An Encyclopedia of American Children's Radio from 1921 to 1960 is an ambitious dream of mine, and part of accomplishing this goal means becoming an expert at telling the differences between all the uncles, aunts, radio godmothers, big brothers, and the story ladies who captivated children in radio's golden age.

This article will discuss "Story Ladies," women who created, oversaw and/or presented stories for a children's radio audience. They wore many hats as actresses, producers, writers, directors, and moguls – if not all of these jobs at once – to create great programming for kids. Traditionally, a story lady was heard on the broadcast, but for historical context I have several exceptions.

The names of Ireene Wicker, Georgene Faulkner and Nila Mack are still fairly well known among old-time radio fans, but they were far from being the only story ladies. Also, in spite of popular belief, Faulkner was not the first story lady on radio. This research began with three overall questions: Who was the first Story Lady? What tales did she tell? How did they begin a trail for future broadcasters?

The answers led to a flood of discoveries and reexamination of how children's radio developed from the 1920s into the 1950s. These finding were shared at the annual Association of Recorded Sound Collections Conference in May 2022.

Who was the first spoken story lady, and how it was almost Josephine Lawrence

Story ladies go back to the beginning of children's radio. In fact, if not for an accident, the first regularly broadcast kids show would have been with a story lady. Sometime between October 1 to 5, 1921, The Man in the Moon, the first children's program over a standard radio broadcast station, premiered on WJZ in Newark, New Jersey. According to some account this program was supposed to feature stories written and read by Josephine Lawrence (1892-1978), the children's editor for the Newark Sunday Call newspaper. Lawrence was a prolific writer, and would eventually write novels and film screenplays in addition to children's books.

On the night of the series premiere Lawrence fainted while trying to climb the 15-foot ladder that ascended into the WJZ makeshift rooftop radio studio. At the last minute, Newark News reporter and sports commentator William "Bill" F. B. McNeary (1891-1934) was asked to step in. Since the children were expecting a woman and not a man, McNeary wanted to remain anonymous. Tommy Cowan glanced at the night sky, and dubbed McNeary "The Man In The Moon", and the rest was history. Thus, while Lawrence could be considered the first story lady in the sense that she continued to write stories for the series until 1925, it is not known if she ever read them over the air.

In less than 12 months the bedtime story was recognized as a genre of radio programming along with news, sports coverage, opera, agricultural reports and several others. Many other storytellers began to appear on the radio to read to children. So, who among them was the first spoken story lady?

Some radio histories have claimed that the first story lady on the air was Georgene Faulkner (1873-1958) and this writer is guilty of repeating that idea. Faulkner was an innovative storyteller and is believed to be the first person to create phonograph records specifically for children. After examining some newspaper accounts and a thesis about WGN-Radio, Faulkner was heard giving children's stories as early as October 6, 1922. During the ARSC presentation, another historian shared with me that Faulkner presented children's stories much earlier in that year under her married name.




Oakland Tribune, Oct 5, 1922, announcing the first broadcast of Ethel Rose Taylor as "The Story Lady."

Preceding the October 1922 Faulkner broadcast by just a few days was Ethel Rose Taylor, a librarian and storyteller at station KLX in Oakland, California. Taylor, like Faulkner, was also a popular public storyteller. The *Oakland Tribune* newspaper documents her many appearances at department stores and libraries. Ethel Rose Taylor Horsfall (1888-1987) may have been the first radio story lady on the American West Coast.

Author and journalist Florence Vincent Smith (18?? - 1969) read her children's stories "The Adventures of Peters" and "Animal Stories" over WJZ, Newark around February 1922, only four months after The Man in the Moon. So, it seemed for a while that Florence Smith Vincent was radio's first spoken story lady. That is what I thought for several months, until I learned about a remarkable broadcaster from Massachusetts.

Ultimately this research can account for only one spoken story lady from 1921. That was *Eunice Randall* who preceded Taylor and Faulkner by a few months. She broadcast bedtime stories on experimental station 1XE at Medford, Mass. in November 1921, just a month after *The Man in the* Moon premiered.

To talk about Eunice Thompson (nee Randall) (1898-1982) who was known as "The Girl Wizard of Medford" only as the first on-air story lady would be a great injustice. She was the first female radio announcer in Boston, built a radio station at the age of 19, and was the first woman in the American Radio & Research Corporation (AMRAD). Randall also hosted a children's bedtime series called Sleepytime Stories on station WGI beginning in March 1922. For children's programs Randall was known on-air as The Lady of The Lamp.

Story Ladies emerge throughout the 1920s.

By 1925, there were dozens of story ladies on the air from coast to coast. Among them were Grace Sorenson of WOAW, Omaha, Nebraska; Majorie Stewart the "Dreamtime Lady" of KDKA Pittsburgh; Mrs. J. Leon Coulter the "Tell-Me-A-Story-Lady" of WDAF in Kansas City, Missouri; Ethel Hawes of

WHK Cleveland, Ohio; Aunt Vivian of KFQX, Seattle, Washington; and "Aunt" Peggy Albion of WRC at Washington D. C.

Among these women two can still be heard today. Valerie "Val" McLaughlin was Radio's Original Sandman of WOC Davenport, Iowa, and later the Lullaby Lady of WLS in Chicago. In 1924 she did a series of children's stories for Brunswick Records. They are scarce but occasionally pop up on eBay. Georgene's Faulkner's children's phonographs have been digitized and are now on the Internet Archive.

There could be more albums out there in private hands. According to the Discography of American Historical Recordings, Dagmar Perkins, a noted specialist of diction, had four Victor records. Perkins hosted a children's program called *Dagmar Perkins' Playground*. The status of her records is unknown. Also, Rita Maginot, host of *Rita's Kiddy Music Party* on WRNY New York, had two trial Victor records that are also unavailable today.

The First Storytelling Moguls - Big Impact from the Beginning of the Network Era and Mass Syndication

The formation of the Columbia Broadcasting System (CBS) and The National Broadcasting Company (NBC) would forever change the reach and scope of children's media in the home. As new networks began, they started to recruit writers and producers to establish children's hour series for the networks. They only had to pull talent performers from network affiliates. As directors or producers of children's and women's programs, several ladies became prominent examples of the opportunities that awaited women in the booming industry.

Margaret Bernice "Madge" Tucker (1897-1996), was the earliest credited director of children's radio programs for NBC. In this role she was an actress, writer, and "radio godmother" for a generation of new radio actors. Tucker held this role until the early 1940s, with possible co-direction of Paul Wing in the 1930s, and worked in radio until 1952. Her involvement with children's productions began on station WRC in Washington D. C. around 1924 before it joined the NBC network.

Tucker was known to have sometimes interviewed and auditioned over 100 children a week while writing, directing, and producing her programs. Among her pupils were Muriel Harbatter (Jane of *Jolly Bill and Jane*), siblings Eddie and Elizabeth "Betty" Wragge, soap legend Cherita Bauer, voice legend Walter Tetley, Billy and Bobby Mauch (later of movie fame), musical siblings Julian and Sylvia Altman, Winifred Toomey, Billy and Florence Halop, Rosalyn Silber (Rosie on *The* Goldbergs), and Jimmy M'Callion.

Under her leadership NBC produced the *The Lady Next Door* in which Tucker was the story lady who led children on imaginary journeys and told engaging stories. Also from Tucker's guidance was the series *Our Barn, Adventures in King Arthur Land*, the *The NBC Children's Hour* with host Milton Cross, later retitled *Coast to Coast On a Bus*, and the NBC Musical Appreciation Hour.

An honorable mention from the Tucker NBC era goes to Janet Van Loon the Sick-A-Bed Lady (c. 1935) who told stories and shared crafts with ill children not in school. There was another story lady who was on the NBC Blue Network but we will get to her.

Story Ladies at CBS, or the long road to Let's Pretend

The chief rival to NBC was the Columbia Broadcasting Network (CBS). One radio series dominated the accolades and fame it still continues to have in regards to children and radio; The Peabody Award-winning fairy tale series *Let's Pretend*. That series was not created overnight, and its development came about via three different women.

An early storytelling series on CBS that is sometimes listed as the foundation for *Let's Pretend* was *Aunt Jymmie and Her Tots in Tottyville* (1928-1930). There is very little information about this program, and it doesn't help that in radio listings Jymmie was frequently misspelled as "Jimmie".

From a close examination of schedules, genealogy, and copyright records, Aunt Jymmie was a woman named Ida "Jymmie" Schulman (c. 1898-1977). The program originated from WMSG, the Madison Square Garden Broadcast Corporation station on Wednesday, May 23, 1928 at 5:15 pm EST as *Ida Schulman's Pals* or *Aunt Schulman's Tots*. A week later a second series called *Tots From Tottyville* was listed at 5:45pm EST. It is not clear if these were two different series, or one show where the segments are listed differently at the 15-minute mark.

After a summer run that ended June 20, 1928, both series later merged, or were finally listed, to become *Aunt Schulman's* (or *Aunt Jymmie's*) *Tots From Tottyville*, *Aunt Jymmie Schulman's Tots*, or *Aunt Jymmie and Her Tots From Tottyville* when it moved to the CBS affiliate WABC on October 27, 1928. *Aunt Jymmie* ran on WABC until Fall of 1929, when it completed its run on WRNY Rome, NY in January 1930.

Jymmie Schulman was a playwright with a number of works copyrighted under the names "Jymmie Schulman," "Mrs. Herman Schulman," and "I. G. Schulman". More research and primary sources are still needed to explain how she came to star in this series, and who the "tots" were. Schulman was also the mother of West Coast TV producer Lee Schulman.

The earliest known person credited at CBS as its director of children's programs was Yolande Langworthy. Langworthy was the *nom de plume* of Mrs. Frances Mary Lawson Reade (1892-1976). A Canadian born musician, Reade emigrated to the United States in 1922, four years after her husband Lt. Thomas Harold Reade was killed in action. The young war widow and single mother to their son began singing in her "rich contralto" voice on various New York radio stations that same year.

It is unknown how her writing career or professional affiliation with CBS began, or why she

used the name Yolande Langworthy. From contemporary news accounts she was the creator, director, and writer of at least three children's series for the network. *Littmann's Mountainville Sketches*, (1929-1930) was a small-town drama sponsored by Morris Littmann's stores. The cast included children and adults. Littman's attempted an experimental TV version in 1930, and it is not clear if it was ever broadcast.

The Land O' Make Believe (1929-1932) was a Sunday morning fantasy program (often confused for Let's Pretend). On this series Langworthy played a character called The Beautiful Lady while Broadway and radio star Artells Dickson was the Captain of The Ship O' Dreams. The Captain took two children, played by Donald Hughes and Pat Ryan, on surrealistic adventures to the islands of Thought, Courage, Fear, as well as many others, in a program designed to teach ideals.

The series with Langworthy's longest impact on radio would be *The Adventures of Helen and Mary*. This series about two little girls played by Estelle Levy (who later was known as Gwen Davies, 1922-2022), Jean Derby (1921-1995), and Patricia "Pat" Ryan (1923-1949). Which actress played Helen or Mary varies by source. The girls had fantasy adventures enacted with adult actors. Levy, Ryan, and Derby appeared in all three Langworthy series, while Levy and Ryan would become mainstays of CBS radio for the next 18 – 25 years.

Langworthy was even more esteemed for a primetime drama series called *Arabesque* (1929-1932) that modernized the Arabian Knights with poetry, acting, and music. The program was a hit with audiences, and Langworthy published two collections of poems from the series. Her opening poem "Drifting Sands and Caravans" was reprinted in several "best-loved" poetry anthologies and student yearbooks for decades.

None of Langworthy's children's scripts are publicly available today, only snippet descriptions from newspapers. In Arthur Andersons book, *Let's Pretend and The Golden Age of Radio*, it was said that CBS executives - namely William S. Paley - did not like her work, and she was let go from her role in the fall of 1930. On the contrary, some articles from the time suggest that parents, children, and teachers liked all three of Langworthy's programs.

Her departure also coincided with a lawsuit she filed with the New York Supreme Court against CBS to retain the rights to the *Arabesque* series. Her case was cited for years as an early example of author rights to scripts in radio. Her career ended as CBS's children's director in 1930.

In 1932, under her given name Frances Reade, Langworthy wrote a New York series with child and adult actors, including Estelle Levey, simply titled *Riverdale*. Decades later, Langworthy returned to Canada. Langworthy's replacement at CBS was a woman who became an institution in children's radio.

The *Bold Venture*/Ziv Fundraising Project: Follow-up

In the last issue we shared information about a big – and we mean BIG – crowdfunding project by Carl Amari to release the entire run of *Bold Venture* recorded from Fredric W. Ziv's own master recordings.

Seeking to raise more than \$70,000, it was by far the largest Kickstarter effort this author is aware of in the old-time radio hobby. Running for two months, it was also considerably longer than most Kickstarter projects, whether OTR-related or not.

It's fair to say that the project attracted a lot of attention within the hobby, a decent amount of which was negative.

First, the overall cost was considered far beyond realistic by many, especially compared to the scale of other OTR crowdsourcing projects that may have raised a few thousand dollars. Amari repeatedly shared that the project required a number of up-front costs that would not be needed in subsequent fundraisers for future series releases. Also, these discs are licensed so there are costs that go to the rights holders. Further, the cost of having the discs transferred by Doug Hopkinson, one of the most esteemed individuals doing this type of work in the hobby, had to be considered. On top of that, Kickstarter takes about 10% of the whole pie for various fees, an amount that needs to be figured in from the beginning.

Second, a number of hobbyists shared their lessthan-favorable memories of Amari's activities – or activities that were thought to be his – from more than two decades ago. Statements with his name were made in the late 1990s threatening legal action against individuals who did not cease in sharing and selling certain programs, due to his having exclusive deals to distribute those programs. In an interview with Joe Webb, Amari said that he never sent such letters; they were all sent after he had sold his oldtime radio business. The successor owners were allowed to continue using his name, however, because of its close association with the product. Regardless of the details of what happened back then, a fair number of hobbyists swore off the project because of it.

Third, the pledge level to receive the complete run of 78 *Bold Venture* episodes was \$250, an amount that seemed exorbitant to some. Here, the hobby really saw a split between those what had been active in the hobby for decades, and those who may have been newer, in the sense of discovering it since the spread of digital copies started in the late 1990s and early 2000s.

At just under \$4 per episode, those who remembered the days of paying \$10 an hour (or more) for programs found it a good deal, considering the audio quality and that a number of the episodes are still un-circulating. Those who are newer to the hobby and not used to paying those amounts (if any amount) to acquire new programs indicated in some social media posts that the cost was a deal-breaker.

Regardless of the obstacles this project faced, *Bold Venture* surpassed its goal and fully funded; 242 supporters pledged a total of \$72,800. In followup emails to backers, Amari has indicated that the money has now allowed him to move ahead with the shows, tentatively by the end of the year. He announced the purchase a bulk CD recorder so that the hundreds of CDs (1,800!) needed for backers can be created. This is one of the up-front costs that will not be needed in following campaigns.

Amari is not setting back and letting things quiet down, however. He announced during the *Bold Venture* campaign that if it was successful, he planned to release *Boston Blackie* next. Indeed, he is jumping headlong into initial plans to creating a new crowdsourcing effort to transfer the entire *Boston Blackie* run from Ziv's personal discs. This is a much bigger series, numbering 218 episodes, several of which have never entered circulation. Keep your eyes and ears open for announcements about this new project, maybe as early as the new year.



Remembering Frank Rosin

News of the death of Frank Rosin reached the oldtime radio world on December 6. Included are some reflections offered by those who knew him.

"Frank was one of the hobby's most important, devoted, and generous collectors of our hobby from its earliest years. He was a key figure in the REPS (Radio Enthusiasts of Puget Sound) for many, many years. He was responsible for hundreds of disc transfers in the early years of the hobby, and someone listens most every day to the recordings he made for our hobby.

"Frank was generous to me over many decades. I saw him in 2017 and he gave me the script for the last Jim French production for which he served as sound effects artist.

"I had the pleasure of interviewing Frank at that time along with collector Bob Blume. We were in Seattle for a couple of days before taking a cruise to Alaska. We found an empty conference room at the Springhill Suites where we were staying, moved some chairs around, and had a great discussion.

"Listen to the interview -- we had great fun and he gave some really interesting background about early collecting and also the various Jim French productions.

"RIP, Frank... you left a marvelous legacy of kind generosity and wisdom."- Joe Webb

"Frank Rosin passed away on Sunday. Frank was a major OTR collector going back in to the 1960s. Frank was able to get many of the *Suspense* and *Whistler* shows from the 1942 season, plus many of the CBS newscasts from the war, into the hobby. Frank recorded all of the *CBS Mystery Theater* broadcasts with newscasts from KIRO. He was a member of many buying groups over the years. He was the newsletter editor for REPS for many years and also did live sound effects for Jim French productions." – Walden Hughes "Those of us who love *CBS Radio Mystery Theater* have Frank Rosin to thank for giving us a set of recordings to enjoy. Frank, an avid collector of old-time radio shows, started taping the shows from the very first broadcast to the very last. He taped originals and reruns from radio stations KIXI and KIRO out of Seattle. Frank was dedicated to the task and rarely missed a broadcast.

"Eventually, Frank generously made his tapes available to a few collectors so they could be digitized and shared. Eventually, thanks to Frank's hard work and persistence, the collector community can now enjoy listening to his recordings, in excellent sound quality, including news and commercials. Wow! Thank you, Frank Rosin, from all of us who love to listen to *CBS Radio Mystery Theater*. Your generosity will live in our memories forever." – Kenny Long

"I sought out Frank after seeing his name and address in *Hello Again*. This was some time in the mid-70's. I had no phone number, just an address. I found his residence and knocked on the door. That seems unthinkable to me today. He lived in a Kirkland studio apartment on the shore of Lake Washington below street level. His ramshackle "beachcomber" dwelling belied the fact that he owned the store fronts above and two expansive lakefront lots. Frank always went for functional, never fancy. For most people a cold visit like that would have been questionable at best and outright unwelcome by most. But I was immediately welcomed.

"There was a flurry of activity going on there, with boys coming in and out. He explained he was a Sea Scout leader and the kids were moving through there all the time. Despite being obviously busy with all that, he took the time to talk OTR with me and showed me his collection. Boxes of tape lined the entire room!! I was staggered by the quantity. I left his place carrying a dozen of those tapes on loan. And every one of them was better than anything I had.

"Can you imagine? I literally had just met him! He just figured he could trust me. I returned a couple weeks later. We had another extended conversation and I left with another stack. I never had the time to trade with anyone else after that. It was all I could do to keep up with the loaners I got from him. He never asked for a thing in return. With some breaks here and there – like when I moved away to Portland for four years – this would continue for decades. It turns out he did this for several others as well. The tapes would eventually change to CD's but his generosity was always the same. And our conversations were always the best.

"I have a very long list of amazing Frank anecdotes gathered from 40+ years of knowing him. Like his brief brush with fame as an 'extra' for Warner Brothers and meeting James Dean. That one is a mind-blower. I'll miss our conversations. He was one of a kind.

"I was thinking last night of all his other interests besides our hobby. He was an active member of the Model A Club of America and he had a fully restored Model A Coup in his garage. He frequently volunteered to pick up incoming REPS guests at SeaTac airport in this vehicle and convey them to the hotel. And part of that journey involved getting on the freeway. What an adventurous beginning to a Seattle visit! He told me Hollywood legends John McIntyre and Jeannette Nolan were two of his brave passengers. Frank drove that car to Model A Club events all over the country.

"He relocated from the beach house sometime in the mid-80s. A noisy night club had opened next door and he couldn't take the noise. His new house was a late '50s or early '60s ranch-style in nearby Juanita. He immediately performed a little customizing and installed an early 20th century cast iron wood burning stove in the kitchen. It had belonged to his family. This monster was used not only for cooking; it literally heated his entire home. I smile a little thinking how the real estate agent will explain some of the unique features of this house to prospective new buyers.

"Frank's house was jam packed with artifacts of his youth. He had a giant telephone collection going back to the 1920's and before. Most of them were in working condition, including a number of candlestick models like you'd see in the old Warner Brothers gangster movies. He even rescued a complete circa '40s switchboard from being discarded. This was one of the first things you'd see entering his home. Frank's mother had been a telegraph operator in Seattle and he even had the original bulletin she kept announcing the Pearl Harbor attack. "Under the house he dug out a little basement of sorts. In this he stored some of the items REPS had inherited including many ET's stacked in large pizza boxes. When the local movie theater closed in Kirkland in the '60s, Frank somehow ended up with the projector and numerous cans of film that were never returned to the studios. I know it was an ambition of his to fire that thing up for friends and show one of those old movies, complete with popcorn from the theater popcorn maker which he also acquired. I'm sorry that never happened.

"For several years Frank was the sound effects man on Jim French's stage productions of *Imagination Theater*. They typically did one Harry Nile and one Sherlock in these live audience shows at Kirkland Performing Arts Center. Jim liked the theatricality of a sound effects guys on stage with the actors. The audience enjoyed it and practice continued after Jim's passing. Frank loved doing it. He used quite a bit of Ray Erlenborn's gear in these performances. But he'd want it known that the pistol used for all the gunplay was his own.

"His most cherished association was with the Kirkland Historical Society. He worked at their museum two days a week. Frank had a great love for this community and I am hoping all this stuff he collected and valued over a lifetime will end up with KHS for generations to enjoy." – Bob Blume

Norman Lear

Norman Lear died on December 5 at the age of 101. Widely remembered for the impact he had on sitcoms in the 1970s, especially All in the Family, Lear did have slight connection to the old-time radio hobby. He is credited as a writer on the Martin and Lewis Show in 1951 and 1952.

Karl Schadow shared this with the OTRR community: "<u>The Radio Preservation Task Force (of</u> which I am a member) hosted three Copyright Webinars during 2022 which are now available to all interested parties. This series had been most helpful for researchers." This issue I hope to begin a regular series of OTR book reviews, specifically older volumes that may not be familiar to newer hobbyists but remain pertinent to fans of old-time radio.

Words at War by Howard Blue A Brief Review

Published in 2002, *Words At War* focuses on the dramatic radio series produced by the federal government, commercial businesses, and non-profit agencies, during World War II in an effort to increase American morale and grow citizen support for the war. Blue's book unquestionably remains the most definitive work on the topic.


Finally, I received a copy and pulled it off the shelf this fall. I wish I hadn't waited so long! This is a gem of a book on a few fronts: First, in providing a comprehensive overview of radio series focused on World War II, it provides a one-stop source for reading about any number of shows that many hobbyists may be vaguely familiar with but may not have actually listened to. Second, it's the clearest overview of the programs produced by the Office of Facts and Figures (OFF) and later the Office of War Information (OWI) that I have read. Third, it helps the reader identify other war-centric series that were created by agencies such as The American Jewish Committee and The Writers War Board. Finally, Blue does well at highlighting radio professionals who fell all along the politically left-to-right spectrum and how they approached their craft during the War and Post-War eras.

There are so many series referenced in this book that rang a very quiet bell in my mind; I'd heard of them but realized I had listened to and read about very few of them. This book provided a logical structure to explore these works by grouping them by their focus on the civilian or soldier perspective. Additionally, Blue goes into more depth – albeit somewhat speculatively – about the potential impact of these programs on listeners than most radio publications.

Be aware that this book is not merely a litany of details and dates about a few dozen shows, nor does it confine itself to programming directly related to the war effort. Blue includes chapters not just the war itself but how different series attempted to change attitudes at home concerning domestic issues, including greater rights and freedoms for women and Americans of Color and America's own anti-Semitism. The final chapter even expands beyond the War years and focuses on the blacklist era, which saw many careers ruined. Inevitably, the volume involves politics of the time, a topic that OTR fans often try to steer clear of within their hobby.

Below is a list of the series that are discussed in this book. It offers a perfect opportunity to learn more about each of them within the larger context of the War and the broadcasting industry. An American in England, American Way, The, American Women, Army Service Forces Presents, Assignment Home, Chaplain Jim, Children in Wartime, Conquerors of the Sky, Cradle Will Rock, Day of Reckoning, Dear Adolph, Doctor Fights, The, Eyes Aloft, First in the Air, Free Company, The, Green Valley, USA, Hasten the Day, It's the Navy, Keep 'em Rolling, Labor for Victory, Man Behind the Gun, The, Men, Machines, and Victory, Not for Glory, Passport for Adams, Pursuit of Peace, Reunion, USA, Service to the Front, These Are Our Men, They Call Me Joe, This Is Our Enemy, This Is War, Treasury Hour, Treasury Star Parade, Uncle Sam, Way We Were, The, We Deliver the Goods, Wings of Destiny, Words at War, and You Can't Do Business With Hitler.

Words at War is available at <u>Roman & Littlefield</u>, for which the book's publisher Scarecrow is an imprint. At \$87, however, I'd be hard pressed to recommend it. Instead, visit Amazon and find it new for less than \$12 new or less than \$10 used.

The Radario begins with a confused murmur of voices, for the meeting has not yet begun, and the members are chatting. They are interrupted by the sharp tapping of the president's gavel. After strenuous effort the president quiets the ladies, although Mrs. Somerville and Mrs. Green are reluctant to cease gossiping. When silence prevails Mrs. Bigsbee makes a flowery speech and concludes by introducing "Lieutenant Timothy Donoghue, who will speak to us on the subject: "Our Traffic Rules and Their Regulations."

Will Go on Air November 21

Well, well—the scene that follows—the Irish lieutenant being incessantly interrupted by the members of the Women's Civic Improvement Club—is handled with a gentle satire that would crack a smile in the dullest face on this old earth.

"Oh, What's the Use?" has already been turned over to Helen Schuster Martin, who is directing the Crosley Radarians this winter, and will be presented from WLW on the evening of November 21. The beautifully melodious voice of Slack Barrett will be cast as Lieutenant Donoghue, and Mrs. Martin is sure to select the other voices with greatest care.

When it came to the second prize winner, our choice fell upon a beautiful and uplifting story of Christmas Eve. It is a Radario entitled "The Drum," written by Frances D. Singler, 624 New York Life Building, Minneapolis, Minnesota. There are only four people in the cast: Nell Harvey, an apartment house dweller; John Harvey, her husband; Ted Martin, her young brother; The Tramp.

But there is a soul to this little twentyminute Radio play, and we hope to get the spirit of the thing over to the audience

on our WLW program on Christmas Eve. The third prize went to Emabel Wesboyd, Route 4, Box 95, Bakersfield, California, the title of the Radario being "Tell a Woman." We have not yet decided upon the date of its presentation. But even apart from these three there are a score of manuscripts cleverly prepared, and worthy of Radio presentation. Thus a new problem presents itself. Shall we continue to stimulate the writing of Radarios? Powell Crosley, Jr., president of the Crosley Manufacturing Company, owner of Station WLW, answers in the affirmative.

Mr. Crosley knows full well that many an aspiring young author would be only too willing to submit his manuscripts gratis in return for the great publicity that he would derive from their presentation by Radio. However, Mr. Crosley is not thinking of the broadcasting of this winter or next, but Radio of the future, and in that future there must be a definite aim toward constructive programming. 



And just like that another trip around the sun is quickly winding down for all of us. If you're reading this upon publication, I hope your holiday season is going swimmingly. It has certainly been an exciting year in the world of old-time radio.

2023 kicked off with an announcement that Radio Archives was going to begin a five-year subscription to release their entire library, whether the recordings had been released commercially or not. Enough people signed up that it went forward and the first batch of 600 shows arrived in April. On the first of December the most recent batch was sent out, marking 5,400 programs for subscribers this calendar year.

Just recently, Carl Amari finished a KickStarter to release the entire run of *Bold Venture* from Ziv's personal discs. The effort is highlighted elsewhere in this issue.

The Radio Archive subscription required a minimum number of subscribers at \$60 per month (now \$120) and *Bold Venture* required pledges totaling more than \$70,000, substantial sums for most hobbyists. Yet both came to fruition, proving there is still money in this hobby for the right projects, despite the amount of free content (of varying quality) available in various places. Both of these projects will provide a nearly endless number of hours of enjoyment for hobbyists!

Sadly, we also said goodbye to two pillars in the community, Jack French and Frank Rosin. Both left indelible marks on this hobby and will be long remembered.







Real street names in Cairo were used in the series, Rocky Jordan. The series was actually set in Cairo, where each week, cafe owner, Jordan (an American played by Jack Moyles), got involved in some kind of mystery or adventure. CBS carried the series from 10/31/1948 to 09/10/1950 and from 06/27/1951 to 08/22/1951. You would think old-time radio drama was already dead at that point, and it was by the late 1940s and early 1950s due to television. **Rocky Jordan**, however, is another example of the high quality shows that were still being produced by a major network. **Suspense** and **Yours Truly, Johnny Dollar** are widely regarded as the last "really good shows" from the "golden age" that lasted until 1962, but there were others that at least made their mark in the 1950s. One of the favorites among OTR fans was **Gunsmoke starring William Conrad**. **Gunsmoke** lasted well into the mid 1950s and turned into a television series. Meantime, more than 100 **Rocky Jordan** programs were produced. The show was mostly sustained (unsponsored) through this part of its run. CBS network invested many thousand of dollars into production of this show until at least Del Monte and Wrigley's Gum finally became the sponsor.

MESSAGE FROM BOB...

Looking ahead, 30 years from now, I don't expect to still be in the old-time radio business! Next year though, marks 50 years since I, as a teenager, started this business and hobby without any aspirations as to where it would lead.

In the process in my past (originally inspired by past Detroit personality, Warren Pierce), I learned how to generate my own content as well as host, DJ, Engineer and do whatever else was needed in radio all while marketing and promoting OTR and teaching others.

I celebrate "the classics" as <u>present day</u> entertainment, rather than merely nostalgia. Today, it is also my privledge to host Radio Vault every week on the nearby Henry Ford College station, WHFR-FM. Without high quality content and the support of a lot of friends today, I couldn't do that.

I started **Radio Vault** back in the early 1980s by invitation from the late Bill Bragg on his then fledgling satellite **Yesterday U.S.A. Superstation** out of Dallas. Allegedly, I was the first "live" host besides Bill himself. **YUSA** is still going strong today and so am I (with your support).

The present day radio business or OTR world is not what it was when I started, yet the best of the old shows which I have marketed "forever," still sound as fresh today (thanks to technology) as they did when they were still being produced.
