave her skirt to a page-boy to take to the cleaners, and did her broadcast wearing her coat.

### Similar to David Ross

A University of Wisconsin freshman auditioned for a job as announcer on station WHA in that state. "That voice sounds familiar," said the boss. The freshman read more lines. "You sound like a ringer for David Ross," the boss interrupted. He should have. Because the freshman was David Ross, Jr.

### Duke of Windsor Scoop

There are stories that the Duke of Windsor has turned down one million dollars in radio offers. So naturally it was a surprise to the industry when Robert Ripley presented the Duke, unballhooped in advance, on his program from Nassau December 6. Believe it or not, despite this important scoop, Ripley went off the air that night. Now free from microphone duties, Ripley is thinking about a South American trip.

"Musical Americana" leaves the air with the broadcast of January 16. Budget troubles. Charlotte Manson is now playing Katherine in "Myrt and Marge." "The White

Haired Boy," with Betty Garde, will open on Broadway this month. . . . Burl Ives, singer on CBS' "Back Where I Come From," has the Maharajah Metta, twenty-two-year-old wealthy Indian, as a roommate. Not yet fully Americanized, the Maharajah, who met and liked one of Ives' girl friends, wanted to give her twelve elephants as "a token of affection." . . . Boake Carter has sent Dorothy Rasmussen of his research staff to South America to gather exclusive news for his broadcasts. This is a precedent, for commentators usually lean upon established sources.

Ben Grauer now knows why they call a New York stage show "It Happens on Ice." Assigned by NBC to do a broadcast from the show, he put on dress clothes, hurried to the theater and dashed on the stage. Edgar Guest returns to the air January 15 with Eddy Howard to be heard Wednesdays, Thursdays and Fridays over NBC-Blue at 4:45 p.m. EST. . . . The *Saturday Evening Post* recently presented Raymond Gram Swing as having the world's largest radio audience. The basis for this claim is that Swing is heard via short wave and BBC in England, South America and Australia as well as in the U. S. A.

A welcome and delightful Christmas present was delivered to Genevieve Rowe in the form of a contract renewal as soprano star on, both the NBC and CBS sessions of "Johnny Presents." Only a few Yuletides back, Miss Rowe was just one member of the choral group. . . . Prof. Quiz entertained one thousand children at a Christmas party in Columbia's Playhouse December 21. Helping the Professor with the entertainment were Bob Trout, announcer; Otto Soglow, author of "The Little King" cartoon; Russ Westover, creator of "Tillie the Toiler"; Lee Falk, who writes "Mandrake the Magician," and many others of cartoon fame.

Aiding Bergen and Charlie in the dedication was Preston Foster, avid Nimrod and cinema star.

Haven MacQuarrie, who conducted the past two CBS "Marriage Club" broadcasts from Hollywood, before he returned east admitted he was still puzzled over some impressive matrimonial facts he ran up against at Minneapolis. Among his studio audience there, MacQuarrie decided to try to find a few couples who had been married twenty-five, forty or even fifty years. To his near-blackout, he discovered present forty-five couples who had been married fifty years or more! On the night of the broadcast he spotted one elderly couple in the front row and asked them casually if they had been married fifty years. "Good Lord," snorted the old-time gentleman derisively, "you've got nothing but kids on the stage. Ella and I been married sixty-four years!"

**Pigeons and How They Coo**

Charlie Forsyth, the "Lux Radio Theater" sound-expert who stalks noises with his wax recording-machine and captures them without losing a single note, has decided that California pigeons (sometimes called doves) are temperamental. Lum and Abner rang the bell once more—for the eighth successive year, to be exact—when they repeated on Christmas night their homely version of the birth of Christ; the sketch has become a radio classic, like Lionel Barrymore's "Scrooge" . . . Edward G. Robinson and his "Big Town" cast will move to New York City for several weeks starting probably January 15 . . . Add to the list of nice people: Norma Shearer; she turned over her radio-guest salary check for work on "Everyman's Theater" to "Bundles for Britain." Elizabeth Bergner did likewise recently . . . The "Voice of Experience," heard from the beginning of his new series over the Pacific CBS net only, has now had his network extended to six more stations in the Rocky Mountain area . . . Page-boys at NBC thought they were seeing double the other day; two dressing-room doors, facing one another across a hall, were labeled "Mr. Crosby"; one was Bing's and the other Bob's, who happened to be in Hollywood for that broadcast.

you said the same things about other people, he believes, they would be dull. This is an extremely interesting and basically sound point of view. For instance, if I say to you today, "Mrs. Jones, my neighbor, has just dyed her hair . . . or taken to raising Scotties, or bought a new automobile," you would not care at all. But if I said these things about any one of a dozen well-known people I can name to you, stars of stage or screen, you would at once begin to think that dyed hair, Scotties or new cars were important.

Mr. Astaire has not forgotten the hard road to success—the years in vaudeville and on the stage without benefit of publicity. He worked, he practised year in, year out. He did without a home, without the glories and excitement and security of childhood. He has not reached his present situation through publicity. Publicity has merely caught up with him. He has earned the right to his success. The only thing for which he will accept credit is the hard work which has made up his life. No one praised him on the way up. He can't accept praise now except for what it is worth to him. Publicly expressed adulation embarrasses him. He finds it all a little incredible. He doesn't want to splurge, so he doesn't. He likes living quietly. And so he does. Flattery is useless to him, because it can in no way reward him for grueling work, heartbreak, disappointment, and struggle. Nothing in life can be a reward for the difficult road except the inner satisfaction to the person who has traveled it, the satisfaction of having reached a goal and having done a job well. No one can give you this satisfaction, no amount of praise, no spoken or written word. For this satisfaction comes from yourself and from yourself alone. It is your own individual reward, given you by yourself. You know, that's all.

MR. ASTAIRE lives simply and well. He drives a small car; he is not interested in racing around publicly. He dreads being asked to "perform" on impromptu occasions. It seems like "showing off" to him. As a matter of fact, I fancy that most people who are asked to exhibit their special talents at parties and friendly gatherings must, in their souls, wonder if they are not throwbacks to the court jesters of the kings of yesteryear.

Mr. Astaire does not use his name to procure special favors. This was apparent at a recent preview when, going without the knowledge there was to be a special occasion, he found the seats sold out. Had he asked to see the manager, a seat would have been found for him. He didn't. He couldn't see why, because he was Fred Astaire, he should find a place when hundreds had been turned away. His name he has made himself—as actor and dancer. But he did not go through the agony of creating it in order to be given a seat at a theater when there were a great many other people who couldn't get seats—because they had no "names."

I do not for one moment believe that such modesty is what we have come to call an act. There are other stars of whom this might be said, with truth, but not of Mr. Astaire. He is what he is. He knows himself. He accepts him-

self at the valuation of self-knowledge and not at the valuation of people who are blinded to everything in a well-known name except its persistent glitter. I doubt if glitter holds much charm for him. He knows what it is worth, too. I am certain that he is glad he has succeeded. He would not be human otherwise. But what makes him glad is not all the excitement and oh-ing and ah-ing and autograph-hunting and envy. It is the knowledge merely that he has worked hard and without cessation and that he has been true to himself.

To be true to oneself and one's star, to remain clear-sighted when success is so blinding to most people—that is modesty.

refused to split the extra half-hour, which would leave fifteen unwanted but highly valuable minutes dangling in the ether. So the Democrats bought a full hour, cancelling such headline programs as Eddie Cantor and "District Attorney" on NBC, Fred Allen on CBS. And these artists require talent fees, even if they don't go on the air. If you like figures of the statistical type, here's what the damage came to, just so Roosevelt could read another six or eight pages of speech:

Total cost over NBC, \$37,117.70. Total for CBS, \$42,081.15. And for Mutual, \$8,241.64. You can add to this a flock of independent stations (with no network connections) and a few small regional networks, aggregating about another \$1,000.

That's just a slight idea how highly radio is valued by the men who want to see your "X" in a certain spot on the ballot.

Roosevelt reputedly made five presidential campaign broadcasts, and each of them averaged between \$60,000 and \$75,000 of revenue for those impartial, unbiased broadcasters. Original budgets (\$250,000 for the Democrats, \$150,000 for the Republicans) were stretched out of all shape by the end of the campaign.

Another fact not generally known before election day is that the political parties had a meeting with radio moguls on the very mundane question of paying for whatever time the former used. It was agreed to allow thirty days' credit from the date of broadcast. (A few of the bigger shows were paid for at once—but only a few.) Neither Church nor Johnstone were in the market to purchase any old hour that happened along. There was much figuring, slide-rule strategy, perplexed lip-biting. Keymen in both parties were studied with care, with an ear to best microphone techniques and personality.

Crackerjack outdoor orators, they learned, are sometimes thorough dubs in the studio. We have hints there is a standing, unwritten agreement among the networks that candidates for President and Vice President of either major party will be permitted the air whenever they desire, regardless of who is on at the moment. Lesser fry candidates are not so lucky.

It is not always smart, the political radio men now tell us, to buy time generally filled by a popular program unless the substitute is an eminently worthy one. Although you may garner a peak listening audience at first, a lot of them will probably be pulling their hair because a pet broadcast has been sidetracked. In 1938 young Thomas Dewey, competing for the governorship of New York state, usurped the half-hour normally occupied by "Information, Please." Apparently he lost a healthy allotment of votes.

From all survey indications, the President hit high point for big audiences on October 30 when, speaking from Boston, he enjoyed a rating of 38.7 percent—phenomenally high. Wilkie's best effort was only a shade less—a 37.8 percent gathered during his acceptance speech on August 17. It is rather fascinating to note that on the same night when F. D. R. spoke at Boston, Wilkie hit a 30.6 rating during his Madison Square Garden ("We Want Wilkie") rally. The ratio between the two—38.7 and 30.6—is almost the same as that reflected in

national balloting three days later.

(Record for non-commercial broadcasts is also Roosevelt's—a high 45.5 chalked up during his Charlottesville address last June 10.)

Very few people realize that Alexander Woolcott's special stumping broadcast for the New Deal—of which he is a rabid disciple—was his own idea. It seems that Woolcott wrote Mrs. Roosevelt of his desire to speak for the President, and upon investigation it developed that he had purchased fifteen minutes on WABC, Columbia outlet in New York, with his own money. The Democrats pounced upon this and built a whole network show out of Woolcott's sally, which, incidentally, featured Roosevelt-rooter Oscar Levant.

THAT cold-sweat fear of showing a slight partiality dogged the networks all the way from conventions to election returns. Shortly before Wilkie went on NBC's air with his conscription speech, a G. O. P. official phoned the network with last-minute instructions on "fill-in" music to follow the talk.

"Mr. Wilkie will probably run short," he explained, "but he plans to end on a patriotic note, so please fill out the time with a selection in the same vein. Something brisk and brassy to sustain the mood..."

NBC thought it all over carefully—then substituted a Strauss waltz. Fear ruled that protests would follow if listeners thought they were boom-decaying for Wilkie.

The station telephone switchboards are invariably a wilderness of red lights and irate calls during a political talk. Many people insist that someone is causing terrific and willful interference with their receivers. Investigation, of course, always shows that the accusations come from impatient persons who seldom listen to the radio anyway. "When the campaign begins," explains a studio official, "they finally hear how badly their neglected set is working. Then they blame it on the chicanery of political opponents."

Another little-known fact is that the election eve, two-hour shindig splashed across the nation by those same heavy-spending Democrats cost approximately \$135,000. But the Democratic National Committee did not pay for this. The bill was initiated by the Democratic State Committee of New York. Reason: There's a bit of Federal legislation called the Hatch Bill, designed to keep political parties from spending too much money on campaigns. By this arrangement, however, the provisions of the bill were evaded.

All in all, radio has never before had such an important task—as an instrument of democracy—to fulfill as its work of the past summer and fall. Newspapers can have forty-five-degree political leanings; they can distort the news and exhort editorially—but radio has a moral and a legal obligation to present both sides of the picture clearly, equally, without discrimination. Its facilities are open to all qualified candidates.

And when we look across the ocean and see what use is being made of radio there—to regiment, intimidate, deceive and arouse the many people now lost to democracy—then that little pencil-mark upon a ballot, made by minds which are free to think as they will, becomes ridiculously cheap, even at twice two million dollars.

And, at the same time, infinitely priceless.

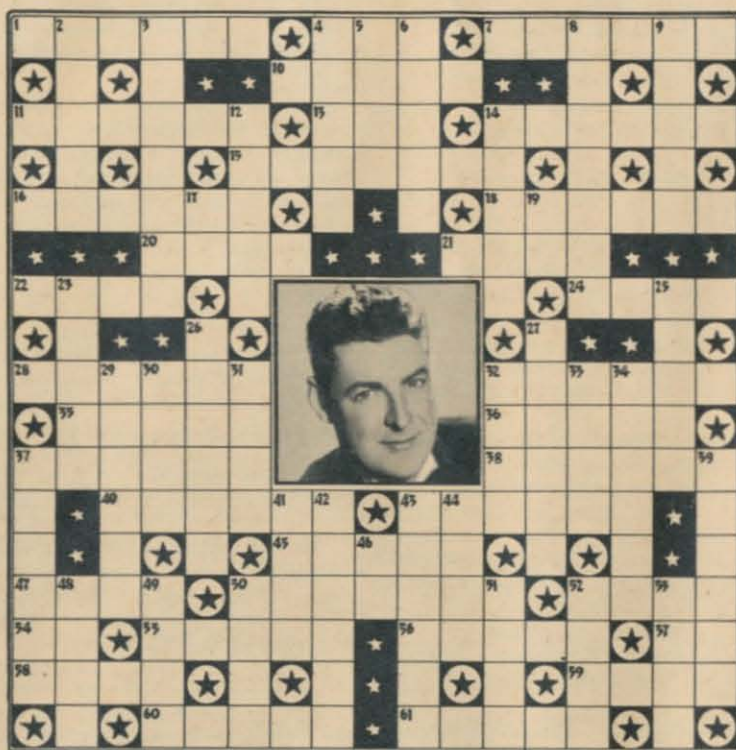
