Kate Smith Pays a Tribute to a Dear Departed Friend

THOSE of us who have danced or listened to Hal Kemp's music were deeply shocked at the news of his death. We first heard him when he came out of the South to head a band which played in New York's old Manger Hotel, and we shall never forget his grand smile and his eagerness to please those who danced while he played. Kate Smith knew him then, too, for she was a comedy dancer in a Broadway musical comedy, and still to become known as the Songbird of the South.

On a recent broadcast, she talked of Hal in simple, sincere words. I believe all his friends will want to keep this copy of her remarks.

"I'd like to speak for a moment about a friend and fellow artist, a popular bandleader whose name most of you know well, Hal Kemp, who fought a losing battle for life last week after a serious auto accident at Madeira, California. The news of Hal's death on Saturday morning came as a shock to his many friends. I saw him on Thanksgiving Day, Mr. and Mrs. Collins and their daughter, Adelaide, and I were his guests for the holiday dinner at the Cocoanut Grove in Los Angeles, where he and his orchestra were playing to huge crowds nightly. Then, as always, he radiated that warm, sunny personality, and spoke in that slow southern drawl that endeared him to everybody he met.

'Hal Kemp was born in Marion, Alabama, only thirty-six years ago. It was at the University of North Carolina, during his college days, that he started building his musical career. He and his classmates got together and formed a band that later was to become famous all over the country. They were just a bunch of college boys then, making music for the joy of it, and making music that was better than average. Upon graduation, they all went on tour, playing in various cities and towns in captivating staccato rhythm that quickly brought them to the attention of all who loved dancing. Crowds applauded Hal Kemp and his boys in Chicago, in New York, but it wasn't until they took Hollywood by storm that they became outstandingly popular.

"So today I pay tribute to Hal Kemp, who only a week ago was healthy and happy and busy, and who now has gone from our midst . . . Hal was one of those rare personalities that made more than a passing impression on those who knew him. He will be mourned not only by his own family . . . but by many who never saw

him. He will be missed ... and he will be remembered as a fine musician. But more than that, as a fine



4:40 a.m. The newlyweds are in an awful hurry. Back in the plane.

BLACKOUT" brings to the screen a vivid picture of the war and how it affects the daily lives of people in a big city. It shows how activity and hubbub carry on in the darkness of the blackout just as they do in the light of the ordered world.

This story is interesting because it actually pictures people going to and coming from work in darkness, hopping onto packed buses with only a small flashlight as a guide, reading sign-posts with just the dim glare of a tightly shaded lamp. Conrad Veidt is cast as the skipper

of a neutral Danish freighter. Stopped

by a British patrol ship in search of contraband, he is forced to spend the night in an English port to await approval of his cargo. What happens to him that night makes the story.

One of his passengers, a woman (Valerie Hobson), steals his landing permit and his first mate's permit, and she and her companion get ashore. Veidt pursues them, and catches up with them on a train bound for London. When they arrive in London, in his pursuit of her, he becomes involved with the Gestapo and discovers that the woman and her friend are British agents. They (Veidt and Hobson) are captured by German agents, active in London, and he escapes, later rescues her.

Veidt gives a suave and convincing performance; Valerie Hobson rings the bell both for beauty and talent in this picture, filmed entirely in blacked-out London.

INDING stars for America's movies is the world's greatest gamble, with a cash pay-off that makes the Irish Sweepstakes look like penny-ante. It's a sort of free-for-all that's liable to crown anybody's neighbor Queen of the May without warning.

Sending its five hundred scouts to comb every city and village in the land for talent, and spending fifteen million dollars a year to train and ballyhoo their catch into tempting titbits, Hollywood deals in fame and fortune in carload lots.

But in stirring up his dainty morsels, old man Cinema is a cook without a recipe, and doesn't know whether he's going to dish out a crepe-suzette or a roll of tripe. And it's this element of chance that makes star-picking a headache for Hollywood, and a great game for the rest of the country.

So that you can name your winners and gloat as your predictions come true, Movie-Radio Guide's "talent tout" passes out the dope herewith:

Now let's see what's on the board. Here's an entry two studios are playing on the nose for stardom: Virginia Gilmore. What's Virginia got that you and I haven't?

Not beauty, curves or glamour. Samuel Goldwyn and 20th Century-Fox aren't betting on this filly for what catches the eye. So let's discover what's different about this girl.

At the age of twelve Virginia had her heart set on joining a little-theater group in San Francisco. As they were more than a trifle radical, her mother and step-father scoffed at the idea. So Virginia took the matter in her own hands. Instead of attending school in Burlingame, she used her lunch money for carfare to San Francisco each day.

There she haunted the theater group until she got an audition and an opportunity to rehearse for the play, "Awakening of Spring."

Day after day for three months she rode the trolley between the city and Burlingame. Finally she was admitted to the group and was cast to a part. As that meant spending her evenings in San Francisco, Virginia had to confess to her mother that she had been "skipping" school and playing actress.

She discovered her deception was known, and that she had been allowed to continue it as a test of her determination, to discover if she really wanted to be an actress badly enough

to surmount obstacles. She had, and since she must possess ability to win a part in a play, she could join the group.

Excited and happy, she moved into the weird abode of the players. It was one of the "earthquake houses" on Telegraph Hill. San Francisco's disaster had left it grotesquely misshapen. Its doors were cock-eyed, its windows askew, and its floor so slanted that a few hours under its leaky roof convinced one the whole world was on the bias once he stepped outside again.

The group put on every type of play, finally being taken over by the Federal Theater Project. Then Virginia's work had a wider audience. A Hollywood scout saw her, and one day a letter from the Samuel Goldwyn studios came to the old house on the hill.

Naturally, to admit interest in motion pictures was to lose face with the group. With almost every member of the group at her elbow Virginia answered Samuel Goldwyn's invitation to come down and have a test made. She was not interested in pictures, she wrote, because of her commitment to do a show in New York. What show no one has discovered to date.

Goldwyn wrote again, urging her to go to New York by way of Hollywood, and to see him en route.

Virginia dropped in on Goldwyn and was so confident of her own ability, so faintly interested in movies and so eager to get on to New York that Sam signed her without a test. In spite of the fact that she had crooked teeth, a boyish bob hacked by a member of the group and a lisp.

Whether Goldwyn saw real genius under this girl's highly individualist appearance and manner, or whether he didn't want anyone to know he signed her "as is," he hired instructors to teach her French, Spanish, music, diction and dancing. He put her in the hands of dentists, doctors, hairdressers and dressmakers.

For almost two years Goldwyn paid her a salary and wrote checks to cover everything that was done for her—without giving her a day's work in pictures.

Then, for one of the mysterious reasons known to Hollywood, 20th Century-Fox put her in a "B" picture called "Manhattan Heartbeat." Then in another "B" called "Jennie."

After that came a small part in "Laddie" at RKO.

at the picture "Jennie" and bought half Gilmore's contract from Goldwyn. The instant this deal was closed 20th Century signed her to the feminine lead in their super-duper "Western Union."

A year and a half without a day's work in a picture—then four pictures in five months. That was Virginia Gilmore's record. And more amazing, she was given the lead in one of the biggest pictures of the year without ever having been seen on the screen by the public.

She has just finished "Tall, Dark and Handsome," the picture in which she is co-featured with Cesar Romero, and goes to Goldwyn to make "Little Foxes" with Bette Davis. Meanwhile, Fox is wondering how they can arrange the shooting schedule on "How Green Was My Valley" to get her into that also.

THERE is only one answer to the amazing play this girl is getting. Hollywood believes she possesses real dramatic genius. She has not beauty, glamour, curves or outstanding personality. In fact, Virginia is positively miserable when she has to meet strangers, and her lisp is entirely due to self-consciousness. One thing she does possess, however, is a smile that transforms her. She has blond hair and very large brown eyes, is five feet four and weighs 110 pounds. Her

real name is Sherman Poole.

In contrast to Virginia Gilmore is Veronica Lake, Paramount's ultraglamorous beauty. Like Mary Beth Hughes and Lana Turner, Veronica has dangerous curves.

Few if any youngsters have ever drawn Hollywood's spotlight as quickly and sensationally as Veronica Lake. Though not yet seen on the screen, she has been the talk of the town for months. Paramount officials happened to see a test of this hundred-pound bomb of feminine lure that was made at M-G-M and rushed to sign her. Now her dramatic portrayal of the cafe entertainer who comes to a tragic end in "They Wanted Wings" is the talk of the studio.

Veronica's meteoric career is as much a surprise to her as to the picture colony. A bare nine months ago as Constance Keane she was plowed under by Paramount's talent head's remark: "You're just another Hollywood cutie—with really nothing to offer pictures. Sorry."

Today she is one of the most discussed players in Hollywood, and the public has never had a glimpse of her on the screen. The hard, tough row has never been Veronica's lot.

While studying medicine at Magill, Veronica accompanied her parents on an automobile trip to California—but never went near a movie studio. They returned east—but moved out again the following year, with Veronica quitting college in the second year of her pre-med course.

This time the cinema raised its ugly head, for Veronica met Gwen Horn, who was in pictures. She accompanied Gwen to an interview at RKO and

was bitten by the bug.

So she enrolled in one of Hollywood's innumerable little theaters and took part in half a dozen plays. Then she started the rounds of the studios and was practically advised by Paramount to take a dose of castor oil and

But she didn't, and managed to get bit parts in RKO's "Sorority House," Fox' "Jones Family" and M-G-M's

"Forty Little Mothers." Then came the M-G-M test and the Paramount grab.

Veronica's freckled blonde with blue eyes; is five feet two and weighs ninety-eight pounds. And as for the distribution of her curves: She has a nineteen-inch

waist, a thirty-three-and-one-half-inch bust and is thirty-three and one-half inches around the hips. Which, experts in feminine form tell us, is just about IT.

He sailed on a schooner to Balboa Beach, California, but as his salary was only twenty-

five cents a month, he returned east by freight. Next he served as captain and crew on a small yacht cruising Maine

Winter didn't drive Sterling off the sea—merely out with a Gloucester fishing crew. His next sailing job took him to the warmer waters of Floridawhere he was "beached" with sixty cents and a shipmate. They camped out for a couple of days in Miami's Bay Front Park, living on peanut but-ter and bread. Job as fireman on the steamer Florida plying to Havana, Cuba, got him off the beach.

In 1937, as mate of the schooner Yankee he cruised around the world. Later, as navigator aboard the famed Gloucester schooner, Gertrude L. Thibaud, when it raced the Bluenose in the International Fishermen's Race, Hayden was "discovered" by an eastern newspaperman. He became the

subject of a barrage of letters to a Hollywood movie-talent agent. According to this newspaperman, Sterling had everything Hollywood's adventure heroes wished they had.

Meanwhile Sterling kept to his sailing, finally getting a schooner of his own.

He planned to start a passenger service between Hawaii and Tahiti but the war interfered. Also, his sailing days were numbered, as the Hollywood agent was working on him, and had brought his exploits and physical appearance to the attention of director E. H. Griffith.

Griffith, who was looking for a strik-ng type for the picture "Virginia," ing type for the picture had seen a picture of Hayden in a national magazine. Griffith went east, tested Sterling and brought him back to Hollywood. And the first sneak preview of "Virginia" convinced Paramount that it had the male catch of



GNACIO RUIZ, the first man to climb to the top of Mt. Whitney (14,496 ft.) back in 1904, doffed his cap to the trail-blazing efforts of the cameramen who filmed Warner Bros.' "High Sierra," for many of the scenes were photographed on the steep slopes of America's highest mountain, and at a height greater than any yet achieved in filming an American motion picture with earth-based sound equipment. Twenty men worked four days to clear a path for the train of mountain-reared Spanish mules used to pack in the cameras and equipment. Arriving in the shadow of Mt. Whitney during the deer season, director Raoul Walsh and the more than two hundred members of the location group wore bright-colored jackets while not working to avoid being mistaken for deer by quick-fingered, eager hunters. Bogart, on a hunting-trip during the location stay, shot the first deer of the season—a two-hundred-pound buck and the second-largest killed in that vicinity in recent years. Wade Boteler, who played the sheriff, has played sheriff roles in 240 pictures since 1927, but his posse of twenty-five men was composed of Hollywood stuntmen. Stuntmen were needed for the pursuit scene in the mountains, but neither Boteler nor Bogart would permit extras to substitute for them. "High Sierra" is scheduled for release in January.



A. to the strains of "The Star-Spangled Banner" (probably the only known use of that tune in opera). Butterfly arrives and after the opera). Butterfly arrives, and after the marriage contract is signed an uncle-priest curses her for renouncing her

terrified. Pinkerton tries to comfort Butterfly and the act ends in an ecstatic love duet. The time of the second act, in Butterfly's house, is two years later. Pinkerton has left her but she believes firmly in his return, and describes his arrival to her maid, and describes his arrival to her maid, Suzuki, in the famous aria, "Un bel di vedremo" (One Fine Day He Will Return). Sharpless comes to read Butterfly a letter from Pinkerton, but is interrupted by a suitor seeking her hand, whom she refuses, declaring her love for Pinkerton. Sharpless hints that Pinkerton may not come back, and Butterfly reveals that she has had a child, which she has named Trouble, and brings him out to show Trouble, and brings him out to show Sharpless. Soon after Sharpless' de-Sharpless. Soon after Sharpless' departure a cannon booms, and, in one of the most touching scenes in the opera, Butterfly and Suzuki sight Pinkerton's ship in the harbor. They make elaborate preparations to welcome him, and settle themselves at the window with Trouble to await him. In Act III they are still at the window after an all night vigil. Butterfly leaves the room for a moment and Pinkerton and Sharpless arrive terfly leaves the room for a monarand Pinkerton and Sharpless arrive and Pinkerton's and Pinkerton and Sharpiess arrive with a strange woman—Pinkerton's American wife, Kate—who, when told of the child, offers to take him. 

In this atmosphere of doubt and misunderstanding, Professor Allen (Roger DeKoven), Christy's father, has wisely recognized the trouble and knows that the young people will never find contentment until they are able to look further than their own selfish desires. In trying to resolve their problems he has fallen ill, so that additional troubles—those of his other daughter, Siri (Joan Tompkins)—must wait. For listeners who like stories filled with tears of joy or happiness—but always tears—"Against the Storm" offers a look into human hearts. It may be heard Monday through Friday over NBC.



name-band business—the story of how bands brought vaudeville back

A MONG the few vaudeville acts that get a hearing—or make a profit—nowadays are the "in person" appearances of big-name bands. And they get a hilarious reception with a handsome profit. Fact is that the radio-famous dance bands, with their swing music, have revived vaudeville from the doldrums into which it fell when radio boomed in the early thirties. Jitterbugs wanted to see their new-found idols in the flesh and their elders wanted to know what all the hullabaloo was about, so the bands started touring the country's theaters. As a result, stage doors were unlocked, musty dressingrooms dusted off and a key source of revenue opened to the baton-wavers. For a week's engagement theater-managers are now glad to hand out \$7,500 to \$12,500 to an ordinary top band, and fifty percent of gross receipts to super-sensational band attractions such as Kay Kyser and Fred Waring. Kyser has walked out of theaters after a week's work with as high as \$18,000 on this basis. For those who wonder what a dance band can do, besides playing, to fill thirty to sixty minutes, there is the case of Fred Waring, who has been playing theaters since 1921. Although the Pennsylvanians' vaudeville engagements have been spasmodic since they began their current five-a-week radio show, their leader remains one of the greatest band showmen of all time. Waring innovations are endless. Megaphones for the band-singing, monkey jackets, comedy drummers, glee-club effects are a few of them. His "dancing tambourine" (illuminated pie-plates worked with flashlight switches) still closes all his shows. Hottest theater attraction today is Kay Kyser, whose appeal lies in the three-cornered, unabashed horseplay between him, his band and his audience. Most amazing theater band record of recent years was Orrin Tucker's with Bonnie Baker, when they grossed \$54,000 at the Chicago Theater in one week, similar amounts from Coast to Coast. For all of the theater-band champs, there are advantages and disadvantages, but the headaches of a band gone stale on tour can easily be dismissed in view of the rich rewards reaped in the form of fancy fees, increased popularity, flesh-and-blood contact with the fans.

NE of the younger bandleaders who is attracting national attention these days is Vaughn Monroe. Born in Ohio, Vaughn is a graduate of Carnegie Tech and the New England Conservatory. In the first-named institution the young Buckeye State lad studied for an engineer's degree, which he obtained but has never used. The college course, incidentally, was financed through play-ing professionally with a dance band at night. Yes, you guessed it; when he finished college he kept right on playing. Began his music-making at the age of eleven, when he took up trum-peting; in 1926 won a state contest for a trumpet solo in Milwaukee, As we've said, when Monroe finished college he didn't stop playing. Probable reason was the job which bandleader Austin Wylie offered him. An association with Larry Funk's band followed, with which band he remained for three years as a baritone and trumpet-player. In 1935 switched to Jack Marshard's Boston society band, where he continued as a featured vocalist and trumpet-player. Vaughn would have remained indefinitely a plain musician had it not been for Marshard's insistence that he take over the baton-waving for one of Marshard's units. Faced with the threat of being fired if he didn't, Monroe reluctantly agreed, but was firm in his belief that he wouldn't be a success at the job. Since that time three years ago, has consistently refuted that early argument by playing highly successful engagements at leading night-clubs and hotels in Miami Beach and in and around Boston. The band which until last April was a ten-piece "society" orchestra is now a thirteen-piece affair, specializing in swing. This change from society music to swing has resulted in ever greater success, with the band getting several NBC Coastto-Coast broadcasts weekly. At present Monroe and his lads are holding forth from the Statler Hotel in Boston, where the band's music is broadcast via CBS Fridays and Saturdays at 11:15 p.m.

News from the Music Front

AST week I spoke of the controversy aroused by Walt Disney's "Fantasia," as to whether it was helpful or harmful to the cause of good music. I submitted that I believed "Fantasia" would create a vast new audience for music in exposing it to an unfamiliar public, and that, hearing the music for the first time under such conditions, non-music-lovers would be interested enough to listen to it the next time they heard it on the air, instead of turning to something else. To prove it, the switch-board operator of Movie-Radio Guide's New York office, Miss Renee Rinner, offered herself as a guinea pig. She agreed to see "Fantasia" and give me her reactions. Up to date and interested in everything else, Miss Rinner knows nothing about serious music and has classed it as something to be respected but not enjoyed. In her own words she declared about "Fantasia":

"I thought it was a swell Disney picture. But I loved the music, too. I think I liked the Beethoven Pastoral Symphony the best, it's so gay." (When told that this symphony is rated as fairly highbrow music, Miss Rinner registered astonishment.) "I particularly liked the opening, the Bach piece." (Interpreted by Disney in abstract swirls of design.) "I found myself wondering just how I would have illustrated the music,

and I'd like to hear it again, just to see what ideas I get listening to it. In fact, I'd like to hear the whole thing over again without the pictures. I'm not sure I'd like all of it, particularly the heavier bits, but the next time I hear any of the pieces on the air I'm going to listen."

This response of Miss Rinner's does not, of course, mean that she will immediately turn into a symphony addict. But certainly a new world has been opened to her, whether she follows it up or not. And if "Fantasia" can do that, it has done its job. This discussion is now open to anyone who wants to write in, for or against.

Big news from the Metropolitan Opera is the rousing success of its two new comic productions, "Don Pas-quale" and "The Daughter of the Regiment." They are the talk of New York and are playing to sold-out houses. There will certainly be more comic revivals (in English, I fervently hope) next year, which is probably why at a recent party given to Lily Pons by her husband, Andre Kostelanetz, to celebrate the tenth anniversary of her American debut, both she and several Met conductors went into a huddle at the piano over the score of the French comic-opera "Fra Diavolo," by Auber. If it is re-vived next year, it won't be long before someone will call it the strip-

tease opera, because of a censorable disrobing

The year 1941 marks the hundredth anniversary of the New York Philharmonic Orchestra and impressive plans are in view for the centennial celebrations next fall. Both Toscanini and Stokowski are slated to appear as guest conductors, thus ending two noted feuds which both carried on with Philharmonic officials. Top-flight soloists will also appear, as well

as John Barbirolli and Dimitri Mitropoulos, who scored a big hit in his recent guest appearance.



Musician of the Week Joseph Szigeti

He looks like a Balkan diplomat: he is a violinist for violinists

BROADCASTthe thrill of a gamble," declares Joseph Szigeti, Hungarian violinist, in precise, only slightly ac-cented English. "The performer knows that many listeners twirl the dial haphazardly, and he hopes that perhaps a phrase, a snatch of the melody he is playing will make them pause and listen further. The possibility that a few notes might convert some such



Szigeti, who has been called "the violinist for violinists" be-cause of his scholarly and deeply sensitive interpretation of the classics, has started a violin series on Sunday nights with Alfred Wallenstein (MBS), For Szigeti it is a return to the strictly noncommercial and high-minded attitude of the British Broadcasting Corporation, which felt it owed a cultural duty to the people and solemnly performed rain or shine, everything from the best known to the most erudite of music. This sometimes resulted in boring and exceedingly highbrow programs. But, more often than not, it forced upon the listeners what for many was a new and unfamiliar enjoyment which they learned to appreciate. Szigeti feels that more of this is needed over here and cites the enthusiastic response to Wallenstein's Bach Cantata and Mozart Concerto Series as proof that Americans, as well as the English, listen avidly to the best in music without having to have

it served up with sugar-coating.
Although he has been playing the violin in public since the age of fifteen, and made his early reputation with such a thoroughly classical work as the Beethoven Violin Concerto, Szigeti has never permitted either his playing or his repertoire to remain static. Among modern composers he is

known for his sincere open-mindedness toward new music, and they delight to dedicate new works to him. Three moderns, Hamilton Harty, Ferruccio Busoni and Alfredo Casella, wrote con-certi for him, and Bela Bartok composed both Rhap-sody for Violin and Orchestra, and Rhapsody for Clarinet, Violin and Piano for Szigeti. He played the latter piece with the composer and Benny Good-

man, whom he admires tremendously not only for his serious music accomplishments but also for his swing talents. Szigeti is one of the few serious musicians to thoroughly understand and appreciate swing, and to have a talent for making swing fans interested in his own kind of music. When the jitterbugs crowded Carnegie Hall to hear Benny Goodman go classical, they stayed to applaud Szigeti.

Szigeti, both in appearance and manner, is the epitome of that overworked phrase, "man of the world." He resembles one's idea of a Balkan diplomat more than a violinist, is tall, slender, with a delicately modeled face and dark eyes. He wears his clothes with distinction and moves with grace. He loves good food, good wine and good conversation. He is that rare creature, a musician who does not consider music the focal point of all things. His exquisite Paris apartment, filled with art treasures (of which he has only two marvelous eighteenth-century miniatures over here), was a meeting place of everyone of importance, not only musicians but painters, writers, sculptors, diplomats and statesmen. He knows how to listen as well as to talk, and possesses that disarming simplicity which seems to be the attribute of only the very great artist. He is married and both he and his Russian wife look too young to have a married daughter.

Lord Haw Haw Unmasked

Lord Haw Haw, Nazi broadcaster with the English accent who does his fifth-columning via short wave, is unmasked in a manuscript brought to America by CBS' William L. Shirer. Titled "Twilight Over England," the book contains scripts by Haw Haw and his own autobiography. In it he says his real name is William Joyce, that he is an ex-Mosley Fascist, that he was born in New York in 1906, passed his boyhood in Ireland, spent most of his youth in England, was educated by the Jesuits, attended the University of London, taught in London University. He left London on August 25, 1939, for Berlin, where he was hired by the German government at seventy-five dollars per week for propaganda work. His identity was revealed, he says, when he deserted his wife and two children to run away with another woman. His wife heard him broadcast and said, "That's my husband."

\$5,000 But No Suit

Angus McDougall, sixty-two-year-old Scot discovered living in a Chicago flophouse, was too proud to come to New York to claim the five-thousand-dollar estate unearthed for him by the "Court of Missing Heirs," because he had no "Sunday suit." FM STATIONS RECEIVE DISTINCTIVE CALLS

BROADCASTING by FM has passed the experimental stage and is now recording. and is now recognized as a definite commercial broadcast service. FM broadcasts provide noiseand static-free reception of an extremely high-fidelity character. FM broadcasts can be received only over limited areas; therefore hundreds of FM stations, properly spaced in relation to each other, can operate on the same frequency FM broadcasts take place on ultrahigh frequencies and can not be received on ordinary receivers. Simple converters are now available which, when used in conjunction with your present set, make it possible to receive these broadcasts. Receivers for FM reception only and receivers that will receive both FM and present-type broadcasts are now available from the majority of radio dealers at fairly moderate prices.

To provide distinctive calls for FM broadcast stations, the FCC has adopted a new system of callletters with interposed numbers.

Under international agreement the first letter of a call indicates the nationality of a station, thus, the United States is assigned the use of three letters-N, K and W Calls beginning with N are reserved for the use of the Navy and Coast Guard. Those beginning with K are assigned to broadcast stations west of the Mississippi River: those beginning with W are assigned to stations east of the Mississippi River.

Consequently the first call-letter of an FM station must be K or W, depending upon its geographical location.

A second letter for an FM station will be assigned in alphabetical order to each station on a given frequency as licensed, thus providing twenty-five stations in each area for a given frequency. Where it is possible the city or area also will be indicated by the second letter or combination of second and

third letters. Thus stations in Boston will terminate with the letter B, while stations in New York City will terminate with NY, etc.

However, between the initial letter and supplemental letter (or letters) two numbers will be utilized. These numbers will indicate the frequency assignment. This is possible because all FM stations are in the 42,000-50,000 kilocycle band, and because all FM frequencies are assigned on the odd hundreds in kilocycles. Thus the first figure and the last two figures of the frequency assignment can be dropped (glance at the frequency chart given here and you can easily see by the italic numbers how this works out).

In brief, here is how the system works: W41B would indicate an FM station in the eastern section of the country (Boston) operating on 44,100 kilocycles. By the same token, K43SF would apply to an FM station in the western part of the United States (San Francisco) on the 44,300 kilocycle frequency

OAN CRAWFORD doesn't diet, contrary to all stories you may have heard concerning her, and she has a waistline that a Powers model might

She's a tall girl with broad shoulders, a fine, high bosom and the long, slender legs we so frequently hear de-scribed as "typically American." There's something about this cleareyed young woman, with her wide, sensitive mouth, her friendly smile,

her quick, intense way of doing things that is characteristically American. Here is no dollar princess, but a young woman who has made good in a brilliant way, who also has made it in the hard way and doesn't mind your knowing it. Talking with

Joan and studying her at close range, as I had the opportunity to do recently in her beautiful hotel suite, fragrant with flowers and spilling over with the books she loves and the photo-graphs of people who quite obvious-

ly love her, I had the feeling that this young person would never be satisfied with herself, or more literally would never permit herself the luxury of relaxation-the kind of "letting down" relaxation that makes so many women grow heavy physically and light mentally; that keeps their faces unlined but their expressions as empty and brittle as a piece of china.

Joan's face today is a young wo-man's face, but it is fortunately not a countenance that looks as though it had just been lifted pink and untouched from life's tissue-paper wrappings. It holds much that is gay and young and unconquered but it is also the face of a girl who has loved and suffered, who has given and will continue to give extravagantly of herself to those she loves. You may not be aware of it but that is one of the reasons why you enjoy watching her on the screen. Her expression tells you that she has not been spared the problems and heartaches and responsibilities that fall to the lot of the average person but that they have in no way affected the gallantry of her spirit or made her less responsive to the needs and expectations of other people.

(I think I should be prouder to own her kind of beauty—and she is lovelier in her dark-eyed, eager way, than her photographs or the screen indicate—than to have a face that is a composite of a hundred professional beauties or of baby-faced "starlets.")

I asked Joan if she would mind tell-

ing me for the benefit of you readers how she manages to retain that clear, fine skin texture and slenderness of figure that are two of her most noticeable characteristics. She told me with a flicker of amusement that she had no diet, exercise or cosmetic "secrets" whatever. She uses quantities of soap and water and she walks whenever and wherever she has the opportunity. Walking to Joan, however, represents much more than win-

dow-shopping or skipping down the street to mail a letter or hurrying to a street-car. In her case it means miles of brisk strolls down the avenues of New York City or cross - country hikes in Westchester or Hollywood. It also means unhampered skirts and appropriate shoes, so that she is free to enjoy every moment of her health-bringing exercise.




