Is she a magic voice—an ethereal, providently-endowed organ for phrasing words?

This is a quandary which has puzzled radio audiences ever since chain broadcasting was an innovation. For that was when Elsie Hitz first began to cast a spell with the marked wizardry of her voice.

It is true that Elsie's voice is of a richness particularly its own. But dominating that fact is the realization that she is a real flesh-and-blood woman, a very feminine young lady, and one of those dynamic persons who wouldn't for a minute permit her physical charm to become secondary to her dramatic equipment. Elsie's voice, to put first things first, is just a Thespian tool to be used on occasion—whereas her personal characteris-

tics are worn constantly. And it is by these she would have you know her.
The invisibility which, fortunate-

ly, is a rapidly waning shortcoming of radio entertainment, lends elaboration to the illusion that Elsie is just a phantom voice. But those who know her are not confused by the issue. To them she is the vivid, startling heroine of a dozen personal experiences which match the situations prepared for the

roles which she enacts.

Carl Lyndon Bixby, author of the Dangerous Paradise sketches in which Elsie is featured with Nick Dawson, for many months has been fashioning

for many months has been fashioning his episodes around actual or nearly parallel adventures experienced by his two leading players.

This fact eliminates any conjecture about magic from the skill of Miss Hitz. True, her rare voice is a handy vehicle, but it only conveys the naturalness which she puts into her work.

her work.

Outstanding about Elsie Hitz is the fact that while she is theatrically trained, she never is theatrical. Underplaying her roles has taught her the modulation which is her chief attraction, and is the leash which forever has kept her from going dramatic. tic.

In some stars this is highly developed microphone technique, but in this stage-trained Cleveland girl it is nature asserting itself with the aid of a well-balanced sense of proportion. To her, to be natural is instinctive—and it is by being natural that she has endeared a continent to her thoroughly typical art.

HE was born in the Ohio metropolis on July 21, 1902, so she has reached her mature skill by progressive so she has reached her mature skill by progressive stages, interlarding her dramatic experiences with that most exciting of all feminine adventures, matrimony, and its culminating thrill, maternity. Her husband, Jack Welch, is of the commercial world, and so far they have no career plans for their only daughter. Elsie, herself, will carry on just so long as audiences continue

herself, will carry on just so long as addictices continue to acclaim her.

Most life stories are humdrum. But that's not so of Elsie Hitz'. What makes her story so well worth telling is the fact that little suspected facts creep in about her that completely tear down the veil of

obscurity and disclose her as some one you've known

obscurity and disclose her as some one you've known right along, theoretically, without realizing it.

For instance, her first radio appearance, which was in the original microphone presentations of Show Boat. She did the part of Magnolia and doubtless there still are listeners who will recall that at the time they wondered who the girl was with that compelling voice.

Others will recall the leading woman in such stage successes as The Butter and Egg Man; The Spider; The Cat and the Canary; Penrod and many others, and when they learn that it was Elsie Hitz, exclaim: "Is that who that was? No wonder we remember her so vividly. I didn't have any idea it was the same person who has I didn't have any idea it was the same person who has made such a success in radio."

A ND until she became known in The Magic Voice over the CBS network and later in Dangerous Paradise by way of NBC, she figured prominently, but more or less anonymously, in such radio features as the True Story Hour: The Shadow; Arabesque; Love Stories; American School of the Air and other programs.

The illusion bred of radio somehow presents Miss Hitz as the striding, masculine type of woman. On the contrary, she is as slight as a reed, weighing only 107 pounds. She is five feet, three and one-half inches tall and is of the type of beauty generally connected with the light brown hair and deep brown eyes combination.

Broadway knew her at 16, and she has been an important figure there for the succeeding years of her life. One of her few departures from the Manhattan scene was to play 30 weeks with a Boston stock company, and there were occasional tours with road shows.

But she has rejected completely the New York com-

But she has rejected completely the New York complex. She is of no place so far as her attitude toward her roles is concerned. And that of itself has been an invaluable aid in adapting herself to her tremendous variety of parts.

From the standpoint of those who work with her and the man who currently writes her scripts, she is the epitome of desirable material. By virtue of her beautifully rounded career and her fine flair for repression she literally writes herself into any continuities in which she is to figure

which she is to figure.

No, Elsie Hitz is no phantom. She is a virile, important person, and the only thing about her which even suggests the word "dream," is that she is the answer to any director's or script-writer's dream.

Away from the Studios, Raymond Knight Tries to Stay as Close as Possible to the Atmosphere Surrounding His Art. Read His Own Story of How He Does It

It HAS BEEN rumored persistently among radio listeners that I am one of the original Mystic Knights of the Sea, but there is no more mystery about me than there is about a bathing beauty's silhouette.


I am addressed properly by my inferiors as Mr. Knight, which doubtless has been perverted to Mystic Knight—and accounts for the false rumors. Neither shall I further be confused as the name figure in the Knight Life of the Gods, another fallacy wnich has caused me untold mental anguish.

Nor yet have I ever had the distinction of being formally knighted. I know that formula too well. Some distinguished sovereign lays a sword uncomfortably close to your neck and says: "Be Knighted, Sir Raymond."

And while I may be benighted in my boyish way. I don't want the fact proclaimed before an audience by some top-heavy guy in ermine who looks like a Soglow character.

on the ground floor, and the bustle is next door in the Phoenix Corset, Brassiere and Bustle Shop, Inc.

It is extremely important to the creative mind that it be not disturbed by the noises of the great city, and so I ascend in the elevator to Airycastle (as I call my penthouse). I hear the clamor gradually growing fainter and fainter until it disappears altogether. (This clamor, by the way, must not be confused with a man who digs clams at low tide.)

A S I reach the top of the Chrysler Tower where Airy-castle is, I nod goodbye to Walter P. Chrysler—who usually runs me up—and enter the doors of my little retreat. In honor of this my private bugler blows retreat, and Smedley comes forward to relieve me of my fur-lined coat. Smedley is my faithful old retainer who has been with me longer than any other of the servants. I can't remember just how long, but it must be at least six months. His real name is Herman; however, I call

him Smedley because he is a butler.

I shall now briefly describe Airycastle, as one's surroundings have a definite effect upon one when one does creative work. Or two for that matter.

The entire design of my home is planned to put me into a mood to write radio programs, and therefore each room is faithfully copied from various rooms and studios at Radio City. When I am home, I am really living in an atmosphere of Radio, and not for a single moment am I away from my inspiration. You will see how carefully it has been planned from the following description:

THE foyer, which is the first room encountered as you stumble over the elevator door, is done in the manner of an NBC reception hall. As I enter, an ex-Follies beauty—whom I have trained myself—looks at me coldly and says "Whom did you wish to see?" I laughingly explain that I live there, whereupon she resumes polishing her nails. Smedley and I smile at each other covertly, and I am right at home.

From the foyer I go into the music room which is a faithful copy of the music library at NBC. All my music is filed on shelves about the walls, and a grand piano at one side is tastefully covered with several overcoats and hats and a varied collection of briefcases, gloves and

Usually I require a few-moments of relaxation, so I summon Smedley and ask him for a piece of music which fits my mood. If, for example, it is a bit of Brahms, I say "Brahms" whereupon, after an hour's search through the "X's," Smedley produces a Tchaikowsky overture This is played on the piano by one of my staff of musicians who is always standing by ready to go on at a moment's notice.

Beyond is the huge living-room which is an exact reproduction of Studio 8 H, at Radio City. As I wander into this theater-like place, I am immediately filled with a tremendous desire to set down on paper some great.

like them, and whiskey and soda are there for supporters of that drink. Practically everyone present elected to partake of the vodka—except Bea, who restricts her imbibing to light beer.



Hayton is leaving the FRED ALLEN show, of course, and he will be replaced there by the band of PETER VAN STEEDEN, one of the smarter young maestros. This

Two other significant developments of the week

The plunge of an entire nation into the radio field as a sponsor. The Country of Mexico is sponsoring the already current Mexican music of the MERCADO band, with the idea of popularizing Mexico as a tourist's paradise. Following closely upon this expedient comes the Musical Union Local 802 by-laws can be effected.

Quite a surprise was occasioned by the announcement during the week that MORTON DOWNEY'S Sunday afternoon show would fade out April 7, and that his other evening show would continue up until June. The big flurry of the week eventuated when it became know that GENERAL HUGH JOHNSON, through Northwestern University (where he was to speak) appealed for time on WJZ to counter-attack FATHER COUGHLIN, but was refused. For 48 hours there was turmoil in the NBC. The refusal had been ordered by high officials. It was explained in a statement that the refusal was based on previous negotiations with the General for a time spot, in Washington. This was the baloney, but things were set right when, following a huddle of radio execs, Johnson was contacted—with the result that he will go on the air Saturday night, March 31, at 10:30 EST (9:30 CST).





start. They trusted to their already-proved ingenuity to find suitable titles for their new characters. As the first idea developed, it began to dawn upon them that it would be difficult to create the first scripts unless the characters were named.

There's a sound reason for that. A trip to the boys' office in Chicago any afternoon will divulge it. When they are creating their scripts they assume the parts identically as they portray them on the broadcasts. They can be heard plainly through the partitions, speaking in the varied voices of that shadow parade with which the nation has become familiar.

It was impossible to throw themselves into the parts if they had no names. After all, Hey There! or Say You! were rather inadequate salutations, so without much thought for the euphony or potential popularity of the names, the two decided on Jim and Charley. Only after the first script was concluded and on paper did they realize that their species of newprediction had been selected.

HE importance that radio has asnever been more clearly demonstrated than in Adolph Hitler's recent startling announcement to the world, via stort waves, of German's definitely and finally abandoning the Versailles treaty.

A few minutes after this drastic statement was issued from Germany, the radio channels of the world were humming with the frantic interchange of messages be-tween statesmen of the various world powers, each trying to decide just how this announcement was going to affect his in-dividual country. The English translation of Hitler's speech came through DJB, Zeesen, Germany, on Sunday morning, March 17, from 10:45 to 11 a.m.
Without making any attempt to philoso-

phize. I say that short wave listening is destined to be an important factor in deciding whether or not there will be another war. Today one may decide for himself the vital issues of the day by tuning from country to country.



to a glossary of names in their office dictionary and listed from it, alphabetically, all of the male titles which they believed would be used by a Negro mammy for one of her boys. They never got beyond the A's. For the bluff, know-it-all character they had devised, Andrew struck them as thoroughly typical. For his meek but more intelligent pal. Amos impressed but more intelligent pal, Amos impressed them as positively ideal. The alliteration them as positively ideal. The alliteration made for euphony, and the contraction of Andrew to Andy produced a short and easily remembered title.

Thus were born the two adventurers whose careers were shortly to be the concern of an entire continent—whose words were to halt service in public cafes; whose lives were, for a time so to confound thea-ter owners that many of them found it expedient to interrupt shows and permit their audiences to hear the broadcast right in the theaters, in order to accomodate the customers who otherwise would not stir from their firesides until each evening's Amos 'n' Andy episode was concluded.

WMAQ officials were more lenient with Gosden and Correll about the proposed recordings which would permit broadcasting of the day's episode simultaneously in all parts of the country. Their decision was far-sighted. Already the station had NBC affiliations for occasional network purposes, and its owners realized that popularizing the Amos 'n' Andy sketches in remote sections of the country would pro-vide them with a high-class feature for later sale to the big chain organization.

With Robb directing their business af-

fairs, the broadcasting by records was in-augurated. The plan was simple enough. Independent stations were offered ten suc-cessive recorded broadcasts, with the understanding that if they proved unpopular the contract would be abrogated automatically. It is almost needless to say that no station that launched the series ever can-celled its contract. Within a year the Amos 'n' Andy disconnected chain was the largest on record, and it was to be many years before any of the network organizations would approximate, for single broadcasts, the number of stations included in that phonographic network controlled by Gosden and Correll.

It was not until a few months after the network was set up that the boys had any idea of the popularity which they had attained. In response to a request from a theatrical firm in the Northwest they decided to make a personal appearance tour along the Pacific Coast in hope of bringing themselves into the public eye.

Their first stop was San Francisco. Their previous experience as hams playing seemingly interminable theatrical tours in no way prepared them for what happened in that city. They were accustomed to the routine of debarking from day-coaches, unostentatiously entering those mysterious back doors which characterize all show houses, and there fighting the customary battles for billing and position.

It is a fact that when Correll and Gosden stepped down the Pullman steps and saw the horde which had turned out to greet them, they instinctively turned around to watch other passengers alight, thinking that some movie star or national figure had been on the train.

It was Robb who first realized that the crowd was there to welcome Amos n' Andy, the two bashful Chicago entertainers who had come West in the hope that they might build up some prestige with potential listeners. Save for the huge mail response to their recent contest, this year—which was amazing in light of the fact that the act was charged with waning in popularity—that San Francisco greeting, which took on all the aspects of a civic holiday, still stands out in the minds of Freeman Gosden and Charles Correll as the most vivid experience in their entire success story.

"Boy, that was sumpin'," is their char-

acteristic succint summary of the occasion.

In light of later developments it appears to the lay eye as practically nothing, but it was eventful to a pair of aspiring actors who, to phrase the cliche of

the day, "didn't know their own strength."
For two years Amos 'n' Andy pursued the weird experiences of the Fresh Air Taxicab Co., Incorpolated, over WMAQ and via their widely distributed records.

Their first omen of what was in store

for them materialized from a totally unexpected telephone call which brought them into contact with an old friend of WEBH days. Sen Kaney. By then Kaney had ascended to managerial capacity with the National Broadcasting Company. It was just prior to one of the boys' broadcasts that Correll received the call. Kaney

wonder if you could come in some time tomorrow morning. Niles Trammell would like to have a talk with you."

Trammell is vice-president of NBC and manager of all its Chicago activities. That call was pregnant with eventualities—yet prominent among them was a decision which might easily have subjugated Amos 'n' Andy to a point where their identities would have been so merged with others that their tremendous future might have been forever balked.

Learn how the future of Amos 'n' Andy bung in the balance—in next week's issue of Radio Guide. In the forthcoming instalment will be disclosed the plans of the sponsor who wanted to employ Gosden and Correll, but who wasn't convinced that a symphony orchestra might have a greater appeal—or that if he did use the act, how it might be presented to better advantage in an entirely different setting. How the boys themselves, along with Sen Kaney, fought and conquered, is fully revealed in next week's issue. Don't fail to read these intimate revelations.





Hastily I dictate the rough outline of some magnificent ether program, and as I talk I can see through the glass windows of the control room how fast her fingers are flying as she endeavors to control the flow of language which is pouring to her out of the loudspeaker.

As soon as the rough idea is outlined, I

As soon as the rough idea is outlined. I signal to Smedley, who has been sitting in one of the 1,500 living-room chairs, and he steps to the microphone.

"This concludes our dictation," he says. "You have been listening to Raymond Knight, the Voice of the Diaphragm, in a program of his own ideas. This is Smedley Herman Butler, saying—goodnight and God bless von." night and God bless you."

With this completed, the next thing is

With this completed, the next thing is to polish up the program, put dialogue in it, select the music and find a sponsor. I allow myself from fifteen minutes to one hour to write a radio script. This is my cue, and as I dash off page after page of manufacturers they are seized.

Sometimes she gets excited at the speed of writing, and once she slipped the uniformed page into the rollers of the typewriter instead of the manuscript page. But she never repeated this




