IN EVERY profession there are some women who crave success and its attendant fame to such a degree that they are willing to make almost any sacrifice to attain it. They are even willing to make the supreme sacrifice for it. The story is not new. Fame is the ever glowing candle which never loses its glamour to those who would achieve it. Once achieved, it glows not half so brightly. The little country lass, lured to the city by illusions of the stage, is ambitious enough to lose herself in order to attain jewels, cars, the worshipping adulation she imagines in her innocent naivete to exist for every show girl. Never a thought of hard work, long hours, heartless cruelty. And although radio doesn't offer the sparkling, teasing image of thousands of eyes radiant and rapt upon her alone, as does the stage, radio does have its appeal in the mistaken idea that radio stars do little, earn much and lead very thrilling lives.

With such illusions, these girls rush to the city. The majority of them are swallowed by the crush and competition of the sometimes heartbreaking profession. Some win a start. Some never do. Suppose a lovely child, intent upon the stage, wins her start by, losing her moral ideals. I have seen it happen time (Continued on Back Page)

WLS' Old-time Music

Older folk of families tuned to WLS, Chicago, do stay up until 11:30 p. m. (EST) Saturday nights to hear WLS' famous Barn Dance (10,382 out of 10,552); young folk likewise do enjoy the program (8,640 said yes); an outstanding, almost unanimous majority do want old-time music in preference to jazz (10,491 wanted old time music; 43 wanted jazz; 18 asked for both).

So went the response to questions asked of the WLS Barn Dance air theater at 11:30 o'clock on the night of Saturday, December 17. Four questions in all were asked, the fourth being: "Which five acts on the Barn Dance do you enjoy the most?"

Barn Dance do you enjoy the most?"
Interesting is the result of the survey which brought 10,552 letters from every state, every province in Canada. There can be no doubt that older folk stay up late Saturday nights to tune in the barn dance program which has been broadcast consistently for eight and a half years by WLS. Surprising is the fact that 83 per cent of young people favor the program. Amazing is the heavy demand for old-time music rather than jazz. Program builders at network offices, individual stations and advertising agencies may believe otherwise, but the WLS public wants the old folk songs, not the latest releases from Broadway shows.

Favorite fifteen of forty-four WLS acts and singles, according to survey, in order, are: Mac and Bob, Uncle Ezra, Maple City George Goebel, Three Little Maids, Linda Four, Arkie, Ridge Runners, Red Foley, Parker, Max Terhune, Spareribs, Lula Bell, Gene Autry, Jack Holden, Hal O'Halloran.

Eighteen states gave more than one hundred replies to WLS questionnaire, namely: Illinois, 2,958 (Chicago and sophisticated Gook County supplying 1,384 of these); Wisconsin, 1,205; Pennsylvania, 857; Indiana, 559; Minnesota, 464; Michigan, 376; Oklahoma, 307; Ohio, 302; Texas, 280; Nebraska, 201; Kansas, 198; Iowa, 189; Missouri, 185; Wyoming, 167; New York, 166; Colorado, 157; West Virginia, 113; North Dakota, 107.

Phil Cook's Circus

Phil Cook, long absent from the air waves, will go "Four Hawaiians" Joe Cook eleven better Saturday, January 28, on his return to the air with a full hour circus program requiring fifteen characters—all to be played by Phil Cook. Program, to be heard at 6:45 p. m. (EST) over an NBC-WEAF network, is built on musicomedy plan, has ten scenes. Latter include the circus parade, various acts in the ring, backstage incidents and high-wire acts.

Cook not only will act the fifteen roles but direct the orchestra and sing all the songs. Versatile actor-singer Cook likewise wrote the whole show, all the songs, both words and music.

CBS Moves Downey

Morton Downey, Columbia whistling high tenor farmed out once weekly to the National Broadcasting Company, will broadcast his non-commercial programs over a Columbia-WABC network on a new schedule beginning the week of January 29. His songs will be heard Thursdays at 10:45 p. m. and Saturdays at 10 p. m. (EST). Added appearances will be made on the Columbia Guest Revues Mondays at 10 p. m. Tenor Downey is kept very busy filling a number of vaudeville engagements in the vicinity of New York City.

Germans Twist Dial

German listeners desire more light music, appreciate classics but want few classical programs, would cut down over-abundance of political talks but would like to have more interesting sessions of the Reichstag broadcast, possibly from records, and also ask more sporting news by capable announcers.

A survey of German radio fans was made recently by Berlin branch of a radio dealers' association to convince the government that changes were necessary. The German government, studying its Reich broadcasting service, has decided that radio, properly used, can be made a powerful force for nationalism; has announced a reform; will give the public part of what it wants.

New plan: Stations shall build national feeling, cement the natural classifications of society, respect Christianity, spread German culture, place emphasis on educational and cultural programs, permit only the purest of German to be spoken at all times, render good music preeminently and give light music when time permits. Strict censorship is to be maintained, and while emphasis is to be placed on nationalism, nothing offensive to other nations will be permitted.

While German idealistic plan proceeds, the proposed shakeup of French broadcasting is indefinitely postponed due to fall of Premier Herriot, whose cabinet wished to impose a new radio tax to improve programs. Present French system of both governmental and private station operation is reported unsatisfactory.

Cantor on Road

Eddie Cantor, who soon will leave New York City for a vaudeville tour, will not permit stage appearances to interfere with his Sunday night broadcasts over a coastto-coast network at 8 p. m. EST.

Cantor will return to the NBC Times Square Studio in New York City each week.

Later, when the stage tour carries the comedian out of range of New York, arrangemens will be made for him to broadcast from the road each Sunday night as usual.

The vaudeville engagements, in which Cantor will be assisted by his old friend and fellow artist, George Jessel, are scheduled for the following cities:

More Watts for WJZ

Pioneer Manhattan station WJZ has increased its output sixty-six and two-thirds per cent; now radiates 50,000 watts instead of 30,000 watts of power employed since veteran transmitter was replaced and moved to Boundbrook, N. J., in 1925. Step up is expected to increase service range of station, one of the National Broadcasting Company's two basic network "keys," by twenty-five per cent.

History of WJZ: Began broadcasting on regular schedule in an upper story of Westinghouse Electric and Manufacturing Company's plant in Newark, N. J., on October 7, 1921, with 500-watt transmitter in shack on roof. Studio consisted of one cloakroom draped with monk's cloth. Station and elaborate studios were installed on sixth floor of Aeolian Hall, New York City, and remained there until 1925 removal to present location. Studios removed from Aeolian Hall to 711 Fifth Avenue when NBC was organized, took over station, opened its own headquarters.

Bahama's Mike Bow

The Bahama Islands, linked to the North American mainland with a new radio telephone service, celebrated with a broadcast from Nassau on Sunday, January 22, over the Columbia-WABC network. Notables gathered in Fort Montague Beach Hotel in Nassau on picturesque Island of New Providence, were announced by Ted Husing who flew from Miami, Fla., to Nassau for the event, greeted America over the new short-wave facilities of the American Telephone and Telegraph Company. Among the greeters: the Hon. Bede E. H. Clifford, governor of the Bahama Islands, introduced by William S. Paley, president of the Columbia Broadcasting System. Concert music by the hotel's orchestra completed the program ballyhooing the airphone connection of dry America with the wet Bahamas.

Air Triangle Club

The Benjamin Moore Triangle Club, bringing Lew White's organ music and Betty Moore's decorating talks to listeners on an NBC-WEAF network each week, will be inaugurated Friday, February 3, at 4:15 p. m. EST.

Lew White, whose melodies will fill a major portion of the fifteen minute periods, is one of the best known musicians on the air. From his New York City organ studios, where the Benjamin Moore Triangle Club broadcasts will originate, have come many distinctive and original recitals of organ music.

Covering the Inauguration

Fifteen microphone positions, five mobile short-wave transmitters in the air and on the ground, thirty-two engineers, ten announcers and twelve observers will be utilized by the National Broadcasting Company to cover the inauguration of President-elect Roosevelt.

The broadcast, the most elaborate of its kind ever attempted, will give a complete picture of the colorful ceremonies, from the time the President-elect leaves his hotel until he returns to the White House as President of the United States. Networks and short-wave will take the broadcast all over the world.

Plans as now drawn up call for use of two air positions, one in the dirigible Akron and one in the Army's radio laboratory plane, although final approval by the Army and Navy Departments is still pending.

In addition to the short-wave transmitters in the air, the NBC short-wave car will follow Gov. Roosevelt in the parade, and two announcers equipped with "pack" transmitters, strapped to their backs, will mingle with the crowds on the streets and in the corridors of the Capitol. The "air" will be switched back and forth from one position to another as the occasion demands.

This degree of mobility will enable the announcers to report every phase of the inaugural, no matter where it may occur. Huge parabolic microphones along the line of march also will pick up the music of the bands and the cheering of the great throng which is certain to crowd Washington.

Why Is There?

"Why Is There Poverty in a World of Plenty?" asks Sir Henry Strakosch, emment British banker and economist, as his topic for trans-Atlantic broadcast from London on Sunday, January 29, from 12:30 London on Sunday, since 1895 has been closely connected with South African industrial and particularly gold mining development, represented South Africa at International Financial Conference in Brussels in 1920, and at many League of Nation assemblies.

G. B. Shaw Weakens

Erratic Irish writer George Bernard Shaw not only will visit the United States of America he has shunned for years, but he will appear as guest of honor at a meeting of the Academy of Political Science, make an address; and his address will be broadcast from coast to coast by the radio he has pooh-poohed in the past. An NBC network stands ready to catch Mr. Shaw's sarcastic remarks.

Controversy-minded George Bernard is now engaged in a 'round the world cruise on the Empress of Britain, which is scheduled to dock at the Port of New York on April 11. The white-bearded sage of satire will be seen that night at the Academy meeting only by members and their guests; will be heard immediately by all tuners in who care to listen; will dominate all motion picture screens as soon as newsreels can make it possible.

Shaw's only appearance and broadcast was aranged invitation of Alanson B. Houghton, president of the Academy and former ambassador to the Court of St. James, St. James. Semi-annual meeting of





Music in the Air

PREPARE yourself for a stunt!

A tone never before heard on your radio will be broadcast next Wednesday evening during Howard Barlow's program (H p. m. EST, CBS-WABC). It will be F above high C, sung in full voice by a tenor, Nino Martini. Such a tone is rarely reproduced except by a few coloratura sopranos.

The arias which are scored up to F above high C are "Credea Si Misera . . . Ella e Tremante" (sung as one) by Arturo in Bellini's "I Puritani." The opera is full of engaging melodies, carrying an insipid libretto of the war of Puritan against Cavalier, in which the heroine

loses and regains her reason several times. Like "Norma," the music has insuperable difficulties. I am told it has never been sung from beginning to end in the original keys, since the death in 1854 of Rubini (for whom it was written), until Martini revived it at Milan some eight years ago.

Martini, a Fine Singer

However that may be, you should also prepare yourself for some fine singing!

The presence of this twenty-eight year old gentleman from Verona, two evenings a week on the Columbia networks, has occasioned considerable comment among professional musicians. For he has much to commend him, in addition to his range of two and a half octaves. His is a clear, "liquid" voice, ideally suited to the microphone. And the radio audience has grown to appreciate the instrument and his artistry.

Signor Martini sang boy soprano parts in local churches of Verona, where his father was custodian of the legendary tomb of Romeo and Juliet. In the unromantic horse-yard that surrounds the tomb (which resembles a worn-out watering trough), the young boy became one of the town's best horsemen. His press story relates that music interested him only because of the poetic significance of singing, guitar in hand, before the moonlit tomb.

His voice was "discovered" by Zenatello and his wife, Maria Gay, who seem to have spent much time since their retirement in search of talent. They are credited with having brought Lily Pons to world attention. She will soon fill her General Electric engagement, now twice postponed.

Martini studied with the Zenatellos and made his first operatic appearance as the Duke in "Rigoletto," the role of his American debut with the Philadelphia Grand Opera Company. He has sung many recitals abroad. In the movies he appeared with his friend, Maurice Chevalier, in "Paramount on Parade." And occasionally he has sung on radio programs; of late, regularly with Howard Barlow every Wednesday and Friday night. Along with Bellini's stunt, he promises for this Wednesday, Serrano's "La Cancion del Olivido," "The Hills of Home," and Drigo's familiar Serenade from "Les Millions d'Arlequin."

Listen, and you will return to the radio often when Martini sings.

Our Guest: Lotte Lehmann

OUR guest Sunday afternoon or, the New York Philharmonic-Symphony program is to be the distinguished and sensitive artist, Lotte Lehmann, who will sing Eva at Bayreuth next summer, when Toscanini conducts "Die Meistersinger." Mme. Lehmann, by her penetration into the masterpieces of song literature, won immediately

upon her appearance in this country the avor of those connoisseurs whose good opinion is worth having.

To hear her on a program with Bruno Walter is a rare privilege. The two have much in common as artists. Both are characterized by an expansive gemutlichkeit; both mold the music, in which they excel as interpreters, with loving care. Singer and conductor are alike masters of the art of mood communication.

They represent with a singular completeness and authenticity what has been called, for want of a more sharply indicative term, the great central tradition of German musical culture. Both are steeped unmistakably in that tradition.

It is easy to recognize its influence upon them, and yet it is unsafe to limit the nature of that tradition by definition—and, no doubt, foolish to imply that it is all-sufficing.

In certain instances, however, when the music to be played is a product of the Tradition, which began with Beethoven and has found its end, apparently, in Strauss... what a happy coincidence if creator and interpreters use a common tongue! It is just that which Mme. Lehmann and Mr. Walter do. They have a fundamental identity of outlook, a fundamental sympathy for such music. That is why we are fortunate to hear them in "Divinites du Styx" from Gluck's "Alceste" and "Ocean, thou mighty monster" from von Weber's "Oberon."

"In the Firing Line"

HE'S always pryin' into corners. I ain't botherin' him; why should he be botherin' me?" That is an orchestra player's reaction to Arturo Toscanini, as told in an article, "In the Firing Line of an Orchestra," by the late Arthur Pimwroth, and printed in the January 7 issue of the Saturday Evening Post.

This article is brought to your attention because there is more truth in it than in most of those that are written about musicians. If you can find the issue around the house, read it. You will laugh, and you will learn the typical orchestra man's attitude toward the conductor and the public.



Just quiet, sober gentlemen with a flair for plumpness You know, Eddie and Ralph have their pictures taken in these poses because they can't help it. They're gripped with an innate desire for craziness. whether for the benefit of a radio audience of millions, or just their own amusement.

East and Dumke—Jokesters

MID-AFTERNOON. Chicago. Cars shooting up and down Michigan Boulevard. People, hundreds of them, briskly walking. Traffic as usual on the Fifth Avenue of Chicago. Suddenly a huge fat fellow darts out from a building. He makes straight for the middle of the street, holds up his hand to stop traffic and emits a terrible shriek. "Hey, hey!" he yells to the world at large, "Eddie and Ralph are canned again!" He jumps up and down making a fearful outcry and a very funny scene.

Before a cop could reach Ralph Dumke, a man dashes out of the crowd, seizes Ralph and pulls him to the curb. "I think I can use you. For radio. Can you get a teammate?" Hereupon Ralph nearly collapsed. He dumbly pointed to the other 350 pounds on the curb... Eddie East. "He's," he stuttered, "he's my partner."

SO Eddie and Ralph walked right back into the same building from which they had just been kicked out. It's very amusing for the boys to remember those few weeks that preceded their being fired from radio. That is, it's amusing now, several years later. Eddie and Ralph howl with unconstrained laughter, living it all over again . . . in memory. But then, at that time, it was the final poke in the face. After much wild scheming to get themselves on radio, the pair had landed a berth on a Chicago station. The job paid \$35 a week each . . . for fifteen programs per twenty-four hours. Fifteen programs a day, mind you! The boys were billed as "The Harmony Boys," say at 8 o'clock in the morning. At 8:30 they might be announced as "The Fat Boys." Perhaps by noon it was time for them to go on the air as "Eddie and Ralph," or "Dumke and East" or "Five Hundred Pounds of Harmony." Try and think up fifteen different billings to use on these two. They had to. Days were spent in running in and out of the studio, putting on another program every few minutes. Nights were spent in tearing their hair and thinking up new programs. And then, after eight weeks of frantic and intense effort, after the boys clapped each other on the back, encouraged each other, and told themselves they were getting on . . they got the boot! Canned! Fired!

No wonder Ralph became a wild man and cried out to an unjust world on Michigan Boulevard. Fortunate for them both that Ralph was seized with a wild desire to proclaim this comedy to any and all who would listen. "Can you imagine it," laughs Eddie, "We were sore as pups."

IT'S been eleven years since Eddie East and Ralph Dumke first met. For eleven years, the two have been pals and buddies, inseparable companions. Both are jolly and funny and rather irresponsible "huge mountains of flesh." Both have laughing eyes, kind faces, easy manners, untroubled dispositions. Prone to rough and tumble, they love to play practical jokes together . . . on each other and on others. Both are two big Hoosiers on a perpetual, neverending spree of jokes and mild forms of rowdyism. They look and act like my idea of how another fat man looked and acted . . Falstaff. They've both attempted to

reduce together, and they both retain their

avoirdupois together.

Both led lives that pointed nowhere be-

fore they met each other.

It was back in Bloomington, Indiana, on April 4, 1894, that Mr. East, senior, first surveyed the young arrival in the East family and decided that here was the carrier-on of his law practice. The shadow of the "law" hung over all Eddie's wild young days and he didn't like the idea. Being just a scamp at heart, he ran away at the age of fifteen years and joined a

This was really living. He, Eddie East, was a barker with this exciting combination! After two years, barking lost some of its allure. So he returned home, finished school and read sufficient law in his father's office to be admitted to the Indiana bar. The wanderlust returned. Eddie left home to become an insurance adjuster in Indianapolis, later a salesman of automobile shock

absorbers and finally tires.

Then he took to the stage, singing with a theater orchestra and doubling on the drums. When a better offer came along from Charlie Davis, director of the Ohio Theater Orchestra, giving Eddie a chance to play the banjo, it was snatched up. But when Eddie went to the theater for the first rehearsal, he saw to his surprise another banjo player. Also fat. "What's this, Charlie," said Ed. "You've got a banjo player." "Yes, I know. But I'm going to have two in this band," Charlie

replied.

Ralph looked up at Eddie and said "Hi."

It was the first greeting of two understanding souls. They plunked banjoes together for several months, in the course of which time Eddie found out that "Ralphie" was born in South Bend, Indiana, on July 25, 1899, that he attended grammar and high school and went to Notre Dame, where he studied engineering and sang around. They found out they not only thought they both were pretty swell guys with pretty much the same likes and dislikes, but that they might even get together as a vaudeville

team by themselves.

So they left the band and as "Eddie and Ralph" the boys toured around the country, for some years. They got along all right, acquiring a good vaudeville reputation, but vaudeville was then beginning to lose ground, with talking pictures and radio replacing its appeal. Realizing that the snows of vaudeville's yesterday were today, nothing but slush, Eddie and Ralph, after one broadcast from the stage of a Detroit theater, decided that here was something that looked likely. They returned to Chicago and, after negotiations, procured their radio start that ended in a finish on Michigan Boulevard, which in turn led to a new and this time successful beginning all over again

all over again.

Eddie has given up all ideas of reducing his 250 pound bulk, finally. He and Ralph used to belong to a gym where they worked out regularly but succeeded in working up as well, a voracious appetite that called for steak sandwiches immediately afterward. This got them nowhere. Ralph, however, still goes on a diet regularly every, Monday. He doesn't eat any breakfast at all. By noon he's off the diet and ready, for a seven course luncheon. This goes on, as I say, every Monday, the decision to "really reduce" hitting Ralph hard every, Sunday afternoon.

Playing on the opening bill of Radio City's Music Hall, the boys long more than ever for dear old New York City. Eddie has a home out on Long Island, his seventeen-year-old daughter ("she makes me feel like an old man") goes to school here in the East, and all things considered, the boys wish New York was the home of stockyards instead of Chicago. The boys left New York for the middle west town last fall, but despite their proximity to native Indiana their thoughts turn as Broadway.

Romance Takes the Air

EVERYBODY loves a love story! Invariably the listener pictures himself as the dashing, romantic hero, if he is a man . . . or the beautiful, charming heroine swept off her feet, if she is a woman. One sighs during the love scenes . . . and grunts viciously when the voice of the villain fills the ether with ominous and menacing tones. One fears, but not too seriously, for the lovers . . . knowing full well what the happy outcome will surely be.

Each Sunday at 5:30 p.m. (EST) over NBC-WJZ a modern romance is aired in the program "Pages of Romance." Vividly presented, these dramas are selected from the best stories currently appearing in magazines such as Collier's, Red Book, Cosmopolitan, and written by such well-known authors as Dorothy Canfield, Clarence Budington Kelland, and Stephen Morehouse Avery... only to mention a few. The best popular fiction finds its way to dramatization in "Pages of Romance."

HAVE you ever read a fine story, and wished you might know the characters in it? Wished they might come to life instead of lying buried in the printed page? And then suddenly, a chance twist of the dial, and you have tuned it in! Those characters have come to life! There is that thrilling romance become real! Real people, living and breathing, romantic and gay. No longer in the pages of a magazine book, but telling their story, speaking to you in "Pages of Romance."

Each sketch presents a completely different story from the one told the previous week. A complete new group of characters is identified and for half an hour their adventure is yours. One week you may hear a story of a little servant girl who falls in love with the rich boy next door. Next week the heroine may be a sophisticated society girl, looking for adventure and excitement. Perhaps she finds love in Bermuda . . . China . . . Paris. Perhaps her quest takes her downtown in New York where she meets an impoverished social worker who shows her that her standards are false . . . and that service is the only means of lasting happiness. are all sorts of possibilities. Excitement galore. Changes of atmosphere. The love of mystery and intrigue one week. In next week's presentation the players may portray for you a story which takes place in a bleak little Swedish farmhouse... or on a moonlit terrace. It may be the doorstep of an old brownstone house in New York City . . . or the quiet hush of an operating room in a great hospital. But always there's woven into the play the old and ever new story of a man who loved a girl. And the musical background, devised especially by Graham Harris, lends

color and enchantment to the illusion.

The variety of the program leads to an almost entirely different cast of actors each week. Peggy Allenby, Ned Weaver, and Allyn Jocelyn find parts in almost every episode. But when the script calls for other characters you may hear Eunice Howard, Helen Dumas, Teddie Bergman (the Joe Palooka of last season) Hugh Rennie, Alma Kruger and John MacGovern portraying them for you

Peggy Allenby, is, you know, one of the snest dramatic actresses on the air. She

is the sparkling personality you hear as the young girl of sweet seventeen . . . or the philosophic old soul you hear as the Irishwoman, way past sixty. It's all in the day's work to Peggy, for experience with those Radio Guild plays and the Five Star Theater dramas has taught her versatility. Allyn Jocelyn you may count on invariably as the hero. Tall, romantic with so fascinating a smile, it's a pity television hasniquite arrived yet; his unusual crisp voice, touched with humor but sounding the man's man always, you've thrilled to in Danger Fighters, The March of Time, Eno Crime tales and The Showboat. The villain of sweet romantic pages is . . Ned Weaver! Of all persons! The same Ned Weaver who's been an air sweetheart of Elsie Hitz' in many radio dramas . . . now unexpectedly turns up as the almost too charming villain. Ned is currently heard on D. W. Griffith's Hollywood Revue, Charlie Chan, and the March of Time. But who could forget the Ned Weaver of True Story Hour?

LET'S pretend it's Sunday . . . in Studio A . . . the big impressive room at NBC. The minute hand of the clock points to thirty seconds before five-thirty. It's that brief electric pause which captures evez on the air . . . the magic of that moment on the stage when the curtain rises. The hand moves on. "Pages of Romance" is called. At one end of the big studio Graham Harris lifts his hand and the orchestra swings into that haunting theme song. Ralph Kirbery's baritone voice inspires in the listener the proper romantic mood. And then the announcer's "The story begins . . . "

Even the veteran actor clutches his script nervously. The sound-effects man, out of his welter of wind machines, doors, dishpans and train whistles, fixes his eyes on the director for his cue. In that brief moment, so the cast tells, each one wonders why he ever went into radio! The invited audience, seated four rows deep along both sides of the great studio, watches breathlessly in mortal terror of coughing or sneezing. Then "We're on the air!" And listeners, be they in the studio, or in their homes, sink back in their seats, hearing living pages of breathless romance . . . and loving it!

IT requires a special type of drama to put across the love story in radio, for there are no kissable lips to observe, no acting is present. The love scenes must be carried entirely through the voice—and that is difficult for even the most experienced actor.

The voice must fairly exude personality. It must ring with the utmost sincerity else it will fail miserably to portray that most tender, beautiful emotion of life—love. Love, to be real love, must be true, and the voice which portrays it on the air must sound truthful. Love lines overdone sound artificial, not real.

It is easy for an actress or actor to register such emotions as fear, or hate, or anger, or happiness through the medium of his voice alone. But it is difficult to register that most intangible of emotions—love. Why? We asked a production director. Because people make love in many different ways and voices. An angry voice is always the same. A voice expressing ardent devotion is almost never the same. When an actor says "I love you, darling," it will not sound convincing unless he has studied his lines carefully, gained just the right inflection for each word. Otherwise, the declaration, coming into the listener's own living room, and unaided by any visual effects, may sound ludicrous.

The actors and actresses of "Pages of Romance" find themselves trembling, sometimes weeping, in a high emotional pitch after they have concluded the love scenes. They throw their hearts into the lines just as if they were really in love—truly living the lines.





Hamp's \$100,000 home in Hollywood, California

Charles W. Hamp

Hamp Dodges Chains

TEN—or maybe it was eleven years ago—a young band leader, Vincent Lopez, and a young singer and piano picker, Charles W. Hamp, were playing at the Palace Theater, in Newark, New Jersey. At that time there was a radio station in Newark—the old WJZ—that was anxious to try some entertainment on the air. Previously, it had confined itself to broadcasting news flashes and weather reports. So an executive of WJZ went to see Hamp and Lopez at the theater.

"Mr. Hamp," he said, "I wonder if you will come over to our studios and sing on the radio?"

"Radio?" queried Hamp, "What's that, a new kind of benefit?" After WJZ had explained the nature of radio to the puzzled theatrical star, Hamp decided to take a chance. He sat down at a piano in the old WJZ studios, in front of a microphone that looked like the horn of an old time phonograph. He liked it.

SINCE that time Charles Hamp has indeed discovered that radio is a new kind of benefit. He has been singing and playing on the radio ever since, and his weekly salary—\$2,000, is the highest paid any artist heard over only one station. At present Hamp is under contract to Peruna, and is heard over WBBM, in Chicago. Not only is Hamp the highest paid artist on a local station, but he has been more consistently employed than any radio entertainer for the past six years. During this period, he has averaged six half hour broadcasts a week, week in and week out. He never needs any help—except his piano—and makes all the commercial announcements himself.

To the artist who believes that success—real success—in radio only lies over the networks, Hamp appears a paradox. He has been employed on stations all the way from the Pacific Coast, where he is viewed as the outstanding individual entertainer of radio, to New York—and always his salary has been larger than that of most network stars.

Hamp has an original idea about the advan-

tages of playing and singing over only one station. People tire so quickly of the same form of entertainment, he says, that artists heard over the networks are likely to kill their popularity quickly. Nevertheless, it is rumored that Hamp's program will go over a chain of stations within a few months.

HAMP is one of the stars of radio who has really reaped a golden harvest from his voice. He owns a \$100,000 castle in an exclusive section of Hollywood, California, and he is going to retire to this magnificent home when, as he says, "I make enough money not to have to worry for the rest of my life."

Like Ed McConnell, Charlie Hamp is a master air salesman. "I never use continuity on a program," he says. "I depend entirely upon my ability to ad lib. I sit down at a piano, with nothing but the music of the songs I expect to play—and then the program seems to take care of itself. I chat with my radio audience, say anything I happen to think of. Honestly, I get such a kick out of broadcasting that it seems a shame to take money for it."

Charlie was born in Richmond, Virginia, and his family moved to Johnstown, Pennsylvania, just after the flood swept that city. Charlie's father was in the hotel business—which must be where he inherited his hospitality. From his mother he learned to love music.

In his youth he studied music, but he had no idea of commercializing it. He attended one of the oldest prep schools in America—Chambersburg Academy—to prepare himself for an electrical engineering course at Yale. But all of a sudden something happened and Charlie found himself behind a counter dispensing groceries. Now to

say that young Hamp disliked dispensing potatoes by the pound and bacon by the flitch is to put it very mildly indeed. So in spare moments, between trips to the flour bin, as it were, he organized a dance orchestra. Then he promptly quit the grocery business.

THE next stop was the pit of a theater, thumping a piano, and then came a chance to join a musical comedy company. This was all before he reached the age of twenty. Then came a jaunt with a stock company. He liked it so well that he stayed two seasons.

Then, as it did to a good many young men, came the war. Charlie was fourteen months overseas, and he rose to the post of top sergeant. In the same outfit was one Adolph Menjou, then a struggling young actor.

After his discharge from the Army, Charlie Hamp joined the forces of the Keith circuit. For six years he toured the country with an act called "A Little Bit of Paris." He played in every theater from the Palace, in New York, to the "Opty" House, in Two Forks, Missouri.

THEN, as has been related, he broke into radio —when the new form of entertainment wasn't even old enough to get into its own swaddling clothes. Some years ago—before radio would pay for more than coffee and cakes, Hamp took a trip to California. He wanted to go into the movies. Then he suddenly discovered that the West Coast stations would pay real money—comparatively speaking—for air entertainment. His first big radio job was on KMTR. Then he bounded from coast to coast, beloved everywhere by radio fans, and amassing one of the really big fortunes of the entertainment world.

His principal hobby is cabinet making, and he's constantly snooping around with a movie camera. His pet expression is "Evenin', folks. Is everybody happy?" If you haven't heard it yet, listen in. You'll like Charlie Hamp.



voices on the air today. RADIO GUIDE is willing to wager that Ruth

Etting will still have one of the most colorful voices on the air tomorrow. Her voice has almost magical quality. But Ruth is no flash in the pan! Her success has been won over a period of long

arduous years. There were those years Ruth spent in Chicago night-

clubs and cabarets. Singing. Bringing men and women alike to the spot

she happened to be working at the time. Ruth has more women fans than men. No woman has ever felt she didn't care to bring her escort

to the club or show which featured the beautiful Etting. Ruth has

never driven women frantic with jealousy like many of the sensuous singers who pervade American entertainment. During the time Ruth

sang at famous Chicago night spots like the old Marigold Gardens,

Colosimo's Restaurant and the College Inn of the Hotel Sherman, she

also sang over station WLS, Chicago. Her voice was heard over the air

and she was offered a contract to make recordings. The late Florenz

Ziegfeld heard one of her records and sent Stanley Sharpe, his right

hand agent, to Chicago to sign her without seeing her. She came to

New York to play in Ziegfeld's Follies of 1927 with Eddie Cantor; to play in Ziegfeld's "Whoopee" with Eddie Cantor and with Ed

Wynn in "Simple Simon." She appeared in the last Follies the master

showman Ziegfeld ever produced. Florenz Ziegfeld said of Ruth Etting "I consider her the greatest singer of songs I have managed in

my forty years in the theater." Ruth had no pull in getting ahead

but slowly progressed from one job to another. Each one a step

farther along toward the present glory of her career. She has never

been fired. She has never quit a job to take another. She has gone on, earnestly and sincerely . . . learning of the rackets, the schemes, the tricks, the wiles that are employed in the entertainment profession,

but never having any part in them. Ruth had a much firmer foundation of success than any hollow advantage, easy living could have given her. And that is . . . her wonderful voice. She is better

equipped to tell of how some women get ahead in her profession than

any writer associated with RADIO GUIDE.

EDITOR'S NOTE: Ruth Etting has one of the most dearly loved

and time again. If she has just enough talent to get by she may make out for one production, or two . . . for as long as the "interested friend" is still interested, and depending upon the degree of his interest, which, need I say, wanes so quickly. On the stage the show girl is surrounded by beautiful settings; spot-lights play upon her. She is made up to create the most beautiful impression expert make-up technicians are able to contrive. She is raw material to these skilled artists. She presents a face and figure. Ordinary, perhaps. Yet she evolves into a gorgeous, glamorous creature . . or at least gives the impression of so being to those who sit beyond the footlights.

How long does she last?

In radio, such girls last a much shorter time. The microphone is a cold, sensitive instrument. You must have something that belongs to you exclusively, something that listeners recognize instantly. Something that listeners crave. No make-up here to hide imperfections of physical beauty. Indeed, physical beauty is unimportant before a microphone. So are those vivid stage settings that do so much to "build up" an artist on the stage. There is no audience, stunned and awed by the beauty and lavishness of the stage production as a whole, to clap and clap for any performance that is a part of it.

Looks Fail to Count

NO! Before a microphone the artist can stand in last year's dress and with a shiny nose. The audience, out there in space, relies on nothing outside of the artist for its enjoyment of the program. A voice stealing into homes and rooms, some bare, some ugly, some even vile, and most of them plain average American homes, has nothing to "build it up" excepting its own merit. If an artist is to create an illusion of beauty and wonder over the air it can be done only by tonal quality and the intrinsic emotion of the voice itself.

It doesn't matter if a girl may have an "influential friend." Our radio audience is not shy and it is certainly frank. Fan mail conceals nothing. And if fan mail shows the audience pulse to be beating indifferently for a certain artist, a station cannot afford to retain her no matter who is in back of her or who is responsible for her introduction into radio.

There are many stars of stage and screen to whom the microphone is hostile. They lack something from which the attention of a visual audience is diverted by means of props . . . but which the unseen radio audience senses instantly. There have been great singers who have entered radio. Great singers who a short time later were back singing where they had been before. There's only one explanation for it. Their voices carried nothing to their unseen audience, Acclaimed by the world, they failed to impress unseen worlds. Unseen worlds of homes and rooms whose reactions are un-

accountable in some cases. Likewise there are movie stars who have failed to capture the same applause from a stage that they've won from the screen. Numerous stage stars have tried to go Hollywood. And after one picture or two, they came back to Broadway.

Harder for the Amateur

HOW much less, then can an amateur or second rate artist hope to achieve radio success because of an "in"!

radio success because of an "in"!

No matter what native talent an artist possesses that artist will never attain the heights without practice and experience. No factor can replace experience. The singer who progresses slowly and surely, learning, learning, learning—and utilizing everything learned—is equipped to stay at the top after once obtaining the attention of the public. Overnight "finds" and "sensations" are here today . . . and gone . . . gone forever tomorrow. How few ever come back! A rapid rise to success means an equally rapid fall to the depths. These artists have nothing to sustain themselves once they've reached the top of the ladder.

"I've Learned About Women"

MY years as a singer in cabarets, stage productions and radio has shown me much. It has shown me that women who use their wiles to get ahead are near-sighted . . . seeing only the very immediate future. They don't realize what the outcome is most certainly going to be. That little torch singer of a big radio variety program last spring, for instance. She had the introduction of one of the most famous showmen in the world . . . because she was the "friend" of a radio columnist. Her picture flashed across pages. Publicity was given her in all important publications. But when she sang . . . the radio audience wondered. There was nothing in this voice that held its fancy. It wasn't long before that girl was off the air. I never knew whether it was because she'd lost her sweetie or not. But surely she had never clicked. And so she was through. And there's a nice lad directing his own orchestra over the air who has a different girl singing with his band every few weeks!



LITTLE LEE WILEY IS SINGING HER WAY TO RADIO FAME

LEE WILEY'S a slim young thing with a cupid's bow mouth and languid eyes. She has a pointed chin with a dimple in it. She most decidedly does not resemble a young-girl-capable-of-hard-work. But 'twas a wise old gent who first remarked that looks are deceiving. Lee Wiley looks just like the kind of girl she was a few months ago. A few months ago Lee Wiley was a gay little butterfly, flitting about, having a glorious time. Today Lee Wiley is the featured singer of Leo Reisman's Pond's Program and a songwriter with a couple of swell tunes to boot. Maybe it's the Cherokee in her coming out. Lee's one quarter native red woman, let me say. You know Indians on the warpath! Maybe that's why Lee aould blaze a trail from Fort Gibson, Oklahoma, to New York City and knock radio's scalp for a loop!

Let me explain. Ever since she was old enough to abandon hair-ribbon bows and patent leather Mary Jane pumps, Lee Wiley has been coming to New York "to shop." Now that in itself doesn't mean very much. Every day people from Brooklyn, from Jersey, and from Connecticut travel toward Manhattan's fashion emporiums. But Lee and her mother rode days and nights before the fast train they'd boarded at Tulsa could deposit them at their Gotham des-

tination. They'd visit friends, round up their wardrobes, see shows and go places.

WHEN Lee came to New York for her annual trip last fall, she knew this trip couldn't be as gala an event as it had been in the past. Sitting on a train for days at a time gives a person ideas, you know. Lee began thinking she ought

to do something. What . . . she had no idea. Her impulse to "do something" was still vaguely floating about in her mind while she was wined and dined around the city's fashionable night spots. And even when her crowd pulled her over to sing for Leo Reisman at the Central Park Casino one night she hadn't caught on to any definite ambition.

But as Leo Reisman was offering her the opportunity to become his vocalist above all the hundreds of professional singers he had at his beck and call, surely, thought Lee, there must be something in my voice that merits his decision. Reasoning on this premise Lee went to work sensibly and quietly. Gradually she picked up "mike technique," learning when to step away from the sensitive little sound carrying instrument . . . and when to draw near it. At first she sang only choruses. But when the new Pond's series started over the air, Lee became a featured artist. Along with Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt—if you please! Lee thinks Mrs. Roosevelt is "the most marvelous woman in intelligence, poise and gracious manner" she has ever been privileged to meet. "Why even the boys in the band think she's a grand person and a swell sport!"
