The EDITORS' NOTE

GILBERT SELDES, in the current issue of a contemporary magazine which costs too much to be read (except on loanout) by the general public, lists six reasons why the public isn't patronizing the movies the way it used to. We have no fight to pick with Mr. Seldes. Some—maybe all—of his reasons may be quite correct. But we'd like to put the following on record as the most delightful movie evening we have spent in some time:

We were invited to Warner Bros. to witness a preview showing of the R. A. F.-made short feature, "Target for Tonight." But when we arrived, we first were treated to a most interesting, informative and humorous Technicolor short, "The Tanks Are Coming." Then followed a streamlined, thirty- or forty-minute remake version of the old Richard Barthelmess starring yarn, "At the Stroke of Twelve," by Damon Runyon, and capping the climax, the most interesting British-made "Target for Tonight" in which actual members of the R. A. F. enact a typical bombing raid into Germany, showing each step required into Germany, showing each step required—and the result.

We thoroughly enjoyed every picture of the three, which were shown in exactly ninety minutes—one hour and a half. We drove leisurely home, with time to eat a light snack before retiring.

Maybe that's another trouble with the movies. They take too long to get to the point in this streamlined day of speed.

BUT rather than find fault with movies, nearly all of which we like, we'd rather do a bit of boasting about our own discovery, war correspondent Edwin Hartrich, former CBS radio reporter from both the German and Allied fronts, the only two-front war observer available in these so-far peaceful regions. He is here because the Nazi Gestapo didn't like his sharp mind, his ability to get the truth through to America. He was asked to leave Berlin last December.

When we heard about him we proposed that he write the current series of articles and supervise the drawing of war maps which would make it possible for the average American radio listener to understand the war communique broadcasts better and, at the same time, provide the real inside stories that have not been told here yet because of military censorship. He has done both nobly, and—please note—his sense of timing has been uncanny!

Last issue he gave the lowdown on "Hitler's Tragic 'Victory,'" the story of why Hitler went after Russia and why his "victory" is a hollow one. This week, young but experienced Mr. Hartrich will unfold "Why Doesn't England Invade Now?" Don't miss his analysis and behind-the-scenes material. If we weren't writing from Hollywood, we'd say he's terrific!

NEXT WEEK, with lovely Ann Sheridan on the cover in color by the expert Jack Albin, the "Truth About Ann Sheridan's Non-Engagement Ring" is revealed. Gene Autry's working day at Republic Studios is told in pictures. Oh, yes, and there's a war map. You'd better order it NOW.—The Editors.

JIVE

HOEDOWN

MICKEY ROONEY and Judy Garland danced the La Conga in "Strike Up the Band," and the dance swept the country last year as a national favorite. Now in Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer's "Babes on Broadway," to be released early in 1942, they are introducing a modern version of the old-time hoedown to a new song, "Hoe Down," written by Roger Edens and Ralph Freed. Anyone can dance the Rooney hoedown. It's fun, too!

Steps of the new dance combine some of the old-fashioned hoedown with the latest rug-cutting jive. While it is given a spectacular production in the picture, its basic steps are simple enough to catch on quickly in dance halls, night-clubs everywhere. Mickey and Judy hope it will prove even more popular than the Conga.

Words of the song's opening chorus (*italicized*) best describe the dance as shown by these pictures—

1. "*Hoedown! The country's gone hoedown!*"

The boy and girl start out in the dance's key step, a shuffling step forward with a new twist of the body and backward jerk of the thumb.

2. "*It's putting its toe down, and kickin' its heel.*"

They do exactly what the words say, first pointing toe at the floor, then stamping heel, meanwhile dancing and tapping wildly about each other.

3. "*Hoedown! Is really a rare dance.*"

Again it's a shuffle forward in a variation of the first hoedown step. This time the toes are pointed in, the arms straight down and crossing in front of the body.

4. "*A pioneer square dance, but with a new deal.*"

Here they really swing into action, frantically circling each other, then coming together suddenly again. When dancing in a crowd, they even change partners in what amounts to a speeded-up version of the early-day square dance.

5. "*One . . . two . . . Swing your partner lightly . . .*"

After coming together, the boy grabs the girl around the waist, swings her off the floor around him onto his knee. This is where the modern swing fans will come into their own.

6. "*While you hold her ever so tightly.*"

From his knee the boy gives the girl a spin away from him, then pulls her back and lets her drop with legs stretched out in front of him. If he's good he catches her just before she hits the floor.

The rest of the song is:

"Go down and bring your best beau down.

We're facing a showdown and got to make hay . . .

'Cause hoedown's on its way!"

As the chorus continues, the basic steps of the dance are repeated. It ends in a shuffle step forward with one arm stretched forward shaking a finger as though to say—"See, didn't I tell you so?"

Why So Many Pretty Girls

Come From Texas

"WHY," inquired the editor, "do so many pretty girls come from Texas? There's Ann Sheridan from Denton and Dallas, Ann Miller from Chireno and Houston, Mary Martin from Weatherford, and Linda Darnell from Dallas. They're standouts. Then there's Helen Vinson and Adrienne Ames from Beaumont and Fort Worth. Among the starlets are Evelyn Keyes, Georgia Carroll, Judith Barrett, Lynne Roberts and Ann Morriss, all from Texas. Find out why."

So we set out to investigate. Our first call was the *World Almanac*. "The peach," the almanac stated dryly, "is the leading Texas fruit."

Next we turned to the U. S. weather bureau. Here a diligent young lady uncovered some interesting facts. Dallas, a predominating beauty spot, it seems—after a look at the source of Misses Sheridan-Darnell-Miller-Martin—up to 1920, about the time they

were born, had a mean temperature of sixty-five degrees. The thermometer had never gone below ten degrees. Mean maximum temperature was 74.7 and mean minimum 55.3. Denton and Houston temperature was about the same as Dallas. Chireno and Weatherford were too small to have temperatures taken.

But the young weather lady imparted, "Texas generally has moist, warm tropical air, particularly near the Gulf. Winters near the Gulf are moderately mild." There, we thought, we have it. Texas beauties grow up without being blighted.

But that's as far as we proved anything in our investigation, for when we looked into the beauty foursome's childhood diet, upbringing, here's what we found:

Linda Darnell's favorite childhood teething was done on beefsteak, black-eyed peas with pepper sauce and lots of milk. The Darnells always spent

considerable time at picnics, riding horses and out in the open air.

Ann Sheridan gave the climate and general Texas good health as the determining factor, added: "We from Texas eat good, wholesome food, including lots of fruit and vegetables. It's really only a little time since Texas was a frontier and girls from there today are but two or three generations removed from pioneers who settled the plains. That's where we get sturdy bodies and qualities like courage, initiative, self-reliance and poise," she explained.

Ann Miller, on the other hand, had a puny start in life despite Texas. Dancing lessons, given her when a baby, overcame that handicap, developed her limesome figure. She admits eating man-sized steaks when but ten years old, lots of fresh vegetables at her grandmother's. She also drank barrels of clear well water, spent many nights camping.

Mary Martin somewhat disproved the trio's backgrounds. She said she'd hardly recommend her diet as a youngster as a beauty formula. "I ate too much candy, peanuts, crackerjack, drank too much pop, had my share of green apples. I also had all varieties of measles, but I do think Texas climate is a beauty aid." Mary likewise took up dancing, even taught it at her own school and so improved her figure, vitality.

And there you have the Lone Star state's secret of pulchritude. All you have to do is add up the stated advantages, divide by two, and you'll still have a very sharp set-up. There's one thing we did not do in pursuing our investigation. We didn't write to the Texas Chamber of Commerce. We know what their answer would have been. Something like:

"Beautiful girls from Texas, sir? Why, what other kind of girls do you think we raise down heah?"—E. P.

"BIG TOWN" Editor ROBINSON Crusades on Screen



FOR those who know Edward G. Robinson chiefly as Steve Wilson in the Columbia Broadcasting System's "Big Town" radio program it is difficult to think of the veteran Hollywood actor as any type of character except a hard-boiled, square-shooting newspaperman. But with the many moviegoers who consider Robinson films must-go-see items it's a different story. If you check the roster of Hollywood artists and the list of their pictures you'll see how astonishingly versatile the little giant really is. Take the cases of last year's "Brother Orchid" and "Dr. Ehrlich's Magic Bullet." In those he played a thug turned monk and a medical benefactor. Then there was his brutal role as a sea captain in "Sea Wolf." And remember "Little Caesar" and "The Hatchet Man"? One of Robinson's outstanding film portrayals of a newspaperman was in "A Dispatch From Reuters." Now it's good news for radio and movie fans alike that his new M-G-M film, "Unholy Partners," is another newspaper story of a hell-bent-for-copy newspaperman and his fight against the underworld—pitching hot lead type in reply to hot lead slugs from the triggermen. The story is laid in

the days of post-war inflation and prohibition, of "bunion derbies" and marathon dances, of the big bull market in Wall Street and of tons of ticker-tape fluttering from skyscraper windows upon returning heroes, of transatlantic flights, that fateful day of the market crash and the dramatic climax of the editor's (Robinson's) answer on the most vital question concerning life. Those who like Robinson best as radio's Steve Wilson will enjoy this new movie; those who like Robinson's screen portrayals won't be disappointed either—because M-G-M's new picture, "Unholy Partners," is thrilling, dramatic Robinson action all the way. —D. M.

ONA "LORELEI" MUNSON Has Bad-Girl Problem



ONA MUNSON, petite, pretty and amiable, is one of Hollywood's best "bad girls" as far as screen activities are concerned. The blond actress has done a succession of villainess roles with such finesse that she has become virtually typed on the screen. And her success in such evil roles has been achieved over the handicap of her slight frame, which isn't exactly the type for the heavy roles Miss Munson has been portraying in pictures. However, in spite of such typing in a series of screen roles, Miss Munson's versatility, well established on both stage and screen, is demonstrated to the many loyal followers of the "Big Town" radio show.

On the air she is an ideal team-mate for Edward G. Robinson, playing the part of his valuable girl reporter, Lorelei. In that role she is not a siren, though she does let her romantic emotions break through now and then. She is not languorous; she is brisk. As the dependable sob-sister she has the chance to emerge, at least through her voice, from the bad-girl complex and demonstrate the range of her ability, at the same time finding a creative thrill herself in the contrast. In "Gone With the Wind" Ona, who is five feet two inches and weighs an even hundred pounds, had to have her clothes padded heavily and lifts placed on her shoes to create the illusion of the buxom Belle Watling. Now in "Shanghai Gesture," she is portraying a sly-eyed Chinese woman of the world, Madame Gin Sling. Regarding her versatile roles, Ona said: "Being first and foremost an actress, trained in the theater, it is only natural that any colorful role offers challenge to my imagination and instincts in that line." Ona passes the situation off lightly by ascribing her dual dramatic nature to the fact that she was born under the sign of Gemini, the Twins! —D. M.

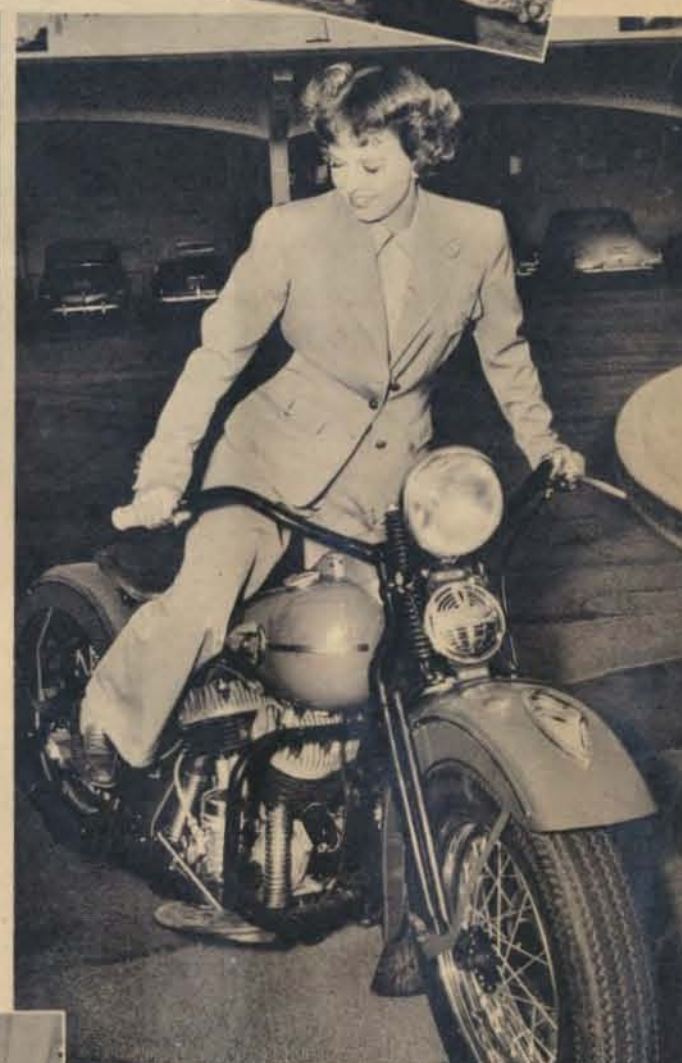

"Hot Spot"

Cast: Betty Grable, Victor Mature, Carole Landis, Laird Cregar, William Gargan, Alan Mowbray, Allyn Joslyn. Directed by Bruce Humberstone; produced by Milton Sperling. Screen play by Dwight Taylor. From the novel "I Wake Up Screaming," by Steve Fisher.

This is the Story: "Hot Spot" is something like a one-cent sale. For the price of one, movie-goers will not only thrill to a superb murder mystery thriller but they will also witness some very sterling acting. The story revolves around the murder of Vicky Lynn (Carole Landis). Although Carole is a morgue candidate as the picture opens, she gets plenty of acting opportunities through use of the flash-back technique. Through the fanatical efforts of detective Ed Cornell (Laird Cregar), circumstantial evidence points out Frankie Christopher (Vic Mature) as the murderer. The unraveling of the story is tense, makes it a chair-holder until the final few feet of film, but to tell more of the story here would only deprive it of much of its suspense.

Verdict: Under the Zanuck roof, Grable, Mature and Landis have all three blossomed into box-office names. Their histrionic efforts in this picture warrant that popularity, but a special bit of praise must be set aside for Laird Cregar, who does one of the finest pieces of character acting that Hollywood has seen. —L. R.

"Dumbo"

Type of Picture: An animated cartoon comedy-drama in color, full-length feature size, with a traveling circus as its locale.

This is the Story: Dumbo is an amazing baby circus elephant who brings disgrace to his mother by being born with such huge, flapping ears that he is looked upon as a freak, and is always stumbling on his ear tips when he goes to do a trick. How he triumphs over his difficulty would spoil the story—so go and see.

Verdict: "Dumbo" comes close to "Snow White" as Disney's next best feature to date. —E. P.

Outstanding Pictures

HERE COMES MR. JORDAN: Story of a spirit removed from a body fifty years before its time. Good comedy, with Robert Montgomery, Claude Rains, James Gleason. (Adults.)

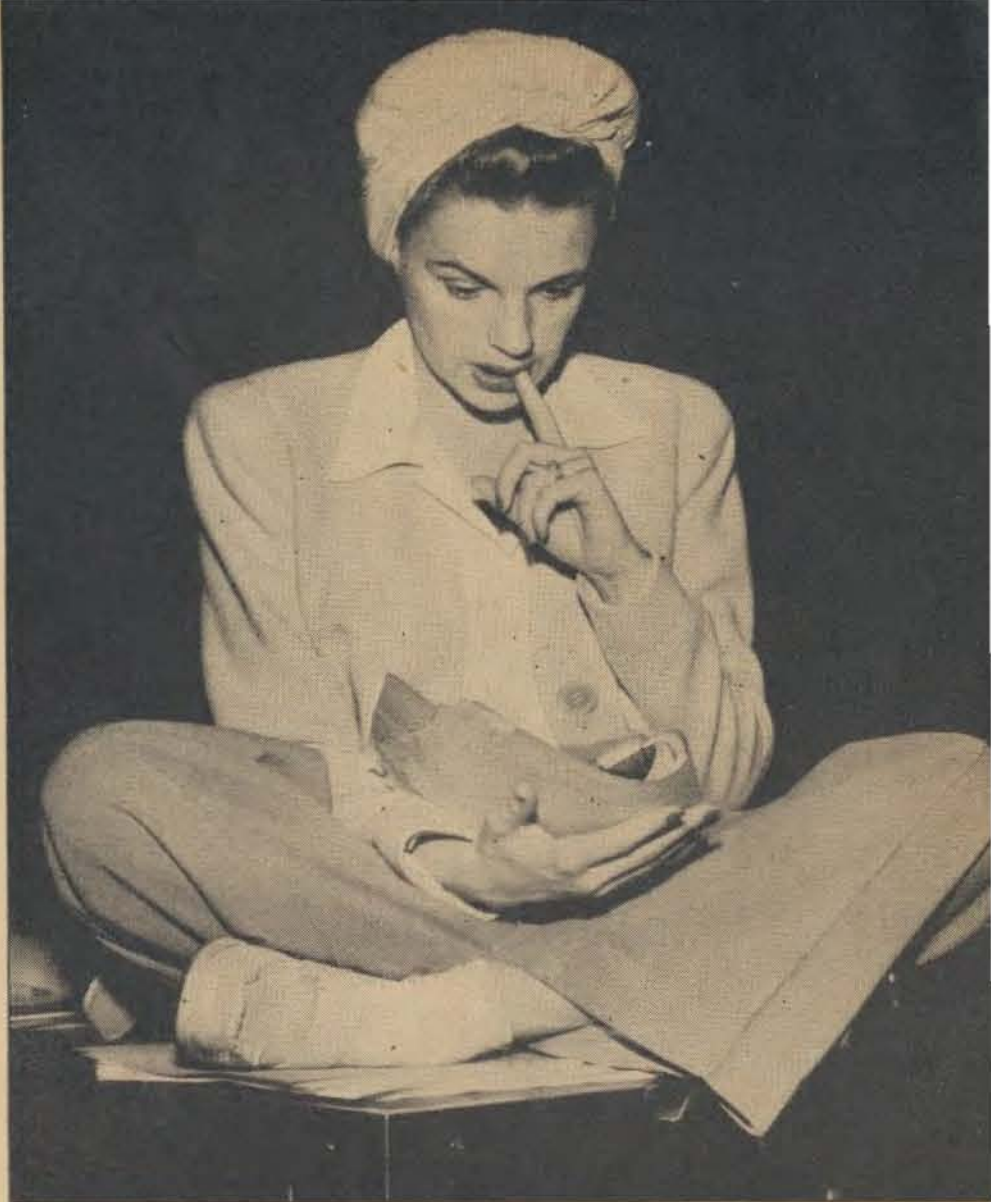

Mickey and Judy Again

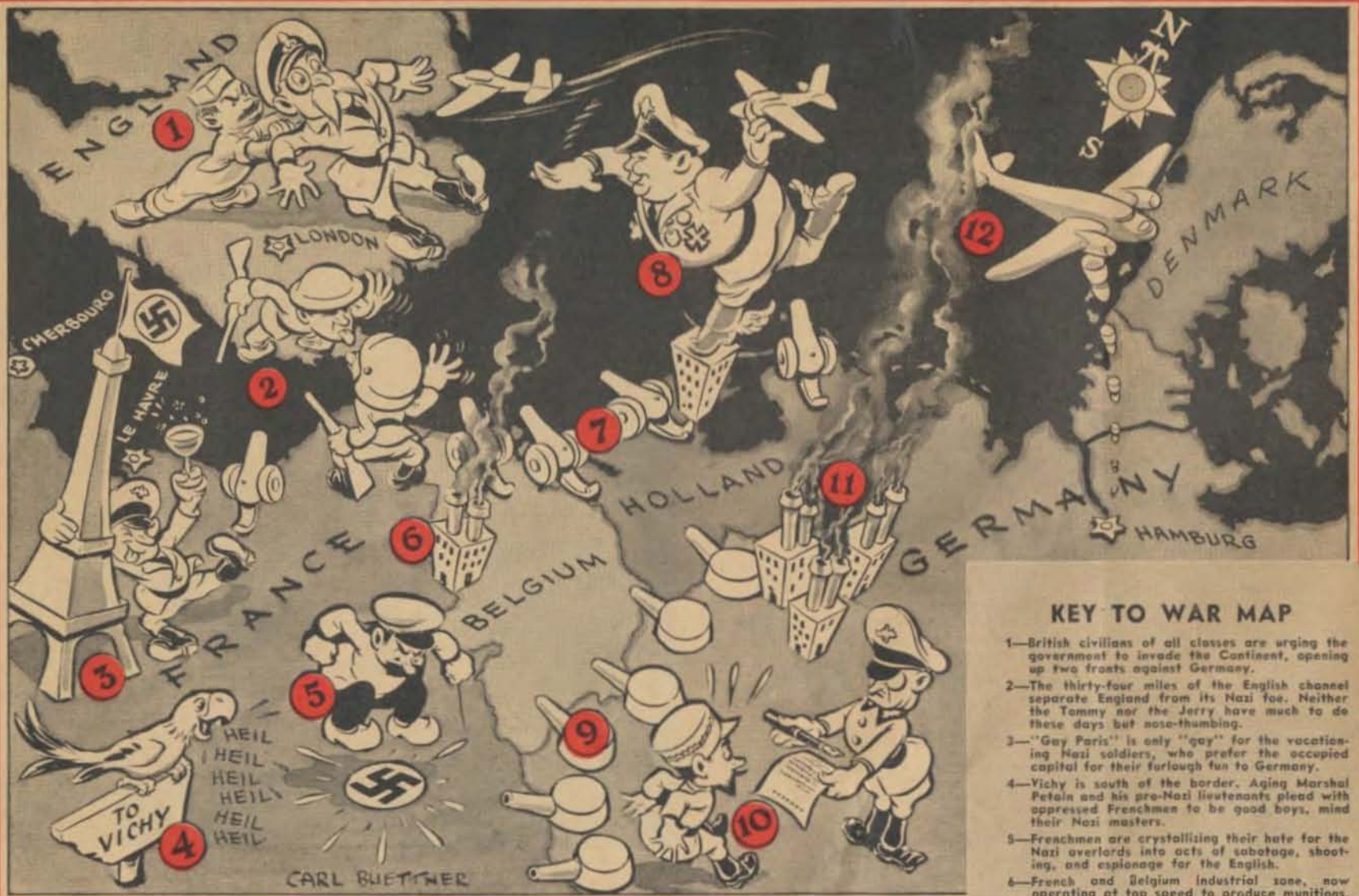

- 3—"Gay Paris" is only "gay" for the vacationing Nazi soldiers, who prefer the occupied capital for their furlough fun to Germany.
- 4—Vichy is south of the border. Ailing Marshal Petain and his pro-Nazi lieutenants plead with oppressed Frenchmen to be good boys, mind their Nazi masters.
- 5—Frenchmen are crystallizing their hate for the Nazi overlords into acts of sabotage, shooting, and espionage for the English.
- 6—French and Belgium industrial zone, now operating at top speed to produce munitions, etc., for the Nazis.
- 7—Rotterdam with its deep-water approaches to the interior is a likely invasion spot when the English decide to return to the Continent.
- 8—Reichsmarshal Hermann Goering, boss of the Luftwaffe, has headquarters for the Nazi air force in the swank Carlton Hotel in Amsterdam.
- 9—The Siegfried Line from Switzerland north. It is the most formidable line of fortifications in Europe, an effective protection to the vital Ruhr industrial basin lying behind it.
- 10—Wiesbaden, where the German-French armistice commission meets. Nazis prefer an armistice to peace because they can continue to demand and receive fresh concessions from Vichy.
- 11—The Rhineland and Ruhr industrial basin. If it can be crippled, Germany cannot win the war.
- 12—The R. A. F. continues to attack Hamburg, a vital naval and submarine base.

WHY DOESN'T ENGLAND INVADE NOW?

By **EDWIN HARTRICH**

Editor's Note: Edwin Hartrich is the only American radio reporter who has covered both sides of the European war on regular assignment. As a member of the CBS foreign staff he was a roving war correspondent, reporting the war in France, in Finland, in Holland during the blitzkrieg, and then in Germany. He has also visited the occupied countries on three different occasions.

ADOLF HITLER has sent his great war machine into the depths of Russia, seeking to deliver a knockout blow before the dark and cold winter of northern Europe immobilizes his blitzkrieg. In his bloody chase of the elusive Soviet armies he has stripped the barracks of Germany of millions of soldiers to set them fighting in Russia. His air bases in Europe no longer resound to the hum of Messerschmitts, Dorniers, Heinkels and Junker planes; now they are in the air over Moscow and the

Donets basin. The snow- and mud-covered steppes of Russia shake under the thousands of tanks and armored cars which have been rushed into battle direct from the factories in Germany, Czechoslovakia, Poland and France.

Adolf Hitler is recklessly spending his men and equipment in the furious victories thus far gained in Russia. Behind him lies a conquered Europe seething with revolt and unrest. Across the channel lies a resurgent Britain. The English have emerged from their crisis of a year ago, armed with the knowledge of how the Nazis fight, and with the men and equipment to defend themselves. The British Isles are virtually impregnable if we are to believe our own military experts who have seen the fortified "right little, tight little isle." Strong at home, the British should be ready to take the offensive. While the Russians plead for an invasion of the Continent, London hesitates. Why?

Obvious military strategy calls for a war on two fronts against Germany—something which the Nazi generals

fear more than anything else. Why doesn't England invade now?

From the North Cape above the arctic circle to Hendaye on the French-Spanish border stretches a line of heavy fortifications. Thousands of French, Dutch, Belgian and Norwegian guns, now manned by German soldiers, are pointed toward the British Isles. I have seen the great chain of steel and concrete pill-boxes which the Nazis have constructed to defend the occupied coasts, extending miles inland at vulnerable points. Behind the fortified zone are the numerous camouflaged air bases from which the Luftwaffe may bomb any invasion force. The harbors of Brest, Cherbourg, Le Havre, Boulogne, Antwerp, Rotterdam, Den Helder, Trondheim and Narvik conceal hundreds of "schnellboote" (fast motor torpedo-boats) and flotillas of "baby submarines." Working with the Luftwaffe, these craft could work with a deadly effectiveness at short range.

To transport an invasion force to the Continent would require hundreds

If Russia should capitulate, would England sue for peace?

ANSWER:

I wouldn't bet my money that the British would have much enthusiasm to keep up the fight for "dear old democracy," provided that America had not entered the war. However, if the United States comes down from the grandstand into the arena, we would force the British to keep on fighting. If we don't enter the war, the British have what they consider an air-tight alibi for a "negotiated peace" with Hitler—America failed to provide the sinews of war to defeat the Axis. By "sinews" Britain means more than planes and tubs of butter—she means our Navy and Army.

of ships. The British have them, but most of their shipping is busy carrying lend-lease supplies and munitions from America to British ports. If an invasion of the British Isles is almost an impossibility, or so costly that it is hardly worth the price—the same can be said for an invasion of the Continent. However, the Germans are handicapped because they have thousands of miles of coast to watch, while the British have only hundreds of miles of coast to watch.

An expeditionary force, to be successful, must be prepared to fight its way into Germany to win its final victory on the soil of Hitler's Third Reich.

The Nazi armies may fail to conquer Russia. But to expect the Hitler regime to collapse as a result is a

sheer flight of wishful thinking. That is one of the lessons the Allies have learned from World War I. The Nazi bible, "Mein Kampf," preaches what every German wants to believe, that the Kaiser's armies were not defeated on the field; Germany, it says, lost the war because of traitors and weaklings on the home front. In proof, Hitler points out that Germany was not invaded. So, only when enemy troops in World War II are actually fighting in "der Vaterland" will the Germans realize they have lost all chances of victory as promised them by one A. Hitler.

IF THE British and their allies can breach the coastal defenses and fight their way through the occupied countries to the German border, they still have a major obstacle to hurdle. Remember the "Siegfried Line"? The English once were "going to hang their washing" on it. They will have to do just that if they want to win

this war decisively. The vital Ruhr basin, center of Germany's heavy industry, lies behind those fortifications, 250 miles as the crow flies from England.

The answer to the question "Why doesn't England invade now?" was given to us in America several months ago.

General Sir Archibald Wavell and his successor as commander of the British Near East armies, General Auchinleck, who are responsible for winning the war and not for its propaganda, gave us the clew to this question. In embarrassingly frank interviews they said in effect that the British expected and would need another American Expeditionary Force to help them defeat Hitler's armies in the Old World. The British could not defeat Germany alone. They could not plan an invasion unless they had America as a working partner.

Winston Churchill had said that the English only needed American sup-

plies, not its man power. But that was a propaganda political speech in the House of Commons. Now he has privately applied to join "The Word Eaters' Club."

THE British army still smarts from the evacuations from Namsos, Andalsnes, Dunkirk, Greece and Crete. The initials B. E. F. were parodied from "British Expeditionary Force" to "Back Every Fortnight."

When the United States is IN the war, when our troops are ready and available to fight in Europe, then we will see an all-out attempt to defeat Hitler on his home grounds. Until that time, Josef Stalin will have to carry the ball all by himself.

Next week Mr. Hartrich will discuss "How Germany Can Be Invaded" as a sequel to his subject of this issue. In it the two-front war correspondent will expose the soft spot that Hitler's generals most fear.

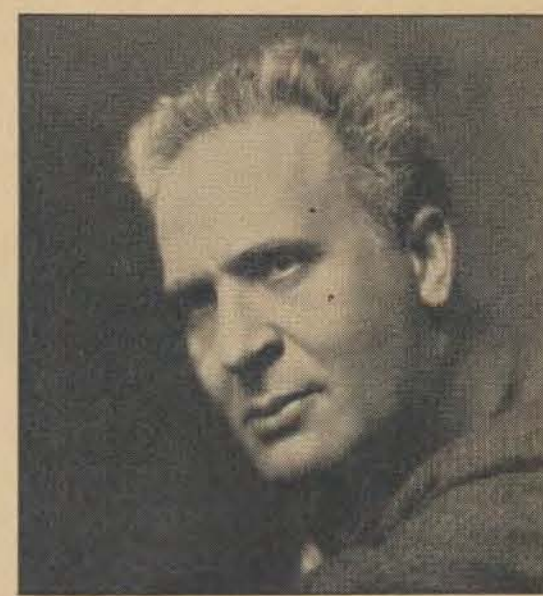

Peace in Music War

NEW YORK.—Music from the extensive catalog of the American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers became available October 30 for broadcasting over networks of the Columbia Broadcasting System and the National Broadcasting Company for the first time since midnight of December 31, 1940. Return of ASCAP music to these networks was permitted by terms of voluminous papers signed by executives of the networks and Gene Buck, president of ASCAP, the afternoon of October 29 in the board room at ASCAP's headquarters in New York City.

Contracts for both networks are identical and provide that they shall pay ASCAP two and three-quarters percent of net receipts and that their managed and operated stations shall pay two and one-quarter percent of their receipts.

Provisions of the new contracts result in a victory by the broadcasting

chains over ASCAP, as ASCAP originally demanded seven and one-half percent of network income for commercial programs.

During the long period when ASCAP music was off the air the National Association of Broadcasters established its own music-publishing house, Broadcast Music, Incorporated. This organization will continue to function, but now in competition with the many publishing houses that are members of the Society.

The Mutual Broadcasting System, which had come to a separate agreement with ASCAP several months ago, may, if it wishes, receive the same terms as those provided in the new contracts. These contracts are effective through December 31, 1949, and are renewable for another nine years.

GENERAL

Fighting Over Fun

HOLLYWOOD.—Veteran comedy ace Bob Hope and new comedy threat

Red Skelton are battling over the services of a gag-writer. Hope maintains that Jack Douglas is under contract to write exclusively for him, seeks to prevent Skelton's use of Douglas' material. Douglas asserts that he advised Hope he was leaving last September 30. The question as to which comedian is entitled to the writer's services was scheduled to be settled November 24.

Stratosphere Broadcast

CHICAGO.—When Arthur H. Starnes made his world-record delayed parachute-jump of more than 30,000 feet October 24, station WLS was in constant touch with him in the plane up to the moment he leaped and called "All clear!" The station also picked up and broadcast Starnes' heartbeats as he plummeted almost six miles downward before opening his parachute for the last 1,500 feet. The WLS mobile unit was the first car to reach the spot where the parachutist landed. And during the eighty-five-miles-an-hour ride announcer Jack Stillwill kept up a running commentary on the leap. Starnes' only injury was a bruised lip, bitten when his chute opened with a sudden jerk.

AFRA Antics

CHICAGO.—The AFRA Antics, annual event of the American Federation of Radio Artists in Chicago for the benefit of the organization's charity fund, is scheduled this year for November 7 at the Grand Ballroom of the Sherman Hotel. At this gay party radio personalities act as hosts to the public, and most of the city's radio people attend. This year there will be a mammoth floor show headed by Zorina, the dancing sensation of the screen; Joe Lewis, one of the country's top night-club comedians; magician Harry Blackstone; songstress Marian Mann, the Vagabonds quartet and other radio entertainers; and numerous actors and actresses from Chicago

legitimate-theater shows. There will also be dancing to the music of Bob Strong's orchestra.

Stokowski—Cash Customers

NEW YORK.—Because of an unusually large public demand for tickets to the NBC Symphony Orchestra's concerts, a policy of paid admission has been temporarily adopted. The policy holds during the series being conducted by Leopold Stokowski. The great demand for tickets for the Stokowski concerts caused NBC to move the performance to the Cosmopolitan Opera House, seating over three thousand. It was to pay for renting this auditorium that the admission charge was adopted.

Windsors Watch Cantor

NEW YORK.—Unexpected visitors to the repeat broadcast of Eddie Cantor's "Time to Smile" program recently were the Duke and Duchess of Windsor. The audience upon spotting them was demonstrative. Cantor rushed out and cried, "Stop! I'm the chief here. Don't you know me? I'm the Duke of the Bronx!" Then he went to the booth and exchanged compliments with the British royal couple. Said comedian Eddie, "Anything I do now is an anticlimax." Said Duke Eddie and his wife Wally, "We'll never be as popular as you." And they proved they meant it by laughing as hard as anyone in the studio.

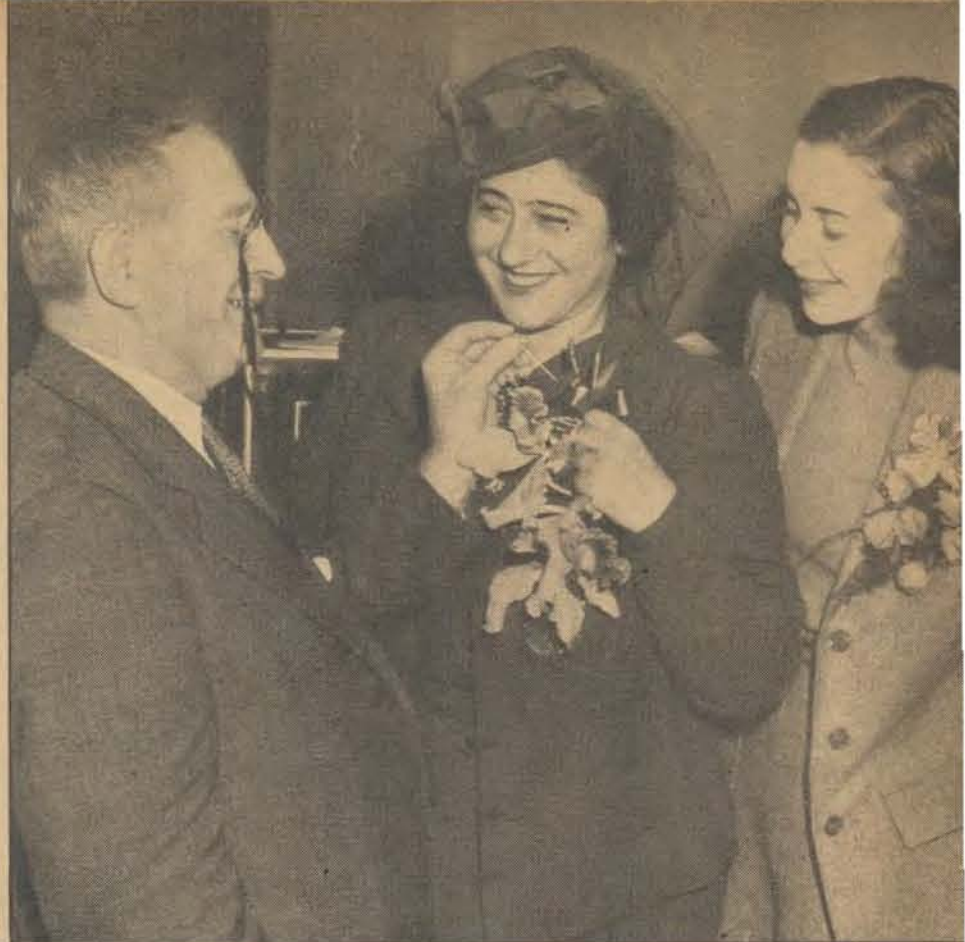

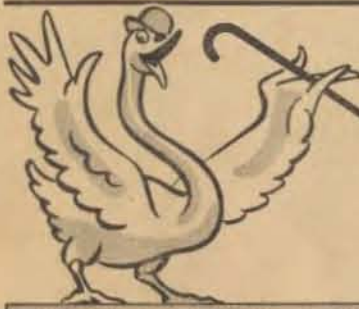

Latins Hear "March of Time"

Moscow Station Vanished?

There are numerous short-wave stations in China. There are large stations and small stations; stations operated by Chinese, Japanese, French, Italian, German, British and even American interests. There is only one official broadcasting station. This is international station XGOY-XGOX, "The Voice of China," located in bomb-riddled Chungking, West China. Although its equipment has reportedly been damaged several times during air raids, this station has never been forced completely off the air and despite tremendous odds it maintains the following extensive schedule of transmissions each day (EST):

- 5:00 to 5:55 a.m.—To Asia on 11.90 megs (English news at 5:15 a.m.)
- 6:00 to 6:45 a.m.—To Japan on 11.90 megs
- 6:45 to 7:20 a.m.—To eastern Asia on 11.90 megs
- 7:20 to 8:55 a.m.—To South Seas on 5.95 megs (English news at 7:30 a.m.)

- 9:00 to 10:25 a.m.—To North America on 9.65 megs (English news at 9:00 and 10:00 a.m.)
- 10:35 to 10:55 a.m.—To U. S. S. R. on 11.90 megs
- 3:00 to 4:00 p.m.—To South Seas on 5.95 megs
- 4:05 to 5:00 p.m.—To Europe on 11.90 megs (English news at 4:30 p.m.)

The following items are featured in the Chungking transmission to North America: 9:00 a.m., English news; 9:15 a.m., music; 9:30 a.m., talk in English; 9:45 a.m., Cantonese news; 10:00 a.m., English news; 10:25 a.m. EST, national anthem and sign-off.

The most powerful of the independent short-wave stations in China is a newcomer, XGDN (11.93), "The Voice of Democracy," whose transmitter is located atop the North China Daily News Building in Shanghai. This station—extremely pro-democracy in sympathy—is supported by voluntary subscriptions from Britishers in Shanghai. XGDN is a welcome reply to the German Club-owned short-wave station XGRS and the Italian-supported station XIRS, both in Shanghai. XGDN operates daily from 3:30 to 10:00 a.m. EST. The BBC's English news bulletin is rebroadcast at 6:00 a.m. EST. Popular David Conway reads additional English news bulletins at 7:00, 9:00 and 9:40 a.m. EST. XGDN is heard with loud signals in western United States and with fair regularity throughout the rest of the country.

"Radio Maroc"

Letters from North Africa have been received only at very infrequent intervals since the beginning of the war. This week I received a communication from L'Inspecteur Princel-

pal Charge de l'Exploitation de la Radio-Diffusion, Rabat, Morocco, which includes interesting details concerning international station "Radio Maroc." This station consists of two transmitters—each powered with from 15,000 to 25,000 watts—which transmit on 8.03 and 11.94 megs, respectively. The two transmitters can be used either simultaneously or separately. At the present time only the 8.03 megs frequency is being heard in the United States. The studios, transmitters and aerial towers of "Radio Maroc" are situated in an unbelievably green and beautiful tropical oasis, the dazzling white stucco buildings showing up vividly above the small palms and ornamental hedges, the whole plot surrounded by the barren, shifting sands of the desert. "Radio Maroc" (8.03) operates at present from 2:15 to 2:45 a.m.; from 7:00 to 8:00 a.m.; from 9:00 to 10:00 a.m.; from 12:30 to 4:30 p.m. and from 6:30 to 7:00 p.m. EST. French, Spanish and Arabic are the three languages normally employed over the station, although an English transmission is made on Mondays, Wednesdays and Saturdays from 1:00 to 1:30 p.m. EST. News in French is broadcast daily at 2:30 a.m., 7:30 a.m., 1:30 p.m. and 3:00 p.m., with the official communique broadcast at 6:30 p.m. EST.

The other important station in North Africa, namely, TPZ (12.12), Alger, Algeria, continues to be heard daily from 1:30 to 6:00 p.m. EST, with the best reception afforded during the latter two hours of the broadcast.

New CBS Latin-American Network Nearing Readiness

CBS' new inter-American network will be functioning by the first of the year, according to Edmund A. Chester, CBS director of short-wave broadcasting and Latin-American relations. Affiliation contracts have been successfully negotiated with seventy-two stations to date and deals with additional stations below the U. S. borders are now under way. Construction has already passed the eighty-five percent mark on the two 50,000-watt transmitters CBS is building for its Latin-American network. The two new transmitters—WCBX and WCRC—are located on a big tract at Brentwood, Long Island. Their eight directional antennae are designed exclusively for transmissions south of the United States.

Program Particulars

One of the most popular factual broadcasts on the air, "The March of Time," is now being transcribed and rebroadcast to Latin America succeeding Saturdays at 6:30 p.m. EST over WGEO (9.53), Schenectady, New York, and at 8:00 p.m. EST over KGEI (15.33), San Francisco, Calif. . . . On the second Saturday of each month at 10:00 p.m. EST (the next will be Saturday, November 8), HCJB (12.455), Quito, Ecuador, broadcasts a very interesting English program entitled "Off the Record" . . . Cuban station COK's (11.616) weekly good-

will program in English, broadcast on Saturdays at 10:00 p.m. EST, is dedicated on November 8 to the Grand National Shortwave Listeners Club of Cincinnati, Ohio . . . The United States is not the only country in which football is popular. Listen to Guatemala City's play-by-play description of the game as played in the Estadio Escolar, Sunday, November 9, at 4:15 p.m. EST over TGWA (15.17).

General Notes

"What has become of RV96 (15.18), Moscow?" This station, which up to about the middle of October furnished the best Soviet reception in North America, seems to have vanished. Fair English reception from Moscow is still afforded United States listeners from 6:00 to 7:55 and from 9:30 to 9:55 p.m. EST on 15.11 and 15.23 megs. The only catch here is that the 19-meter band is usually dead at this time of day. If any of our readers are hearing English transmissions from Moscow, kindly drop a line at once to the writer of this department stating times and frequencies. This is urgent! . . . From our correspondent in Zurich, Switzerland, comes word that Deutscher Kurzwellen-Sender ATHEN (7.09) is broadcasting from Greece daily from 2:00 to 4:00 p.m. EST—and so another once free voice has been added to the Nazi propaganda network. Our correspondent also informs us that "Radio Mediterania" (7.037), located at Valencia, Spain, is being heard near 2:40 p.m. EST.

HELEN HAYES' FANTASTIC LOVE-STORY

Her marriage to madcap MacArthur reads like fiction — but it's fact!

WHEN playwright Charles MacArthur and actress Helen Hayes were married, he promised her, "No matter what happens, dear, you will never be bored." And she never has been, according to her own admission.

"It has been glorious," says Miss Hayes. "Of course, I probably shall kill Charlie ultimately. I don't see how it can end any other way. Imagine being married to a man who has never, never bored you!"

A husband's pledge that his wife would never be bored and the wife's avowal that she never has been—that should be enough to stamp a marriage as one of the most fantastic of love-stories. So truth is stranger than fiction—even for a man who writes fiction and a woman who interprets it in action.

This story begins the day the distinguished stage and radio actress accepted an invitation to attend a party

The remark so pleased the actress that when the party broke up she allowed the peanut-eating man to take her home. He was Charles MacArthur, who was later, in collaboration with Ben Hecht, to write "Front Page" for far more than "peanuts," because it was one of the most successful of all plays about the newspaper profession.

Two days after the meeting at the party, a knock sounded on the door of Miss Hayes' dressing-room at the theater where she was working. It was MacArthur. As he walked in, he casually asked, "Did I by any chance ask you to marry me the other afternoon?"

"Of course not!" Helen gasped. "Why?"

"Oh, I just wondered," he shrugged.

That incident is typical of Charlie MacArthur. It is his penchant for devilishness that makes the Hayes-MacArthur love-story sound so utterly fantastic. Try to envision, if you can, two people in love—one a quiet, serious, hard-working little actress; the other a hulk of a man, dynamic, erratic, a prankster extraordinary. Most people—and perhaps one school of psychologists—would say that they are totally unsuited to one another. Yet, after thirteen years of married life, Helen and Charlie are still much in love, still getting along well, still not bored.

SO WHO is this man who has so continuously held the interest of America's long-leading actress? Everybody knows he's a prominent writer of plays, films and fiction, especially in partnership with Ben Hecht. Not so many, perhaps, know he is the same MacArthur who on dull evenings in Hollywood used to throw empty bottles at the houses of friends; who once knocked out his managing editor on a newspaper staff because he forbade Charlie to keep a bicycle in the local room; who chased dignified Charles Evans Hughes, then Secretary of State, down Fifth Avenue, yelling as he ran, "Yah, yah, Secretary of State! What are you doing here if you're Secretary of State? Yah, yah, Secretary of State!"

During his newspaper days in Chicago, Charlie was known as "Bugs" MacArthur, for the main and simple reason that quite a few people considered him slightly balmy. His passion for playing practical jokes had a lot to do with that impression.

given by Neysa McMein, the noted illustrator. Entering the living-room of Miss McMein's apartment, Helen stopped short and gulped at the sight that met her eyes. A man was sitting cross-legged on the floor eating peanuts! The spectacle intrigued her after she recovered from the momentary shock. She promptly went over to him and asked what he was eating.

"Peanuts," he said, offering her some, "but I wish they were emeralds."

were married in the fall of 1928, after an engagement which lasted over a year. Miss Hayes was appearing at the time in a play called "Coquette," and MacArthur's play, "Front Page," had been open two weeks.

Much has happened to complicate Helen Hayes' life since that memorable afternoon. She has carried on her dramatic career and soared to heights achieved by few American actresses. In addition, she has had one child of her own and adopted another. Yet she has also found the time and understanding to love and retain the love of a husband whose talent for writing is outweighed, perhaps, only by his knack for doing the bizarre and remarkable.

She has had a full-size job for a woman.

THERE was the time Charlie bought her a gift when she was in the hospital awaiting the birth of Mary, the famous "Act of God" baby. "Darling," he told her in a hushed voice, "I've got the most wonderful present at home for you and the baby. Wait until you see it!" When mother and baby came home, Helen walked into the green-and-peach nursery, and there in the middle of the floor was the present—a huge billiard table! If the actress had been less in love with her husband—or a much stronger woman—she might have tossed it out. As it was, it remained. When Charlie and his friends played billiards, the baby slept in another room.

Only a woman who loved a man deeply could remain calm in the face of such repeated eccentricities. Charlie in turn is sincerely devoted to his wife, but he just can't resist doing such things as pasting flies on the doors. Imagine that! The couple were having the finishing touches put on the beautiful Victorian home they built in Nyack, N. Y. The decorator had just finished doing the living-room doors in egg-shell white. Shortly afterward Helen came along and discovered Charlie trimming the doors with decalcomania flies.

"I don't think these doors look natural without a few flies hanging about," he said nonchalantly.

Then there was the time that MacArthur and co-writer Ben Hecht, who is also co-prankster, decided the best way to keep cool on a hot day was to remain on the bottom of a pool near the MacArthur place. And no sooner did they get the idea than they bought a diving-suit and a pump to go with it. Putting on the helmet, Charlie dived to the bottom of the pool. While down there, he amused himself and visitors sitting around the swimming-pool by sending them messages with gurgling noises.

FINALLY tiring of the sport, he came up. He immediately began regaling his wife with the rapturous, luxurious thrill of the experience. "Please try it, darling," he pleaded.

Helen didn't want to go down in the infernal contraption, but she was game, and besides she had learned that she might as well give in and get it over with when Charlie got an idea like that in his head. So she went down in the pool.

"What a horrible experience!" she exclaims about it. "The air was simply foul with heat. Now I know Charlie's crazy!"

Yes, indeed—truth is stranger than fiction! At least, it is in the love-story of actress Hayes and playwright MacArthur. Stranger, yes. But the true story is also as happy as any story that he could write or she could act out.

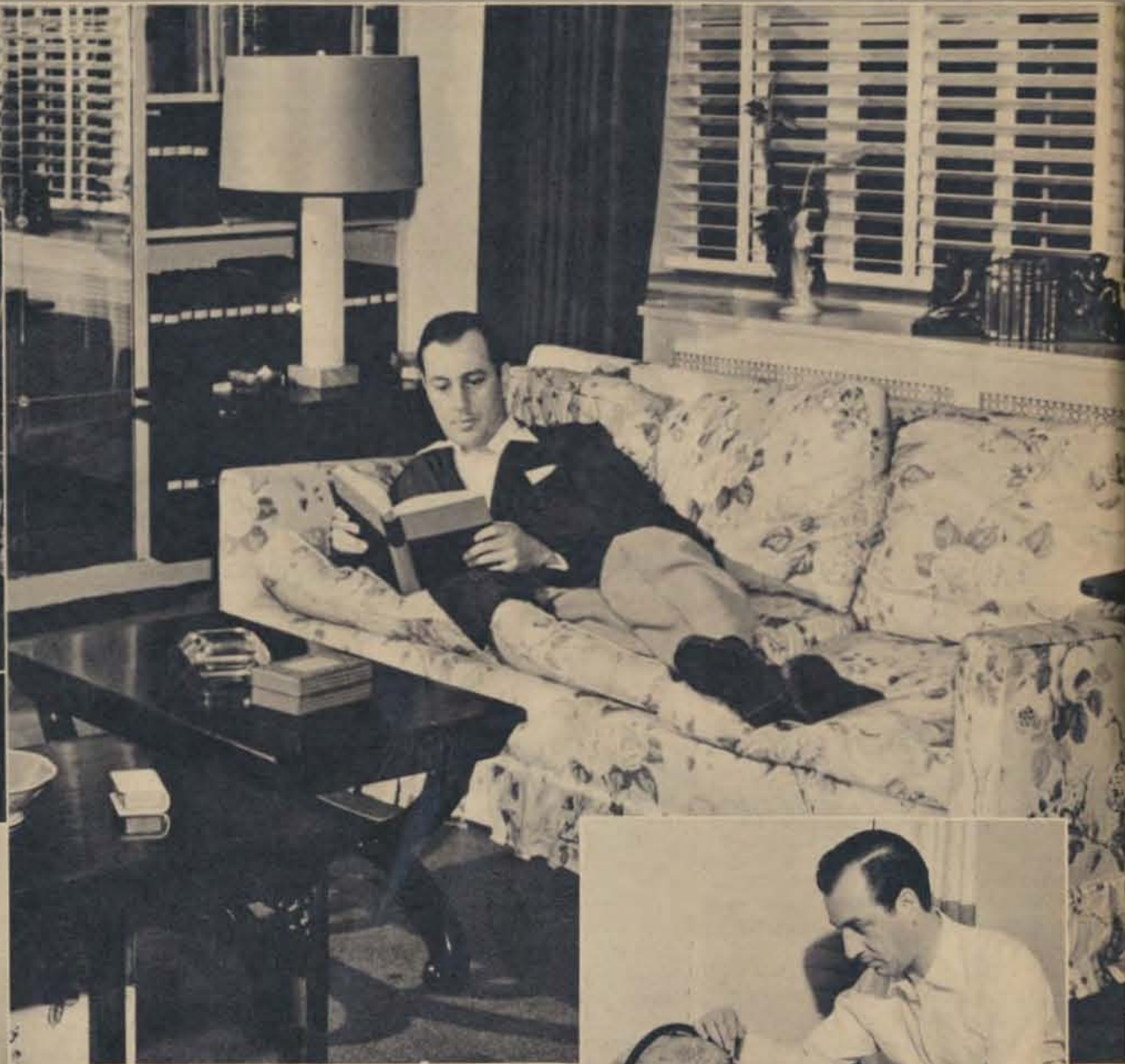

ONE of the curiosities of the theater world is the fact that no matter how topnotch a play may appear to theater audiences in Boston, Philadelphia or Atlantic City, the producers are not certain they have a hit until it has passed in review before New York theater-goers. However, this rule works in reverse when it comes to determining the relative merits of certain popular songs.
