RADIO'S COMEDY SHOWS.
Perhaps one of the most remembered comedy shows on radio
was the FRED ALLEN SHOW, which
was later known as Allen's

Alley. Fred had a voice that no matter what he said, he received a laugh. Some immitator has used his voice for many commercials of radio and television, after his death and still the audience loves it. ALLEN'S ALLEY was a report, of life in a humorous point of view from many different backgrounds——all of which live in New York City. There was a Southerner, an Irishman, an Upstater, and a Jewish lady. Senator Claghorn was a Southerner, and. "wouldn't even go to Yankee Stadium unless Dixie Walker is playing..."

Minerva Pious portrayed Pansy Nussbaum a Jewish lady who made absolutely no sense of the English language. Nussbaum means 'nut tree' in German. Ajax Cassidy was the Irishman who laughed and made everyone laugh. The upstater was an elderly person who considered Senator Claghorn a foreigner.

Fred Allen attacked the nations problems in a rather humourous manner. Today some of his comments still hold true and here are

just a few:

"When I left New York last week...everybody in New York seemed to be out on strike, the stock market went down, and meat was selling for more than General Motors. Meat was so scarce, the city put up a sign in the lion's cage at the zoo, 'Do not throw meat out to people!"

Fred also attacked his own source of income, Radio, here are just

a few of his most remembered attacks:

"The reason they call radio a medium, is because nothing is well done on it. . A conference of radio executives is a meeting in which a group of men who singly can do nothing; agree collectively that nothing can be done. . A network vice-president is a man who comes into his office every morning and finds a molehill on his desk; he has until five o'clock to make the molehill into a mountain." — THIS COLUMN SUBMITTED BY: TOMMY HARRISON, JR. 7015 Crystal Valley Road, Little Rook. The year 1974 has taken many of the radio performers and actors. September 29th 1974...60 year old radio sports announcer Van Patrick died following broadcast of Notre Dame-Purdue game in South Bend. Mr. Patrick was currently sports director for Mutual Broadcasting System. He started his radio career at WHBF radio in Rock Island, ILL. On November 11, 1974 ... 74 year old comedy actress Jane Ace died. She and husband Goodman Ace headlined in radio's EASY ACES for over 20 years, On December 15, 1974...89 year old humorist, Harry Hirshfield died at St. Clare's Hospital in New York. Hirshfield is most remembered for his jokes on the weekly radio show "CAN YOU TOP THIS?". He also wrote many humourous articles for national magazines. He was also an excellent cartoonist. I felt the effects of the very sudden death of JACK BENNY on December 27, 1974. Jack was 80 years of age. Jack visited our area in 1967 for the anniversary (first) of the Duluth Minnesota Arena-Auditorium. He played golf while here, talked about his investments and lots of other topics of general interest. Though he was a famous man, his manners were Mr. Benny had played always down-to-earth, Prior to the Arena-Auditorium the local vaudville houses before he became famous. He was still using his real name then. He also appeared once at the Lyceum Theater with a song-and-dance revue that included some stagestruck Duluthians. And speaking of the Lyceum Theater in Duluth...it is no more. This beautiful building was torn down a year or so ago to make room for a parking lot. I can remember the first "talkie" I saw at the Lyceum. It was "HELLS ANGELS" with Jean Harlow, Ben Lyon and James Hall.during the World War II years I lived in Duluth and attended many live variety shows on the stage of the Lyceum. EDITORS NOTE: I recently got my copy of "ARKANSASAIRWAVES" and found it very interesting. So interesting, in fact, that once I got to reading it I hated to put it down. Book goes way back to the crystal set days. This is a beautiful HARD COVER book.

REVIEW OF "ARKANSAS AIRWAVES" By: Ray Poindexter. Published October 1974.

For an industry built on communications radio broadcasting has been remiss in keeping track of its own history. Amazingly little can be found even at this day on the early agonies of getting the radio broadcast system started in this country. Pioneers in envineering kept some notes but few pictures. The program and sales people apparently ignored the art of writing or keeping information they had generated in the day-to-day work.

For the first time an exhaustive history of early radio in a state has come out in book form. "ARKANSAS AIRWAVES" by Ray Poindexter has just been published. It details the full history of nearly every early station and influence in radio broadcasting in the state of Arkansas. Station by station it details how it was founded, when, and how it operated. Nuch trivia must be waded through to get the action, but the author has accumulated an amazing amount of details on who sang what in Paragould radio in 1926, et al to give you an idea of what early programs were like.

That such an accurate and far ranging story could come out of a state like Arkansas (my native habitat) is surprising. If it can be done there why has not someone done work in other states where the action was most vigorous and glamorous? So Ray Poindexter, still a working radio man in Jacksonville, Arkansas, deserves much credit for digging up through interviews, old news files and many sources such a compendium of how broadcasting really began in what many regard as a remote part of the country.

The parade of history in this state must parallel that in others. So this book can be matched with what went on in Kansas, Ohio, Montana, New Jersey if an energetic writer would dig it up. The book also covers interesting anecdotes on U. S. Radio History in general. A reader is surprised at the ingenuity and variety of the radio programming developed by these early stations, with the resources of the community. Too bad some present day dreary "format" stations do not pick up the lesson. If the book has a minus it is the absence in most places of why stations died, or station owners and managers departed, or other action taking place behind the scenes. Some of this was probably due to the loss of early history and the passing of the people from the stage. But even if you are not an Arkansawyer you can get a laugh and a tear in reading this notable publication of a dedicated writer. By: C. A. Cisler- Former Manager of KTHS, Hot Springs, ARK.
