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
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Information and Help to the OTR Collector-Part 8 CLUBS AND BUYING GROUPS

Before we get into many more of these installments, I thought that we really should cover one high interest area, especially for the new collector. Namely, where are the clubs that you can join and exactly what is a buying group? Newsletters, Digests, Publications, and Commercial Dealers will be the main focus of future installments in this series. After the first installment of this series appeared in the Old Time Radio Digest, I received a lot of mail concerning the buyers group references.

I will not offer a large amount of text in this section. I will just give some basic information on the following and save room for the important names and addresses, which of course is what you are interested in obtaining.

Let's look first at Antique Radio Clubs. There are several that you can join if you are interested in collecting or even repairing original radios. They are a good source for information on schematics, parts, gatherings, etc. I've included the name of their publications and any fees that I know about. You should, of course, check to see if these fees and costs are current or have changed. Here are a few:

Of course, if you are interested in obtaining and collecting just old time radio programs, you have several directions that you can follow. Joining a club or special interest group is a great way to help build your interest and collection. These club and groups will have the same dedication and interest that you have. They will also be a good source for information about your area of enjoyment and will probably also be a good source for the actual programs themselves.

Some clubs, groups and organizations specialize in particular programs such as science-fiction, or drama, etc., and others have a broad collection of everything offered through the decades. I will not attempt to identify which of the following clubs and organizations have strong drama, or western, or comedy collections; you can sort that out by contacting them. My purpose here is to provide you with enough information so that you can contact them.

There are fees and costs in belonging to most clubs and organizations. So, along with identifying your interests and what you're looking for, be sure to ask about the costs in first joining and what the yearly costs are after that. Some organizations charge more for the first year and the yearly costs afterwards are lower.

Many, but not all clubs and organizations, have lending libraries that you can borrow or rent reel-to-reel, or cassette tapes from. Some libraries are small and specialized, some libraries are very large and diverse. You will want to check on the

costs of borrowing the tapes, which includes the cost per tape, the amount of tapes per transaction that you can borrow, postage and handling fees, and the length of time you are allowed to borrow the material. Check also if the club will allow you to trade additional material that you have for material you may want from their library. This will cut your costs as your collection continues to expand.

Many clubs and organizations produce a publication of some sort. A single sheet newsletter to a multi-page pamphlet. Some are monthly, bimonthly, or quarterly. Through these publications, you can usually run a small ad for your own wants and needs. Other collectors can then contact you directly and that may lead you to individual collecting and trading between the two of you. The individual collector may have larger holdings of programs than even the club has.



Lastly, buying groups. Some years ago, buying groups were very popular among a few dealers and some of the larger collectors that were looking for uncirculating programs. The idea is that in order to gather programs at a cheaper cost per show to yourself, you join with a few other collectors, pool your money together and purchase the material you want. This works especially well if the material is being held by an individual who is asking a lot of money per episode. Some reels of material can cost \$25,00 to \$40,00 per reel and more. This would certainly put these reels of new material completely out of the hands of most collectors.

Once the buying group selects and purchases the material, the original reels are then circulated from one group member to another in some sort of rotational order. Usually there is a mailing list included with each package of material that is circulating and as you finish with the material you sign off your name with the date you received the material and the date you mailed it to the next individual. This way the material is trackable and any delays can be identified and hopefully corrected so that all the individuals on the list can receive the new programs in the shortest possible time.

If there are 10 members of the group, then your cost for the material purchased is a tenth of what you would have paid as an individual. Sometimes restrictions are placed on the material either from the source of the programs or the group itself. It makes sense that you wouldn't want to be near the end of the rotation list, finally receiving programs that someone at the beginning of the list was already selling or circulating to other collectors.

I have both belonged to and headed buying groups. They can be a lot of fun and a lot of headaches. I have been asked many times over the last few years to start another buying group. But there are just not enough hours in the day to turn my attentions to all of the areas that I am involved in. To run a buying group, you need to devote more time than you would think. Maybe some day I will return to a buving group, either as a member or an active supplier of material. I feel that collectors that join a buying group definitely receive their money's worth. There are not as many buying groups today as there were in the past. If you find a buying group, they are not easy to join. Usually there is a waiting list as groups remain small. Smaller groups allow the material to circulate faster among the members than with larger membership.

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Vincent Price: The Renaissance Man by Jack Rothwell

Webster defines the "Renaissance man" as a person who has wide interests and is expert in several areas. Those of us who have followed the life of Vincent Price over the years know that he was the closest personification of a "Renaissance man" as one could encounter. Unfortunately, the worlds of art and entertainment lost this highly popular and cultured man on Monday, October 25, 1993. After a five year struggle with lung cancer, he died at his Hollywood Hills home. He was

Although this publication is aimed at the interests of the fans of old time radio, I would be remiss to ignore Price's many other endeavors. Without question his first love was the study. teaching and dissemination of knowledge about art. Even an abbreviated outline of the vast array of his contributions in this area is well beyond the space limitations of this article. This zealous booster and patron of art also had a solid reputation as a gourmet chef. Moreover, he was a respected and accomplished stage actor. had a recording career (with a Grammy nomination), was the author of several highly successful books, was a nationally syndicated columnist whose work appeared weekly in over eighty newspapers in North America, and for years was the highest paid lecturer in our nation. As one might expect, over the years he appeared in numerous print advertisements and TV and radio commercials for a wide variety of products. As entertainment buffs we obviously remember Price for his large number of good horror movies, as well as many "B" films, and by his own admission, even some very low-grade "C" bombs. He appeared in well over one hundred feature films. His career, of course, included hundreds of TV and radio performances. Most of us believe that he was the "one and only" radio

Saint.

Vincent Leonard Price was born in St. Louis, Missouri on May 27, 1911, to Vincent and Marguerite (Wilcox) Price. The Price family was renowned, successful and affluent, but not wealthy. Price often quoted an old axiom to describe his family's financial position: "They were not rich enough to cause envy, but successful enough to deserve respect." In the mid-1800s, Vincent Price (the grandfather) was the founder and owner of the Price Baking Powder Company. Vincent Price (the father) was the president of the famous National Candy Company.

After attending St. Louis Community School (a progressive private school founded by his mother and other mothers in his neighborhood), he enrolled at St. Louis Country Day School and then completed studies at a nearby boy's prep school to ready himself for college. Because his grandfather, father, brother and brother-in-law were all Yale men. there was never any doubt as to which college young Vincent would attend. He entered Yale in 1929. Upon graduation in 1933, he moved to New York to pursue an acting career. His lack of success in the world of show business led him to a teaching position at Riverside Country Day School in Yonkers, New York. At Riverside he directed the school plays in order to learn more about acting and theater drama. During this brief teaching career he continued to seek work on the New York stage, but absolutely no interest was shown by the many casting offices on Broadway.

The disappointed but determined Price decided to further his education by earning a master's degree. He went to London and enrolled at the University of Fine Arts, located at the Courtland Institute (a branch of the University of London). The Courtland

Institute had long held the reputation of being one of the most excellent schools of its kind in the world. During this period in London, he finally got his first break when he was hired to play the part of an American in a stage production of CHICAGO. Next came the role of Prince Albert in VICTORIA REGINA: thus, he was "on his way" as a stage actor. By December of 1935, he was again playing Prince Albert in VICTORIA REGINA, but this time in New York opposite Helen Hayes, "The First Lady of the Theater." The play enjoyed a long, successful run, but in 1937 Hollywood called. After receiving offers from MGM. Price eventually signed with Universal Pictures, because the unique contract gave him the freedom to work six months of each year on the stage. During the Universal period he performed in various stage plays, including several productions with the famous Orson Welles-John Houseman Mercury Theater in New York.

Price's early radio work included a 1936 guest appearance on the "Standard Brands Hour" with Rudy Vallee, and a performance of VICTORIA REGINA with Helen Haves and George Macready on "RCA Magic Key" (1937). He performed on that same show later in 1937. Another early radio appearance was one in which he played a scene from the play EVER AFTER on the "Standard Brands Hour" for NBC. His co-star was Broadway actress Edith Barrett, who had performed with Price in various stage productions. Eight days after their radio performance, they were married on April 22, 1938. Radio work was a good source of extra and steady income for the Price family during the Universal years. For example, for three months beginning in February of 1939, Price played the villain Paul Morrison on NBC's soap opera "Valiant Lady." In addition to the show's star, Joan Blaine, during this period the serial featured Parker Fennelly and Everett Sloane (another Mercury Theater player). On "The

Chase and Sanborn Hour" (3-12-39), Price again performed scenes from VICTORIA REGINA with Helen Hayes and Don Ameche.

In most of his Universal films, Price was required to play the traditional romantic leading man, without much auccess. His last film for Universal was a real "dog" jungle adventure. GREEN HELL (1940). An often cited scene from this "bomb" has the dying Price on his deathbed, after being shot with a poison dart. He looks up to Douglas Fairbanks, Jr. and (with a straight face) asks the "compelling" question, "Tell me. Brandy, is it possible to be in love with two women at the same time and in your heart be faithful to each, and yet want to be free of both of them?" WOW! What a paragon of incongruities! As the actors predicted, that hilarious line of "serious" dialogue brought forth roars of laughter in movie theaters all across the country. Surprisingly, this choice for the worst picture of 1940 made a profit, but Price's contract with Universal was terminated a short time later. However, he was signed to a contract with 20th Century Fox Studios soon after he was fired by Universal.

In December of 1941. Price's career seemed stalled. He was waiting for the right vehicle to carry him back to star status. That big break came when he was offered a major role in the play ANGEL STREET (formerly titled GASLIGHT). His performance as the very sinister Mr. Manningham received rave notices from the critics and he became "the toast of Broadway." ANGEL STREET enjoyed a three-year run in New York, but Price left the play after one year because of other commitments. Price noted that this was a major turning point in his career, because he proved to himself and to the critics that the "good guy" roles in the disappointing Universal films were leading him nowhere. He had finally found his niche as a villain. To use the trite old saying: The rest is history. When he returned to Hollywood in late 1942, he was given a key role in THE

SONG OF BERNADETTE (1943). He played the implacable and viperish regal prosecutor who attempted to commit the visionary Bernadette (Jennifer Jones) to the local asylum. For the first time, Price was cast as a full-fledged movie villain. After he received very favorable notices from various film critics, Fox Studio quickly cast him as the "lily livered" parasitic playboy. Shelby Carpenter in LAURA (1944). Later he was the venomous and complete cad, Russell Quinton, in LEAVE HER TO HEAVEN (1945). These three very successful Fox pictures helped to make Price one of the screen's "favorite" slinking suave villains. Moreover, after his performance as the brooding, deranged and tyrannical Nicholas Van Ryn in Fox's DRAGONWYCK (1946), he was touted as a serious contender for an Academy Award nomination, but did not receive the honor.

During the time of his successful and prolific movie career at Fox. Price was extremely active in radio. He performed on more than twenty drama shows such as "Hollywood Star Time," ("Hangover Square on 04-07-46, and "The Lodger" on 05-19-46), and "This is Hollywood" ("A Scandal in Paris") on 11-23-46). He appeared on "Suspense" and many other shows. Price has noted that during this period one performance that gave him great pleasure was "Flesh and Fantasy" on "Screen Guild Players" (07-16-45). This CBS show co-starred Edward G. Robinson. another Hollywood actor who was an authority on art. This was the first time they had worked together. As a result of their mutual interest in art, they became close friends over the years. In 1947, after his Fox movie contract expired, Price was offered the continuing radio role of Simon Templar on "The Saint." Price said he accepted the part because it guaranteed his financial security on a continuing basis as he free-lanced for other acting work. During the period he played the Saint on NBC, he did three CBS radio dramas on "Escape" that were, and still are,

widely acclaimed: "Present Tense" (01-31-50), "Three Skeleton Key" (03-17-50), and "Bloodbath" (06-30-50). The rich deepness of his voice was naturally suited for these dramas of the macabre. Although by this time he had persuaded the moviemakers that he should stick to playing villains, he had not yet convinced them that he was a good candidate to perform in films of the macabre.

In the 1940s, the popular Price was very busy with art, lecturing, films and almost constant radio appearances. Unfortunately, his married life suffered, and in May 1948, Edith Barrett was granted a divorce. Price made Hollywood gossip columns when he started dating fashion designer, Mary Grant. They were married in August 1949.

Price launched his TV career in 1949 as a guest on "Pantomime Quiz," and in 1950 he appeared on "The Saturday Night Revue With Jack Carter." He later acted in many of the early "live" TV dramas. After he signed a nonexclusive film contract with RKO and Howard Hughes in the early 1950s. he made few movies for that studio but worked often on TV. For example, in 1952 he performed on seven major teleplays, but made only one RKO picture. Price appeared on hundreds of TV episodes throughout the years. In just one year, 1956, he made thirty dramatic show appearances. He was a guest on "The Red Skelton Hour" more than thirty times. Another one of his favorite programs was "Hollywood Squares," where he appeared as a guest numerous times. In 1966 he was marvelously funny as "Egghead" on the Batman series. In recent years, he was the host on the PBS series "Mystery."

Still another major turning point in Price's career (the move to films of the macabre and horror) occurred in late 1952, when Warner Brothers offered him the lead role in the 3-D film THE HOUSE OF WAX (1953). The picture was a smash hit, even though the 3-D process itself was a short-lived fad. The film thrust Price into a higher rank

of Hollywood actors. As a result, he was deluged with offers to appear in more horror films, most of which he refused for fear of being relegated to starring in "B" horror movies for the remainder of his career. Instead, he turned to the stage again.

In the mid-1950's, Price remained loyal to radio when he acted as substitute host for three months on "Your Radio Theater" (10-15-55 to 01-10-56), while regular host, Herbert Marshall, was working on a movie. He also continued to star on such radio shows as "Suspense," "CBS Radio Workshop" and others.

In September and October of 1956. Price was booked as a game show guest on the nation's second most popular TV program "The \$64,000 Challenge." to compete with jockey Billy Pearson, also an "art expert." The contest was called a tie, and Price and Pearson split the \$64,000 prize. Later Price was matched against his friend Edward G. Robinson in vet another challenge for the \$64,000 payoff. Again the contestants fought to a draw and each walked away with \$32,000. The nationwide exposure of Price as an art expert proved to be invaluable to him. There is no doubt that it enhanced his reputation as a scholar and opened doors to many more rewarding experiences in the world of art. In addition, Price was untainted by the quiz show scandals that rocked the TV industry a short time later. As large numbers of his public lectures in the field of art already had indicated. Price hardly needed to be coached by dishonest TV producers.

Price received much praise for his work in several films based on the stories of Edgar Allan Poe. These were produced and directed by none other than Roger Corman (the creator of many extremely bad "cheapies"). HOUSE OF USHER (1960) got the Poe series off to a good start; THE PIT AND THE PENDULUM (1961), TALES OF TERROR (1962), THE RAVEN (1963), THE HAUNTED PALACE (1964), THE MASQUE OF


THE RED DEATH (1964), and THE TOMB OF LIGEIA (1965) were other successful Poe stories filmed by the Price-Corman team. Today, of course, Corman is somewhat of a cult figure. Obviously, one could comment on many other Price films. The "Prince of Terror" made scores of movies before and after the Poe series (some very good and some downright abysmal). Even the Disney studio made sure that Price stayed with his well-known image when he was hired to do the voice of the villainous Dr. Ratigan in the animated feature THE GREAT MOUSE DETECTIVE. In one of his famous lectures called "The Villain Still Pursues Me." Price offered this witty observation about his being trapped as the bad guy in so many spook movies: "You know, a great many scientists and college professors are fans of horror pictures. It isn't true that you make such entertainments to appeal to twelve-year-old minds. It's just that a lot of fine minds revert to twelve years old for relaxation."

Unlike many in the art and highclass society crowd who blasted Price for making so many "B" horror films, masses of movie, TV, and old-time radio fans did, and still do, admire much of the work of this respected and popular actor. The "Renaissance man" of such disparate interests will be missed by his fans, friends and admirers. Fortunately, a large number of his contributions to the world of entertainment are still available for us to treasure and enjoy.

Monday, CBS BOOB BACK

It was quite a while ago that Tom Howard was fired by his boss, the grocer, in Philadelphia for reciting "The Face on the Barroom Floor" to all the customers. It was only a short while later that Tom bobbed up in vaudeville as the "boob" comedian. Then came the Greenwich Village Follies, Ziegfeld's "Smiles," movies with George Shelton, then radio. A boob incarnate, with his scarecrow clothes, horn-rimmed specs, and derby, the son of Ireland's County Tyrone is well known to

We Put Our Heads Together... Any Suggestions?

For longer than any of us care to remember, we've been hearing that the Golden Age of Radio is a thing of the past — just a dim, distant memory, with little or no chance of revival except for scattered pockets of programming in various markets.

Well, your editor and his partners simply do not believe that! For a considerable period of time, an attempt has been underway to raise a sizeable amount of money in order to purchase several AM radio stations for the sole purpose of presenting full-time, old-time radio.

An all-out effort has been made to put together a reasonable and highlydetailed business plan. We have worked closely with an experienced station broker to identify possible properties in a variety of markets around the nation. We are up-to-date on what's available and the probable purchase prices. It appears that it would be possible for us to buy a flagship station and up to three satellite properties with the lesser number of dollars we've been seeking and up to six satellite operations with our optimum mount. That would afford the possibility of up to seven stations to get us started and would also provide all the required monies for whatever necessary upgrading of equipment, etc. and sufficient operating capital that would be needed for successful operation.

Naturally, the "success secret" of the project would lie in the sister station broadcasting activities. That's because all programming would originate at the flagship station and would be fed to the others via satellite. Therefore, those three to six additional stations would have only minor overhead expenses with staffs composed largely of those in sales and board operators. The state-of-the-art equipment that exists makes it quite simple to function in

that manner. We would program at least eighteen bours a day, with a full twenty-four log highly possible. It would be made up of all the shows we love from the Golden Age of Radio, interspersed with the music of the era. We also have projections of working with colleges and universities through their drama, music, journalism and other departments to have students, for credit, write, produce and act in new programming done in the fashion of what was so great from vesteryear. This would serve the dual purpose of providing some interesting new shows while spurring enthusiasm of young people for the overall product we'd be

Eventually, we feel there is a tremendous possibility for syndicating our programs to stations all around the nation.

Use your imagination for a moment. Think how nice it would be for you and your family, friends, business associates and others to be able to once again enjoy outstanding entertainment of a sort that barely exists in this day and time.

Yes, we know about copyrights, etc., and for the programs on which rights are still held, we have allowed for lease costs in our business plan budget.

How much, you ask? The plan calls for a total of \$8 million for the smaller setup (up to four stations), and \$12 million for the added properties (up to seven stations) and we're perfectly willing to let those with the necessary cash own the lion's share of the company. The fact of the matter is, however, that venture capital simply doesn't grow on trees these days. We feel we've come close a couple of times, but thus far are still checking on every aspect to see what to do or how to proceed. That's where we'd like your input concerning the proposal.

We're not asking for financial involvement by you in any way, shape or form. What we want are ideas or contacts that would enable us to present our plan with all of its ramifications to principals who either have or could raise the required funds if the notion appeals to them. Who do you know? What do you know? ANY SUGGESTIONS?

Book Review by George Wagner

As many of you already know, I spent 35 years in the new, used and rare book profession. During those decades I managed to read every book that passed me concerning Old Time Radio.

I also searched for radio books through the card files of the Cincinnati Public Library, the second largest public library system in the United States. There were also long hours spent at library sales, rummage sales, charity book bazaars, and in dusty old attics.

For at least the first half of this long period I wondered if I was the only person interested in this crazy pursuit. I certainly had no OTR rivals while diving into book boxes at book sales. Fellow book collectors would often stick things right into my hands with "here's one for you, George" plus a sort of unspoken afterthought of "who else would want it?"

All this time I wished there was a catalogue of Old Time Radio books. It would have been so much easier to have had a checklist/bibliography to give form and direction to my book hunting and collecting. Without it I was a book accumulator rather than a true OTR bibliographer or archivist. I used to have dreams about that nonexistent book.

The problem is that I was born at least 25 years too early. That bibliography exists NOW. And it is

even better than I dreamed it would be.

The book, in two separate volumes, is A RADIO BROADCASTING BIBLIOGRAPHY, by the redoubtable Mr. Frank Becquaert, he of Rainy Day Books. I will tell you about the second part first. This contains nearly 700 titles: radio scripts, books on specific shows, biographies of radio performers, even an extensive list of novels with radio studio settings.

Amazingly, well over half the titles Frank Becquaert cites are entirely new to me. And there are even a few, alas, that I have seen MANY times over the years without ever realizing that they ARE Old Time Radio books.

This second volume alone makes A RADIO BROADCASTING BIBLIOGRAPHY an OTR reference manual to rank with TUNE IN YESTERDAY and THE BIG BROADCAST. It is the very first book, in fact, that makes radio history GENUINE history, rather than just one more basement or spare room hobby.

Part One is a hair more oriented towards the technical end of radio broadcasting, but nonetheless fascinating. Station histories are here, as well as more general histories of the radio medium. Books on script writing, on running a radio station, on sound effects, on announcing, acting and directing – they are all in this volume. Part One contains well over 600 titles.

Orice again, these two volumes are a treasure trove for the serious OTR historian/archivist/collector who sees his or her radio program collection as something more than pleasant time—passers for long trips in the car. Truly in-depth radio history may begin with Frank Becquaert.
