A number of years ago four young teenagers, with one of their mothers, piled into a then new 1939 Buick and headed for Chicago. It wasnot a long trip from Hammond, Indiana, but it always seemed a chore as in those days there were no super-highways and the trip was spent waiting on one train and stop-light after another.

This turned out to be a never-forgotten experience for a group of young lads with rather dubious musical talents, who played under the not too imaginative name of "The Hillbilly Band". The collection of musical instruments were as unsophisticated as their title, namely: harmonica, guitar, Jew's harp and crock jug. The occasion was an invitation to appear on a live radio amateur hour show, broadcasting from Chicago.

One of the biggest snags encountered was that for some reason the tunes that were rehearsed were not allowed on the air (we never did fully understand why), and a substitute song was played. It turned out to be "You are my Sunshine", which at that time was being beat to death throughout the country by anyone who could carry a tune.

Needless to say all the friends and relatives listened to the radio that night, with the announcer urging all that listened to vote for the performer of their choice. The voting was done by post-card.

As in any group of young fellows, it seems that one is a little more enterprising than the rest. At his suggestion each bought a dollar's worth of post cards and saw that they were mailed, voting for their group. This was no mean task, as back in those days you got a hundred cards for a dollar.

The actual tabulation of the voting was not made public, but the group probably received exactly 400 votes. Anyway, they were not declared winners.

As the show that night was reserved for the talents of young people only, a prize was awarded to everybody who appeared. Those who weren't declared winners were given a less expensive Gruen watch with an inscription on the back.

I don't know what happened to the watches the other fellows were awarded, but in my box of souveniers can be found all that's left of an old Gruen watch, the back, with this inscription:

"THE ROAD OF LIFE" told the intensely human and true-to-life story of a young surgeon's struggle for success and happiness. Jim Brent was the doctor who grew up in the steel-mill district of South Chicago, Since his intership, Dr. Brent had devoted himself to surgical practice, in which he had proved himself as an expert, He was a member of the staff of City Hospital and was assistant to Dr. Parsons, eminent surgeon and favorite doctor of Chicago's elite. Besides developunder Dr. Parsons' tutelage into a nationally prominent surgeon, Dr. Brent was very popular with his associates. Jim's young brother, Fred Brent, had caused him Jim a great deal of inconvenience and worry. At one time Fred was mysteriously shot, and it was only through kindness of Jim's good friend, Helen Gowan, that Jim succeeded in covering up the incident. Helen permitted Fred to remain at her apartment until he recovered. Fred's gratitude later proved embarrassing to both Jim and Helen. Then in a heated argument Fred accidently shot Jim in the right hand. The injury placed Jim's future as a surgeon in grave doubt. The incident had caused him to postpone his marriage to his schoolday sweetheart, Mary Holt. Mary did not approve of the postponement and decided there would be NO marriage at all if not now. Meanwhile, Jim had opened his old office in the basement of the Bront home in South Chicago for practise...and ON and ON and ON!

"THE ROAD OF LIFE" was a morning 'soaper' on NBC and an afternoon program on CBS. The show was written by Irna Phillips who also authored "The Guiding Light" and "The Woman In White". Miss Phillips was a Chicago girl. Director of the show was HOWARD KEEGAN. Before taking over as director of The Road Of Life he was a member of the NBC production department in Chicago. He also directed The Guiding

Light and The Woman In White."

DX BY: D. MARTIN

During the early 30s I was an avid radio listener and DX'er. On Saturday nights I could often tune in (on our Stromberg-Carlson) where we lived around the Great Lakes, the NBC Station in San Francisco, KPO. That city was the center of radio programming for the west coast.

After midnight reception was good, and I could enjoy "Pacific Moonlight" a program of quiet organ and guitar music with Paul Carson at the organ. There was also "Carefree Carnival" a variety show which featured Heredith Wilson's Orchestra (he was head of the studio music department at KPO) Vera Vague (who later appeared in many movies) doing an act much like Gracie Fields; Cliff Nazarro, (who later made a record in which he was labeled "Jack Benny's double-talking comedian) singing and getting laughs with his double-talk --- he too later appeared in some movies and later ended up in a mental hospital, There was Charlie Marshall and His Boys doing western songs, playing and singing along the lines of The Son's Of The Pioneers.

Several years later I migrated to San Francisco, and used to regullarly visit the NEC studios, which were at that time on one floor of a Sutter Street Office Building, with very limited audience space. By that time the "Carefree Carnival was sponsored by a short-lived brand of cigarettes called "Kentucky Winners." The program was broadcast nation wide and earlier on Saturday nights at 5:30 Pacific time. Studio audiences had become part of radio by that time, so the broadcast was done from the Auditorium of the Women's City Club. I still have an admission ticket to one of those broadcasts.

Not too long afterward---Hollywood became the radio programming capital as emphasis shifted to screen stars for radio programs... and most of the radio personalities went there too. Charlie Marshall got himself a job as a Farm Editor of KFEK in Sacramento and until the late 50°s used to broadcast an early morning farm program where he spun records of country music alternated with farm news. He retired about 1960.




Anthony, 68, was best known for the show's opening line, "Mr. Anthony, I have a problem" and his frequent plea: "Don't touch the microhone."

He was stricken while eating dinner at the Sheraton Palace Hotel in San Francisco, and was dead on arrival at a hospital.

FRAN VAN HARDESVELDT, 59, radio producer and director, died June 29 of a heart attack in Methodist Hospital, Houston.

He produced and directed "The Aldrich Family" from 1939 to 1951 and the "Rail-road Hour, "The Great Gildersleeve", "Father Knows Best", and the "Roy Rogers Show".

CHESTER STRATTON, 57, actor, died July 8 in Los Angeles. On radio he played in the "O'Neills," "Pepper Young's Family," "Ace Of the Airways," and "Lux Radio Theater." He has been appearing on TV dramatic shows from New York.

TELL A FRIEND ABOUT RHS & RADIO DIAL!

(From Autumn 1968 RADIO DIAL) By: ROBERT H. POWELL

Charlie Ingersoll, Director of the Radio Historical Society and Editor of "Radio Dial", who, incidently, is my cousin, once owned and operated Radio Station WXLT in a small city in Northeastern Minnesota called "Ely", which you could visit on your way to the Canadian Border as it is not too far away from our friendly neighbor to the North.

After a year of planning and building, WXLT was finally "on the air". It was in the year 1948 when cousin Charles began broadcasting activity from his small station and, it was during this time that really GOOD RADIO PROGRAMMING all over

the country was coming to am end.

This, of course, presented quite a problem to keep listeners interested and it took a lot of original ideas to fill a 16-hour day with programs. It seemed that the radio listener then was not as interested in the "phonograph record and talk shows" as he is today, so WXLT featured such home grown shows as "Native Tunes", "A Guy, A Gal and Two Turntables", "Hal's House", "Miscollaneous" with Miss Elaine and "Ask The Kiddies" and others. They had a remote broadcast, each day (6 days a week) from Matty's Bar and Grill, in downtown Ely, which was owned and operated by a fellow by the name of Matty Kapsch. Charlie had a phone line installed along with the permanent remote equipment for the programs from there which came at 5:45 P.M. and at 10:15 P.M. The first show was primarily "dreamy dinner music" and the last show featured the more vigorous and "peppy" kind of music and this last show had all the "whoopty doo" sounds in the background. These remote shows became very popular with the listener in range of WKLT, as they received requests from such other cities as Cook, Hibbing, Grand Rapids and International Falls, They got letters from as far south as McGregor a small town in Aitkin County.

Matty hired organists to play in his lounge from where these remotes originated and the first entertainer to be hired was Glenn Brooks (a fine gentlemen from the state of Illinois), followed by Cy Perkins, Tony Lonetto and a husband and wife team named Tommy and Mary Thompson, Tommy played the organ, piano and solovox

and wife Mary vocalized, on occasion,

It happened that Tommy and Mary were on the 5:45 P.M. show on that Autumn afternoon in 1948, when the "murder" took place and this is what happned. Just as the show was coming to a close, Matty entered the lounge with a wooden yardstick in his hand and, as we all are susceptible to "urges" we can't explain, Matty being no exception, he slapped the yardstick flatways on a formica-topped table, making a very loud "crack" --- much like a gunshot. At that instant, Mary gave out with a piercing scream and Tommy shut off the remote equipment. Result: Dead silence on the line to the station.

All of a sudden the telephones began to ring at the station...people wanted to know what had happened. Of course, we didn't know and could give them no information at all.

A gal by the name of Mae Sletten, who was the telephone operator, called WXLT and said "What the dickens happened up there...this switchboard lit up like a Christmas tree?" A listener put in a call to Chief Of Police Douglas Nankervis, telling him there had been a murder at Matty's and, with his assistant Mr. Joe Markovich, rushed to the place, siren blowing.

When they entered the bar, they expected to see a body on the floor and blood spattered on the ceiling. Well, you can imagine their amazement upon finding no evidence of the "crime", as Matty and the other occupants of the place were in excellent health. In fact, didn't know what it was all about, as he hadn't heard

how the broadcast had ended,

A fellow from Ely, who was listening on his car radio on his way to Virginia. heard all this and his curiosity caused him to turn around and return to Ely, as he was just 5 miles away.

The next day the station had a caller in the person of Mr, John Keenan, John, whom I assume to be manager of the telephone company, warned cousin Charles and the gang not to try a trick like that again.

Keenan said that if all the phones were removed from their hooks at the same time, it would burn out the switchboard. I guess they took this warning to heart for no further chaos occured such as that on that eventful afternoon.

Well, Charles and his crew found out they had a lot of listeners, that day,

without going to the expense of hiring Mr. Hooper to give WXIT a rating.

WXLT was replaced by WELY, but I am sure that it will never be forgotten when the series of events that led to the "Murder At Matty's" are rehashed over a cup of coffee by some of the old timers in a cafe in downtown Ely, Minnesota. This is one crime you won't read about in True Detective Mysteries. If you want the facts, just ask COUSIN CHARLES INGERSOLL----he'll tell you! (RHP)

MEMBER HAROLD A BROWN SAYS: I suppose my favorite programs were detective stories. I never missed the THIN MAN - who could forget Nick and Nora and their sexy goodnight routine. Also I liked BIG TOWN, THE FAT MAN, THE SHADOW, GANGBUSTERS, NERO WOLF, MARTIN KANE, COUNTER SPY, and others.

I'll bet most everyone has forgotten about a short-lived program that came on in the 40's called THE TUCKER FAMILY. It was a patriotic story about an average American family doing its part on the home front for the war effort. Also there was another short-lived program called HOT COPY which was a newspaper story similar to BIG TOWN. There was an adventure story broadcast out of Chicago called THE EXPLOR-ERS CLUB. The stories were mostly about adventures in Africa and South America. They were supposed to be true stories told by the members of the EXPLORERS CLUB. I also remember a quiz program called THE CAMEL QUIZ SHOW, The contestants had to answer so many questions before reaching a second level of harder questions. They were then called Lemac which was Camel spelled backwards. Bob Hawk was the quizmaster, and if all of the questions were answered a money award was given. But if the contestants lost a certian number of cartons of Camels were sent in their name to a certain service camp or Military Hospital selected for honor each week. It was my favorite quiz program. Does anyone recall it?

I'll never forget those delightful poems and stories read by TED MALONE with mood music played by ROSA RIO at the organ. I wonder if anyone recalls Ted's annual reading of the story, WHY THE BELLS RANG ON CHRISTMAS DAY? Also two religious programs I enjoyed were THE GREATEST STORY EVER TOLD - reproductions of bible stories - sponsored by the Goodyear Tire and Rubber Co., and THE LITTLE CHURCH IN THE WILDWOOD with Sarah and Josiah Hopkins and their horse Dan. Josiah was the pastor of the little church. As I recall this was only a 15 minute program but a very delightful one. Perhaps I have stirred the memory of some of the readers of
