We who are still free to listen, and who are privileged to listen to the best that money can buy, can pause at any moment at all and begin to count our many blessings.

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BMI MUSIC possesses much sound and some fury but little melody, according to most readers of this publication. As we announced last week, 70.8% of our readers voted that they liked the old ASCAP music better. This week we have some more figures. We believe they are important.

We asked, "Were you aware of a change in the musical quality of programs after Jan. 1?"

YES . . . 95%
 NO . . . 5%

We asked, "Do you think music of the sort you are now hearing will be satisfactory permanently?"

YES . . . 23.8%
 NO . . . 76.2%

We asked, "Do you think ASCAP and BMI should get together and cooperate instead of continuing the fight which deprives listeners of some of their favorite numbers?"

YES . . . 90.2%
 NO . . . 9.8%

Up to now the public has supported BMI because they have understood that ASCAP was attempting something in which the average citizen did not believe. They will probably continue this support.

But they would like to hear fewer contrapuntal catastrophes and rickety roundelays.

PUBLIC SERVICE is a cardinal tenet of every broadcaster's creed. Typical is the recent broadcast by WBT in Charlotte, N. C. Influenza had closed most of the schools and all of the churches. A. E. Joscelyn, WBT's manager, offered his facilities to the local churches. Holy services were held in WBT's studios, and parishioners heard their pastors without leaving their own hearth-sides. This is a public service that any station in either weather-bound or disease-ridden communities can offer its loyal listeners.

It was not until later that he went in for comedy in a big way, and his success on stage and radio was assured. Love on a
Phonograph Record

IRENE DUNNE AND CARY GRANT, veterans of many a film funfest, are brought together again for "Penny Serenade," a heart-breaking and heart-warming tale by turns concerned with a couple who met over a phonograph record, which, much later on, plays a part in saving their happiness. Humor is incidental to the story, filled with pathos and far off the beaten Dunne-Grant path of movie-making. Grant plays a reporter striving to build his own weekly newspaper. Miss Dunne is his wife and helpmate

Norma Shearer, often known as filmdom's first lady, was born in Montreal of a family long known as industrial and cultural leaders of the community. Her father, president of a large lumber and contracting company, suffered financial reverses as an aftermath of the World War, and this fact largely accounts for Miss Shearer's entrance into the entertainment world.

With her mother and her sister Athole, who later married Howard Hawks, Norma came to New York to make a name for herself in the theater, and by a strange turn of affairs both she and her sister were cast in minor roles of a Broadway production nine days after their arrival. But the luck didn't last, the show folded, and the young girl turned to anything that would make a living—from posing for artists to playing a piano in a silent-film theater.

She finally got the opportunity to play a few important parts on the stage, eventually went to Hollywood, where her success is a well-known story. Highlight of Miss Shearer's life was her marriage to the youthful Irving Thalberg, general production manager and an official of great importance at M-G-M.

The most tragic event of her life was the untimely death of her husband only a few short years later. In the face of this tragedy, how did Miss Shearer react? What is the truth about

the much-publicized George Raft interlude in her life? What is she doing now and what are her plans for the future? These are questions you will find answered in this vital story of a very remarkable woman.—Editor.

WHAT'S happened to Norma Shearer? Is she lonely living alone with her two small children? Has she adjusted to Irving Thalberg's death at last, or is she embittered? Why does she keep on making pictures when she has millions of dollars? What's the story behind her romantic friendship with George Raft and why did it end?

Questions about Norma are rife. They keep coming. Let me try to answer them for you by telling several stories about her, stories I've never told before.

It was the summer of 1939, just before the war. Norma, traveling in France with Pat and Charles Boyer, was away from home for pleasure for the first time in the three years since Irving Thalberg had died.

She and Pat were crossing the promenade des Anglais at Nice. The traffic was as noisy and confused as French traffic is always. But even three French taxi-horns tooting at once didn't hurry the girls.

"Charles wants me to live on the farm with his mother when he goes with the army," Pat told Norma. "He

Her role in life is but another four-star performance

THE GEORGE RAFT interlude in Norma's life is made understandable in this story of a lonely heart. They met on shipboard—Norma, grieving for her deceased husband, and George, heart-sick at his separation from Virginia Peine. It was natural that they should be thrown together

says—whatever happens—I'm likely to be safe there. But I want to go with him. I want to take quarters in some little inn or farmhouse near his camp—and move on when he does."

It looked then as if Charles would be in service for a long time and see action. No one dreamed he would be in uniform a month or two only.

There was a moment's pause. Then Pat asked, "What would you do, Norma?"

"I'd stay close to Charles for as long as I could," Norma told her. "Even though I had to pitch a tent by the side of the road!"

There was no hesitancy before she answered. She knew, so surely, what she would do. Since coming on this holiday she had missed Irving Thalberg in a different way than she ever had missed him before. And in her new loneliness she had found it satisfying to remember she had spent every possible minute with him, even risking her career to remain beside him when he was ill and to travel with him while he grew stronger.

As Norma said when she came home after this holiday:

"EVEN during the first year after Irving's death, when I wondered if life without him was worth fighting for, I never felt quite as left over and completely on my own as I did traveling—in spite of all the consideration both Charles and Pat showed me. While I stayed at home I was comforted more than I realized by the familiar things around me."

She wasn't remotely dreary. She never is. She has a way of saying these personal things impersonally, like a writer analyzing general reactions. When she reminisces about Irving Thalberg, for instance, as she loves to do, she laughs gently about the things that once amused them, and her voice lifts whenever she tells of things they found exciting. Listening to her you easily could believe Irving was still alive. And I think for her, in many ways, he is. Because somehow she's found the spirit to rejoice over the happiness she had with him for ten years instead of growing bitter that this happiness had to end.



It was while Norma was traveling in Europe that items about her and George Raft began appearing in American newspapers. George fell in love with Norma when he crossed with her and the Boyers on the *Normandie*. I have his word for this. So, of course, he followed her to southern France and saw her whenever possible.

She made it possible for him to see her often. At first, I think, his devotion was an anesthesia for her loneliness. Then, because George is so different from the friends she knew, it was inevitable he should intrigue her and finally offer romantic excitement.

There were those who didn't know Norma who wondered, out loud, what would happen when she and George found themselves in Hollywood again. The social chasm between the two groups in which they move is very deep and very wide. However, anyone who ever has shaken hands with Norma *knew* what she would do. Her handclasp, amazingly hard and firm for anyone so quiet and so small, declares her a forthright young woman, not one to compromise, not one to whisper to any man, "Let's get together Thursday if neither of us is doing anything."

For months a very proud George Raft went to parties to which he previously wouldn't have been invited and which he previously would have avoided like plagues had invitations come. He even escorted Norma to the dinner party the Walter Wangers (Joan Bennett) gave for the president of Dartmouth.

Norma, on the other hand, went where George went. And he was as relieved that his friends liked her as she was that her friends liked him. I'll never forget his joy when a couple he knew (race-track followers) telephoned him after meeting Norma to proclaim her one of the sweetest little ladies they had ever known. George had underestimated the native shrewdness of his friends. He had been afraid they would confuse Norma with the useless "society dolls" and the "phonies" they scorn so deeply.

Norma and I had lunch on the awninged terrace of her beach-house one day last summer when George Raft was very much in the picture. Beyond the woven wood fence which encloses her private beach and her blue swimming-pool, the booming Pacific piled foam along the shore. Except for this boom, the occasional sound of silver against china, and our voices, all was still. Young Irving, whose red fire-engine hung over the side of the pool, was at school—*public school*. Little Katherine had gone to a party.

"The World We Make" was under consideration for Norma's next production. She wanted George to play opposite her. The studio thought Spencer Tracy ought to have the part.

"Of course it would be fun, great fun, to play with George," Norma said, laughing. "I admit that at the start! But that isn't the only reason I'd like him for the part of the rough and tough gentleman who shares his lodgings with me. I think George, because of his screen reputation, would help the picture's entertainment value. If it should be Spencer who takes me in, for instance, I don't think the audience would feel any suspense when the door closed behind us. I think they'd know Spencer was going to act honorably, that I would be safe!"

Norma finally made "Escape" instead. And perhaps it was just as well she and George didn't play in a picture together, since their interlude was to end so soon. I tell this story because it illustrates that frank gaiety of Norma's—one of the loveliest things

about her.

Since their interlude was to end so soon . . . I put it that way advisedly. Norma and George's friendship was not one to endure, to lead to marriage. They belong to different worlds. There couldn't be any deep congeniality between them. However, while their romance lasted it served them both well. It carried George over the difficult period he knew after he and Virginia Peine had decided upon separate ways. And it eased the loneliness that swept over Norma when she went traveling alone and came again to places she and Irving had visited.

Writing about Norma's beach-house brings many pictures of her to mind.

I see her living on there after Irving died . . .

Her family and her friends implored her to sell this house and move up into the hills. And always she thanked them for their interest and stayed on. As she's said so often:

"I didn't want to run away from memories of my life with Irving. Actually I needed those memories—to keep me from growing bitter, to remind me how fortunate I had been for a long time."

NOT once, even when the days were longest and loneliest, did she allow the sliding panel which separates her room from the room that had been Irving's to be closed. For her sake and for the children's sake she wanted this room to remain as alive and sunny as it had been when he was there, so instead of being a "forbidden room" it would be a room dear and familiar to all of them—as it is today.

I see Norma in the driveway with little Irving, splashing about in a big puddle, her eyes as bright as his over the excitement of the unusual rain . . .

Norma believes anyone who doesn't give way to an impulse occasionally cheats himself badly. She was dictating important memoranda to her secretary that day. But when she heard her son shouting with glee and saw him stamping about in the rain, the dictation came to a full stop.

"Type the notes we have so far," she told her secretary. And she ran downstairs, grabbing rain-coat and rubbers on the way, to join in the fun.

I see Norma in her library, studying the script of her next picture, making notes . . .

For a year after Irving Thalberg's death it seemed doubtful she would return to the screen. But as time passed and she started getting her life without Irving in order, she realized she needed work more than she ever had before. It took plenty of courage for her to go on with the career he had guided so minutely, so brilliantly. And here's to her for the wise way she's done this! Here's to her because she's never sacrificed a story to the importance of her role, and because, at all times, she has surrounded herself with players who are quite capable of stealing a picture from a star.

I see Norma in a beautifully simple evening gown moving about the first floor of her house before dinner guests arrive . . .

Friends, stimulating conversation, music, gracious hospitality—these are some of the things that have sustained Norma during the last few years. And during this time there have been many distinguished names on her little white place-cards. Often enough she is asked to entertain for the film colony's most eminent visitors.

I see Norma, her eyes a blue blaze of anger . . .

Someone repeated something that had been said about Sylvia Fairbanks, something about it being time she had adjusted to Douglas' death.

"Who decides such things?" Norma asked. "Who says 'This is the day you stop grieving for your husband, the day you laugh again!'"

"I don't know who has the *authority* to say such things, but I know who has the *audacity* to say them—the same people who would be first to seize upon and talk about any word or action they possibly could construe as lack of respect!"

"Sylvia Fairbanks lives next door to me. She is my friend. I've been with her a great deal. And I have respect not only for her great sorrow but also for her great bravery."

I see Norma at her dressing-table, just after her masseuse has left; her body beneath her bright-blue robe as slim and firm as a very young girl's . . .

As always, the panel between her room and the room that was Irving's was open. The sun coming through the windows in that room rested on a doll Katherine had dropped there—a doll with bright-yellow hair, exactly

the hair a dusky little girl like Katherine, who looks so very much like her father, would want on her doll.

On Norma's dressing-table a vase shaped like a hand held a beautiful talisman rose. Standing beside it was a single bottle of perfume, the discreet perfume that has been Norma's choice for a long time.

OFTEN women grow careless when they are widowed. But there's never been a day when Norma's hair hasn't gleamed, when her beautifully capable hands haven't been well kept, when her clothes haven't been immaculate and freshly pressed. Even if grooming weren't instinctive with her she would have attended to these things. For she's as protective of her position as Irving Thalberg's widow as she was of her position as his wife.

These last years haven't been easy for Norma, but in them she has consistently given a four-star performance as a human being. I think she always will; because irrespective of how much she may be hurt, she will love life always. You're convinced of this when you're with her, whenever you hear that lovely lilt in her laughter.

Here is a tale of two girls who knew what they wanted—and of Alice Faye, who found only fame

ONCE upon a time—as all Hollywood stories really should begin—two girls stood at the cinema gate to fame. They came from the Land of Toy Balloons, which is just another way of saying that one was a cigarette girl and the other sang with a dance band. And both were beautiful.

All this happened about seven years ago, and because the two girls got to Hollywood at almost exactly the same time it seemed as though fate, with a sort of figurative starter's gun, was giving them an even break. The cigarette girl, dark, vivacious and petite, was Barbara Worth from a little town in Washington; the singer, from the Hell's Kitchen section of New York City, was Alice Leppert.

Both girls, of course, have long since changed their last names. In Alice's case not only she herself became Alice Faye but her whole family followed suit when they followed her from New York to Hollywood, where now she is so well known and her affairs so important that it keeps them all busy answering her fan mail and changing the water in her swimming-pool, and so on. What Barbara changed her name to doesn't matter so much, because she answers her own mail and hasn't got any swimming-pool. In Hollywood many are called but few are chosen, and if the same thing had happened to both girls there naturally wouldn't be any story to tell.

Incidentally, it's only fair to warn you right now that this is another Cinderella story and if you don't like Cinderella stories you may as well skip it. The only thing different about this one is that, at the end of the story,

you fit the glass slipper for yourself.

We're still at the beginning, though, and as these things came about it looked as if, of the two girls, Barbara was the one more likely to go farther. For Barbara, after winning a personality contest in her home town, had set out for Hollywood specifically with the idea of carving herself a big slice of career, and while she was perhaps a bit sweeter and a little less self-assertive than a real career girl should be, when she got off the train she had stars in her eyes and dreams in her heart.

Alice, when she came, didn't. As everybody knows, she at that time had no thought whatever of being anything in the movies at all, much less of becoming a big star (her first experience of trying to crash any theatrical gate, when she was just thirteen, had cured her of wish-thinking like that). Then she had tried to bluff her way into a Ziegfeld chorus, putting on enough rouge and lipstick to make herself look like Du Barry, but the girl-wise Flo had taken just one squint at the childish features beneath the goo and thrown her out. A year or so later Alice did get a job with a Chester Hale unit, and she believes still that she might have remained a chorus girl all her life if it hadn't been for that fluke with the recording machine at a party. She sang into it just like everybody else there did, only it was her husky voice that Rudy Vallee liked when he heard the record, and so he spotted her with his band in George White's "Scandals."

Alice still shudders to herself when she happens to reflect that if it hadn't been for that she wouldn't have had all this and Hollywood, too, and now,

in her big new house at Encino, she often goes into her dressing-room and looks at the walls to reassure herself it's real. She looks at the walls because they're all covered with mirrors, all four of them from floor to ceiling, and the Alice Faye who looks back at her is a really, truly movie star. So Alice has to believe it in spite of herself.

Alice is funny that way. She thinks she's just been lucky, and she simply can't get out of her mind the fixation that she's just a chorine having a wonderful delusion. That's why, instead of the expensive clothes she loves, she usually wears the same sort of tailored suit she always used to wear in her chorus days—trim enough, but practical, too. She's afraid she'll wake up any time hearing Buddy De Sylva tell her that she had nothing for the stage, as once he did, and advising her paternally to go get a job in an office. Whenever she has her fortune told, which is as often as she can, although of course she isn't superstitious, her hand trembles as she holds it out, because she's sure the bubble is going to burst.

THE song "Mimi," which Alice sang into that recorder, is really her "The Rosary" and easily her favorite of the several hundred songs she knows. She sings it over every once in a while, just as she looks into the mirrors, to get from it what she gets from them. Then not only her hand but her voice trembles.

So when Alice first came to Hollywood she hadn't the exalted dreams Barbara had, because she was just tagging along with Rudy Vallee to sing a refrain or two in a little bit of his picture. Rudy and the band expected to stay on the Coast a month at most and Alice fully expected to go back to New York with them. Not even a fortune-teller had told her that Lillian Harvey, who was to have played the feminine lead, would walk off the set in a tantrum and that her part would be dumped in Alice's lap. But she did and it was, and after that there were "Wake Up and Live," "In Old Chicago," "Alexander's Ragtime Band," "Lillian Russell" and "Tin Pan Alley." Besides all the others in between, of course, and those she's scheduled for now.

As a matter of fact, and even after Alice had jumped from bit player to top billing in the picturization of the "Scandals," her whole world was wrapped up in a mink coat. She wanted one more than anything else on earth, and for a long, long time it seemed 'way out of reach. When 20th Century-Fox first signed her she couldn't believe they'd renew her option, and so, instead of buying a coat she'd seen in a window and fallen in love with, she merely put down a deposit on it and stopped in the shop to look at it every time she went by. Then, as soon as her option was renewed and her salary raised, she decided that it would be selfish of her to get the coat before she sent her mother the money to come to California, and all in all it was almost two years before she actually did get the mink. When she did finally get it she didn't wear it very much, because she was afraid it would wear out and she wouldn't be able to get another.

Now, to be sure, Alice has half a dozen fur coats, all hanging neatly in her closet. She slips any one of 'em on over her nightie when she gets out of bed and dashes for the studio in the morning. Nobody knows the difference when you go to work in a limousine driven by a chauffeur.

Barbara, on the other hand, doesn't

go to work any more. Her experience is an old, old story to Hollywood—not that she didn't get her chance, too, for it so happened that shortly after she arrived Paramount was looking for that much-publicized "panther woman" you perhaps remember, and although Barbara was hardly the type, she nevertheless was among the fifty-odd girls given a screen test and signed for stock. She didn't get the panther part, but she did get a number of small parts in other pictures, none of which amounted to anything much nor she to anything much in them. When option time came around the studio just let her go with most of the others, and after that she played bits here and there whenever she managed to get them. Eventually there weren't enough bits, and so she had to take extra work.

Even that, for weeks on end sometimes, was pretty scarce, and Barbara, discouraged, often wondered why she had enough beauty and charm to bring her to Hollywood but not enough to put her over. She was game, however, and kept on trying, and one day, when she was playing on the screen a cigarette girl such as she had formerly been in real life, she tripped on one of the cables always lying on any stage floor. The packages of cigarettes on her tray flew all over the set. A young electrician helped her to pick them up. In that way they became acquainted.

Ironically enough, the picture in which she was working was a sub-B called "Everybody Sing," featuring, as his screen debut, a young crooner named Tony Martin.

Barbara's bit part in that nightclub set lasted for several days, and on the day following her spill the young electrician, waiting his chance when she wasn't looking, brought a flower and shyly laid it upon her tray. She turned quickly and caught him in the act, and later, when the director called lunch, she passed the young juicer sitting in the sunshine outside eating sandwiches from his lunchbox. Somehow she found herself sitting beside him and sharing the sandwiches. He drove her home that evening and took her to a movie, and after a few such dates they were married.

RENTING a little bungalow in North Hollywood, because rents were cheap out in the Valley, as soon as they could afford it they bought a lot still farther out and the young electrician built a house upon it, largely with his own hands. It was a pretty big lot so that they could have chickens and rabbits and things, and Barbara, whose husband didn't want her to work any more, settled down to housekeeping and flower-growing and was very happy.

When the first baby came she was even happier still, and began wondering what on earth she could ever have wanted with a movie career. Every once in a while her husband, who had been promoted to a gaffer by now, brought home a couple of preview tickets that somebody slipped him, and they went together to see the arc lights stabbing the night sky. Barbara, as she looked at the theater marquee those evenings, might sigh gently to herself as she recalled those so-big dreams of hers when she had first come to Hollywood—one of those names up there, had those dreams come true, might so easily have been hers. But she breathed a different sort of sigh when they left the lights behind and came home. All that, in Hollywood, was so hectic and exciting; all this, out here, so tranquil and still.

On Sundays they would put up a lunch, jump into the car, and go picnicking . . . to some place like Sherwood Forest, where "Robin Hood" and so many other super-supers were shot, or to the beach down around Malibu, where anybody can see a hatful of stars almost any time.

Meanwhile Alice had gone from success on to success, her ability developing and her fame growing in picture after picture. From the unknown torch-singer with Rudy Vallee's band she had become the uncontested queen of the 20th Century-Fox lot, still without quite knowing how it all happened. Even now Alice is probably the least-affected actress of anything like her importance in all Hollywood, the one who gives herself the least airs and who imposes least upon those who have to do with her. She is still untemperamental, still humble in spirit. And still, in her heart of hearts, afraid both of Hollywood and of herself and that the clock will strike twelve just where she came in.

ALICE, too, found romance, but with all she is and all she has happiness eluded her. Tony Martin proposed to her twenty-one times before they eloped and were married, and then their union was short-lived. Hollywood believes that the marriage was wrecked solely by a conflict of careers, that the very thing which Alice has worked so hard to attain deprived her of the one thing which above all others she wants most. Because she was a first-magnitude star and Tony Martin still on his way up, professional jealousy came between them—anyhow, whatever the cause, the smash-up certainly did things to Alice.

While Barbara, sitting in the front seat of their jalopy beside her husband, with the baby on her lap and a happy smile on her face, was going on those little picnics and admiring the scenery as they chugged by, Alice, alone in her limousine with the straight back of the chauffeur in front, was riding practically all over southern California just because she was too restless to stay home. Often she ordered her big car in the middle of the night and just rode and rode, staring out of the window and seeing nothing.

While Barbara, humming a little tune, was standing over her kitchen stove cooking some little surprise of which her husband was particularly fond for their dinner when he came home, Alice had her dinner served in her spacious dining-room, and sat staring at the food on her plate without eating it. And while Barbara fussed about the four or five rooms of her little house, pushing the vacuum

her even the least bit of an inward thrill anywhere.

She didn't take the corner of her apron and wipe off a bit of dust from this or that as Barbara did. There wasn't any dust and she wouldn't have seen it had there been, anyhow.

Alice could have gone out into her garden, just as Barbara did, and cut armfuls of beautiful roses—but she didn't. Even roses had no color nor fragrance for her. And she had no chickens nor rabbits to feed, because if she wanted either for dinner the cook just called the butcher. And when it was on the table Alice didn't

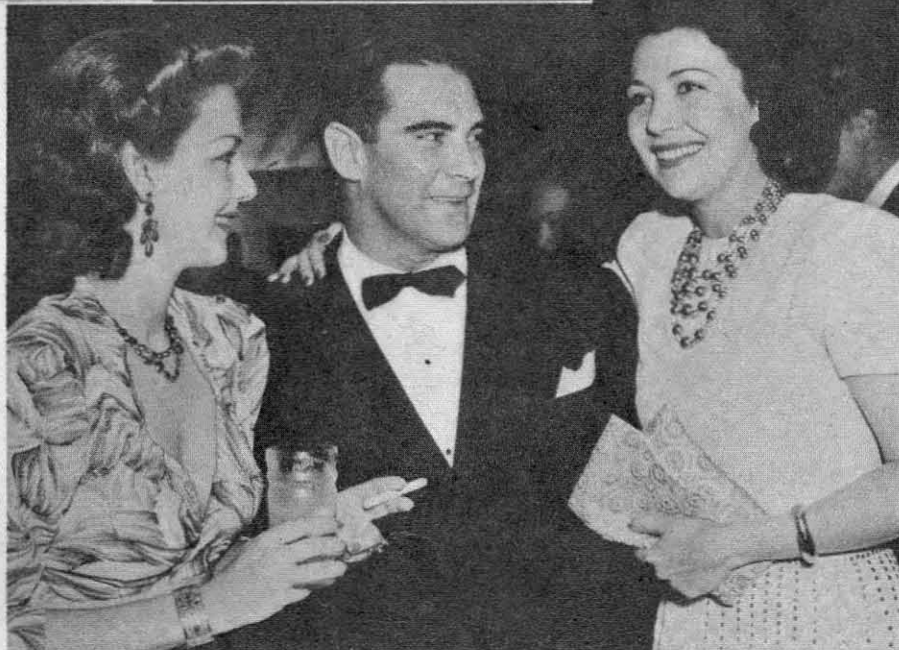

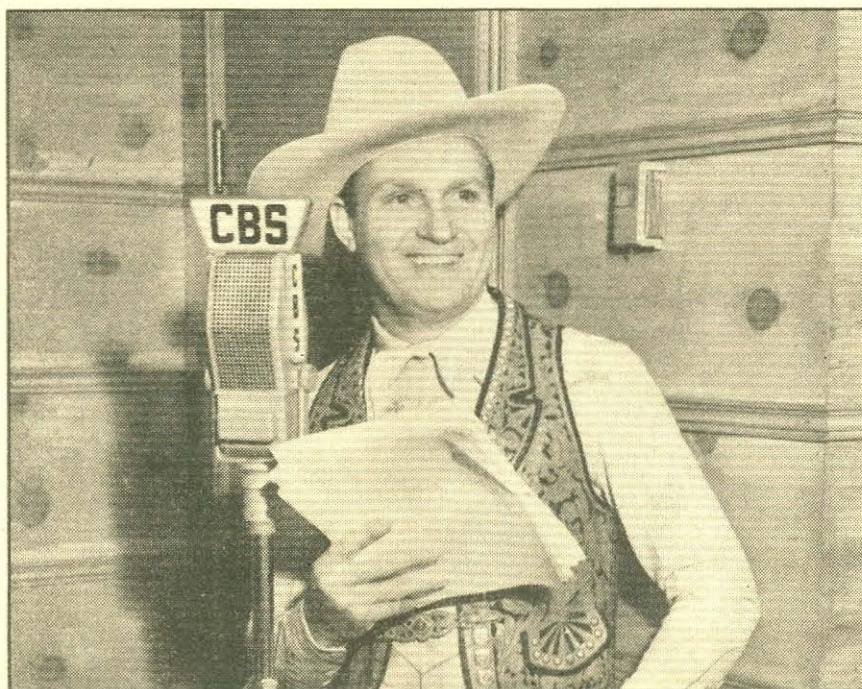

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THE METROPOLITAN OPERA COMPANY PRESENTS "L'AMORE DEI TRE RE" ("The Love of Three Kings") BY ITALO MONTEMEZZI IN THREE ACTS, NBC. The cast: Archibaldo, Ezio Pinza, bass; Fiora, Grace Moore, soprano; Manfredo, Richard Bonelli, baritone; Avito, Charles Kullmann, tenor; Flaminio, Alessio de Paolis, tenor; A Maid, Lucille Browning, soprano; A Young Woman, Maxine Stellman, soprano; An Old Woman, Anna Kaskas, contralto. Conductor, Italo Montemezzi, opera's composer.

This is one of the most lyrical of modern operas and resembles the Wagner music drama rather than the conventional opera of the Italian school. Action of the story is laid in the tenth century in a lonely Italian castle. Fiora, a beautiful princess, had been given to Archibaldo, an old king, as the price of peace with a neighboring country which he had invaded. Archibaldo has married her to his son, Manfredo, who loves her dearly, but who is frequently away fighting in the wars. Fiora had loved Avito, Prince of Altruria, who, in the first act, comes secretly to see her. Before his arrival, Archibaldo, who has gone blind, has been in the hall awaiting Manfredo's return. As dawn nears he extinguishes the signal light and retires to his room. Fiora and Avito suddenly notice that the signal

light is out, and, fearful that Archibaldo knows of Avito's presence, he flees. Archibaldo enters and accuses Fiora of unfaithfulness but she denies it. Manfredo returns and cannot understand why his wife greets him coldly. Archibaldo instinctively realizes what is happening and the act ends as he murmurs to himself, "O God, let me indeed be blind." In Act II, Manfredo, recalled to his troops, bids his wife farewell on the terrace of the castle walls. She promises to wave his scarf as he rides away. Avito, disguised as a guard, again approaches Fiora, but she begs him to leave her forever. He is insistent, and Fiora, who is waving the scarf, gradually gives in to him, stops waving, and lets Avito embrace her. They do not hear Archibaldo and his servant, Flaminio. Archibaldo, suspicious, calls to Fiora. Flaminio warns Avito away, who escapes silently. Manfredo is heard returning, Flaminio goes to meet him, and, left alone with Fiora, Archibaldo forces her to admit that she is unfaithful. But she refuses to name her lover. In a rage he chokes her to death, and Manfredo, alarmed that his wife no longer waves the scarf, returns to find his father crouched over her body. Act III is in the castle chapel. The body lies on a bed of flowers. Avito has come secretly to mourn her and kisses her lifeless lips. Manfredo, emerging from the shadow, warns him that Archibaldo has poisoned the lips to trap her lover. Avito dies, and Manfredo, overcome with remorse, in turn presses his lips on Fiora's. As he lies dying Archibaldo gropes his way in, only to find his son a victim of his plot.

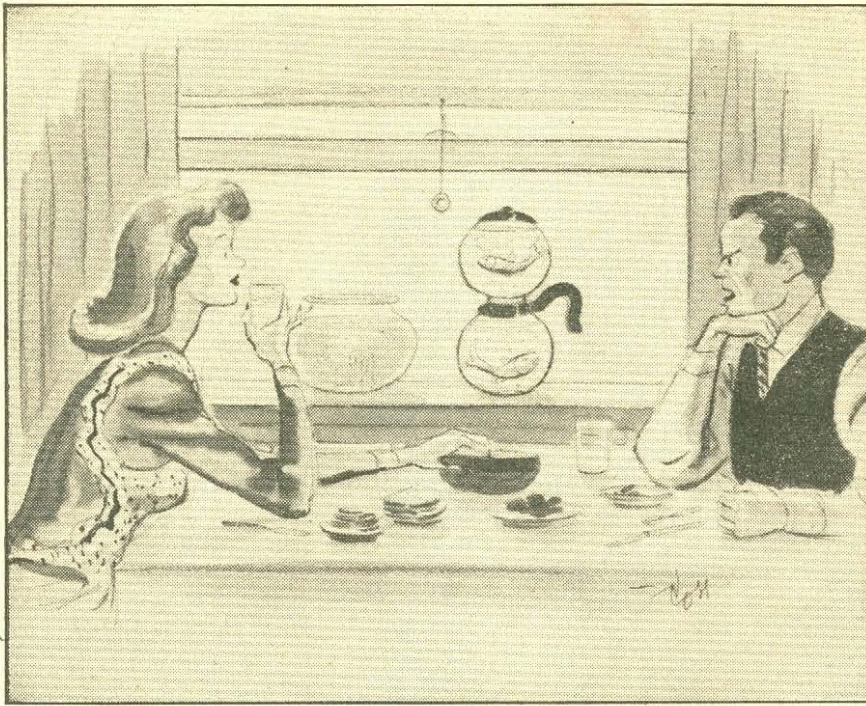

"RIGHT TO HAPPINESS"

ALMOST everybody wants happiness; almost nobody knows quite what happiness really is. And the struggle to achieve this elusive state of bliss often has the strange effect of creating a great deal of unhappiness. For instance, in Irna Phillips' serial show "Right to Happiness" (heard Monday through Friday over CBS). Here the struggle results in a muddle of love triangles which would confound the wisest adviser to the lover-lorn. First, Bill Walker (Reese Taylor), an advertising executive, falls for widow Doris Cameron (Connie Crowder), a woman's magazine editor—until he meets her daughter, Carolyn (Eloise Kummer), whom he marries while Doris is away on business. Carolyn is ignorant of her mother's love for Bill, later finds life with him—he is twenty years older than she—quite incompatible. Her real heart-interest is Bill's young business associate, Dwight Kramer (Frank Behrens). She threatens divorce, but Bill refuses to leave her. Another triangle develops as Louise Sims (Sarajane Wells), comes to live with Doris, meets Lyle Anders (Karl Weber), a young writer, to whom she becomes engaged out of pity on learning that he has only six months to live. But his recovery places her on a spot, for she really is in love with a young lawyer named Dick Gordon (Monty Mohn). A third trend is introduced when Fred Minturn (Art Kohl), who loves Doris, is spurned because she still carries the torch for Bill Walker. All of these men and women search for one possession—happiness.

Work Harder Work Longer

Here—on a backstage visit to "Lux Radio Theater"—you'll learn what makes the top drama broadcast tops

ONCE upon a time, a radio producer pondered how he might present a broadcast which would be better than any dramatic show on the air. Good shows were being broadcast nightly. Fine stars directed by fine directors were giving brilliant performances.

"How can we do it?" he was asked. "We can work harder. We can work longer," said the producer.

So that became the plan of the "Lux Radio Theater," which comes into your home each Monday night with the clarion call to pleasure, "Lux presents Hollywood . . ."

For example, early this year Lux presented "Nothing Sacred." As is usually the case in a Lux play, the story was one familiar to its potential audience. It had been done magnificently on the screen by Carole Lombard and Fredric March. Follow this

routine and judge for yourself.

First, radio rights had to be secured. James Street, author, who wrote the story when it first appeared in *Cosmopolitan* magazine, was contacted and the purchase made.

Then came the problem of casting. This concerned the advertising agency men who produce the show for Lux and Cecil B. DeMille. They conferred and picked two men and two women they thought suited to the story. Two each, for safety's sake. Joan Bennett and Douglas Fairbanks, Jr., were signed.

With rights secured and players signed, the play was given to young George Wells, an unsung but nonetheless tremendously important person in the final analysis.

It was his job to adapt the motion-picture story for radio. He had to recast the yarn into a form which could

be understood by an audience whose only tie with the actors was an auditory one. He had to evolve a workable script which could be played in exactly one hour (minus time for commercials), which would retain the flavor of the original version, and which would have color and punch enough to hold its listeners.

When George Wells had finished the final script to his, the network's, Mr. DeMille's and the agency's satisfaction, he turned it over to the director of "Lux Radio Theater," Sanford Barnett, who cast the minor roles, went over the preliminary draft of the music with Lou Silvers, the conductor, and set the date for the first rehearsal.

In the matter of rehearsals there is no program on anybody's air which does as much preparatory work. Usually ten or twelve hours of intense concentration precede the words you hear which open the show. This is not merely the labor of bit players. The stars, no matter how big they are, must also be present.

The first reading on Thursday is most informal, a sort of verbal jam session in which pomp is forgotten and big names are merely "some of the boys." In the case of "Nothing Sacred" Joan Bennett arrived in slacks, with a red ribbon in her hair, wearing glasses and leading a small black dog which looked like a pet lamb. Young Doug tiptoed in fifteen minutes late, with a grin on his face like that of a ten-year-old caught stealing jam. The script was read without benefit of microphone, just to get the feel of it.

During this reading voices were low. Lines were fluffed. Characters were hazy at times. "Sandy" Barnett sat on a high stool in the center of the stage, his arms on a tall reading-desk, and pretended he'd never heard of direction. That would come later when the play was taken act by act. Then a definite dialect could be decided on for the European specialist. Then the fight scene between Hazel and Wally could be speeded up and accentuated. Then

the sound-effects would be added.

One reading, a few preliminary remarks on character and action by Mr. Barnett, and the first run-through was over. The actors appearing only in the second and third acts departed. "See you tomorrow!" floated back from the swinging doors to the street.

Suddenly the atmosphere changed. It wasn't a jam session any longer. The engineer arrived. The mike was turned on. Work really began.

The first act gathered pace and form. Fairbanks became a young newspaperman, intent on getting a story for a hard-hearted boss. Lou Merrill, in the late Walter Connolly's part of the editor, snarled and threw sarcasm about the stage. Joan shed crocodile tears of self-pity because she was doomed to lingering death from radium poisoning.

FRIDAY the second act was taken.

Saturday the third. Each time a new portion of the tale became alive. Lines were sure. Dialects were definite. Small bits were played with finesse and humor.

Meantime, the musicians had also been at work. Lou Silvers had written short snatches of melody which would bridge and point the scenes. These had been rehearsed with his men and Mr. Barnett.

Meantime, too, the sound-effects had been worked out. Charlie Forsyth had prepared a perfect facsimile of every noise mentioned in the script.

Besides sound and music, every doubtful word or fact in the play had been checked as to pronunciation or authenticity. When the seven letters of "gallant" were run across in one of the lines, a hurry call had been made to Frank Calvin, Mr. DeMille's research man at Paramount. Mr. Calvin, who is responsible for much of the credulity of the DeMille films, had dived into dictionaries and came up with the proper pronunciation. The verdict was: If used as an adjective, "possessing brave or chivalrous spirit,

WORLD WAR II

CASTING ahead, even for a day, during this period of greatest tragedy the world has known, is a task that may prove far from accurate, even though the operator be possessed of the veritable profundity of knowledge.

Back in those distant, delightful mid-Victorian days of peace and comfort, Lord Tennyson dipped into the future far beyond the human vision, and discovered—

*The heavens fill with commerce,
Argosies of magic sails
Pilots of the purple twilight,
Dropping down with costly bales,
The heavens fill with shouting,
And there rain'd a ghastly dew,
From the nations' airy navies,
Grappling in the central blue.*

All that Lord Tennyson foresaw has happened, especially the blight of air warfare that today attempts to destroy even the hope of human happiness, and to blast civilization as we have known it, back beyond the dark ages.

Today we can be certain of at least some matters that will affect the Axis during the year 1941.

Primarily, the confidence in victory, at least for a portion of the period, will continue in the minds of its military leaders—particularly those of Nazi Germany. Herr Hitler very likely may aid toward the improvement of the present Italian situation. Even though his Roman partner now seems more a liability than an asset, he cannot throw him overboard. Therefore it is quite probable that by the end of 1941 Italy, too, will be among those vassal states controlled from Berlin.

The mighty blitzkrieg on all fronts

—Gibraltar, Dardanelles, Suez, Far East and the English home front—now in process of preparation by the Nazi high command, to take place in the early spring, if not earlier, may very probably be halted just short of victory. Then the present unhappiness of the Axis peoples will sink gradually into despair. And then that same harvest that now is being reaped by England will be visited upon the Axis powers—that harvest predicted by Winston Churchill of toil and sweat and blood and tears.

ON THE domestic front 1941 promises—or threatens, according to your point of view—to produce one of the greatest economic-boom periods in American history.

National defense billions, poured into industry, will cut unemployment to a negligible figure. As the year wears on and living costs increase (inevitable result of business inflation), labor strikes probably will multiply, unless specific steps are taken by the White House or Congress blocking them.

Congress will have one of its bitterest sessions since the Civil War, with non-interventionists battling against changes in the Johnson and cash-and-carry laws, against financial-aid-to-Britain blocs trying to crack both.

Administration tendencies will be toward the conservative side. Draft-the-wealth proposals will rise repeatedly in Congress, but probably will fail. American subsidization of Latin-American countries will increase as the first step in a bid for trade superiority with those countries.

THE FAR EAST

TRYING to predict what will be the course of events in the Far East is about as easy as trying to guess what the weather will be one week from today.

The most important development is the quiet massing of the Red Army in the Sinkiang desert—as yet unreported in the American public press. Fanning out from Tashkent, important center in Russian Turkestan, large-scale Russian preparations are under way.

This may be part of a general settlement with Japan, calculated to liquidate the Chinese war. The Russians want the war in China ended as soon as possible, so as to give them a free hand when the day of reckoning with Germany comes. German generals are openly talking of the "inevitability" of war with the U. S. S. R. in the close future.

It is possible that a Russian-Japanese agreement would permit Russian occupation of the outer provinces of China—Sinkiang and Mongolia. This would be an effective stab in the back to China. Japan would be enabled to win the war in the eastern territories.

Should this happen, and it appears quite likely, the war in the Far East should end within the coming twelve months. This would relieve Stalin from Japanese threats at the back door while he set himself to meet an attack from Germany at his front door.

I doubt that the United States will go to war with Japan in 1941—unless some unexpected twist should come in the European war whereby Hitler received a setback, English chances grew suddenly brighter, thus emboldening the U. S. to slap at Japan, upon pretext, as indirect aid to the British.

WHEN Bernard Ance! was born in Bayonne, N. J., in 1893, few people realized that he would eventually become Ben Bernie, bandleader extraordinary and popularizer of such famous expressions as "yowzah" and "fo'give me, fo'give me." Among those who failed to discern the coming greatness of the little lad was his father, an extremely pious-natured blacksmith. Papa Ance! did not want his little boy to be a blacksmith. No, not that. But what he did envision was a picture of Ben, the engineer. And so to that end Ben was enrolled in the New York University. Young Bernie, however, spent most of his time directing and writing campus theatricals and practising upon his violin. He had given a concert at Carnegie Hall when he was fourteen. It was during the college minstrel shows that he picked up his now famous "yowzah," with a slight East Side accent. Benny's first break in theatricals came when he was discovered selling violins in a department store by Joe Schenck, then a booker for the Loew's circuit. Schenck liked the Will Rogers type of sales talk that Ben gave and hired him to play concertos a la Heifetz. Bernard Ance!, however, wasn't exactly a stage name, so Benny became Bernard Berni, "The Boy Wonder." That was soon changed by a press-agent who kept tacking an "e" on to the end of his name. Later on in his vaudeville career Bernie teamed up with Phil Baker, who played the accordion. Their musical performances were interspersed with Ben's gags. Following

the war, Ben got the idea of becoming a bandleader. Paul Whiteman was then introducing symphonic jazz to a r h y t h m - crazed country, and Bernie, sensing that the new type of music would soon be sweeping the country, learned the secret. His first band was a stage band. Later, when the Roosevelt Hotel was built in New York City, he and his band were booked for six months. He stayed six years. Since the conclusion of that long engagement Bernie has been heard at many famous hotel spots throughout the country, in addition to having had numerous commercial radio programs. Bernie, incidentally, is the creator of many "firsts" in radio. He was the first to use exchange guest artists, having Kate Smith as his first artist. He was also the first to use the same song each night when he signed off, and Benny swears that it was his band that was the first to broadcast on a Coast-to-Coast network—from New York to Philadelphia in 1923!

The Bernie band is heard at present on Tuesdays at 8:00 p.m. EST, over the NBC-Blue network, when the wise-cracking maestro emerges as a quiz-master who tests the musical knowledge of the studio audience. News from the Music Front

BACK in 1924 a young girl was singing in the Music Box Revue in New York. She was introduced to an Italian composer, Italo Montemezzi, who had written a popular opera called "The Love of Three Kings." Quite seriously, the young girl informed him that one day she intended to sing the leading soprano role in his opera. That girl was Grace Moore.

Saturday "The Love of Three Kings" will be broadcast from the Metropolitan with Montemezzi, now living in America, conducting. Although the opera, composed in 1913, and brought originally to the Met by Toscanini in 1914, has been performed many times, it has never been broadcast over here. The soprano star of the performance will be . . . you've guessed it . . . Grace Moore.

Igor Stravinsky, Russian composer, famous for his "Fire-bird" and "Petrouchka" Ballet Suites, is becoming an American citizen and threatens to write some swing music, heaven forbid. Stravinsky and swing are all right apart, but together . . . the mind reels in horror at the thought!

Walter Damrosch was seventy-nine years old just the other day, and is still going as strong as ever. On February 20 and 21 he will conduct a revised concert version of his opera, "Cyrano de Bergerac," with the New York Philharmonic Orchestra (the concerts will not be broadcast). The concerts hit the front pages of New York newspapers when it was announced that two of the soloists, Jarmila Novotna and Ezio Pinza, had withdrawn, giving as the reason their heavy rehearsal schedule for the English production of "The Bartered Bride." Somewhat bitter letters were exchanged by Damrosch, the soloists and the Met, all of it causing some excitement in the New York local press.

Another slight press flurry was occasioned by the announcement that conductor Dimitri Mitropoulos had been offered the permanent conductorship of the New York Philharmonic. Vigorous denials came from all sides, Philharmonic officials pointing out that John Barbirolli's contract still had another year to run. However, speculation has arisen in musical circles as to whether Barbirolli's contract will be renewed.

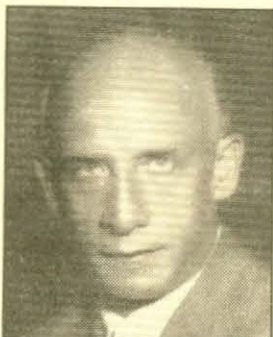

Musician of the Week

Lucille Manners

Soprano with a purpose is tiny Miss Manners of Cities Service

MISS LUCILLE MANNERS, blue-eyed soprano of the "Cities Service Concerts" (Friday, NBC), would have you believe that she is a softie. What else, she asks, could you call a girl who hates to fish because the fish look so reproachful when they come out of the water? The good deed of which she is proudest (having just been made an Honorary Den Mother of the Boy Scouts) was accomplished in Manhasset, Long Island, where she lives the year around.

"I was down on the dock," she recalls, "watching a man fish. He pulled in the cutest little sea-robin, took it off the hook, put it down beside him and paid no more attention to it. The poor little thing began to flap around and I felt worse and worse. Then the man strolled away for a moment. I ambled past the sea-robin and kicked him back in the water." She doesn't know whether the sea-robin revived or not. She only knows that the dirtiest look she ever got was from that fisherman.

However, it would take more than a dirty look to get Lucille Manners down, because, in spite of such evidence to the contrary, she is definitely not a softie. Her fragile blondness, her slim, small figure and her Dietrich legs are deceptive. She is a purposeful girl, and to date has let no obstacles delay her progress for very long. She began singing practically in the cradle and went on to perform lustily and with spirit at school entertainments in her home town of Newark, New Jersey. She didn't impress the teachers much, but her mother was delighted. Her mother had always cherished a yearning to be a singer. She was sure that Lucille would fulfil her own thwarted ambitions. Lucille thought so too. Working as a stenographer in a Newark office, she got up an hour earlier every morning to prac-

tise. Every spare cent went for singing lessons. The other stenographers thought she was crazy and said so. But she kept right on. First she obtained a few church jobs, then engagements on local stations, and finally was engaged by NBC. She sang on many different types of programs, made guest appearances, then took Jessica Dragonette's place for a while on Cities Service. When Jessica left the program, Lu-

cille was the natural choice to follow her. Possessed of a rich, warm voice expertly trained, musicianship, taste and a capacity for hard work and endless study, Miss Manners made a unique place for herself on the air, and very soon lost the title of Jessica's "successor."

Some, if not all, of her ambitions have been realized. She always wanted to own a house. A few years ago she was finally able to buy one in Manhasset. It has nine rooms and a garden and she lives there with her mother, and two dogs, a bulldog and a Samoyed.

Last year another of her ambitions came true—to give a concert at New York's Town Hall. Her press notices were excellent, and she planned to give another this season, but canceled it when her singing teacher died unexpectedly. However, she concertizes all through the winter, making short tours between broadcasts. Working out programs for these recitals and for the broadcasts leave her little time for anything else. She is usually in bed at ten, with a piece of music to study.

Lucille has operatic ambitions, like other singers, but is in no hurry. It is an astonishing thing to hear a young singer declare that a singing career can't be made in a day. Very early Lucille learned the hard way produces the most lasting results. She has never swerved from that belief.

CONGRESSMEN like to speak and be heard. They now have their chance on the new CBS program, "No Politics," which originates in Washington. But, as the title implies, they are forbidden to discuss politics, which may hamper them. The program is for sale to advertisers, which means that Mr. Congressman So-and-So may be representing Arkansas politically in the House of Representatives and at the same time representing Goosberry Shave Cream commercially on CBS. What we're getting at is the advisability of such a program especially in these trying times when Congressmen should have enough to do keeping America's house in order without trying to sell products as a sideline. The best product they can sell is Americanism and that, we think, is a full-time job.

Censor's Delight

Censorship is at work, abroad and at home. Over in Rome someone didn't like Cecil Brown's tone of voice and attitude in his broadcasts to America for CBS. Maybe Il Duce took exception to Brown's statement: "The Italians report troop movements in Albania but do not indicate whether they are forward or backward." In any event, Italy has banned him from the air. At this writing CBS is pulling wires to get the ban lifted. The other Saturday night, without warning or explanation, Bucharest banned Frank Stevens, NBC's correspondent there. In Belgrade CBS commentator Winston Burdett is silent by request. He is charged with issuing a report that riots had broken out in Italian cities, to which the Italian government took exception. Belgrade officials will hold a hearing to decide if Burdett is to be deported.

At home censorship took on a more humorous aspect. Fred Allen was to introduce a woman who supposedly demanded time on the air for an announcement that would stop all gags about Jeanie with the light brown hair, a gag that started when the song of this title began to be overworked because it is in the public domain and out of the ASCAP-BMI fight. "I have just had a henna rinse," she said,

and of course claimed she was Jeanie. CBS said the gag couldn't be used. "The heck it can't," said Allen, who knows his rights, and it was used. The same day Charlie Cantor was supposed to say, "Happy birthday, Mr. Ginsberg with the light brown hair," on the "Meet Mr. Meek" program. Again CBS said no. CBS objected to the first two words on the grounds that they made up the title of an ASCAP tune, and objected to the "light brown hair" because that gag only emphasized the music war. Charlie didn't fight and the blue pencil won, so on the air Charlie said:

the Xavier Cugat show, is actually Ken Smith, NBC announcer.

Vox Poppers Abroad

Parks Johnson and Wally Butterworth, "Vox Poppers," are establishing some sort of record for commercial programs by originating shows outside the U. S. borders. On February 13 they were in Mexico City; on February 20 in San Juan, Puerto Rico; February 27 they will be in Havana or Rio de Janeiro. The latter date is uncertain at this writing. If Rio can be set for the 27th, then they'll go to Buenos Aires for March 6 and broadcast from Havana on March 13. Both boys took their wives along on the trip. Parks and his missus expected to stop over at the University of Texas to visit their two children, both students there. Bill, seventeen, is a freshman and a member of the freshman swimming team. Betty (and that's not short for Elizabeth in this case) is nineteen and a junior.

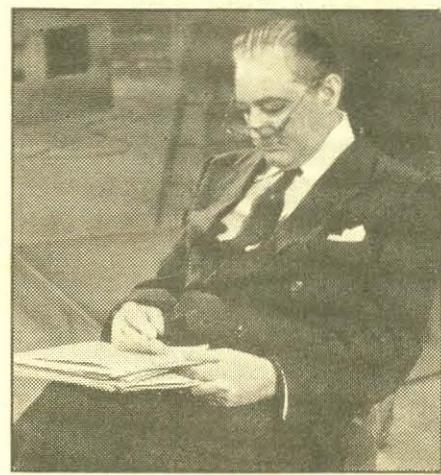

INTERESTING NEW SHORT-WAVE STATIONS TO TEST LISTENER'S TUNING SKILL

REGULAR readers of this department in MOVIE-RADIO GUIDE have by this time undoubtedly become quite proficient at tuning in the ordinary powerful short-wave stations such as London, Berlin, Rome, Tokyo and Sydney, Australia. Today I propose to lead you a little farther afield in some of the fascinating by-ways of short-wave reception; to give you information about some new and interesting broadcasters that can be tuned in if you are patient and persistent. To land one of these far-away and bizarre stations has never ceased to be a thrill to the writer. I think you will get a kick out of it also.

First let's try for Greece. SVM (9.935) is a commercial wireless station at Athens. Ordinarily it does not broadcast program material. At present it is broadcasting twenty minutes each day. This short period, which consists of a resume of latest Italo-Albanian war news in English, is on the air from 2:40 to 3:00 p.m. EST. The broadcast, which is put on primarily for London press sources, opens with the Greek anthem and "God Save the King." The identification is "This is Athens calling." According to Robert Skyten of East Brookfield, Massachusetts, the news bulletin is also rebroadcast by an unidentified station operating on 7.075 megs.

Press and radio get much of their first-hand information about the war in Libya from broadcasts of the North African short-wave network. The principal stations in this group are: TPZ (12.12) and TPZ2 (8.96), identified as "Radio Alger," in Alger, Algeria, and CNR (12.83) and CNR2 (11.94), identified as "Radio Maroc," in Rabat, Morocco. The Alger stations broadcast daily from approximately 1:30 to 3:15 a.m., the Morocco stations from 6:00 to 8:00 a.m. and all stations in the network from 1:45 to 4:00 p.m. or later EST. At 2:45 p.m. EST the official war communique is broadcast in French. General Weygand's recent message to his

French troops was broadcast over the Alger stations and carried by the network.

If you would like to hear Egypt direct, watch for an evening network pick-up from Cairo, then turn your dial to SUX (7.865). This Cairo station is ordinarily engaged in commercial telephone service with London.

ZNR, Aden, Arabia, is on the air daily from 12:00 noon to 1:00 p.m. EST with an Arabic program of music and news. Occasionally the following identification in English is made, "You are listening to short-wave station ZNR, operating on 12.12 megacycles, in Aden, Arabia." Note the frequency of ZNR, that is 12.12 megs, is the same as that of TPZ, Algeria.

General DeGaulle, leader of the Free France forces, is putting as many stations on the air in the interests of Free France as possible. The most notable of these thus far has been FZI (11.97), "Radio Brazzaville," at Brazzaville, French Equatorial Africa, which I have dealt with at length in the past and which can still be heard with excellent signal strength each afternoon from 3:00 to 4:00 p.m. EST. "Radio Francais Libre D' Orient" (Free France radio of the Orient), located in Syria, is operating on 9.045 megs, daily from 12:30 to 1:10 p.m. EST. Other Free France stations are being heard irregularly and operating from unidentified locations.

Tough ones to receive in this country but which are being reported occasionally are Salisbury and Bulawayo, in Southern Rhodesia, operating on 7.21 and 6.757 megs respectively. These stations broadcast simultaneously daily from 4:00 to 4:30, 6:00 to 6:15, 10:55 to 11:30 a.m. and from 12:55 to 3:00 p.m. EST.

Well, that's the line-up. See what your batting average will be on these catches and then drop me a line and let me know how you came out. The writer is always glad to hear from readers of this department.

GENERAL NOTES: The "American Hour" from Rome, heard daily from 8 to 10:45 p.m. EST, is now broadcast by 2R03 (9.63), 2R018 (9.76), 2R04 (11.81), and a new one, 2R019 (7.31). Another new station, 2R017 (19.59), is broadcasting daily from 9 a.m. to 12 noon EST, according to John Wilson of Wilmington, Del. . . . Desmond Callan of Readville, Mass.,

reports that an anti-Nazi radio transmitter, located somewhere in Sweden, is now operating daily on approximately 10.07 megs, from 9:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. EST. . . . Miss Margot Andrade of Greencastle, Ind., informs me that the "Hawaii Calls" program, Saturday nights from 11 to 11:30 p.m. EST, can be heard direct by tuning in KKH (7.52) of Kahuku, Hawaii.

want it any more.

At the studio things were like that, too. Alice, who had always been so easy to get along with, couldn't find anything to please her at all. Instead of chatting pleasantly with the hairdresser while the latter did her hair, she'd sit there almost morosely, staring at herself or at something quite beyond herself in the mirror. Then, when the girl had finished, Alice would find fault, rumples the fresh coiffure with an impatient gesture of her hand, and it all had to be done over again.

In the wardrobe her costumes didn't suit her, either. She didn't know what she wanted and so nothing was right. Fitting after fitting displeased her, and the wardrobe girls, who previously had told each other how sweet Alice was, were perpetually on the verge of hysterics.

The other studio departments had plenty to complain about, too. Alice made appointments and either didn't keep them at all or appeared hours late. The publicity department was especially burned up because Alice wouldn't come in for interviews, wouldn't answer her phone, wouldn't go to the gallery for portraits. She became so difficult that the press and publicity people simply said to hell with it.

Somehow, during those not-so-long-ago days, Alice Faye's scintillant career did little to solace her. Nor did her big house, her clothes, her servants, her jewels and all the rest of those wonderful, end-of-the-rainbow things she has. With the whole cornucopia emptied right into her lap, Alice seemed to be looking desperately for something that wasn't there.

All of this emotional maelstrom she climaxed with a six-month nervous breakdown, during which the radiant Alice who had so recently been in wonderland took no interest in anything. It seemed such a long, long way back to that mink coat, the mink coat which once had been the epitome of all her pink-cloud dreams and which now hung listlessly upon its hanger without ever being worn.

During all that time Alice went nowhere and was seen with no one. Eventually she snapped out of it at least enough to go back to work and to begin going places with Sandy Cummings. More recently she's being seen about a bit more again.

In "Tin Pan Alley," Alice's latest picture, there's at least one scene into which Alice put her whole heart. It came early in the film, just after Alice, as one of the song-plugging team of sisters, had met John Payne and they were standing on the balcony outside a night-club overlooking the lights of New York. And Alice, with something in her eyes that no director ever put there, turned to Payne and said:

"Did you ever ride on a train through a quiet countryside at night, look out of the window and see the cottages of some small town nestling so peacefully there?"

That's what Alice wanted in the picture—and the picture could have gone farther and had her say, "And can you imagine what's on the inside of those little cottages, all the happiness that couples find together after the day's work is done? They don't have to be anybody or do anything; all they need is just to be there with each other."

Later in the same picture, when Betty Grable is telling the young

British captain to whom Alice is then engaged about her feeling for the same John Payne, Betty says of Alice:

"You know how it is with girls like her—once she's tagged, she stays put."

There are a lot of people who think that Alice Faye just walked through "Tin Pan Alley," that she didn't put into her performance what she has in the past. Because of that, Betty Grable ran off with a lot of the honors, and because of that, Betty Grable is pretty much the fair-haired girl around the 20th Century-Fox lot right now. Part of Hollywood thinks that it was the studio's way of disciplining Alice, and some point out that since the release of "Tin Pan Alley" there's no doubt that Alice is becoming more cooperative again.

Hollywood has never completely understood Alice Faye, however, nor really been able to see into her heart and find out just what makes her tick. Hollywood, for instance, believed that all this time Alice has been carrying a torch for Tony Martin, that she gritted her teeth whenever she saw him or read about him with Lana Turner, and that she herself hoped for a reconciliation with him until the last.

Hollywood doesn't realize that Tony Martin is only a symbol to Alice Faye, to the same Alice Faye who came to Hollywood itself expecting nothing but who found everything, and who now might gladly exchange places with Barbara, who came expecting everything and found nothing.

EVERYTHING and nothing, that is, all according to the way you happen to interpret things like that. For Alice does have everything and Barbara nothing, and both girls are beautiful, you remember, and anything can happen in Hollywood.

There's just one other little sidelight of this so-to-speak narrative parallelogram which may perhaps be worth pointing out. At the time Barbara and the young electrician bought their house out on the far side of Calhoun Pass, only Toluca Lake had been discovered by the movie folk. Quite a few of them live there, and beyond that is North Hollywood and Van Nuys, where just ordinary folk live, and across Ventura Boulevard from those little towns, on the right side of the tracks as it were, is Encino. Here Don Ameche and Al Jolson and a few others recently pioneered a new picture colony, just at the base of the foothills which overlook the entire valley, and from the house which she built in this lovely locality Alice Faye can actually look down upon the roof of the little house where Barbara lives, one of the hundreds nestling side by side on the floor of the flat, smiling gorge below.

Alice, of course, doesn't know that particular roof nor has any reason to differentiate it from among all those others which she can see from her house. Nevertheless, she has to pass it every morning and every evening going to and from the studio. Naturally she never dreams that, had the strangely tangled threads from which all human lives are woven been twisted just a little more or just a little less, she might be the girl in Barbara's house and Barbara the girl in hers.

As it is, all the world adores Alice. And Barbara? Well, she adores her own little world.

gal'-lant"; "showing polite deference to women, gal-lant'."

On Sunday Mr. DeMille greeted his cast for the first time. Young Doug and Joan were old friends. The letters "C. B." were tossed around. Laughter was heard. Then work began again.

As I mentioned before, the first dress rehearsal was recorded for the use of the actors and the production staff. This transcription was listened to with all the concentration of a Hitler ultimatum. Any discrepancies of wordage or characterization were corrected. The entire show was carefully timed to last just one hour.

Besides the record, however, the whole proceeding came under the brilliant directorial eye of Cecil DeMille on Sunday afternoon. What Mr. Barnett had done—no matter how well—was then passed by The Master.

When Mr. DeMille had read his introductory speech for the first time, therefore, he descended into the pit of the theater to watch the action. He wandered up and down the darkened aisles, his hands behind his back, noticing every atom of production detail. He saw how the crowds had been handled (his own motion-picture specialty); how a fight sequence had been worked up, both as to lines and sound-effects; whether or not the music fitted his conception of a particular trend of events.

If anything was wrong in the reading of a speech or a bit of mechanical creation, he spoke to Mr. Barnett about it when the rehearsal was finished. The latter then told the actor himself.

For, you see, Mr. DeMille is the producer of the show; Mr. Barnett is the director. Mr. DeMille passes on what is done; Mr. Barnett creates it. On the air, Cecil DeMille is just another actor. He takes his cues from the man with the head-phones on the high stool. He reads his script with the rest of them.

Speaking of Mr. DeMille's script brings up a detail which re-emphasizes the pains which are taken for a perfect show.

C. B. DeMille is one of the busiest men in Hollywood. His time is immensely valuable. What he does, therefore, must be done as efficiently as possible.

For this reason his scripts are typed to be read instantly. Each natural phrase of a sentence is printed on a separate line. Each line ends where one would normally take a breath, whether a period has been reached or not.

Moreover, when it is necessary for him to work with other actors at the end of a show, his lines are in blue type; theirs are in red. Nothing can go wrong.

Many times, you see, when Mr. DeMille is shooting a picture, he does not have a chance to see his part before he reaches the microphone. He reads "cold." This method assures him of as much accuracy as possible.

After the second "dress" on Monday, when perfection had been reached, the cast relaxed for the first time. There was an hour before the show went on the air. The musicians departed for their inevitable and eternal cup of coffee. Joan retired to her dressing-room to change from beige slacks into a black velvet-banded street dress and hat.

The curtain was rung down. Young Doug talked with a slightly nervous cameraman and put him at ease. Mr. DeMille and "Sandy" Barnett discussed politics. ("The Old Man" was a Republican; "Sandy" was a Democrat!) From all parts of the stage came the sound of low-voiced conversation.

As the hands of the studio clock neared six, however, there was an upsurge of excitement. Flash-bulbs went off. Pictures were taken of Joan and Doug, scripts in hand. The second curtain on the stage went down, behind which the actors would remain until the introductions were over and the play was actually on the air.

Finally, the musicians were in their places behind the screen. The cast took their chairs. Mr. DeMille and his secretary retired to their seats at the side of the stage, near his personal microphone. "Sandy" Barnett climbed onto his high stool and spread his scripts in front of him. His stop-watch and head-phones were ready. The announcer, Mel Ruick, made his speech to the audience. A few coughs were heard. The lights went down. The curtain was raised.

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The largest audience in the history of drama, which is the same as saying in the history of the world, relaxed in its chairs. Some twenty, some say thirty, millions of Americans listen each Monday night. Listening, they reap the harvest of entertainment promised in that almost forgotten policy laid down years ago . . . "We can work harder. We can work longer."

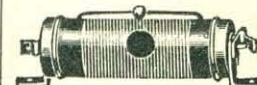

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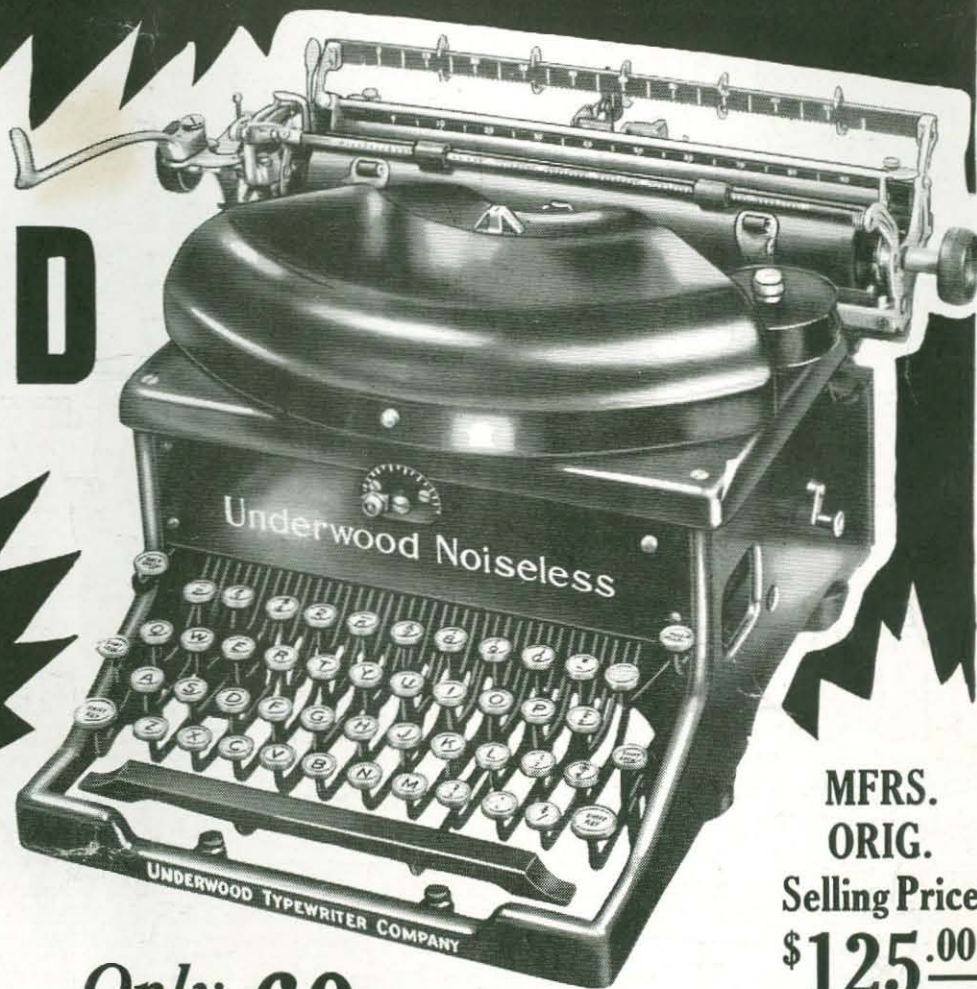
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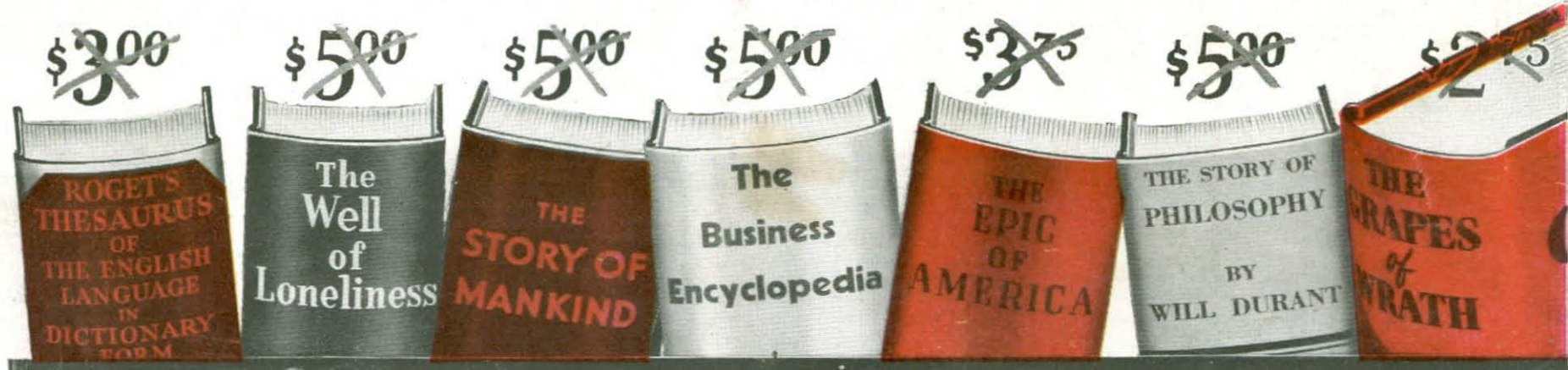
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
