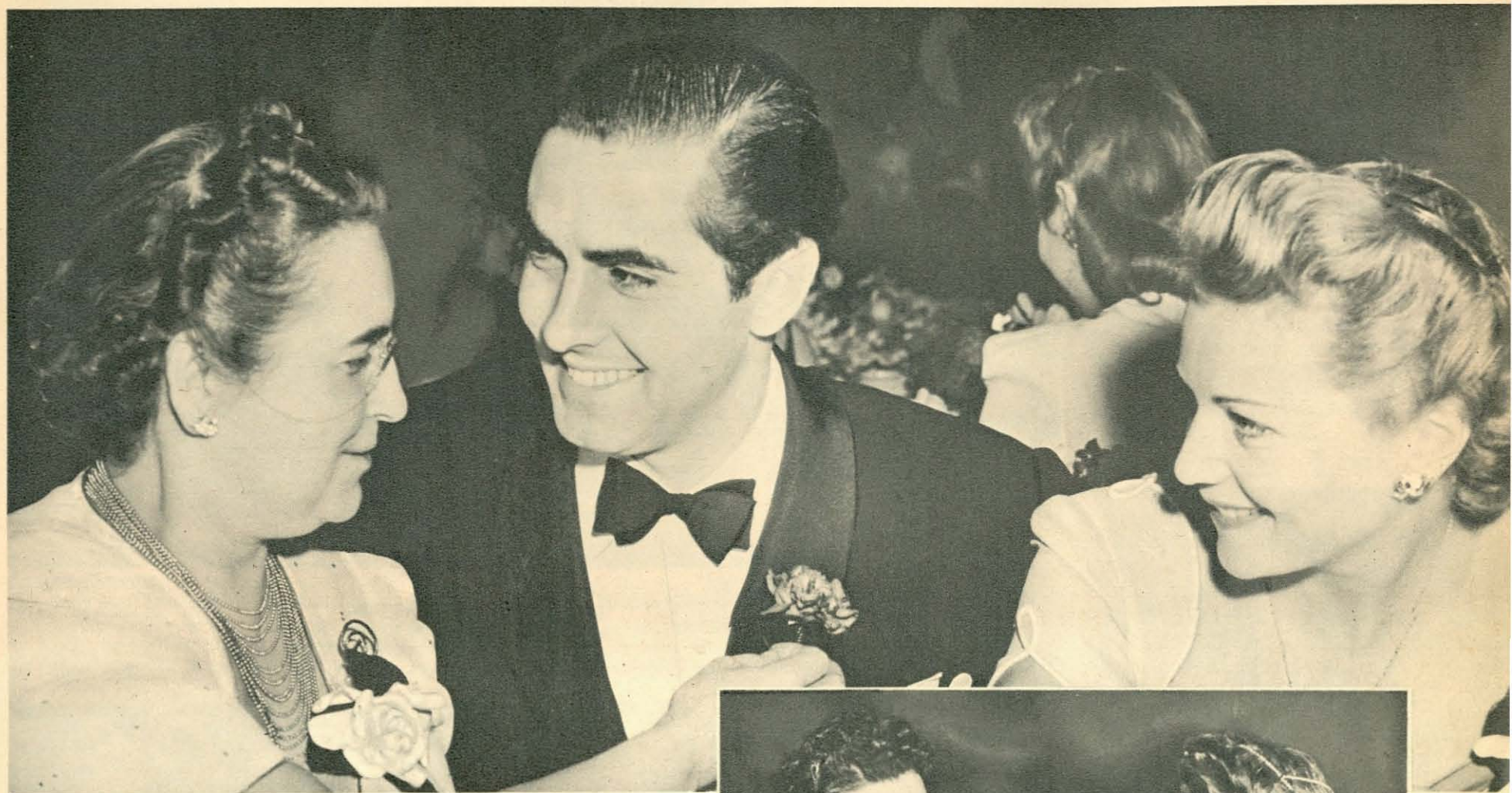

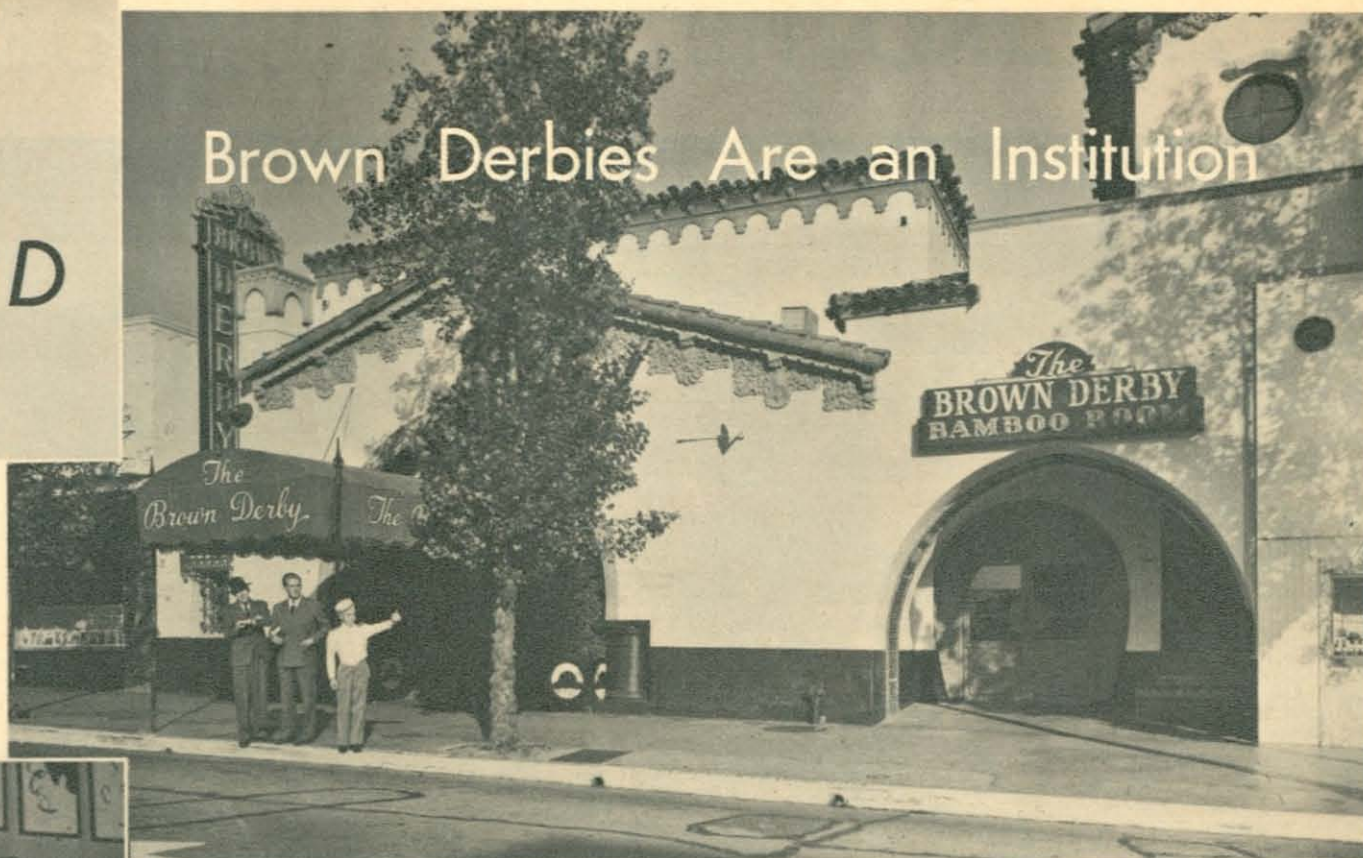

Brown Derbies Are an Institution

THE first Brown Derby was founded in 1926 by picture-producer Herbert Somborn, the husband of Gloria Swanson. It was born of his desire to have simple, homelike meals well prepared. He thought such a restaurant—especially with a common name like the Brown Derby—would draw a big trade. He was right. The first Brown Derby, built in the shape of a hat, went up on Wilshire Boulevard opposite the Ambassador Hotel. A second and larger Derby followed it, this time on Vine Street near Hollywood Boulevard. A third followed the second at Rodeo and Wilshire, in Beverly Hills. A fourth is now being planned by the Brown Derby Corporation, owners of the chain. The Derbies do not publicize the individuals of its staff of close to five hundred employees. But everyone knows the head waiters—Chelios at the Hollywood Brown Derby; Sam at the Wilshire; Gregory at Beverly Hills. Not all of the Derbies' business is transacted inside. They do a tremendous business catering at the stars' parties, and trucks bearing their trade-mark are a familiar sight in residential sections. Best days to see the stars are: Thursday (cook's night out) at the Beverly Hills site; Friday (or fight night) in Hollywood. Any early Sunday luncheon at either of the three is a star-sprinkled affair.

Jimmy Stewart Swears In

Despite his wish to have no parties celebrating his being sworn into the United States Army, Jimmy Stewart nevertheless was feted at two—one on Thursday night previous to his Saturday enlistment, the second one Friday night at the home of Franchot Tone. The first was a surprise party staged by Metro boss Louis B. Mayer and included practically the entire Metro star and executive roster. Among those present at the dinner in the private dining-room on the lot were Lana Turner, Judy Garland, Ann Rutherford, Rosalind Russell, Diana Lewis and Ruth Hussey. All the girls kissed him, Mr. Mayer made a speech testifying to his regard for Jimmy and concluded, "And when Jimmy returns he can have his old job back!" Jimmy then spoke briefly and copped Ruth Hussey for a date at Ciro's; it was their first date, although the two worked together in "The Philadelphia Story," and right

away it began to look serious. There's also the unconfirmed rumor that Stewart sprinted over to the RKO lot and kissed Ginger Rogers good-by the day before he was called, but no one has a picture of it, so there! The Friday night stag party tossed by Tone was a dilly; called a "Military Ball," everyone attended in uniform, including Clark Gable, Henry Fonda, Spencer Tracy, Robert Taylor and Burgess Meredith. P. S.—Regardless of his lack of sleep, the army accepted Jimmy Stewart.

Warner Bros. Goes to Sea

Filmland's first premiere at sea was staged last fortnight by Warner Bros. when they took the top hundred of Hollywood's motion-picture critics and cameramen and a score of stars aboard the U. S. liner *S.S. America* on an overnight ride to San Francisco and, en route, screened "The Sea Wolf." Unfortunately, the riders boarded the ship March 21, whereas youthful-as-ever-appearing Gloria Swanson left the same boat the day before after journeying on it from New York through the Panama Canal to Los Angeles. In all respects the cruise and subsequent trip on Friday, and the Saturday trip to the ranch home of Jack London, forty-five miles from San Francisco, were arranged and came off perfectly. There was only one drawback; half the stars and newspapermen couldn't "take" the pitching of the *S.S. America* in the heavy Pacific seas, and left the other half to have all the fun. Significant was the statement of the cruise director who had been aboard the luxury liner ever since it left New York. Said he: "The picture and newspaper people were very well behaved. It was the quietest night we had during the trip. It's those people from the Middle West that we have trouble with!"

1. THE ELECTRIC interurban carried the group to downtown Los Angeles, where they waited to enter induction center. Girls walked by, said good-by to lads who were total strangers. No "little fellow" before, Jimmy is now only one of that vast army of "little fellows"

2. WHEN THE INK on the enlistment blank Jimmy is signing here dries, he's in the Army for a year. The Army regulars call them "yard birds," "bucks" and "rookies." Ten photographers and three newsreel cameramen shot this scene—witnesses enough to make it quite legal

REPORT: When I was assigned to shoot complete picture coverage of Jimmy Stewart reporting for army duty, it was like old times. I spent six and a half years with the California National Guard, 160th Infantry, working up from buck private to cadet officer. So it was like being back in the army again. I had to get up just as early as any soldier. I had a telegraph company phone me "reveille" at 5:30 a.m. My car—packed with cameras and flashbulbs—was ready to go.

I jumped into my clothes and headed the flivver toward Westwood, where Stewart and eighteen other soldiers-to-be were to report at 7:30 at Westwood station of the Pacific Electric.

I got there about seven. There was a big crowd of U. C. L. A. students, mostly boys but a few girls, too, and they had banners, bands were playing, some of the students were in uniform, some wore old German helmets from the last war. They were yelling and singing at the top of their voices.

The selectees whose numbers were "up" started drifting in by ones and twos, most of them with girl friends, wives, families along. There was much kissing, fervent farewells and tears as the ladies saw their men ready to join the army.

Ten minutes before train time, Jimmy arrived in a convertible coupe with a couple of friends—not in the picture business or I'd have recognized them. He said good-by to them, picked up his bag and joined the selectee group and reported to the head of his draft board to be checked in.

From there on I followed Jimmy and the others with my camera clear to Fort MacArthur, took pictures of every step in the process. That's what the army calls it, "processing." I think I got a pretty good set of pictures. I hope our readers like them.

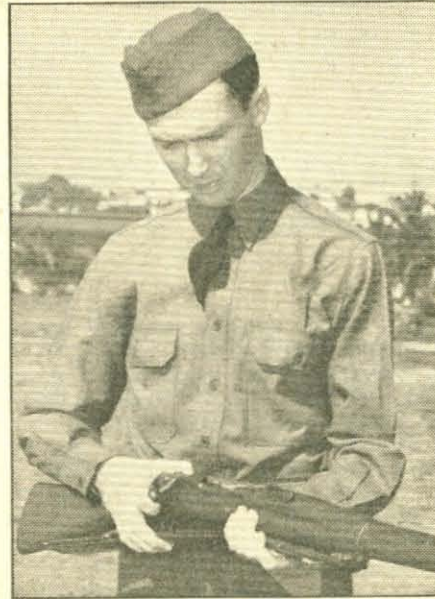

"I Wanted Wings"

Cast: Ray Milland, William Holden, Wayne Morris, Brian Donlevy, Constance Moore, Harry Davenport, Veronica Lake, et al. A Paramount picture, produced by Arthur Hornblow, Jr.; directed by Mitchell Leisen, who also directed "Remember the Night." Based on a story by Eleanore Griffin and Commander Frank Wead.

"I WANTED WINGS" is the greatest flying picture since "Hell's Angels" and it should be seen by every youth in America to inspire them with the high traditions of the United States Army Air Corps.

Besides being a swell and most timely picture, and in addition to offering Ray Milland, Wayne Morris, Bill Holden and Brian Donlevy in first-rate performances, "I Wanted Wings" serves to introduce Paramount's scintillating new discovery, Veronica Lake, who, as a blond vamp, is the nearest thing to Jean Harlow to hit the screen since the latter's death.

Miss Lake shows that she has what the boys like, and she steals every masculine eye for every scene in which she appears. Call it wham, zing, or stuff, Veronica sizzles. This young lady is going to give all Hollywood's glamour girls a tussle for top place.

The story essentially is that of three air corps cadets and the training they receive before they get their wings. Milland, Morris and Holden as the three are most believable, and Brian Donlevy turns in another first-rate job as the flying instructor. Connie Moore, for the first time, is given an opportunity to do a big part well and she does it. "I Wanted Wings" is tailored to fit the entire family and should be seen by all.

The other principals, Ida Lupino, John Garfield and newcomer Alexander Knox, are perfect in their parts, too. Strong support is given by Gene Lockhart and Barry Fitzgerald.

London's novel, of course, has been read by too many people to have its story repeated, but, to refresh memories, the play pictures the inhumanity and cruelty of the captain of *The Ghost*, a mysterious hell ship manned by the toughest crew that ever was shanghaied to sail from the Golden Gate. Miss Lupino plays Ruth Brewster, fugitive from the police who is rescued from the sea, and Garfield is George Leach, a seaman whom the law is seeking. Alexander Knox, new to the screen, delivers a surprisingly excellent performance as Humphrey Van Weyden, the writer who is fished out of the sea with Miss Brewster. Lockhart, as Dr. Prescott, drunken physician who recovers his self-respect only to end his life, and Barry Fitzgerald complete a notable cast of principals.

This fourth film-recording of the famous Jack London story, meaty and realistic, is indeed a masterpiece of its type.

Truth about the Vaughn

Deanna Durbin's approaching marriage gave Hollywood gossipers a field day. Here's the lowdown on a real romance!

Deanna Durbin will become Mrs. Vaughn Paul at the Methodist Episcopal Church in Hollywood on April 18, the same day on which her parents were married in Manchester, England, thirty-three years ago, according to announcements already made. Although Deanna, realizing the sacredness of the vows she is to take, hopes the wedding will be a quiet affair, there undoubtedly will be hundreds of pictures taken, thousands of words written about it. **MOVIE-RADIO GUIDE** is making special plans to rush into print exclusive and pertinent pictures of the bride and groom and of the wedding itself. Watch for them—first—in an early issue.—The Editors.

FANCIFUL observations have been made about Deanna Durbin's status as a "child bride." Ridiculous remarks have been spread about

Vaughn Paul trading on the position and reputation of his well-known father. Gossip flew thick and fast about how the studio and parents on both sides opposed this match until forced to face it out. The romance had the warmth and reality of a dead mackerel. This has been Hollywood's "inside" opinion of the most extraordinary romance it has ever witnessed.

On the eve of their marriage, I'd like to tell the truth about Deanna and Vaughn.

In the first place, I champion both their right and the good taste Deanna and Vaughn have shown in refusing to share their feelings about so intimate a matter as their love for each other with every Tom, Dick and Harry who knows how to read. I admit that Deanna's position as a great and popular star entails certain obligations to her public, and that celeb-

rities cannot hope to enjoy the complete personal privacy which is the enviable privilege of the rest of us. I admit that Vaughn must expect a certain public curiosity about the man Deanna takes as a husband and be willing to satisfy it within reason.

It is not within reason, however, to demand a mental strip-tease from either of them.

As for the "child bride" nonsense, it is understandable to a certain extent and the studio, in a way, is at fault. Deanna's career has been so cleverly molded since her first smash hit when she was a fourteen-year-old girl, and her succeeding pictures kept so imbued with that fresh, gay spirit of youth, all of us have forgotten the years have been passing. Instinctively we still think of Deanna as a little girl, the flesh and blood symbol of the make-believe roles she has been playing. Yet she is nineteen. Legally that makes her a woman.

Speaking frankly, Universal admits one reason for her recent tour of several cities, the first of its kind she ever has made, was to let the press and theater exhibitors see with their own eyes just how charming and grown up a young woman she actually is today.

NEXT let me untangle the mess about young Vaughn and his capabilities.

Today, at twenty-six, he is an associate producer at Universal. That is a responsible position for a man of any age, and the exception for a youth in his twenties. But not at Universal. That studio always has been willing

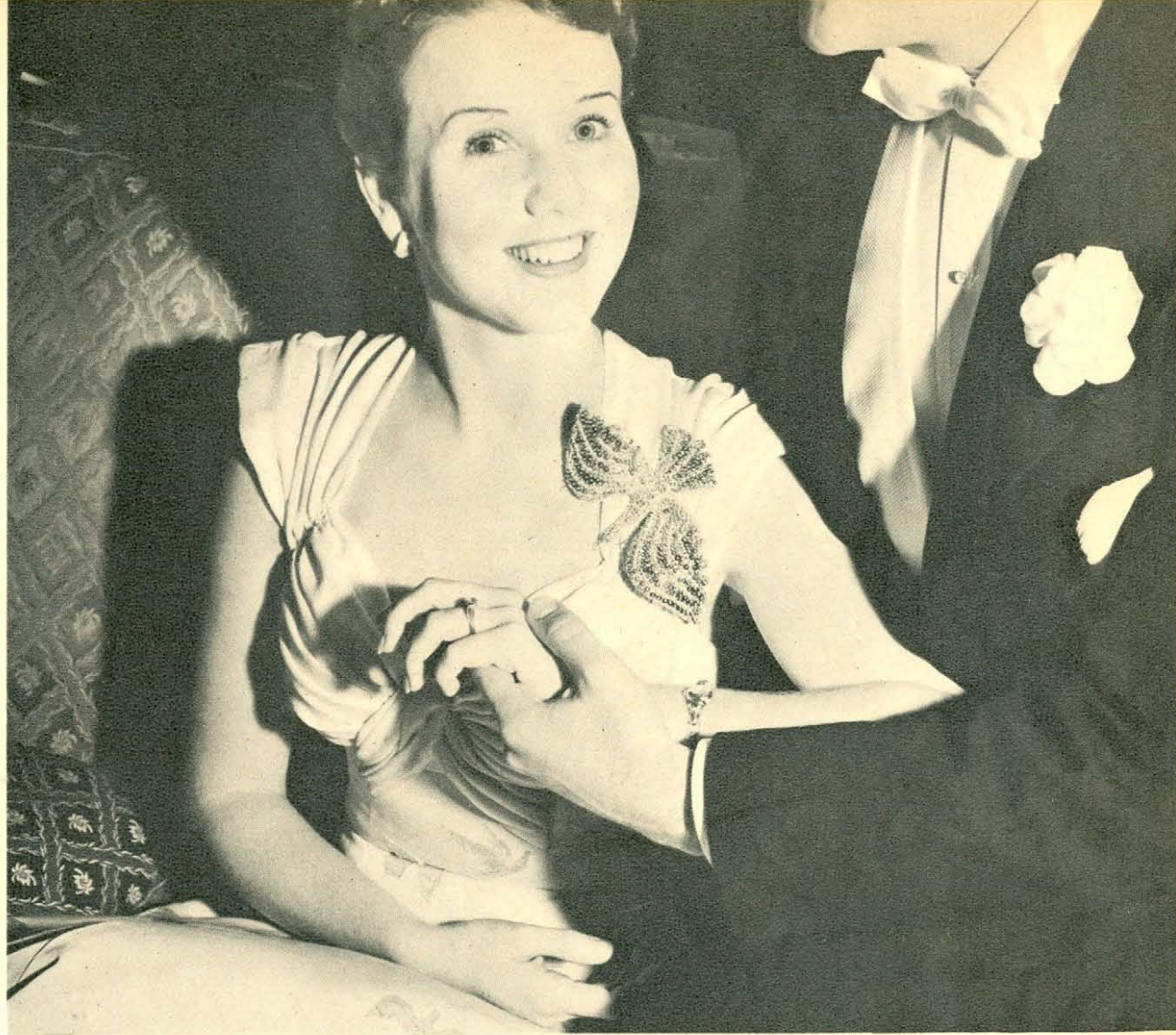
to take a chance on youth. The late Irving Thalberg, who was rated the genius of the entire industry at his death, was a Universal producer when in his twenties. Producer Joe Pasternak was in charge of all European production when he was twenty-five and Matty Fox, the present vice president of the studio, today is only thirty. Jack Bernhard is even younger than Vaughn, yet he recently was elevated to an associate producership from the cutting-department, and Alex Gottlieb won the same promotion from the writing ranks.

Nor is it because Vaughn is "the boss' son," as the sour-grape brigade would have you believe. No studio in its right mind is going to give even the boss' son three hundred thousand dollars to play with. Not in these touchy days. Besides, his father, Val Paul, no longer is the general manager of Universal Studio and hasn't been for two years. He is working for a rival producer, Edward Small.

What Vaughn has accomplished (and it parallels Deanna's achievements in importance) he has done on his own. True, he has absorbed a great deal of knowledge of the picture business from his father in the twenty-five years it has been discussed at home; but each actual step Vaughn has made on his own merit, starting as he did as a mail-boy at Warners, then as a company clerk at Paramount, and later as a second assistant director and then first assistant director at Universal from 1936 to 1940. Late in 1940 he was made an associate producer and assigned a schedule of youthful comedy romances.

I dare say Deanna's parents, Mr. and Mrs. James Durbin, were perturbed when Deanna began to talk seriously of love and marriage. She was only eighteen, and that seemed very young to them for a girl to take on marital responsibilities. They, too, couldn't realize that little Edna Mae (her real name) had grown up, and since it was her first love-affair with her first real beau, it was natural they should doubt the quality of its endurance and genuine significance. Once those doubts were dispelled, their whole-hearted approval was given.

As for the studio, at no time did it say "Thou shalt not" to the young lovers. Probably it was worried and worried plenty, but who could blame it? After all, Deanna is its most valuable asset, and marriage has wrecked the popularity of Hollywood stars before this. But once it discovered how unperturbed the Durbin fans were over the possibility of marriage for Deanna, and saw how her pictures could be steered in the same successful course by the simple expedient of plotting them along more adult lines, the studio, too, had only good wishes for the couple.

Not, mind you, that I think opposition would have cut any ice! Both Deanna and Vaughn have a good wide stubborn streak in their natures and, although tractable in most situations, in this case they would have done as they darn well pleased, or else!

Few people know Vaughn Paul well or more than superficially. His reticence and reserve blocks it. As a result he is accused of snobbery and being antisocial. Magazine and newspaper

photographers, shooting him and Deanna on dates, found him "surlly" and "uncooperative" in the early days of the romance. The truth was, he was painfully shy and their public attention embarrassed him. As he said, he squirmed inside and didn't know what to do with his hands and feet. Being movie-wise, he should have anticipated the avalanche of interest in his romance with a top star; instead he still is confounded by it.

Serious-minded, Vaughn is a thinker and has the equipment to think with. His complete conservatism about everything and lack of imagination make him seem just a bit stolid and yet, paradoxically, he has a fine story mind and definite creative flare. Incapable of fawning on anyone, he rarely is demonstrative even with intimates, and certainly is not the impetuous-lover type. Well heeled financially, he is careful about money, yet in no sense is he niggardly about spending. As any good businessman, he wants value received. Fellow workers report him a tough boss—sometimes needlessly tough—but, on the whole, fair in his dealings. Anyone who attempts to push him around had best expect trouble, and pronto. What's more, he's handy with his mitts and can take care of himself in that direction most ably. At college he was a "natural athlete" and apparently could excel at any sport without much effort. He has a quiet sense of humor, and, once he makes friends, holds their loyalty and respect.

There is a clean, scrubbed, just-out-of-the-tub look about him. Huskily built with broad shoulders, he stands around six feet and weighs 180 pounds.

His hair is dark brown and his eyes blue. His voice is pleasant but so quietly pitched it frequently is a strain to catch his words. This, perhaps, is his most annoying trait.

Deanna, too, is a conservative. Once, before the engagement was announced, a newspaper called Mrs. Durbin in the middle of the night. Was it true Deanna had eloped with Vaughn Paul? Mrs. Durbin became sick with worry. As far as she knew, Deanna was just out dancing with the boy. Hour after hour dragged by as she paced the floor with Mr. Durbin. Shortly before two o'clock Deanna came home.

"You know I'll never do that to you," she told her mother when the excitement was explained. "When it's time we'll do it the way regular people do, with a proper ceremony and you and Dad there."

LIKE Vaughn, she is not demonstrative of her feelings and is not easy to know well. In that they are a well-matched pair. Nor is she a scatterbrain; she has a wise head on her shoulders and good business sense. If she is career-conscious above all else—and I think she is—it's not to be wondered at. For the past five years, the years in which most girls of her age are flitting from beau to beau with nothing weightier on their minds than the latest dance step or a new party frock, she has carried the staggering weight of success or failure on her slim shoulders. Her pictures stood or fell on her efforts, and she knew it. It may not have been a long, hard fight to get to the top; in truth, she zoomed there with that first picture, "Three

Smart Girls." But it has been a hard fight to stay at the top; eight successful pictures in a row is a miracle, true enough, but miracles like that don't just happen.

Of late we've all been hearing tales of a new wilfulness in her, unbecoming caprices, and signs of a swelled head. Personally I have yet to see evidence of them. If they are true, I'd peg them as nothing more serious than the emotional jag of a heretofore sheltered girl suddenly discovering the world and getting a little tipsy on the power she found was hers in it. Her innate common sense will bring her down to earth again. And counterbalancing it is the new charm, presence of mind and tact I know she has acquired.

In Dallas, Texas, for instance, is a hard-boiled motion-picture editor of a newspaper. He has little liking for movie stars in person, and was persuaded to attend the reception for Deanna only as a favor to the studio representative. The next day Deanna received a note from him.

"This is the first time in my life I ever have done this," he wrote, "but I would prize an autographed picture of you."

That man had met them as big as they come in Hollywood. Of them all, he sought out only Deanna.

If the charge against Deanna and Vaughn were that they are sufficient unto each other it would be true. I've never seen two people, in or out of love, who had less need of the outside world and its diversions. In each other they seem to have all they need or

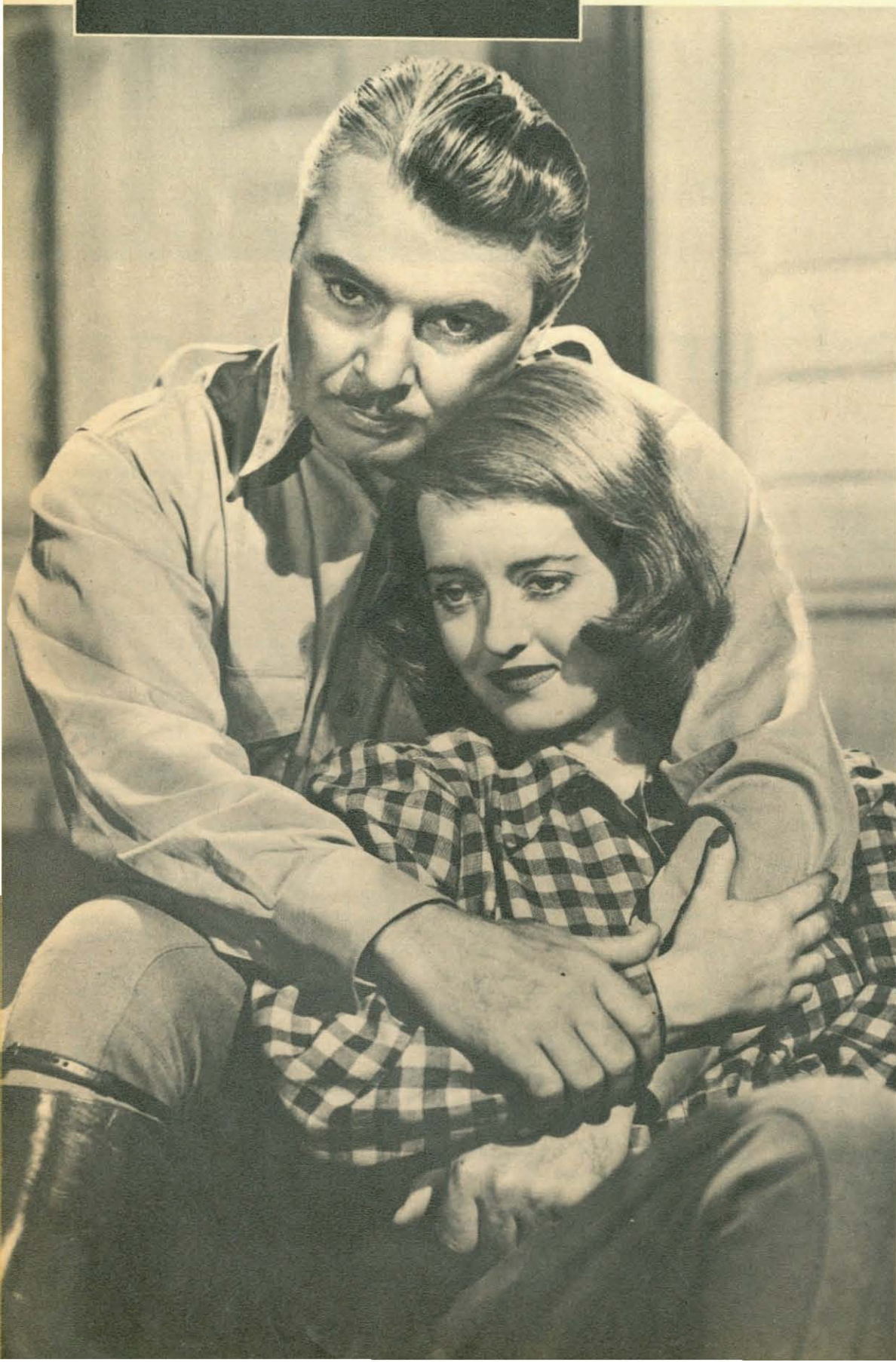

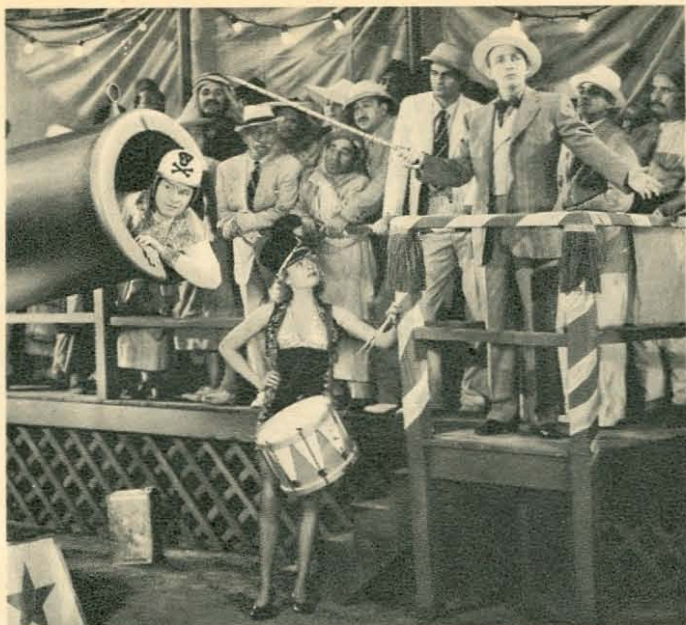
TWO years ago Bette Davis and George Brent teamed in "Dark Victory." Edmund Goulding directed that rarely beautiful and tragic picture. In "The Great Lie" Miss Davis, Brent and Goulding are reunited in a film which, less somberly tragic, is yet a tender and powerful love-story. Also, it is the first modern-girl role Miss Davis has played since "Dark Victory." The story hinges about a baby—and the battle of two women for its love. Actually, two babies were used—one for the baby at three months, the other for the baby at nine months. In one scene, home movies of the baby, supposedly taken by Miss Davis and Brent, are shown. Really, this sequence had a three-day shooting-schedule and a production crew of fifteen persons, including the director and the baby. Mary Astor (in real life one of Miss Davis' closest friends) plays her bitter enemy—a cold, ambitious concert pianist. Miss Astor is really a finished pianist. Brent in real life is a civilian aviator, holds a pilot's license, once owned and flew his own plane and, for scenes in the film, actually did the landings and take-offs necessary. Five Academy Award winners were in the company that made this film. Bette is twice an Oscar-copper, Hattie McDaniel was honored for her fine supporting characterizations. Honored, too, were cameraman Tony Gaudio, assistant director Jack Sullivan and art director Carl Jules Weyl.

ANOTHER tested-at-the-box-office team finding its way back to the screen this week is that of Bing Crosby-Dorothy Lamour-Bob Hope, with director Vic Schertzinger handling the megaphone. This same quartet is responsible for "Road to Singapore," to which "Road to Zanzibar" is a fitting sequel and companion piece. The latter is livelier and more easy to believe than the first (undoubtedly it will end up as a series by popular demand) and features a hilarious safari along a smashing script with ad-libbed side trips on the part of Crosby and Hope. The whole thing is embellished with bang-bang comedy and action and punctuated by some of the most singable tunes yet turned out by Johnny Burke and Jimmie Van Heusen. One number, "African Etude," is the result of months of research into African music, is sung by Bing Crosby and the Hall Johnson Choir, and is the longest song ever recorded on film. Against thrilling wild-animal scenes filmed by Osa Johnson, Bob Hope takes a terrific licking as a stuntman barnstorming Africa. He came through scenes, where physicians were kept at hand because of the risky stunts he was called upon to perform, with only a few scratches. Result: Hollywood's top stuntmen made him an honorary member of their clan. In one scene, three hundred colored extras who were able to speak Swahili, Ubangi and Zanzibar dialects were used. Fifteen extra make-up men, starting at five in the morning, were hired to handle this mob. Make-up men had to wear the grease-paint themselves while daubing the extras to demonstrate that it was a non-irritating paint. Miss Lamour forsakes her sarong, but appears in one scene dressed in a few ferns.

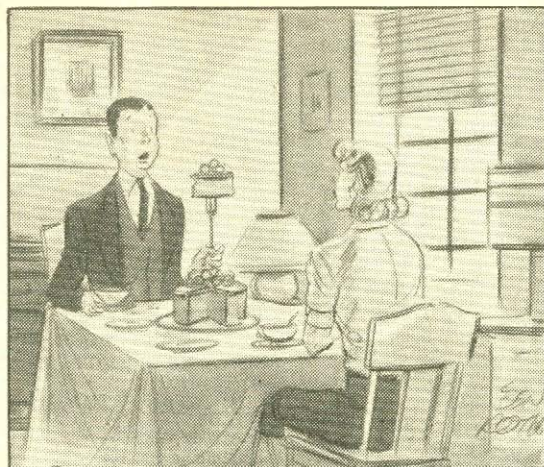

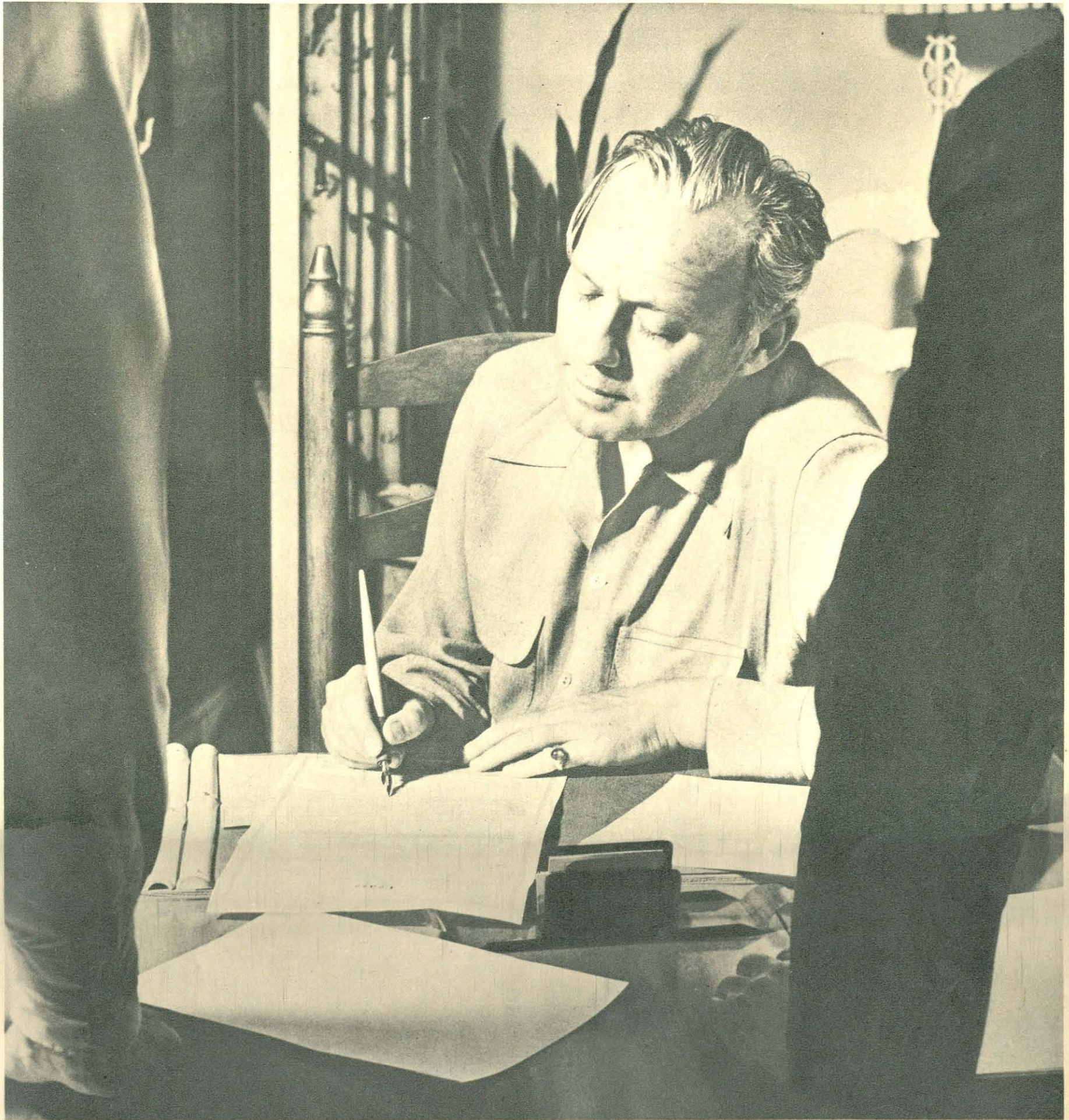

IT IS by now anybody's story that Jack Benny has signed with his Jell-O sponsor for another season. What is not generally known—and what is disclosed by MOVIE-RADIO GUIDE here—is the amazing nature of Jack's new contract. His signing of it, above, made radio history. For the 1941-42 season it provides for the usual period of thirty-nine weeks at the same salary, a package-show price of \$20,000 a week. Benny himself will be heard on thirty-five of the thirty-nine broadcasts. Then follows the unique—and history-making—clause. For 1942-43, according to the contract, the thirty-min-

ute period on NBC—his spot since 1934—will belong to Benny, regardless of who is his sponsor or even if he decides to go sustaining. Such a deal has never before been made with any star, probably will not be made again soon. What the clause's final effect will be, only time and Mr. Benny can decide. It boils down to this: Mr. Benny has obtained a very personal option on radio's choicest half-hour for the entire 1942 season, and whether he'll sell it and himself to Jell-O again or to a new sponsor or dispense with a sponsor, he alone may say. Of course, this strange power Mr. Benny has

over the radio bigwigs is about as strange as rain in April. With an audience of approximately fifty million listeners—largest of any personality in radio with the possible exception of President Roosevelt—the radio comedian can sit back and write his own ticket. Doubtless those fifty million listeners are happy to see their comedian's ability recognized, but their biggest interest in this exclusive picture of Jack actually signing his new contract is the assurance it gives them of hearing him on his usual Sunday show for another year—and still another. That's what pleases Mr. Benny, too.

ON THE BANDWAGON

FEW people know that orchestra-leader Ted Weems is a direct descendant of the man who invented the story about George Washington chopping down his father's cherry tree. Perhaps Ted has been reluctant to proclaim this fact because he hates to disillusion those who believe the cherry-tree incident really happened. Another Weems ancestor, by the way, is credited with inventing the Scottish bagpipes. The present-day bearer of the family name was born in Pittsburgh, Pa., just forty years ago. Shortly after that event took place the Weems family moved to Philadelphia, where Ted grew up. It was during his sophomore year in high school that the Weems heir discovered the school's orchestra. He promptly joined, later becoming its director. After his graduation from high school he entered the University of Pennsylvania with visions of becoming an engineer. This desire was frustrated two summers later when he succumbed to the urge to form a professional band. After a strenuous rehearsal the embryonic band embarked upon its career, full of confidence and hope. Fortunately they immediately received a break in the form of a job with a Philadelphia cafe. Weems was aware of the kind of music which Philadelphians preferred and he proceeded to give them just what they wanted. He wound up as co-owner of the cafe. Since that mem-

orable time the Weems band has advanced rapidly in the public's favor. It is an organization that has played many outstanding hotel engagements, college proms, and has supplied the music for several network radio shows. Last year he began airing his own program, "Beat the Band," which became a favorite with the listeners. Two-Minute Inspiration

A snatch of plot, 120 seconds of super-speedy thinking and you have NBC's new show, "Deadline Dramas"

MURDER his intent, one man motioned an accomplice to hand him a gun he held in his hand. But the man with the gun held it just out of the other's reach. The would-be murderer became desperate, reached frantically for the revolver. Then the man who was holding it—fired. And the radio play was a success.

The man who wanted to do "murder" was an actor at the microphone. The man who wouldn't let him have the gun, and finally did the blank-shooting, was the sound-effects man. He couldn't hand over the gun because he knew—while the actor didn't—that New York City has an ordinance prohibiting an actor without a gun-permit from firing blanks.

Such is the drama behind the unique "Deadline Dramas," heard on NBC Sunday nights. Such are the situations that prove indubitably to those who witness them that the plays enacted by Robertson White (the man who wanted the gun) and Irene Wicker, with only two minutes' preparation, are all they pretend to be—bona fide extemporaneous sketches fashioned on the air from plots snatched out of thin air.

Here's how the show works: Studio spectators submit twenty-word sentences, each of which forms the basis of a story plot. One of the sentences is selected by William Fadiman, story editor of Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer and brother of "Information, Please's" Clifton Fadiman. White and Miss Wicker have two minutes to plan a story from the sentence selected while Fadiman talks extemporaneously or a musical selection is played. Then the pair go to the microphone and present their play, taking all parts themselves, even improvising some of the sound-effects along with the soundman. In conclusion Fadiman gives a frank criticism of the play.

"Deadline Dramas" are aptly named, whipped into preliminary shape as they are with the second hand of the studio clock nudging right against the deadline. So dramatically, in fact, does the title describe the lightning-like strokes of inspiration by which the White-Wicker team produce their impromptu plays that, when program officials conducted a contest to rename the series, most listeners said the name shouldn't be changed at all.

Bob White has long had fun with "Deadline Dramas." He got the idea

in 1923 when he was an actor with the Hedgerow Theater in Rose Valley, Pa. He called his creations "improvisations" then, and he considered them only an entertaining party game. But his exceptional finesse in originating sound, lively sketches on the spur of the moment won him widespread acclaim. A decade passed, and White opened a radio-production office in Chicago. Being both a good businessman and a good social mixer, he held open-house parties each Sunday. Actors on the way up and on the way down attended. White entertained them by letting them entertain themselves with his ad-lib dramas. To ambitious actors this was the ultimate of free expression. White, though, was still the guiding genius and the master performer. But among the others one tiny actress, radio's renowned "Singing Lady," Irene Wicker, stood out prominently with her dramatic sense, ingenuity and ability to work smoothly with White.

AFTER White tried the idea over Hollywood's station KFVB in 1940, taking all the roles himself, he was offered the opportunity of making a network feature of it. When he went to New York to prepare the show, naturally he remembered Irene Wicker. And the pair that were the hit of the parties with their "improvisations" became the stars of radio's dynamic "Deadline Dramas."

The studio audience of the show invariably contains many skeptics, people who do not believe such really interesting plays can be prepared in two minutes and the dialog created by the actors as they go along at the microphone. But they always go away convinced that there were no tricks—especially after seeing such a behind-the-scenes crisis as that of the murderer who couldn't get the gun away from the soundman.

The listening audience, too, is apparently intrigued and pleased with "Deadline Dramas." After the first customary thirteen-week trial the show has one of the highest ratings of any sustaining program, and bids fair to become a long-run hit.

"Deadline Dramas" is heard over NBC Sundays at 10:30 p.m. EST, 9:30 p.m. CST, 8:30 p.m. MST (not available to Pacific Coast), and is recommended for your listening pleasure by the editors of MOVIE-RADIO GUIDE.

NATIONAL DEFENSE LISTENING-POSTS TO STUDY FOREIGN SHORT-WAVE BROADCASTS

SINCE the beginning of the war I have been continually pointing out the ever-increasing importance of short-wave broadcasting as an instrument of international policy. With the powerful international broadcasters of Europe and Asia filling the ether with propaganda twenty-four hours daily it was inevitable that at least a certain percentage of this intentional and insidious doctrine-preaching should fall upon fertile ground. Thousands of listeners in our own country were gulping down these propaganda messages—disguised as sugar-coated pills—with no understanding of their hidden intent. I felt that we should be more concerned with the importance of international broadcasting; should be paying more attention to what was filling the ether of the whole world; should be listening to and analyzing what the other nations were attempting to sell; should be setting up a coordinated government bureau of short-wave information. Single-handed, because I could get no official support, I attempted as far back as the fall of 1939 to set up a National Defense Listeners League. The plan was to enlist the services of several hundred expert short-wave listeners who were willing to act as watchdogs over certain specified frequencies each day. Due to lack of interest on the part of both officials and listeners the idea was abandoned. All the while Great Britain, Germany and other leading nations were operating busy and efficient official government monitoring stations (listening-posts) upon a twenty-four-hour basis. In England alone a staff of some two hundred were being employed in the recording, translating and analyzing of some five hundred thousand words of foreign broadcasts received daily from every corner of the earth. Every day other countries were taking down every word of every international broadcast being sent out from the United States, analyzing it and making a permanent record of it. We still were ignoring the situation. Meanwhile, however, some private agencies were establishing their own monitoring stations. Enterprising journalists began to pick up and utilize foreign news and propaganda-casts. NBC and CBS set up their own monitoring

services. Princeton University installed a listening-post and began a serious study of propaganda broadcasts. Next the Federal Communications Commission's field monitoring stations—established primarily for checking frequencies of U. S. broadcast stations—began to watch for programs of a subversive nature and for illegal stations. The amateurs assumed the responsibility of policing their own ether lanes. The period of awakening had set in. Inquiries concerning all phases of short-wave broadcasting began to pour into the writer's bureau. From ordinary listeners to leading radio figures, everyone was becoming interested in the vital statistics concerning short-wave stations.

At long last we are awake. The Federal Communications Commission is establishing special national defense listening-posts to record, translate, transcribe and analyze foreign short-wave broadcasts.

A twenty-four-hour watch for subversive and other pertinent radio propaganda from abroad is being set up at primary monitoring stations strategically located throughout the United States and its possessions.

A picked force of 350 technicians, translators, clerks, propaganda analysts and other experts will work in eight-hour shifts to keep abreast of all overseas emissions which may involve propaganda intended for persons in this or neighboring countries. The listeners and analysts will pay particular attention to voice broadcasts, including news, speeches, announcements and playlets, as well as some musical programs.

After being recorded in the field, all this material will be coordinated and studied at Washington. The extent of the work involved is indicated by the fact that it requires an average of seven hours of translation and transcription to fully process one hour of recorded material. It will be necessary to record and analyze matter of which seventy-five percent will be in languages other than English.

This necessary step to deal with vital national defense problems developed by radio is taken on recommendation of the Defense Communications Board, as approved by the President and the Bureau of the Budget.

GENERAL NOTE: Daily at approximately 11:30 a.m. CST, Lord Haw Haw of Berlin reads the names, numbers and prison camps in Germany at which they are being held of

several British officers who, it is claimed, have thus far not received any mail from home. This broadcast may be tuned in over DJB (15.20).

want. In all sincerity I hope it may always be so. But to say their love is any less real or warmly human because they do not shout it from the housetops is as ignorant as it is untrue.

I wish you could have seen the supposedly cool and detached Deanna the day she received her betrothal ring of a huge diamond circled by two rows of rubies. True, she didn't run around saying "Look! Look!" to everyone. But, for my money, the way she sat around the set with her hand so "nonchalantly" posed against her cheek was twice as young and sweet, and ten times as revealing of the glowing pride within her.

Unexcited about the romance? I wish you could have overheard the long and ardent telephone calls which passed between the two each day she was away on the trip (with Mrs. Durbin cautiously keeping track of the fleeting minutes and Deanna blissfully waving her away), and seen the daily wires. I wish you could have been in the hotel room that afternoon a big box was delivered airmail special from Hollywood. It was a gardenia corsage for Deanna to wear to a party in Atlanta. From Vaughn, of course. She jumped up and down, squealed with happiness, and raced all over the suite to show off her prize. "Isn't he wonderful?" she demanded. "Isn't he wonderful!"

The romance began in 1937 but it didn't get anywhere. Deanna was a jilted lady.

I know Deanna industriously has been studying home management from her mother and married sister, and Vaughn is knee-deep in plans for their new home.

BUT more than that I do not know, nor would I ask the details. I think it's their own business if they choose to regard it so. They do.

The engagement was announced in proper fashion by her parents and was followed by a formal reception. The wedding will be a formal church wedding and the honeymoon will be spent in Hawaii, picture schedules permitting. They will build their home after the wedding on a lot which faces the mountains, the city and the ocean and it will be livable, but definitely not a show-place.

Of the future Deanna says only this: She will never work in a picture with or for Vaughn. It would not be fair to either of them, she feels, for they might see too much of each other, or create uncomfortable situations for others by trying to smooth the way for love. Such problems as arise each must solve for himself.

One smart girl has indeed grown up.

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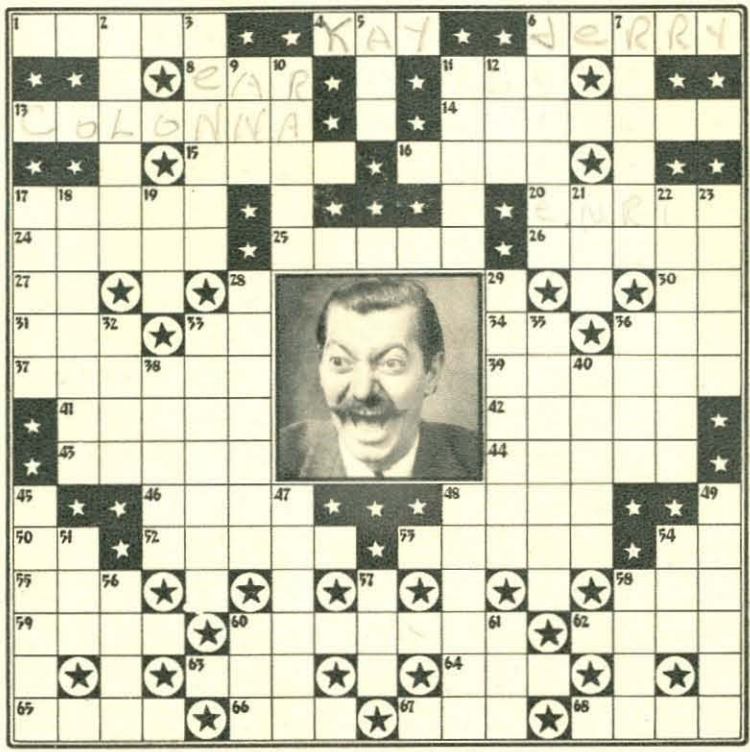

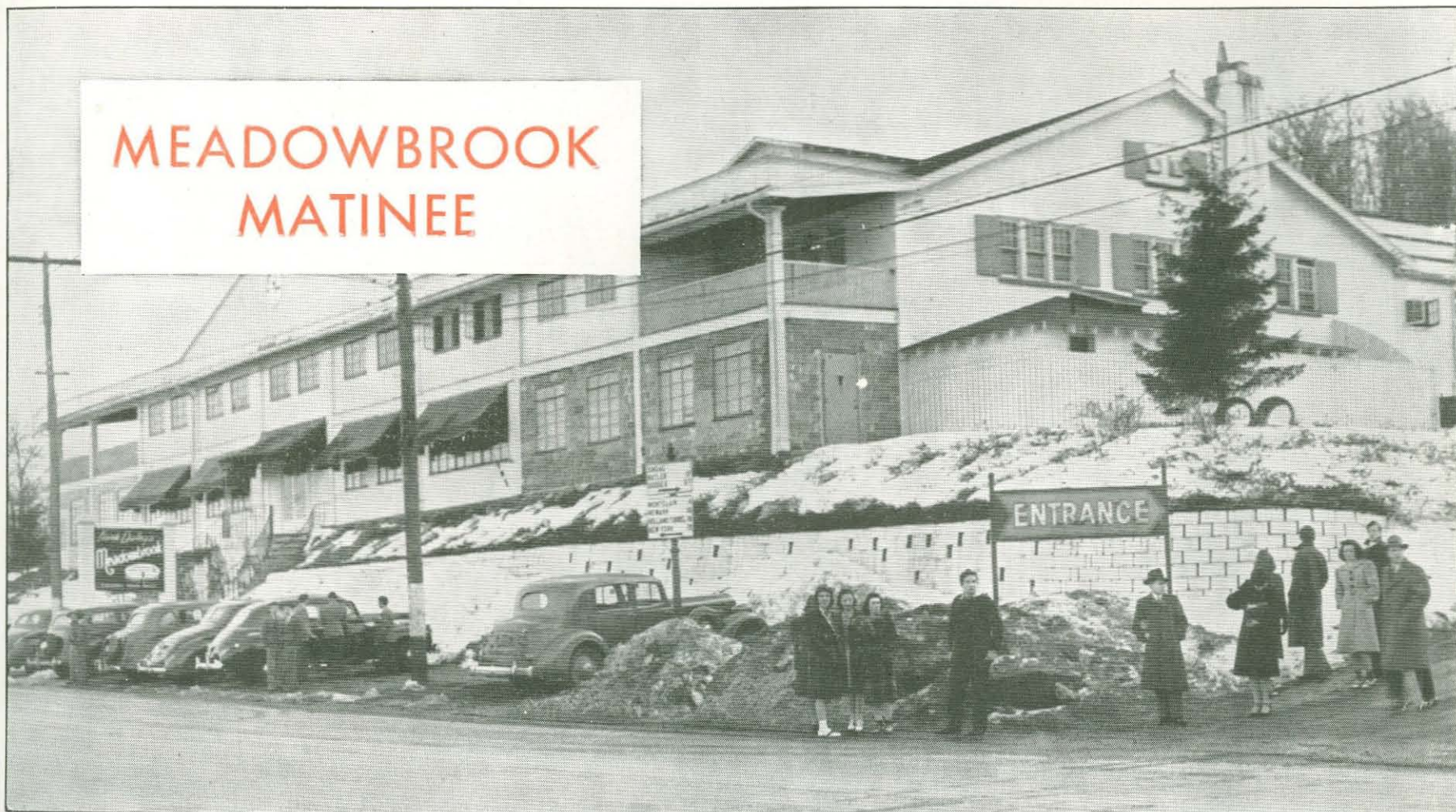
