A Special Award Is Made to Gene Autry

WE HAVE come into possession of a remarkable document. In these days of international tension and neurotic tendencies it is reassuring to encounter a radio and motion-picture hero to so many people whose private and public codes of behavior are an inspiration.

The man is Gene Autry, cowhand. The document to which we referred is an expression of his personal practises and beliefs. We present them just as they came to us:

He can never be seen smoking in any picture.

He can never be seen drinking.

He can never take unfair advantage of anyone, not even a villain.

He can never be seen kissing a girl. All romance is inferred rather than shown.

He can never hit a man who is noticeably older than himself. He must respect his elders at all costs.

He must first try to settle all differences amicably before using force, and he can use his gun only as a last resort.

He must consider other people's problems before he worries about his own.

He can never be disrespectful to a lady.

He can never use slang, although his speech must be natural.

His conduct at all times must be that of a gentleman.

The Autry code of personal living is:

He realizes that kids think of him as the man they see on the screen. He honestly patterns his life as nearly as possible to his picture code. Kids actually govern Autry's life.

He does not smoke, because he doesn't want kids thinking they can smoke just because he does.

He does not drink, for the same reason.

He lives a comparatively simple life, does almost no night-clubbing. His intimate friends are chiefly horsemen and people who work around his ranch.

He is genuinely interested in other people's difficulties and spends a great deal of time and money in helping others.

He does his own thinking, having no business manager and putting through all of his own business deals. He does not shove people off on a secretary, seeing and talking to everyone who has a reason for visiting him. In short, he tries to conduct himself just exactly as he did before he became a star.

He tries never to do anything which the parents of the average boy would not want their own son to do.

Gene Autry's simple songs and unpretentious pictures and broadcasts have nevertheless made him a

great American favorite. In this year's poll of motion-picture exhibitors, his was one of the ten leading names in the list of stars whose pictures brought the most people into theaters.

This means that he ranks ahead of such stars as Marlene Dietrich, Joan Crawford, Errol Flynn, Edward G. Robinson, Paul Muni, Don Ameche, William Powell, Myrna Loy. This means that he stands in the very front rank with Mickey Rooney,

Spencer Tracy, Clark Gable, Tyrone Power and Bette Davis.

Much attention has been paid to stars who cavort about Hollywood's night-clubs. They provide a diverting spectacle. But it is good to know that a man who spends most of his evenings at home, who lives quietly and cleanly, is the number one hero of young America as well as a great many others of us.

Because of the example Gene Autry has set and because his radio broadcasts in behalf of the Wrigley Company and his pictures made by Republic Studios have provided and are providing an example for all real Americans to admire, we present to Gene Autry our Movie-Radio Guide Award of Merit.

RONALD COLMAN proved something about radio the other night. He proved that even the most capable actor is at the mercy of his material. Remember his performances on "The Circle" of lamented memory. We understand they even embarrassed Mr. Colman so much that he withdrew from the broadcast.

But on January 13 he came all the way back with a great performance that must have made him a million new friends. We have our hard-boiled program manager's word for it. His memo on Tuesday morning said:

"Hope you heard Ronald Colman's job on the Lux Radio Theater's presentation last night of 'Libel.' It had me sitting on the edge of my chair. I've listened to shows for ten years. Probably I'm harder to please than most listeners, but if ever there was a FOUR STAR radio performance, THIS WAS IT. My opinion was confirmed when I walked into our program department this morning and found the whole program gang yelling, 'Did you hear Colman on Lux Radio Theater last night?' Isn't there some way we can recognize radio events like this, even though it is too late for those who missed it to hear it? (Signed) Richard Kunstman."

We don't know any answer to that last question. The only thing we can suggest is that you listen to radio just as much as you possibly can. Today's programs pack many an unexpected punch, many a glorious surprise.

GIRL ON THE COVER: Anyone who can make the grim-visaged, war-harried producers of Hollywood smile today is something of a wizard. But tiny Carolyn Lee has performed that miracle, and this in spite of the fact that she is Hollywood's number one picture-stealer. Carolyn's early years—and by this we mean until she was four—were spent in Martins Ferry, Ohio. She was discovered for films by a theater owner of that town, but even before that she had appeared on the "Musical Steelmakers" broadcast. Her first film was "Honeymoon in Bali," and she stole it from under the noses of Fred MacMurray and Madeleine Carroll. 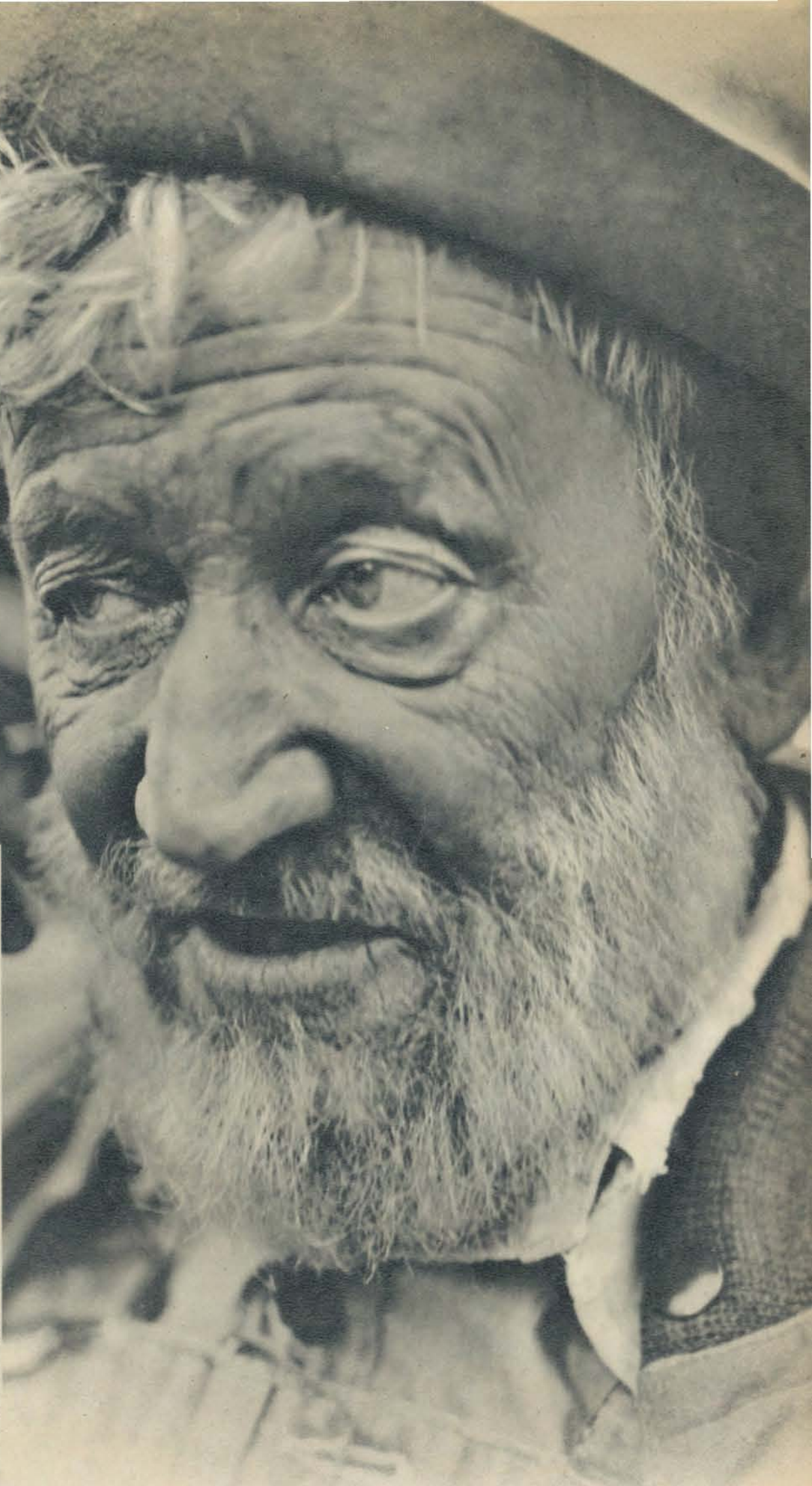

happy ending *for* HEPBURN

The end of the Hepburn-Hollywood feud was as unexpected as it was pleasant. Here's the inside story

Harry Brandt, who once branded Katharine Hepburn as being "box-office poison," yesterday scratched her name off the list as reports came in on the record-breaking business of her new picture, "The Philadelphia Story" . . .

A GAY crowd had gathered at the station in Los Angeles to see Katharine Hepburn off. In it were directors, technicians, actors, ac-

tresses and, more important, studio press-agents charged with maintaining good relations between stars and the press, whose predecessors had had such a miserable time of doing a job for a reluctant Hepburn before. There were even newspapermen there—newspapermen who remembered Hepburn with dislike and resentment. "We're sorry to see you go," they chorused. Moreover, they meant it.

In a way, that was a minor miracle

and, for Hepburn, a major victory. Hepburn—a changed Hepburn, everybody says—replied, "I'm not deserting Hollywood. I'm simply taking a rest to think things over. I'll be back."

With Hollywood clamoring for more and more Hepburn, she will be back. She isn't crazy, even if Hollywood had a half-way idea that she was at least a little fay back in those days when she preferred the company of her pet monkey to that of scintillating cinema

folk. Dispassionate observers will agree that there is at least a whiff of reason behind her choice. But this much is certain:

When Hepburn does return to Hollywood, her contract will be studded with "if" clauses. And the biggest of these "ifs" will be the one which starts, "If Miss Hepburn doesn't like a story, then Miss Hepburn doesn't have to appear in it . . ."

There were other miraculous nuances

to this second farewell Hollywood gave la Hepburn, and for those who remember her first departure—just after she had been labelled box-office poison by a group of prominent theater operators (who should know) and had won what then seemed the undying hatred of almost everyone with whom she worked or came into contact—not the least miraculous phase of it is the mere fact she ever got back to Hollywood to enjoy a second departure. When you understand how this occurred, then you'll have a pretty good understanding of what Hepburn has to offer Hollywood and vice versa. Also, when you understand this, you'll understand a lot more than either Hepburn or her studio bosses understood her first trip out.

Back in the period when Katie was one of the most cordially disliked people in Hollywood, writers for the magazines and newspapers spent reams of paper and plenty of hours absolving Hollywood of all blame for Hepburn. They went back to her stage record before she came to films, pointed out that she had had trouble in three stage productions and actually left the casts of those shows because the director refused to give in to her whims. They told about the time at Bryn Mawr when students, following the old custom of singing carols under dormitory windows early on May Day, got the cussing-out of their lives for waking Katie.

They could have gone back farther than that. Mrs. Thomas Norval Hepburn, of Hartford, Conn., wife of a socialite physician and the mother of Katie, believed in birth control. As a matter of fact, she traveled about the country crusading for birth control. She crusaded for many other causes, too, but definitely missing from the list was child control. After Katie was born, Mrs. Hepburn just let her grow, and there is something about Katie that is very elemental. Not all of the "debbie" polishing, not all of the fine finishing-schools she attended, nor the weirdly cultural background of her

childhood in a home where Emma Goldman and Emmeline Pankhurst were frequent visitors, can conceal it.

The point of departure between Katie and Hollywood was the simple fact that for some twenty years Katie Hepburn had been Katie Hepburn without a restricting rod or a hampering word, and Hollywood, overnight, wanted her to be someone else. For example, her first film, "A Bill of Divorcement," made her an overnight sensation. That Katie had modesty and a certain sensitiveness is adequately proved by the fact that, the moment the film was finished, she went to Europe fourth-class to avoid being at hand when the public reaction began to come in. When the studio wired her in Vienna that she was a success and to hurry back, she almost fainted.

THEN suddenly things began to happen to Hepburn. She is a skilled actress—there is no longer any doubt of that. But she isn't a versatile actress. As a rebel boldly, proudly defying convention for her honor's sake, none can surpass her. She showed that in "A Bill of Divorcement" and "Little Women." In other parts she can be as critics have unhesitatingly declaimed, lousy. And yet the studio cast her in pictures entirely out of character, until finally theater owners arose en masse to protest against Hepburn films which constantly lost money at the box-office. The theater owners were right, but that doesn't necessarily mean that Katie was wrong. The protest, with much more logic, could have been levelled against the executives in charge of casting and stories.

The same was true of her private life. Here again, Hollywood wanted Hepburn to forget that she was Hepburn and live according to the accepted code of other Hollywood stars. The Hollywood code called for stars to be nice to newspaper and magazine writers, to open their private lives shamelessly to the surveillance of camera lenses and inquisitive pens. And Katie

—whose mother was an indefatigable crusader, remember—rebelled and conducted a one-woman crusade against the invasion of things she deemed her own private affairs.

Shortly after college Katie had married a young broker—C. Ludlow Smith. Idealistically, the young couple set out from Philadelphia for New York, he to open a stock-brokerage office, she to build a career on the stage. It didn't work out, and when Katie came to Hollywood the press was curious about her marriage. She managed to offend most of the reporters in Hollywood by answering personal questions with, "Children? Yes, I have five—all colored." Or, "My husband? What husband? I don't remember getting married."

When the press of the press became too strong, even for Katie, she stole away to Mexico to attempt to get a divorce secretly and rapidly. It was just what the newspapers were waiting for. They had a field day at Katie's expense. And all the while, Hepburn was being driven deeper and deeper into her protective shell. She was afraid to speak, for her words and motives were twisted and distorted. She really welcomed the action of the exhibitors who denounced her as box-office poison. She went at once to her then studio boss and offered to cancel the remaining six months of her high-priced contract without a cent. The executive, accustomed to paying out huge sums in such situations (Corinne Griffith, when past her prime, is alleged to have collected a cool quarter-million dollars for quitting), could only gasp . . . and accept, gratefully.

Hollywood—and by Hollywood we mean only Hollywood—heaved a sigh of relief and settled back on its smug haunches with Katie's departure. At that early date, Hollywood couldn't foresee the imminent descent upon Cinema City of Orson Welles, destined to fill the vacancy in the city's whipping-post which Katie had occupied for so long.

Katie heaved a sigh of relief, too, and settled back into the business of being Katie. In this, she had the help of an old friend and playwright, Philip Barry. Barry had carefully followed the Hepburn screen career and, knowing her intimately, had reached a decisive conclusion about her acting ability. To drop Hepburn into a ready-made story was the sheerest lunacy, he concluded. What Hepburn needed was stories tailored to her own peculiar gifts, and with pen in hand he sat down to do such a story.

Hepburn has a little different version of this episode. "The Philadelphia Story" and I came together just in the nick of time," she told friends. She's right, but she leaves out the purposefulness which lies behind the play's writing. Barry had placed his finger upon a great truth. Hepburn, playing Hepburn, is unsurpassable. Hepburn, as someone else, is unspeakable. Hollywood couldn't change that. Neither could the legitimate stage, for don't forget that Hepburn had failed miserably in Jed Harris' production of "The Lake," a dour story so completely out of her character that it led the acidulous Dorothy Parker to comment about Hepburn, "She runs the gamut of emotions from A to B."

"The Philadelphia Story" was produced by the Theater Guild, and it is owned, in equal third parts, by Katie, Barry and the Theater Guild. It was an instantaneous success. Hollywood began to want the play, began to bid for it, one studio outdoing the other. Quite frankly, none of the studios wanted Hepburn. Like other places and other people, Hollywood has the memory of the proverbial elephant

where evil things are concerned, and the memory of a grasshopper for the good things a star might have done. Katie was "evil doings" to Hollywood.

But with Katie it was a matter of love me, love my dog. The highest bidder could have the story, but Katie went with it. In the end, M-G-M bought "The Philadelphia Story" and accepted a Hepburn they didn't want. Hepburn got what few other stars who have felt the skids under them have ever gotten—a second chance at Hollywood. We hope that both Hepburn and Hollywood have gotten a better understanding of each other, because with such understanding, we, the movie-goers, have much to look forward to.

In Hollywood they will tell you that Hepburn came back a very different person. Perhaps she did. She's older and wiser and her experiences must have had a chastening effect upon even so unreconstructed a rebel as Hepburn. But there is a possibility that Hollywood has changed, too, in the two short years that Hepburn has been away. She came back to a cinema colony that has made, in the interval of her absence, such films as "The Grapes of Wrath," "Of Mice and Men," "The Long Voyage Home," "Our Town." That is not the same shallow Hollywood that once resented a girl's desire to live as she pleased off-screen and denied her the right to a private life.

AT ANY rate, the Hepburn stay in Hollywood this time was pleasant for all concerned. Katie was gracious and kind, the same hard worker she has always been, and the staff which worked with her in filming "The Philadelphia Story" swears by her.

The first day she reported to the set for work someone referred to her as the star of "The Philadelphia Story." Hepburn leaped from her chair heatedly. "Oh, but I'm NOT the star! There's Cary Grant and Jimmy Stewart before me. I come third." Cary Grant, who has made four pictures with la Hepburn now, is, incidentally, one of her staunchest supporters. He always has been.

"As an actress, she's a joy to work with," Grant said long before Katie's glorious return. "She's in there trying every minute. She 'gives.' As a person, she's real. She's the most completely honest woman I've ever met."

Perhaps there isn't a great difference in Hepburn, basically. Perhaps to everything that Hepburn was before has been added simply a dash of tolerance which makes her see the viewpoints of others more clearly and which will, in turn, permit others to view Hepburn with a greater degree of understanding. Tolerance comes with reverses and Hepburn has had her full share of these. Perhaps, too, Hepburn is really more certain of herself now than before, more willing to be appraised in the light of her certain knowledge that, given the right role, she can move audiences.

The important thing is that the moving drama of "Hepburn in Hollywood" has come to a happy ending. Hollywood likes happy endings, as witness the films which it produces. So does the movie-going public, which is now flocking in droves to see "The Philadelphia Story" wherever it is showing. So do the theater operators who once lost money on Hepburn films, denounced her as box-office poison and are now busy eating their denunciations. That goes for Hepburn, too, who is perhaps happier at the moment than ever before in her career. That makes everybody happy. Which makes a good ending for this story—and points to a new, greater career on the screen for Hepburn.

Less than three months ago Bette publicly was denying any romantic interest in the gentleman she married, and by implication made it plain she was wedded to her career and intended to maintain that status quo.

Even at the moment she was dashing furiously through an Arizona desert storm to meet her bridegroom, the public prints, including MOVIE-RADIO GUIDE, were insisting—without refutation from Bette—that she still was in love with her divorced husband, Harmon O. "Ham" Nelson, the bandleader, and shortly would reconcile with him.

No wonder, therefore, the news of her blitzkrieg marriage knocked everyone for a loop, including her bosses at Warner Bros. studio and all her personal friends! THE DESERT WEDDING THAT FOOLED THE WORLD

The blitzkrieg marriage of Bette Davis left Hollywood gasping for breath—and here's how it all happened!

some phase of the industry in California. He flies his own plane.

So much for the man. Now about how it happened.

Bette renewed her early friendship with him on one of her annual New England vacations. During the summer of 1939 she tossed off one of those casual "Look me up if you come to Hollywood" invitations. Farnsworth and his sister went to Hollywood a few weeks later and took her up on it. Frankly, Bette was annoyed—not at their personal presence but because it was difficult to be charming to house guests after a grueling day's work at the studio. Just then she was doing her arduous portrayal in the

film, "All This, and Heaven Too."

When Farnsworth returned home in January, the Boston papers blatted the news of his engagement to Bette. Bette was hotly indignant (and so was he), because, as she said, it was the last thing in her mind. She saw him again last summer while on vacation and still had no thought of marrying him. Early in November she decided she would, and by long-distance telephone they began to make their wedding plans. They hoped to keep them secret.

The plans called for the marriage to take place on the vast Rimrock Ranch of Justin and Jane Bryant Dart near Clarksdale, Arizona. Jane, who

deserted her movie career in favor of marriage, had been one of Bette's closest Hollywood friends. The date was set for New Year's Eve because it was the first anniversary of Jane's own marriage and because it gave Bette ten days' free time between the close of "Her Great Lie" and the start of her new picture, "The Bride Came C. O. D.," a comedy with James Cagney.

On Monday morning, December 30, a caravan of three cars slipped out of Hollywood. In them were Bette, her mother, her hair-dresser, Margaret Donovan; Perc Westmore, Lester Linck, her radio representative; Ruth Garland, a house guest; John Favor, her cousin; and Mr. and Mrs. Robert Pelgram, her sister and brother-in-law, who was the best man. With the exception of her immediate family, the others thought they were headed for a gay New Year's house party! Five hundred miles away, Farnsworth was waiting for them at the ranch.

Bette was at the wheel of her own station-wagon. Tuesday morning found them fifty miles from their destination and hopelessly caught in a raging rainstorm which had washed out the soft clay roads and sent huge boulders crashing from the mountainsides into the path of all traffic. Only Bette's instinct, the others said, led them safely through the gutted wilderness to the ranch. Another woman, incidentally, also drove fifty dangerous miles through that storm; she was the clerk who brought the marriage license from Prescott, the county seat.

At one point the excitement grew tense. The figure of a man suddenly loomed in the road. Bette stopped the car and the man approached. After looking at her for a moment, he said: "You're Bette Davis, aren't you?"

The secret is out! Bette thought. She said nothing. He asked where they were going.

Bette was evasive.

"Listen," he said. "I know you are Miss Davis. I recognized you immediately, but I don't give a darn one way or the other. I just wanted to warn you the bridge is out ahead and to offer my help in directing you. I know this country around here."

Still the news that Davis was in strange country on an unknown mission didn't leak!

"Tall, Dark and Handsome"

"CISCO KID" Cesar Romero turns comedy gang-leader in this most unusual revival of gangster dramas, in which many are "killed" but no one dies. Besides supplying many laughs and much suspense in its fast-paced direction, "Tall, Dark and Handsome" serves as the vehicle for the introduction of lovely Virginia Gilmore and the reintroduction of the new Milton Berle.

Pretty young Miss Gilmore, who also made "Western Union," has a

hair-do reminiscent of Margaret Sul-lavan, but a rounded face and pretty nose distinctly her own. Her figure, revealed most delectably when she wins her chance to sing in Shep Morrison's (Cesar Romero's) night-club, has few equals on the screen.

The story is set in Chicago of 1929, and revolves about South Side gang king Morrison and his difficulties with Pretty Willie, the North Side boss, portrayed villainously and somewhat nauseatingly by goggle-eyed Sheldon Leonard. Romance begins early in the unreeling when Morrison meets Judy (Virginia Gilmore), a department-store nursery attendant, tricks her into accepting a job taking care of his non-existent children. By the time Judy has discovered who he really is, she has fallen in love with him and an exciting denouement follows.

This is lively comedy, good film fare.

From there on the plot farces along until the ending, which is clever, as was said before.

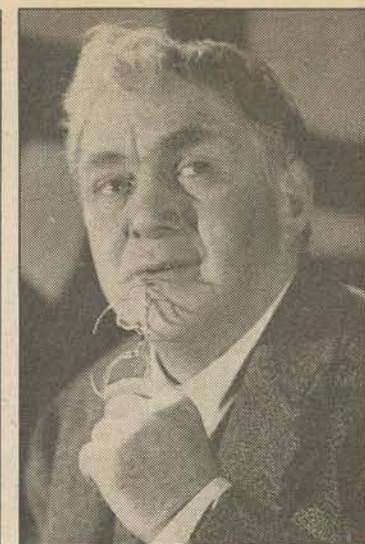

Through Flynn- land

Here is a swashbuckling hero who lives as he acts—but vividly!

SOME lucky stiff's are born with silver spoons in their mouths, but Errol Flynn can beat that. He was born with the blarney stone in his. And, speaking of stiff's, there aren't many careers, even in Hollywood, which began as corpses, either.

Flynn's did—that is, it did if you choose that particular version of his biography. There are several biographies of Mr. Flynn, put out by the publicity boys at his studio, by himself, and by those who say they knew him when. Hardly any of them agree but they're all entertaining.

If all the stories told about Errol Flynn were laid end to end they'd reach from here to Methuselah, and Mr. Flynn is said now to be thirty-one. When he joined the New Guinea Constabulary and was sent into the interior to chase headhunters he said he was twenty-one; however, at that time, as he cheerfully admits now, he was really only seventeen. Anyhow, he almost caught some of the headhunters, at that, and did catch one of their spears through his right leg—or perhaps it was his left leg—and he still carries the scar to this day.

Well, that gives you an idea . . .

That Errol Flynn has led a life lit-

erally packed with adventure there can be no doubt whatever, and the adventure actually began in his own back yard at Antrim Ireland, where he once, at the tender age of four, scared his mother almost to death by pretending that he was his own ancestor, the famous mutineer of the *Bounty*, Fletcher Christian. Errol's grandfather, who was Irish too, was in the habit of taking his grandson upon his knee and telling him bedtime stories all about how Christian and the rest of the mutineers cut throats as casually as other people cut cakes, and so young Errol, doing his best to live up to the family tradition as it were, persuaded some of the neighborhood kids to join him in that game and his horror-stricken mother, rushing outdoors in response to a blood-curdling scream, caught him kneeling athwart one of them with a table-knife poised where it would do the most good. Errol wasn't really going to hurt the other youngster, of course, but even then he had a flair for making things realistic.

After that Grandpa was warned to quit inspiring little Errol's imagination, which, judging by the aftermath from then until now, was about as

necessary as teaching a duckling to swim. Errol was suppressed as much as he could be by being sent to school, and how much that was you can decide for yourself by the fact that he was expelled, or ran away because it was so dull, but in any case he left. And, anyhow, Fletcher Christian wasn't through with him yet—not by a long shot he wasn't.

BELIEVE it or not, it was Christian who afterwards led Errol to become an actor in the first place, and that version is the official studio version of Errol's movie debut. It came about after Errol had almost caught those headhunters in New Guinea, and it came about only because, while he was almost catching them, a man who was with Errol to take motion pictures of the headhunters took pictures of Errol instead; the headhunters were hiding in the brush and didn't want their pictures taken. So when the film was later developed in Australia, and a film company which was then

about to make a movie called "In the Wake of the Bounty" saw the shots of Errol fighting the headhunters they couldn't see, they cabled him to come to Australia from New Guinea right away and play a part in it. The part—guess what? Right. It was no less than Errol's own ancestor, Fletcher Christian.

Flynn says that this film was made and shown in Australia, but nowhere else. The version that you probably saw, in which Clark Gable played Fletcher Christian, was the American-made "Mutiny on the Bounty" with Charles Laughton as Captain Bligh. There was, as the advertisements say, no similarity between the two.

If all this seems to be getting slightly mixed up, what with different versions of films and their characters, remember that it's only on account of Fletcher Christian. He staged that mutiny a long time ago, it's in all the history books that he did, and Errol's mother, as a matter of fact, shouldn't have objected so much to Errol emulating him because he was *her* ancestor anyhow. Errol's father was a peaceful instructor of biology at Queen's College and there weren't any mutineers on his side of the family. That side, undoubtedly, was where the corpse came from that began the next of Errol's movie careers.

In order to get that straight it's necessary to go back to the British Isles and to Errol's seventeenth birthday, when his father, the instructor of biology, invited him to go along to Tasmania on a scientific hunt for a specimen of the duck-billed platypus which the elder Flynn hoped to acquire for a museum. Errol accepted with alacrity, since he smelled adventure, but in Tasmania the duck-billed platypus somehow palled and Errol, after being sent to school in Sydney, took French leave and found himself, broke, at first sleeping on park benches and washing dishes in restaurants for his meals, and then working in a soft-drink factory.

He had a peculiar job. Whereas he had at first smelled adventure, now it was his job to smell bottles. He had to smell them, he explains, to detect any which might have been used to contain kerosene or similar harsh liquids and therefore needed special cleaning treatment.

That palled even worse than the duck-billed platypus, and Errol got the gold-rush fever. He shipped on an island schooner for New Guinea, where a strike had been reported, as cook. That was a bit tough on the rest of the crew, since Errol then didn't know how properly even to boil water, and after a four months' voyage the schooner made Port Moresby, Papua, where the natives wear skewers through their noses and where Errol, because he was supposed to make the return trip as well, says that in the dead of night he slipped over the side, pushing his belongings upon a piece of timber ahead of him, and swam ashore. He didn't know then that those waters were infested with man-eating sharks and giant barracuda, a fish more dangerous than even the most vicious shark.

From that point Errol's adventures went along just like one of his movies, through his enlistment in the Constabulary, from which he resigned because he went swimming one day when he was supposed to be on patrol duty, through a couple of jobs as overseer on copra plantations, back to Australia and thence, as one of the crew on a Liverpool-bound freighter, to French Somaliland, where he decided he'd leave the ship and look around. His looking around took him to Ethiopia, where as a "big game

hunter" who had "lost his baggage" he was the guest of the former Emperor Haile Selassie until the baggage alibi wore thin, when he again departed in the dead of night and got eventually to London.

There he played bit parts on the stage and at long last was seen by a Warner Bros. scout in John Drinkwater's "A Man's House." Signed to a contract he was shipped to Hollywood, and on the boat met a dazzling creature named Lili Damita. Flynn says that they took an immediate dislike to each other, which dislike led to their marriage a few months later.

Errol and Lili, judging from their innumerable separations and reconciliations since, haven't yet decided whether they most like or dislike one another. Their romance has been at least as eventful as Flynn's career, which is considerably eventful.

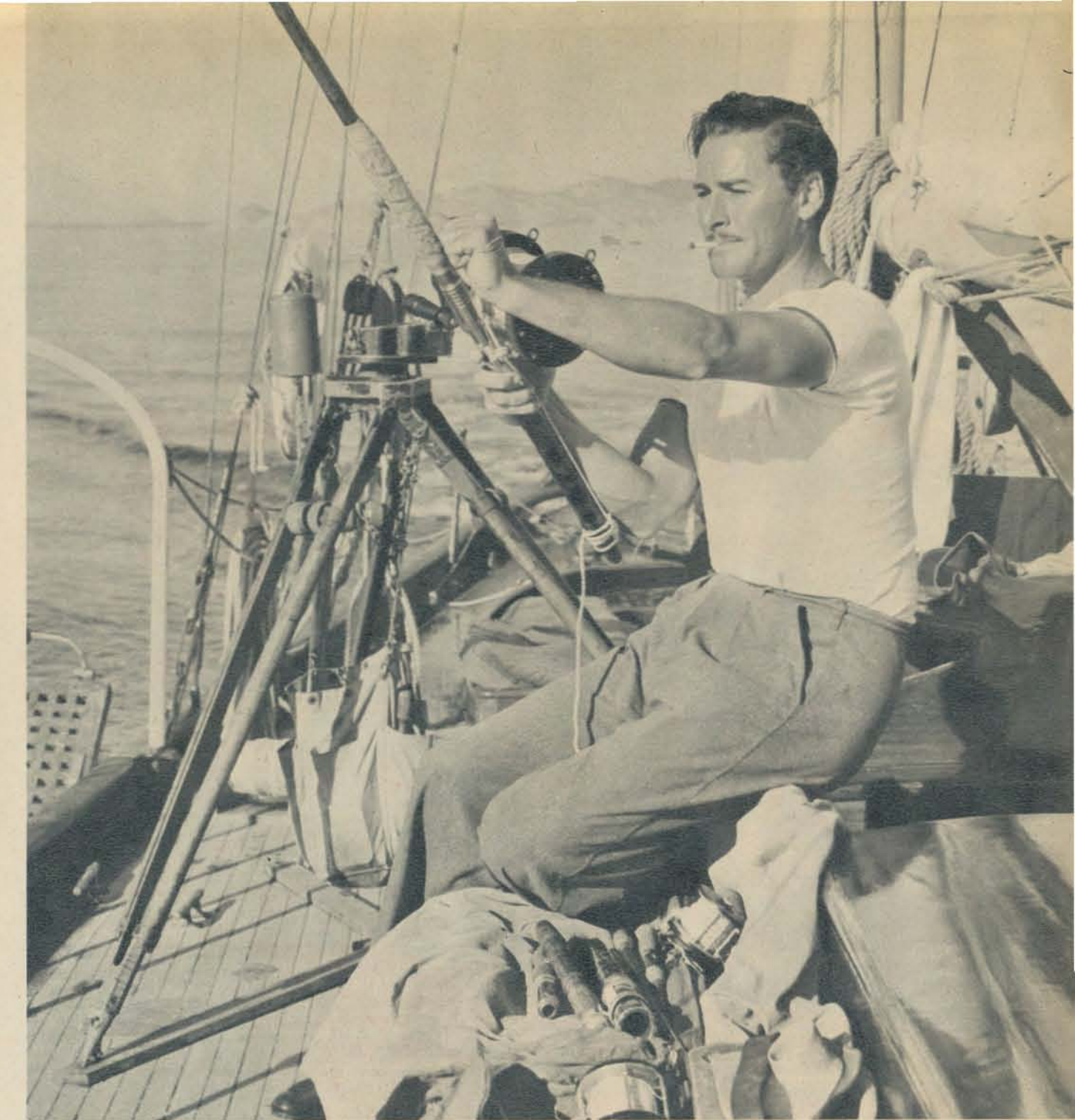
MEANWHILE, as his Hollywood debut and after having come all the way from England, Errol was given that corpse to play. That was in a picture called "The Case of the Curious Bride" and Errol's job was to lie there without speaking or moving, with his face away from the camera, and act very, very dead. It would be nice to say that even in that position Errol's personality registered so vividly that it was his open sesame to stardom, but unfortunately the facts are otherwise. For a long time after playing that corpse Errol's screen career seemed to be suffering from *rigor mortis*.

And then, when a star who had been cast for the part walked off the lot and refused to do it, Errol Flynn, along with a good many others, was tested for "Captain Blood." The corpse came to life with a bang and has been swashbuckling between sea and saddle ever since.

So far so good—but all that, according to the next version, is all wrong. Errol was still born in Ireland, but he left home in his teens to become an actor and played in provincial stock companies in Northampton and Birmingham. A British company decided to film "The Bounty," and because Errol was still Fletcher Christian's descendant he was chosen for the role. The troupe went to Tahiti, and after the film was finished, Flynn, thirsting for adventure, decided to stay in the tropics instead of going back home. Buying a boat and hiring a native crew, he started in the pearl-fishing business, went then to New Guinea, and discovered a gold mine. He sold out for \$10,000 in cash and \$50,000 in stock, which proved worthless, bought another boat and wrecked her on a reef, went to London and back on the stage, and then was discovered by the Warner Bros. scout after appearing in a number of pictures, among which was "Murder at Monte Carlo."

In Hollywood his life has been at least as colorful as it was in Ireland, in Australia, in Ethiopia, Tahiti, and New Guinea; just to keep in trim for his old-time jaunts he frequently goes off to South America, to Mexico, or to anywhere the spirit moves him, and the fist-fights he got into on his recent trip south of the borders show that he hasn't lost any of his youthful gusto. He got into them at all, incidentally, only because he said he saw preparations for Nazi penetration and was outspoken about the fifth columnists.

One pro-Nazi newspaper publisher took Mr. Flynn to task editorially for a speech he made advocating Pan-Americanism, sneering in type that Errol undoubtedly was a very brave warrior in front of the cameras who wouldn't have the courage to fight for

his convictions without a script. Errol sent around his card with an invitation to a fistic duel in his hotel room. The editor didn't accept. Which probably was just as well for him inasmuch as, in 1928, Flynn was a member of the Australian boxing team at the Olympic Games. It's too bad to have to add that, in the semifinals, he was matched with the American Eddie Egan and knocked out.

In Chile Flynn learned how a pretty girl feels when she sells charity kisses—not that he actually sold kisses, but he did sell waltzes at a huge ball which was organized during his stay for the benefit of the British Red Cross. All the ravishing señoritas bid for dances with him, and, when it came their turn, paid with their escorts' money. Flynn doesn't think that Latins are lousy lovers, either, as a now-famous magazine article once alleged.

"Any time a guy up here begins to think he's pretty good," he said, "he should go down to South America and see what real finesse in lovemaking means. Those fellows dance like zephyrs and their compliments could be set to music!"

If in Hollywood Flynn is famous

for anything more than for his stories it's for his attitude toward Hollywood. Unlike most stars he doesn't fancy himself as a great actor, and despite the fact that he receives more fan mail than any other personality on the Warner lot—and did even when Paul Muni was there—he's quite modest about his ability.

"HOLLYWOOD has a lot more gold in it than New Guinea," he says, "and it's a lot easier to get. For me it's very largely luck—and when my luck runs out I'm just going to get aboard my boat and go exploring. Meanwhile I'm paid very much more than anybody is worth for saying a few lines somebody else writes just as a director tells me to say 'em, and when I've said all there are to say in any particular picture I get a nice long vacation in which to play. I love to play," he confessed, "and I guess I keep on being an actor because I'm too lazy to work."

"The only time I really did work hard as an actor I got panned for my pains. That was in 'Elizabeth and Essex,' and I tried to do the very best I could with my role. I took my script home and studied it all night, worried about it even while I ate—with the net

result that, when the reviews came out, the critics said that I tried too hard." He shrugged philosophically. "So I reconcile myself to action pictures," he said, "which aren't so exacting. I didn't have any trouble with 'The Sea Hawk' you bet."

Action unquestionably is Flynn's medium, if only because he's so active himself. He hates the long sessions on the shut-in sound stages, is happy as a kid on a picnic when he's off on location. "Santa Fe Trail" was right up his alley because it was practically all in the open; if he had his way the movies would return to the old days when almost every scene was shot outdoors and nobody worked when it rained. Just the same, he makes tea every afternoon on an electric grill in his dressing-room and drinks it with toast and honey. At home he has a huge white sofa in front of the fireplace in his living room, whereon it is his habit to sprawl with his feet higher than his head.

Notwithstanding all his travels and his unique attitude towards Hollywood, Flynn declares that he likes Hollywood as a place to live better than anywhere else he has ever been

AFTER an interlude of drama on the "heavy" side, Carole Lombard—one of the world's best-dressed women and moviedom's sprightliest comedienne—returns in RKO's "Mr. and Mrs. Smith" to the screwball comedy which brought her stardom and with a wardrobe which cost the studio more than was spent for Lombard wardrobes in her last six pictures combined. For the first time in their careers Lombard and Robert Montgomery play together. Each has made audiences rock with laughter in gay comedies; each has starred with distinction in profound drama. Now they are teamed in the high-gaited drawing-room comedy of the type which brought them stardom. A distinct departure in film experience is "Mr. and Mrs. Smith" for its director, Alfred Hitchcock. Both here and abroad he has been known as a director of suspenseful films jam-packed with spies and intrigue. When Hitchcock came to America, it was with three major objects in view—to film a deep study of human nature, to film a gripping melodrama and an American comedy. He achieved the first of his objectives in "Rebecca"; the second in "Foreign Correspondent," and now, in "Mr. and Mrs. Smith," he completes the triumvirate and offers fresh evidence of his directorial genius. Here is a whirlwind comedy with amusing and often devastating crises. It is played briskly and in an uproarious manner against a background of modern Manhattan, Greenwich Village and a quiet Lake Placid winter resort. "Mr. and Mrs. Smith" was released nationally by RKO during January.

THE METROPOLITAN OPERA COMPANY PRESENTS "CAVALLERIA RUSTICANA" BY PIETRO MASCAGNI AND "PAGLIACCI" BY RUGGIERO LEONCAVALLO, NBC. The cast, "Cavalleria Rusticana": Santuzza, Stella Roman, soprano; Lola, Anna Kaskas, mezzo-soprano; Turiddu, Frederick Jagel, tenor; Alfio, Leonard Warren, baritone; Lucia, Doris Doe, soprano. These two short Italian operas, produced within two years of each other (1890 and 1892), are as inseparable as ham and eggs, being almost always presented on a double bill. They are both melodramas with tragic endings and with vivid, colorful and tuneful music. One of the most famous arias in the tenor repertoire is to be found in "Pagliacci." "Vesti la giubba," badly translated as "Laugh, Clown, Laugh," and the intermezzo of "Cavalleria" are almost as well known as "Home, Sweet Home" or "My Country 'Tis of Thee."

"Cavalleria Rusticana" (Rustic Chivalry) takes place among the

peasants of Sicily in Italy, and is in one act. It is Easter time. Santuzza, in love with Turiddu, has learned that he has been seeing Lola, the wife of Alfio. He was engaged to Lola before doing his military service, and has returned to find Lola married to Alfio. He courts Santuzza and then tires of her. When the opera opens, Santuzza tells Mamma Lucia, Turiddu's mother, of her suspicions. Turiddu appears, Santuzza reproaches him. He denies her accusations but Lola, strolling in, mocks Santuzza and enters the church. Santuzza begs Turiddu not to leave her, but he throws her to the ground and follows Lola. Alfio arrives and is also about to go into the church when Santuzza tells him about his wife and Turiddu and he swears vengeance. The stage is empty for a few minutes while the orchestra plays the "Intermezzo." The crowd of peasants comes out of the church. Turiddu treats them to a drink across the square in his mother's wine shop and offers Alfio a drink, too. He refuses and challenges Turiddu to a duel, biting his ear as a token of challenge. The two men go off. In a few minutes a shriek is heard. Turiddu has been stabbed by Alfio, and Santuzza falls fainting to the ground.

"Pagliacci" opens with a prolog sung before the curtain by Tonio, member of a company of strolling players. The curtain rises on the outskirts of an Italian village. Crowds await the arrival of the players or "I Pagliacci." They arrive riding in a donkey cart, with Canio beating a big drum. Tonio, misshapen, bitter, tries to stir up trouble between Canio and his wife, Nedda, accusing her of unfaithfulness. Nedda is in love with a villager, Silvio, who keeps a secret tryst with her. Tonio betrays her to Canio, who commands her to tell the name of her lover, but she refuses, and goes to dress for the performance. Canio is left alone and cries out his rage and grief in the famous "Laugh, Clown, Laugh." In the last act the players give a performance for the assembled peasants, among them Silvio. The plot of their little play is much like the domestic tragedy of Canio and Nedda, and the crowd soon senses that this is no play, but reality. As the play nears its end, the peasants become uneasy. Canio, crazy with rage, tries to force a confession from Nedda, and when he fails, finally stabs her. She calls on Silvio, who runs to her, and is also stabbed by Canio. Dazed by what he has done, he turns to the spectators and says, "The comedy is ended."

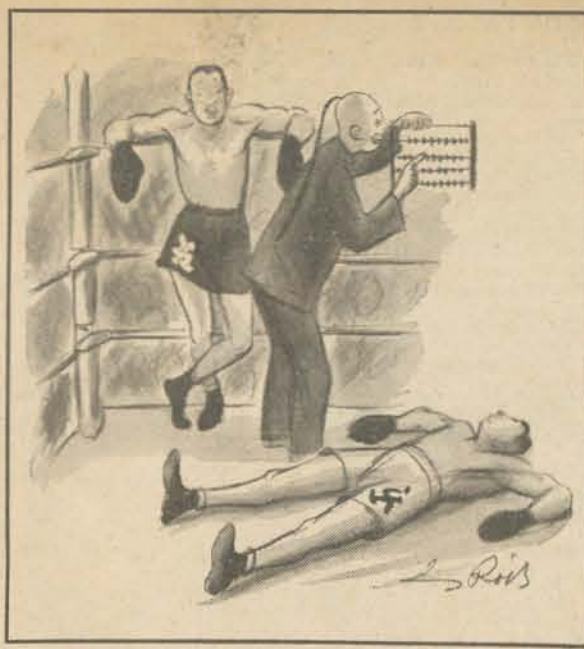

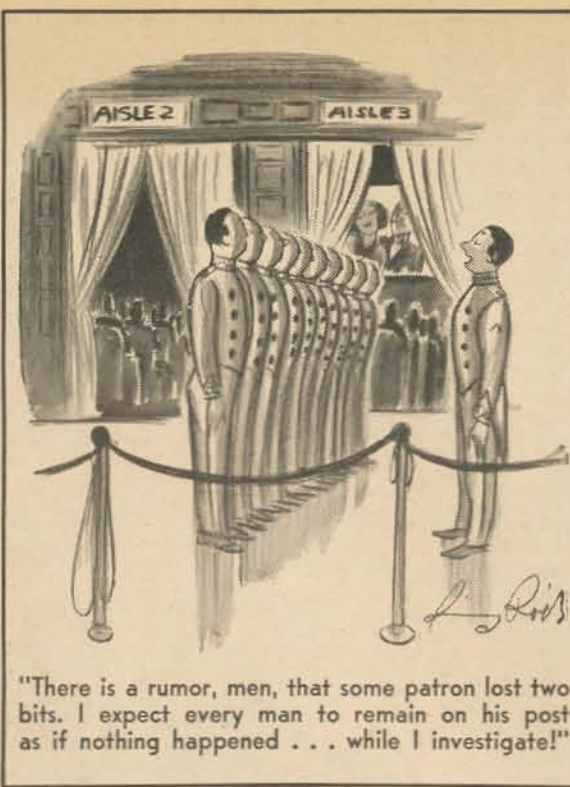

"Romance of Helen Trent"

EIGHT years ago Virginia Clark, possessing beauty, youth and talent, turned from a marriage with her play-boy husband to find a new life. In radio, as Helen Trent, she found it—a job which interested her so deeply that she has since succeeded in making Helen known to almost every daytime listener as the heroine of "The Romance of Helen Trent," heard Monday through Friday over CBS. Meantime,

Virginia Clark has found real-life happiness in a second marriage. Helen Trent is a woman in her thirties who refuses to let life pass her by. She had been married for thirteen years to Martin Trent when he divorced her for a younger woman. Having lost her beauty, and now facing a bleak future, she does a daring thing. With the encouragement of her elderly Aunt Agatha (Marie Nelson), she becomes

a dress-designer, winning a contract with Sentinel Pictures, whose president, Drew Sinclair (Reese Taylor), admires her and her work. They fall in love. Tragedy enters when Drew's young son, Peter, dies, and the grief-stricken father is taken to a sanitarium, where Helen is allowed to see him only at infrequent intervals because of his mental condition, which ranges from normal to complete un-

balance. Figuring importantly in Helen's existence is gay, hard-boiled Alice Carroll (Gingr Jones), who won Philip King, now dead, from her, but is now an intimate friend. There are also Margot Burkhart (Alice Hill) and Jeanette McNeil (Vivien Fridell). "The Romance of Helen Trent" is a story of heart-throbs and heartaches; it is also an adventure in making the romance of youth live into middle life.



DESIGN FOR *Listening*

How one mother discovered in radio a highroad to the riches of the mind—for her whole family

WHEN Ken took the job in —ville I thought the end of the world had come. To have to live in a small town after the glamour and excitement of New York—it was like a death sentence. And just when the children were old enough to enjoy everything the big city could give them. I argued, begged Ken not to take the job, but it was no use. He answered that it was only for a few years, until the new plant was built and running, and then he'd have the choice of a job anywhere. But I thought I knew what those few years would mean. The children would grow up without any advantages and we would all be out of touch with everything that really mattered.

I tried to make the best of it those first few months in —ville, but it was pretty hard. I had too much time on my hands. But one day young Ken stayed home from school with a bad cold. That bad cold turned out to be the luckiest bit of misfortune that ever happened to me. I bundled him up on the living-room couch, turned on the radio and went out to market. When I came back, I found young Ken listening, fascinated. I sat down and listened, too. What I heard was a vivid and dramatic description of exploration in the Gobi Desert. The speaker, Dr. Roy Chapman Andrews of the American Museum of Natural History of New York, was recounting one of his fossil-hunting expeditions. I found myself hanging on his words, holding my breath as he described the dangers and thrills of the trip, sighing with relief as the caravan arrived at its destination. When he stopped speaking it was announced that this was part of the American School of the Air course, heard daily except Saturdays and Sundays over the Columbia Broadcasting System.

I began to laugh. "Imagine getting so worked up over a radio program," I said to young Ken, a little ashamed. But he didn't even hear me. His eyes were glistening with excitement and he said, "Gee, Mom, that was swell! Do you think there are more things like that on the air?" I looked at him a moment and then heard myself answer, "I don't know, son. But I'm

going to find out without further delay."

Of course we'd always had a radio. In the city it stood in the corner in lonely magnificence. We even used it once in a while. Ken liked Charlie McCarthy; little Ken listened to "The Lone Ranger." We tuned in on news and sports reports. And when the crowd came over in the evening it was convenient for dance music. But for the rest, we were too busy. We went to concerts, subscribed to the New York Philharmonic. We went to the opera now and then, and to the theater at least twice a month. I attended a lecture course, and the children went to the Saturday morning Philharmonic Children's Concerts. We were like most of the couples we knew, who turn their radio dial haphazardly, and go on about their business of reading the newspaper or playing bridge while the radio buzzes along unnoticed. One of our pet phrases was, "You never can get a thing on the radio!"

Now suddenly I found you could. That night I studied the radio programs in the paper. I found listed one first-class symphony orchestra, a play, two lectures and an educational forum. The next day I bought a copy of MOVIE-RADIO GUIDE. And I made the extraordinary discovery that radio schedules a minimum of one symphony a day; that radio forums employ the best minds in the country; that one can acquire a well-rounded education over the air; and that it is possible to enjoy a cultural "season" in one's own home the equal of any in a big city.

FROM then on our family started to "go to the radio." It became the most important piece of furniture in the house . . . after we stopped treating it as a grab-bag and whining when we failed to draw a prize. We decided that to get the most out of radio we had to have a plan. With the help of MOVIE-RADIO GUIDE and the daily paper I worked out a program that included most of the best things on the air. That winter was one of the most entertaining and instructive we had had in years.

Now every winter we follow the

same routine. When fall comes we write to the networks for whatever literature they might have on the coming winter's programs . . . and are promptly deluged with an avalanche of forecasts, booklets, pamphlets and study manuals. Some are sent free of charge, others on receipt of a nominal sum. We map out our free time exactly as though we had bought subscriptions or tickets to lectures, concerts, operas or the theater. Then we attend—yes, attend—in our living-room every broadcast we've planned to hear with the same seriousness and respect we would accord a public performance in a hall.

On Sunday afternoons we go to the Philharmonic. The Sunday papers have been read, the dishes washed. We draw up comfortable chairs, Ken and I light cigarettes and stop talking. We feel that just because we can relax in our own home is no reason to discuss my new hat or Ken's golf score during the concert.

Thursday evenings have become just as inviolate. At 9:30 p.m. EST the Town Meeting of the Air begins. We know in advance what the forum is to be about, the speakers who are to take part. We try to read up as much as possible on the subject beforehand. I like debates on education and foreign politics. Ken prefers business and government affairs. The Town Meeting affords us an opportunity to hear experts in their fields discuss our favorite topics. Last winter we invited a few people in on Thursdays, Town Meeting enthusiasts like ourselves. After the broadcasts we had an informal forum of our own over highballs. This year there is talk of enlarging the Thursday night gatherings, taking the high-school auditorium and organizing a community forum.

When the Toscanini concerts first started, I organized a group of the town's music-lovers, and we meet at each other's houses for dinner every Saturday night. Afterwards our town music-teacher, who has had excellent training in one of the best American music conservatories, gives us a short talk on the evening's program. And at ten the radio is turned on, and a group of silent, appreciative listeners

give Toscanini the concentrated attention he deserves.

I used to bewail the fact that I could go to the opera only once in a while, it was so expensive. But now I go every Saturday afternoon during the season—via radio. And the children still hear the Saturday morning Philharmonic children's concerts. They are all broadcast. Besides, they hear Dr. Damrosch's Music Appreciation Hour in school every Friday afternoon, not to mention countless other hours which are giving them a thrilling insight into a score of other subjects.

The theater was the thing we enjoyed most in the city. And I knew that —ville had no theater, and that road companies were few and far between. But so far we've had no reason to complain of the lack of them. I found that nowadays there is hardly one Broadway show that doesn't sooner or later reach the air in a condensed version. Hollywood takes many of its pictures from Broadway plays and presents radio adaptations. The legitimate stage is hurrying to catch up with the example set by the movies and now supplies much of radio's best talent.

THIS year, for instance, we're taking in the Helen Hayes Theater. My fifteen-year-old daughter, Janie, has developed stage ambitions, and every week she listens to Helen Hayes with a copy of that week's play on her lap. Next day we hear strange mummings from her bedroom and recognize a passable imitation of Miss Hayes' voice. Janie follows the Great Plays series also on Sundays and is getting a thorough grounding in the classic drama that she wouldn't get if she had to depend only on reading.

With radio theaters such as Helen Hayes, the Silver and Lux Theaters and the Screen Guild, the new and significant dramatic experiments of Arch Oboler and Norman Corwin, and the Great Plays series, every type of play is given on the air. Even the good old soap-opera has its uses. I know of at least two young people from —ville who are working steadily in those serials. They've become a sort

ON THE BANDWAGON

ALTHOUGH Count Basie did not win national acclaim until 1937, his name has been a famous one in musical circles since the early thirties. Basie was one of the stars of the great Benny Moten orchestra which was greatly responsible for the so-called "Kansas City" style of jazz. When Moten died in 1935, Basie took the stars of the Moten crew and organized a band of his own, which soon came to the attention of Benny Goodman. Benny, whose own band at that time was plenty hot, was amazed at the terrific jazz which the Basie crew gave out. It was this admiration for Basie's style which led him to assist the "Count" by recommending the band to his own manager, Willard Alexander. Alexander, upon hearing the band, was impressed, too, and agreed to manage it. Incidentally, he's never had cause to regret this decision, for since taking over its management the band has piled up an enviable playing-record. Leading dance-spots throughout the country have found that Basie's music is the kind that breaks attendance records made by other bands. Basie, who was born in Red Bank, N. J., in 1906, gained his title of "Count" while in Chicago many years ago. Down and out, he took a job as a pianist in a nickel movie house. Quickly his swiftly moving and talented fingers won him a permanent job, and likewise a title, for it seems that regarding the latter the patrons sensed a certain "royal" air about him as he sat down and struck the piano keyboard. They began to shout, "That guy must be a Count!" Thusly did William Basie acquire the sobriquet which has stayed with him through the years.

Two years ago the band made its New York debut, opening at the Famous Door on Fifty-second Street. As an indication of the band's popularity

and interest shown in Basie's brand of "jump" swing, ordinary patrons of the place were unable to gain admittance, due to the fact that practically every musician in town was on hand. Since that history-making night the "Count" and his boys have ranked high among the nation's bands in popularity. For that reason, and because the "Count's" contribution to swing has been an important factor in the success of that type of music, *MOVIE-RADIO GUIDE* nominates the Basie orchestra as the **BAND OF THE WEEK!** Next week: Charlie Spivak.

Bandata

Sometime in February Artie Shaw will make his first New York appearance since he walked out on his old band there more than a year ago. He will accompany Burns and Allen to the Big Town, from which place the zanies will do five scheduled broadcasts. . . . There seems to be a rush to sign up big-name bands for new movie productions. It probably started with the success of the Kay Kyser movies.

Which reminds us, Kay and his band will return to Hollywood sometime in February and remain until next September. He will undoubtedly make another movie for RKO while there. . . . Just for whom Benny Goodman will make a movie is uncertain. Various reports have it that his band has received offers from Columbia, RKO and Paramount. The last-named studio is reported to be thinking about co-starring him with Count Basie in a feature musical production. Benny, incidentally, broke a ban of long standing when the conservative *New York Times* ran a full story on him in its

Sunday magazine section. . . . Another bandman who will make a picture is Glenn Miller. He is set for 20th Century-Fox' "The Great American Broadcast," which will star Alice Faye and Jack Oakie. . . . Ben Bernie set a new attendance record at the Victor Hugo in Hollywood when he opened there recently. All his old pals of the show days turned out to see him, and a great reunion it was. Movie executives are said to be trying to arrange another one of those Bernie-Winchell "feud" films. . . . Here's the reason why Marion Hutton left the Glenn Miller band following W. Winchell's scoop report on the forthcoming "blessed event." The report made her feel too self-conscious although the baby isn't expected for some time yet. . . . Will Osborne is scrapping his band and will head for Hollywood to start life anew as a movie director. . . . Which calls to mind the reported rumor that Horace Heidt may stop his radio work

and stick strictly to the movies! . . . Ork-leader Horace Henderson has given up his band. He will concentrate upon arranging for Charlie Barnett. . . . Bob Allen, the vocalist in the Kemp band, is being mentioned as a dark horse for the band's baton-waving job. Previously mentioned were John Scott Trotter, Skinnay Ennis and Saxie Dowell. A definite announcement as to who will inherit the late Hal Kemp's baton will be made about the first of February, when the band goes on tour. . . . When Decca tore up Jimmy Dorsey's contract and gave him a new one it automatically made the band the highest paid on its list.

Toscanini: Musical Diplomat

AMAZINGLY, the diplomacy of bully and barter which grips the world today has met its match in a white-haired ambassador, whose dispatch case contains only a well-worn sheaf of symphonic scores, whose secrets hold nothing more mysterious than the universal appeal of great music. In this day of Hitler, it is true, Arturo Toscanini's diplomacy of music seemed childish and impotent to many good people. But Mr. Toscanini proved they were wrong.

He proved it by boarding a boat in New York harbor last May 31 with his famous NBC Symphony Orchestra to begin a South American concert tour which was to become an unprecedented junket of democratic good-will from our own country to the great commonwealths south of the border. It was not, however, a case of simply boarding a boat.

Fifty-four years before, Toscanini had made his debut as a young Italian conductor in Rio de Janeiro. Twenty-five years before, he had received a thundering ovation at the Teatro Colon in Buenos Aires. Years had passed, and he had turned a consistently deaf ear to entreaties of South American music lovers anxious for his return. Instead, he had come to the United States—to the New York Philharmonic Symphony, and later to the NBC Symphony Orchestra. South American music-lovers persisted. Finally, in 1939, came a letter to NBC's Samuel Chotzinoff from Norman A. Bogdan, a thirty-eight-year-old music-lover and banker, prominent throughout the South American republics. Mr. Bogdan wrote from Buenos Aires: "We are willing to go to almost any lengths to meet yours and Toscanini's conditions . . . I warn you that I won't take no for an answer!"

This time Mr. Toscanini didn't say no. Mr. Toscanini is keenly interested in the fortunes of democracy. He has long been a voluntary exile from Signor Mussolini's Italy. He was, it may be remembered, one of those world-famous musicians who declined the

doubtful honor of appearing at the Nazis' Bayreuth Music Festival. When it was presented to him that a South American concert tour could be an ideal means of fostering friendship between the Americas, the gentlemanly conductor could not say no.

There was then the problem of how to transport a hundred musicians half around the world. And how to pay them. Patriotism and sacrifice upon the part of NBC, of the union which governs the professional conduct of the musicians, and of Toscanini himself, helped to provide a solution. When expenses had been whittled down to somewhat less than fantastic proportions, the National Broadcasting Company and four South American cities—Rio de Janeiro, Buenos Aires, Sao Paulo and Montevideo—agreed to divide them. NBC was to furnish transportation; the municipalities (where concerts were to be held) were to house the musicians.

So, on May 31, the good ship *Brazil* sailed out of New York harbor and its pea-soup fog, carrying a precious load of musicians and instruments on a two-week roll down to Rio. It was a carnival holiday for the musical gentry. Those accompanied by their wives—thirty of them were—got first choice of staterooms; others paired off and drew lots for the remaining rooms. Comfortably settled in one of the ship's two de luxe suites, Mr. and Mrs. Toscanini played host and hostess to all. Giving the lie to stories of aloofness and temperament, the maestro behaved like a schoolboy, chattering with his musicians and promenading the deck in gaily flowered silk pajamas, cork-soled sandals and beret.

In such manner did these carefree gentlemen arrive at their destination, standing at the *Brazil's* rail, gasping at the beauty of Rio's harbor, crowned as it is by Sugar Loaf Mountain and studded with tiny green isles. Their own eagerness could only be compared with the enthusiasm of Rio de Janeiro citizens who shouted from the

Musician of the Week

Albert Spalding

Story of the poor little rich boy who cried for his fiddle

NOT that Mozart couldn't have been a professor at the age of fourteen, but he just wasn't. Not that Albert Spalding couldn't say to himself, "Well, I have it on Mozart," but he just wouldn't.

Nevertheless, it is true. At the age of fourteen he was graduated from the conservatory at Bologna, Italy, with the highest honors accorded to any young musician there since the time of Mozart. The diploma handed to Albert set forth that he was not only a brilliant violinist but also a professor of that instrument and of harmony! If he hasn't ever used the title, it's only because he has an abiding sense of modesty—and of humor.

Back in 1888, when he was born in Chicago, it looked for all the world as if he would manufacture official league baseballs and sell sporting goods when he grew up, for that was the business of his late father, head of the famous firm of A. G. Spalding & Bros., still in existence. Right here the story should tell how young Albert began to pick out the notes on the violin when he was a baby, and cried for Bach's "Chaconne" instead of Castoria. But as a matter of fact, he dutifully took his Castoria and until he was seven played tag and peek-a-boo and everything else except the violin.

Then, as he relates himself, one day he heard a wandering street fiddler who carried a monkey that collected pennies thrown as a sop to art. So Albert cried for a violin, not because he liked the instrument, but because he imagined that if he became proficient on it he might some day also have a monkey.

Mrs. Spalding, his mother, a musical enthusiast and cultured pianist (she was a pupil in Chicago of Emil Liebling, great-uncle of this writer), was delighted. Her secret hope had always been that Albert might become a great musician.

Having successfully cried himself into a violin, one would suppose that he now devoted himself to it heart and soul, but he didn't. He used to practise his scales mechanically, the while he read a story book propped on his music-rack.

However, he got caught, and the first thing he knew, his mother and he were living in Bologna and later in Paris, which was the scene of his professional concert

debut when he was sixteen. The event was a huge success and soon engagements came all over Europe. His wise mother had seen to it that general culture was not neglected, so Albert acquired an amazing knowledge of literature, art, history, languages. Today he speaks five tongues masterfully—including the choicest English, as all know who hear him emceeing Sunday for the Coca-Cola show.

Returning to America in 1908, Albert bowed himself into a debut at Carnegie Hall, but for years he had difficulty in making the critics accept him as a first-rank artist, for they had an idea that the wealth of his family was buying him all the appearances he made. For the same reason he was offered small fees, or none at all. So he went back to Europe and stayed there until his fame compelled American managers to bring him over here again—and this time at fees as large as those received by other fiddlers of rank.

The career of the poor little rich boy has since gone steadily upward.

If you've guessed by now that Spalding is very much of a regular person, you've guessed right. Tall, dark, broad-shouldered, with only slightly silvered hair, he laughs when he is reminded of the time when he "cried for Castoria" rather than the Bach "Chaconne."

"Well, I must have been some crier," he answers. "The first long-term radio engagement I ever had was for—Fletcher's Castoria."

Everything is calm at MBS. . . . Tommy Dorsey's saxophone-player was slugged by four men outside the Strand Theater the other morning. Police indicate it's girl trouble. . . . Henry Levine, maestro of "The Chamber Music Society of Lower Basin Street," and

Vivian A. Brown, daughter of a movie executive, were married January 11 and spent a short honeymoon in Atlantic City. . . . It seems certain that Toscanini will not be with NBC next year. . . . There are now nine hundred radio stations in operation or in process of opening in the U. S.

AUSTRALIA ON THE SHORT WAVES

BEFORE the outbreak of war, short-wave radio in Australia was mainly for the benefit of listeners in the far-out back country and in the islands around the coast of the continent. Since the war, however, Australia's short-wave radio activities have grown until eleven transmissions are now broadcast daily in English, French, Dutch and Spanish.

Summaries of Australian and Pacific news are heard morning and evening daily throughout America, separate transmissions being directed to eastern and western regions of the United States and Canada. Programs for listeners in the eastern part of North America are broadcast daily at 4:20 a.m. over VLQ5 (9.68) and at 1:55 p.m. PST over VLQ7 (11.88). The morning transmission is much the better received of the two. Broadcasts for listeners on the Pacific Coast are radiated daily at 7:25 a.m. and at 9:55 p.m. PST over VLQ7 (11.88). In addition to English news summaries which are heard near the beginning of each transmission, special discussions of significant phases of the news are featured on the Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday morning broadcasts. On Monday and Friday mornings Richard Qua, a Canadian newspaperman now living in Australia, talks about aspects of Australian life he finds interesting and unusual. The evening programs, on the other hand, are designed to give American listeners a clear picture of Australian war effort and potentialities, and her feelings about the course of the war and the trend of events in the south Pacific. The transmissions for Pacific Coast listeners broadcast Friday evenings at 9:55 p.m. PST,

contains a special feature entitled "The Truth of It Is . . ." American listeners who have heard this broadcast say that the Australian commentaries are probably the saltiest in the world. When they really "go to town" they are even more pungent than the Germans.

The object of these Australian broadcasts, which are prepared by the Government Department of Information, is to strengthen and extend the existing bonds of interest and friendship between the United States and its fellow democracy in the southwestern Pacific.

Robert Skyten of East Brookfield, Mass., reports the anti-Nazi German Freedom Station "Deutscher Freiheitssender," currently on 9.795 megs, is being heard daily from 9 to 10 a.m. and from 12 noon to 12:45 p.m. PST, with very strong and clear signals. Despite frantic efforts by Germany's secret police to locate and exterminate those operating this mysterious station, the broadcasts go merrily on . . . Nazi-sponsored broadcasts from Holland can now be heard daily from 3:30 to 7:45 a.m. PST, over PCJ (15.22) and PCV (18.065), with news bulletins in English at 3:45, 4:45, 6:30 and 7:30 a.m. PST . . . AFRICA'S OWN WAR OF WORDS: SUX (7.865), Cairo, Egypt, broadcasts daily from 9:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. PST. The last half-hour of this broadcast is sometimes audible in the United States . . . FZI (11.97), located at Brazzaville, French Equatorial Africa, Free France station of General DeGaulle, is still being heard in this country daily from 12 noon to 1 p.m. PST, with astonishingly strong signals . . . French stations in Algeria and Morocco are very active. CNR (12.83) and CNR2 (11.94), "Radio Maroc," at Rabat, Morocco, and TP2 (12.12) and TP22 (8.96), "Radio Algiers," at Alger, Algeria, are broadcasting daily from approximately 10:45 a.m. to 1 p.m. PST. All stations in this new network relay an important news bulletin in French at 11:45 a.m. PST.

and says that he enjoys even Hollywood parties. Hollywood, in his case, is really Beverly Hills, where Lili and he have their home.

All those who like him most now didn't like Errol at all at first. There was Lili to begin with, and then Olivia de Havilland, who has played opposite him so many times. It is common knowledge all over Hollywood that in their first few pictures together Errol and Olivia scarcely spoke between scenes, and when they did they usually said something nasty. Now she says that Errol is the one man in Hollywood who can completely captivate a woman's imagination. Upon first acquaintance Errol seems to have a somewhat cocky attitude, which in all probability really is his cover-up for his uncertainty inside. Actually he's even shy.

Errol's virtually inseparable companions are Johnny Meyer, his bodyguard, valet, stand-in and what have you, and his schnauzer, Arno. To show just how considerate he is of both, on the recent trip to South America Flynn introduced Johnny as a wealthy cousin so that he would get some attention from the señoritas too, and, for Arno's benefit, both masts on Errol's yacht, *Sirocco*, are camouflaged at the bottom as trees.

That boat is really Flynn's true love—he would cheerfully part with all his earthly possessions rather than with her. His life has very largely been spent on boats, and the *Sirocco* is the namesake of the old ketch he bought down in the islands after he made his gold strike. Flynn purchased his present yacht with his first major earnings as a film star, bought her even before he could really afford to, and if all else in his world failed him he still could find complete happiness in the feel of her decks beneath his feet. He and Johnny and Arno often go for voyages of a thousand miles or more on the *Sirocco*, spending weeks aboard her at a time.

Besides being an actor, Errol Flynn is an author who has written many

articles on his travels, a book on pearl-fishing, and two novels, one based upon his adventures with two companions when sailing the original *Sirocco* the three thousand miles from Sydney to Papua. The trip was climaxed with a typhoon, in which the boat was wrecked and one of Flynn's comrades drowned.

Around his neck Flynn always wears an embossed disk suspended upon a slender chain, which he never removes. The disk is a medallion of St. Christopher, the patron saint of travelers, and the story how he got it is highly dramatic. It was while he was down at Rabaul, in New Guinea, and had started upon an expedition into the interior, that he came one day upon what appeared to be the remains of a camp. Expecting to find another victim of the headhunters, he found instead, still faintly breathing, a Catholic priest.

For an entire week Flynn managed to keep the priest alive. He nursed him with what medical skill he had been forced to acquire as a copra overseer—during which time, he says, he not only performed amputations upon the natives but also practised obstetrics—however the missionary's strength ebbed daily and one evening, just as the sun was going down, he made a supreme effort and drew Flynn close. He took the medallion and chain from around his own neck, put them around Flynn's, and fell back dead.

"I believe I owed my life to that medallion several times in the ensuing few years," Flynn has often told those who ask the significance of the disk.

Maybe that pleasant, but slightly twisted grin of Mr. Flynn's is because he does have his tongue in his cheek. Maybe not quite all of his romancing is done on the screen—still, nobody ever lost out in Hollywood from being overcolorful. Maybe Mr. Flynn hasn't won any Academy Awards and doesn't expect to win any; nevertheless, all in all, his illustrious ancestor of "Bounty" fame can be justifiably proud of him. Errol is doing the best he can to keep life from becoming humdrum, too.

of training-ground for our stage-struck youth who can't find work in the theater or the movies.

Our listening plan includes not only plenty of entertainment but a little extra learning as well. Last year I found that my knowledge of musical history was a bit confused. So this winter I'm planning to tune in on the Eastman School of Music hour Saturday mornings and follow its Milestones in Music course. Conducted by Dr. Howard Hanson, outstanding American conductor and composer, it traces the development of music from the thirteenth century right down to the latest American composition still in manuscript. NBC has already sent me advance schedules for the entire course and I've bought a musical encyclopedia for reference purposes. At the end of the winter I expect to have a pretty good working knowledge of the history of music. Ken has decided he needs brushing up a little on American history and is finding "Cavalcade of America" ideal for the purpose.

THE other day, looking through some college prospectuses for Janie, I was amazed at how many of them use radio programs as a regular part of their curriculum. I found that over sixty-five colleges and universities have assigned listening as well as assigned reading, and that at least sixty-five percent of all broadcasts come under the classification of adult education, defined as beginning where formal education leaves off. Apparently the networks have discovered that the American appetite for learning painlessly acquired is voracious. I know that I've learned an amazing number of things from "Information, Please" and that it has reawakened my interest in reading. The radio provides information on practically any subject, from geology to pie-making, from astronomy to the latest in can-openers. Most of the programs are dramatized. All I've listened to are fun.

I've heard that radio's recent zeal for public benefaction is the result of the Federal Communications Commission investigation, which put radio on the carpet and delved deeply into its activities. But Ken and I don't believe that whole-heartedly. We feel that behind that which has enriched our lives to such an extent must be a sincere desire to benefit the listeners, and not just the pocket-books of the radio moguls. It's true that many broadcasts are still cheap, vulgar and of no value whatsoever. But a much greater percentage has become the most important cultural force in the country.

Last year Ken asked me if I wanted to move back to the city. I refused. I had realized that today it doesn't matter if you live in a big town or a little one. Radio will give you what you think you lack and much that you couldn't get any other way.

Now, more than ever, with the world involved in what seems like hopeless catastrophe, Ken and I are grateful to the efforts of radio to keep us and millions like us informed and alert, ready to defend any threat against our democracy. We understand and appreciate what radio is doing to help America preserve the past and out of it create a future. And to the best of our ability we're trying to cooperate—by not taking radio for granted.

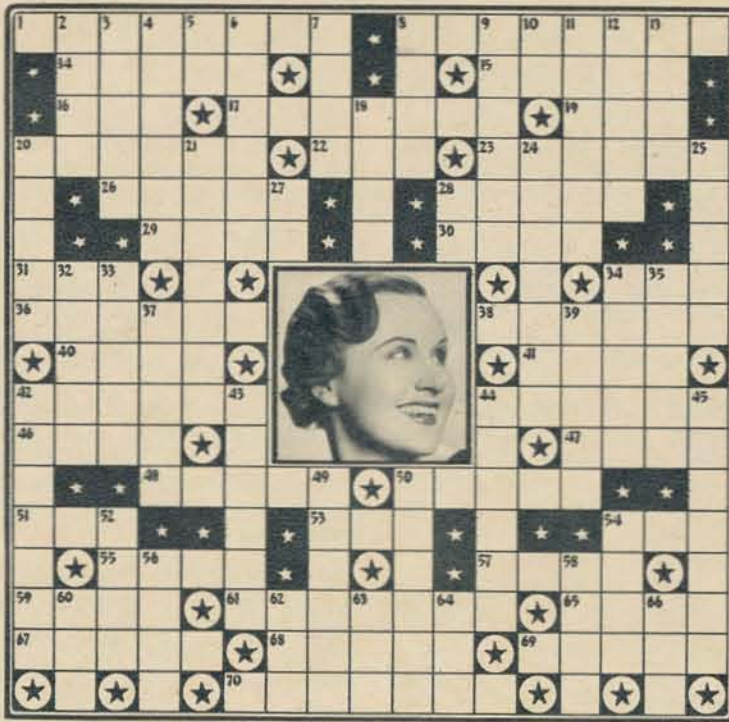

crowded pier as the *Brazil* docked.

That evening, June 12, Toscanini displayed his "perfect instrument" to a crowd jammed so closely together that many fainted in the crush. The next afternoon the performance was repeated. Meanwhile, Toscanini was proving his skill in the art of diplomacy. After thrilling official Rio with his music, he proceeded to make friends in every quarter until all Rio was proposing a toast to Toscanini, and—more important—to the United States!

Rougher diplomatic waters lay ahead. In Montevideo, for instance, whence rumors of Nazi fifth-column plans to make trouble had already reached the party. And in Buenos Aires, "City of the Friendly Air," government officials had not always been too friendly to the Stars and Stripes. There were to be four concerts in Brazil's Sao Paulo, four in Buenos Aires and four in Montevideo—then two more in Rio on the return journey. But if Mr. Toscanini was worried he didn't show it as he sailed from Rio with his men on June 15.

In Montevideo, where anti-American demonstrations had been half-anticipated, there were demonstrations . . . tremendous ones. The audience made threats, but they were threats to tear down the hall unless Toscanini would take a thirteenth bow. He took it. Having already taken off his suit, he appeared swathed in an overcoat.

In the "City of the Friendly Air," four thousand listeners packed the Teatro Colon for each concert while thousands waited outside for a glimpse of the famous conductor, and one woman flew two thousand miles from Patagonia to attend the concert. Argentinian dignitaries wined and dined the maestro. Music-lovers opened their homes—and hearts—to him. Newspapers carried columns of adulation.

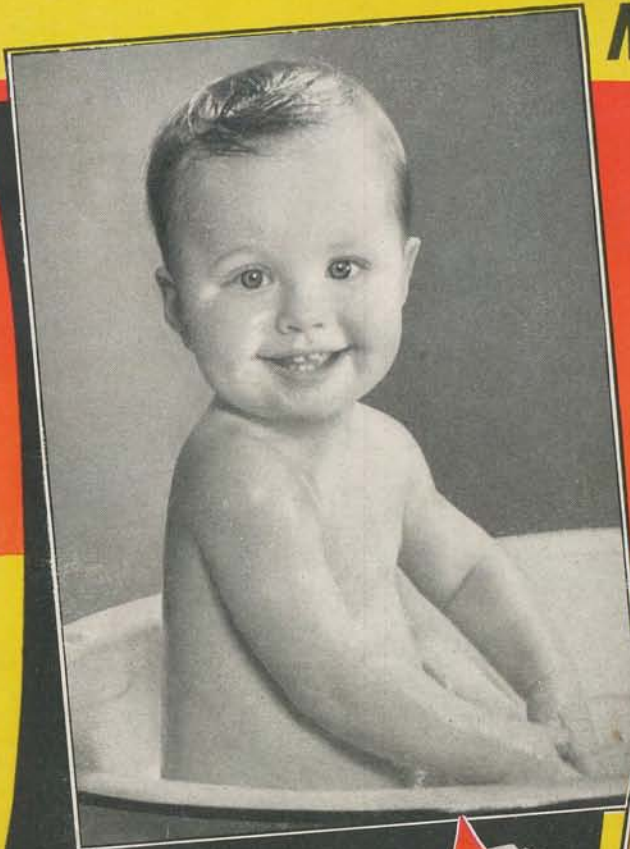
Not all of the success of the Toscanini tour need be left to the imaginations of admirers in the United States, for all of the sixteen concerts were broadcast to North America. Wild applause and shouts of approval which punctuated them were thrilling to music-lovers, of course, but they were even more thrilling to Yankees who hope to cement more firmly their ties of friendship with South American republics. South Americans, it appeared, were more easily swayed by music than by military might.

Thus, as the liner *Uruguay* steamed up East River on July 22, marking the triumphant end of Toscanini's tour, and as Mr. Toscanini resumed his concerts at Radio City last fall, it was not unnatural that we should look to him with new admiration and new appreciation. Through him, music became, for us, an ambassador of friendship and good-will which did more to unite the Americas than a dozen armies or a fleet of battleships. More than that, ambassador Toscanini, with his universal language of music, has pointed to the hard but hopeful path which we may follow in making democracy, like music, the universal language of the nations.
