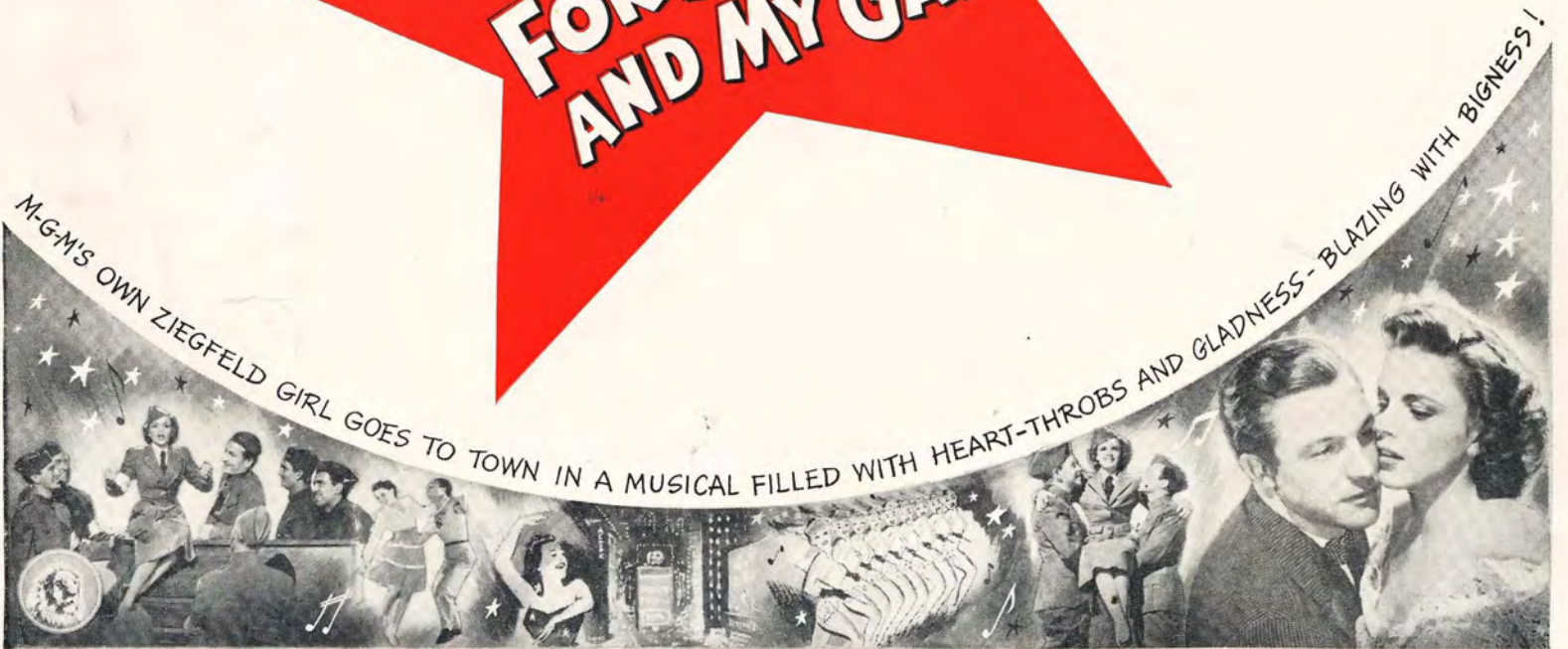

## Let's Tear the Trio to Bits!

HOLLYWOOD always can be depended on to turn out unique ideas, even when it comes to getting funds for relief. Poster which forms the background for picture (left) is one of them. It was put up in Paramount Studios for the Dutch-Chinese-Russian Navy Relief. Made in the form of a big jig-saw puzzle, it was torn apart by groups of studio employes instead of being put together. For each \$1,250 contributed, a group was allowed to take off part of the puzzle, until the trio was completely dismembered. All studio folk contributed heavily to the idea, and it didn't take long before Hitler, Hirohito and Mussolini were in bits. Comparatively simple to carry out, it's an idea that might be used to advantage in many organizations to stimulate the sale of bonds and stamps as well as giving relief to our allies. It's one way in which small sums from members of large groups can be made to grow into a substantial amount. It serves also as a grim reminder that this is a war for the survival of the fittest, a war of all the people whether they travel the high road or the low road in this world conflict for freedom!

## The Clean Plate

GEORGE MARDIKIAN, proprietor-chef of the Omar Khayyam restaurant in San Francisco and official NBC chef in the Golden Gate city, has originated an "Eat to Save" campaign among his patrons that can be followed by everyone in so far as leaving a clean plate after a meal is concerned. But George has gone a step further. Each patron who eats everything he orders gets a ten percent discount on his check, paid in war stamps. As a practical example, here's how the idea works: Every week George buys 2,500 pounds of lamb. If his stamp idea saves ten percent of that meat, it makes 250 pounds of lamb available for other essential uses. Multiply that saving by what could be accomplished if all restaurants adopted the "clean plate" plan, and the amount is prodigious, and one answer to present rationing problems. —The Editors.

as authentic as possible. Some of the aerial shorts in the picture are direct from the China News Service. Other scenes were filmed under the strict supervision of the U. S. Government. Curtiss test pilots went aloft for maneuvers, to show some of the precision-flight formations for which Chennault's men were famous. Translated, the Chinese symbols seen on the backs of the "Tigers" in the picture read, in Gen. Chiang Kai-Shek's own wording, "This American has come to the aid of the Chinese. He should be respected by all, and by all persons of military rank." The Flying Tigers disbanded on July 4 and enlisted in the U. S. Army; but this Republic picture records their heroic deeds for posterity!

REPUBLIC PICTURES approached the making of "The Flying Tigers" with full appreciation of the tremendous hold General Chennault and his men had upon American public opinion. They spared no effort to make it

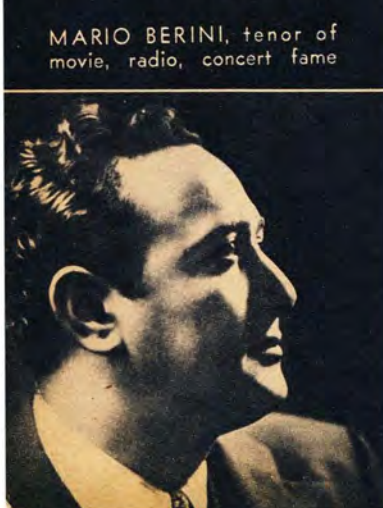

ASK Jean Holloway to tell you something about herself and she says with a twinkle, "I'm single, normal, and ambitious. My mother was a dancer on the stage, and I have a wonderful great-grandmother, now eighty-six. When she was five, Great-Grandma stuck her tongue out at Abraham Lincoln, which she always has regretted. I have a dog named Grapenuts, and I'm about to acquire another named Rinso (no doubt in honor of her sponsors); but I would draw the line at Sal Hepatica." Here's what we discovered on our own about this San Francisco-born lass: At twenty she sold her first radio story to Kate Smith. Until last June, she was the scripser mainstay of Kate's activities. Jean wrote all her speeches, song lead-ins and dramatics. Her recent Red Cross and defense play, starring La Smith, was considered outstanding. In addition there has been a free-verse drama

about Davy Crockett for Walter Huston, shows for Charles Boyer, Orson Welles, Gertrude Lawrence, to mention a few of the more than two hundred top stars of stage, screen and radio for whom Jean has written.

# CBS STAGE DOOR CANTEEN

A Precedent-Setting War-Time Radio Program Designed to Serve Thousands of Men in Uniform

NEW YORK'S Stage Door Canteen runs on air. That is, it is very largely supported by the money it receives from the sponsor of its by-product radio show.

The Canteen was launched by the American Theater Wing to provide hospitality and entertainment for ser-

vicemen of all the United Nations. Stars of the entertainment world pitched in with money, time and talent. But the undertaking was large and needed more money to improve and extend its service.

Stage star Helen Menken conceived the idea of building a radio program

around the canteen. She had plenty of talent to draw on, and she soon found a sponsor. Corn Products Refining Company agreed to back the program to the tune of \$2,500 a week, payable to the Canteen for use in its work for the fighting men. Since then the sponsor has voluntarily increased its pay-

ments to support the ever-increasing work of the Stage Door Canteen. Originally planned by the Theater Wing to accommodate five hundred servicemen a week, the Canteen now serves thousands of America's and the United Nations' fighting men. The broadcast may be heard on CBS Thursday nights.

#### "I Married a Witch"

## CHICAGO

Chicago radio takes its tone from the town. It's a driving, sleeves-rolled-up business. Most of its performers get little fame—but their work pays a large share of radio's bills.

To prove my point, let me present Hugh Studebaker. Hugh's big-time on our radio row. The square-jawed actor has an enthusiastic audience of millions, most of whom don't know his name.

Hugh outlined his schedule for me, and it is an impressive one. His lead part of Doctor Bob on "Bachelor's Children," his character roles of Ikky Mudd and Peter on "Captain Midnight" and "Guiding Light," respectively, his Father Brewster on "That Brewster Boy" and sundry roles on "First Line" and "Author's Playhouse" keep him busy.

"Take Thursday, for example," Hugh said. "Rehearsal for 'Bachelor's Children' starts at 8:45 a.m. That's plenty early for a man who likes to sleep late. The broadcast ends at 10:00, and I head for home, a bath, and a heavy breakfast. From 12:30 to 1:45 I'm working 'Guiding Light,' and at 2:30 I do a 'Bachelor's Children' repeat. In short order I switch to 'Captain Midnight.' I leave a couple of minutes early, duck out to my car, and my wife drives me across to CBS to arrive at 'Brewster Boy' rehearsal a couple of minutes late. Then I tear back to 'Captain Midnight' repeat. From there I'm rushed to a 'First Line' rehearsal and broadcast, ending at 9:30 p.m. That day I have to carry my supper. I'm probably the only actor in town who totes a lunch-basket, and I eat during rehearsals."

Hugh paused at this point. "Look," he said. "Don't play me up as a big I-am man. I'm just a guy doing a job and trying to get along. I wish you'd stress the job Chicago radio people are doing for the war effort. We perform at bond rallies, serve coffee at canteens and servicemen's centers."

Along about then I asked the interviewer's inevitable question, "What was your biggest moment in your fifteen years of radio work?" The Hoosier-born actor answered:

"It was several years ago on a Christmas Eve. I was on my way to a broadcast of Dickens' 'Christmas Carol' at WGN. Across the street I saw an old car pull up. Out of it, into the fluffy snow, came Mme. Schumann-Heink, the great singer, with her son. We were great friends. She called me 'Irish,' because I reminded her of someone who had been dear to her. On this Christmas Eve she saw that I was gloomy, and she asked why. I told her it was because I wasn't going to get home to see my mother for Christmas. She threw her arms around me and said, 'Irish, you come with us. I will be your mother this Christmas!'"

I'd like to conclude with a thumb-nail sketch. Hugh's a well-built man, square, stocky, a bit under six feet. His face is square, too, but it isn't stolid. It's a little taut, a little weary. There's still a suggestion of the nervous tension that forced him into an extended rest a year or so ago. But back of the face there's a sense of strength, assurance, drive—ambition modified by experience and success. His voice is an actor's voice, fluid and colored still by a Hoosier accent.

# RODZINSKI OFFERS ALL-TSCHAIKOWSKY PROGRAM SATURDAY, CBS

Casadesus Guest of Philharmonic-Symphony; "Keyboard Concerts" Presents Hilda Banks; Tossy Spivakowsky Guest of Cleveland Orchestra

THE all-Tschaikowsky program promised by Artur Rodzinski and the Cleveland Orchestra (CBS) for the fourteenth contains two items that have interesting histories. They are the Violin Concerto and the Overture-Fantasy "Romeo and Juliet." For the record, the concerto will have Tossy Spivakowsky as soloist, so let's take that up.

As seems to have happened often in the case of violin concertos, this work had to run a gantlet of savage criticism before it was premiered. Not only Tschaikowsky's opponents—and he had many of them—but his friends found much fault with it. His closest admirer, Mme. Von Meck, who was the lady bountiful supreme, discovered flaws in it, and that was something unheard of, considering her adoration of everything he wrote.

But the whole thing was started by the composer himself, who took a dislike to the andante he had written. He rewrote it altogether, and his revision, no doubt, was strongly influenced by Joseph Kotek, a Russian composer and violinist who was with him a good deal.

A note from Tschaikowsky to Mme. Von Meck, which answered her own carping one to him, read, "Your frank judgment on my violin concerto pleased me very much. It would have been very disagreeable to me if you, from any fear of wounding the petty pride of a composer, had held back your opinion. However, I must defend a little the first movement of the concerto.

"Of course, it houses, as does every piece that serves virtuoso purposes, much that appeals chiefly to the mind; nevertheless, the themes are not painfully evolved; the plan of this movement sprang suddenly in my head and quickly ran into its mold. I shall not give up the hope that in time the piece will give you greater pleasure."

The next hurricane of disapproval came from Leopold Auer, then professor of violin at the Imperial Conservatory. Tschaikowsky, in the role of supplicant, had hoped that the noted violinist might agree to perform it. Auer, cursorily scanning its measures, announced that "it was impossible to play."

Be all that as it may, a violinist by the name of Adolf Brodsky, an enthusiastic champion of the piece despite some objection he found to it, finally gave it its first performance with the Vienna Philharmonic on December 4, 1881. The work was not well received. To make matters worse, everyone connected with the perform-

ance had been dead set against it.

Hans Richter, the conductor, had to be cajoled into scheduling it for his program. There was only rehearsal with orchestra and that a most unfavorable one to the Tschaikowsky music. Richter, furthermore, wanted to make some cuts, but Brodsky would have none of it. And at the performance itself the musicians, rather than "go smash," played their lines in *pianissimo*.

Brodsky's letter to Tschaikowsky relating the circumstances was guardedly worded. He did not want to hurt the composer's feelings. But the truth had been made clear to Tschaikowsky by the venomous reviews his music got from the Viennese journalistic solons.

However, there was triumph in store for the composition, for with its gradual growth into popular favor, thanks principally to Brodsky's unflinching interest in it, Auer—ironically enough—ended up by teaching it to almost all of his pupils.

## Another Concerto, Another Story

The Liszt Piano Concerto in A Major was once amusingly described by William Foster Apthorp as "a symphonic poem for piano and orchestra, with the title 'The Life and Adventures of a Melody.'" His analysis of it runs sedately enough until he reaches the point of the actual material, when he goes real plushy and figurative. "From this point onward," he says, "the concerto is one unbroken series of kaleidoscopic effects of the most brilliant and ever-changing description; of musical form, or musical co-

herence, there is less and less. It is as if some magician in some huge cave, the walls of which were covered with glistening stalactites and flashing jewels, were revealing his fill of the wonders of color, of brilliancy and dazzling light his wand could command. Never has even Liszt rioted more unreservedly in fitful orgies of flashing color. It is monstrous, formless, whimsical and fantastic, if you will; but it is also magical and gorgeous as anything in the 'Arabian Nights.' It is its very daring and audacity that save it. And ever and anon the first wailing melody, with its unearthly chromatic harmony, returns in one shape or another, as if it were the dazzled neophyte to whom the magician Liszt were showing these splendors, while initiating it into the world of magic until it, too, becomes magical and possessed of the power of working wonders by black art."

If a critic were to dish out a hot plate of the above stew these days, his job would be about as secure as that of an oysterman during the R-less months. But Apthorp, we must remember, was a great musical authority, who started an honorable tradition of program annotators. The strained elegance has gone out of critical writing, thanks be, though occasionally one of the musicological confraternity is sure to go violently rhetorical.

The Liszt Concerto in A Major will be performed by Robert Casadesus and the Philharmonic-Symphony under Howard Barlow's direction over CBS on November 15. Mr. Casadesus has his work cut out for him on that afternoon, because he is scheduled to play also the Cesar Franck Symphonic Variations—with the orchestra, of course.

These variations are symphonic, but in no mere titular sense. They are broad and important in scope. They have the big design and there is much material and much development of it, the sort of thing that goes on in symphonies.

## More Ivory

The CBS "Keyboard Concerts" comprise an attractive series of pianistic events. The quality of the playing varies from week to week depending, naturally, on the artists performing. Hilda Banks, who takes over for the afternoon of Tuesday, November 17, is a gifted player. She has elected to deliver three Chopin numbers, the "Butterfly" Etude, an Ecossais, Opus 72, and the Waltz in E Minor. Other works include the Brahms Intermezzo in A Minor, Opus 116, and his Rhapsody in B Minor, Opus 79.

## POPULAR MUSIC

AN ANALYSIS of the dance style of the Harry James orchestra reveals the rather unexpected fact that the leader's trumpet is by no means its sole pillar. The idea has gotten abroad that "James just blows and the men follow," yet nothing could be farther from the actual truth.

In the first place, even if it were strictly a one-man situation, there would be much to be thankful for, particularly since that one man is quite a musician. But, logically, because James is quite a musician he could never tolerate such a state of affairs.

All of the members of the orchestra have what might be termed key roles in the interpretation, let us say, of the latest tunes. The leader's arrangers, under his supervision, consider the orchestra first of all as being a unit, and second, as a group of units whose separate contributions must be integrated with the whole pattern of an arrangement.

True, the trumpet does take a kind of precedence. And true, also, the arrangements are built around that theory. But a solo trumpet, like a solo violin in some violin concerto, can play its virtuoso lines to the hilt, while the rest of the company indulge in a strictly patterned give-and-take. The theme, as in serious music, is handed back and forth, being given special emphasis when the soloist plays it.

There are dance orchestras, of course, featuring some special instrumentalist in what might be regarded as a "me and the music" sort of contraption. Names of such organizations need not be mentioned here, but they do exist and they are probably well known to the shrewder listeners.

Since, however, Harry James is first of all a musician, and since a musician is interested primarily in the music he is playing, it follows naturally that his orchestral arrangements should be models of construction and good taste.

Next time you hear the James boys, see if it isn't true that with them the music is the thing; that there is logic and musicianly development of ideas; that the trumpet solos are natural parts of a cohesive pattern. No performer worth his salt would want it otherwise.

All the foregoing has not been written in defense of James and his men, for they certainly are in need of no such latter-day championing. But it does give one a pain to listen to the arrant nonsense that gets around about perfectly simple matters.

# BAUKHAGE IS A VETERAN OF BERLIN AND WASHINGTON NEWS FRONTS

Blue Commentator Is Proud That He Works Directly for the Little Businessmen of Main Street; A Plea for Elmer Davis' Return to Air

## Meet Baukhage

**A** MEETING with a commentator is an event almost always packed with surprises. I always have built up a mental picture of the man from my listening contact with him—and that mental picture is almost always far out of line.

Baukhage is a case in point. I expected to see a rather lordly, very confident, almost frightening sort of individual, a sort of cross between a successful minister and a high-powered business executive, earnest but a little condescending. That was my impression before I met him. Actually, he creates an entirely different effect.

Baukhage (Hilmar Robert are his almost forgotten given names) looks like an average businessman or professional man. Physically he's unimpressive in his neat, dark suit. There's no swank about Baukhage—he seems almost shy at a first meeting. Certainly he was on guard as we talked across a luncheon table, weighing words carefully.

Baukhage is a true Illinois product, born in La Salle fifty-three years ago. He says: "My father pioneered to Grays Harbor, Washington. It was a wild and primitive country. We moved to Lockport, New York, and lived there through my impressionable high-school years. Next we moved into near-by Buffalo. I joined a stock company as an actor for two summers. Finally my father arranged for me to enter the University of Chicago.

"The university was a wonderful experience because of its cosmopolitan character. Among my classmates were Japanese, Chinese and Filipinos who later became leaders in their countries."

Baukhage worked as a technical expert for the telephone company after his college days, then went to Bonn University in Germany. Newspaper work followed, and Baukhage spent some time with the Associated Press, where he learned the hard lesson of neutrality in writing. He served with the Coast Artillery in the first World War, and covered the peace conference for the Army newspaper. He worked for Consolidated Press after the war and later for the *United States News*. He broke into radio as a commentator on "National Farm and Home Hour."

One of the highlights of Baukhage's radio career came in 1939 when he covered the German assault on Poland from his post as NBC's Berlin correspondent. In those days, when we hung over our radios far into the night, the assured, familiar words, "Baukhage talking," gave us confidence that the real news was still coming through.

Baukhage told me one very illum-

inating anecdote about a former classmate of his, Kasai, who became a member of the Japanese Diet. Kasai visited America in the fall of 1941. He looked up his "dear friend" Baukhage, embraced him affectionately, gave Mrs. Baukhage a lovely Japanese fan. He was, he told his American friends, a camera fan—does that sound familiar? His particular interest lay in photographing bridges, and Washington had "such beautiful bridges"! He snapped away to his heart's content. He and his films returned to Japan two weeks before Kurusu arrived on his "peace" mission.

Did a grateful Jap government reward Kasai for his helpful pictures of military objectives? Yes, in typical Japanese fashion. Baukhage has learned that Kasai was shot shortly after his return for being too pro-American.

Baukhage also told me this story about Kurusu. The Blue commentator visited the Jap embassy on December 6, 1941. He noted that Kurusu was wearing a tweed suit. Baukhage asked, "Does that mean that your excellency expects to spend the winter in Washington?" Kurusu nodded and replied, "I hope so."

Baukhage said that he is convinced Kurusu did not know that war was to be declared. Other people in the embassy apparently did. It was a Saturday afternoon, and embassy employes usually do not work at such a time. On this day, however, Baukhage saw plenty of activity. Clerks were sorting papers—papers that would make a bonfire the next day.

Some commentators feel—or pretend to feel—that they are too concerned with world affairs to worry much about their business arrangements with the radio industry. Not Baukhage. He expressed genuine pleasure with the commercial set-up of his program—a participating sponsorship in which local advertisers insert their own commercial plugs during pauses in the talks (where no

sponsor buys the time, Government announcements replace the plugs). The commentator said, "I like to feel that I'm working for the little businessmen in scores of communities. I like to feel that my broadcasts have an important place on the nation's Main Streets."

I asked Baukhage, at the end of our talk, if he wanted to express any general opinion on the present situation. He declined, saying that his listeners already knew his views. He did, however, give me this statement on the problems of news analysts in war and on the question of censorship:

"War creates no essentially new problems. The stories are much more important, just as a story of a burning skyscraper is bigger than the story of a burning barn. But the basic approach is the same . . . The most powerful censorship in the world is that of the listener who turns his dial when he hears anything he doesn't want to hear. Official censorship does not seem to me to be too strong. In individual cases I have felt that news was held up too long, but I cannot be certain, since I do not know how much the enemy had learned before the news was released."

## We Want Elmer Davis!

There's been a lot of talk about Elmer Davis returning to the air shortly. The story is that he may come back as an official Government spokesman over all major networks. At this writing the rumor has not been confirmed.

I want to put in a strong word of approval for the idea. When Davis was a CBS commentator—before the Government wisely drafted him for the job of head of the Office of War Information—he was one of the most thoroughly satisfactory news analysts in this country. Dry and unexcited, American in his viewpoint and his accent, Davis gave us news and opinion in which we could have real faith. His was no tricky style of delivery, no shallow sensationalism, no mawkish sentimentality.

Maybe I'm all wrong, but I'd rather have the Government tell me what it wants done through the clipped phrases of Elmer Davis than through all the superdramatic ballyhoo that now accompanies many such announcements. If you agree with me, write me about it. I'd like to send Davis a pile of letters from typical listeners urging him to steal enough time from his other duties to get back on the air and tell us what is what.

# AMERICANS IN SHANGHAI LISTEN TO JAP-BANNED KGEI NEWSCASTS

European Transmissions to Be on Lower Frequencies This Winter;  
Jap-Captured 100,000-Watt Transmitter Begins Operation in Malaya

## Report on Listening in Shanghai

**A** VIVID account of how Americans in Japanese-controlled Shanghai heard news of the Battle of Midway from KGEI, in San Francisco, has been received from Hal P. Mills, a former Shanghai newspaper publisher.

"Fix this scene in your mind," wrote Mr. Mills, who returned to the United States recently on an exchange liner. "Night in Shanghai—Jap-controlled Shanghai. A thin wafer of a moon rides high.

"Dour Jap sentries pace the streets, rifles and bayonets ready. Here and there ominous machine-guns are in evidence. Frightened Chinese slink through the streets.

"The Nips are in control. Alert. Cruel. The papers publish only the propaganda of the Japs. Few persons know what is going on. They know of alleged Jap victories . . .

"The time is 10:40 p.m. (Shanghai time).

"Into a modest structure hard by Bubbling Well Road, slinks an American. Then another and another. Presently five or more are gathered in a stuffy attic room. All lights are out. The eery silence is broken by a calm, welcome voice from distant San Francisco.

"Station KGEI is on the air!

"Intently the furtive Americans listen, for that voice from San Francisco comes as a shining, blessed oasis of truth and cheer in a dreary desert of Nazi lies and propaganda.

"The listening Americans are suddenly electrified, for over the air comes the wonderful news of Midway.

"Thank God for KGEI, murmurs an American voice. Perhaps there is a catch in his throat. Perhaps his eyes are strangely blurred. Who will censure him? Five patriotic Americans in enemy country.

"Someone produces a bottle. The five grip hands and drink to the United States of America and KGEI.

"Sir, I was one of those five. I am one who was a newspaper publisher in Shanghai, one who was on the Wang Ching-wei death-list, whose newspaper was thrice bombed, and who was thrown into a Jap torture cage for sixty-five days.

"I am one who was commissioned to bring back to you our deepest thanks and appreciation for your life-giving broadcasts to the Far East. I sailed from Shanghai aboard the exchange liner and arrived in New York August 25. Since that time I have been broadcasting for WLW, Cincinnati, and also doing some writing.

"Few Americans in Shanghai dare to listen in, but those who do dare promptly whisper to other Americans of the text of your broadcasts. They are inspiring.

"Fully three hundred Americans,

prior to my departure from Shanghai, asked me, if possible, to call at KGEI and broadcast a few words of cheer. I do not know if that would be in order. However, I plan to soon visit the West Coast and meet the boys of your station."

## Longer Short Waves This Winter

Listeners have probably noted that the 19-, 25- and even 31-meter bands are going dead early these evenings—at least as far as reception from Europe is concerned. This is not only the usual characteristics of winter reception setting in but a more marked change brought about by our present position in the eleven-year cycle. Each winter for five or six successive years lower and lower short-wave frequencies must be used to provide reliable long-distance reception. We have still not approached the period where the lowest frequencies must be brought into use, but gradually more and more broadcasting for winter-evening reception must be done in the 41- and find such London frequencies as GSL (6.11), GRW (6.145), GRS (7.07) and GRM (7.125) will provide best reception from 10:00 p.m. (or earlier) on. As a matter of fact, GRC (2.91), the lowest frequency employed by the BBC, will be brought into use for the deep night midwinter period before

long. European reception on the 19-meter band will continue fair to good during the day, while reception on the 25- and 31-meter bands will be at its best during the late afternoon hours.

## Short-Wave Quotes

Berlin's Lord Haw Haw insists that enemy propaganda has quietly transferred attention from whether Stalin-grad will fall to whether Germans are disappointed on the length of time it is taking to conquer it . . . Moscow reports that because escaping Soviet war prisoners are accused of discarding their identification marks, the German general staff has ordered that the design of a sloping cross be "burned" on the underside of the left arm of the prisoner with lunar caustic . . . According to a London military commentator, the Middle East (including Egypt) is the first, second and third fronts. It is the gateway to Russia; holds the Germans and Japs apart . . . According to Melbourne, an eye-witness observer reports that when the in the waters-troyer P— was sunk aircraft guns were still blazing away with full force as the waters closed over her . . . London's "Radio News-reel" reports that the Fiat factory, near Genoa, Italy, recently bombed by the R. A. F., was so big that it had a race-track on its roof. Formerly

turning out the fine Fiat car, the factory now manufactures tanks for the Axis . . . Also from the London News-reel: Audience reaction is a great source of enthusiasm and inspiration to Maltese fliers, who are forced to take to the air several times a day to meet the never-ending waves of Axis bombers and fighters. One popular pilot has now downed twenty-nine enemy planes in the past four months. His career is followed more closely than that of a cricket star. In all, Maltese airmen have brought down over one thousand Axis aircraft . . . Melbourne reports that shirts in Australia won't have any tails hereafter. Melbourne also reports the little story of an Aussie flier who, when the Japanese fleet had invaded New Britain and was on its way to Rabaul, radioed the Japanese commander to order the fleet to turn back or he would open fire. Having been ignored in the same way that an elephant might ignore a mosquito, Lt. Bob Thompson winged over and dove straight for the flagship. The last that was heard of him was when he radioed that his tail had been shot off and that he was preparing to land . . . According to London, the new British "Mosquito" was these new planes that bombed the Gestapo headquarters in Oslo. The Mosquito, a two-engine plane, mounts four 20-mm. cannons and four machine-guns . . . A roving reporter for the BBC, eavesdropping one day on an American history class in a British boys' school, learned that the two favorite American books were "Little Women" and "Huckleberry Finn"; that Americans are largely judged by American films seen in Britain; that average Americans, except cowboys, gangsters and movie stars, aren't interesting; that many still believe that the U. S. is full of people shooting each other with tommy-guns.

Radio Thailand (11.715), Bangkok, is being heard with much louder signals. ### Blemishes Are No Blessing!

**W**HY do men like us? Because we are really quite nice to know and are attractive, each in our own way. They don't believe for a moment that beauty is wholly dependent on the color of a woman's hair, the shape of her nose—or even the clothes she wears. But they do agree on one thing—a woman's skin. They like girls who have a scrubbed, fresh look and a glowing skin, regardless of age. So how do you rate on complexion beauty?

Far too many of us are guilty of grimy blackheads, be they ever so few! And to a man, there is nothing more disillusioning than to discover those specks of gray around the nose of his lady-love. To him it means she is unclean. But how untrue that can be. You may be just the girl who never, never forgets her nightly bath, weekly shampoos, or a clean face before new applications of make-up. Yet you still possess those disgusting little dots of dirt. Why, oh why has fate chosen you!

But don't despair—you are not the only one who struggles with nasty blackheads. Your skin is made up of "jillions" of tiny pores which must excrete oil and waste material. Maybe your skin has a tendency to be more oily than your sister's—and consequently requires more care to keep the pores open and free from grime. So if that is your problem, then here's some good advice on how to get rid of them.

Blackheads, you know, are veritable sign-posts pointing to future and more disastrous trouble, so try the good, old-fashioned soap-and-water technique. the preparation gently loosens the blackheads and your face should be bright and clean.

WHEN Sir Turkey Gobbler suddenly becomes cautious instead of arrogant, you know his day of rue is not in the too distant future! This year, Mr. Turkey happens to make his contribution on the last Thursday of the month—November 26, to be exact. And, although you may believe this is actually the traditional date, Thanksgiving Day has always been more or less variable.

Back in the days of the early colonists, the Thanksgiving celebration simply waited for a convenient time. One year, a small Carolina town postponed Thanksgiving until a shipment of molasses had arrived from some distant point. Why? Reason enough! Their faithful housewives could make no brown bread or pudding until they had received this precious commodity. And still other colonists waited for the frost when their cattle could no longer graze. Then Thanksgiving would be proclaimed.

And what a feast! Our ingenious and hardy forefathers were gluttonous gourmands indeed! The Thanksgiving menu of 1862 contained such a quantity and variety of foods that would keep us in rations for a week! And believe it or not, the hostess was definitely slighted if too much food was left untouched. Fortunately for us, this tradition has been slightly varied through the years, and our menus

have been cut down a great deal for after-dinner comfort and comparative economy. However, we still carry on with turkey 'n' fixings, but salads and sherbets or such lighter foods have replaced the heavier meats and desserts of by-gone days.

So try this menu. It's easy to prepare—attractive to see—and definitely appetizing to eat.

- Tomato Juice Cocktail
- Roast Turkey with Chestnut Stuffing
- Fluffy Mashed Potatoes
- Giblet Gravy
- Baked Squash
- Molded Strained Cranberry Sauce
- Fruit Salad
- Sherbet
- Coffee
- Chestnut Stuffing
- 2 pounds chestnuts (3 cups shelled)
- 1 cup cracker crumbs
- 4 tablespoons melted butter

## WHAT'S COOKING!

### Let's Talk Turkey!

- ¼ cup cream
- 1¼ teaspoons salt
- dash of pepper
- ¾ cup hot milk

Make gash in each chestnut with knife. Place in pan in hot oven (450 degrees F.) for ten minutes, or until shells and skins can be easily removed. Shell, remove skins, and cook gently in enough boiling water to cover for twenty minutes. Drain and chop fine. Add remaining ingredients. Mix well.

- Molded Strained Cranberry Sauce
- 4 cups Eatmor Cranberries
- 2 cups water
- 2 cups sugar\*

Cook cranberries in water until all the skins pop open. Strain, add sugar and blend. Boil rapidly for about three minutes. Skim and pour into one large mold or individual molds.

\*To save sugar, substitute one cup

of corn syrup, dark or white.

Now prepare your turkey for roasting! Carefully singe, clean and wash, then rub the inside with salt. Prepare the chestnut dressing, and stuff your turkey. Then you're ready to truss. Draw the thighs of the turkey close to the body and insert the steel skewer through the middle joint, running it through the body and out under the middle joint on the other side. Cross the drumsticks, tie firmly with a long cord, and fasten to the tail. Then place the wings close to the body and insert a second skewer through the wings and body. Draw the neck skin under and fasten with a small wooden skewer. Place the bird on its breast, and cross the string attached to the tail and wind it around each end of lower skewer; again cross string and draw around each end of upper skewer. Tie the string in a knot and cut off the ends. Now you're ready to brush the turkey with unsalted fat and roast at 350 degrees, allowing fifteen to twenty-five minutes per pound, depending upon the size of the bird. Your turkey may be roasted with or without a cover, but if you prefer the latter method, place a clean white cloth saturated in melted fat over it to prevent drying out.

So there are your tips! Gather the family together and make this holiday an occasion.

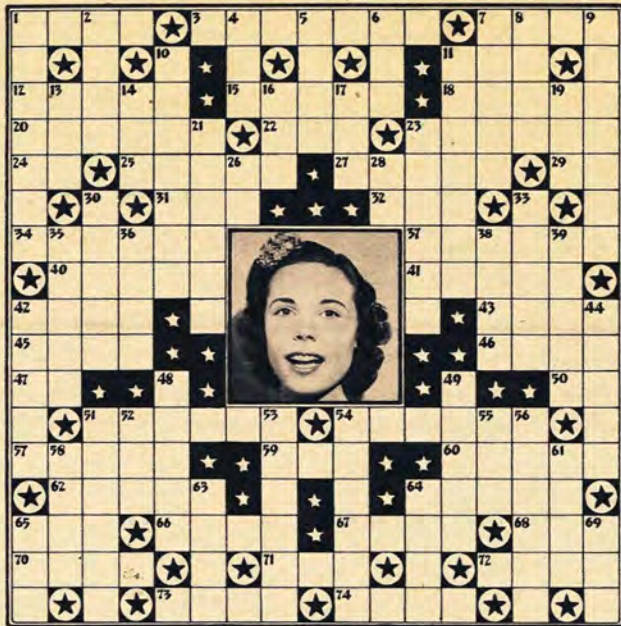
